When asked on his sixty-fifth birthday anniversary whether there isn't an age limit to a man's usefulness, Henry Ford replied: "I haven't found it yet. You take all the experience and judgment of men over 50 out of the world and there wouldn't be enough to run it. Youngsters have their place, and are necessary; but the experience and judgment of men over 50 are what give purpose to the younger men's efforts." There is obvious truth in this statement. One needs to think of only a few of the men now leaders in the various lines of industry, commerce, politics, invention, to realize what a lot of men are today over 50 who are tremendously useful and important to their fellowmen. No doubt Ford had no intention of implying that men under 50 lack judgment. Many of today's middle aged leaders, such as Ford himself, began to show judgment and ability long before they reached 50 years. But such men must inevitably acquire, along with years of experience, a ripened and mature judgment that is more valuable than their youthful judgment. Youth and age are both necessary; the one for its enthusiasm, energy, optimism, freshness of view, and the other for its experience and wisdom.

WHAT'S A TOMATO?

This isn't a question of "tomahito" or "tomayto," but something more serious. Australia is torn up with a bitter controversy over the ancient question whether the tomato is a fruit or vegetable. The row began in the customs office. The officials didn't know how to classify the thing, and the schedules were confusing. The botanists were all mixed up over it. The Australian farmers, with the usual common sense, have a simple solution. "Call it whatever costs most," they say. A FARMERLESS WORLD.

Prof. H. E. Barnard of Northwestern University tells the American Chemical society that the world can be fed without farmers. He is not worried by the Malthusian doctrine that human multiplication will make too many mouths for the earth to feed. "He is confident that when the fertile acres of the earth do not produce crops sufficient for man's needs, the chemist can synthesize them in his laboratory. Indeed, he is already doing that. When the need comes, the chemist will convert the light of the sun and nitrogen of the air into food for the human family. Thirty

men working in a factory the size of a city block can produce in the form of yeast as much food as 10,000 men tilling 57,000 acres under ordinary agricultural conditions." Men will always have to eat, but will learn to eat differently. There would be a solution of the farm problem—but what a change! Farms filled with people, and farmers turned to factory hands producing food for them indoors. The economic system would be badly wrecked if that transaction came too suddenly. But it is reassuring for the long-range worrier to learn that even present scientific knowledge is adequate, if it were advisable to use it, for the feeding of any conceivable population in any country.

has two large bouffes, one of them floating to the floor in the back. Another in Japan green silk has the circle tied in front. It holds the floating cascade in the back.

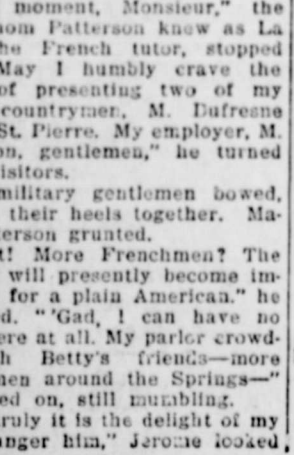
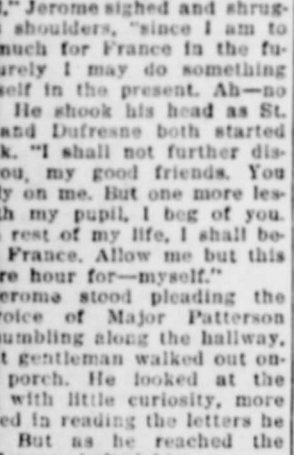
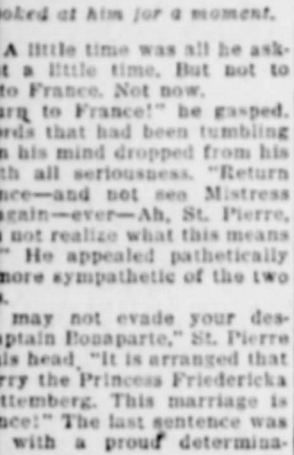

REPUBLICANS TO CARRY FIGHT TO SMITH ON FARM ISSUES

P. to Make Most of Rejection Governor of Equalization Fee; to Play East against Middle West

ALTO, Cal., Aug. 7. — Republican leaders will try to make the most of the rejection of the equalization fee by Governor Alfred E. Smith on the campaign trail as soon as the presidential campaign begins in September. The rejection of the fee is expected to be a major issue in the campaign, and the Republicans are expected to play the East against the Middle West.

George N. Peek, another fee advocate, has said he was "satisfied" with the position taken by Smith and John J. Raskob, Democratic national chairman, to which Tilson gave this dry rejoinder:

"With Smith denouncing the equalization fee, Peek must now feel like Democratic dry delegates from the South did after they returned home from the Houston convention."

NEW OIL POOL DISCOVERED IN STEPHENS CO.

BRECKENRIDGE, Aug. 7.—Stephens county's latest oil pool was tapped Sunday southwest of here about seven miles on the Ross Elberta lease when the Wenz Oil company brought in a small producer at a total depth of 3,494 feet. The well is reported as making about 193 barrels of 40 gravity oil.

The Caddo lime was penetrated at a depth of 3,393 feet and the bit sent 11 feet deeper when the flow of oil began.

This test, in the southwest part of the county, is 3 1/2 miles from the nearest production and opens up a

new high gravity field for the district.

Confederate Veteran Who Sought Pot of Gold at End of Rainbow of Texas Oil Dies in Ranger Hospital

RANGER, Aug. 7.—The trail of an oil boom follower, an old Confederate veteran that before death never reached the age that the glamour and rush of an oil strike seemed to appeal to him, has ended.

Albert Williams, 88-year-old Civil war veteran, died Friday at the City-County hospital. His body is being held at a funeral home, while efforts are being made to save his body from being placed in potter's field.

Last Tuesday, at the suggestion of Dr. W. C. Palmer, health officer, the veteran was removed from a rooming house to the hospital. He died without telling hospital officials anything in regard to his relatives.

When 79 years of age, the old man rushed to the Ranger oil fields to share in the flowing gold of those hectic days. He had joined the painter's union at Brunswick, La., and affiliated with the local union. He plied his trade as a painter and builder and his little bank account

thrived. Then came the slump. He left in 1922.

Other booms followed for him. He went to Mexico and rode along the wave of humanity that swept into the once peaceful village.

Tuesday he carried his savings with him to the hospital. They consisted of only 14 pennies in a tobacco sack.

Efforts to find relatives of the aged man proved futile. Letters in his pocket indicated he had a daughter in Tampa, Fla., and a granddaughter in Harrison, Ark., and one in Richmond, Va. Telegrams sent to the two former were reported undelivered. Nothing has been heard of the latter. Papers in his office indicated he was supposed to report to the Confederate Veterans' Home at Boonville, Miss., once each week. A telegram sent there has brought no reply.

The body will be held until all clues as to relatives have been exhausted.
