

Slight Gain Made In Fight For Teachers

Slight headway in the see-saw battle for teachers was noted Thursday at the meeting of the Big Spring Independent School district board of trustees.

Nine were elected to places on the local faculty, while five resignations were accepted. This left the system with a shortage of 18 elementary school teachers and five for the high school staff.

Truman, Demo Heads Have A Pow-Wow

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6. (AP)—President Truman had a political pow-wow at the White House last night with present and former leaders of the Democratic party's national organization.

Charles C. Ross, the president's press secretary, told reporters today that the "whole political situation" was gone over in "frank discussion."

Those attending included Sen. Barkley of Kentucky, the vice presidential nominee; Sen. McGraw of Rhode Island, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, and five former national chairmen.

The former chairmen were Geo. White of Ohio, Robert E. Hannegan, Frank Walker, Homer S. Cummings and Edward J. Flynn.

Ross said all other living former chairmen, and James M. Cox of Ohio, 1924 presidential candidate, were invited but could not attend for various reasons.

Asked why James A. Farley did not attend, Ross said he understood Farley was on his way to Europe. About the only other party chairman of recent years who was not there is Cordell Hull. Hull is in very poor health.

Presumably, one purpose of the extraordinary confab was to talk over with kind of campaign should be waged.

Mr. Truman has made it clear that his own inclination is to keep hammering away at the record of what he calls at least the "second worst" Congress in history.

Most political leaders think that sooner or later Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, the Republican presidential nominee, will be put into the position of having to defend that record.

Republican leaders in Congress believe Dewey is satisfied with their anti-inflation and housing program.

Rodeo fans saw a peppy show than opening night's performance. Animals acted more like "critters" as some 15 bronc and bull riders hit the dirt.

Mansfield, five times calf roping champion of the world, turned in a time of 15.7 last night to nose into second place Jack Skipworth of Clovis, N. M. Skipworth laced his calf in 17 seconds. Third spot in final results was taken by Royce Stewart of Brownwood, Wednesday evening's top man, who boasted a 17.2 timing. Paul Young's (Lovington, N. M.) 17.6 was good for fourth place.

In the Cowgirls' Clover Leaf race Margaret Montgomery of San Angelo copped low time with a neat 19.4 for the two nights' events. Making the circuit in 19.8, Iris Dorsett of Sweetwater, Wednesday night's winner, took second. Third place time was made by Jackie Worthington of Jacksboro with 20.2, and Rosemary Beck of Talpa trailed with 20.3. Young Rosemary Rice of Big Spring drew applause for her close time, 21 seconds.

Best time in first go-round steer wrestling was turned in Thursday night by O. L. Harris of O'Donnell, who shackled his animal in 17.8. Bo Chesson of Beaumont moved back into second place with his 18.1 clocked Wednesday evening. Dub Phillips of San Angelo came in third with 20 flat, and James Bynum, Waxahachie, tagged with 21.6.

In saddle bronc events Bob Whiteside of Imperial, Calif., chalked first with his Wednesday night performance. Holding onto his mount for second place was Paul Gould of Sweetwater, while Bill Barton of Abilene and J. B. Bradshaw of Sweetwater split third and fourth spots.

Baraback riding champ for the first go-round is Bill Barton, and W. N. Rice's (Brooksmith) Wednesday evening ride was good for second. Third and fourth places were taken by L. E. Weeks of Abilene and J. B. Bradshaw respectively.

LIKE STERN, NOT TOO HOPEFUL PARENT
FCC Shakes A Warning Finger At Radio Get-Rich-Quick Programs, Asks Curbs

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6. (AP)—Like a stern but not too hopeful parent, the Federal Communications Commission shook a warning finger today at the get-rich-quick radio programs popping out all over the dial.

The station-licensing agency said disapprovingly that an almost infinite number of these border on "illegal lotteries or gift enterprises."

So the commission announced a set of proposed new regulations aimed at curbing, if not eliminating, many of the programs currently offering fabulous cash, travel and merchandise gifts to lucky listeners.

In essence, the rules say there must be no more such give-aways based in any way "upon lot or chance." Nor can the winners be required to (a) furnish any money or other thing of value (b) possess the sponsored product or (c) be or have been listening—or viewing—the program in question.

Guard Ordered To Quell Polk Vote Violence

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 6. (AP)—National guardsmen were mobilized today and ordered to move immediately into Polk County in Southeast Tennessee, where disorder was reported by the Polk County sheriff, the day following the state's primaries.

Two men were reported slain and a third wounded last night. H. E. Brewer, Ducktown undertaker, said this morning that four other persons were wounded in election night gunplay.

The disorder was accompanied by reports of a dispute over absentee ballots in Copperhill and Ducktown.

Political Leader E. H. Crump apparently was headed his first major ballot box defeat in 20 years in yesterday's voting. Candidates he backed for the U. S. Senate and for governor were behind in the voting on unofficial and nearly complete returns.

Sen. Tom Stewart today conceded the victory of Rep. Estes Kefauver in the race for the democratic nomination for U. S. senator. Kefauver was in the lead over Crump-supported Judge John A. Mitchell for Stewart's seat.

Troops were ordered into Polk County by Adj. Gen. Hilton Butler. He acted after Gov. Jim McCall ordered troops to Cleveland, Tenn., 20 miles from Benton. Benton is the seat of Polk County.

Guns were reported being issued in Benton when ballot boxes holding votes from the nearby communities of Copperhill and Ducktown were due here to be counted. It was understood these boxes held absentee ballots in the dispute.

In Ducktown, Undertaker Brewer listed the wounded as Wayne Kimsey, 33; Chester Goode, 28; Hardy (Cobby) Loudermilk and Loudermilk's wife.

Son To Be Buried In Mother's Yard

BROWNSVILLE, Aug. 6. (AP)—Because Pfc. Jimmie Robinson's mother, Mrs. Buck Wilson, wants her son near her, he will be buried beneath a tree in her front yard at 3:30 o'clock today.

Robinson was killed in August, 1944, on a Normandy beachhead. He had asked his mother to buy a farm and bring him home if he should die.

DEATH OF AN EMPIRE

Allies Will Chop Up Farben Cartel

FRANKFURT, Germany, Aug. 6. (AP)—British and American authorities set out today to chop the giant I. G. Farben chemical cartel into small pieces. Their plans are intended not only to break up the billion-dollar trust, but to keep it that way.

"One of the objectives of military government in the combined economic area (bizonia) is that the I. G. Farben empire shall be reconstructed," an announcement said.

"The independent units that are to be established will be required to operate independently and in competition with each other in accordance with the requirements and as part of the overall economic German industrial program."

Scores of Farben plants soon are to be offered for sale. One U. S. officer estimated the number at "about 50," but said he did not have the exact figure.

Sales of the properties—now split into independent units by four-power order—will be carried out by German authorities. For the time being, the sales will affect only properties in the British, and American occupation zones, but French authorities have been notified and are expected to follow suit.

The action was taken by the British and Americans independently of the Russians. It represents a break in the former quadripartite control of the vast Farben empire. American sources said the action was taken because four-power rule of Germany has collapsed by reason of Soviet actions.

"Similar procedure can be followed in the Soviet zone by parallel action if Soviet authorities so desire," the announcement said.

McDowell Tells Of More Red Uranium Aid

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6. (AP)—Rep. McDowell (R-Penn.) said today a "significant" amount of uranium metal, a "vital component" of the atomic bomb, was sent to Russia in 1945.

In a House speech, McDowell said these shipments were in addition to those he told the House Un-American Activities Committee yesterday were made during war years.

McDowell, at the committee's hearings on Communist spying, had said 1,300 pounds went to Russia in 1943.

He said in his House speech that 1,420 pounds also were sent in 1945. And he repeated to the House what he at the committee meeting—that the materials were obtained "as a result of pressure of the highest kind."

Interview Lasts For Three Hours

MOSCOW, Saturday, Aug. 7. (AP)—The United States, Britain and France gave their reply to the Soviet Union on the Berlin and other questions in a three-hour interview with Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov last night.

The three western representatives went at once to the American embassy after the meeting.

"We met with Molotov," said U. S. Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith. "No comment."

He juggled his brief case from one hand to the other, obviously anxious to get to work with his colleagues.

Stalin was not believed present at this meeting, which the western diplomats had sought with the foreign minister.

(Diplomats in London said they expect a Big Four communique to be issued this week end, announcing plans for a new meeting of the foreign ministers' council. The council is the four-power agency whose last two meetings broke up in disagreement.)

Informed quarters said it was hoped that the last small differences among the United States, Britain and France over an agreement to be presented to the Russians would be ironed out this morning.

Britain's special representative called on U. S. Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith early today.

Observers noted that the British diplomat, Roberts, had chosen an unusually early diplomatic hour—10:30 a.m.—to call on Smith. The latter arrived at his desk at 9:30 this morning.

The three diplomats conferred at length yesterday on their next steps. The respective embassies all have received the first reactions from their home governments on the Monday night conversations with Stalin, and are believed in position to plot their next moves.

(In London, a British foreign office spokesman reaffirmed last night the West's intention to proceed with plans for a Western German government this fall.

(There has been mounting speculation in the British capital that the Russians have demanded deferment of these plans in return for a settlement of the Berlin deadlock.)

Four Randolph Field Fliers Are Crash Victims

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 6. (AP)—Four Air Force Base fliers were instantly killed eight miles south of New Braunfels shortly after 8:30 o'clock this morning when two AT-6 training planes crashed in midair and plummeted to the earth in a mass of flames.

Lt. Norman Travers, at the scene of the crash, told the San Antonio Evening News over long distance telephone that fire trucks, ambulances, chaplains and investigating officers from Randolph had just arrived at the scene.

He said that an eye witness had told him that the two planes collided in midair and fell about two miles apart, each about a quarter of a mile off from the Austin Highway. One fell on Freddie Kropp's farm.

A check was underway to determine occupants of the planes, both of which were on routine training missions.

Jester Lashes At Dixiecrats

AUSTIN, Aug. 6. (AP)—Gov. Beauford H. Jester has reminded his Dixiecrat critics that he signed the southern governor's anti-Truman manifesto with reservations.

Jester said the record shows he signed after making it clear he was not attempting to speak for Texas Democrats.

His comments came after a full page advertisement was published in yesterday's Dallas Morning News asking "why has Gov. Jester reversed himself?"

It also said: "If he agreed that Texas Electoral College votes should not be cast for Truman March 13, why is he for Truman now?"

The ad was sponsored by the Texas Committee of States Rights Democrats. It was another lick at Jester in the current fight between the so-called "loyalist" Democrats headed by Jester and the States' Rights group.

Jester is going along with the party in support of President Truman. The Dixiecrats want Texas' Democratic vote to be cast for Gov. J. Strom Thurmond.

Senate Passes A Compromise Housing Bill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6. (AP)—The Senate passed and sent to the House today a compromise housing bill aimed at speeding small home building.

The measure contains no low-rent or slum clearance subsidies.

Approval came on a voice vote after the chamber had voted 48 to 36 to substitute the measure for the Taft-Elender-Wagner Housing Bill.

The Senate thus overrode its Banking Committee which had approved the T-E-W measure.

The T-E-W bill would have provided for government aid in building public-owned low rent and slum clearance projects.

The housing action came after the Senate Banking Committee voted two major changes in the Republican anti-inflation bill as passed by the House yesterday.

The committee struck out a House provision calling for a boost in federal reserve bank gold reserves, which Secretary of the Treasury Snyder and Federal Reserve officials said would do nothing to stop inflation.

Governor Jester Will Stop Here For Conferences

Governor Beauford Jester will stop here Saturday morning for a brief conference with T. A. Harris, commanding officer of the local national guard unit, and other citizens.

The state's chief executive wired Capt. Harris Friday that he would land at the municipal airport at 10:30 a. m. The local guard unit committee and other citizens are expected to be on hand also to greet the governor, who is making a tour of West Texas points. He was in Pampa today and was to visit here and at Abilene Saturday before returning to his home in Corsicana to spend the weekend. He plans to return to his office Tuesday and will not be on hand Monday for the meeting of the state democratic executive committee in Austin.

Draft Registrants May Number 3,500 Men In This Area

It estimates from Adjutant General K. L. Berry are correct, the Howard-Martin-Mitchell county selective service district will have more than 3,500 registrants.

Several women had been called, according to members of a group that had made contacts, and only in two instances had refusals resulted. Other responses ranged from acquiescence to enthusiasm.

Requests were being made to abstain from meat purchases for the period of one week to see if prices do not ease off. Among those who have been making contacts, said a spokesman, were Mrs. A. E. Clanton, Mrs. L. G. Ivey, Mrs. S. R. Wilkerson, Mrs. V. Coffey, Mrs. T. A. Rogers, Mrs. Jess Bailey and Mrs. Avery Deal.

Chest Action Time At Hand

Something needs to be done about the community chest situation.

It's several weeks until October, but in terms of preparation for so big an undertaking as a centralized and concerted chest campaign, October is just around the corner.

And that's the important thing about some decision now—that adequate time can be devoted to organization. Last year the Chest fell short, or if you please, it failed to achieve its goal. The reason for that was delay, probably unavoidable, pending incorporation and revision of basic plans for solicitation.

In relation to the amount of time spent in setting up the campaign, its results were remarkable. The weakness lay in failure to be able to reach everyone with a direct appeal; consequently, little more than 800 people did all the giving for a county of some 30,000 souls. That should prove that any sort of quota—even substantially larger than the \$36,000 asked last year—could be raised if the appeal were made sufficiently broad to include something from everyone.

It can't be done in the twinkling of an eye, however, and time is here—if not already past—when the chest committee should take preliminary steps toward organization for the fall campaign. Otherwise, uncertainty will overwhelm some of the participating agencies, already under strain because the chest did not supply anticipated needs last year.

Adage Still Holds True

There is ironic humor in the fact that such a simple adage as "you can't have your cake and eat it, too" should find application in so complex a field as the international situation. Yet it applies rather pointedly to Russia. The Soviets extended their sphere of influence wherever resistance did not keep it back after the close of World War II. The objective seems to have been two-fold. One was to maintain this influence, yet even control, over the internal affairs of these satellites and at the same time milk them for reparations, etc.

In eastern Germany, the result is a dilemma for Russian policy. A two year plan was announced, but it did not materialize, even though it was modest and easily within reach. The reason was plain: Russia consistently bled the country white for its own use, leaving nothing for recovery and rehabilitation. Naturally this has reacted against internal good will as a satellite or toward the possibility of creating an independent friendly state. Similar deterioration has taken place in Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia, Bulgaria, etc. Apparently, a people are not ravished without remembering who the despoiler was.

SIR ALEXANDER FLEMING, born Aug. 6, 1861, at Lochfield near Darvel in Scotland. With Sir Howard Florey he discovered penicillin, which has been termed "the most valuable disease-fighting chemical." A distinguished scholar from his academy days, Dr. Fleming won many honors in medicine including the Nobel prize. He first noticed penicillin in 1928. It took 11 years to develop it.

CONGRESS MUST HELP U. S. WOMEN STAY BEAUTIFUL

NEW YORK, Aug. 5. (U.S.)—Does Congress want the American woman to stay beautiful?

Well, if it does, it had better start looking out some cash.

This is the advice of Mrs. Veronica Dengel, a beauty engineer, who says the high cost of keeping beautiful is pricing many women right out of the market.

"Beauty is so important," she said, "that there should be national beauty clinics subsidized by federal funds which would bring beauty within the reach of every woman."

Mrs. Dengel thinks women have every bit as much right to a chunk of the national budget as farmers.

"There are government subsidies for almost every type of education except for the all-important one of enabling American women to learn how to be and remain a race of beautiful, healthy creatures. And this is a vital necessity to preserve marriages in the face of today's alarming divorce rate."

Mrs. Dengel has been campaigning for some time for equal rights at the drugstore counter.

"Congress should repeal the 20 per cent tax on cosmetics," she said, "because lipstick, powder and cream are as essential to a woman as shaving cream is to a man, but the man doesn't pay a luxury tax on his whisker soap."

Convinced that American women are the most beautiful in the world, Mrs. Dengel regards this as "one of the dividends of democracy."

"As long as we have beautiful women," she said, "our men would slaughter any foreign 'ism'."

So she puts it up to Congress to save America by saving its womanly beauty.

Mrs. Dengel's views were given in a long telegram in which she disagreed with this department's recent muted protests against "the great American female face."

"There are five basic types of faces," she said:

"These are Alexis Smith, executive; Joan Crawford, dramatic; Ingrid Bergman, wholesome; Shirley Temple, feminine; and Irene Dunne, conservative."

So there are five kinds of faces. I wouldn't quarrel with a lady beauty expert even if she said there were 25 kinds. My only contention is that in public they tend too often to merge into an iceberg profile that cloaks their real personalities.

Republicans Worry About Reaction Of Folks Back Home To GOP Methods

WASHINGTON — House Republicans shoved the Democrats off the House floor the other day, locked the doors, and obediently rubber-stamped the decisions of their leaders at a cut-and-dried caucus.

Only a mild protest was raised by one Republican — Minnesota's Walter Judd, who wanted to know whether the leadership had intended to commit the Republicans without holding a conference. He referred to the fact that GOP chiefs had answered President Truman's message without talking it over with members of the party.

Speaker Joe Martin pacified Judd by saying that the statement drafted by the leaders was only a "proposed statement." If it wasn't adopted by the caucus, he promised, a new one would be drafted. Needless to say, it was adopted unanimously.

Before the rubber-stamp vote, Rept. William Dawson of Utah urged his colleagues not to close the session "without making an honest, conscientious effort to do something about the high cost of living."

"We may not agree with the President on price control and rationing," Dawson declared, "but the people still expect us to do something about high prices."

Martin agreed that the committee should "tackle the problem" and give it more than superficial examination. Even Majority Leader Charles Halleck admitted that "we should not be cavaliers and dismiss the session with a polite bow." However, he made it clear that he still favored an "early adjournment."

This last remark was greeted with boisterous applause.

Even hotter under the collar with resentment, Junior Statesman Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts pounded the table and tried to jam respect for the 80th Congress down Brannan's throat. But after Republican tempers had cooled, Brannan still hadn't retracted his statement.

Facing his first congressional firing squad since taking office, the young Secretary of Agriculture met behind closed doors with the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to appeal for ratification of the international wheat agreement, of great importance to farmers. Instead of taking up wheat, Vandenberg, scowling sternly, ordered Brannan to read an interview which he had conducted in the New York Times.

In the text, Brannan called Congress "irresponsible" for not ratifying the wheat agreement.

"You had no right to use that sort of word," snorted the big Michigan senator.

Then he pointed to the Senate's bipartisan record on foreign policy, demanded to know how Con-

gress could be called irresponsible after passing the European Recovery Program and the peacetime draft. His own Foreign Relations Committee, Vandenberg insisted, had voted unanimously on all important issues.

SENATE'S JUNIOR STATESMAN

After Vandenberg's stern lecture had run its course, Lodge broke in: "I interpret this charge to have been directed at me!"

"Neither the committee nor I should be subject to that kind of charge!" shouted Boston Back Bay Senator, using his fist for a gavel.

Brannan had mentioned Lodge in the interview as chairman of the subcommittee which failed to act on the wheat agreement.

"You can't pass that kind of bill in the limited time available," thundered Lodge, still flushed with anger.

EUROPE UNION IS THE DREAM OF MANY MEN

For close to 150 years idealistic statesmen have dreamed of and labored for a United States of Europe, but ironically enough it has taken the frightful menace of Communism to start this vision on its way to partial materialization.

That seems like a queer twist of fate, but maybe it's not so strange after all. Atheists turn to prayer in extremities, and men of many minds band together for mutual defense, in time of danger.

Anyway, western Europe has started a swing towards a confederation of democracies which are making concessions in sovereignty for the common welfare.

We were given two further notable indications of this trend Wednesday, Italy's free thinking, outspoken foreign minister, Count Carlo Sforza, stated that in order to effect a European union his country is ready to take the lead in accepting "curtailment of its political sovereignty, even in the most unexpected aspects."

The same time French Foreign Minister Paul Reynaud said he hoped Britain would come out in full support of a United States of Europe next autumn, after the dominions conference in London.

There is no indication of whether these two statements were coincidental or concerted. It would be interesting to know. In any event, they aim at the same objective.

Of course these pronouncements aren't the first positive developments along this line. There was the sensational formation of the five-nation western European union some five months ago, when Britain, France, Belgium, Holland, and Luxembourg formed an alliance which was hailed by many observers as giving a decided step toward the idea of a union for the whole of western Europe, and received the blessings of the United States.

This western European combine nearly complemented the union of 16 European countries which had banded together in support of the Marshall Plan. Indeed, time may demonstrate that America's European recovery project provided the nucleus for a United States of western Europe — and perhaps finally of all Europe in the happy days when Communism has had its run and the continent has returned to freedom.

Italy's adherence to the western European bloc so openly is a striking development in view of her powerful Communist Party which at one time seemed about to deliver her into the hands of Moscow; Count Sforza Wednesday urged union now as the only cure for the continent's economic and political ills and as the sole hope of peace.

His stand for unity was strengthened last week when the Italian senate, in approving the Marshall Plan accords, urged their early development into effective union. Only communists and fellow-traveling socialists offered opposition.

The 74-year-old Sforza still square shouldered and vigorous despite his years — is a blue-blood aristocrat of great wealth who is a liberal, pursues republican politics, and long has been advocate of European unity. After Mussolini came to power Sforza went into voluntary exile, traveling about Europe, Asia, South America, and the United States writing and lecturing. He was a critic of both Fascism and Monarchy.

Watch Your Horn Tootin'

Most everyone has heard persons who were temporarily vexed by some annoying incident exclaim, "There ought to be a law against it!"

However, few probably ever take time to stop and consider just how often there actually is a law controlling the incident in question. One that comes to mind at frequent intervals because of repeated occurrence all over the country is excessive and improper use of automobile horns.

There have been laws for scores of years that could control such practices, at least indirectly. Nearly all incorporated cities and towns have nuisance ordinances, and sometimes excessive honks by motorists have justified disturbance charges.

Texas now has a law that covers the situation without quibbling. It is included in the uniform traffic code that has been in effect for only a few months. It provides a penalty of a fine which can range up to \$200 for any person convicted of the crime of sounding an automobile horn for any purpose other than signalling warnings to drivers of other vehicles or to pedestrians. In theory such things as friendly blasts to attract the attention of acquaintances have been ruled out. The trouble is, nobody seems to pay any attention to the law.

On the whole, however, that section apparently is abused no more than other traffic regulations. Education has been upheld as a solution, but it seems there are those who would destroy the fruits of education if any credence can be attributed to a story that came to hand recently via circulars distributed by an insurance organization.

It develops as follows: A son of an influential family received drivers' training in school and subsequently qualified for his operators license. Soon afterward he accompanied his mother on a shopping trip downtown.

At the first stop on the trip, the mother proceeded to park on the left side of the street. Then later she stopped in front of a fire hydrant, and before they returned home she had aggregated some half a dozen infractions. Finally the son mentioned that his mother had been repeatedly violating traffic ordinances, whereupon she informed him that his father was acquainted with enough persons in authority to "fix" any matters of that sort.

Such incidents help prove that "a law against it" is no guarantee that violations of the statutes will be discouraged.—WACIL McNAIR

Party Officials Predict Much Lighter Vote In Demo Primary Runoff August 28

By the Associated Press
A much lighter vote in the Texas democratic runoff election than in the first primary is predicted by estimates of party officials and newspaper men in key counties. A record vote of 1,195,906 was cast in the July 24 first primary. The second primary will be held Aug. 28. Its only statewide race is that between former Gov. Coke Stevenson and U. S. Rep. Lyndon Johnson for the U. S. senatorial nomination.

There are runoffs in three congressional districts—the 3rd, 10th, and 15th. Many interest-exciting local contests were settled in July.

Where stiff fights on the county level remain they will have influence on the number of second primary votes in a county.

Reliability of the forecast is subject to uncertainties which control an election turnout, such things as the weather, or the degree of interest campaigning can arouse. But if the estimates are borne out the vote Aug. 28 is also expected to be considerably less than the highest cast previously in a runoff. That was 1,056,672 votes when Beauford H. Jester beat Homer P. Rainey for governor in 1946. A total runoff vote of 293,700 was

forecast in 17 counties which cast 409,563 ballots in July. The same ratio carried out in the state would mean a total vote of approximately 857,500 Aug. 28.

In a few instances there were predictions that the runoff vote would match or exceed that of the July election. One case was that of Webb county (Laredo), which is considering the 15th district runoff between Philip A. Kazen of Laredo and Lloyd Benfien, of McAllen. Webb county officials believe the vote might run as high as 7,500. It was 6,900 in the first primary.

County chairman J. M. Patterson said at Austin he expected Travis county to cast about 30,000 votes, about the same as in July, with the U. S. Senate and a sheriff's race main drawing cards. The tenth district congressional runoff also holds interest.

Estimates of lighter voting came from Harris, Dallas, Tarrant, Bexar, Hidalgo (in the 15th district), Cameron (in the 15th district), Navarro, Lubbock, Wichita, Denton, El Paso, Anderson, Tom Green, Nueces, Taylor, Lamar, Galveston, Jefferson, Hill, Grayson, and Angelina.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Ethiopian Was Friend In Need To Jeremiah

Scripture—Jeremiah 38:1-39:18.

The present series of lessons is a study of some little known characters of the Bible, today's being an obscure Ethiopian eunuch attached to King Zedekiah's household, who was a real friend and hero.

We of the present day can readily understand and admire these men and women of ancient times who were willing to risk their personal liberties and even their lives, to do what they thought right, or to save their people, or a friend.

Even in everyday walks of life we know of persons who risk their lives for others, or even to save a cat or dog from death. In a world where cruelty and brutality are all too prevalent, this is an heartening phenomenon.

Jeremiah, the prophet, had been telling the king and people that the Lord was against them because of their many sins, and that Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, would conquer and destroy their holy city.

The princes of the land thought that such talk was treason, as Jeremiah also told them that those who stayed and defied the Babylonians would surely perish, but those who surrendered would be spared and taken into exile.

The princes contended that the spirit of the soldiers to resist the aggressor was being lowered—which was probably true—and they petitioned the king to have Jeremiah killed.

King Zedekiah turned the prophet over to them. They tied his arms with ropes and let him down into a deep and muddy well, where they thought he would shortly die of starvation and hardship.

When Ebed-melech, the eunuch, heard this, he, without considering what might happen to him, went to the king and pleaded with him to save Jeremiah's life.

The king was evidently touched by his arguments that the princes had done an evil thing to treat the prophet of God. The king told Ebed-melech to make a rope of cords, and let it down to the prophet by cords, which he could fasten to his arms. Ebed-melech took 30 men with him and with the rags and cords they pulled Jeremiah out.

Thereafter he was kept a prisoner, but in the court of the prison.

King Zedekiah went secretly to Jeremiah and asked him to tell him truly what was going to happen to his kingdom. Jeremiah repeated his prophecy as before, telling the king that the only hope was in surrendering to Babylon.

Before he would repeat his prophecy, however, he made the king promise that he would not be put to death nor be given up to his enemies because of what he felt he must say. The king promised.

Zedekiah said he was afraid of the Jews who were prisoners of the Babylonians, that they might kill him. Jeremiah replied they would not do so, and begged the king to "obey the voice of the Lord," but Zedekiah did not. He made Jeremiah promise him that if the princes questioned him about this talk he would tell them nothing, and Jeremiah kept his promise.

In the ninth year of Zedekiah, king of Judah, in the tenth month, came Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, and all his army against Jerusalem, and they besieged it.

Although the people of Judah resisted, they were overcome and many slaughtered. The king was taken prisoner, his children killed before his eyes and he was blinded, and taken to Babylon. Jerusalem was burned and the walls pulled down. Nebuchadnezzar, however, had Jeremiah well treated.

The Lord told Jeremiah to go and speak to Ebed-melech and tell him not to be afraid. He would be delivered from the Babylonians and his life would be spared, "because thou hast put thy trust in Me, saith the Lord."

King Zedekiah, with all his wealth and power behind him, did not dare oppose his own princes to defend a prophet, even though he probably felt Jeremiah was right in his prophecies and warnings.

However, the humble servant in the king's household put his trust in what he knew to be right and God's will, risking his life by so doing, to become a hero for all time.

Ex-FDR Doctor Dies In California

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., Aug. 6. (AP)—Coroner John D. Ross has reported the death of Prof. Emory Siposs, a physiotherapist who for several years gave hydrotherapy treatments to President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The coroner said Siposs died Tuesday, apparently from an overdose of sleeping tablets. A relative in Washington, D. C., said the professor suffered a nervous breakdown from overwork a year ago and had been in hospitals intermittently.

Noted Historian Dies In England

MILFORD - ON - SEA, England, Aug. 6. (AP)—Dr. Albert Frederick Pollard, 78, noted historian, teacher and lecturer, died Tuesday, it was announced yesterday.

Author of many books, he was considered a ranking authority on the Tudor period in English history.

He lectured extensively in the United States as well as Europe, and served as professor pro tem at Columbia University in 1924-25. In 1918 he was a member of government committees on the League of Nations.

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Aug. 6. (AP)—Laszlo Rajik, Hungary's Communist minister of interior, was named foreign minister Thursday in a cabinet reshuffle.

He succeeds Eric Molnar, also a communist.

Mexico Bans Export Of Raw Hide To U. S.

LAREDO, Aug. 6. — Mexico has banned export of raw hides to the United States.

Raw hides—principally cow hides and goat skins—are usually brought into the United States in large amounts, through the port of Laredo.

The ban on raw hides export was imposed along with that on cotton, according to Chief Clerk Luis Aragon of the Nuevo Laredo, Mex., customs headquarters.

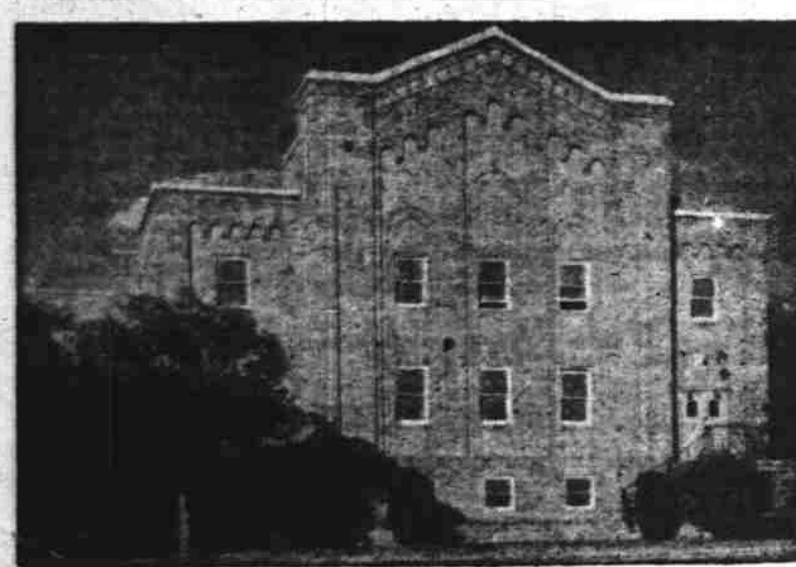

HCJC Budget Hearing Set

Trustees of the Howard County Junior college Thursday evening checked faculty lists, passed on a tentative budget and set date for a budget hearing.

The board also checked with the county board of trustees concerning the Howard County Vocational school, which has been functioning as an adjunct to the HCJC, and the county board was due to announce recommended policies Saturday.

The tentative budget, subject to the public hearing on Aug. 19, was pegged at \$106,000, which represented a \$3,000 increase over the budget for last year. The increase (and more) was in the appropriation for instructors' salaries, this item being increased from \$55,000 to \$60,000. Consequently, there was a net reduction of \$2,000 on other items, partly attributed to abolition of short term loan interest, lower insurance appropriations. Revenues were computed on an estimated 35 cent rate, same as this year.

The recommended budget was considerably under the actual expenditures for last year, which amounted to \$153,000. However, this was well under the \$181,000 revenues (loans and repayment showing in both totals). During the year the college repaid \$42,000 short-term loans and paid insurance (nearly \$17,000) five years in advance.

Preliminary consideration was given a permanent teacher salary schedule.

AAA Office Will Explain Grain Program

Employees of the local AAA office are prepared to explain all points of the government's grain purchase agreement program recently put into effect by the Commodity Credit Corporation to growers of Howard County.

The purchase agreement program is being offered to assure producers price support at not less than the announced county loan rate for both wheat and grain sorghums where the producer is unable to obtain storage in warehouses because of lack of space, does not wish to obtain a loan but desires assurance of a floor price on his grain, has a type of storage on a farm which does not meet loan storage specifications and where his farm storage is located in an area not eligible for farm storage due to hazards (e. g., climate).

Under this phase of the price support program, the producer who signs a purchase agreement and pays his fee to the county committee has a firm offer by the Commodity Credit Corporation that, if he is not able to sell his wheat or grain sorghums between the date the form is signed and April 30, 1949, for at least the support price, the corporation will purchase the grain.

If, at any time he finds he can sell his grain at more than the CCC "bid," he will be permitted to do so.

If the grain is delivered to the CCC, the settlement will be on the grade and class as of May, 1949, and not on its condition at the time the agreement is signed.

At all times, the grain is in the possession and care of the producer. For that reason, it is recommended by M. Weaver of the local AAA office that he periodically inspect and fumigate when necessary.

Midland Youths Are Treated For Burns

Three Midland youths, enroute home from the north-south all-star football game in Abilene, were treated for burns here Friday morning.

Scalding water from a radiator poured over Dunny Goode, Midland high school football and track star, Barney Hightower, and John Foster.

At the Malone & Hogan clinic hospital, they were given emergency treatment and released. None of the burns appeared to be serious.

Federal Support Is Announced For Middling Cotton

M. Weaver, county supervisor for the AA, has been informed via wire from Washington, that the government support price for 15-16 middling cotton will be 30.74 cents per pound with appropriate premiums and discounts for grade and location.

As soon as the base loan rate by cities and counties is received here, the farmers will be advised by the supervisor.

Steps will be taken, Weaver said, to offer the farmers service in securing loans through the Commodity Credit Corporation. The county office has placed an order for proper blanks to carry on the cotton loan program.

SHOW GOES ON

Woman Trainer Is Clawed By Tigers

JACKSON, Mich., Aug. 6. (AP)—The Show went on inside the Shrine Circus' tiger cage here last night even after three of the big cats badly clawed Mrs. Mabel Stark, 60-year-old veteran trainer.

Mrs. Stark, of Thousand Oaks, Calif., was treated today in her hotel room for shock and deep gouges on her thigh and ankle. She disdained hospitalization.

Circus attendants said two of the eight tigers in the cage began fighting soon after the elderly woman began her act before 4,000 spectators. When she moved in to separate them, a third animal, recently added to the act, set upon her.

Disengaging herself deftly from the tiger's claws, Mrs. Stark ignored her bloodstained clothing and signals from circus officials to cut short the performance. For eight minutes she continued to crack her whip and put the animals through their paces.

She collapsed as she left the cage.

Two physicians in the audience administered first aid.

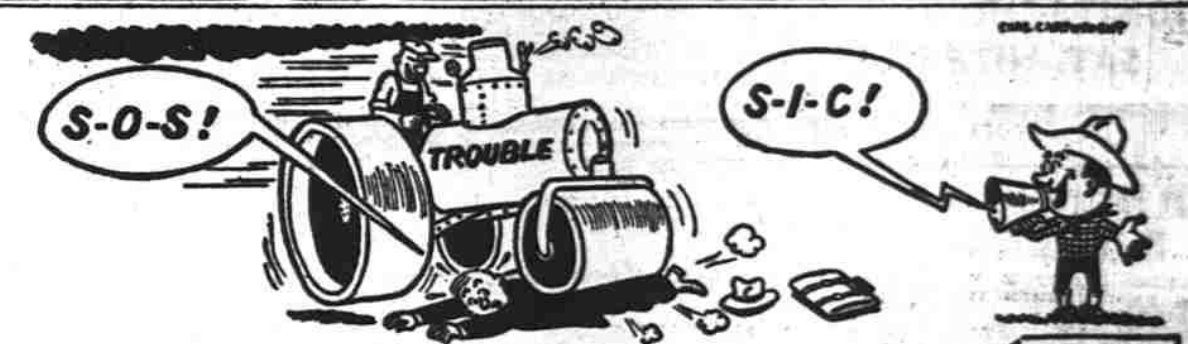

FIRES AT MINISTER, TOO

Brazen Young Gunman Admits Shooting, Axing Of Youth In Episcopal Bishop's Home

BOLTON, Mass., Aug. 6. (U-P)—A brazen young gunman who, police said, admitted firing two wild shots at Suffragan Episcopal Bishop Raymond A. Heron and the fatal shooting and axing of a 17-year-old youth in the clergyman's home was held on open charges today.

Frederick S. Pike, 19, of Boston, was held at Holden State Police Barracks after being brought from Providence, R. I., where he was captured yesterday in the bishop's car three hours after the shooting.

Pike waived extradition but was turned over to Massachusetts authorities after, Police Chief Charles A. Higgins and Capt. John J. Lang of Providence said, he admitted in a signed statement he shot at the bishop and killed Paul Zayka, a youth who lived with the prelate. Pike, a Concord Reformatory

parolee, was taken into custody following a bullet-spattered 75-mile an hour chase through heavy traffic.

Higgins and Lang said the young gunman boldly admitted shooting Zayka three times with a .25 caliber automatic pistol and then striking the youth with an ax before dragging the body to the cellar of the bishop's home.

Pike was quoted as saying he shot Zayka when the latter put up a struggle after being robbed of \$2. The parolee turned over to Providence police a spent bullet which he said he had fired through young Zayka's head.

Globe-Girdling B-29s Are Home

TUCSON, Ariz., Aug. 6. (U-P)—Two globe-girdling B-29s—the first to fly around the world—landed at their home base, Davis-Monthan Field, at 5:31 o'clock this morning.

They made the trip in 15 days, in 10 hops. But en route, a third superbomb went down in a crash near Aden, Southern Arabia, in which 17 of the 18 men aboard were killed.

Each plane came in with 17 men aboard today. One officer had been left behind at Aden to clear up matters pertaining to the crash of the third craft.

Piloting the big bombers in from Anchorage, Alaska, on the final leg of the journey were Lt. Col. Richard W. Kline of Haskell, Tex., commanding officer of the 64th Squadron, and first Lt. A. M. Neal, Visalia, Calif., of the 64th Squadron.

In the round—the world flight which started here July 22, the Superforts refueled at McDill Field, Fla., and later landed at the Azores, Tripoli, North Africa, Aden, Ceylon, Manila and Yokohama, Japan.

Man, Four Horses Perish In Blaze

BUTLER, Pa., Aug. 6. (U-P)—A 79-year-old caretaker and four race horses perished last night in a blaze that destroyed a large barn on the Butler County Fairgrounds.

The body of Lou Patton, caretaker who had living quarters on the grounds, was found in the ruins of the barn after the flames had been extinguished.

Firemen expressed the belief Patton had been asleep when the fire started.

The horses were owned by A. J. Richards of Butler, president of the Butler County Fair Assn.

Richards, who estimated his loss at \$50,000, said the horses burned to death were two colts out of Billy I Direct; their dam, Grattan Maid, and a horse named R. J. Richards.

Texas' Accident Prevention Record Up For Comparison

AUSTIN, Aug. 6. (U-P)—Texas' traffic accident prevention record will be compared with efforts of other states here tomorrow.

Lew Wallace of Chicago, assistant to the president of the National Safety Council, will make the analysis at a meeting of the Coordinating committee of state officials recently appointed by Gov. Beauford H. Jester.

The meeting is scheduled in Gov. Jester's office in the morning.

Couple Is Facing Negligence Count In Fatal Beating

MOOREHEAD, Minn., Aug. 6. (U-P)—Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Halvorson, two of whose 11 children beat their baby sister to death last week, faced court here today on charges of neglect.

G. L. Dosland, Clay County attorney, signed complaints against the couple late yesterday and they were jailed pending preliminary hearing. Earlier, Juvenile Court Judge P. F. Fountain Como granted the 11 Halvorson children to custody of the Minnesota social welfare director.

The boys, seven and eleven years old, continued to blame each other for the fatal beating of their sister, Joyce, two and a half.

Forty-One Bids Rejected In June Mineral Lease Sale

AUSTIN, Aug. 6. (U-P)—Forty-one high bids have been rejected as "inadequate" by the State School Land Board in the June 1 mineral lease sale.

Board Chairman Bascom Giles said yesterday the rejections followed a careful study and personal inspections of various tracts involved. He said many of the tracts would be reoffered at a later sale.

The board accepted 19 other bids Giles said. Previously the board had accepted bids on 14,000 acres offered in the sale.

Son Is Charged In Death Of Father

LYNCHBURG, Va., Aug. 6. (U-P)—John Fogle, 50, was charged here yesterday afternoon with felonious homicide in the death of his 83-year-old father, George B. Fogle.

The elder Fogle died Wednesday night in an automobile after an alleged fight between father and son. Coroner J. A. Wilkins said death was caused by a ruptured aorta, a large artery near the heart.

MOSCOW, Aug. 6. (U-P)—Pravda devoted three columns on its foreign affairs page today to the national convention of the U. S. Communist Party in New York.

Seven Children Die

BERLIN, Aug. 6. (U-P)—Seven German children, from two to 10 years old, perished at Cologne while playing with an old artillery sydgil they found, the British-licensed German Press Service said today.

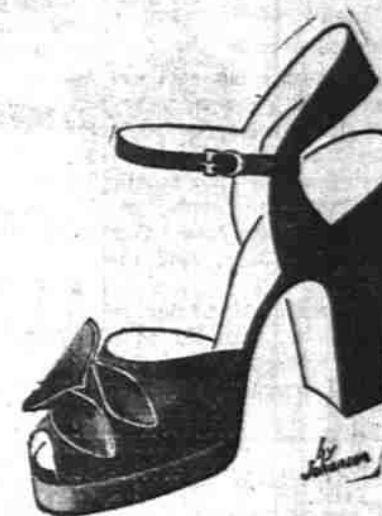
