Spring Vegetable Soup.

Four good-sized new carrots, 1

Bermuda onion, 4 outside blades of

celery, 1 small parsnip, 1 new tur-

nip, 3 tablespoons butter, 1 cup

strained tomatoes, 4 cups water, 1

teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper,

2 tablespoons quick cooking tapi-

oca.

Scrape and peel vegetables and

put through coarse knife of food

chopper. Melt butter in kettle, add

prepared vegetables and cook five

minutes. Then add sifted toma-

atoes, water, salt, and pepper and

simmer, closely covered, for one

hour. Add water as necessary to

keep five cups of liquid. Add tapi-

oca and about half a cup of any left-

over vegetables on hand. Peas

and beans are suggested. Cook rap-

idly until topicals is tender, about

15 minutes.

Serve in soup plates with cre-

ttons.

Four Who Made Flight Tell How

Pilots Praise Work of Two Americans, Radio Operator and Navigator

SUVA, Fiji, June 6.—Announced by Flight Commander Charles Kingsford-Smith that no decision had been reached as to when the Southern Cross will hop the 1730 miles to Brisbane, Australia, and a vivid account by co-pilot Charles Ulm of the wild flying that drove the four airmen to the verge of madness on their long hop here from the Hawaiian Islands, were the outstanding features of a banquet in the hotel here tonight.

Captain Kingsford-Smith today expected a proposed take-off site at Naselle, sixteen miles away, but he had not made up his mind whether the runway was long enough or when the Southern Cross could resume its flight to Sydney.

Ulm made a speech before a large gathering of Fiji officials and citizens tonight at a civic reception and banquet, and described a phase of the flight that was fraught with any perils.

Difficulties Described.
"I am telling you on behalf of myself and 'Smithy' that we would have been very cold meat but for the aid of our two American friends, Larry Lyon, navigator, and James Warner, radio operator.

"Imagine the roar of the plane's four horsepower motors, the plane's mail cabin deafened with the roar of the motors, trying to send and receive radio messages one hundred per cent efficient, 4,000 to 5,000 miles away.

"Jim Warner possessed no mean will and was full of courage, getting back to the old sea dog again. Warner was a former steamship radio operator.

"Night before last in the middle of the Pacific, the fates were not with us.

Wild Flying.
"We struck bad weather. Our job was intricate. The direction was taken from the hands of the navigator. The wild flying was getting to the stage where one might just as well be doing stunts. Flying dodging storm clouds, turning right angles when flying 100 miles an hour.

"The navigator's skill, resources and initiative were shown when after all these quick movements throughout the night, that he could not out our position and when we came out of the mess, to say: 'here we are, here's where you are.'

"That we came through was not luck. Get the right men and equipment, coordinate them and you will get through."

In opening his speech at the banquet, Ulm said the difference between an aviator and a parrot was that a parrot could talk but not fly, and an aviator can fly but not talk.

Ulm then addressed the gathering. "I had to navigate," Lyon said. "I had to find Suva where we had to land. I have had such a good time in this world that I want to carry on."

Ulm said these aviators were now looking for a site to take off for Brisbane and he was sure they would find a suitable one. He said he felt certain that if they could not find one that they would build a runway, as his new friends here had offered to provide a few hundred men to make it.

He appreciated the Fiji residents' enthusiasm, Lyon said, and hoped the flight of the Southern Cross would lead to a regular air service from America and bind these nations more closely together.

After inspecting some of the runways offered for the use of the Southern Cross, Commander Charles Kingsford-Smith announced he still was undecided as to when the ship would take off or as to what field would be used.

TEACHERS PRAISED

Staff in Rural Schools Are Commended

Rural school teachers of Lubbock county for the last session yesterday were commended by County Superintendent W. M. Pevehouse. A large per cent of the teachers are attending Tech summer school, he stated, and many others are attending summer schools elsewhere.

"This influence will be reflected in the students of the future and will aid materially in the creating of a better school system," he said. Mr. Pevehouse urged a closer cooperation between the city and rural schools, suggesting occasional good-will trips to the rural schools during school terms by local business men. He declared that neither could do without the other. He hopes for a one-school system whereby rural and city schools will be combined under one department.

He further stated that he thought rural school should have as efficient teachers as city schools.

VACANCY FOR TEACHER

Vacancy for an experienced well recommended school teacher for a rural county has been reported to County Superintendent W. M. Pevehouse.

Applications for the job are asked to report their qualifications to Mr. Pevehouse in the near future. He will give the desired information concerning the school.

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Lithuanian Row Threatens Peace

France and Great Britain Tell League Of Nations That Tranquility Is At Stake In Dispute.

GENEVA, June 6.—France joined Great Britain today in publicly stating before the council of the League of Nations that non-settlement of the Polish-Lithuanian dispute over the Vilna question is threatening the peace of Europe.

M. Paul-Boncour, French socialist, who is taking the place of foreign minister Briand on the council, went even further than Sir Austen Chamberlain, British foreign secretary, by advocating the fixing of a definite period during which the dispute must be settled by direct negotiations failing which the league council would take a hand, and seek a more rapid solution.

This statement was regarded by many of those present as a hint to premier Waldeckras of Lithuania that the council might enforce a decision if necessary by applying the league financial and economic penalties.

The atmosphere of today's session was tense throughout. It opened with an official report by M. Van Riecklant of the Netherlands who stated that the negotiations on the problem had made no appreciable progress, alluding to Lithuania's action in proclaiming Vilna capital of Lithuania in her recently adopted constitution. The report declared that this prejudice of the progress of negotiations had harmed Lithuania in the eyes of the public.

Sir Austen characterized Lithuania's act as an irritating provocative and added that Lithuania was adopting a course of procedure that no great nation faced by another great nation would dare to follow.

The British foreign secretary appealed to Premier Waldeckras to exercise conciliation more like that which had inspired the formation of the League of Nations.

M. Metton of Alpine, a student at the summer session.

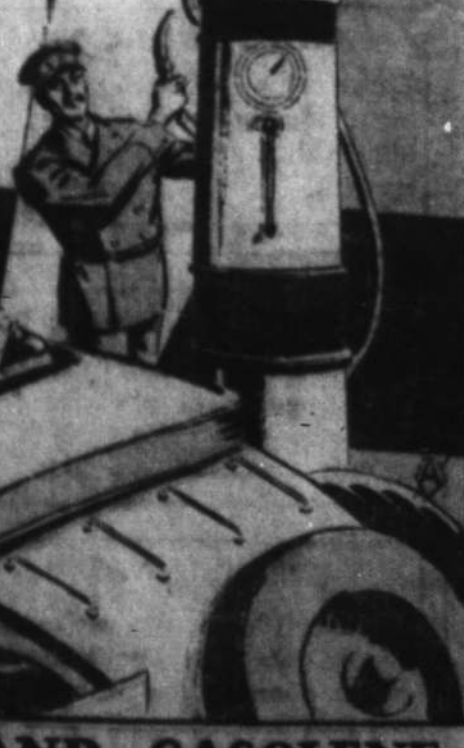

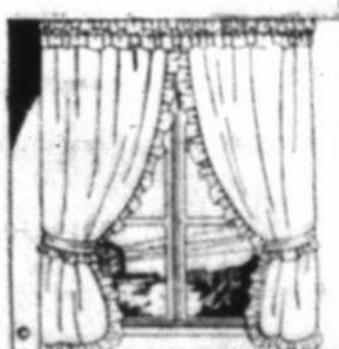

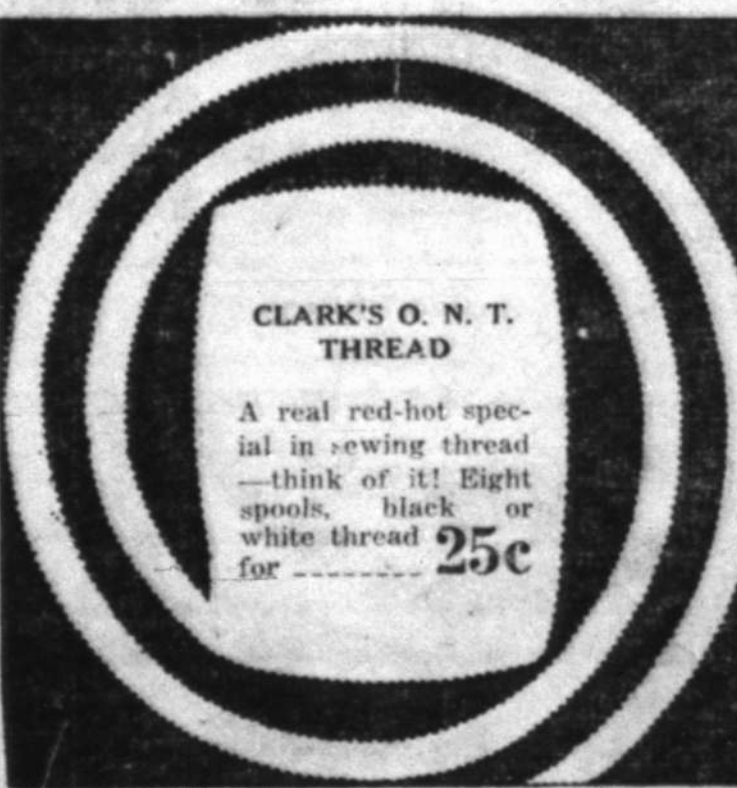

Add These Votes

As the count stood after the last of the contests had been disposed of, Hoover had added these votes, originally challenged, to his string.

Florida—nine, giving him the entire delegation of ten from that state.

Kentucky—Two, insuring him the support of the full 39 delegates.

Louisiana—ten of twelve.

Mississippi—12, the entire delegation.

Tennessee—Three, indicating that he would have all that state's 19 votes on the first ballot.

Texas—26, the entire delegation.

Pledged or Instructed

All of these votes—62 in all—either are pledged or instructed for him. All had been in dispute, although most of them had been included in the claims of the Hoover managers which have put his convention strength near the 545 majority, needed for nomination.

The national committee devoted most of today to the contest from Texas, the outgrowth of a bitter feud between forces lined up with R. B. Creager, national committee man, and those controlled by Rep. Harry M. Wurzbach, the only Texas republican in congress, and C. C. Littleton, of Fort Worth, brother of Martin Littleton, widely known

New York attorney.

First the committee tackled the phase of the contest involving the "Big Four" and got some interesting and vivid insights on the way political warfare is conducted in Texas. take the ship to Rome, although the distance Levine announced the plane would travel indicated its goal might be either Rome, Berlin or Warsaw.

Miss Boll, who was at the field all day helping her crew prepare the ship for flight, left before midnight with the word that she would return by 4:30 a. m. ready to fly.

The plane fully loaded will carry 480 gallons of gas, Oliver Le Boutillier, the pilot, said, and will weigh 6,200 pounds at the take-off.

New Tanks Installed
A new tank recently installed will carry 101 gallons. The main tank will hold 322 gallons and the wing tanks 66 gallons. Le Boutillier said the motor would consume about ten and a half gallons an hour and that the plane would have enough fuel for 48 hours in the air.

Miss Boll, Levine said, will be in the rear of the pilot's compartment at the start, sitting on a three-legged stool. She will be unable to talk with her two companions except by shouting forward through a six-inch passageway at the side of the new tank. When this tank is emptied it will be cut up and tossed overboard.

The plane will start without a radio. Every available corner has been utilized for fuel storage. Le Boutillier said, and the ship will carry no weight that might be dispensed with.

Le Boutillier will be at the controls at the take-off. Capt. Arthur Aples, co-pilot, will take the stick when the flight is well underway.

But Jeanne persisted and the ambition has dominated her life.

NEW PLAN SUGGESTED FOR BUILDING HIGHWAYS

Cone Johnson and some other members of the Highway Commission are advocating a change in the system of financing the building of highways, and according to the way they have explained it some speeches it is a mighty good scheme. The proposal is to change the constitution of the state and allow the issuance of bonds to build the highways. Each county would be reimbursed for the highways they have already built, and the money could be used for building laterals to the main highways, and in that way there could be a continuous highway, and not broken by counties that could not build, or could not issue more bonds. The scheme is gaining favor among individuals and chambers of commerce and officials are proclaiming their endorsement of the plan. R. S. Sterling, chairman of the highway commission, Hon. Cone Johnson, commissioner and various other state officials have propounded the question and its logical and reasonable advantages to the people. The proposals call for a bond issue of \$350,000,000 to be used in retiring outstanding road bonds and in building new system of connected state highways throughout the state, to be retired entirely by the gasoline tax. The statements are made that no tax would accrue to the property owners and that taxes on property would be lessened considerably by retirement of the road bonds that are now drawing funds from property tax. That is true. The road bonds that are now outstanding are being paid and the interest is being paid by property tax. To issue the state bonds and retire present bonds would stop that property tax. To use the gasoline tax to retire the state bonds would relieve property tax payers of a considerable burden. We can see no objection to the state bond issue to be retired that way. The great advantages are that the present generation would get the benefits of a good roads system immediately and those who use the roads would be the ones who would pay for their construction under the gasoline tax. The thousands of tourists who traverse this state would thereby pay a just portion of the cost of good roads under that plan. Operators of heavy motor vehicles would pay their portion of the construction cost of good roads under the plan. We assume that equal taxation of the people is the thing that the people desire. If that be true, then we doubt if the state bond issue plan will meet with any opposition among the farmers and rural population, and very little throughout the state.

THE FINE ARTS OF LIVING

Some people have a tendency to poke a lot of fun at the women's organizations and sometimes it would seem that some women let their interest in club work go too far to the sorrow of their homes but this is an exception rather than the rule.

Founding the keynote of the General Federation of Women's clubs when its biennial convention opened in the other day, Mrs. John D. Sherman, the president, summed up that organization's many-sided activities as cultivating "the fine art of living."

Surely that is a most worthy objective not only for the Federation's three million members, but for all men and women in whatever station of relationship. The one pursuit which all human beings follow in common is living. Whether a person be fitted for it by special training, whether he choose or not, that responsibility must be met; it cannot honorably be evaded.

This obligation, which is sacred—owed to oneself, one's fellows, to the state and to God—may be discharged falteringly or in a happy-go-lucky manner, or it may be accepted frankly and bravely, with a determination to live as worthily as strength of soul and resources of the spirit will allow. There can be no question as to which course all true men and women will follow. At least they will strive to live—each according to his lights—following the loftiest guide which is within his ken.

Certainly it is worth while recognizing

that living is a fine art and can be cultivated as such. Who will deny that it is as important as music, painting, literature and other pursuits usually so classified? for it embraces all these and many other things.

Mrs. Sherman properly places home-making foremost among the arts, for the home nurtures all the others and the mortalities, as well. She emphasizes the truth that there is no substitute for the genuine, abiding values—a delusion which so many persons betray by their feverish quest. The saddest error is to imagine that either worth-while success or permanent happiness can be attained through self-seeking. The women's club movement deserves great credit for what it has done to dissipate that fallacy. As Mrs. Sherman explains, the millions have joined this organization with three main purposes in view: The pursuit of culture, social contacts and the opportunity to serve their kind. None of these aims is narrow and selfish; the last is purely altruistic—to follow it is to acquire the fine

Thomas a Kempis' counsel to the neophyte should be heeded by all who would live worthily:

"Thou comest to serve, not to rule. Knowest that thou wert called to suffer and to labor, and not to be idle, nor to spend thy time in talk?"

By both precept and example the Master taught the glory of humility, the nobility of service. The life so consecrated is not only a boon to others, but a source of durable satisfaction to oneself. As Dr. Benjamin C. Brodie, an eminent English surgeon of the past century, wrote: "Nothing in this world is so good as usefulness. It binds your fellow creatures to you, and you to them; it tends to the improvement of your own character and gives you a real importance in society, much beyond what any artificial station can bestow."

Let those who aspire to advance socially, in business, a profession or otherwise, reflect upon Brodie's words. The surest ladder to success, fame or fortune—to whatever exalted station—is service to one's kind, which is also service to God. Whatever is worth having on earth, or in eternity, is to be gained through such devotion as this.

One who serves faithfully and unselfishly becomes indeed a ruler—over an imperishable dominion. To live usefully is to reap the finest rewards which this world has to offer—the gratitude of one's kind, the approbation of conscience, and abiding content. That is to live fully and fruitfully—a veritable fine art.

Good roads are among the necessary things that tourists consider in making out their itinerary for the summer trip. The average tourist will study the way of the roads in the direction which he has decided to go, and then he takes the one that has the most good roads marked on it. Lubbock county has very good roads when the weather is just right, but we do not have what is called a permanent road. The condition may be very materially changed within 24 hours, and that is where we are liable to get talked about in a very unfavorable way. If our roads happen to be in a very bad state of repair at the time a flock of tourists come through, we might get the blackeye for a thousand miles down the line.

It is hardly economy to be without some of the things that we need to help in the building of a city. Lubbock is very badly in need of a public auditorium. It is standing in the way of Lubbock inviting some of the big conventions to meet here, and this of course keeps a lot of business away. Let us get busy on the proposition of building a municipal auditorium.

There is possibly nothing in the way of progress more than a town that is merely standing still and taking up space that should be utilized by a live, progressive city. It holds down a certain amount of territory, and keeps down development. There are such places, and it is a pity that they should be located in such a rich and fertile part of the universe as the South Plains.

This section of the country is liable to open up a bigger industry here in the way of grain crops some of these days. With the big elevator here, and the railroad facilities that puts us in touch with every part of the South Plains there is no reason why the big flour mill here should not do a big business.

We are glad to note so many pretty yards in Lubbock this year. As the city grows older, of course the yards increase in beauty, and there has been some mighty good taste displayed in planning the lawns in this city. We think that a pretty lawn contest in Lubbock would bring out some very interesting things in connection with the beautification of the city.

We regret that some of the little towns of the county put off some of the important things until they have to pay a big price for it. For example Sengrave paid the price of the loss of nearly every business house in town because they were too economical to vote bonds for a water system. The bonds have been voted since then.

The building and loan association, moreover, is a safe and conservative organization, with a smaller percentage of failures than national banks and a dividend rate that is as high as high as one can expect to secure with safe investment.

The young man who saves a part of his earnings and invests it carefully not only accumulates funds that will be invaluable to him later in life, but he places himself in

position to command the respect of the community and gains tremendously from a credit standing. The wonder is that so many carelessly throw away their opportunities to get a start in life.—Brownwood Bulletin.

EXIT OLD BIDDY.

The Review family had the pleasure Tuesday morning of visiting the Crosby county hatchery, operated by J. L. Sicker, located in Southeast Crosbytown. This hatchery has a 12,000-egg capacity incubator. Forty-five thousand chicks have been hatched off this spring and practically all of them have been delivered to Crosby county chicken raisers. The average hatch for Texas hatcheries is 70 percent. Mr. Sicker states that he has averaged 75 percent in custom hatching and from 90 percent to 100 percent of eggs from his own flock. He stated that the difference was made by proper feeding and care of hens and chicks. The hatchery is a wonderful thing, and it will be the means of making this great South Plains section the banner poultry producing section of West Texas. Crosby county is just one of the South Plains counties that is putting a lot of steam behind the poultry industry, and it is just one among the large number of West Texas counties that is showing an increase of bank deposits among the farmers. The combination of feed raising and chicken raising is working out fine, and when the farmers get the proper formula for mixing the feed on the farm for the various kinds of stock and poultry this will be the home of the most prosperous and happy farmers that any county could produce.

YOUR HEALTH

By DR. MORRIS FISHER, Editor Journal of the American Medical Association and of Hygiene, the Health Magazine.

The egg is an important article in the diet, since it provides a protein that is easily digested. It is deficient in carbohydrate and sugar, but this of course, is not an important deficiency.

The white of the egg consists chiefly of water, proteins and mineral salts. The yolk of the egg is highly emulsified, in which there is much vitamin A and D. Proportionately, also some protein and such minerals as phosphorus, calcium and iron.

Contains 70 Calories. The average egg weighs about two ounces, about 15 percent of its content is protein, about 10 percent fat, and about one percent mineral. It is a food of great value, and is times of much attention to calories and reduction in weight it is important to realize that a single egg will provide 70 calories, so that it is not a good reducing food.

A raw egg is not so easily digested as one that is slightly cooked, contrary to popular opinion. On the other hand even a raw egg is fairly easily digested.

Public Opinion

The movement to restrict the sale of firearms is no more important than that steps should be taken to see that these who are authorized to carry such weapons shall not make use of them except when the occasion warrants. The indiscriminate use of guns by officers of the law is often dangerous to the public. Such danger usually arises without the slightest warning, and the innocent bystander suffers his proverbial fate. The recent instance in Washington in which two boys were wounded by shots fired from a policeman's gun is by no means isolated. Similar happenings are recorded daily in different parts of the country. Overcautious officers should be made to realize that they can not escape the responsibility for such acts. The rule is almost general that law enforcement agencies are armed to protect their own lives, and to apprehend those who have committed a felony. The present is more honored in the breach than the observance. Persons suspected of minor crimes are made the deliberate target of the agents of the law. Where marksmanship is bad, innocent citizens are the victims. The usual explanation is that the policeman "thought" the fleeing man was going to pull a gun or that he made a motion toward his hip pocket. It develops that in many cases the prisoner or suspect was not even armed. Irresponsible shooting in the name of law and order can not be condoned.—Washington Post.

School control of recreational activities tends toward municipal economy. Many buildings and playgrounds are now under the control of school boards. These schoolhouses are usually the neighborhood centers from a geographical standpoint by a comparatively small expenditure of money, the schools can be made adaptable for use other than purely educational, and thus become the local points of the neighborhood, from a civic and community standpoint. New schools can be and should be planned for a wide use, thus saving future expenditures for alterations. If the school grounds are too small, it is better, as a rule, to enlarge them than to purchase new sites to be used for playground purposes only.

A well-planned program for play does not consist wholly of games. Many children enjoy handwork, such as sewing, cooking, and manual training, during their spare time. The school often has the equipment for these activities. Besides, it has the necessary rooms for gymnastics, dramatics, vacation clubs, and rainy day activities—other essential features of a playground program.

New schools can, and ought to be, planned so that the activities of the recreational department will not seriously interfere with the activities of the educational department, and many old schools can, at a small cost, be made adaptable to the use of both departments. People do not spend all their leisure time in the so-called play activities; many prefer to spend part of it in study. Hence a community center should conduct classes in the various sciences, mathematics, and other subjects, such as literary and debating, all of which may be termed the educational activities of a community center. Bands, orchestras, chorus, and library reading have great recreational interests, as well as educational values.

The two rooms which contribute most to the success of a community center are the gymnasium and the auditorium. Where both are impossible because of the cost, a combination gymnasium and auditorium is advisable. The public is more and more demanding a "wider use" of the school plant. There are cities where the wider use of the school plant has had detrimental effects to the main purpose of the school—education.

Farm Bureau Gin To Be Ready For Fall Operation

\$40,000 To Be Spent On Plant, Construction Starting Soon; Storage House To Be Included.

A modern \$40,000 gin is to be built by the Lubbock County Farm Bureau Cotton Association for the use of its members here.

The plant is expected to be in operation and ready to care for cotton of members by fall. Construction is due to start immediately and is expected to be well under way by June 15th.

N. H. Payne, field representative of the Farm Bureau, stressed the point that the association was not fighting anyone for the gin business but merely was seeking to facilitate handling of members' cotton.

A one hundred bush storage house with complete seedhouse is to be built in connection with the gin. Various other units are to be added later.

A manager will be appointed to supervise the plant, under direction of a board of bureau members. A similar gin is to be erected by the Bureau at Idaho.

Thousand Expected At District Session

The annual district meeting of the South Plains Farm Bureau association is to be held on July 7th at Levelland and one thousand farmers, from twenty-one counties, are expected to be present for the affair. Preliminary arrangements for the session were made at a meeting of various field men and county agents held Monday night at Levelland.

Forty More Farmers Join Organization

Forty farmers were added to the membership of the Lubbock County Farm Bureau during May. It was stated yesterday by N. H. Payne, field representative of the organization here. This brought the membership of the county organization to more than 600.

TEXAS CATTLE LEADER

State Has Largest Number Of Jerseys

NEW YORK, June 6. (AP)—Texas leads the country in number of thoroughbred Jersey cattle, says a report submitted today at the annual meeting of the American Jersey Cattle club.

The figures for all states show an increase in the registration of thoroughbred Jerseys of 30 percent with Texas leading the list at 7,282. Ohio, Tennessee, Missouri, Indiana, and Mississippi follow in that order.

DAILY MARKETS

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, June 6. (AP)—Reports of improved weather conditions and prospects in the south were considered chiefly responsible for declines of about \$1.50 in the cotton market today. After selling off to 20.75 at the start, October rallied to 20.91 but broke again to 20.54 and closed at 20.55, compared with 20.88 at the close the previous day. The general market closed barely steady at net declines of 29 to 33 points.

The opening was steady at decline of 4 to 10 points, active months soon showing net losses of 5 to 13 points under liquidation and local selling promoted by better weather reports and relatively easy Liverpool cables. The initial decline brought in some trade buying and covering and the market rallied July selling up to 20.69 and December to 20.74, or about 3 to 4 points net higher.

This bulge was checked by a renewal of liquidation or selling for a reaction and offerings became more active after publication of the forecasts for generally fair weather over most of the belt and the week-report of the weather bureau. The latter appeared to be more favorable than anticipated by recent buyers, and prices eased off the rest of the day with the market under considerable pressure. Selling seemed to come from local, Wall Street and southern sources, and some orders were uncovered on the decline which extended to 30.35 for July and 20.39 for December contracts in late trading when active months were about 30 to 34 points net lower.

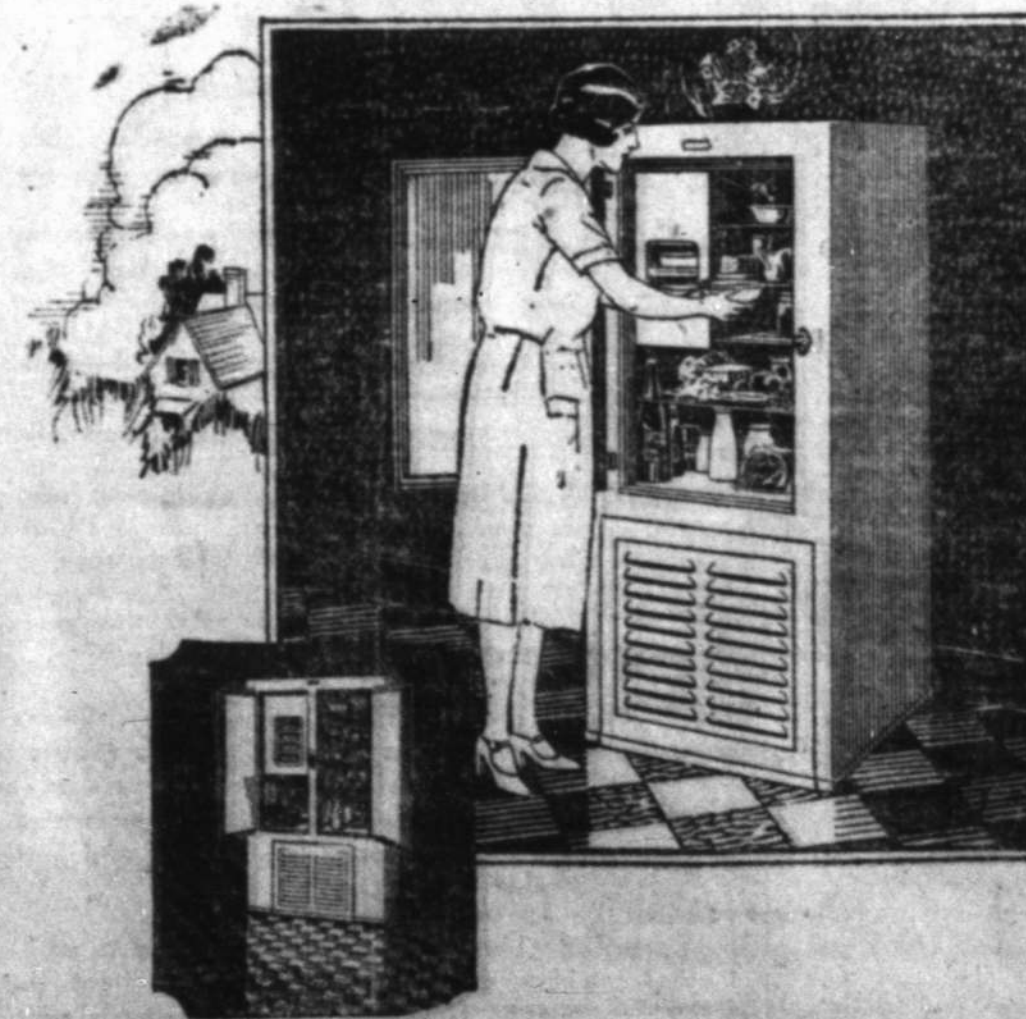

Factional Lines Sharply Drawn On Hoover Candidacy

Managers Determined To Bring Enough Votes For Nomination; Foes Determined To Halt.

(By Associated Press.)

KANSAS CITY, June 6.—The drive to clinch the republican presidential nomination for Herbert Hoover is on, but whether it succeeds depends on the ability of his managers to overcome the many obstacles opponents are piling in his way.

Encouraged by national committee decisions which in the last two days have brought 33 delegates definitely under the Hoover banner, his backers are expressing increased confidence that he can go over on an early ballot.

Foes Are Determined
Although, on the surface, they appeared less active and confident the commerce secretary's foes today were seeking to reinforce their alignments, determined to go the limit to stop him.

The convention will be in full blast a week hence, but at this stage of the proceedings many of the men who will play a big hand in the selection of the nominee are not yet on the scene.

Lowden is still to come. Curtis of Kansas is an absentee. Mellon, the man who has not yet fully shown his hand, won't be here until Sunday. Leaders of the so-called farm revolt are just beginning to show up.

Until the whole picture is complete, and some of the big unit-structured delegations reach the convention city, hold their caucuses and chart their course, the final then, many party leaders point out that no national convention is a bomb proof against the numerous uncertainties which crop up at any time in political maneuverings.

Farmers Disappointed
One of these is considered in some quarters as apt to come to a head as a result of the disappointment expressed in the corn belt over President Coolidge's veto of the McNary-Haugen farm bill.

Farm leaders have served notice that they will be on hand to press their claims, but so far there has been little concrete evidence of their program setting under way.

The bulk of the men who will direct the farm attack are expected before the end of the week, and a special headquarters will be set up in the Ambassador hotel from which strategic moves, aimed largely against Hoover, will emanate.

No one in the Hoover camp, where there has been activity for days professes to be worried over the outlook. James W. Good, the Hoover campaign generalissimo, in a statement said that national committee decisions, seating Hoover delegates from Florida, Louisiana and Mississippi "will, of course, disappoint anyone who hoped that Mr. Hoover could be robbed of a block of southern delegates."

"The ruling of the national committee," Good declared, "not only assumes the nomination of Mr. Hoover, but advances the cause of republicanism throughout the country."

The success of the Hoover followers in the committee hearings which may be concluded before nightfall, has brought charges from some of their foes of steam roller tactics, a suggestion that brings equally vehement disclaimers in return.

Both Seeking Proxies
Both sides are making every effort to get proxies for absent national committee members, for use particularly when the fight for control of the 26 delegates from Texas reaches the show down stage, perhaps late today. Each group is charging the other with going too far in this direction, and there is no doubt that bitterness has been engendered by the hearings on delegate contests.

One of the results of the committee votes taken yesterday was to keep Perry Howard, newly national committeeman, in the saddle in Mississippi. A contesting delegation sought to keep Howard and his group of delegates out of the convention, but Howard, whose delegation is instructed for Hoover got the decision by acclamation.

The committee still has before it today contests involving about 30 delegate seats, but the fight in Texas, between R. E. Creager, national committeeman and Hoover champion, on the one hand, and a group headed by Representative Wurbach, the only republican Texas congressman, on the other, overshadowed all the rest.

CAN'T HOLD THEM
Prisoners Need Not Serve Out Court "Costs"

AUSTIN, June 6. (AP)—Prisoners serving out felony sentences cannot be held longer to satisfy court costs, the court of criminal appeals held Wednesday. E. C. Smith, given 90 days and fined \$25 for allegedly driving while intoxicated in Van Zandt county, was ordered released. Smith said the fine and finished the sentence but officers declined to free him because he had not remitted court costs.

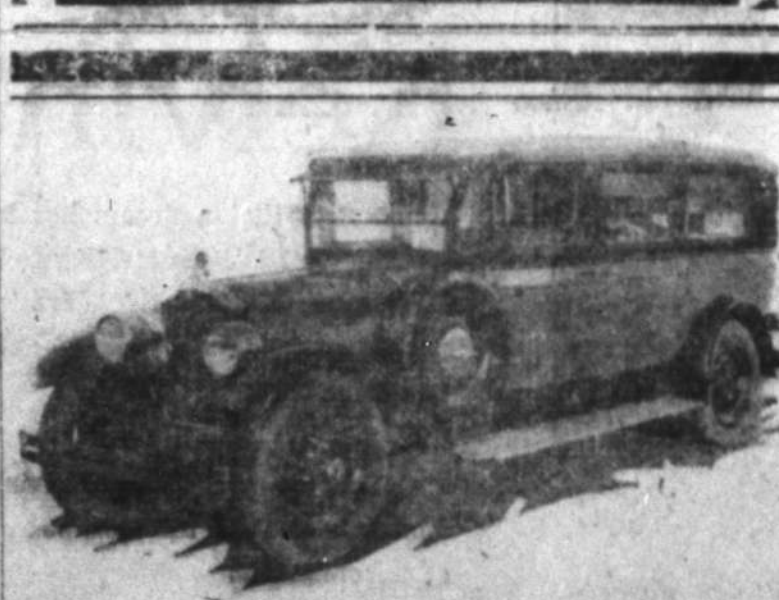

Hoover Expenses Exceed All Other GOP Expenditures

Has Spent In Neighborhood Of \$400,000 Through Campaigns In Various States Of Nation.

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Fifteen candidates for the presidential nomination in the democratic and republican parties have spent \$731,087.05 to date upon their campaigns, figures given to the senate campaign funds investigating committee disclosed.

The expenditures compiled from the testimony before the committee by accountants were made public today by Senator Steiwer, republican, Oregon, the committee chairman.

Secretary Hoover in his fight for the republican nomination, according to the committee's figures, has had spent in his behalf more than all of the other fourteen candidates. The Hoover expenditures were placed at \$380,822.34, with the remainder of the field totalling \$350,264.94. However, his campaign shows a deficit of \$41,799.90, as the total contributions to his campaign were fixed at \$339,022.44.

Governor Smith of New York had the largest expenditure of the candidates for the democratic nomination with a total of \$121,471.04. His campaign also shows a deficit of \$59,64 with contributions fixed at \$139,911.40.

Next to Hoover on the republican list, the largest expenditure was made in behalf of the candidacy of the late Senator Willis of Ohio, the outlay totaling \$66,789.52 with contributions of \$61,787.77.

Former Governor Lowden of Illinois ranks next, with expenditures of \$60,922.90. Lowden, however, has a balance left in his campaign fund for his receipts are placed at \$68,123.20.

In the democratic list, Senator Reed of Missouri ranks next to Smith, with expenditures of \$38,782.79 while his receipts show a total of \$41,430.64.
