No New Developments In 4-Yr. Cone Mystery Case

While Sheriff J. S. Tally does not give any credence to the written confession of Elmer and Claude Tension, inmates of the Oregon State Penitentiary, that they killed Jean Cone and his two sons, J. M. Jr. and Vernon, age 9 and 6, in or near this city on June 1, 1932, yet the sheriff and his force are working diligently on the revival of the four-year-old mystery and following every clue that might possibly lead to a solution of the death of this father and the disappearance of his two small sons.

Sheriff Tally has requested additional information from Warden J. W. Lewis of the Oregon State Penitentiary, that he has received anything further than the first confession, he has not made same public. The Tension brothers, former residents of Perryton, are now serving a long term in Oregon for bank robbery. Tally and his deputies are working on a rumor that the children are alive and they are sparing no effort to run to earth any and all possible solutions of the case that for over four years has remained unsolved and has been the cause of much speculation in this vicinity.

Cone was found early on the morning of June 1 in a dying condition from two gunshot wounds in his breast in a garage in the rear of his home in this city. It was apparently a case of suicide. The two boys were last seen with him late in the evening before. Since that time no trace has been found of them and it was the supposition of local authorities that Cone had done away with them before killing himself.

The Tension confession brings the case back again. Are they really guilty of this crime or is it only a hoax on their part to get out of the grim prison walls and make a break for liberty? This is one of the questions asked. Or do they really know the true facts of the case and serving notice of the guilty ones, if such might be the case, that they're going to "sneak" if something isn't done for them. Some think that this is the situation. There is no question but that the case is going to be revived and if murder has been done, it is a pretty good bet that the old saying, "murder will out," will come true.

REDUCTION OF ACREAGE WILL PAY FARMERS

WILL PAY AVERAGE OF \$7.80 AN ACRE ON 15% OF SOIL DEPLETING BASE. SURVEYS NOW BEING MADE

Details Released Friday

PAYMENT PER ACRE IS MORE THAN EXPECTED; MAY INCREASE BY PRACTICING OTHER METHODS

Ochiltree county farmers by complying with the soil conservation program will receive approximately \$430,810.38 on 15 per cent of the soil depleting base, according to information received Friday by J. T. Stovall, county agent. Data released to the county agent Friday, stated that an average of \$7.80 an acre would be paid in Ochiltree county, which is somewhat more than had been expected. This can be increased by practicing additional conservation methods it is reported. Payments to farmers should be made early in 1937 it is said.

Requirements are for those who would take advantage of this program that 15 per cent of all naturally cultivated land be left uncultivated and that soil conservation methods, as outlined, be practiced. In some instances the amount allowed per acre will be greater and in some less than \$7.80 as the amount paid will be based upon past production of the land. An appraisal of the land in this county was made by the Community Committee in October and the production estimated at from 10 to 13 bushels of wheat per acre.

WHEAT ALLOTMENT PAY SOON

EXPECT \$345,000.00 TO BE PAID TO OCHILTREE COUNTY WHEAT GROWERS IN NEAR FUTURE

From latest available information, it is thought that wheat checks will be delivered to Ochiltree county wheat growers within the next 30 to 60 days to the amount of \$345,000 covering the rental on the 1936 wheat allotment program. This is the 21c per bushel on land planted to wheat in the fall of 1935.

According to County Agent Stovall, 98 per cent of the land in the county is under contract and compliance papers have been signed on at least 80 per cent of the contracted acreage. Mr. Stovall's office will start mailing contracts to Amarillo on September 15.

OCHILTREE STATE PARK GETS STATE RECOGNITION

The fame and beauty of the Ochiltree State Park is becoming statewide. In last Sunday's Fort Worth Star-Telegram, under the caption, "Texas and Texans in the Week's News," a view of picturesque Wolf Creek was carried with the following comment: "OCHILTREE STATE PARK, located on Wolf Creek, 18 miles southeast of Perryton, is becoming the mecca for recreation seekers. Scenes like this abound in the park, which has many shaded swimming holes."

The Ochiltree County Commissioners Court, who now exercise supervision over the Park pending its development by the National Parks Service, are to be commended for their action in stopping the grazing of live stock within the Park area. This action adds to the enjoyment of pleasure seekers and is giving the natural grasses and shrubs an opportunity to recover from the drouth of the past few years.

OCHILTREE NOW DROUTH COUNTY

NORTH PANHANDLE COUNTIES ADDED TO EMERGENCY DROUTH COUNTY AREA LIST

Ochiltree was included in the 20 counties added to the emergency drouth list by the Department of Agriculture on September 4. This brings the national total to 1,111 counties in 23 states.

Counties added in the Panhandle were Carson, Dallam, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Potter, Roberts, Sherman, and Wheeler.

All of Oklahoma and Kansas are designated as drouth areas, also a big portion of Arkansas and New Mexico, and 32 out of 254 counties in Texas.

Counties designated as drouth counties receive reduced freight rates for shipping in and out of cattle and for shipping in feed. There are also other material benefits from the national government.

TED TAYLOR WILL MANAGE TRI-STATE FAIR FOR THIRD YEAR SEASON

For the third consecutive year since 1931, O. L. "Ted" Taylor is secretary-manager of the Tri-State Fair, which will be held September 21-26 in Amarillo.

Taylor has served the fair association in that capacity every year the late Wilbur C. Hawk was president. When he was elected unanimously as president, Gene Howe, editor and publisher of the Amarillo News-

Globe, who is known everywhere as "Old Tack," accepted with the understanding that Taylor again would be the secretary-manager.

"This year the Tri-State Fair has spent more money preparing for the exposition than ever before in the history of the association," Taylor declares.

"This expenditure has been justified by the ever-increasing crowds that daily go through the exposition's free gates," continued Taylor. Among the improvements, Taylor said, are remodeled, renovated and enlarged exhibit buildings.

"For the first time in four years," he said, "the Tri-State Fair will have a poultry department. This department has been added to meet an insistent demand from fanciers throughout the Southwest and Earl J. Curry of Amarillo, who is the superintendent of that show, is particularly anxious to have many entries.

"As to the improvements—in order to provide more space and to provide exclusive exhibits, the substantial automotive building has been remodeled entirely, the interior of the merchant's building has been rearranged to accommodate more booths and the race track or rather, the plant, has been almost entirely rebuilt."

Almost a month ago more than 4,000 catalogs of the 1936 exposition were mailed at the direction of the secretary-manager.

"These catalogs list cash premiums of approximately \$20,000 and they are all guaranteed for payment in full, so if anyone who did not get a copy of the catalog and is interested he or she may have one by writing to me," Taylor said.

VETS HOLD 31 PERCENT

Washington, D. C.—At the end of August, the Treasury Department has redeemed 23,574,913 soldiers' bonus bonds totalling a face value of \$1,204,689,800. This is 69 per cent of the total amount of bonus bonds issued, indicating that 31 per cent remains in the hands of veterans.

BRAKES ON SPEED ADVERTISING

Detroit, Michigan—Spurred by mounting country-wide casualty figures, the Automobile Manufacturers Association has adopted a resolution asking all member companies to refrain from making any reference in advertising or publicity to the maximum speed attainable by their cars. Speaking for the American Automobile Association in favor of the speed-reference ban, President Thomas P. Henry said it was "in line with the enlightened policy the industry is pursuing in its dealings with the public."

VALE SELLS FOOTBALL BROADCASTS

New Haven, Conn.—Yale University will receive \$20,000 from a gasoline advertiser for the privilege of broadcasting six football games to be played in Yale Bowl this Autumn. More than a dozen other colleges promptly signed contracts to produce broadcasting revenue from football contests.

DEVIL'S ISLAND DOOMED

Paris, France—The Socialist Government has promised to abolish Devil's Island, notorious penal colony off French Guiana, as a prison-camp for dangerous criminals.

FEDERAL FINANCES IMPROVE

Washington, D. C.—Receipts for the first two months of the new fiscal year were \$636,902,126 against \$577,653,636 for the corresponding period last year. Expenditures fell from \$1,249,466,413 to \$986, 674,461, reducing the deficit for the period to \$348,745,344, which is about half last year's deficit for the two months. Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau announces his intention of maintaining a working cash balance of a billion dollars as "the safest insurance we can carry for the American people should anything unforeseen occur."

CUSTOMS INSPECTORS SWAMPED

New York City—With a score of big ships returning from Europe and other cruises over the week-end, nearly 15,000 home-coming tourists swamped the port's force of 500 customs inspectors. Trans-Atlantic travel is heavier than it has been for several years.

TROTSKY IN ISOLATION

Oslo, Norway—Because of his alleged activity in fomenting plots against Soviet Russia, Leon Trotsky, exiled Bolshevik, has been removed under guard to a remote country village, where he is denied the privilege of meeting visitors.

TWO CANDIDATES MEET

Des Moines, Iowa—President Roosevelt shook hands warmly with his Republican opponent, Governor Landon at the "non-political" conference of the governors of Kansas, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Missouri and Minnesota, in session here to discuss the drought problem of their states. The President offered Gov. Landon the use of the Presidential yacht for a fishing trip down the Potomac.

NEW TUNNEL UNDER HUDSON

New York City—The final barrier in the new vehicular tunnel between New York and New Jersey was dynamited successfully. The new law provides maximum fines of \$100 or 30 days in jail for a first offense, \$250 or 90 days for a second offense and \$500 or 180 days, with revocation of license for third offense. While no speed limit is fixed, any speed in excess of 40 miles per hour is presumptive of reckless driving.

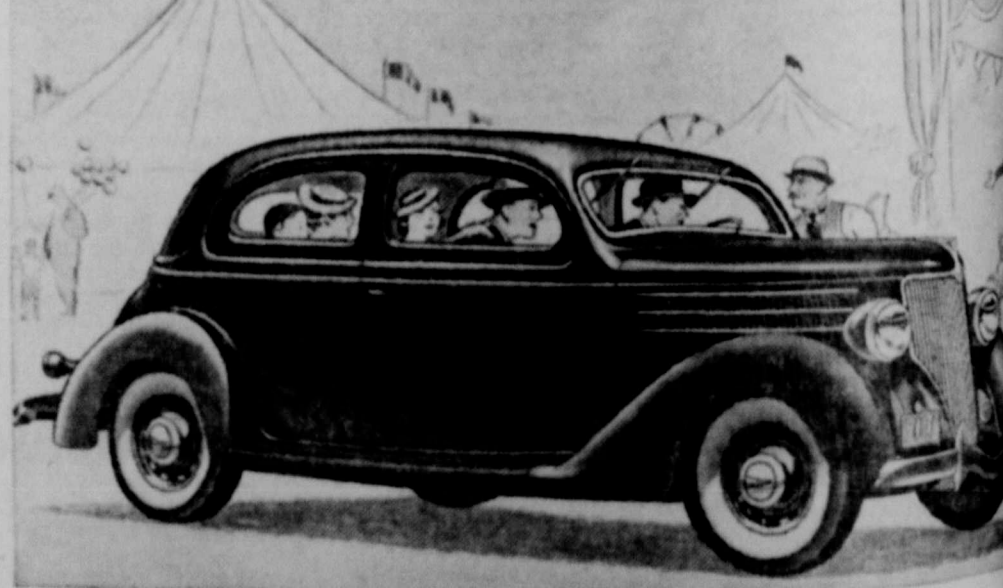

Supervisors are working this week measuring land and preparing reports. Every farmer in the county is urged to contact the supervisor in his district and if possible be present when his land is measured. If he cannot be on his farm at the time the supervisor calls, he is asked to make a rough sketch of his land, showing what was grown and harvested, or plowed under. Each day the supervisors make reports of the farms measured; these reports with maps of each individual farm are mailed to College Station.

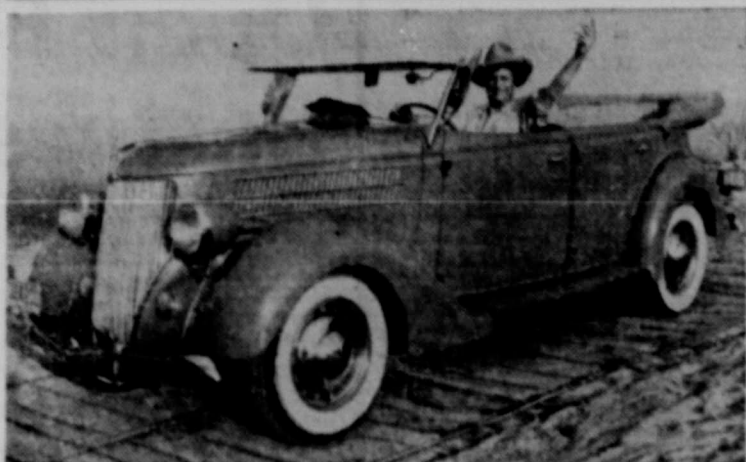

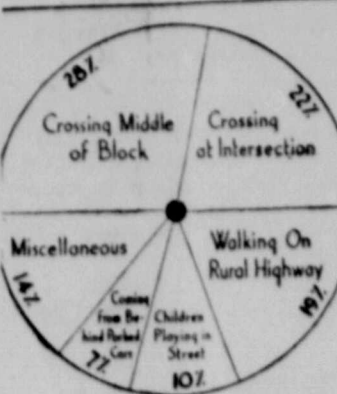

Pedestrians, Heed!

It shows that 28 per cent of those killed were crossing the street in the middle of the block; 22 per cent were crossing at the intersection; 19 per cent were walking along the rural road; 10 per cent were children playing in the street; 7 per cent darted out into streets from behind parked cars; 14 per cent were indulging in miscellaneous practices.

The important thing that this chart brings out is that many pedestrians fail to take the simplest precautions. According to statistics of the Travelers Insurance Company, more than 1,000 pedestrians were killed and 35,000 were injured by crossing against signals; 4,500 were killed and 73,000 were injured by crossing in the middle of the block; 1,140 were killed and 33,000 were injured by darting out into streets from behind parked cars.
