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WILL NOT HOLD POULTRY SHOW

LACK OF FINANCIAL SUPPORT CAUSE OF NOT HOLDING ANNUAL POULTRY EXHIBIT

Because of lack of financial support, the North Plains Poultry show will not be held this year, according to Harlan Hawk president of the association sponsoring the exhibit. For the second time in as many years, the show has had to be abandoned.

The Perryton Chamber of Commerce offered support to the extent of \$150.00 for the show, the amount allowed in the Chamber's budget at the first of the year and it was hoped that this amount would be matched by the Commissioners' Court of Ochiltree county. However this body felt that because of existing conditions, so little poultry was in shape for exhibition purposes that it did not warrant the expenditure.

Rather than put on an inferior type of show, local directors of the North Plains Poultry association favored postponing the exhibition for this year.

WARNS AGAINST WINTER FIRES

CITY HAS PERFECT FIRE RECORD; INTO FIFTH MONTH WITHOUT FIRE CALL

Stress was laid this week by Fire Marshal R. H. Gamel and Fire Chief W. B. Lilly, warning property owners of the danger of winter fires and urging them to take every necessary precaution in removing fire hazards of all kinds and making a determined effort to preserve the city's perfect fire record for the year.

Laying claim to the best fire record this city has ever had, officials are anxious to finish out the year without loss. The last insured fire loss was sustained on July 27, 1933, nearly sixteen months ago, without a single insured loss during 1934. Perryton is going into its fifth month without a fire call for any cause whatsoever.

Only one fire has occurred during the year of a serious nature, it being the Odd Fellow's hall and it was uninsured, and the loss was not great. Uninsured fires are not reported to the state fire insurance commission, Office Gamel explains, so as far as the city is concerned on their records, Perryton has a one hundred per cent rating for the year.

If this can be maintained for the next six weeks it will undoubtedly mean further reductions in the insurance premiums for property owners.

Business men and property owners, who have always been so kind to cooperate, are urged to check over their heating equipment, electric and gas connections, and eliminate every possible fire hazard. Fires are always more frequent during the winter season and especially during the holidays and it is hoped that this year they can be entirely avoided.

Relief Pay Not To Be Spent For Operating Pleasure Cars Or For Booze And Gambling

Owing to the fact that many people on relief rolls have been using money so secured for the purpose of operating pleasure automobiles, purchase of liquor, gambling and other such non-essentials, the Texas Relief Commission has just sent to all County Administrators strict rules concerning same.

While no Administrator can demand of a relief client, the key or license plate to his car, he is empowered to deny relief to any family which persists in expending relief grants on the operation of an automobile which is not essential to their welfare. Clients may use relief funds for operation of cars in going to and from their work and it is also recognized that in some instances, cars are necessary for clients to reach the headquarters office, but the State Commission

DISTRICT COURT IS IN SESSION

GRAND JURY RETURNS THIRTEEN INDICTMENTS; TRYING CIVIL DOCKET THIS WEEK

The regular fall term of the district court convened Monday with Judge E. J. Pickens, Canadian, presiding. W. L. McConnell, Panhandle, district attorney, is representing the state, assisted by Max Boyer, county attorney.

The grand jury was empaneled with J. W. Daniels as foreman. Thirteen indictments were returned by the jury before they recessed Wednesday. They will reconvene later in the court term. Ten of the indictments were on felony charges, three for misdemeanors. Practically all parties indicted were already under arrest and in confinement or at liberty on bail. Among those indicted were Alvin and David Ash, Amarillo, charged with house-breaking, theft and burglary; W. F. Maxfield, liquor violations; Ted Tannehill, gasoline tax evasions; and M. B. Rowe and Jack Davis, Amarillo, theft of wheat.

The civil docket is being tried this week. The criminal cases will be called next week.

BUY 500 COWS IN OCHILTREE

FINAL QUOTA SET FOR THIS COUNTY IN GOVERNMENT CATTLE BUYING PROGRAM

A final allotment quota of five hundred cows has been set for Ochiltree county in the government cattle buying program, according to County Agent J. T. Stovall. Information regarding the new quota was received this week from Geo. W. Barnes, assistant state drouth director.

This final allotment will consist of only mature cows, no calves or steers to be received. The herds that are in distressed conditions will be given preference in the purchase of cows to fill this quota.

Anyone that desires to sell should sign up at the earliest possible convenience so that an inspection can be made if necessary. The allotment will be purchased in about two or three weeks, Mr. Stovall advises.

TAX PENALTIES ARE ELIMINATED

TEXAS LEGISLATURE PASSES BILL IN SPECIAL SESSION TO REPEL PAST DUE PENALTIES

Those who owe taxes which were delinquent on August 1, 1934, will now have the opportunity to pay them without the penalties and interest which have heretofore accrued on them, according to advices from Representative B. L. Rogers at Austin.

The Pope law which was passed in the closing days of the Fourth Called Session, will be effective immediately as a result of a resolution which was passed after the bill was passed. When the bill was passed it did not receive the necessary two-thirds vote in the Senate to place it in immediate effect so the resolution was later passed in order to accomplish this purpose.

The law provides that all penalties and interest on ad valorem taxes which were due on or before August 1, 1934, are released if the taxes are paid on or before March 15, 1935. If the taxes are paid between March 15, 1935, and April 1, 1935, there will be added a penalty of two per cent. If the taxes are paid during the month of April there will be added a penalty of four per cent. If the taxes are paid during the month of May there will be added a penalty of five per cent. If the taxes are paid after May there will be added a penalty of six per cent per annum.

The law is mandatory on all cities, school districts, water districts, etc., up until March 15, 1935. After that date the law is optional and the governing bodies of political subdivisions of the State may adopt the provisions of the law by passing an ordinance or resolution to that effect.

TESTING WATER FOR FLUORINE

FEDERAL HEALTH OFFICIALS MAKING SURVEY TO FIND CAUSE OF BROWN TEETH STAIN

Monday of this week Dr. H. T. Dean of the U. S. Public Health Service, Washington, D. C. made an examination of teeth stains among fifth and sixth grade pupils in the Perryton public schools. This is a government service and is part of a national survey to determine the localities where this brown coloring is found on peoples teeth. The government is planning to treat the water in places where this condition is prevalent in order to counteract the discoloring effect.

It is thought that Perryton's water supply is very mild in the content of fluorine which causes the staining of teeth. Among the pupils examined three showed absolutely no trace of this staining and were marked negative, eight showed very mild traces, eighteen mild, and three moderate, and none showed extreme coloring.

Dr. Dean explained that adults would not be bothered with this discoloration of their teeth. It is prevalent only during the maturing of the permanent teeth. If fluorine is present during formation of the permanent teeth the coloring will be found to be in proportion to the amount of fluorine in the drinking water. Of course individuals are not affected by this brownish coloring even though the drinking water be high in its content of fluorine.

Dr. Dean was accompanied by R. J. Dixon of the state health department and Mr. Dixon took some samples of Perryton's drinking water supply and analysis of the finding will be returned to Superintendent of schools Irvin.

The Story of My Pantry

My pantry was started as a co-operator, for I was not elected Pantry Demonstrator until October 1st, 1934, just one month from the time it will be judged. Our former Demonstrator felt that under certain circumstances she could not continue as the Demonstrator so I took it for the special benefit of the club and our Demonstration agent, Miss Marie Ludwick.

The work is very interesting and I like it very much, but I have had such a short time to get my pantry in shape for achievement Day that it has taken a lot of pleasure out of it for me.

The most outstanding thing to my mind that I have accomplished in my pantry, is the 60 feet of shelving that has been added. (But still need more) and the new coat of white Decort that has been given the walls and ceiling, making it much lighter and improving the general appearance of the cellar, for that is where my pantry is. It is 10'x14'x8', cement walls and floor, heavy frame top and cement and dirt on top of that.

Before the shelves were added I had all my canned goods stored in boxes and one would have to look from one box to another for what they were looking for and most generally would have to go myself to find it. But now since I have the shelves and have them labeled and the jars in the proper place any one, even a small child can go down and at once find what it is sent after.

The next thing I feel that was of a very great help to me in the filling of the pantry for the months we have to live out of it was the 4-H budget card, that each member filled out to fit her family. In filling the pantry from this card you know just how many leafy and starchy vegetables and fruits, and etc., that your family will need to have a balanced diet for the months we cannot get fresh vegetables and fruits. It also keeps us from canning an excess of one variety, thus saving time and expense.

Another thing the Home Demonstration work has done for our Pantry Demonstrators, Co-operators, and visitors as well, is that it has caused us all to become more interested in finding out new and better methods of canning. I know that we will be safe in saying that more fruits, vegetables, and meats have been canned in Ochiltree County since we have had a demonstrator than twice the length of time before.

The 4-H pantry offers other important advantages. Health may be improved by the careful planning that results in the proper amounts and balances of foods to protect the body from diseases, time is saved the housewife in having a good selection of canned foods which may be quickly prepared, the appetite is pleased with the variety of foods provided throughout the entire year and a certain satisfaction is enjoyed in knowing that you have an ample and healthful diet from products on the farm.

This year has been an unusually hard year to fill our pantries. I had a hard time getting the things I needed to can. I had a good garden early, had radishes, lettuce, onions, greens and English peas. Everything else was growing fine, until a hail storm beat it into the ground. This was very discouraging and perhaps I didn't try as hard after that as I should. The dry, hot winds were hard on the young tender plants, I had plenty of water for surface irrigation. I did not get my garden tilled but hope to next year.

In the pantry work in the club I have helped five members in canning meats and vegetables, have helped three to tile their gardens and have sent out twenty recipes.

In my pantry I have 55 varieties of products to serve from for my family of three. I have 511 quarts of fruits and vegetables. Have 1250 pounds of pork provided and a beef that will weigh 660 pounds. Will make cheese along during the winter as we have an excess of milk. Have 120 pounds of lard left over from last year flour and sugar to last all winter. Have wheat to grind for cereal and stored foods to last several months. More will be provided as needed such as: potatoes, cabbage, apples, onions, lettuce and celery. These are very hard to keep in this country.

I value my pantry at \$350.00 in dollars and cents, but its real value cannot be estimated in that way.

CANS TOMATO JUICE

Mrs. Gene Truax, Farnsworth farm food supply cooperator, has canned 68 pints of tomato juice. Mrs. Truax tiled her garden in the spring, but the water supply failed. The tomatoes had to be bought, but enough juice was canned to supply the family needs.

The Story of My Pantry

This has been my first year as pantry demonstrator, and I have enjoyed every bit of it. My motto has been "To Make the Better Best."

My goal has been to plan garden and foods budget according to family needs. I know if my family has balanced meals they will be more healthy. If a person has health they also have happiness. It is up to the mothers to see that their families have both.

This spring I started out in real earnest to plant myself a good garden. I worked and watered it all the time. We had a few good rains at first, but soon it stopped raining all together just when we needed the rain the most.

The well did not pump enough water for everything, so I tried to keep the water on the plants that I mostly wanted, such as tomatoes, squash, peppers and cucumbers. Then they did not bear like they should. Some of the plants started dying and soon the hot winds had burned everything.

We bought \$3.89 worth of seeds and \$4.55 for jars and lids and we didn't raise but \$5.20 worth of produce so we lost \$3.15.

Most all that I have canned I

have bought. There were seven bushels of peaches, ten bushels of apples and one hundred and fifty-two of flour, and also one sugar which has cost us \$1.

This year I have canned quarts of produce which at \$94.40, and we have eaten and dried produce (4026) which is valued at \$241.62.

I had some shelves built in my pantry, 38 feet in all, for \$4.00. Before I had jars any place, and I knew what I had or where any of my shelves have already themselves. I did not have shelf space for my exhibit some shelves out of my exhibit.

I did my best this year. I am going to work all year, because I know now planning my garden and what I accomplished something, I didn't raise a very good one. What produce I bought worked every week to buy it. The value of what I have this year is: \$94.40 and what eaten is \$241.62. The total 02, counting all expenses \$2.

International Sunday School Lesson

by A. C. Williams, Minister Perryton Church of Christ
November 18, 1934
CHURCHMEMBERSHIP
Memory Verse: "We are members of his body."—Eph. 5:30
Lesson Text: Acts 2:41-47;
Matt. 5:13-16

I. The Salt of The Earth (Matt. 5:13)
Jesus had just concluded those wonderful Beatitudes for which the sermon on the Mount is famous. This new and invigorating message from the lips of our Lord had come like a voice from another world, like bits of exquisite music from the lips of celestial singers. In a world where men and women drooped in despair and counted their lot a hard one Jesus came with his announcement, "Blessed are ye." Persecution, poverty, bereavement, thirst, and hunger could not forever steal the sunshine from their skies. For the great teacher had come to bind up broken hearts and breathe the atmosphere of hope and plant roses upon ashheaps.

A new vision was needed for service. Life is not a useless round of meaningless monotony. "Life is real!" Jesus would have his people know that there is a great purpose for their being in the world, and a great influence to be used by all who follow the footprints of the Master. The lowliest disciple is given a torch and told to light his way and the path of his fellowmen.

One type of influence is salt. Jesus said, "Ye are the salt of the earth." Christ proposed that his followers be like salt? In what way?

1. Salt is an enemy of corruption. It attacks germs. It wages war on disease. So Christianity wages war on sin—moral, mental and spiritual pollution. It proposes to purify every community it touches. It attacks immorality and intemperance. Germs of selfishness and hatred flee before this element.

2. Salt preserves. Those treasures which have been entrusted to the hearts of God-fearing men and women are preserved by this mineral. The ancient simplicity of the Gospel as preached in the first century should not be lost to us of the present generation. Then God needs men and women everywhere who will "contend earnestly for the faith once for all delivered to the saints." The simple story of the cross must be kept from the shadows of religious mysticism. The lure of gospel purity demands that it be preserved inviolate and uncorrupted. One terrible charge made against the traditionalism of the Jews was that they had "changed the truth of God into a lie and worshipped the creature more than the Creator."

The gospel was committed to men—to chosen witnesses and ambassadors. Not even an angel of heaven had the right to change that message. So in the New Testament we still possess that simple and wonderful story of the Christ which has lifted thousands from mire to rock.

3. Salt flavors. How repulsive would be the taste of food if it had no salt in it.
How tasteless would be life without the heavenly flavor to make it appeal to hungry hearts. He who really relishes life is he who has used—freely—used—heaven's salt-cellar. He enjoys the Christian life to the full. Though he has given up wickedness, and abstained from many things the world may call "pleasure," he is happier than the servant of sin. Like a shimmering angel, who dwells underneath the resplendent dome of heaven, he basks in the smiles of his God.

The church is salt in a community. Hence it must preserve, purify, and flavor lives of the men, women and children wherever the air of its influence is breathed. The church becomes great not through wealth, popularity nor compromise with the world, but by genuine service to men and loyalty to her God. Men will rise up and call her blessed when she, like a Good Samaritan, extends her willing hands to the needs of a suffering and discouraged people.

II. The Light of The World
Jesus told his disciples they were the light of the world. Amid the dangerous pitfalls along life's pathway, unerring light is needed to detect them. If our feet go as they ought, and evade stumbling stones, we must have a light to show us the way. David said, "Thy word is a light to my pathway." So, like a lantern, we should hold the word of God to show us the right way. It is impossible for man to get to heaven by his own philosophy. Though he be an intellectual giant, the way to the "Beautiful Isle" must be shown by God's revelation. (I Cor. 1:21).

As the last twilight shadows silently fill the valleys and smoothe the sharp angles of mountain peaks we behold the full moon mantled in a golden sea of light rising in silent majesty to become queen of the night. She does not manufacture the beams she sheds so profusely upon us. But she dwells in the light of her master, the sun. As a great reflector, she receives that she may give. She borrows the golden rays that she may fling them across the void to a world that would otherwise be dark. So the church shall dwell in the light of the Sun of Righteousness that she may reflect his light to men.

A reflector, to be efficient must be clean. Dirt or rust will mar the reflected image. So a disciple must

live an honest and unrepentant life if he would shed a good influence for the cause of his Lord. As bent or broken reflectors distort the picture, so bent, broken, or crooked church members make heaven's beautiful image look like a hobgoblin.

III. The Steadfast Christian
(Acts 2:42-47)

Pentecost was the birthday of the church. Some three thousand people had received the gospel message from the lips of Peter, believed in it, repented from their past sins, and were baptized for the remission of sins. This splendid number had been added to the church by the Lord. They entered the kingdom, family, body, church by birth (John 3:5), hence did not "join" it. The "joining process" of modern religious machinery had not been perfected in those days of simplicity.

Four outstanding items characterized the church at Jerusalem. The members continued Steadfastly in—

1. The apostles' doctrine. They believed and lived by the message that God's chosen witnesses delivered. This was the gospel. This was the message of Christ. This was the declaration of the Holy Spirit who had given power to the twelve to be heaven's representatives and messengers to the world. Thus the words spoken were words of inspiration and formed a part of Christ's great revelation.

2. Fellowship. Time, talent, means, resources were placed at Christ's disposal. Cooperation full and complete, unity in its fullest sense prevailed. No lines of demarcation were drawn in this ancient community of disciples. Like a big family around God's hearthstone a great, unbroken circle of companionship made early Christianity a thing both beautiful and winsome.

3. Breaking of bread. It was the weekly practice of the disciples to meet and observe the Lord's Supper in memory of the broken body and spilled blood of Jesus. This institution harked back to the supreme sacrifice on Calvary and touched the hearts of those who observed it with renewed memories of Him who died that we might live.

4. Prayers. Prayer changes things. Like a prattling child climbing his father's knee, or being caressed in a mother's arms, children of the heavenly Father may go to him and pour out their souls in a flood of thanksgiving or petition. His kindly ear is open, his watchful eye never slumbers. As an earthly father loves the handclasp and voice of his child; so God yearns for all those expressions of love and devotion that come to him from loving and obedient children.

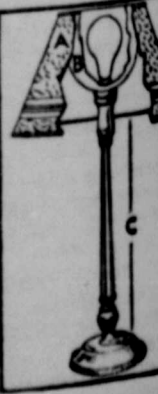

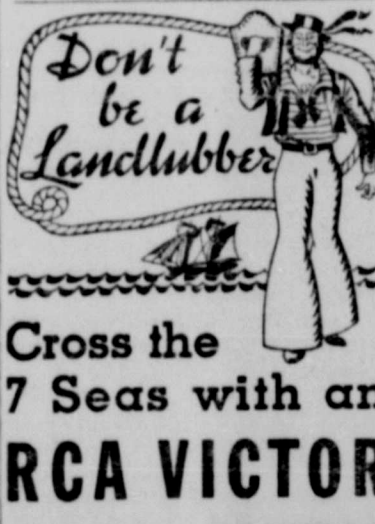

MAKING CHISELING AND CONTOUR LISTING TEST

Since a large number of the farmers throughout the Panhandle area of Oklahoma are chiseling their wheat land, an experiment was started at the Panhandle Agricultural Experiment Station in order to make comparisons between contour listing and chiseling on heavy silt loam soils, says Harley A. Daniel, Acting Director of the Experiment Station.

The listed and chiseled plots are all on the contour and the furrows were made forty-eight inches apart. These plots are being checked by other plots that were one-way disced. The soil was chiseled about eighteen inches deep with the same type of chisel as recommended by R. B. Duckett at Tyrone, Oklahoma.

Previous data secured from this station indicates that contour listing is a very important method of seed preparation in the High Plains area of the state in order to save moisture and consequently increase yields. A study of the soil moisture from each plot will be made during the growing season in this experiment.

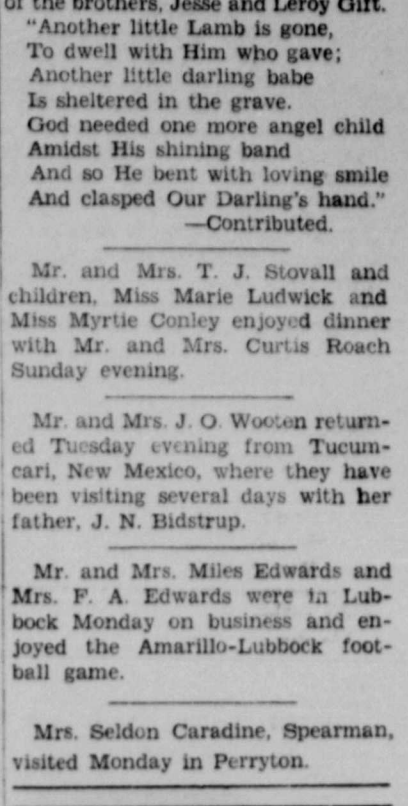

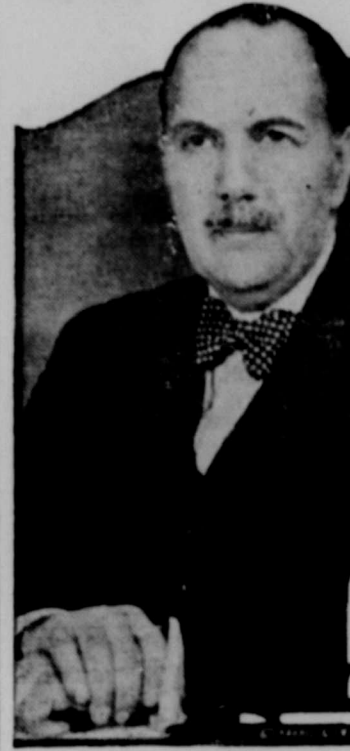
