Lamesa Defeats Tahoka 41 to 7

The Tahoka Bulldogs went down before the Golden Tornadoes 41-7 in last Friday night's game which was played in a cold, misty rain.

James Minor, captain and quarterback for the Tahoka team, scored on one of the most unusual plays ever seen on the local gridiron. On the opening kick-off, he kicked the ball, went down and recovered over the Lamesa goal line for a touchdown and then kicked the extra goal to give the Bulldogs a 7 to 0 lead without the ball ever being in scrimmage. According to all information this play is about as rare if not more rare than an unassisted triple play in baseball.

However, after this play, the Lamesa team went into action and at the end of the first quarter were leading 13-7 and at the half 20 to 7. The last half found numerous Lamesa substitutes going into the game, and the game ended 41-7.

The weather or some other diverting cause found the grounds occupied by a rather small crowd of fans. High school authorities wonder if the sport will be self supporting and state that heavy attendance is needed at the next games in order to complete payment on equipment for night playing and to provide the uniforms, footballs and other equipment essential for the player's use.

At a meeting of business men here this week it was decided that business houses would close Monday, November 11, some for all day, others for parts of the day.

Drug stores will also close at 11:00 to open at 12:30 and close for the Lamesa-Slaton football game, but will be open again after the game.

Six People Injured In Car Wreck Last Thursday Night

Four local young people were seriously injured last Thursday night when their car collided with a Lubbock bus. The bus driver and one passenger also received painful injuries.

The most seriously injured was Edwin Forest, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Forrest, who suffered a skull fracture and a broken collar bone. Others in the car were Miss Naomi Macklin, niece of C. C. Coleman, who received lacerations and bruises of the head, Miss Leanne Bartlett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wade Bartlett, who received severe cuts about the head, and Dwight Morris, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Morris, who also received head injuries. Miss Bartlett was carried to a Lubbock hospital for treatment, where she is reported as doing nicely. The other occupants of the car were brought to a Lamesa hospital.

The driver of the bus, Jack Robbins of Lubbock received painful bruises, while the one passenger, Miss Gilbreath of Dublin was painfully cut about the head.

Miss Macklin and Dwight Morris were carried to their homes the first of the week and are said to be rapidly recovering.

Young Forrest, who has been in a semi-conscious condition since the accident, was carried to a Lubbock hospital Wednesday afternoon of this week for special X-ray pictures, and as we go to press we have not learned his true condition.

GAME SCHEDULED TO BEGIN AT 2:30 P. M.

600 Slaton Fans Already Signed Up For Special Train

The Slaton High School Tigers will be the opposition for the holiday game here next Monday as a part of the Armistice Day celebration. The Tigers are to be accompanied by the Slaton High School Band and Pep Squad and hundreds of fans who will travel, according to Supt. David Lemon, by special train and automobile.

No definite time for the arrival of the special train has been announced but it is known that this crowd will wish to arrive in Lamesa shortly after noon. It is desired that cars with drivers be available to transport those of the Slaton party desiring transportation to the playing field. Occupied cars "Sight see-ers" merely clog the streets offer very little aid in this matter and add difficulties to the transportation problem. If you have a sign on your car indicating transportation for the visitors, please also, save some room.

The football game promises to be closely and bitterly contested. The showings of the Tigers and Tornadoes in conference games indicate that the two elevens are about evenly matched. That is especially true when the Tahoka games are studied. Slaton won over a stronger Tahoka team than Lamesa played by a score of 46 to 6 while the Golden Tornadoes won 41-7. It is to be remembered also that Brownfield went on the field against the Tigers with a stronger team than they were able to assemble against Lamesa's Golden Tornadoes.

Each team is depending upon winning this game in order to play in the district championship contest on Thanksgiving and a victory will bring that privilege to the winners.

The history of the games between the two contenders is known to the public. The games have been full of interest from beginning to end and the teams always have a hard contest. The pep squads and bands put on their best drills and maneuvers for this occasion.

The South Side bleachers will be occupied by Slaton's pep squad and band and rooting section while Lamesa's groups will be on the North Side.

Telephone communications with high school officials on Monday revealed that approximately SIX HUNDRED persons have already engaged transportation on the Santa Fe Special. This advance sale is plenty of evidence of the interest being taken in this game by the visitors.

The Homecoming movement among Lamesa High School graduates and former pupils is receiving interest from Georgia on the east to several California communities on the Pacific, from the State of Washington to the New England States. Former pupils from remote regions of the nation are to spend a short time with their former friends and will have get-together periods during the day, witness and game and then attend a barbecue in the evening. It is expected that these visitors from distant parts and those citizens of Dawson county together with friends from Tahoka, Post, Brownfield, Seminole and other points will form the largest throng ever to witness an athletic event in this territory.

The game is scheduled to begin at 2:30 P. M. Admission prices have been agreed upon at 30 cents for school students and 60 cents for adults. This is the last game for season tickets and all persons holding such tickets will be expected to hand them in to the ticket takers. Band, pep-squad and all others will be expected to present their own tickets.

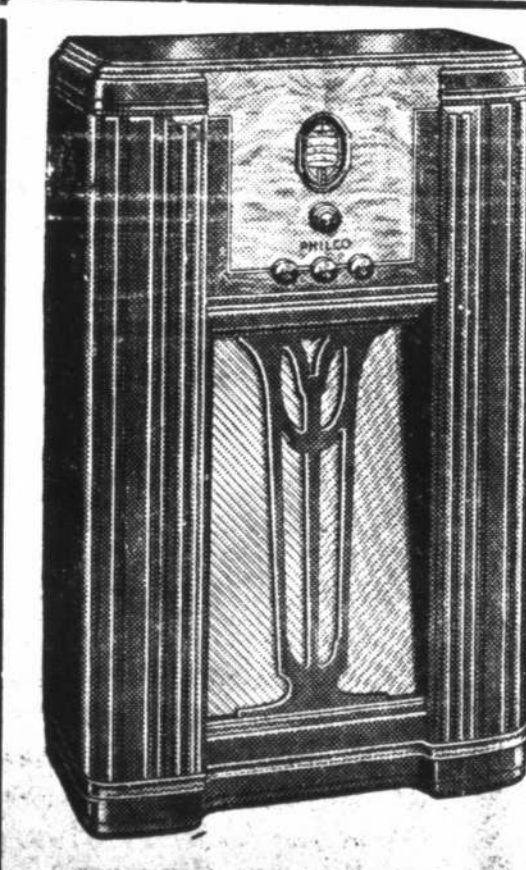

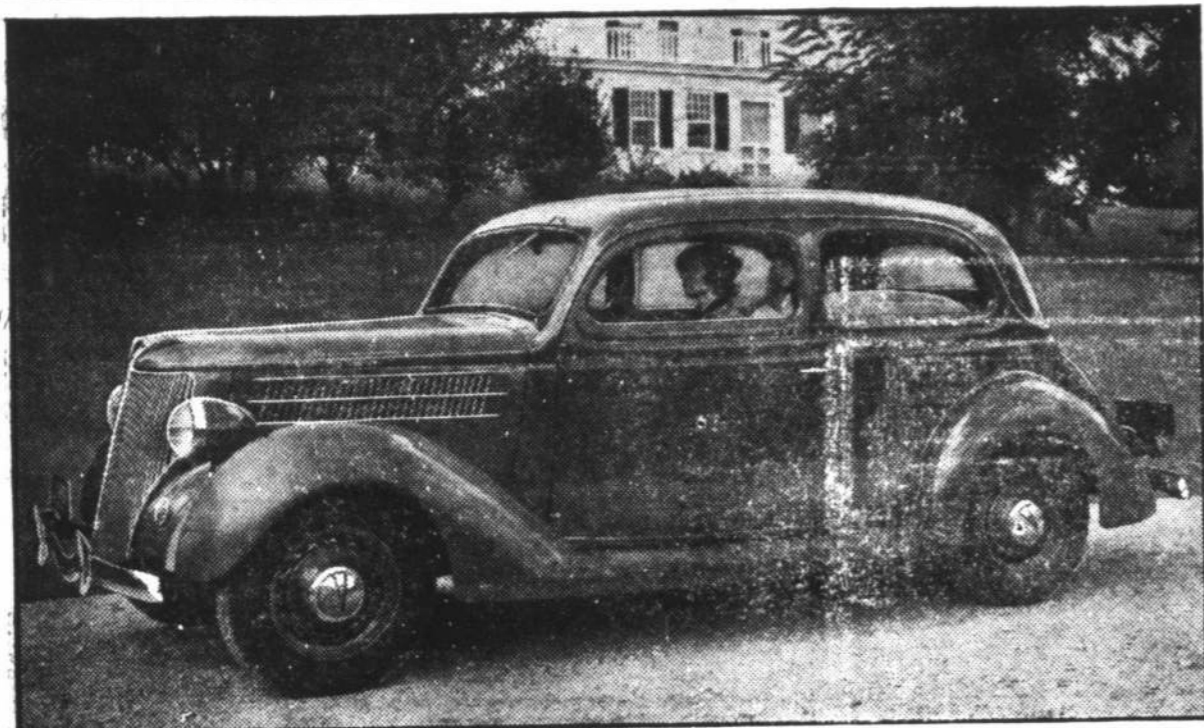

RATHER POPULAR

Austin, Nov. 4.—Among a certain and rather extensive group of self-centered persons symptom hunting unfortunately is rather popular. Because of a too detailed study of so-called health literature of the alarmist type or on account of a recent death in the family introspection develops to a morbid degree. The result is an entirely unfounded fear of all sorts of disease possibilities. Many becoming victims of this warped psychology develop brain and nerve exhaustion and in extreme cases even become affected mentally, stated Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer.

Of course, it is entirely proper to have a normal regard for personal well-being. To maintain vitality and to prevent disease is a logical pursuit for every one. But it most decidedly must be kept within bounds. When one becomes obsessed with the subject, concern for health has overstepped the limits.

For all practical purposes, after giving reasonable attention to diet, personal sanitation, sleep and exercise, and assuming that one's bodily limitations as defined by the family physician are appreciated, the average person can dismiss the subject of health. This, plus the annual physical exam-

ination should adequately cover the situation.

On the other hand, conditions are bound to arise where actual disease symptoms manifest themselves. It will then be up to the doctor to decide what the trouble, if any, is and for the patient to abide by his judgment.

In short, symptom hunting as a hobby is a dangerous matter. One should stay or get away from it. It is neither safe nor healthy to do otherwise.

Mrs. Dan Becker of the Stone community in Washington county had seven acres of feed that it was impossible to cure. She decided to dig a trench silo and this she did at a cost of \$7, putting 54 tons of hegarl in it.

W. L. Brown of Hardin in Liberty county grows selected varieties of sweet potatoes and grades them carefully. He

then puts them in a large storage house and keeps them until spring. He never receives less than 75 cents a bushel for his potatoes.

Hans Hanson, Jr., 15 year old member of the Falfurrias Boys 4-H Club in Brooks county, dug and filled a five ton trench silo, from which he will feed two Hereford calves and the family milk cow.

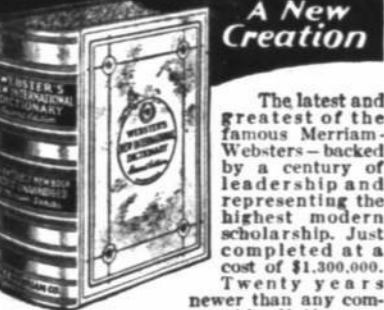

New Rental Checks

The office is in receipt of one hundred forty-eight checks, first rentals, amounting to \$4,530.00. This practically complete the first rentals in the county on the 1935 reduction program as applies to cotton. However, there are nearly one hundred that have not been paid off as yet due to some correction that was necessary to be made in order to complete the contracts for payments so that they will pass the disbursing unit and be approved for payment.

Corn-Hog Checks

Buster Herndon, the corn-hog secretary for the county association announces that he has ready for distribution, 54 checks amounting to \$1083. He states that the checks represent full payment of first rentals on the entire county with the exception of eight contracts. We also have information from the State Board that all the contracts have been forwarded to the Washington office for payment.

Tenant Checks Where Landlords Refused to Sign Contracts

The office is in receipt of slightly over two thousand dollars for the tenants who made contracts in 1934 that land owners refused to sign with such tenants. Only those tenants who have made affidavits that land owners refused to sign contracts have been received. Also there are twenty producers who have not yet received the checks for fulfilling the contracts, whose names were submitted to the Washington office for payment. We do not as yet have any information as to when these others that have been sent in will get their checks.

Notices on all the above names who have checks in the office have been notified that checks are here in the office. Unless a notice has been received

there will of course be no money available.

1934 Bale Tags To Be Reissued Out of Pool

We are in receipt of information that the above mentioned tags are now being reissued in the State office and should reach this office in the very near future. However, as yet we do not have the tags to hand out to those producers who are to be reissued tags to go on the 1935 crop.
