Wets Plan Liquor Fight At Special Session

"HICK" POLICE CAPTURE FIVE GANG LEADERS

TUCSON, Ariz., Jan. 26.—John Dillinger and three members of a middle-western gang, accused of a score of crimes ranging from murder to robbery and jail breaking, were arraigned today and bailed at \$100,000 each.

TUCSON, Ariz., Jan. 26.—Five deputies mounted machine guns around the county jail today guarding four of the Midwest's most desperate gangster killers, captured by a small town police force.

In the jail, expensively groomed, were John Dillinger, leader of the gang, Charles Mackley and Harry Pierpont, accused of a score of robberies and murders, a prison break and a jail delivery in Illinois, Indiana and Ohio. They had eluded picked metropolitan detectives only to fall prisoners in a "hick town."

From them police took five machine guns, numerous pistols, 12,000 rounds of ammunition, \$26,000 cash and \$12,000 in jewels. Officers searched the city today for two other members of the gang, believed still hiding. Four women companions were also arrested.

Second only in importance to Dillinger, ranked as "No. 1 Public Enemy" since the imprisonment of Al Capone, was the capture of Charles Mackey, notorious trigger man.

REVALUATION IS DEFENDED BY SENATOR

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—President Roosevelt's dollar revaluation bill was defended in the senate today as essential to any effort to clear America's tremendous burden of public and private debt.

Senator Bailey, democrat, North Carolina, said he had been informed by reliable sources that the total amount of indebtedness in the country at this time was \$220,000,000,000.

"There is not the remotest possibility that the American people can ever pay this debt under the present standard of prices and living," he said.

Answering republican attacks that took up the entire session yesterday, Bailey said the bill would increase prices to a point where liquidation would be possible.

POLL TAX LAW IS TOPIC OF DISCUSSION

AUSTIN, Jan. 26.—Texas law forbidding a vote to those who fail to pay a poll tax prior to Feb. 1, is more than ever a topic for divided opinion this year.

All efforts, heretofore, to abolish the poll tax receipt as a voting prerequisite have failed. Stripped of the patitudes that are heard about the poll tax it remains as a suffrage requirement for two very practical effects. It keeps down the negro vote and it furnishes the state about \$11,000,000 annual revenue.

Past efforts to abandon it have met strenuous objection from school men. The tax is \$1.50 and \$1 of the \$1.50 goes to school support.

Counties are authorized to levy a poll tax of not more than 25 cents additional. This results in unequal voting requirements over the state. Some counties, desiring a heavy voting strength for its effect in political conventions and elections, do not levy a county poll tax.

A resident of San Antonio, for instance, pays \$1.50 poll tax and is allowed to vote. A resident of Austin, 80-miles away, pays \$1.75 for the same right. A city also may levy a poll tax but it has been ruled that failure to pay a city poll tax cannot bar a person from voting.

Defenders of the poll tax as a voting requirement say that it is the only tax many people pay toward support of the government. They do not go so far, however, as to propose a poll tax only upon those who pay no property tax. The poll tax requirement also is defended as a form of voters' registration. Registration of voters can be accomplished at far less cost than the \$1.50 or \$1.75 poll tax fee.

Until an amendment by the last preceding legislature, there was discrimination as to poll tax requirements between urban and rural residents. Personal application had to be made for a poll tax receipt in communities of 10,000 or more population. In the country the receipt could be secured through an agent's application, being mailed to the payer.

The amendment now permits payment of poll tax for both man and wife in the same check or money order with which their property taxes are paid. If this payment is made before Feb. 1, the tax collector is authorized to mail the poll tax receipt regardless of city or county residence.

Not every legal voter must have paid a poll tax. Indians need none. Blind or deaf and dumb persons, and those who have lost a foot or hand, need no poll tax receipt to vote. Persons over 60 need none, but must have an "exemption certificate" if they live in a town of 10,000 or more people. Formerly this exemption certificate had to be renewed yearly. Now permanent certificates may be issued. If the exempt voter moves, the transfer must be endorsed on the certificate.

Outside communities of 10,000 or more, persons over 60 may vote without certificate or poll tax receipt, the theory being that in rural communities old persons are well enough known to remove danger of illegal voting.

There also is a temporary poll tax exemption for those who become 21 after Jan. 1 of any particular year. It entitles them to vote without poll tax receipt in that year only and only in elections that take place after they become 21.

Possession of a poll tax receipt does not necessarily entitle the holder to vote. A poll tax is levied against many who cannot vote. It may be levied against one not a citizen of the United States, if he resides in the state on Jan. 1.

A poll tax is levied against felony convicts though they cannot vote after release without having citizenship restored by a proclamation of the governor. A receipt issued after Jan. 31 also fails to confer any voting right for that year.

A tax collector may not refuse to accept tender of poll tax payment without tender of payment of other taxes. He may refuse to accept payment of other taxes if the poll tax is not also tendered.

In recent years poll tax payments have been between 1,000,000 and 1,200,000 a year. (Continued on page 3)

Jake the Barber Tells Story of His Kidnaping

CHICAGO, Jan. 26.—John (Jake the Barber) Factor, today retold the story of his kidnaping from the witness chair as Roger Touhy and three henchmen, charged with the abduction, watched with smirking smiles.

In a low voice the colorful promoter, who is charged with fleecing English investors of millions, told how he was seized by a gang in the morning of last July 1.

Before testifying, Factor announced he was ready to identify three of the defendants as his abductors. He said he could identify Touhy, Albert Kator and Gloomy Gus Schaefer.

TWO ALLEGED CAR THIEVES ARE CAPTURED

Two alleged box car thieves were captured in Fort Worth Friday morning after a chase that started in Ranger around 3 o'clock, and a third member of the alleged cigarette theft ring was being sought by Dallas police, according to Chief Jim Ingram.

John Bates, special agent of the Texas & Pacific railway, called Ranger officers at 1:30 and informed them that a shipment of cigarettes would arrive in Ranger on a train due at 2:30. Police Chief Ingram had requested that he be advised of the next shipment in order that he could watch for the ring that had been operating in Ranger in recent weeks.

Shortly after the car had been placed on a siding Patrolmen Jack Roach and Guy Pledger saw three men break into the car. Two were away from the car at the time they approached and the third jumped into a Studebaker coupe and fled with the two officers in pursuit. They called from Weatherford some time later, saying that they were still on the trail of the car, which bore a Dallas county license.

The other two were thought to have taken an early morning train to Fort Worth and officers in that city were notified. When the train pulled into the station there the two men were picked up and, according to word received in Ranger Friday morning, admitted their part in the attempted robbery and named their companion, who is known by Dallas police, and is now being sought.

Pledger and Roach continued on to Fort Worth, where they lost track of the car, but stopped off and identified the two men arrested there, who gave their names as Charles Chambers and Aubrey Barnett. Chambers had been implicated in a previous robbery here and in New Mexico, Ingram stated. The third man, according to the two arrested in Fort Worth, was D. Kirkpatrick of Dallas.

Pledger and Roach returned to Ranger without the two men as they were wanted in Fort Worth for questioning on other robberies, it was stated by Fort Worth officers.

Barrow Keeping Texas Officers On the Alert

DALLAS, Jan. 26.—That elusive trio, Clyde Barrow, Raymond Hamilton and Bonnie Parker, simply won't let Texas officers rest. They keep hobnobbing up here and there, but when the officers are here, they are there, and vice versa.

Last night they reportedly put in an appearance at Terrell, 30 miles east of here, where the automobile of Mrs. H. O. Golden was stolen from her private garage while she watched helplessly from a window of her home.

Mrs. Golden later viewed a picture of Barrow and told police she was positive one of those who took her car was that man.

Hearing Is Held For Two Negroes In Golden Case

ALEDO, Parker Co., Jan. 26.—Examining trial for Robert Butler and Swift Lewis, Fort Worth negroes, charged with murder in the slaying of W. S. Golden, farmer near here, will be held here tomorrow.

Charges were filed against them Monday, after Golden had been shot to death Sunday afternoon when he went to order two negroes from his farm where they were hunting.

Butler surrendered at Fort Worth yesterday after eluding officers four days.

AUTO INDUSTRY HIRES NEARLY HALF MILLION

DETROIT, Jan. 26.—An industrial army of 345,000 workers 100,000 of them recruited from the unemployed of last year—answered automobile factory whistles today as the industry mobilized to meet the largest new car buying wave in five years.

Third by an unexpected clan exceeded only in boom years the industry is rapidly absorbing its idle labor.

Manufacturers report they are calling thousands of their former workers each day. They expect employment figures will approach 1928-29 levels by the end of February.

The huge General Motors corporation has a total employment of 33,000 more workers than this time last year.

The Ford Motor company, leading the production parade because of a month's start on other companies, is working 90,000 men in Detroit alone.

KEEL OUT OF JAIL ON WORD HE'LL "BEHAVE"

L. C. Keel, who was booked at the Eastland county jail for investigation Thursday afternoon after being taken in custody by sheriff's deputies when he accompanied a number of laborers to the Eastland County CWA headquarters to register complaints about the treatment of laborers employed on projects being paid for out of federal funds, was released last night without any charges having been filed against him.

Keel, who gave his residence as Ranger, has been engaged for the past several weeks in an effort to organize CWA workers throughout this section, and has made a number of speeches at Eastland, Ranger, Strawn and other places. It is stated that he charges each laborer, who becomes a member of his organization, a fee.

Deputy Sheriff Steele Hill quoted Keel as saying that he was going to cease his activities as an organizer and would cause no further trouble.

Officers here communicated with Department of Justice officials in Dallas regarding Keel before he was released from custody.

The little flurry of trouble that blew up in Eastland Thursday afternoon following a speech by Keel appeared to have completely blown over and nothing further is expected to be heard of it.

Westbrook May Resign As Head of State Relief

AUSTIN, Jan. 26.—Lawrence Westbrook, federal and state relief director for Texas, returned from Washington today and conferred with Gov. Miriam Ferguson. His resignation to accept a tendered post as assistant to National Administrator Harry Hopkins is expected to be announced by tomorrow.

On his resignation, J. F. Reed, assistant state director, formerly of Galveston, will automatically become acting director. A permanent successor must be elected by the Texas relief commission, which is to meet Feb. 12.

The governor's husband said he had no idea who would be named.

Theatre Owner Is No-Billed In Crooner's Death

BOY WANTED IN ROBBERY IS CAPTURED

Chief of Police Jim Ingram of Ranger was in receipt of a telegram today from the chief of police at Muskogee, Okla., to the effect that a Mexican boy giving him the name as Rafael Camacho, 15, of Ranger, had been arrested on suspicion and had confessed the burglary of the Killingsworth, Cox & Co. hardware store in Ranger. Ingram wired back that he would go to Muskogee Sunday and get the boy.

At the time of his arrest Camacho had \$24.52 in small change on his person and admitted, according to the wire, that he had taken \$37.82 from the cash register and cash drawer Sunday afternoon when he burglarized the store.

Entrance to the store was gained by breaking in a rear window, which had wire re-enforced glass in it. One of the screw drivers taken from the hardware store was used to pry open the top drawer of the cash register. He later went into the office and took a small amount of change from the cash drawer there. Several other drawers in the cash register were not opened, though each contained \$10 in change, left for the opening of business Monday.

According to police Camacho had been arrested on several occasions on burglary charges several years ago when only eight or 10 years of age.

Poll Tax and Car License Payments Behind Last Year

MANY WAYS FOR ACTION ARE PLANNED

Governor Has Not Submitted Topic In Her Call For Special Session.

AUSTIN, Jan. 26.—How best to get hard liquor legislation before the special session of the legislature which meets Monday was being planned today by Texas wet forces.

A special session theoretically can consider only topics submitted. The governor ignored the liquor question in her call.

Should she continue to refuse to submit it there are other ways in which it can be acted upon. It has been the practice in the house for the speaker to pass on to the house, itself, for decision, any point of order claiming a bill is not within the governor's call.

If the wets have a majority they can overrule a point of order. Courts have held if a governor signs a bill passed by a special session the act is valid even though the topic had not been submitted.

Another plan of getting an amendment before the legislature was suggested. Issuance of more relief bonds has been submitted. With this necessarily goes provision for their retirement. A hard liquor tax to retire the relief bonds would open the way to licensing the Dean law penalties and provisions.

A tax on transportation would be legal. The constitutional provision only extends to manufacture and sale. The present law against transportation is merely a legislative act and can be changed.

EUROPEAN MARKETS FOR TEXAS GRAPEFRUIT

Texas grapefruit has made its bow to the people as well as the palates of France. An American ship touched dock at Havre just the other day with a cargo of 500 cases of Magnic Valley grapefruit and thus opened a new market in Europe for the Texas grower. French importers are said to have expressed the hope that the Texas growers could furnish 25,000 cases this season. This first cargo, loaded at Houston, included fruit from the region around McAllen. There is no quota on imports of grapefruit in France at present, although the French government has rigid restrictions on American apples and pears and other fruits.

Ralph G. Bray, publisher of the Mission Times, in an open letter to the people of the Valley prophesied a wonderful future for the lower country. This is an excerpt: "I believe that every business man in the Valley believes that better times and conditions are at hand for a rally," and he tells the reason why. "With their unparalleled agricultural advantages and backed by deserving aid from the federal and state governments we are on the threshold of an epoch of advancement and national prosperity. . . . We should begin to make our plans for building our businesses to greater proportions in anticipation of trade that is to be ours. Before this winter is over there will be millions of dollars in process of spending in the Valley on public projects. More millions will come in through vegetables and fruit crops. The nation will hear of these things and new people, with money in their pockets, looking for business and home sites, will come."

Weekly Sunday School Lesson

STANDARDS OF THE KINGDOM
Text: Matt. 5:1-48
The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Jan. 28

By WM. E. GILROY, D. D.
Editor of The Congregationalist
The Kingdom of Heaven begins in blessedness, and blessings are the portion of all who enter into it and who continue in it. Not blessings as the world too often counts them. Not the blessings of ease or of pleasure or of material satisfactions.
Jesus never promised to his followers, and to those who would establish the truth in their hearts and lives, an easy way. On the contrary, it was to these that he offered burdens and sacrifices and ways of service.
He told them, even, that they would not be free from sorrow and sufferings. But in a world where these things are the lot of the good and of the evil, Jesus promised deep satisfactions and blessings to those who would find the way of light and love and truth.
Our lesson begins in what have been called the Beatitudes—that is, the roll of blessings. It is

instructive to study the blessings that are promised and those to whom they are offered. They offer to the persecuted and the harassed inner peace and satisfaction, but beyond this they express also great spiritual laws or compensations that are operative in life.
The poor in spirit—that is, the ingenuous, honest, simple, earnest souls, who are not concerned about worldly gain, or power, or anything that enables them to dominate over their fellowmen—have the blessing of the Kingdom of Heaven.
It well might be asked whether that blessing is possible for any other men than those of such simple honesty and earnestness. The blessing of comfort is offered to those who mourn. It is doubtful whether those who never have mourned ever have discovered the real meaning of comfort. There are spiritual satisfactions that one can know and understand only as one has felt the need of them through suffering and sorrow.
Perhaps the strangest of all the blessings is the pronouncement of the inheritance of the earth for almost all the experiences of human life, where it is apparently the aggressive, and the selfish, and the exacting, who win the greatest rewards. But it well may be asked whether the success

of these is as great as it seems. It was this same Jesus who pronounced these blessings, who inquired concerning the worth of a man who had lost the world, but who had lost his own soul. Surely the world is full today of people who have attained great world success, who seem to inherit the earth, but in whose lives there is little that makes the soul either glorious or worthwhile.
Does not experience, when we search into its meaning, reveal something of the truth that Jesus emphasized? The blessings upon the merciful, and the pure in heart, and the peacemakers, speak for themselves.
The framers of this lesson have shown insight and good judgment in attaching to the Beatitudes the closing verses of the fifth chapter of Matthew, which lay stress upon the good human life as like the life of God in the bountifulness of its love and magnanimity.
This triumphant description of the good life is closely related to the way of blessing. It is a life in which man is lifted into a different atmosphere from that of worldly and selfish passions and interests. It is a life in which even toward one's enemies reconstructive powers begin to operate when one meets enmity not with enmity, but with love.
Selfishness never can conquer

selfishness, hate never can conquer hate, but when one meets selfishness with unselfishness a foundation is laid for something new. There is a revelation of spiritual value.
And when one meets hate with love, he has met something that is stronger and deeper with something that is even stronger and deeper. But there is no blessedness apart from the commitment of life to truth and righteousness and love.

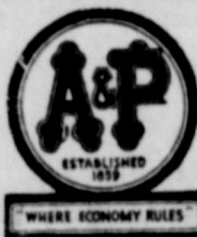
