EAU CLAIRE, Wis., June 13. (AP)—Twelve persons were injured, a few seriously, by a tornado that swept through Eau Claire from the west tonight. Several buildings were blown down. A preliminary estimate set damage at \$400,000.

Fire Breaks Out

Five fires that broke out shortly after the storm struck at 7 p. m. were reported under control.

Telephones, telegraph and electric light poles and wires were twisted in a hedge-jodge debris. Firemen and doctors worked in darkness rescuing injured. Communication was re-established with outside points on a hurriedly repaired long distance line.

Legion Group To Gather In Slaton Today

Eleven Delegates From Local Post Selected; 600 To 800 Ex-Service Men To Session On Saturday And Sunday

Eleven official delegates from the Allen Brothers post, local American legion, have been named to represent this city at the 18th District Texas American Legion convention which opens today in Slaton. The convention will continue through Sunday.

Aside from the official delegates practically every other member of the post is expected to attend the assembly one of the two days, officers stated yesterday.

Delegates Named.

The vanguard of delegates to the gathering began arriving in Slaton last night, according to word received from that city. Total attendance during the two days is expected to be between 600 and 800. Amarillo delegates will arrive Sunday morning on a special train with more than 150 men and women aboard, according to Floyd L. Sloan, adjutant of the Amarillo post.

Judge Clark M. Mullican, of this city, will deliver the main address at the 11 o'clock assembly Sunday morning at the Slaton high school auditorium. The convention business sessions will be held Sunday afternoon while entertainment features are carried for Saturday night.

CHICAGO, June 13. (AP)—A report that the slayer of Alfred "Jake" Lingle, Tribune reporter, was seen in St. Louis yesterday was received by Chicago police today as they continued their onslaught on the underworld, arresting more than a thousand persons.

Hunt Continues

Although the Chicago authorities were interested in the report and asked St. Louis police to drive Pryor, itinerant painter, who said he talked with Lingle's slayer just before the shot was fired and then saw him again yesterday at Grand and Olive streets in St. Louis.

Authorities investigating the slaying were doing so with the utmost secrecy. One new special investigating body entered the manhunt today with the appointment of counsel for the Tribune as a special assistant state's attorney.

Only Five Guarantors Stand Between Lubbock and Chautauqua Program for Next Year; Manager Remains Hopeful

POSSIBILITY that the Associated Chautauques will return to Lubbock in 1931 was seen late yesterday in an announcement by J. A. The Republican-dominated House will take up tomorrow the conference agreement adjusting the differences between the two branches and adoption is confidently predicted after two or three hours of debate.

Graves Trial Nears Jurors

Subway Damage Action Awaiting \$7,500 Near To End; Three Witnesses Heard For Each Side On Friday

With four remaining witnesses yet to go on the stand, the case of Mrs. E. E. Graves against the City of Lubbock, involving a considerable amount of \$7,500, probably will go to the jury shortly before noon today, it was indicated last night.

Three major witnesses were placed on the stand yesterday by both the plaintiff and defense. Roland Graves, E. E. Speck and L. H. Holt testified for plaintiff while R. C. Pierce, J. H. Hankins and W. R. Price were defense witnesses.

Up Again Today.
The case, which is being tried in the 12th district court before Judge Homer L. Pharr, will be taken up again this morning at 9 o'clock.

Plaintiff in the case alleges that damage to the above named amount was caused against her property due to construction of the Avenue H subway. Mrs. Graves is owner of lots 13 and 14, block 40, abutting Avenue H, between 6th and 8th streets. She charges that the only ingress and egress to her property was through Avenue H, and that the underpass has decreased the value of her property from \$4,000 to \$5,000.

"The trouble," he advised the hundreds of women delegates, "is that while labor saving machinery has greatly lessened the house woman's traditional knee-and-elbow responsibilities, she has not yet organized her eye, ear and brain for answering the nation-wide advertisement recently created by the latest progress in psychology."

Luling Automobilist Dies As Water Sweeps Across Road Near San Angelo; Five-Inch Fall Is Reported

Bridge Washed Out

Sweetwater, Llano, Ballinger And Brownwood Among Towns Reporting Heavy Rain; To Be Aid To Crops

DALLAS, June 13.—A large part of West Texas was drenched with a rain today which set at least two rivers on a rampage. The rain also touched other widely separated portions of the state. High water claimed one life.

The North Concho river went on a 25-foot rise. It became a mile wide at Camp Connelley near San Angelo, where sixty Boy Scouts were camped. While their mess hall was standing two feet in water the boys canned their equipment to higher ground.

Heavy Fall Reported

The heaviest fall reported at Sterling City, Bronte and Robert Lee, where it totaled five inches. San Angelo, Sweetwater, Llano, Brownwood, Rowena, Miles, Merita and Ballinger were among the other towns receiving moisture.

A 25-foot rise resulted on the Llano river and a bridge near Llano was washed out. Several washouts in Northern Mexico, south of Laredo, were being repaired today.

Cleburne Rains Helps.
The rain near Cleburne was of particular benefit because of its aid to the crops which had been replanted after the hailstorm in that area. Rain also was reported at Waco.

Sunday-School Lesson

General Topic:
Jesus on the Cross.
Scripture Lesson:
Matthew 27:33-50.

33. And when they were come unto a place called Golgotha, that is to say, the place of a skull.

34. They gave him wine to drink mingled with gall: and when he tasted it, he would not drink.

35. And when they had crucified him, they parted his garments among them, casting lots:

36. And they sat and watched him.

37. And they set up over his head this accusation written, This is JESUS THE KING OF THE JEWS.

38. Then there crucified with him two robbers, one on the right hand and one on the left.

39. And they that passed by rallied him, wagging their heads.

40. And saying, Thou that destroyest the temple, and buiddest it in three days, save thyself: if thou art the Son of God, come down from the cross.

41. In like manner also, the chief priests mocking him, with the scribes and elders, said:

42. He saved others; himself he cannot save. He is the King of Israel: let him now come down from the cross, and we will believe on him.

43. He trusted on God; let him deliver him now, if he desireth him: for he said I am the Son of God.

44. And the robbers also that were crucified with him cast upon him the same reproach.

45. Now from the sixth hour there was darkness over all the land until the ninth hour.

46. And about the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, saying, Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani: that is to say, God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?

47. And some of them that stood there, when they heard it, said, This man calleth Elijah.

48. And straightway one of them ran, and took a sponge, and filled it with vinegar, and put it on a reed, and gave him to drink.

49. And the rest said, Let be: let us see whether Elijah cometh to him.

50. And Jesus cried again with a loud voice, and yielded up his spirit.

so called because it was the site of public executions, or perhaps because caves in the hillside gave the appearance of empty eye-sockets, making the hill look from a distance like a skull. There is such a resemblance in the hill on the north of Jerusalem, about 200 yards from the Damascus gate, which many modern scholars regard as the real Golgotha, but the eye-sockets are modern. The traditional site of the crucifixion is the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, inside the present walls of Jerusalem.

Crucifixion.
"And when they had crucified him." Crucifixion was a Roman method of execution, reserved for slaves and outlaws. Cicero, who knew it well, called it the most cruel and shameful of all punishments. The hands, and usually the feet, of the victim were nailed to the cross, sometimes before the cross was erected, sometimes after. Generally the victim was only a little above the ground, not so high as our pictures ordinarily suggest. Stalker says: "The most revolting feature of death by crucifixion was that the torture was deliberately prolonged. The victim usually lingered a whole day, sometimes two or three days, still retaining consciousness, while the burning of the wounds in the hands and feet, the uneasiness of the unnatural position, the oppression of overcharged veins, and above all, the intolerable thirst were constantly increasing."

"Jesus, the King of the Jews." v. 37. "And they set up over his head his accusation written." It was written on a white tablet which the condemned always were suspended from his neck on the way to the cross, or else it was carried before him by a soldier. Now it was nailed to the cross above the head of Jesus. "THIS IS JESUS THE KING OF THE JEWS." Pilate himself wrote the inscription, in bitter mockery of the Jews. They felt the aspersion, and a deputation of chief priests went to Pilate asking him to change the title to read, "He said, 'I am King of the Jews.'" With a sneer the Roman governor answered them shortly, "What I have written I have written." (John 19:22). The inscription was written in three languages, that all beholders might read it: in Latin, the language of power, in Greek, the language of culture, and in Hebrew, the language of religion. This was typified the service that Christianity was to perform in the fields of civilized government, of mental development, and of spiritual enlightenment. Thus also was indicated the worldwide reach of the religion of Jesus Christ. And thus was set forth the central fact that Jesus was in truth a king, the King of Kings, whose kingdom will outlast all earthly kingdoms, and never pass away.

Introduction.
When Jesus came back from his third season of prayer in the garden, he was betrayed by Judas, arrested by the soldiers, and forsaken by his disciples. Then followed his trial, first before the Jewish authorities, then before the Roman authorities. He was finally condemned by Pilate and turned over to the soldiers to be crucified.

This lesson brings us to the climax of the story of redemptive love. The agony in the garden is past. The mockery of a trial is over. Peter is grieving over his shameful denial. Judas has thrown down before the chief priests the silver that is tarnished by innocent blood, and has gone out in the bitterness of despair to end his wretched life. Pilate is contemplating his cowardly surrender to the clamor of the crowd. The chief priests are gloating over their victory. The disciples are looking on in helpless amazement at the destruction of all their hopes. The Saviour himself is crowning his matchless life with an even more matchless death.

Golgotha. v. 33.
"And when they were come unto a place called Golgotha, that is to say, the place of a skull." Both the Hebrew Golgotha, and the Latin Calvary mean "the place of a skull."

Christ could not save himself and be true to his divine mission. "He is the King of Israel." This was said in mockery, echoing the inscription above the head of Jesus. "Let him now come down from the cross, and we will believe on him." They would not have believed on Jesus because of any such sign. Jesus had worked many miracles greater than that, and they had refused to believe. The miracle of the resurrection was infinitely greater than would have been a descent from the cross, and yet men do not believe on Christ because of his crowning miracle.

"Darkness Over All the Land."
vs. 45, 46.

"Now from the sixth hour." That would be noon, six hours after sunrise. Jesus was crucified about the third hour, 9 a. m., and had hung on the cross three hours. "There was darkness over all the land until the ninth hour." "Until 3 p. m., lasting three hours. This darkness could not have been caused by an eclipse, for, as it was, the moon was full. It was a supernatural darkness, the world sympathizing with the woe of its Creator.

"And about the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice." Showing that even after six hours of the most fearful agony that would endure and live, our Lord retained a goodly measure of strength. Jesus was crucified at the time of the daily morning sacrifice in the temple, and died at the time of the daily evening sacrifice, those sacrifices being typical of the death of the Lamb of God for the sins of the world. "Saying, My God, My God, why hast thou forsaken me?" Christ quoted Ps. 22:1. In that awful hour, with the weight of the world's sin pressing down upon his soul, the one final horror of it all to the Son of God was the sense of separation from his Father.

"It is Finished." John 19:30.

"And Jesus cried again with a loud voice." He shouted in triumph the sixth word from the cross (it is literally a single word in the Greek). "It is finished." John 19:30, which has truly been called the greatest single word ever uttered. Not merely his suffering was finished, his life on earth, but his mission was accomplished, human salvation was finished with a perfect sacrifice, the old era was finished and the era of the New Covenant was begun. Immediately afterward the Saviour uttered the seventh word from the cross, "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit" (Luke 23:46). "And yielded up his spirit." "His last cry with a loud voice" was not like that of one dying. In the language of the early Christian hymn it was not Death which approached

Christ, but Christ Death. Christ encountered Death, not as conquered, but as the Conqueror. — Alfred Edersheim.

The Great Earthquake. vs. 31-33.
A violent earthquake at the time of Christ's death testified still further to the sympathy of even the inanimate creation with its Creator. By the earthquake the heavy curtain which separated the Holy Place of the temple from the Most Holy Place was rent from top to bottom, signifying that now to all men, and not only to the high priest once a year, the way was open to God (Heb. 10:19-20). The centurion, in charge of the soldiers, had doubtless witnessed many crucifixions, and had seen many men die, but he had seen no death like Christ's. What he saw moved him to glorify God and to exclaim (Luke), "Certainly this was a righteous man!" and (Matthew), "Truly this was the Son of God!" He was not brought to the conclusion by the earthquake or the preceding darkness, but by the bearing of Christ through all the six hours of suffering, and most of all by the way in which he died.

TOO MANY LOVERS Murder Trial Brings Out New Findings in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, June 13. (AP)—Attorneys for Otto Sanhuber, on trial here charged with the murder of Fred Osterreich, wealthy retired Milwaukee garment manufacturer, said in court today that Mrs. Osterreich, the widow, had another lover in the basement while she was shielding Sanhuber in a garret cubbyhole of her home. Sanhuber and Mrs. Osterreich are jointly charged with the manufacturer's murder but are to be tried separately.

BUDAPEST (AP)—Stamp collectors are warned by the Hungarian Confederation of Philatelists that most of the stamps bearing super-descriptions of Rumania, Jugo-Slavia and Czechoslovakia on territories ceded after the war, are fraudulent. The frauds came from Switzerland and warrants have been issued against several dealers.

LENOX WINS IN SUIT Cotton Co-Op Loses Decision in Clarksville Court

CLARKSVILLE, June 13. (AP)—The district court here today awarded \$149,000 net damages to Lenox and Lenox, Clarksville cotton men in their suit against the Texas Cotton Cooperative association.

The controversy began in 1922. The cooperative sought damages on the grounds that Lenox and Lenox were under contract to sell 2790 bales of cotton and only 1,986 bales were delivered.

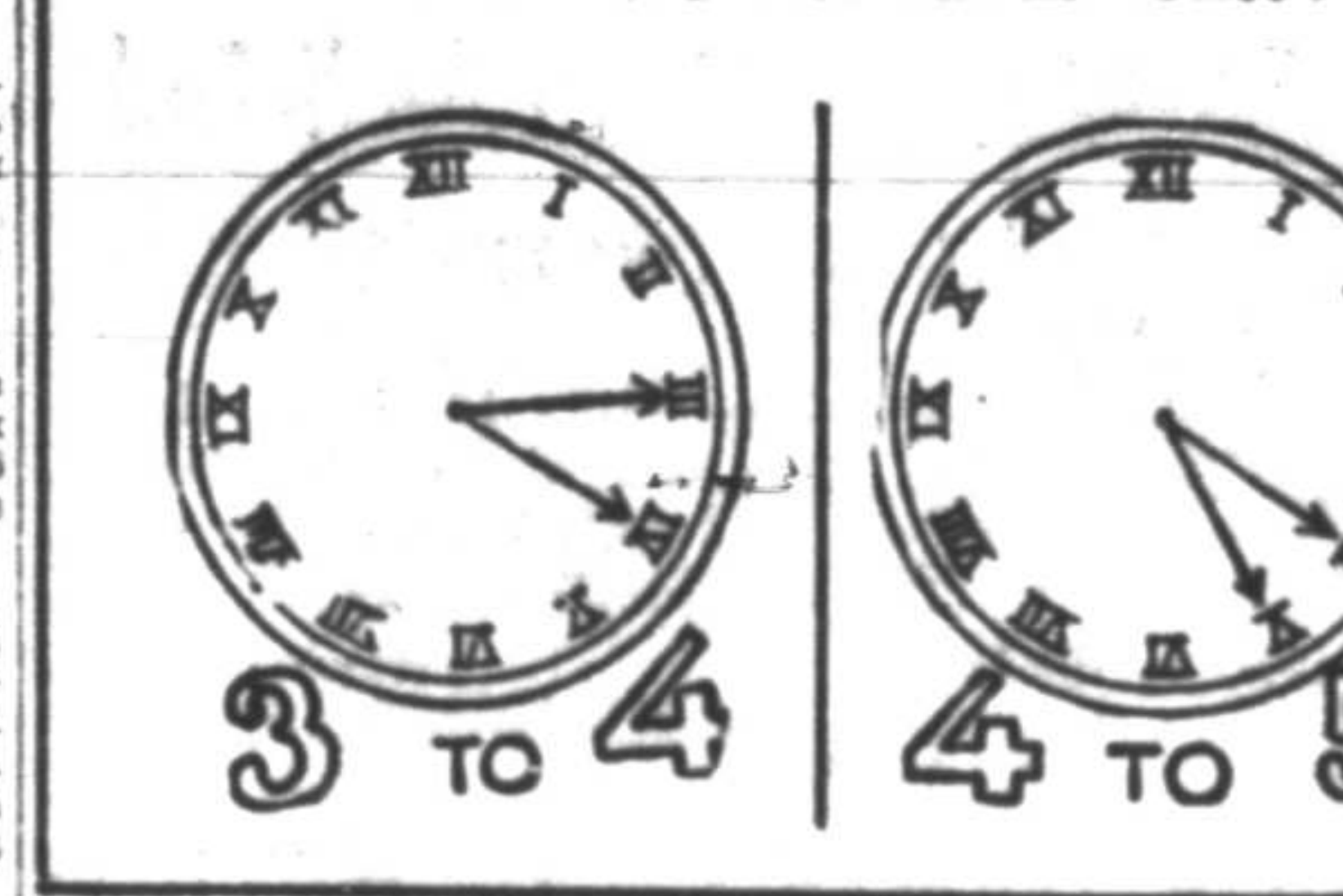

Ten thousand small pamphlets telling of the many things which might cause the loss and waste of water and instructions for their remedy, have been ordered by the city and will be distributed to all water users during the summer months.

Pro-Law Head To Be Chosen By July First

ew Commander Of Dry Forces Is Topic Of Discussion At Selection Day Draws Near; Guesses Are Numerous

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, June 13.—The man who is going to have charge of prohibition under the Justice department is to be selected soon. Transfer of responsibility from the Treasury department takes effect July first. Attorney General Mitchell and his aides have not disclosed who is being considered as enforcement director, but those mentioned prominently include Robert L. Watts, assistant district attorney in New York; Howard Jones, an assistant to G. A. Youngquist, assistant attorney general; Samuel O. Wynn, prohibition administrator at Philadelphia; and J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the bureau of investigation of the justice department.

Watts Is Able
Watts has handled the prosecution of prohibition cases in New York City. He is regarded in enforcement circles as informed and able. Jones served as assistant to Mabel Walker Willebrandt, while she was assistant attorney general in charge of Volstead prosecutions. Even if another is selected as director, the consensus is that Jones will be appointed assistant. Wynn is connected with prohibition enforcement under the treasury. It has been said Mr. Mitchell will want to start with executives who have not been associated with the Treasury's regime, however, and some friends of Wynn believe this objection may work to his disadvantage.

Plans Withheld
The same silence that has shrouded selection of a director has covered plans of reorganization. It is generally accepted, however, that Mitchell will reorganize the bureau to comprise ten or eleven administrative districts instead of 27 as at present. Probably as many as fifty or sixty enforcement districts, double the present number will be formed.

Chicago Will Go Without Its Beer

CHICAGO, June 13.—One of the largest sources of Chicago's beer supply was shut off today after a raid on a mammoth brewery at 2108 South Wabash street within a stone's throw of the Metropole hotel, reputed headquarters of the Capone interests.

District Chief Alexander G. Jamie of the federal prohibition forces said the raid yesterday, made after weeks of undercover investigation, resulted in the arrest of one man and the seizure of 50,000 gallons of brewed beer, 75 half-barrels and 150,000 gallons of beer in process of manufacture.

Charles Wynert, 30, the only man arrested, insisted he was merely a repairman called to adjust some machinery. Among the books and records seized at the plant were several checks signed with the name Mike Potan. Jamie said Potan was owner of Colisimo's club.

M'BRIDE IN TALK

Anti-Saloon League Czar, In Pennsylvania, Raps Wets
GROVE CITY, Pa., June 13.—P. Scott McBride today reviewed the senate lobby committee's investigation of the Anti-Saloon league in an address here and said all charges made against the organization by the wets had been disproved.

"Figuratively speaking, the wets have turned the Anti-Saloon league inside out, but have found the league methods proper, economical, consistent, effective and in every way defensible," McBride, who is general superintendent of the league, said.

WIMBLEDON, England, June 13. (AP)—By winning only one of three matches in the first day's play for the Wightman Cup, America's national women's tennis team left itself a difficult task for tomorrow if the trophy is to be taken back to the United States by Helen Wills Moody and her team mates.

It was Queen Helen, of course, who won her match in the expected manner, 6-1, 6-1, from Joan Fry. But her fellow Californian, Helen Jacobs, lost to her English nemesis, Miss Phoebe Watson, at 2-6, 6-2, 6-4, and the youthful Sarah Paley and Edith Cross were beaten by Joan Fry and Brynnyrd Harvey of England by the same score.

As a result, the Americans must win three of tomorrow's four matches. Mrs. Moody is considered certain to account for one of them. Miss Jacobs, meeting Miss Fry, will have a chance to alone for her defeat by Miss Watson today; and then either the 17-year-old Boston girl, Miss Paley, must win her match against young Phyllis Mudford, or Mrs. Moody and Miss Jacobs will have to win in doubles, a feat no American combination has been able to accomplish since 1927.

Sisters "Defend" Home Against Law As Officers Push Eviction Process

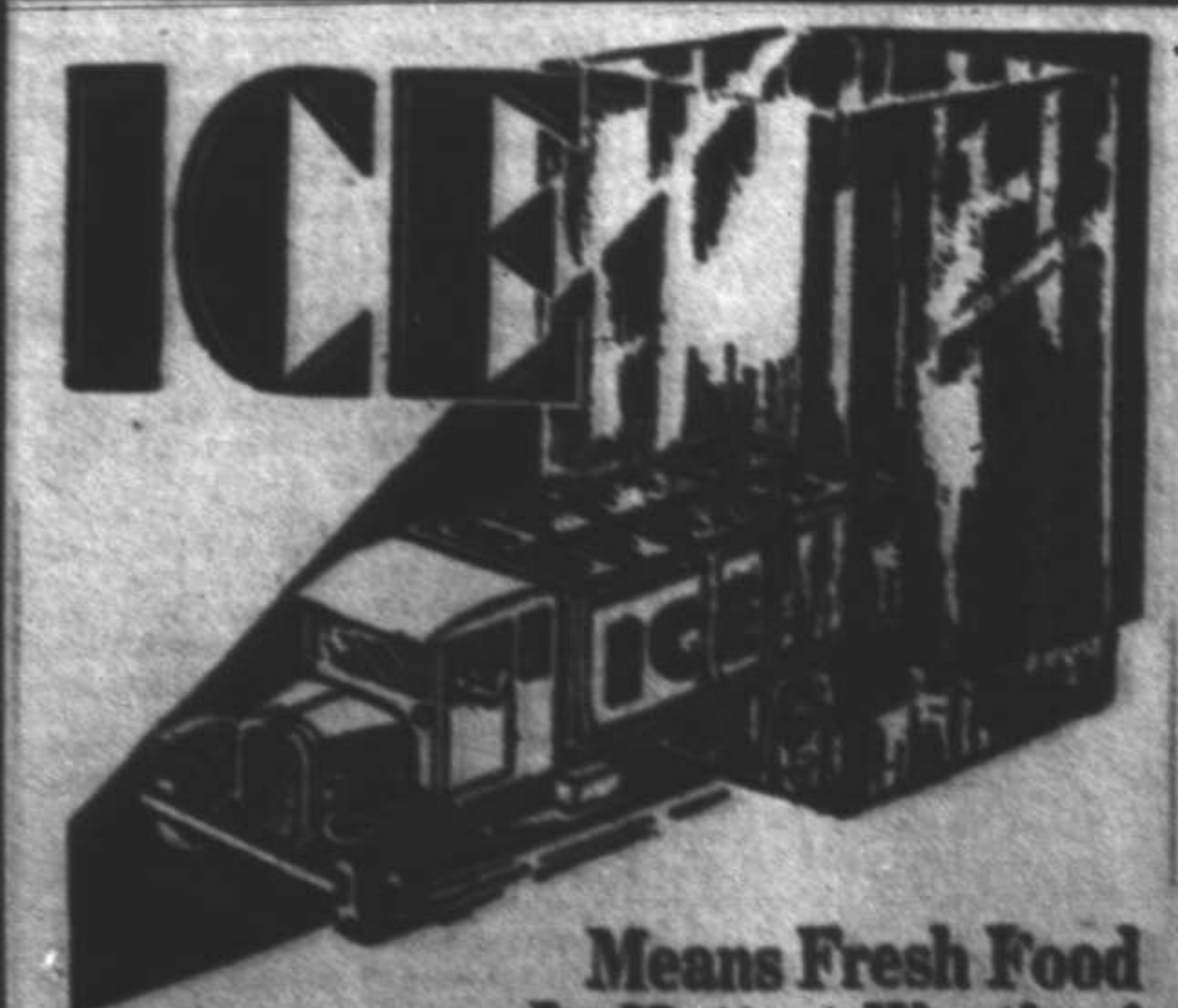

FLAGS FOR FLAG DAY

TODAY is celebrated as Flag Day, and Lubbock citizens should display the Stars and Stripes. Surely if there is one day in the year that warrants floating the colors, that is Flag Day.

The older generation, especially that group whose patriotic blood runs strong, must win at the seeming lack of interest which this generation shows in the display of Old Glory. Time was not so many years ago when every holiday found every loyal community flooded in red and white and blue. It is not so now. Memorial Day, Independence Day, the birthdays of our national heroes are marked by the few rather than the many displays of the flag.

Surely the reason is not the lack of basic patriotism. The war record of America answers that. There may be a feeling that lacking a flag to a house is after all not a sure sign of devotion to country, that deeds rather than displays count. Thoughtlessness is responsible for most of it. At the same time it is unfortunate.

Today, however, makes its appeal directly for the flag. By design the flag is to dominate the day's spirit. Speeches and music and procession are only subordinate to the flag. The day does not commemorate a battle, a great man's birth or anything else but the emblem of our national spirit. Of all days in the year when the flag should fly, Flag Day is the day.

SLOWLY GETTING THERE

Peaceful, law-abiding, self-controlled folk are not a product of definitions of right and wrong. They are the results of breeding, of the process of evolution. The criminal class of today is greatly superior in morality and intellect to the highest type men of the stone age, and it is not unreasonable to suppose that another hundred thousand years will find the lowest class of that future age superior in all ways to the highest type of the day.

Society appears to have done its full duty in the matter of reforming mankind. Through a thousand agencies it has defined right and wrong. It can do no more.

A man of the highest type the race has developed will not strike his child in the face with a club, nor will he lie in wait and shoot another man who carries a large sum of money.

He may be angry with his child and he may covet money, but he will not beat the one or steal the other. The thing that restrains him is not the knowledge that these things are wrong, but the fact that he is a gentleman—that is, a gentleman instead of a brute man.

It is not by exercise of will that he refrains from doing these evil; he has outgrown the urge to do them.

A man of a lower type who does these things is not ignorant of the fact that he is doing wrong. He does wrong deliberately and in many cases without compunction. He follows the urge of his brute instincts.

GOOD ROADS AND RELATIONS

Two young Americans have succeeded in driving an automobile from New York to Managua, Nicaragua, traveling 4,562 miles in 26 days. They report that aside from some bad roads they had no trouble. They passed through Mexico, Salvador and Honduras on the way; officials treated them courteously, and there was no difficulty at any frontier. They camped at night, slept peacefully, and were untroubled.

It should not be long, now that nearly every country in the Western Hemisphere is interested in good roads, before such a trip is a commonplace event. We shall start out some fine morning and in a month, or less end up in Rio de Janeiro, in Lima or Valparaiso, traveling all the way on hard-surfaced roads, putting up at good hotels, and finding hot-dog stands and ice cream parlors, or their equivalents, all along the line. We shall be almost as familiar with the Andes as with the Rockies.

And, traveling about on our own roads in summer, we shall see the license-plates of cars from below the Panama Canal, whose owners have pursued the sun northward, and are having a look at the way we do things. We shall be glad to see them, as they will be glad to see us when we return the visit. Good relations and better trade will result. It is only a matter of time, and better roads.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

POWER VIES WITH PROHIBITION
FOR PLACE AS DOMINANT ISSUE
IN CONGRESSIONAL CAMPAIGNS

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Power will vie with prohibition for recognition as the dominant issue in the campaign, just starting, for next November's election of U. S. senators and representatives—and of governors, in states where they are to be chosen this year.

The power folk want the voters to divide on prohibition.

Prohibitionists, except in safely dry localities, want the fight to hinge on the power question.

How much the tariff issue counts will depend on the industrial and agricultural situations in the autumn.

However, candidates realize the hopelessness of trying to divert the attention of a man out of a job, or one whose farm is about to be foreclosed on, from his personal troubles to some other subject.

Explanations and promises may help a little, but hard times always are to the disadvantage of the party in office—there is no escape from it; the handicaps can only be minimized more or less, if any. That issue is in the hands of the fate; not the politician.

The power and prohibition issues are different from the industrial and farm issues. Most voters can be distracted back and forth, between power and prohibition.

Basically, of course, power is economic, as much as industrial employment and agriculture; in fact, all three are the same issue in the long run.

Nevertheless, the voters have not arrived at a point yet where they regard power control as a practical proposition, like their jobs and their land and crops. It is a new thing to them—and largely academic, as they view it. Such senators as Governor W. Norris of Nebraska tell them what will happen unless they concentrate on it right now—but it takes a lot of oratory to get them interested.

Prohibition is so much easier to understand that it naturally is a more popular issue than power. Still, capably presented, power has its appeal, too. Anyhow, power and prohibition are rivals.

The contest for the Republican senatorial nomination in New Jersey already demonstrates the politicians' strategy.

Dwight W. Morrow is the wet candidate. It must be very distasteful to an individual of his type to have his ability and everything else subordinated to his wetness. Just the same, he cannot help it. Opposition to prohibition is his best issue—New Jersey being wet New Jersey.

But it is not Joseph S. Frelinghuysen's best issue, as another candidate for the Jersey senatorial nomination on the G. O. P. ticket. He always was a dry hitherto. So all Mr. Frelinghuysen did was to modify his former prohibition position slightly and then shut up about it—and proceed to wake his fight on the issue of stricter regulation of Jersey's public utilities; the power issue.

Franklin Fort, to be sure, is a dry, but his game is to squeeze in between Mr. Morrow, as a wet, and Mr. Frelinghuysen, as a regulator of the power interests, on the chance that the odd votes will nominate him.

In Pennsylvania we find Gifford Pinchot campaigning for the governorship on the power regulation issue. Mr. Pinchot is one of the driest dries in the country, but does he mention the subject? Not Mr. Pinchot—in wet Pennsylvania! As a dry power is his issue. But his opposition ticket? My! we shall not hear a word about power from that side of the fence—but a great plenty concerning prohibition's failure.

In Montana, a few weeks hence, we shall behold the ultra-dry Senator Thomas J. Walsh up for reelection, giving Hall Columbia to the power interests—and, trying to beat him, these same interests' reputed good friend, Judge Albert J. Galen, denouncing prohibition.

In Nebraska?—who but 84-year-old Aaron C. Read!—roasting the dry regime but ignoring the power folk—while bone-dry Senator Norris tears into the power companies but never notices Volsteadism.

The liver is the great chemical factory of the body. When food is eaten and changed in the stomach and intestines, the material passes by way of the blood to the liver, and there is converted into other substances according to the needs of the body.

In the liver, the glucose brought by the blood is changed into a substance called glycogen, and stored until it is needed by various tissues. The liver cells also act on proteins and fats as well as on carbohydrates. In the liver bile is formed and passed to the gallbladder and back to the intestines, from which it goes out of the body. Bile represents the product of the breaking down of red blood cells and, in addition, has other functions.

The average human being will develop and pour out from a pint to a quart and a half of bile in a day. In animals, it has been shown that a meat diet favors an abundant flow of bile, while a diet rich in carbohydrates, especially sugar, lessens the flow. The bile which passes into the gallbladder and then back into the intestines assists in digesting and absorbing fats.

It seems to control to some extent the regulation of the removal of putrefied material from the intestines. It carries away poisonous waste products and the salts of the bile seem to act themselves to stimulate the further formation and flow of bile.

Obviously, perfect functioning of the liver and gallbladder is necessary for perfect health. In exhaustion, in poisoning of various types, in injury to the liver, important changes occur in all of the tissues of the body, tending toward degeneration and death.

In order to determine whether or not the liver and the gallbladder are taking care of their functions properly, numerous tests have been devised by the medical profession. It is possible to examine the blood and to find out if the blood contains the materials which should be developed in the liver and in the gallbladder.

It is possible to feel a normal gallbladder under the edge of the ribs on the right side, to inject a dye substance which localizes in the gallbladder and which makes the gallbladder visible when the X-ray is used, to put a tube down into the stomach and then into the small intestine and thus to withdraw the bile.

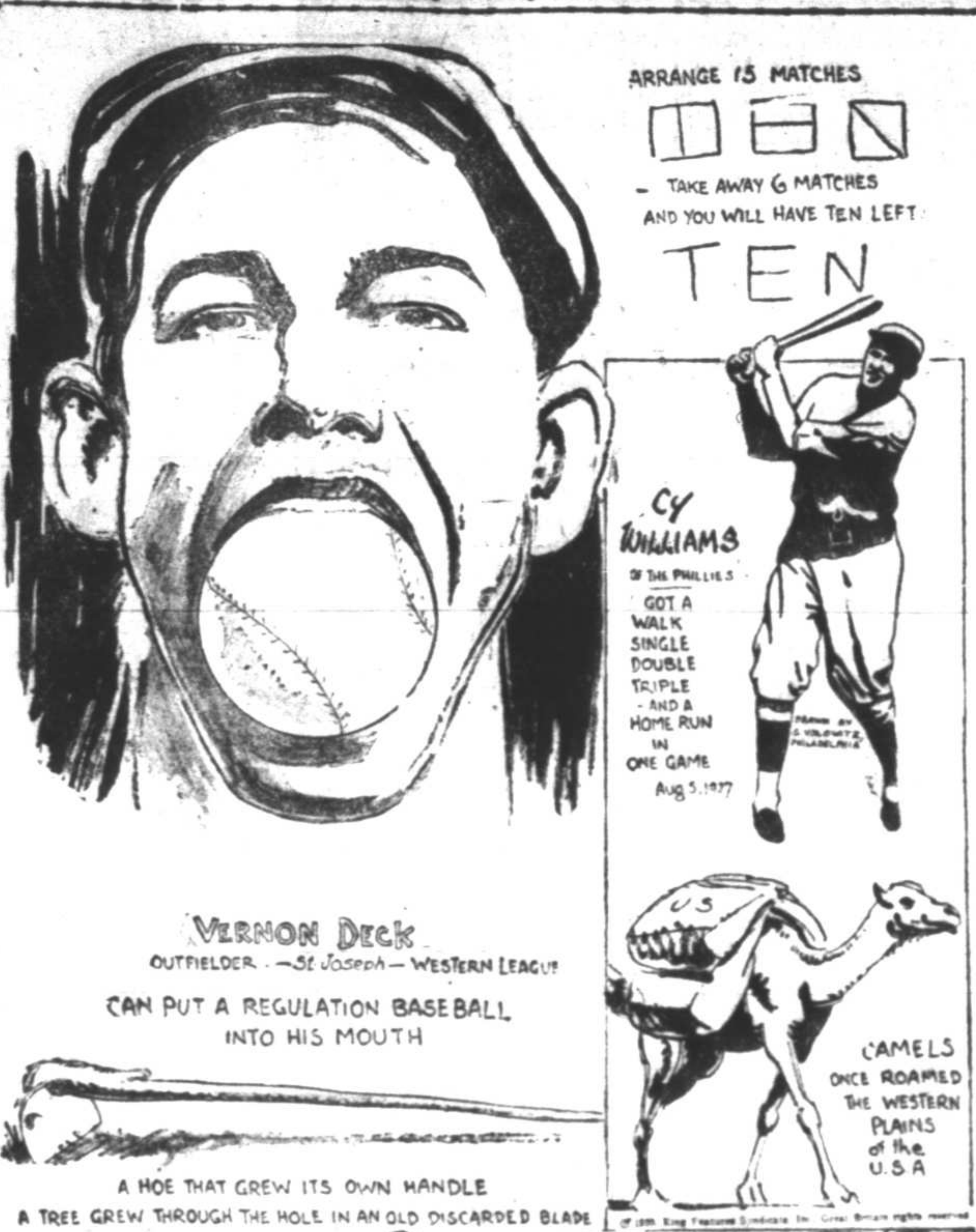
In the presence of jaundice, it is necessary to know to what extent the bile and the liver are responsible whether or not the condition is to be controlled by medical measures or by surgical measures. Fifty years ago practically all that could be done by the physician was to find out what he could from the history of the case. By the aid of modern chemistry and physiology, the modern physician is able to have an adequate understanding of the ability with which various organs are doing their work.

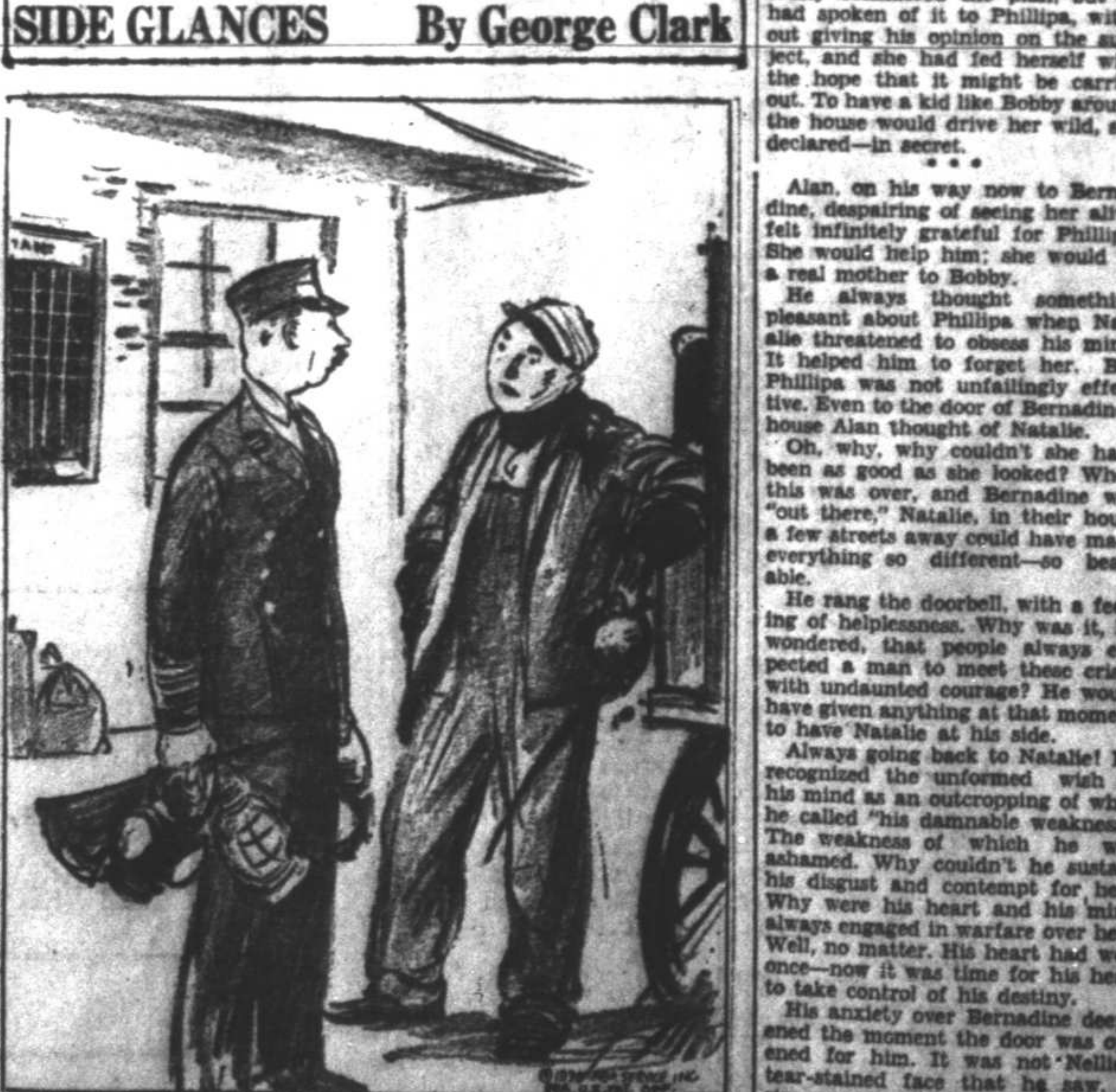
Her heart ached for him because he had lost the woman she was certain he loved, but she did not guess he was constantly burning his memories of Natalie on a pyre of hatred.

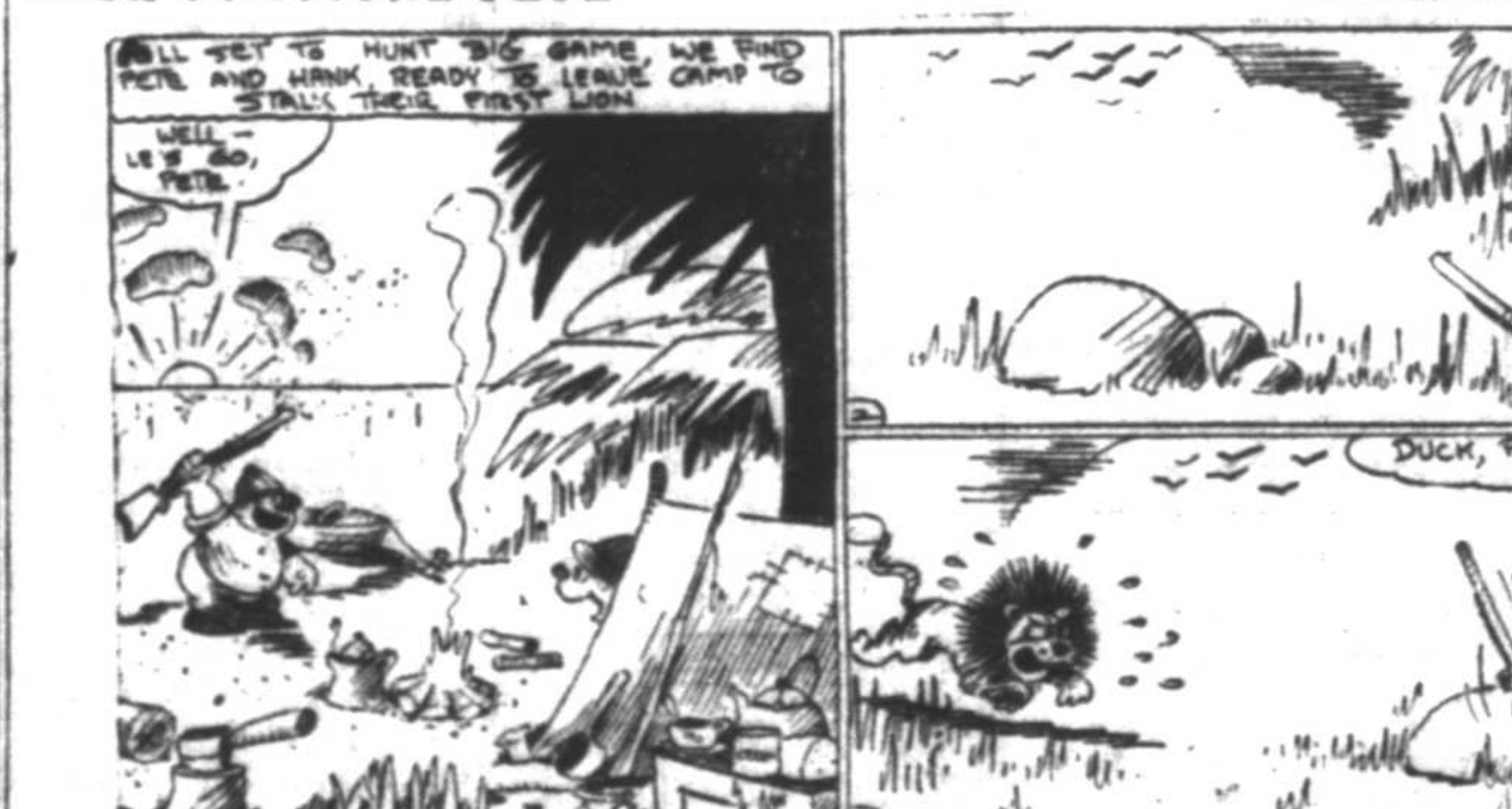

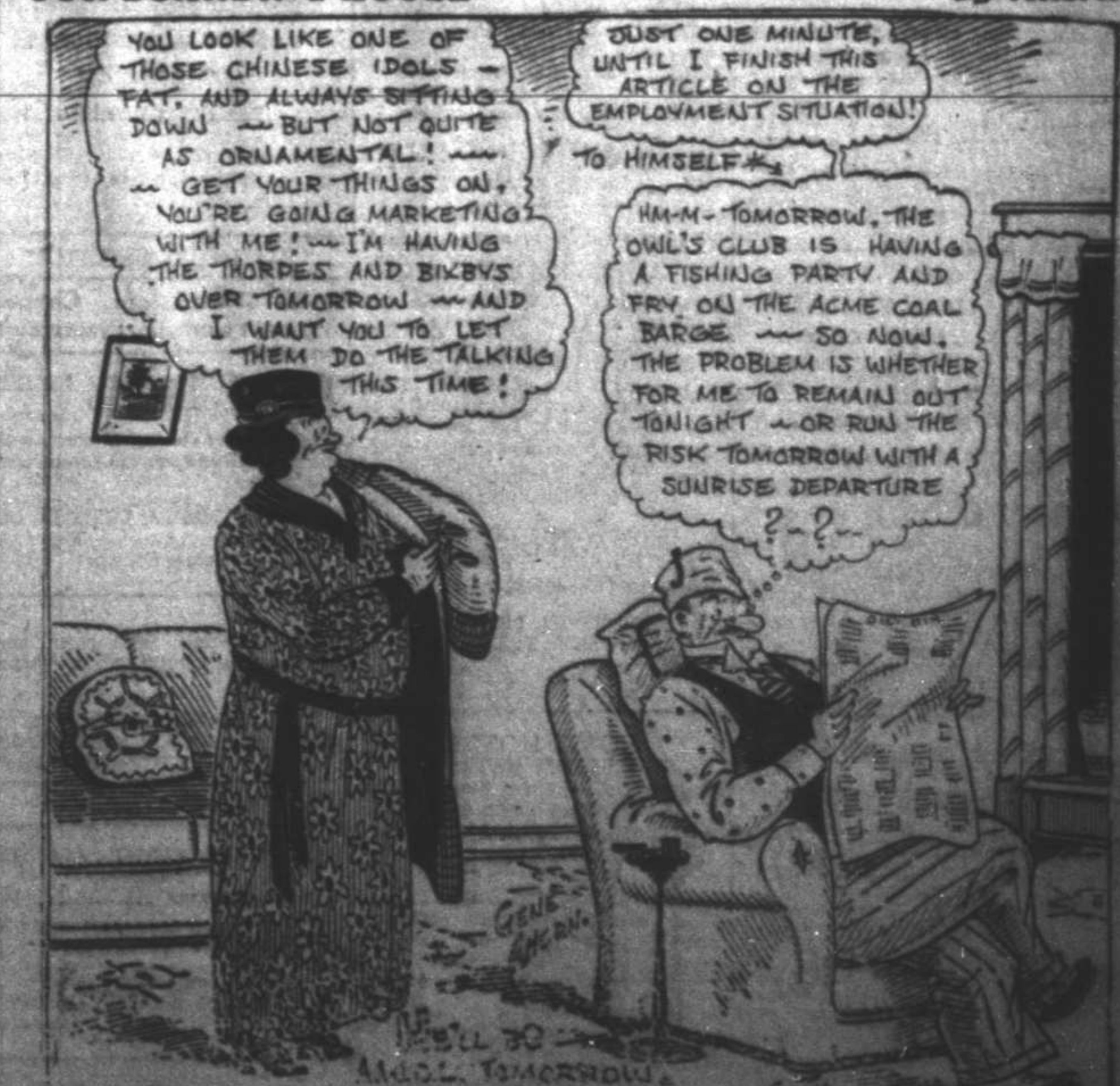

INVESTIGATE JUDGE

LaGuardia Resolution Given Approval Of House

WASHINGTON, June 13. (AP)—The House today adopted the LaGuardia resolution, to authorize a special committee of five to investigate the official conduct of Federal Judge Harry E. Anderson, of the Western Tennessee district.

The resolution, adopted unanimously, directs Chairman Graham of the House Judiciary committee to appoint the committee. He previously announced it would consist of Representatives Hickey of Indiana, Sparks of Kansas, LaGuardia of New York, republicans, Summers of Texas, and Browning of Tennessee, democrats.

INDIANS SEEK LAND

Creek Tribe Asks U. S. Okech On River Bed Property

TULSA, June 13. (AP)—Petitions in which the Creek Indian nation asks \$150,000,000 from the United States for 28,875 acres of river bed lands in the Arkansas, Cimarron and South Canadian rivers, today were in the mails for filing in the United States Court of Claims at Washington.

If attorneys for the tribe win the suit, 20,000 Oklahoma Creek Indians will share equally in the judgment.

The value of the river bed lands, which are claimed as a part of the grant made to the tribe in 1852 by President Fillmore, is listed at \$50,000,000 for old rights, \$100,000,000 for sand and gravel rights and an undetermined amount for power and irrigation rights.

HAS FOUR MILLION

"Greater Chicago" Shows Fine Growth During Ten Years

CHICAGO, June 13. (AP)—Chicago's metropolitan area, embracing six counties including one in Indiana, has a population of 4,670,996, federal census enumerators announced today.

This is a gain of 1,190,198 over 1920 figures or 34.5 per cent. Official preliminary figures for Cook county were 3,967,056 including the City of Chicago with 3,373,753. The percentage gain for the city was 34.6.

CONVICTS SUBDUED

Swinging Clubs Put Halt To Ohio Reformatory Outbreak

MANFIELD, Ohio, June 13. (AP)—The threat of swinging clubs and tear gas bombs had restored order at the Mansfield reformatory today after a second outbreak within less than two weeks during which guards beat the ringleaders of 1,400 howling, milling inmates into submission.

The latest disturbance occurred during the "big supper" hour yesterday when the 1,700 prisoners in the dining room became noisy, tipped over tables and hurled their stools around. Two hundred of the inmates fled outside, apparently with the intention of avoiding injury rather than attempting escape.

Pentecostal Group Uninjured In "Pineapple" Attack

POMEROY, O., June 13. (AP)—The Pentecostal church in Bedford township was shaken and a window blown out last night by a dynamite bomb set off in the rear of the building while 200 persons were attending a revival meeting. No one was hurt.

Constable Leslie Murray, who had been patrolling the church yard after finding a bomb several days ago, was knocked over by the blast, but was uninjured. He said he did not see the person who set off the bomb.

A near panic followed the explosion, but services were resumed.
