THREE BABIES DIE, SIX ILL OF POISON FOOD
MORE NAVAL LIMITATIONS PROPOSED AT GENEVACONFERENCE IS
GIVEN U. S. PLAN
OF PROCEDURELIMIT SUGGESTED FOR
CRUISERS, DESTROYERS
AND SUBMARINES

(By The Associated Press)
GENEVA, June 20.—Extension of the 5-5-2 principle of naval strength of the United States, Great Britain and Japan was proposed today to the three power naval limitation conference by the American delegation.

Opening the conference called by President Coolidge, Ambassador Hugh Gibson, the chairman, proposed that cruisers be limited to 6,000 to 10,000 tons, destroyers to 1,000 to 1,500 tons and submarines to 1,000 tons.

Gibson presented his proposal after a brief address in which he expressed an expression of gratitude to the powers from President Coolidge and declared that "the United States is prepared to accept a general program providing for as low a tonnage as acceptable to the other powers."

Destroyer Tonnage

Destroyer total tonnage would be restricted to 200,000 or 250,000 tons for the two largest powers and to 100,000 or 150,000 tons for Japan. Maximum tonnage for American and British submarines would be 6,000 tons with 35,000 to 54,000 tons fixed for Japan.

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Regrets Others Not In

He expressed regret that France and Italy were not active participants in the conference and urged that the United States, who with Great Britain and Japan are the powers which now lead in naval armaments, to assume "all responsibility for initiating further naval limitation." "If we were not prepared to limit," he said, "we could not expect others to do so."

Total Tonnage

As the conference convened it was a general impression that the American delegates would suggest maximum and minimum figures for total tonnages in the three classes of warships to be discussed—auxiliary craft, destroyers and submarines. It was made known that the United States was prepared to go ahead with an extensive warship building program if no agreement was reached. Thus, it was commented, the real intentions of the nation as regards naval strength would be drawn out and it would be learned whether it was the plan

RAILROADS ARE
REFUSED PLEA
ON PORT RATESEXTENSION OF DATE
AND MODIFICATION
DENIED MONDAY

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 20.—The state railroad commission in an order announced today refused application of respondent railroads for postponement of the effective date of revised gulf port cotton rates and denied reconsideration and modification of the rates.

The revised schedule was ordered effective July 15, as the result of a hearing held in May, closing a series in which Houston and Galveston port side cotton shippers' interests were aligned against "back from the water front" and inland shippers.

The railroad commission ordered new rates striking a compromise between the difference paid by inland shippers who have to concentrate shipments enroute, and what was paid by interests with their only concentration point right at the ship side.

Miller Takes
Governor's Seat

AUSTIN, June 20 (AP).—Lieutenant Governor Harry Miller of Dallas, who is to be "inaugurated" Wednesday night, assumed the post of acting governor today for the period Governor Dan Moody will be absent from the state on the Texas "good will" train to the north and east.

Governor Miller's first official act today was to approve the \$10,000 bond of Dr. J. C. Anderson, respondent state health officer Saturday night announced plans to visit an inauguration ceremony for him Wednesday, probably including a reception and ball.

Another Explosion
Marks Water Fight

LOS ANGELES, June 20 (AP).—Quens valley, scene of a water war between ranchers and the city of Los Angeles, today echoed defiance as peace officers who sought to fix responsibility for still another dynamiting apparently intended to damage the great aqueduct system upon which more than 1,000,000 persons depend for water.

The last blasting occurred yesterday, when a charge of explosive, planted in spite of the watchfulness of scores of armed guards, blew out a sixteen foot section of the last of the aqueduct.

The blast, which was felt in Lone Pine, did not materially impair the operation of the aqueduct, officials reported.

BAN ON TEXAS
VALLEY FRUIT
IS DISCUSSED

WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP).—The quarantining of Texas on account of the prevalence in Hidalgo and Cameron counties of the Mexican fruit fly, was discussed today at a hearing before the federal horticultural board. The pest is a menace not only to the immediate region but also the great citrus fruit industry of Florida, California and the Gulf states.

Arguments in favor of and against the quarantine were heard from representatives of the industry. The board will determine later whether a quarantine shall be imposed. Shipment of fruit from the infested areas under inspection and certification may be possible should the quarantine be placed.

KANSAS CITY IS
HOST TO TEXAS

AIR LINE WILL
PAY, BUSINESS
MEN SAY HEREOKLAHOMA CITY TO EL
PASO LINE PLANNED
THROUGH LUBBOCK

The proposed Dallas-Lubbock-Roswell airplane mail, express and passenger line suggested publicly for the first time in Sunday's Avanti-Journal, has set the people of Lubbock thinking, a series of interviews on the feasibility of the project, secured by a Journal reporter today, indicate.

Eight Lubbock business men chosen at random, were questioned concerning the line and were nearly unanimous in the belief that it would be a success after properly established.

Augmenting the suggestion of the line with terminals at Dallas and Roswell and with headquarters in Lubbock came another suggestion today, this time from E. T. H. Oxford, representative of a large oil company and a member of the Royal Canadian flying corps on the front during the world war. Mr. Oxford believes that the line would not only be a success from the first take-off but that it should extend further west than Roswell.

El Paso Is Planning

Another opportunity for Lubbock to come from the aviation department of the El Paso Chamber of Commerce, which plans the organization of a line between Oklahoma City and El Paso, with an all night stop-over in Lubbock.

"The greatest factor in the proposed air service will be manpower," is the opinion of C. E. Maedgen, president of the Lubbock National bank. "Investors will not demand good machinery only, but men."

COOLIDGE IS
LISTENER TO
BOY PASTOR

(By Associated Press)

RAPID CITY, S. D., June 20 (AP).—Faster to partake of all of the novel experience which this western country has to offer, President Coolidge entered into his second week in the Black Hills, convinced that the summer White House is an experience to his liking.

He has fished successfully in the racing mountain streams; known the romance of its pine covered hills, the thrill that an easterner receives from being dressed in a ten gallon hat, and he has heard from a twenty year old boy a simple statement as to why people should go to church.

Hears Young Preacher

Perhaps more than any other, the president's first Sunday in the Black Hills was an experience he long will remember but the day was hardly less unusual for himself than it was for Rolf Lum, the big blonde youth who preached the first sermon of his life yesterday, before the president of the United States.

The youth stood behind the pulpit of the Hermosa Congregational church and looked out upon a gathering as typical of this western country as was the little building set up on the prairies for simple living folks who worship God in a simple way.

The day was one which probably never will be forgotten in that town of several hundred people, a town which years ago was famous for its shooting scrapes between miners and the cow boys of the section.

MANY ATTEND
ROAD MEETINGSix States Represented In
Amarillo Session Of
Highway 66 Ass'n

(By The Associated Press)
AMARILLO, June 20.—Six of the eight states traversed by United States highway 66 were represented among the 220 delegates to the third convention of the highway 66 association here today. Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri have delegations here. John T. Woodruff of Springfield, Mo., presided.

Reports indicated that two thirds of the mileage of the highway between Amarillo and Chicago has been improved, with encouraging prospects for the remaining one third. Between Amarillo and California, much less has been accomplished, it was reported, and Amarillo was urged to take the lead in developing the southwestern half of the highway.

Road Improvement

John McCharg of Joplin made the principal talk of the morning session, stressing the need of considering road improvement from the national standpoint rather than on a piecemeal basis. He declared that policies simply would not mix in highway affairs, but thought that every state had to pass through a period of political meddling with highway affairs before it really began to get results.

Food Served Sunday

Rose Ann Norbert and Betty Bergman, both two years old, died last night, while the third death occurred early today.

Food served at the Sunday morning meal was blamed for the illness, which affected half the children at the home. Samples of the food have been taken for analysis.

The home matron, Minnie Manley, and the housekeeper, Alice Paul, also became ill, but their condition was not regarded as alarming.

Woman Is Held
In Conspiracy

(By The Associated Press)

NEWBRUNSWICK, N. J., June 20.—The faith of George F. Morse, 84, wealthy retired farmer, in his 40 year old daughter, Bessie, today remained unshaken despite her arrest in a charge of conspiracy to kill three members of her sister's family.

Miss Morse was freed on bail of \$7,000, furnished by her father, after her arrest Saturday by detectives who had posed as gunmen in perfecting an alleged death plot with her maid, Mamie Todd, a negro. The maid, who is 21 years old, had been with the Morse family for 18 years, having been taken from a protective home in Philadelphia.

Plan Changed

Authorities said the conspiracy was originally directed against the father and mother but was later centered against Miss Morse's sister, Mrs. Grace Dey, her husband, Elmer, and their son, Robert. Officials said the first plan was abandoned because of the death of Mrs. Morse two months ago and because the daughter felt her father would not give much money.

The police believe that Miss Morse feared her father's estate, estimated at more than \$100,000, would be left to her sister and brother-in-law.

Morse characterized the alleged plot as "a frame up, pure and simple." "I do not believe my daughter entertained any idea of plotting to kill me or my daughter, Grace, and her husband. The whole affair comes from the mind of the maid."

Kansas Rivers On Rise After Rains

TOPEKA, Kan., June 20 (P)—Kansas rivers were rising again today following a series of abnormally heavy rains the last few days in most parts of the state.

Precipitations ranging from one and four-fifths inches to five inches were reported today for the last 24 hours at scattered points in eastern Kansas. Equally heavy but more general rains fell Saturday night.

Several rivers in eastern Kansas already are overflowing their lowlands. The Neosho was reported to be flooding at LeRoy, the Solomon river, at Solomon and the Smoky Hill above Junction City and the Verdigris at Independence and Coffeyville.

Another great flood in the Cottonwood river valley was predicted by Flora, with the stream bank full and rising rapidly.

they will want to be sure that the personnel of the service is responsible and efficient.

"Speaking from the standpoint of service it would render firms of Lubbock, I should think business men would welcome the time-saving value of mail and express deliveries," he continued. "It appears to me just at this time that persons, on the other hand, would be a little dubious of the safety of traveling by air."

"For a while the line might experience financial loss, through the lack of passenger support. Since the service would be an experiment, so far as this territory is concerned, it might be some judgment to start with one plane instead of three, until passenger and express patronage are assured," he concluded.

CHARLES C. CRENSHAW

C. C. Crenshaw, of the firm of Bledsoe and Crenshaw, expressed the belief that the air line would be feasible. "The Plains country offers an unusual opportunity for experimentation in aviation, because of the available spaces for landings," he said. "The distance between towns in this section is such a menace to transportation that air service should be met with favorable patronage. Placing the value on time, the air route would be cheaper than railroad travel."

"I am doubtful," said Mr. Crenshaw, "whether the project would be commercially profitable until it has proven safe in every way. Individually, I would take a plane for Dallas tomorrow if the business was urgent and the service was available."

E. T. H. OXFORD

E. T. H. Oxford, local land man of the Sinclair Oil and Gas company and former member of the Canadian Royal flying corps, is enthusiastic over the opportunities the line would offer prospective passengers. "It would be necessary to maintain three planes, in order that one or two machines might be held in reserve all the time," he comments. "The line would be successful from passenger patronage alone. In my experience I have observed that flying is no longer considered hazardous by the greater percentage of laymen."

Mr. Oxford feels that the route should extend farther west than Roosevelt, by virtue of the increasing number of tourists who spend vacations on the Pacific coast each summer. It is his opinion that many of the travelers would take the air route each summer.

SAM C. ARNETT

"The project should prove successful," said Sam C. Arnett, president of the Citizens National bank. "One can not estimate the value of advertising such a plan would give Lubbock. Landing space would be an important factor. If suitable space can be obtained for landing

stations throughout the route, and if persons are educated to the safety of travel, the connection of the great area by air should prove profitable from many angles. I, for one, would travel by air, I believe."

WALTER S. POSEY

Walter S. Posey, vice president of the First National bank, is of the opinion that the line would aid appreciably in expediting mail and express service, although he appears a little dubious over availing himself of the opportunity of traveling high in the air just now. He expresses the opinion that in time the line would prove profitable.

JUDGE CLARK MULLICAN

WASHINGTON LETTER

**FIXING THE WHITE HOUSE
ROOF A TOUGH JOB**

WASHINGTON, June 20.—The
ordinary gent who mutters and
groans as he shells out \$300 to
have his roof reshingled was in-
clined to snuff suspiciously when
\$300,000 was appropriated to "fix
the roof" of the White House.

There was much wagging of
heads.
Anyone who has seen the tons of
steel, brick, tile and timber at the
White House portals, the great
crane on the lawn and other evi-
dence of extensive operations, will
realize how superfluous was all
that worry.

The wooden truss support on
which the second floor depended
so long—because supporting col-
umns had been pulled out to en-
large the rooms—is being replaced
by a structure of steel which will
be going business long after our
great-grandchildren have become
progenies.

The contractor can hardly be
making any exorbitant profit. He
was required to erect a temporary
protecting roof as he took off the
old one—which has made it appear
to tourists as if the White House
supported a full-fledged roof gar-
den. A temporary floor had to be
built over the second story also for
protection of pedestrians. The con-
tractor had to take out \$750,000
insurance, covering possible dam-
age to everything in sight, at the
same time guaranteeing to keep the
White House as snugly as possible
during operations.

And the roof is only part of the
job. For instance, the contractor
had to install seven new buildings,
seven new showers and 15 de-
vatories, as well as considerable
new marble work.

The weakness of the roof and the
full extent of the job to the presi-
dent and his family are said to
have been fully revealed only since
it was torn apart, but the danger
was really known all along.

Chairman William M. Butler of
the Republican National Committee
had the fruit of his life in even-
ing as he sat glibbing with Mr.
Coolidge. There was a sudden

earthquake had arrived and Butler
leaped from his chair like a man
who got on a tack.

settling," said Mr. Coolidge, tak-

Work would have begun on the
White House long before if the

of his characteristics that he de-
tests prolonged changes of scenery
which vary his accustomed routine
and remove him from all the con-
veniences of efficiency and com-
fort such as he enjoys at the White
House. He likes to have buttons
to push and his staff close by.

Thus, summer vacations are
something of a bugbear for him,
although necessary from a phys-
ical standpoint and highly advis-
able from a political standpoint.
The president considered it rather
a nuisance when he vacationed at
Swampscott and had to keep his
executive offices in Lynn. Appar-
ently this situation will be more
than duplicated in the Black Hills
this summer.

"Tools are handy," Mr. Cool-
idge is quoted as having explained
in an informal moment.

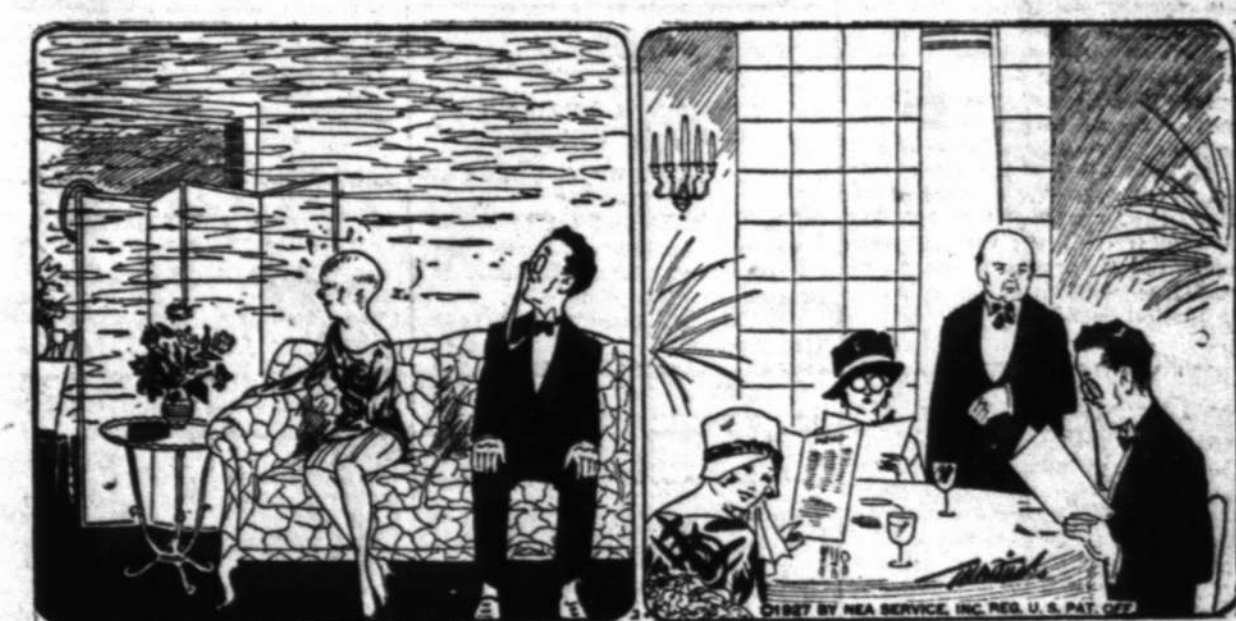

Miss Hill, whose work for the past few months has been confined to East Texas, said the kitchen of Mrs. Jones will rank favorably with any in the state, and that she has never seen a more efficient arrangement for kitchen work.

Improvements cost \$24.48. The improvement cost the labor in half, according to Miss Murray. Almost all the work of the kitchen arrangements was done by Mrs. Jones and her daughter, Margaret.

of the sea powers to engage in an unlimited competitive naval race. The Washington conference saw the origin of the now well known 5-5-2 ratio for capital ships, and the American idea in the present conference is that this ratio should prevail in determining the strength of other war craft.

Would Cut Size Of Battleships

GENEVA, June 20 (AP)—Reduction in the size of battleships of the future from the present limit of 35,000 tons to 20,000 tons, was recommended by W. C. Bridgman, first lord of the admiralty, Great Britain's representative at the tripartite naval conference, which this opened matters which had been settled by the Washington conference. Mr. Bridgman's advice was given during the session of individual submarines to 1,600 tons. He also suggested making the life of battleships 25 instead of 20 years, and that the three powers waive their rights under the replacement tables agreed upon in Washington.

Japan Needs Ships, Claim

TOKYO, June 20 (AP)—Admiral Kato, Japanese minister of the navy, declared in a statement today regarding naval reduction that it is absolutely necessary for Japan to keep as many auxiliary vessels as are needed for the security of the empire in time of peace, and that because Japan is dependent upon foreign countries for raw materials, the auxiliary vessels of which eleven will be completed by the end of 1928, and the replacement auxiliary vessels approved during the last session of the diet, represent the minimum requirements of the country, the minister said.

Germany May Be Given Seat

GENEVA, Switzerland, June 20 (AP)—There are indications that the League of Nations mandate commission, which began its sessions today, will vote to give Germany a seat on the commission. If given a seat Germany will have a voice in the administration of her former colonies.
