Local Girl Killed In Auto Accident Early Sunday

Victim Buried In Pride Cemetery Sunday Afternoon

Miss Verna Mae Williams, 16, was fatally injured early Sunday morning when the automobile in which she was riding with four other young people overturned in passing another car parked about three miles north of Lamesa on the Brownfield road.

Miss Williams died enroute to a local hospital. Other occupants of the light coupe were Brub Kelly, Odessa Hill, Wallace Griffin and Jack Crump all reside at Welfin.

The young people were enroute to their homes when the mishap resulted. The driver swerved to miss a parked car and struck loose soil, the car turning over four or five times, investigators said. Miss Williams was thrown through the top, clear of the wreck.

The other occupants received minor injuries and were treated at a local hospital, but later were moved to their homes.

Funeral services for Miss Williams were conducted Sunday afternoon at 2:30 at the Pride School house, with burial made in the Pride cemetery.

Miss Williams is the daughter of Mrs. C. H. Williams of Welch. She was born on January 25, 1921 in Hall county. Miss Williams was making her home in Lamesa at the time of her death and was employed at the Nolen's Pic Stand.

Survivors are her mother and father two brothers, Glen and Elmer Williams and one sister.

Plans For C. of C. Banquet Made At Tuesday Meeting

The directors of Lamesa Chamber of Commerce held their regular meeting in the Chamber of Commerce office, Tuesday afternoon, January 18 at 5:00. M. C. Lindsey, president of the board, presided over the meeting.

It was decided by the board that the Lamesa chamber of commerce hold an annual banquet this year. No definite date was decided on, but it is hoped that it can be held during the last week in February. Arrangements for the banquet were referred to the entertainment committee, composed of the following members: V. Z. Rogers, W. D. Arnett, J. W. Bryant, Conway King and Owen C. Taylor.

Another question discussed at the meeting was the housing problem here in Lamesa. It was brought out that Lamesa is missing many good citizens because of the lack of adequate housing facilities. A. G. Bearden reported to the board that many inquiries came to the Chamber of Commerce office for good furnished apartments, and that many of the prospective residents are unable to find living quarters of the suitable type. A committee to investigate and encourage the building of some good rent houses and apartments was appointed by the president. Other matters of importance to the town and county were also discussed.

BROWN COUNTY MAN ARRESTED IN THEFT CASE

According to an Associated Press story from San Angelo, Carl E. Williams, of Brownwood has been arrested and placed in jail there, charged with theft of a registered mail pouch more than two months ago, from a Santa Fe Railway car somewhere between O'Donnell and Dallas.

The mail pouch contained currency and silver amounting to \$28,000, and was being sent from the Federal Reserve Bank at Dallas to the First National Bank of O'Donnell.

Williams arrested at San Angelo Wednesday, was lodged in jail in lieu of bond of \$7,500, set upon arraignment before United States Commissioner Jesse Couch.

The complaint was filed by Postal Inspector P. M. Juvenal, who disclosed the theft had happened November 4 or 5, from a railway mail car. Federal agents have not disclosed details of the robbery and it was presumed that until recently they have been without tangible clues.

The mail pouch consigned to the O'Donnell bank, contained \$28,000 in coin and currency, in four packages. One contained \$17,000, including \$5,000 in \$10 bills, \$10,000 in \$20 bills and \$2,000 in \$50 bills. In a second was \$11,000 divided into \$6,000 in \$1 bills and \$5,000 in \$5 notes. The third contained \$800 in half dollars, and \$200 in dimes. Remainder of the shipment consisted of \$150 in nickels.

UNION SCHOOL MOVES INTO NEW BUILDING MON.

The Union school children and teachers moved into the new \$30,000.00 brick school building last Monday morning which is located about two miles south of the Weaver school house.

The building is constructed of white brick, tile and concrete. It is modern in every respect and has eight classrooms, study hall and library, home economics and science laboratories and office. It is equipped with steam heating, delco lighting and modern plumbing throughout.

It is equipped, for the most part with new furniture and equipment. \$300.00 worth of new books were placed in the new library this year along with books on hand in the Weaver and Higginbotham schools.

Union is a new district formed by the consolidation of the Ballard, Weaver and Higginbotham districts last July. It contains 109 square miles and has a valuation of over \$700,000.00. The scholastic enrollment is 230 at present.

Three new school busses serve the district, transporting all children who are not within walking distance of the school.

The faculty is composed of eight teachers: Mr. P. K. Humes, superintendent; Ray Culp, English; Virginia Neel, history; M. W. Webb, 7th grade and science; Clifton Martin 6th grade; Mrs. Lela Seale Gandy 4th and fifth grades; Mrs. L. W. West, second and third grades; Mrs. Hattie Butcher, first grade.

The board of trustees are: F. E. Hardy, president; M. M. Dabnam, secretary; C. R. Crow, O. W. Nell and L. W. Boreland.

Union school is working for affiliation and is on its way of becoming a first-class, four-year affiliated rural high school. Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum county school superintendent said.

NOTED VIOLINIST TO APPEAR IN CONCERT HERE FRIDAY EVENING

Parent-Teachers To Sponsor Event At High School

The first number of a series of three musical arts programs presented by the Hollywood Musical Arts Company and sponsored by the local Parent-Teachers Association will appear here Friday night, January 21 at 7:30 o'clock. In this program music patrons will have the opportunity of making the acquaintance of Josef Piastro, world famous violinist, as he appears here in concert.

Piastro was formerly a court musician and friend of the ill-fated czar Nicholas II of Russia. His father, a musician, was his first teacher and at the age of ten he entered the conservatory of Petrograd where he became a pupil of the late Leopold Auer. In his classes while a pupil of Auer, he was associated with Mischa Elman, Zimbalist, Jascha Heifetz, Kathleen Parlow and others. As a concert artist, Piastro has toured every country of the globe. He has won an outstanding place in the world of violinists and virtuosos by his distinctive playing and the intensely human note that is sounded in everything he interprets. His last world tour was completed four years ago, when he again came to America and is now a citizen.

Piastro uses a violin made by Petrus Guarnerius, dated 1734, which he purchased from the Wurliizer Music Company for \$7500. The bow is a genuine Ticcure, made about the year 1800.

Music lovers of Lamesa cannot afford to miss this and the two succeeding programs of the series. The second program will be Ruth Howell, dramatic soprano, and the third, John De Blois, bass baritone. Each artist will be assisted by an able accompanist. Season tickets good for the three programs of the series will still be available Friday at \$1.50 each for adults. Individual tickets to each performance will be seventy-five cents. Season tickets are not being sold to children but the P.-T. A. hopes to make it possible for every child in the community to attend these concerts. Admission prices for elementary school children will be ten cents and for high school students, twenty-five cents.

NEW SCHOOL TERM OPENS WITH 1565 PUPILS ENROLLED

Increased Enrollment Gives Lamesa Class A Football Rating

The last half of the public free school year opened Monday with nineteen new pupils appearing for enrollment in the elementary school. Twenty-three pupils were promoted to the high school grade eight, thus reducing the number in attendance by four. The enrollment as reported by Mr. Roberts, principal of the elementary school, for the second semester is standing at 1004 not counting the promotions.

The high school received the twenty-three pupils promoted from elementary school together with fourteen additional pupils to reach a new peak. Mr. McCollum, high school principal reports there are now 530 individual enrollment cards of pupils in the high school 1534 white pupils and 31 pupils in the colored school for a gross pupil count of 1565.

The information on high school gross enrollment was requested by State Inter-scholastic authorities on Tuesday this week, for consideration in new admissions to the Conference A football competition. Of course, on the basis of present enrollment, Lamesa high school is automatically placed in the top conference. An announcement is expected soon concerning the names of the school systems with which Lamesa High will be listed in the Conference A. This news will be released from Austin.

NEW DIRECTORS ELECTED FOR FAIR ASS'N.

At a meeting of the stockholders of the Dawson County Fair Association held Wednesday night in the county court room new directors were elected and other important business transacted.

The organization voted that the chairman of the County Home Demonstration Council and the president of the boys 4-H club should be included on the board of directors of the association, it was also voted at the meeting to amend the by-laws of the association to have the annual stockholders meeting each year on the third Wednesday in January.

Directors elected to serve a three-year term were: Joe M. Peterson, W. M. Yates, Connally Baldwin, Chairman Home Demonstration Council and the president of boys 4-H club.

Those elected to serve for two years are: J. M. Peterson, W. K. Crawley, D. L. Adcock, F. L. Gresham and A. W. Matthews.

Those to serve for one year, are W. J. Becknam, S. L. Forrest, C. A. Hollingsworth, George D. Norman and J. T. Allen.

A meeting of the stockholders will be held on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock at which time new officers of the association will be elected.

Questionnaires Will Be Mailed Each Farmer In County

Due to the large amount of cotton produced in Dawson county, which has been ginned outside this county, a survey will be made to determine as accurately as possible the correct 1937 cotton production figure. This survey will be made in accordance with the wishes of numerous farmers and business men of the county who are interested in seeing that Dawson county is credited with an accurate cotton production figure for 1937.

The survey will be in the form of a simple questionnaire which will be mailed to every producer in the county. Instructions will be enclosed with a return card. In order that there be no duplication the name of the farm owner and the farm operator will be filled in along with the acreage of cotton harvested, the total number of bales ginned, the number of bales ginned in this county and the number of bales ginned out of the county.

It is of especial importance that accurate record of the Dawson county cotton crop be established in view of the unusually large crop which was produced in 1937. This record if accurately established may be of great value in getting an equitable quota set for Dawson county in any of the future government farm programs. Every producer should fill out the return to the best of his information and ability and return it promptly so that the replies can be tabulated and the total production figures for the county established at an early date. The survey has no other purpose than to establish correct production figures and should receive the cooperation of every producer.

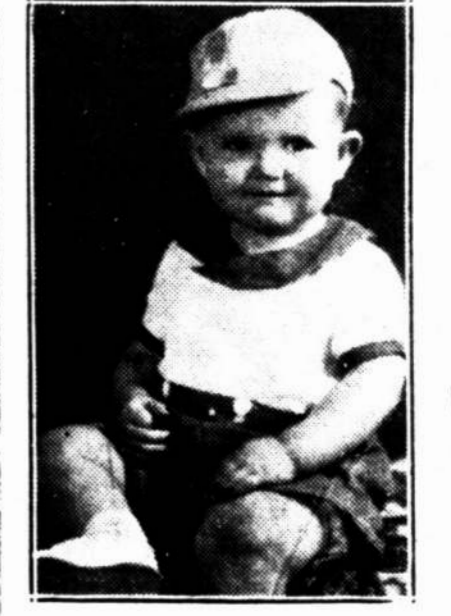

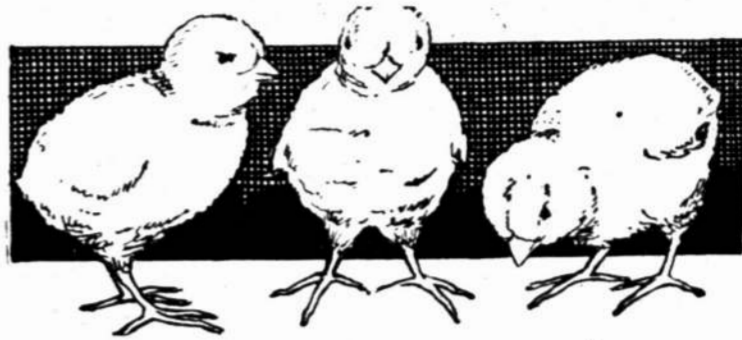

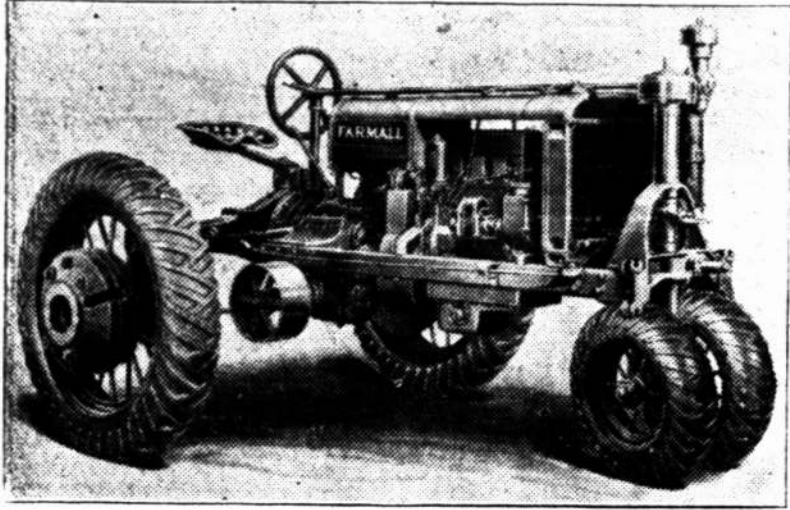

Variety Activities In Borden County's Agent's Report

Annual report of E. B. McLeary, farm agent for Borden county, reveals that a variety of activities were engaged in during 1937.

One hundred fifty farmers earned payments in connection with the soil program. This group represents exactly one-half of the total number of farms in Borden county.

Acres of crops for this group of 150 farms are as follows: Cotton 10,250; corn 350; oats, and barley, 675; wheat, 550; sudan grass, 3,575; cane 375; grain sorghums 7,000; vegetables, 40; idle crop land, 750; orchards 60.

32 Builds Terraces
Thirty-two farms constructed terraces during the year in Borden county, and 42 farms used contour tillage methods, which had not previously been used on any of the total of 74 farms. Acres totaling 4,700 were terraced in 1937, and 19,727 acres were contoured.

Seven hundred and fifty tons of

feed were stored in the 12 trench silos constructed in the county during the year.

Four registered hogs were brought into the county.
Twelve 4-H club boys fed 13 calves. Fourth club boys conducted one radio program for Borden county, and showed beef calf projects at three live-stock shows.

Seventy-one ranch operators participated in the 1937 range program. These ranchers completed the following range building practices to earn a total of approximately \$36,000: constructed 1118 earthen tanks containing a total of 315,000 yard of dirt; deferred grazing for a period of six months on 11,500 acres; eradicated mesquite on 750 acres; eradicated cactus and prickly pear on 1,390 acres; eradicated rodents on 860 acres; contour listed or furrowed 450 acres.

Dee Hull Attends Universal Mills Convention

An optimistic view of business conditions for 1938 was presented by the Southwestern business men who attended the sixteenth anniversary of Universal Mills of Fort Worth, according to Dee Hull, local Red Chain dealer who has just returned from the convention in Fort Worth.

More than 200 representative business men from Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Louisiana and Arkansas were addressed by Gaylord J. Stone, president of Universal Mills who spoke on the value of high quality merchandise and the benefits of extensive advertising. Stone expressed a belief that the present so-called business recession would be short-lived and stated that depressions need not be of alarming proportions of the public and business men would continue operating on a sane, normal basis. Universal Mills was built from a small beginning to one of the largest in the Southwest during the depression years. Stone said.

Ross M. Sherwood, chief of the division of poultry husbandry, A. and M. College; Prof. D. H. Reid, of the faculty of the department of poultry husbandry, A. and M.; A. H. Duke, executive secretary of the Baby Chick Association of Texas and Prof. W. C. Hommer, formerly of A. and M. and now of the staff of Universal Mills addressed the convention on subjects of feed formulas.

The baby chicks need generous portions of milk and cod liver oil in their early diets, said Hommer who maintains that in order to produce consistent layers they must be properly fed from the day they are hatched. This also reduces mortality among small chicks, he stated.

Payments Under 1937 Farm Program Now Under Way

College Station, Jan. 17.—Payments under the terms of the 1937 Agricultural Conservation Program are being made in considerable volume, according to Geo. Slaughter, Wharton, chairman of the Texas Agricultural Conservation committee.

The conservation program terminated two months later than was the case in 1936 when the final date for compliance was October 31. Farmers had until December 31 to carry out conservation practices in 1937.

First payments went to farmers in Brazos, Morris and Jasper counties. Slaughter said. The state AAA office on the campus of Texas A. and M. College is auditing 2,000 applications for grants a day and is equipped to handle as many as 3,000 a day if the volume received from the field justifies.

In spite of the fact that the compliance date fell two months later, the program as a whole is further along than in 1936, according to Slaughter. He pointed out that 167 counties had been approved for final adjustment as compared with 52 on the same date in 1937, and that some 99,999 applications for grant have been typed and returned to the counties. On the same date in 1937, this figure stood at 36,000.

The fact that the expenses of administering the program within the counties must be deducted from the payments going to farmers makes it impossible to make payments to any one county until at least 75 per cent of the applications from that county have been received by the state office. Slaughter said.

Around 36 million dollars will be distributed among approximately 200,000 Texas farmers under the 1937 agricultural program, Slaughter estimated.

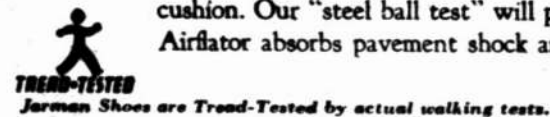

As this is written I have just returned from Bismarck, the capital of the State of North Dakota, where I

spoke at the Jackson Day dinner. I found many enthusiastic Democrats there, and according to all reports the people are overwhelmingly behind President Roosevelt, just as they are in this State. Incidentally, when I saw the President in Washington recently he ap-

peared to be in the best health and happiest spirits of any time I have ever seen him. He seemed to appreciate it when I told him that the people of this State were behind him almost 100 per cent. "Pay your poll tax" That should be the slogan of all good citizens from now until February first.

One of the most important offices filled by vote of the people is that of Lieutenant-Governor. Generally little attention is paid to it by the voters but it is a powerful office. The Lieutenant Governor presides over the State Senate and appoints the various senate committees. This is especially important when a conference committee is appointed. The Lieutenant-Governor's rulings can generally determine whether a bill is to pass or not pass. For this reason you can see how important it is.

Pace, of Tyler who is chairman of the State Affairs committee, where all the tax bills died during the regular session of the legislature. At the beginning of the regular session Senator Pace voted against race track gambling, but later switched to the other side and voted with the gambling crowd all the way during the remainder of the regular session; and even in the special session when the race track gambling law was repealed.

2. Coke Stevenson, who was twice elected speaker of the House by the Ferguson forces; and whose ruling as speaker first made it possible to legalize race track gambling.

3. Senator Wilbourne Collie, who voted for repeal; and 4. Senator G. H. Nelson, of Lubbock who introduced the bill to outlaw race track gambling and successful pushed it through.

This is part of the records of those who have been discussed as candidates. If definite announcements are made I shall be glad to give you "the rest of the record" as to the records of these gentlemen from time to time.
