Hart Teacher Selected 'Woman Of Achievement'

Mrs. Linnie Campbell has received notice that she has been selected one of "Two Thousand Women of Achievement - 1971".

The letter states that the former Olton High School teacher, who now teaches in Hart High School, is "one selected after careful scrutiny of many thousands for distinguished achievement".

A half-page illustrated bi-

ography of Mrs. Campbell will appear in Volume 3 of "Two Thousand Women of Achievement" which is published by Melrose Press, Ltd of London, England and will be released throughout the world this autumn.

Questionnaires mailed to the selected women will be housed for all time at the famous museum at Dartmouth, Devon, the English port from which the Pilgrim Fathers first sailed to the New World. They will become historical documents.

A veteran teacher of 29 years, Mrs. Campbell began teaching in Hart High School in the fall of 1969 after retiring from Olton Schools where she had taught 23 years.

Sponsor of Future Teachers of America, Mrs. Campbell helped organize the Olton FTA chapter in 1955 and served as its sponsor until retiring at Olton.

She was also sponsor of the school yearbook and the school newspaper at Olton High School.

Mrs. Campbell is active in Classroom Teachers Association and Delta Kappa Gamma.

Emergency Care Course Set In Plainview Oct. 26-28

A practical course on emergency care and transportation of the sick and injured to be held in the Plainview area is scheduled Oct. 26, 27 and 28 in the basement of the Unger Memorial Library, 825 Austin Street in Plainview. Registration will begin Oct. 26 at 8:30 a. m. Sessions will run from 8:30 a. m. to 4 p. m.

Invited to attend the three-day course of lectures and demonstrations are ambulance attendants, policemen, firemen, safety engineers, rescue squads, nurses, public health officials, civil defense officials, and other officials and private citizens interested in emergency care. The course is offered free of charge and is expected to attract attendance from a seventy-five mile area around Plainview. The State Department of Health and the Hale-Floyd-Briscoe Counties Medical Society are co-sponsoring the program.

The death rate from accidental injuries can be reduced by improved training of emer-

gency personnel. A fast ride to the hospital is no substitute for appropriate attention to the victim at the scene of the emergency, according to Dr. T. Coe Branch, a Plainview physician who is Program Chairman for the training school.

Emergency care personnel must be able to make a quick survey, determine medical priority, and take the necessary life-saving measures. The urgency of this need is expressed all across the county, and physicians and other medical personnel.

Empty Pesticide Containers Dangerous Warns Area Extension Entomologist

Is an empty pesticide container really empty? Don't believe it, says Bill Clymer, Extension area entomologist at Amarillo.

There are always a few grains of powder or a little liquid on the sides of a container that can be just as dangerous as a full one. Proper disposal is the answer to prevention of damage to crops and perhaps injury or death to livestock and humans. Clymer offers some suggestions on disposing of used containers safely.

Glass should be wrapped in newspapers and then broken. Plastic and metal containers should be punctured and crushed and then buried at least 18 inches deep in an area isolated from crops, livestock or people. The site should not be in an area where the chemical might leach down into underground water supplies.

Paper and other combustible materials can be burned, but make sure the fumes and smoke cannot damage plants or animals, Clymer reminds. Sanitary landfills used by many cities and towns can be a good disposal spot, but a producer should check with the proper authorities before

dumping the containers.

The question of using empty 55-gallon barrels always arises. Most people do not want to throw away containers that can be used for feed storage or as feed bunks. But the practice can be extremely dangerous, especially if the chemical had an arsenic base.

"You can burn them or wash them or anything else, but enough arsenic may still remain in the barrels to kill almost any animal," Clymer warns.

Any chemical kept over the winter should be sealed in an air-tight and water-tight container, and stored away from feed supplies in a barn.

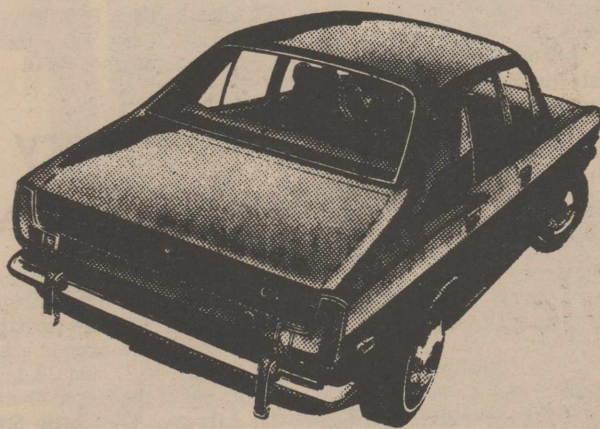

Kangaroos Hop On Fumbles, Hand Horns First 3-A Defeat

The Hart Longhorns lost the ball eleven times to the Kress Kangaroos last week, 10 on fumbles and one pass interception. The Roos managed to score on five of the miscues to down the Horns 45-8 in a district 3-A game.

It was the first time all season the Horns had been out-gained by the opposition or had less first downs than the opposition. Kress led in first downs 18-13 and in yardage 349-225.

The whole story of the game was the fumbles. Kress received the ball to start the game and moved to the Hart 28 yard line where the Roos fumbled. It did the Horns no good, however, as they fumbled it right back on the next play. Kress again moved the ball well down to the Longhorn 7 yard line where the tough Hart defense managed to hold.

From there Hart seemed to be moving well only to fumble the ball on their own 32 yard line. Kress capitalized on this one as Harley Terrell threw a touchdown pass of 19 yards to Roy Jackson only moments later. Larry Searsy added the extra point.

But the Fighting Horns came right back as Stanley Dyer raced 55 yards with the ball to the Kress five yard line, where it looked as if the Horns might score. But then a busted play cost the Horns the ball and a touchdown and the first quarter ended with Kress on top 7-0.

Early in the second quarter, Kress really rolled as they moved the ball to the Longhorn one yard line where Roy Jackson pushed in for 6. Larry Searsy again tacked on the point.

Only moments later after another Hart fumble, Harley Terrell threw a 52 yard scoring strike to Weaver McClure after which the Horns blocked the extra point on a fine effort.

This gave the Horns one more chance to score before the half and the Horns tried to make the best of it only to miss getting a first down by inches and having to give the ball to the Roos with 10 left in the half. But that was enough time, as Harley Terrell threw 36 yards for a TD to Mike Motheral. Larry Searsy added the point after giving Kress a 27-0 halftime lead.

In the third quarter, both teams made a serious threat to score, but neither were able to punch the ball across. But in the fourth, the Horns started rolling and put together their first sustained drive of the night, ending up on the 5 yard line, where John Henry Robinson stormed across for a score. Dirk Rambo passed to Erasmo Castillo for the two extras.

The Longhorns joy was short-lived though as Mike Motheral ran the ensuing kickoff back 62 yards for a touchdown. The kick was no good. From then on it was all Kress as Roy Jackson scored on a 10 yard run and Weaver McClure on a 45 yard run. The extra point

try was no good after both scores, but the Kangaroos had the lead and the game 45-8.

This week the Horns which stand 0-1-1 in district travel to Sudan to take on the Hornets who stand 0-2 in district. Game time is 8 p. m.

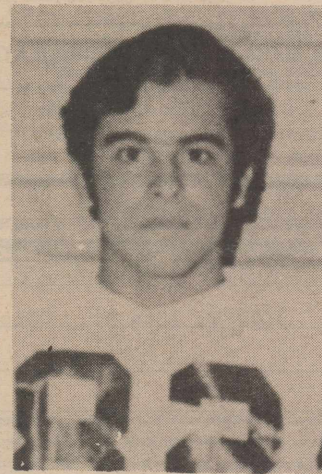

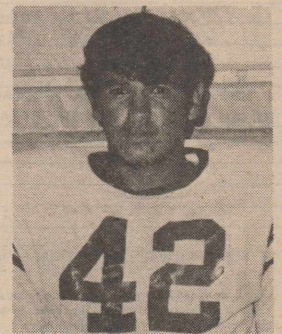

CASTRO CO. H.D. AGENT

Now that the main flow of yard work is at an end it is so easy for us to completely neglect our yards. What we do now will help us to have better landscapes next year. Here is the garden check list for this month. As you can tell it is still a busy time for gardening.

1. Dig and store only disease free Caladium tubers. Store in dry peat or in perlite packed in boxes so the tubers do not touch each other. Store in a dry warm area where temperatures remain between 55 and 60 degrees F.

2. Scale insects on Camellia, Gardenia Holly, and Euonymus can be effectively controlled with dormant oil, Malathion or Diazinon. Use oil only when temperatures are sure to remain below 85 degrees and above 40 degrees F for at least 48 hours after using.

3. Keep fallen leaves raked from lawn area. Leaves make excellent material for composting but must be moistened thoroughly to hasten decomposition.

4. Plant spring flowering bulbs and bulb like plants from

now through November. Make sure Tulip bulbs are precooled or chill them yourself for 60 days or more at 35 degrees F. Plant Tulips in Central and South Texas after Dec. 1 and treat as annuals using new bulbs each fall.

5. Prepare the beds for those tulips being chilled for later planting.

6. Those areas in the lawn with previous history of brown patch should receive an application of PCNB (Terraclor) if you haven't already done so.

7. Fall caterpillars can be controlled with Sevin.

8. For spring color plant seeds of Drummonds Phlox, Cornflower, Larkspur, California Poppy, Bluebonnets, and snapdragons in early October.

9. Prepare pansy beds to receive transplants in late October or early November when plants become available.

10. In North Texas, peonies can be set out or transplanted now.

11. Don't forget the fall application of fertilizer for Bermuda and St. Augustine lawns in mid October. Use 15 to 20 pounds of 8-8-8 or equivalent per 1000 square feet.

12. For dried arrangements don't forget to collect those dried seed pods, pine cones, grass plumes, and other interesting materials, before it is too late.

13. Stake tall mums to prevent wind and storm damage.

14. Make notes of winter gardening chores that will need to be done before spring.

15. For optimum flower production keep Christmas Cactus under cool night temperatures of 55 degrees F.

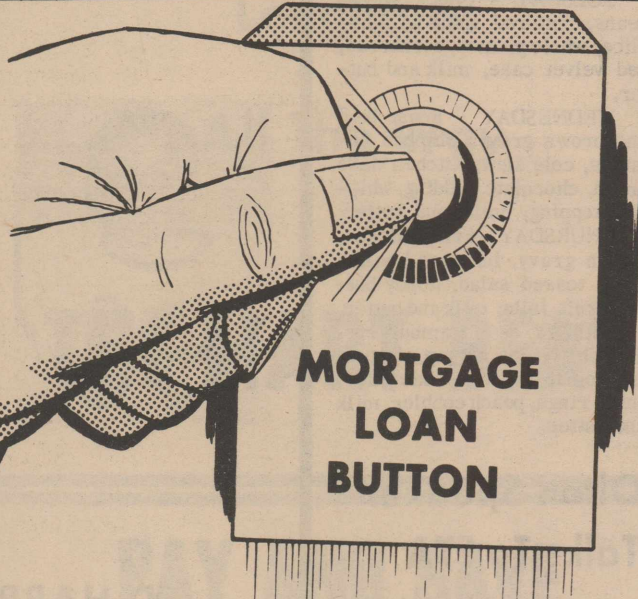

FALL WEED CONTROL

Fall is a good time to control such weeds as rag weeds, groundsels, nightshades, ironweeds, coneflower and broomweed, says Carlyn Hoffman, Extension range brush and weed control specialist. Herbicides are effective in the fall when soil moisture is adequate and weeds are storing food in their root systems. Also, after crops have been harvested, there is little danger of damage from chemical drift. Effective herbicides include 2,4-D, 2,4,5-T, silvex, dicamba, picloram and mixtures of these.

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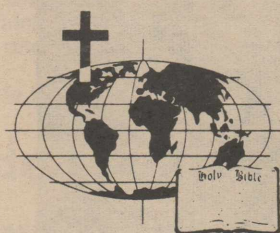
His dejected face slumps under a shabby hat. We don't know who he is.

The century-old Christian concept of the dignity of man has never rested simply on who and what we are. It is founded on the vision of what — with God's help — we can become.

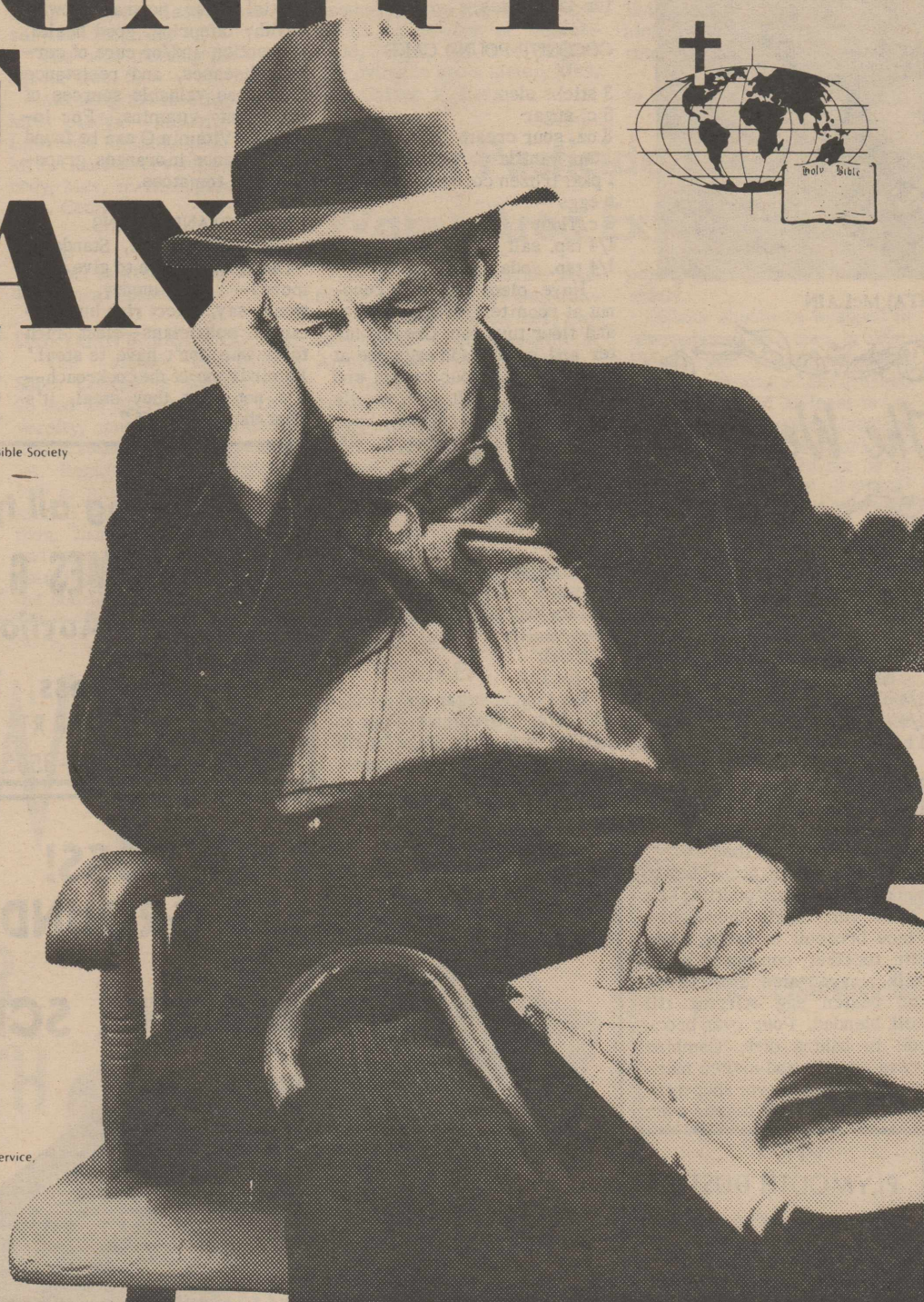
