

Bulldogs Vs. Winters Friday; Rangers Play Blinn Here Sat.

Conference play will get underway Friday night in District 2A-7 with the Ranger Bulldogs facing the Winters Blizzards there. This will be the first conference game of the season for both teams. Game time will be 7:30 p.m.

Ranger Coaches A. C. Prescott and Bill Young report that the Blizzards team is really tough this

year, although they have won only two games. They have wins over San Angelo Lakeview and Colorado City and losses at the hands of Brady, Albany and Anson.

Operating from a straight T-formation, the Blizzards have a good running game with plenty of speed. Comparing them with other teams, the Ranger Coaches said

that Winters was about twice as tough as Dublin.

The Bulldogs lost to Winters last year by a score of 36-0.

The Ranger Junior College Rangers will be at home this week, playing Blinn Junior College Saturday night at 8:00 in Bulldog stadium.

Blinn has one of the best teams this year that they have produced in several years, but they are still looking for a win this season. They have lost games to Cisco, 14-12; Navarro, 21-19 and Wharton, 19-0. Winless all last year, Blinn will be trying to break the jinx.

Ranger Coaches Ken Vokey and Jim Lewis said that the Rangers are capable of coming up with a win this week. Vokey said that he was well pleased with the defensive play of Joe Weaver and Winfrey Shipp against Navarro last week and all of the running of Dwight Martin, on offense.

Final Rites for Dr. R. H. Hodges Held Tuesday

Funeral services for Dr. Robert H. Hodges, 76, were held in the Ranger First Baptist Church Tuesday at 2 p.m. Dr. W. T. Walton, dean of Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, officiated. Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery under the direction of Killingsworth Funeral Home.

A resident of Ranger for 70 years, Dr. Hodges died Sunday at 7 p.m. in the Baptist Memorial Geriatrics Hospital at San Angelo. He had been in ill health for the past two and one-half years.

Born Jan. 26, 1885 in Falls County, near Lott, he came to Ranger in 1891 at the age of six with his parents. He married Opie Bristow Dec. 25, 1918, in San Antonio. Mrs. Hodges preceded him in death Dec. 27, 1955.

"Dr. Bob", as he was affectionately known by his many friends, received his education at A. & M. College and studied to be a veterinarian at Kansas City Veterinary College from which he graduated in 1910. He practiced in Abilene and Waco. Dr. Hodges returned to Ranger in January 1919, after his marriage, to superintend large land interests of his father. He gave up active practice and devoted full time to the affairs of his father's estate.

In 1921 Dr. Hodges was elected president of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce. Serving two terms as mayor of Ranger, he was first elected to that position on April 4, 1923. His second term of office was in 1928.

The City County Hospital was built while he served as mayor. Later he served on the board of trustees for the hospital. He was also a school board member of the Ranger Independent School

District, member of the county livestock organization, and served as president of the Texas Veterinary Medical Association at one time. He was well known for his registered Delane sheep.

A faithful worker in the First Baptist Church until his health failed, Dr. Hodges had served as chairman of the board of deacons for the church.

Surviving are two sons, Dr. Dickie Hodges and Rossie Hodges, both of Ranger; one sister, Mrs. L. L. Neal of Ranger; five grandchildren.

Pallbearers were John Tibbels, Herman Stroud, Felton Brashier, W. A. Lewis, Lloyd Bruce, Carl Page, A. H. Powell and Harlan Gardenhire.

Tax Discount Available

County taxes are now payable and the sooner they are paid the larger is each taxpayer's discount.

Edgar Altom, deputy in the tax assessor-collector's office, reported that a three per cent discount is being given to persons who pay their taxes in October.

Those who wait until next month will get a two per cent discount, and a one per cent discount will be given during the month of December.

The Board of Education of Ranger Independent School District reaffirmed its opposition to a plan for the consolidation of the school in Eastland County.

In so doing, the Ranger board became the third school board in the County to publicly and officially express opposition to the plan.

The Eastland board first made a public statement against consolidation early in September and the Olden board followed suit about two weeks later.

The Ranger board had discussed the plan a few weeks ago, but no public statement was made at that time. Records of the minutes show that the Tuesday vote was unanimous.

In a meeting Tuesday night,

the board approved the following statement:

"It is the opinion of the board that the consolidation of the school districts of Eastland County is not feasible. Committee reports concerning said consolidation lack sufficient evidence to establish, beyond a reasonable doubt, that the proposed plan is workable and offers advantages beyond our present program.

The statement from the third district board leaves six school boards as yet unheard from.

Yet to make statements are Carbon, Gorman, Desdemona, Cisco, Rising Star and Scranton.

Ranger Supt. G. B. Rush was out of town Wednesday and unavailable for comment.

performed during lunch.

During the afternoon session, C. K. Shelton spoke on mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, the oldest form of artificial respiration.

He was introduced by Frank Sayre of Eastland, District Manager for Texas Electric Service Company.

Aided by Ben McKinnis, Eastland, district Rural Representative, Shelton presented the film "That They May Live".

Answering questions after the film presentation, he said, "Texas Electric is always glad to arrange the showing of this film for local organizations, because we believe many lives could be saved if people were taught to act quickly and correctly in a given emergency. If your club or group would like to see the film, please contact your local Texas Electric office."

Lunar Honeymooner May Pay Only \$900

Explosive makers might use boron in their products to help the airlines find "luggage bombs." The Atomic Energy Commission reports boron could be detected by special machines at luggage counters.

One problem: baby powder contains boron, and some mothers with children would be needlessly delayed.

"Mental tests" for automatic computers are being conducted at the University of Michigan to find how well the machines can "think."

Psychologists there give computers an intricate psychological exam, the same as those used extensively for studies of human problem-solving ability, to learn if the machine is capable of abstract "thoughts," or if it simply registers information and gives automatic answers automatically.

Space travel costs could be cut drastically by a breakthrough in nuclear propulsion, predict some aircraft engineers. If a reusable space craft can be developed, future honeymoons could travel to the moon and back at a cost of about \$300, including tips.

Doppler radar for commercial aircraft, which provides the pilot with exact information on the plane's course and ground speed more rapidly than present methods, has been approved for final flight testing by the Federal Aviation Agency.

Unexpected poison source, uncovered by the Public Health Service, is the pod of the wisteria plant. Children have become acutely ill after eating only two seeds from a pod.

Research at opposite ends of the thermometer is making news in two fields. One is an ultra-reliable refrigeration system for trucks which uses carbon dioxide for cooling instead of a mechanical unit.

The system, developed by Chemetron Corp., can provide temperatures as low as minus 60 degrees F., compared with the minus 20 degree capability of mechanical units.

It probably will find widest use in piggy-back rail shipments where reliability is very important.

The other is a problem faced by Temple university scientist working on basic research on metals at temperatures higher than that of the sun's surface. They discovered that the intense heat, up to 10,000 degrees F., is higher than the melting points of materials used as containers for the molten metals.

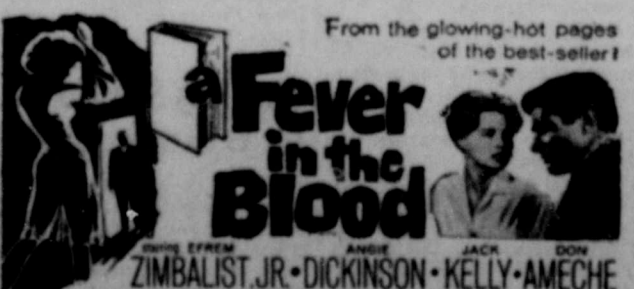

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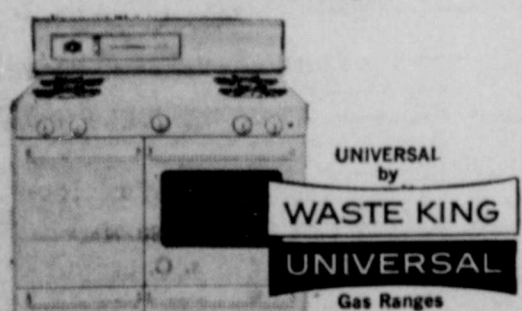

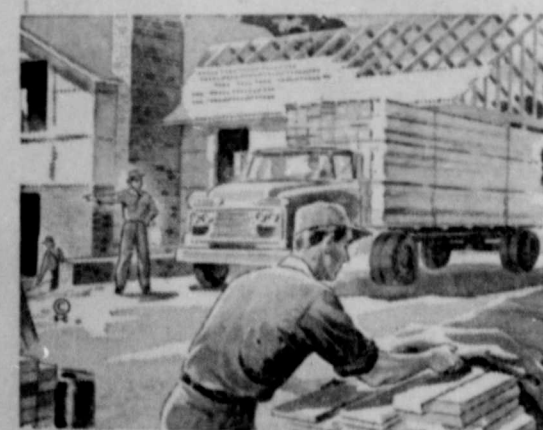
