Johnny Weissmuller Plays the Title Role in Great Film, "Tarzan, the Ape Man"

"Tarzan, the Ape Man," based on the hair-raising story of jungle adventure by Edgar Rice Burroughs, will be the attraction at the Portales theatre for the midnight matinee Saturday.
Johnny Weissmuller, world's champion swimmer and considered to have one of the finest physiques of any man living, plays the title role of the strange white man who lives in the jungle like the apes.
Prominent roles also are played by Neil Hamilton, Maureen O'Sullivan, C. Aubrey Smith, Doris Lloyd, Porter Harty and Ivory Williams.

Seek Burial Ground
The story, laid for the most part in the best of Africa, concerns the attempt of a handful of English adventurers to find the mysterious "elephants' burial ground," where they hope to secure a fortune in ivory.

The daughter of the leader of the safari is abducted by Tarzan, the Ape Man, who lifts her bodily from the ground and then carries her away beyond reach of human hands by swinging through the tops of trees at dizzying heights.

United States through four of the most trying years of our republic. I can see this same awkward figure going through the period of strife, never losing his quaint humor, his kind heart never wavering, and the twinkle in his eye never faltering, but his gaunt frame becoming more and more bent with the burden of his country and mine, and the scraggly beard becoming whiter and whiter, and the firm step becoming weaker and weaker until we come to the black day that our hero is struck down by the bullet of an assassin, and Abraham Lincoln has given his all for his country.

"During the same period I can look to the south and see another figure, also be hindered, but of fine physique. All that any man would crave to be embodied in Stonewall Jackson.
"Great of body—great of mind. The only great soldier that comes to my memory who absolutely refused to fight on Sunday. Many of us think in our small affairs here that we cannot lay aside our work to rest and worship on Sunday, but not so this great soldier friend of yours and mine—the man who knocked off from the duties of the Confederacy at midnight Saturday night and became the soldier of the lowly Nazarene of Calvary for twenty-four hours, and in closing our remarks on that period that was once dark, but that we now look on with love and reverence."

"Have we kept our promise? What have we done toward making perpetual peace? It seems to me that we have done nothing—that the boys who fought and died in vain, but the boys who sleep in Flanders field threw you the torch. We, the American people, must carry our democracy on!"
Through this trying time we keep our institutions, such as our

schools and churches, open. I have scant patience with those of our people who would cut our taxes to the point that it will curtail and retard our fine schools. It is with regret that I look on a fine school building in Portales standing empty. I hope that the time will come that my boy and girl will attend and graduate from the Portales Normal school.

"We owe it to all those here dead to carry on today—to keep alive the principles of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness in this great land of ours, and above all things, we owe to them to retain our American republic and not to go Communist."

"I thank you."

"In memory not of the outstanding heroes but of the multitude whom we honor today, my mind turns back to the spring of 1917. The United States was engaged in the making of the greatest army that it has ever sent to war. Boys and young men from the ages of 20 to 30 were turning away from the peaceful pursuits of life to learn to hate, to fight and to die. Before two men met they would shoot at the other and one of them out, one or both of them must first have learned to hate. The same is true of a soldier in war. He must first learn to hate the enemy before he can go down to meet them with hot lead and cold steel."

"The young men of 1917 who turned their hands to war did so with two thoughts in mind. First—they would fight to make the world safe for democracy and, second, they would fight the war to end all wars."

"You slapped them on the back and told them what heroes they were and sent them away with a promise that nothing would be too good for them when they returned. But where—where did you send them? You sent them to a camp that was poorly built by profiteers, who were hired—not drafted, who got big wages and easy work, and to be equipped with shoddy uniforms, and finally armed with inferior guns, and sent them forth to die in the mud and the dirt along with the lice and the rats. These soldier boys who sleep row on row in Flanders fields did their part—they went to France to end the war. From the place the Americans struck the fire, they never gave back a foot. The war was ended. They came drifting back, one by one. There were no hands to meet them, no promise of work. Those who lived were only discharged soldiers, lost upon with distrust and oftentimes with hatred."
