Thirteen chairmen of local committees meet to talk over program for annual session here in Sept.

Thirteen chairmen of various committees of the local Kiwanis club, all of them working on plans for the coming Texas-Oklahoma district convention of Kiwanis International, to be held in Lubbock September 1 and 2, met yesterday noon at luncheon in the Hilton Hotel.

Reports were received from each of the chairmen on progress of work being done and, according to the reports, Lubbock's entertainment of the convention is destined to be one of the most complete in history of the district.

Coffman To Attend
Announcement was made that Raymond M. Coffman, of Omaha, Nebraska, president of Kiwanis International, will be a visitor at the convention and one of the principal figures on the program. Mr. Coffman was elected president at the recent international gathering held in Atlantic City.

B. Sherrod, a delegate from the local club to the international assembly, gave an interesting and detailed report of his visit to the resort city. Mr. Sherrod went to the convention on a train chartered for members from the Texas-Oklahoma district and stated that from his contacts with other delegates the Lubbock convention is destined to be the largest ever held. Many of the towns over the district are planning special trains, he stated.

C. R. WILLIAMS HELD Prisoner Sought in Kansas and Texas Arrested

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., July 9. (AP)—Sought by authorities in at least two states, C. R. Williams was arrested here today by sheriff's deputies.

Williams, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, is wanted in Hugoton, Kansas, and Breckenridge, Texas.

In addition he is said to have operated an alleged "insurance racket" in New Mexico, Oklahoma and Arizona. He is said to have a wife and child in Amarillo, Texas.

The sheriff here was undecided as to what state he would give custody of Williams, but indicated Texas authorities would have the man.

DRILLING STARTED
CHICAGO, July 9. (AP)—The Missouri-Kansas Pipe Line company has started drilling and development operations in the Texas Panhandle and the Hugoton area in southwestern Kansas. Officials of the company said the move was to assure an ample flow of gas before completion of the cross country pipe line December 1, which is to carry natural gas to various communities in Missouri, Illinois and Indiana. Six wells are being drilled in Texas and eight in Kansas.

Warrant Made For Deputy in Shooting Fray

Officer Charged in Slaying of Kentucky Farmer During Liquor Raid; Warrant Is Sworn to by Relative

BARBOURVILLE, Ky., July 9. (AP)—Sheriff's deputies today had a murder warrant for Nat Helton, deputy constable of Wilton, following the fatal shooting yesterday of Omer Mackey, 35-year-old farmer, during a raid on the farm of Mackey's father-in-law.

The warrant was sworn to last night by Joe Mackey, a relative of the slain man, according to Mrs. B. F. Walker, Knox county sheriff.

Started Run.
Helton, accompanied by one federal prohibition agent and three deputy sheriffs, staged the raid from two sides of the house, he said. As they approached, Helton said, he heard someone shout "There he goes" and saw Mackey running from the house. Mackey fell, Helton said, and reached for his pocket. He drew forth a bottle of whiskey and started to run again, according to Helton. Helton said he then fired to frighten the man. Mackey fell wounded and was carried into the house, where he died a few minutes later.

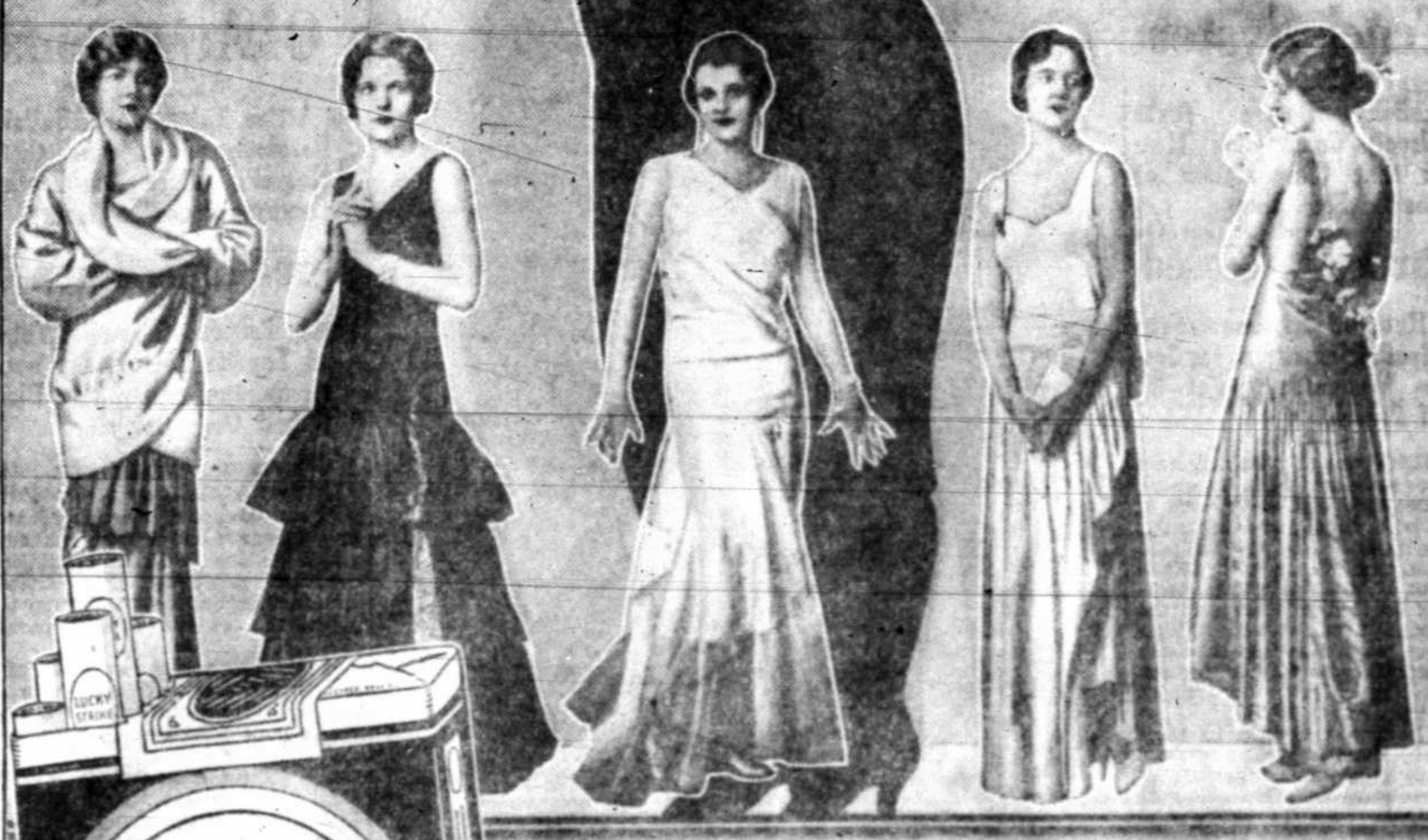

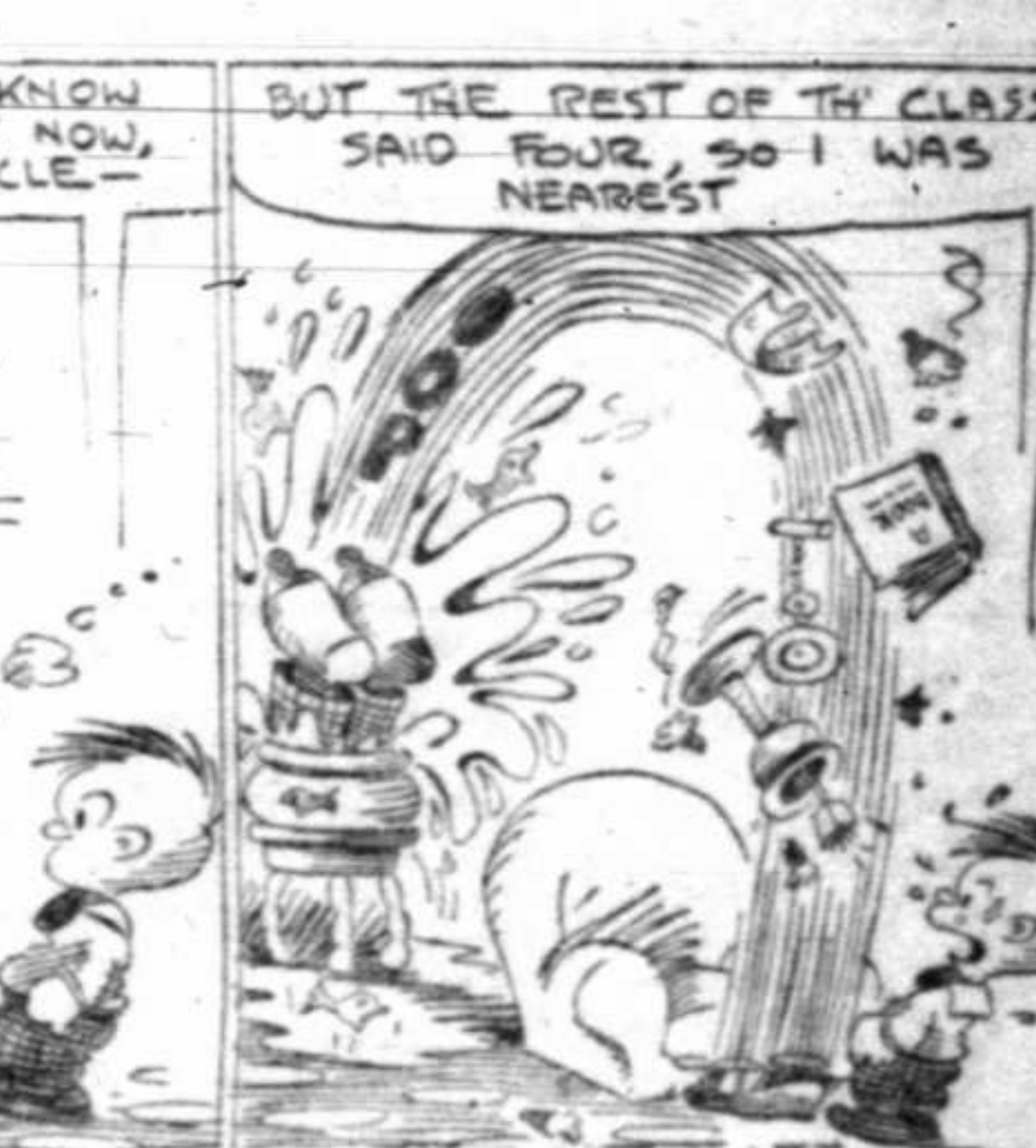

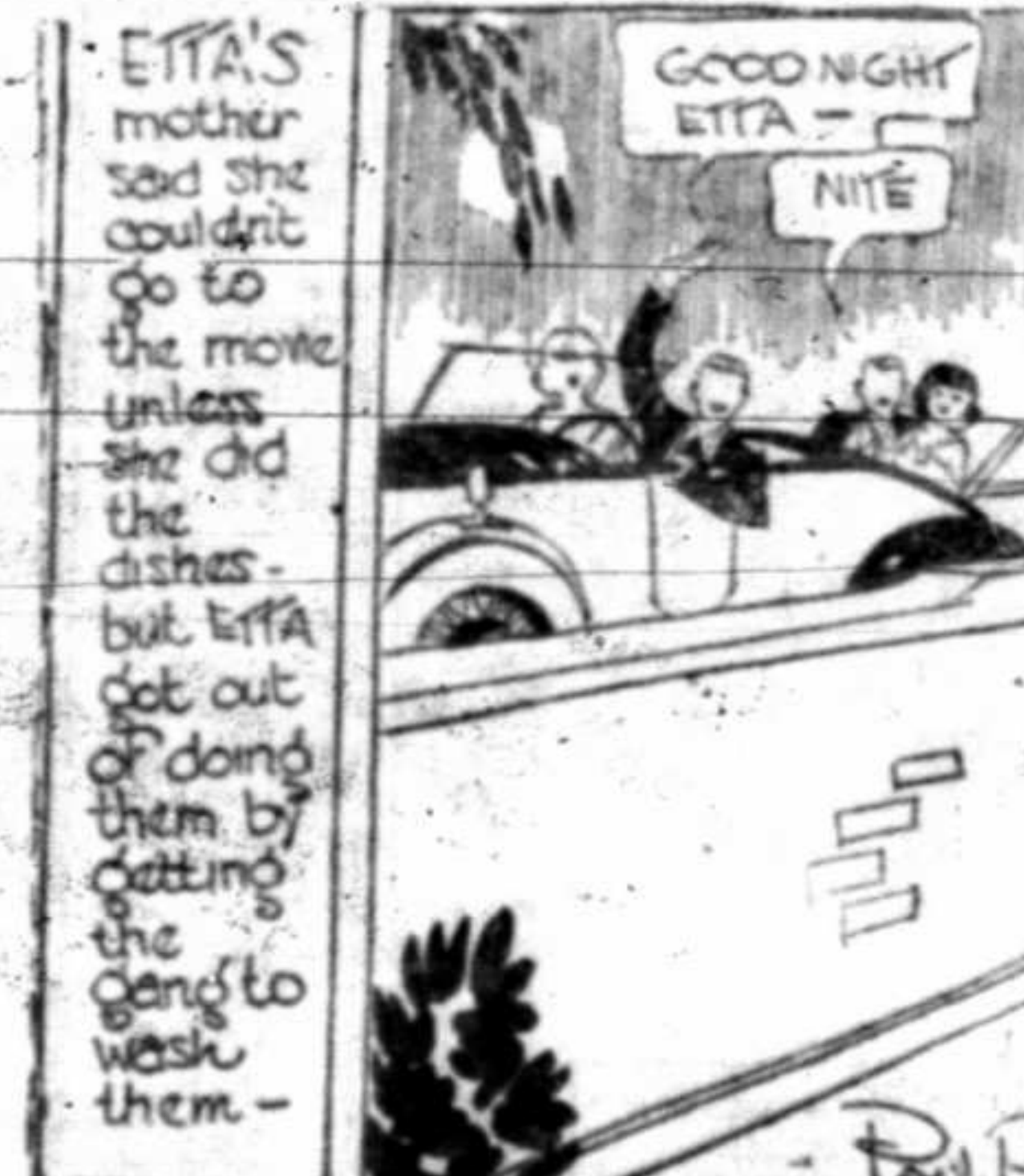

KANSAS CITY, July 9. (AP)—If Fido is to go riding in the family motor car he must stay inside—at least while Kansas City police are looking. An ordinance prohibiting dogs from riding in running boards or fenders was called to the attention of Chief Lewis M. Seigfried yesterday and he immediately issued an order that it be enforced. If Fido's owner is caught violating the law he is subject to a fine of \$5 to \$100.

The ordinance, while especially aimed at dogs, also applies to cats, goats, pet lambs, cows, donkeys, mules and other animals.

POLICE FIND TORSO

Part of Man's Body Buried in Mud Under Bridge

NEW ORLEANS, July 9. (AP)—Police today found the torso of a man lodged in mud under the ferry bridge of the Southern Pacific railroad at the head of Esplanade avenue. The torso was so badly mutilated the coroner was unable to determine whether it was that of a white man or a negro.

The case was looked upon as murder. Search is being made for the head, arms and legs.

CAMDEN, N. J., July 9. (AP)—Federal agents were swept aside today by a "dish pan brigade" which attempted to salvage a railroad carload of confiscated beer being dumped in the marshes of southern Camden.

The car was discovered by federal prohibition agents last night on a railroad siding. During the morning they moved the beer, which was contained in half barrel kegs, to the marshes.

ASK BUDGET APPROVAL

Salaries and Maintenance Up In Board Hearings
