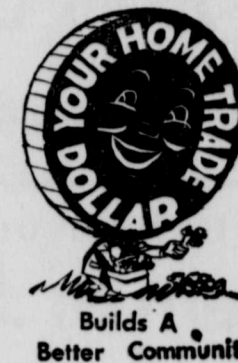


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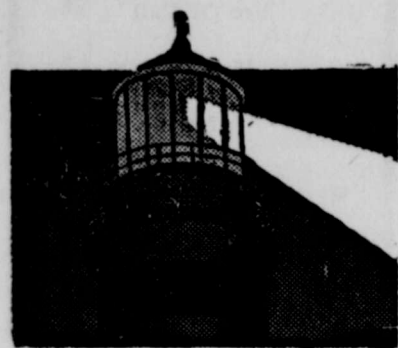

Rabies Vaccination Program Here Feb. 12

During the regular meeting of the Lions Club Tuesday, it was announced by the guest speaker, Dr. R. N. Gray, veterinarian, that a rabies vaccine program would be held at the Lions Club Building Friday, February 12th from noon till 5 p.m.

He strongly encouraged all pet owners to bring their pets in for the new 3 year vaccine, but said the 1 year type will also be available.

Dr. Gray stated it was unusual to have a rabies outbreak this early in the year and it was a good sign that there will be a heavy outbreak in the summer.

Dr. B. H. Johnson said he had given rabies vaccine to 5 people, 3 adults and 2 children, in recent months due to being bitten by dogs, cats and opossums. He also said there were similar outbreaks

in Ft. Worth and San Antonio and 2 persons in Colorado City had been bitten by rabid animals.

Dr. Johnson also stated that the City Council is planning to pass an ordinance that all animals within the city limits who do not have a tag showing that they have been vaccinated, should be destroyed. He urged all local residents who have pets to have them vaccinated during the program.

It was further stated by Dr. Johnson, that if anyone saw a pet or wild animal acting strangely, to pen the animal up if possible and call Dr. Gray. He said "Do not shoot the animal, pen it up so that it may be studied."

There should be an annual check of all animals after they have been vaccinated.

During this period, parents are encouraged to visit the public schools, and all citizens are urged through special programs to recognize the tremendous importance of our system of education.

The home, owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Roland was opened for business February 1. Loraine Schools To Integrate

Negro School To Close

The Loraine School Board and Supt J. B. Cushing met in a called session Tuesday afternoon to consider a directive from the United States Government Office of Education. The directive was regarding a compliance with the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The wording of the Civil Rights Act is, "No person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance." The correspondence from the government required an answer by February 22 of whether or not the Loraine School would comply by the beginning of school next year. Failure to comply would result in Federal funds to the school being discontinued after the current school year. Supt. Cushing stated that the Loraine School receives approximately \$20,000 a year from the Federal government for

the operation of the Agriculture, Homemaking, Lunchroom, Science, and Guidance departments of the school.

Supt. Cushing stated that an attempt to continue a segregated school operation would face immediate problems with state officials in addition to being denied funds from the Federal government.

School Trustee Election

The Trustee Election for the Loraine Public Schools will be held April 3. Terms are expiring for Royce Mahon and Harold Johnson. Both have announced for re-election. Voting in the election will be on the First Saturday in April, in the Lions Building, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.

A resident who wishes to become a candidate for School Trustee must file at least thirty days before the date of the election for his name to be placed on the ballot. Required forms for filing are in the school office.

ernment. Notice has been received that the buildings, equipment, and services of the Loraine Schools will be inspected March 24 by officials of the State Department of Education. One of the regulations in the newly published state bulletin of the requirements for operation of accredited schools is that school systems which operate more than one campus unit of the same instructional level must provide buildings, equipment, supplies, and services that are equal in quality and quantity. Schools that fail to meet the standards required by the state become unaccredited, which means that students of the school receive unfavorable consideration when transferring to other schools and colleges by having to take tests and examinations for admission not required of students from accredited schools. Supt. Cushing and members of the school board after careful and sincere consideration were convinced that integration of grades 1-12 and closing of the Negro school was necessary to comply with State and Federal laws and to continue receiving available operation funds to provide the best educational opportunities possible for the children of the Loraine School District.
