

In wake of break, jail security to be stepped up

While Chief of Police Wayne Gideon doesn't think security at the city jail has been lax, he will be taking steps to ensure that a repeat of last week's jail break won't happen.

Foremost among them are the prospect of closed-circuit TV monitoring of the lockup and the possibility of hiring additional jail personnel. Also, win-

dows on the second-floor will be kept locked and inmates will no longer be allowed to place tissue paper on the light fixtures to shield their eyes while they sleep.

The windows had been allowed to be kept open to enhance air flow in the jail's evaporative cooling system, and the tissue paper had the effect of darkening the cellblock from which four federal prisoners escaped June 11. They were still at large

this morning and are considered armed and dangerous.

"Contrary to what some people think," said Gideon, "the majority of prisoners are intelligent and all they have to do up there is plot ways to beat the system."

Terming the break "very, very well-planned," Gideon said the escapees employed a rope made of blanket strips, a walkie-talkie and a mop handle in the breakout. The walkie-talkie

was used to communicate with accomplices on the outside and had been smuggled into the jail by a trusty. The trusty may be charged with aiding and abetting the escape when the ongoing investigation is completed.

Using the mop handle and the makeshift rope, the prisoners were able to push out a heavy wire mesh screen on the bottom portion of the open second-floor window and haul several hacksaw blades and a large pipe

wrench into the jail. They then spent two to three days cutting through the bars that separated them from the window — periodically disposing of the metal filings and using toothpaste that matched the color of the bars to conceal their efforts.

Although the jail "is frequently checked," noted Gideon, inmates can hear jailers coming down the corridors and have time to hide what they may be doing. Gideon said the federal

prisoners were last "thoroughly checked" at 10 p.m. June 10. The night jailer goes off duty at 11 p.m., and it's then up to the desk sergeant to check inmates until the day jailer comes on duty in the morning.

But the desk sergeant has other responsibilities and, according to Gideon, additional jailers need to be employed by the department. Other measures to tighten security are under consideration.

House panel rejects tax cutting formula

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Ways and Means Committee, rejecting President Reagan's formula for business tax cuts, is endorsing a plan that would lower the maximum corporate tax and allow businesses to write off equipment investments all at once.

Key committee Democrats also have agreed to speed up Reagan's proposed reduction of the "marriage tax" on two-income couples as part of a two-year tax cut that would target most of the relief toward those earning less than \$50,000 a year.

The Senate Finance Committee, meanwhile, was meeting today to start writing its own tax bill, which is expected to include most of Reagan's recommendations.

The House committee's business tax plan would provide about the same half-trillion dollars in tax relief over the next 10 years that Reagan sought, but in a far different way.

As a stimulus to business investment, Reagan proposed that companies be allowed a quicker tax write-off — or depreciation — of money spent for buildings and machinery. Most

expenditures could be recovered through tax deductions over 15, five or three years.

The House committee, by a 20-14 vote Wednesday, recommended instead that businesses be allowed to write off the price of most machinery in the year it is bought.

The committee's plan also would reduce the maximum corporate tax rate from the current 46 percent to 34 percent by 1986 and aim other cuts at helping small business. But the Democratic plan would eliminate the investment tax credit, which now can wipe out up to 10 percent of the taxes a business owes.

The committee has not decided how most buildings should be treated in its plan. But members agreed to a Reagan-backed proposal, designed to help deteriorating inner cities, that would liberalize the investment tax credit for rehabilitating buildings.

Rep. Barber B. Conable of New York, the House committee's senior Republican, assailed the substitute as "a pig in a poke" that is geared to large corporations and does nothing to ensure added investment.

A faster reduction in the "marriage tax" than would be allowed under Reagan's plan was put forward Wednesday by a five-member task force of Democrats on the committee.

Reagan wants to give two-income couples, who often pay more taxes than if they were single, a special tax deduction of up to \$1,500 in 1982 and up to \$3,000 in 1983 and later years. The Democrats want the full \$3,000 to take effect next year.

Overall, the Democrats' basic tax cuts and marriage-tax reduction would focus 67.5 percent of the relief on taxpayers with incomes of \$15,000 to \$50,000 a year, said Rep. Ken Holland, D-S.C., who heads the task force. That group would get 57 percent of the cuts in the president's proposal, he said.

The task force expects to present its recommendations to the committee next week. The Democratic plan would cut taxes in two years, starting Oct. 1, rather than three years as the president wants.

Commissioners hear few complaints on valuations

Midland County commissioners turned "tax men" Wednesday, reduced the assessed valuations on oil, gas and other minerals and on the capital structure of Midland's six banks by 20 percent, and, like the fellow waiting for the street car that never showed up, just waited.

The wrath of the taxpayers seemed to bypass the commissioners, who were into their final meeting as the board of equalization. They received nearly a complaint on the county's \$1.06 billion in assessed valuations.

"We need a domino game started," joked Commissioner Win Brown amid the lull of waiting.

Complaints were almost nil last year, too.

"They (taxpayers) just wanted to complain about taxes in general," recalled Commissioner Durward Wright. He said the taxpayer weren't

unhappy with the county's valuations on taxable property, but were using the commissioners "as a sounding board," Wright said.

The board began its day-long wait by knocking off 20 percent of the assessed valuations of banks and on oil, gas and other minerals appraised on 1981 values.

"They (the banks and minerals) had 1981 values, and all the other (real) property had 1957 valuations," Commissioner Charlie Welch said in explaining why the valuations were reduced to make them equitable with other property.

While the Midland banks and county-wide minerals were subject to the "inflationary" values of 1980 or 1981, other property is being taxed by the county on values of the late 1950s. "That can hardly be equal," said Welch.

"The situation was out of bounds, but we corrected it," he said. Representations of the banks ex-

pressed much satisfaction with the measures, which the county's board of equalization accorded mineral interests last year but not then to the banks.

"Charlie, we appreciated it (the 20 percent cut) then too," said Ray Clayton, the Tulsa, Okla., tax representative for Cities Services Co.

"We're glad to be a part of Midland County," he said. With a value in excess of \$100 million, Cities Services is Midland County's largest taxpayer.

"We're glad to have you," said Wright.

Midland County's tax revenue is based on \$1.6 billion in assessed valuations. County tax revenue in 1981 is expected to total \$5 million, though the new county tax rate has not yet

U.S., Iraq negotiating a U.N. resolution

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The United States and Iraq are trying to negotiate a veto-proof U.N. Security Council resolution that would condemn Israel for its destruction of an Iraqi nuclear reactor.

The Reagan administration said, meanwhile, it could not support Israel's claim that Iraq was planning to build an atomic bomb at the Baghdad

reactor. That assessment drew a sharp rebuke from Israel's friends in Congress.

"There's been some movement, there's been some hope" of negotiating a resolution acceptable to all sides, U.S. Ambassador Jeane J. Kirkpatrick told reporters Wednesday night after working for two hours on a draft resolution with Iraqi Foreign

Minister Saadoun Hammadi, Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim and the ambassadors of Britain and Mexico. She said she would confer with officials in Washington on the new draft.

Hammadi said there "could be a consensus or there could be a breakdown."

Mrs. Kirkpatrick would not say

whether the draft called for sanctions against Israel. U.S. officials have said privately that Washington might support a resolution condemning Israel's June 7 raid and calling for compensation to Iraq, but certainly would veto sanctions or "reparations."

The 15-member council has spent five days debating Iraq's demand that Israel be punished for destroying

the Baghdad reactor. Israel claims it bombed the reactor to stall Iraqi plans to build atomic bombs for use against the Jewish state.

It takes nine affirmative council votes to adopt a resolution, but any of the five permanent members — the United States, the Soviet Union, China, France or Britain — can veto it.

Efforts to extinguish fire at Rankin well site delayed

RANKIN — Preparations are being made for the use of explosives in an effort to kill an oil well fire that has been burning out of control for six days about seven miles southwest of this West Texas town.

Oil well fire experts Boots & Coots Inc., along with about 50 other contracted firefighters, will try to halt the blaze by blowing out the well with explosives, but it probably won't happen until sometime next week, officials from Terra Resources, the Houston firm that owns the well, said this morning.

Iron debris is being cleared from the site to prevent re-ignition of escaping oil and gas once the fire is put out.

The initial explosion last Friday, possibly the result of a pressure build-up, destroyed three mobile homes and a derrick, officials said. A six-member drilling crew at the site when the fire broke out escaped unharmed.

Officials said the cause of the fire is still under investigation.

Bentsen may be hard to beat

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. John Tower, R-Texas, has warned fellow Republicans that Democratic Sen. Lloyd Bentsen will be hard to defeat in the 1982 elections.

"I think Lloyd is in very good position politically in the state and will be a very formidable candidate," said Tower.

Rep. Jim Collins of Dallas and State Sen. Walter Mengden are contemplating a challenge of Bentsen, but neither has asked his advice, Tower said.

His advice, he said, "would depend on who the person was and what the political situation was at the time. But I would think it would be fairly confidential advice, and I would not tell the press."

In a news conference, Tower refused to be drawn into any remarks that might be taken as critical of Bentsen, who three years ago took a virtually neutral position and gave little support to the race that then Rep. Bob Krueger made against Tower.

A reporter asked Tower's opinion of a pollster's view that the best way for Republicans to beat Bentsen is to portray him as a wealthy Texan out of touch with the voters.

"I think I'd have no comment on that," Tower said.

Shouldn't the GOP concentrate its resources toward electing Gov. Bill Clements and getting more Republicans elected to the House, somebody else asked?

"I think obviously the major Republican effort should be on winnable races. Period," Tower said.

"Obviously, there are some very qualified Democrats whose views on national issues probably more closely coincide with the consensus Republican view than with the consensus Democratic view. Obviously we'd like to have them," Tower said.

Tower was asked specifically if Reps. Phil Gramm of College Station and Kent Hance of Lubbock, who have played leading roles in pushing President Reagan's spending and tax cut programs, are among the "very qualified" possible converts.

"I'm not going to call out names," Tower said.

London paper says Charles receives 'sour hello' in New York

LONDON (AP) — Prince Charles got a cool reception in New York City, British newspapers complained today.

"New York's Sour Hello," said the conservative Daily Express in a banner headline, while the more restrained Times of London reported that the heir to the British throne received "a coolish welcome."

Anti-British demonstrations by Irish Republican Army sympathizers and criticisms by New York state and city officials of British policy in Northern Ireland were treated prominently in the British press.

Charles, due back in Britain later today, made his first visit to New York to attend a gala performance by Britain's Royal Ballet Company.

New York City Mayor Edward Koch was widely reported as saying

that if British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher had been the visitor he would have "socked it to her" over strife-torn Northern Ireland.

Lt. Gov. Mario Cuomo grabbed the attention of Fleet Street, Britain's newspaper row, by noting before Charles arrived that the prince symbolized Britain's "oppressive system" in Northern Ireland.

The Times said that apart from political criticisms, "There was also a mean-spirited quarrel about who should pay the \$300,000 for police protection during his 24-hour stay." Because the prince is not a head of state, the federal government declined to pay for security, leaving the city to pick up the tab.

The Times said Charles, complaining of laryngitis, was a "bit sharp" with reporters,

while the Express said he "seemed giggled." "Mob Rages at Charles," the mass circulation tabloid Sun said of the demonstrators. The Sun's headline quoted Koch as saying: "The British Should Just Get the Hell Out of Ireland."

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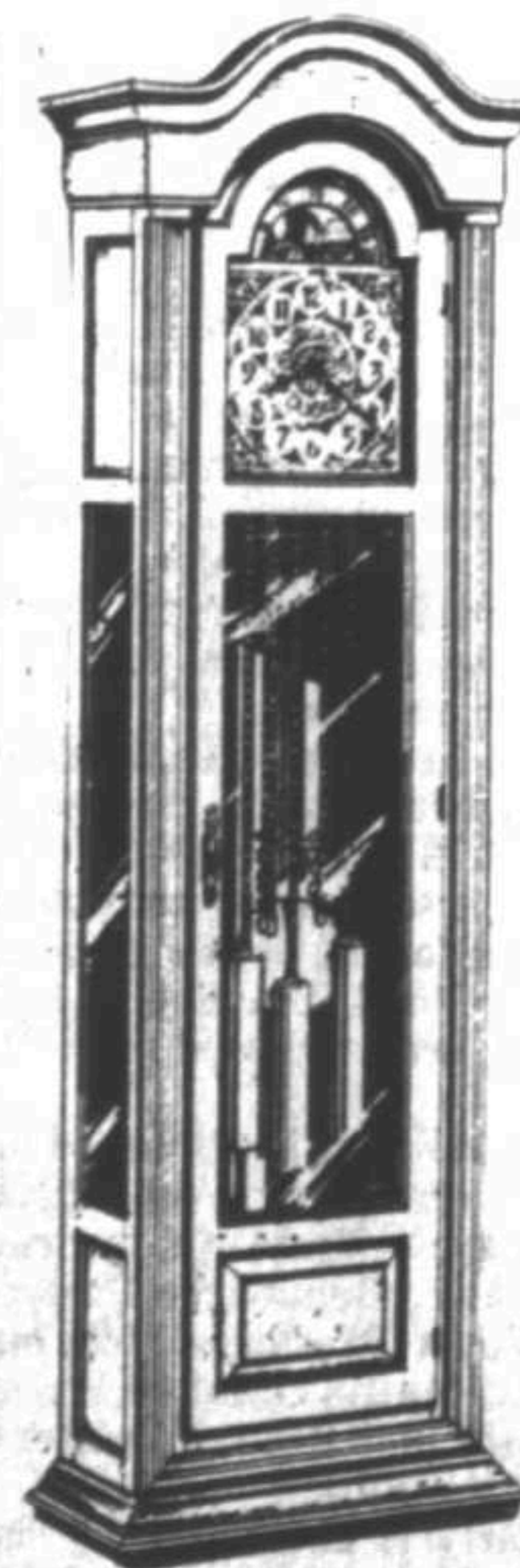


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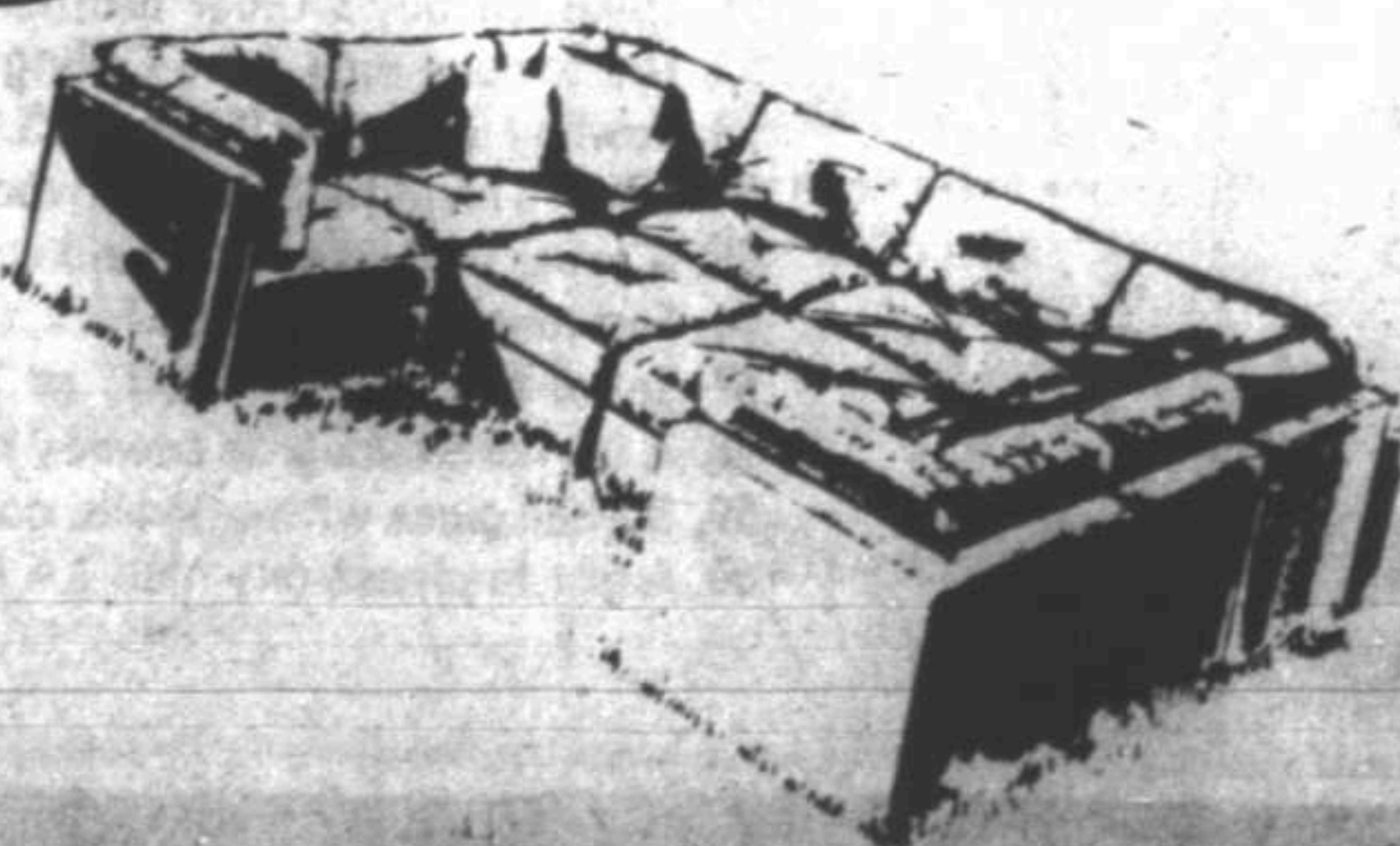

Iranian president missing

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Iranian President Abolhasan Bani-Sadr has vanished from view, apparently on the run from his fundamentalist opponents. His relatives and close friends said today they had no word on his whereabouts.

"I have not got any information on him or his family," Bani-Sadr's sister Robabeh Sakineh, a nuclear physicist, said when reached in her Tehran residence by telephone from The Associated Press office in Beirut. "We have entrusted him to God. May God keep him."

Other sources in Tehran said there were unconfirmed reports that the now-powerless president had taken refuge in his native city Hamadan, in western Iran, as the nation's parliament prepared to debate his political fate on Saturday.

THERE WAS speculation that the first elected president in Iran's history was planning to flee to Paris, where he spent 16 years in exile during the reign of the late Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi.

But Mehdi Bazargan, Iran's first post-revolution prime minister and a Bani-Sadr friend and supporter, told The AP in a telephone interview he believed the president still was somewhere in the capital.

"He is more likely in Tehran. But I am only guessing," Bazargan said. "We, my wife and I, called on him and his wife at his presidential residence four days ago. We saw them."

Since that visit, Bazargan said, Islamic Revolutionary Guards seized the residence and are still surrounding it.

BAZARGAN SAID he and his supporters in the Freedom Movement and the moderate National Front Party have resolved to boycott Saturday's debate and all other open sessions of Parliament "because we are being threatened and insulted and we are all in physical danger."

Bani-Sadr, 47, has not been seen in public since Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, the leader of the revolutionary regime, stripped him last week of his last position of power, commander-in-chief of the armed forces. His office stopped answering telephone calls from abroad Wednesday.

Meanwhile, Bani-Sadr's foes controlling the Majlis, Iran's parliament, agreed Wednesday on ground rules for the debate on his performance as president. It is expected to end in a vote recommending that Khomeini remove him from office and possibly that he be put on trial.

Soldier charged in shootings found insane

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — An American soldier charged with murdering four fellow soldiers during rifle practice on a firing range has been found to be insane and will be returned to the United States for treatment, a military spokesman said today.

The spokesman said an Army sanity board returned its findings Wednesday after evaluating Spec. 4 Archie R. Bell III, 21, of Long Branch, N.J. After his treatment, Bell could still be brought to trial on the charges of murder and attempted murder.

Four American soldiers were killed and a fifth was wounded in a spray of M-16 automatic rifle fire June 5 on the range at Camp Casey, 24 miles north of Seoul.

Bell's arrest was announced soon after the shootings. Five days later, the 8th U.S. Army announced that a second American soldier, Pvt. Lacy M. Harrington, 19, of Baltimore, was arrested and charged with murder — but in only one of the four deaths.

The spokesman said today that Harrington also has been evaluated by a sanity board, but its findings have not yet been disclosed. The spokesman said Harrington remained in the custody of military authorities at the 8th U.S. Army confinement facility, Camp Humphreys, south of Seoul.

At the time Harrington's arrest was announced,

the army said investigators were trying to determine if there had been collusion between the two men and if there was a racial motive to the shootings. Harrington and Bell are black and the five soldiers who were shot were white.

The spokesman said today the possible racial motive is still under investigation and has not been ruled out. He declined to provide further details of the investigation.

In Bell's case, the spokesman said, the sanity board "found that Bell was insane at the time of the June 5 incident and that he does not possess sufficient mental capacity to cooperate in his own defense."

Hunger strikers in poor condition

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Four Polish hunger strikers are in poor condition after fasting for 18 days, suffering from lack of sugar, exhaustion and apathy, a spokeswoman for the independent union Solidarity said.

The strikers are seeking clemency for two brothers, Jerzy and Ryszard Kowalczyk, sentenced to 25 years in prison in 1971 for blowing up a building in the southern city of Opole. A parliamentary committee studying their case is expected to submit a clemency petition this week to the Council of State, which can issue pardons.

The Solidarity spokeswoman said if the strikers' condition continues to deteriorate, the four will be taken to a hospital and fed intravenously.

China, U.S. operating secret listening post

NEW YORK (AP) — The United States and China are jointly operating a listening post in China to monitor Soviet missile tests, according to published reports.

The eavesdropping facility, which has been in operation for the past year, is in a western region close to the Soviet border and has filled a critical vacuum created when similar stations in Iran were lost during the Iranian revolution two years ago. The New York Times quotes senior American officials as saying.

The American officials had sought to keep the existence of the intelligence-gathering station a secret, fearing that disclosure could adversely affect both countries' relations with the Soviet Union, reports by the Times and NBC news said.

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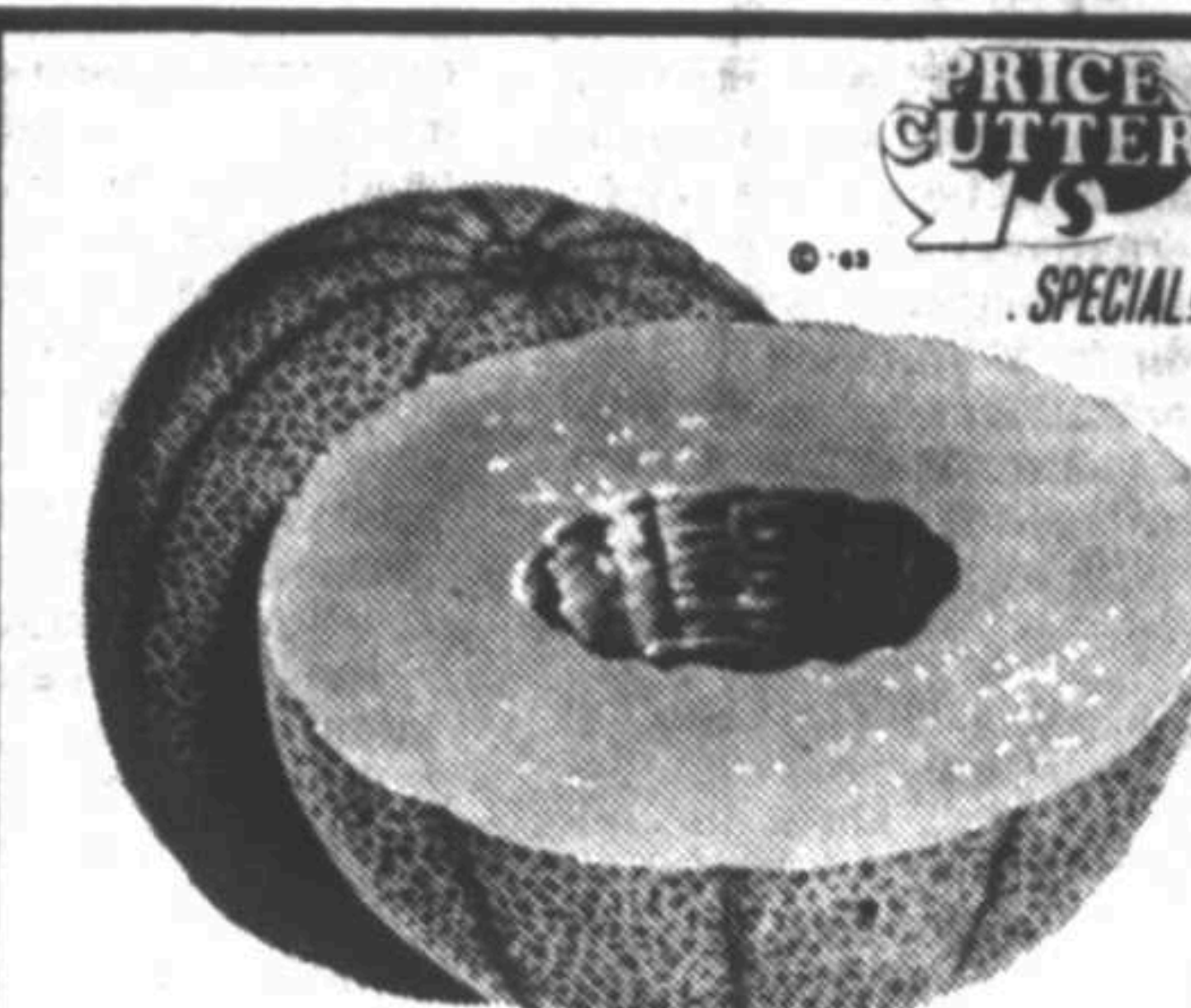
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Doctors kill defective fetus, save normal twin

WASHINGTON (AP) — A coalition of minority rights groups is asking the Reagan administration, which rejected an international code on infant formula marketing, to strictly regulate the industry in America.

The organizations say millions of dollars and thousands of lives can be saved by promoting breast feeding for babies born to poor people in this country.

The Senate, meanwhile, was voting today on a bipartisan resolution that expressed "concern" about the administration's position on the infant formula issue. The House on Tuesday said it was "dismayed" that the administration opposed the code.

Public Advocates Inc., a San Francisco law firm representing the minority rights coalition, told a House Commerce subcommittee Wednesday that the Food and Drug Administration should force formula makers to state on package labels that "Breast is Best."

The labels should be written in Spanish as well as English, the coalition said.

A spokesman for the baby formula industry said the rights groups were trying to force their ideas on the nation's mothers, regardless of their preference.

The Infant Formula Council of Atlanta, representing the formula makers, also said the rights groups were using outdated and misleading figures in seeking to scare people about the use of infant formula. There has been a sharp decline in infant deaths in the last 10 years, including those born to poorer families, the council said.

Robert C. Gelardi, head of the council, said opponents of formula "appeared to be proposing a campaign of enforced universal breast feeding regardless of the mother's or the physician's choice."

The United States stood alone last month as 118 other nations in the World Health Organization adopted a voluntary code aimed at controlling the advertising and marketing of infant formula in developing Third World countries.

Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., who is sponsoring the Senate resolution with Sen. David Durenberger, R-Minn., said that "to cast the lone negative vote was detrimental to our national and international interests."

The resolution, introduced as an amendment to a measure authorizing \$4 billion in spending by the State Department and related agencies, says Congress is "concerned" about the negative vote and "further concerned that the vote has subjected United States policy to widespread misinterpretation."

At the House Commerce subcommittee hearing Wednesday, Public Advocates also proposed that Medicaid payments be cut off to hospitals that permit formula makers to give away free samples to new mothers. Angela Blackwell of Public Advoca-

tes said promotion of breast feeding in poorer communities could save nearly \$400 million a year in public health costs.

"We do recognize that our proposal may present some philosophical problems for the present administration," she said. "If the Reagan administration is discomforted by our proposals, it is incumbent upon them ... to develop alternative plans."

The law firm said that at least 5,000 infant deaths each year in the United States are caused by misuse of infant formula and bottle feeding among poorer families.

The rights groups also accused the medical profession of condoning aggressive promotional practices by formula makers, particularly among poor blacks and Hispanics.

They charged that doctors and hospitals contribute to what they said is an epidemic of death and disease among newborn babies in the United States caused by formula misuse.

"Many hospitals, particularly those serving large low-income populations, do not provide an atmosphere conducive to breast feeding," said Lois Salisbury of Public Advocates.

"Hospital practices such as the distribution of free samples of infant formula and literature published by the formula companies obviously promote formula use," she said. "These promotional practices capitalize on a void left by an indifferent medical profession which has failed to acknowledge its critical influence on parents' choices," she said.

Swimmers ear prevails in damp, humid weather

Dear Dr. Solomon: I love water sports and during the summer months I spend most of my free time at the beach. Last summer, while on vacation, I developed an ear infection that caused me a great deal of pain. In fact, it forced me to go to a local clinic for treatment. I guess I haven't given you much of a clue, but do you have any idea what the condition was and how it can be avoided? — Mike

Dear Mike: Since you say you spend most of your free time at the beach, an educated guess would be that you may have had a condition called "swimmer's ear," an inflammation of the skin of the ear canal. As the name suggests, it very often occurs among people who spend a great deal of time in the water, and is most prevalent in hot, humid areas.

An ear that is chronically damp becomes a breeding ground for bacteria and fungi, and this can eventually lead to pain and crusting in the ear. The pain generally increases with chewing and other movements of the jaw.

From a treatment standpoint, it is essential to identify the cause of the swimmer's ear, whether a fungus, virus, or bacteria, so that the proper medication can be prescribed. According to Dr. Howard S. Farmer, clinical associate professor of surgery at the Rutgers Medical School, treatment is fairly simple once the cause is identified.

If the ear is abscessed, it must be drained before any medication that is used can be effective. It may also be

necessary to use suction to remove matter which might prevent the medication from reaching the infected area. Of course it is not advisable for the patient to go into the water until the condition has completely cleared up.

The only preventive measure is to keep the ear from remaining wet all the time. If you want to swim, do so for three to four hours at a time, and be certain to dry your ears thoroughly. This ounce of prevention may enable you to enjoy your summer at the beach without subjecting yourself to a recurrence of the painful swimmer's ear.

Dear Dr. Solomon: An uncle of mine who lives with me and my family has been diagnosed as having active tuberculosis. Is there anything I should be doing to protect myself and my family? — Mr. T.V.B.

Dear Mr. B.: Anyone who has been in close contact with an individual who has active tuberculosis should be screened. You don't even have to have lived under the same roof; even sharing an office in close proximity to each other calls for precautionary measures.

Specifically, you should arrange for a tuberculin skin test. If the result is negative, the test should be repeated six weeks after there is no longer any exposure to the infected person. If the second test is positive, then X rays are in order.

I suggest you check with your doctor, who can make all necessary arrangements for you and the other members of your family.

New surgeon general choice facing obstacles

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan's choice for surgeon general is facing new obstacles in Congress, but his supporters vow to skirt procedural roadblocks and steer his nomination through the Senate.

House conferees on Wednesday effectively delayed the formal nomination of Dr. C. Everett Koop as surgeon general by refusing to modify an amendment that requires a surgeon general to be no older than 64. Koop is nearing 65.

Koop has been criticized most frequently because of his outspoken position against abortion. His critics say the Reagan administration nominated him only to satisfy anti-abortion activists who have supported the president. They also contend that he is politically intolerant and therefore is not a good choice for the high-visibility job of surgeon general.

The American Public Health Association, breaking its past record of neutrality, said it opposed the nomination, arguing that Koop does not have public health service experience.

Koop's nomination has been caught in a partisan crossfire not only because of his ideological stands but also because of the way the administration chose to advance his nomination. The amendment removing the age obstacle was attached to an unrelated credit card bill by Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., a maneuver which angered many House Democrats.

But Helms' amendment would not have removed another stumbling block to Koop's nomination. There also is a legal requirement that Public Health Service Corps officers retire at 64 and the Helms amendment did not address that barrier.

When the conferees met, Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, asked the House members to lay aside the

Helms amendment and adopt new language that would make Koop eligible to be surgeon general. He noted that opponents of Koop still would have a chance to stop his nomination during the Senate confirmation process.

But the House members declined and adopted the flawed Helms amendment instead. Their action freed the fairly uncontroversial credit card bill for final action but left Koop's nomination "in limbo," Hatch said.

"We'll go through this again," Hatch said. "I suspect somebody

in the Senate will add another amendment to a must-have bill," he predicted.

Koop already is serving in the Reagan administration as deputy assistant secretary for health.

Hatch said he didn't expect the administration to give up on Koop's nomination.

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Regulation on baby formula sought

BOSTON (AP) — Doctors punctured the heart of a defective 5-month-old fetus and left it to wither away in the womb beside its normal twin because the mother decided she "could not face the burden of caring for an abnormal child."

The procedure, done last year at New York's Mount Sinai School of Medicine, was the first successful operation of its kind in this country and only the second in today's New England Journal of Medicine.

It immediately was denounced by anti-abortion activists.

"I don't know of anybody in the Right to Life movement who would be complacent about this operation," said Vincent Euk, vice chairman of the New York State Right-to-Life Party.

The journal said Drs. Thomas D. Kerenyi and Usha Chitkara decided to try the procedure — already done successfully in Sweden — after a genetic test called amniocentesis re-

vealed the 40-year-old woman was carrying one twin with Down's syndrome, which causes retardation and physical abnormalities. The two doctors held a news conference Wednesday in New York City.

The previously childless woman had been having trouble getting pregnant and "desperately wanted to have the normal child but could not face the burden of caring for an abnormal child the rest of her life," her doctors reported.

"If it (the operation) had been refused," the doctors said, "she would have chosen to abort both fetuses."

The doctors reported that the abnormal fetus was killed by withdrawing about half its blood through a hollow needle inserted in its heart, which then stopped beating.

About four months later, the woman delivered a normal baby boy, who now is 7 months old. The remains of the other fetus were delivered as paper-thin fragments of dead tissue.

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Administration rebuked for doubting Israel

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration is drawing a sharp rebuke from Israel's friends in Congress for questioning the Jewish state's assertion that its bombing of an Iraqi nuclear reactor was an act of self-defense.

Undersecretary of State Walter J. Stoessel testified at a House hearing Wednesday that the administration does not agree with Israel's declaration that Iraq had decided to develop nuclear weapons.

Several of Israel's House backers attacked Stoessel's assessment and Senate Democratic Whip Alan Cranston said he intended to refute it today at a Senate Foreign Relations Com-

mittee hearing.

Cranston refused to give details, but aides said he has evidence that international safeguards now in force would have been useless to keep Iraq from developing nuclear weapons.

Cranston said it is true that Iraq was not already developing nuclear weapons but said "there are compelling reasons to believe" it intended to do so if Israel had not destroyed its reactor.

"We can sit here and suggest they may not have exercised that option," Cranston said, "but Israel could not take that chance."

The argument stretches beyond semantics. U.S. law requires cutting off aid to Israel if its use of American-supplied planes to bomb the reactor June 7 was aggression and not an act

of self-defense, as Israel says.

Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin said Sunday that he has "absolutely sure information from the best and most reliable sources" that Iraq intended to develop nuclear weapons and use them against Israel.

Although the Reagan administration has not decided whether Israel violated the U.S. aid law, Stoessel told two House subcommittees Wednesday that it does not agree with Begin's statement.

"We have not made any definitive conclusion that they (the Iraqis) were aiming at a weapons program," Stoessel testified.

"So you don't agree with Israel that Iraq was making a nuclear bomb?" Rep. Lee Hamilton, D-Ind., asked.

"No, we would not agree with that

position by Israel," Stoessel said. "We were not able to make a definitive judgment ourselves which would confirm Israel's position."

"Do you agree that Iraq ultimately sought nuclear weapons?" Hamilton asked.

"No, we have no definitive confirmation of that," Stoessel said.

But he said "we were concerned about the Iraqi nuclear program ... because it would eventually give Iraq the capability to build an atomic weapon."

Rep. Stephen J. Solarz, D-N.Y., told Stoessel he was "amazed and appalled" by the administration's assessment.

Mayors conclude annual convention

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — The nation's mayors have ended their annual convention "in tune with the 1980s" but demanding that cities be given a fair shake by the Reagan administration.

For the first time in 50 years, the U.S. Conference of Mayors didn't ask for new federal money. But they made it clear they didn't want their cities to suffer steep cuts in federal funding either.

"I think we've seen some softening of earlier positions we've taken," said Mayor Helen Boosalis of Lincoln, Neb., a Democrat who took over as conference president Wednesday, the last day of the five-day meeting. "And I think we're in tune with the 1980s."

The conference, which began acrimoniously Saturday, adopted resolutions criticizing some Reagan programs, asking safeguards over others and demanding a better break in the federal budget.

Outgoing chairman Richard Hatcher of Gary, Ind., said the conference "expressed some great concerns regarding some of the (Reagan) policies that are currently under consideration."

"We are concerned about the poor in our cities, we are concerned with the working poor, we're concerned with the middle class, we are concerned about mass transit, we're concerned about health and our children and education," Hatcher said. "And I think those concerns have been reflected in the resolutions which have been adopted by this body."

One of those resolutions demanded "parity" for domestic programs with military spending and said urban programs should be funded "adequately to meet the needs of the nation's cities."

But language critical of President Reagan and the Pentagon was softened before the resolution passed by a bi-partisan 70-41 vote. Democrats control a majority of the nation's city halls.

Many of the mayors in both parties said they were concerned by a Reagan proposal to eliminate federal aid programs for local communities and convert them into block grants to the states.

Many speakers said they didn't trust the states to provide for the cities if given the money with no strings attached.

Republican Mayor Richard Carver of Peoria said the convention "suggests the U.S. Conference of Mayors is moving into the 1980s very much in step with the Reagan administration."

But when Carver attempted to get a resolution saying the mayors are unopposed to block grants in principle, he was voted down 92-37. The resolution that passed said, in effect, that if federal money is given to the states in block grants, the cities want built-in guarantees that the states will pass along the money to the cities fairly and efficiently.

French disclose secret agreement with Iraqis

PARIS (AP) — French officials have disclosed a secret agreement which they said gave France the right to oversee the operation of Iraq's nuclear reactor until 1989 to prevent the Arab nation from building a nuclear bomb.

The reactor in Baghdad was destroyed this month by an Israeli bomber. Israel said it had information that the Iraqis planned to use the reactor to manufacture atomic weapons.

Michael Pecqueur, chief administrator of the French Atomic Energy Commission, disclosed to reporters from the newspaper Le Monde and other newspapers and radio stations this week the terms of a secret agreement between France and Iraq signed in 1979.

Pecqueur said the agreement would have prevented Iraq from using the reactor to build a nuclear bomb. There was no immediate comment from Iraq.

The agreement, Pecqueur said, provided for all experimental programs to be developed by a joint committee of experts of the two countries, chaired by the heads of their atomic energy commissions.

French technicians were to take part in the operation of the reactor through 1988, with a constant French presence on the site, he said. Pecqueur said the French technicians, combined with inspections by the In-

ternational Atomic Energy Agency, would totally prevent Iraq from developing atomic weapons.

He added that the French technicians as well as the IAEA inspectors would have easily detected the unauthorized irradiation or removal of the large quantities of uranium which would be involved in building a nuclear bomb.

France's immediate reaction would have been to stop deliveries of highly enriched uranium, and the amounts left in Iraq would have been insufficient to make a weapon, he said.

"Even if you envisage the worst hypothesis of a simultaneous renunciation of all engagements and controls, the fuel supply cutoff that would immediately result would make it impossible to produce militarily significant quantities of fissile material," Pecqueur was quoted as saying Thursday in a dispatch from Paris in the New York Times.

Le Monde said the agreement "above all had a political connotation, because it withdrew from Iraq all possibility of using the installations secretly."

The newspaper said that if the agreement had been made public from the start, "it would have enabled a lot of doubts about the controversial project to be lifted," but the administration of former President Valéry Giscard d'Estaing did not wish it, "and today, it is too late."

Publicity surprises principal

HOUSTON (AP) — The principal of a school which had planned to offer a summer course to teach children to shoot guns says he is astounded by the amount of publicity the idea generated.

"Gosh, we got calls from everywhere," said Kenneth Royal, principal of Clear Lake Elementary School. "I got a letter from a gal in Chicago who said I was a legend in Chicago."

The course was canceled Wednesday because not enough students signed up.

"We only got about 11 and we needed 18 to make the class," Royal said.

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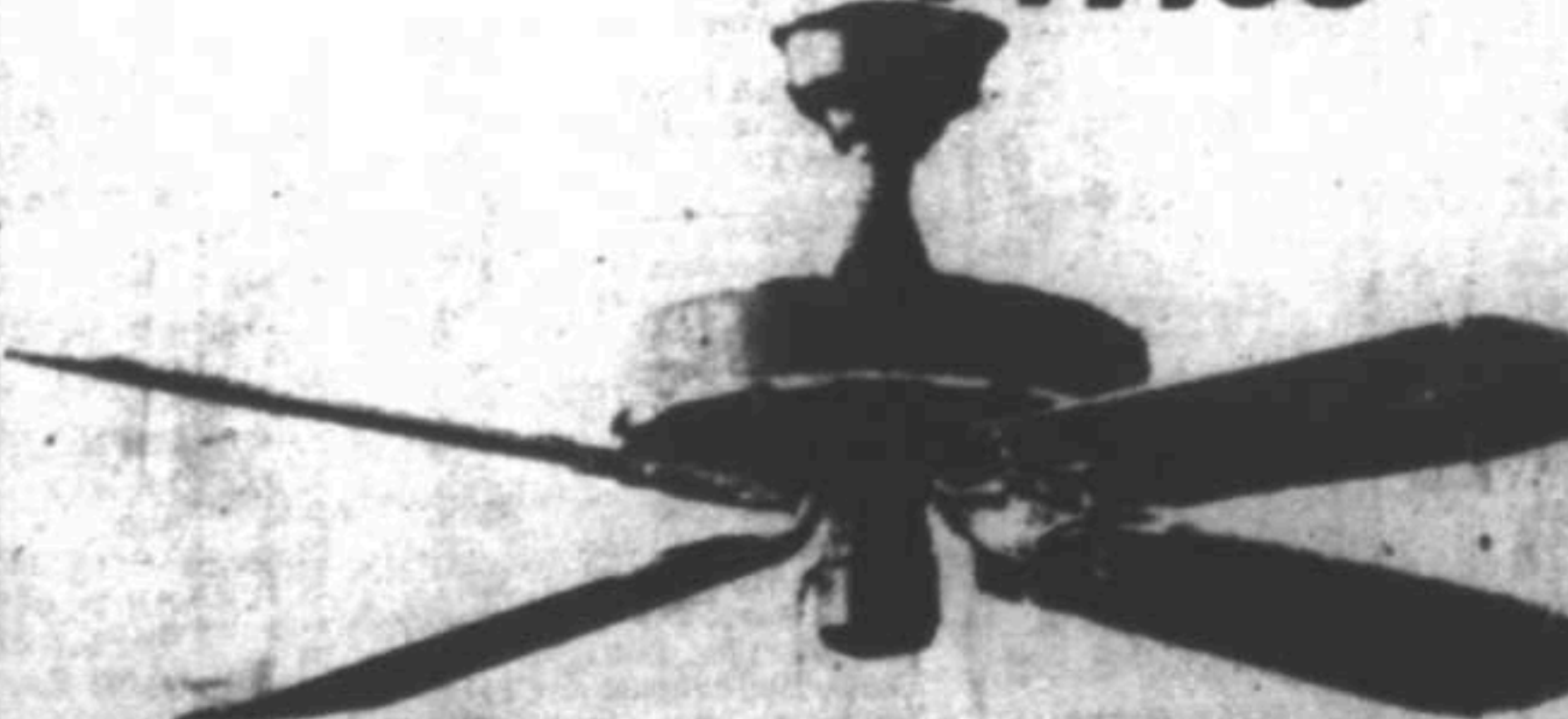
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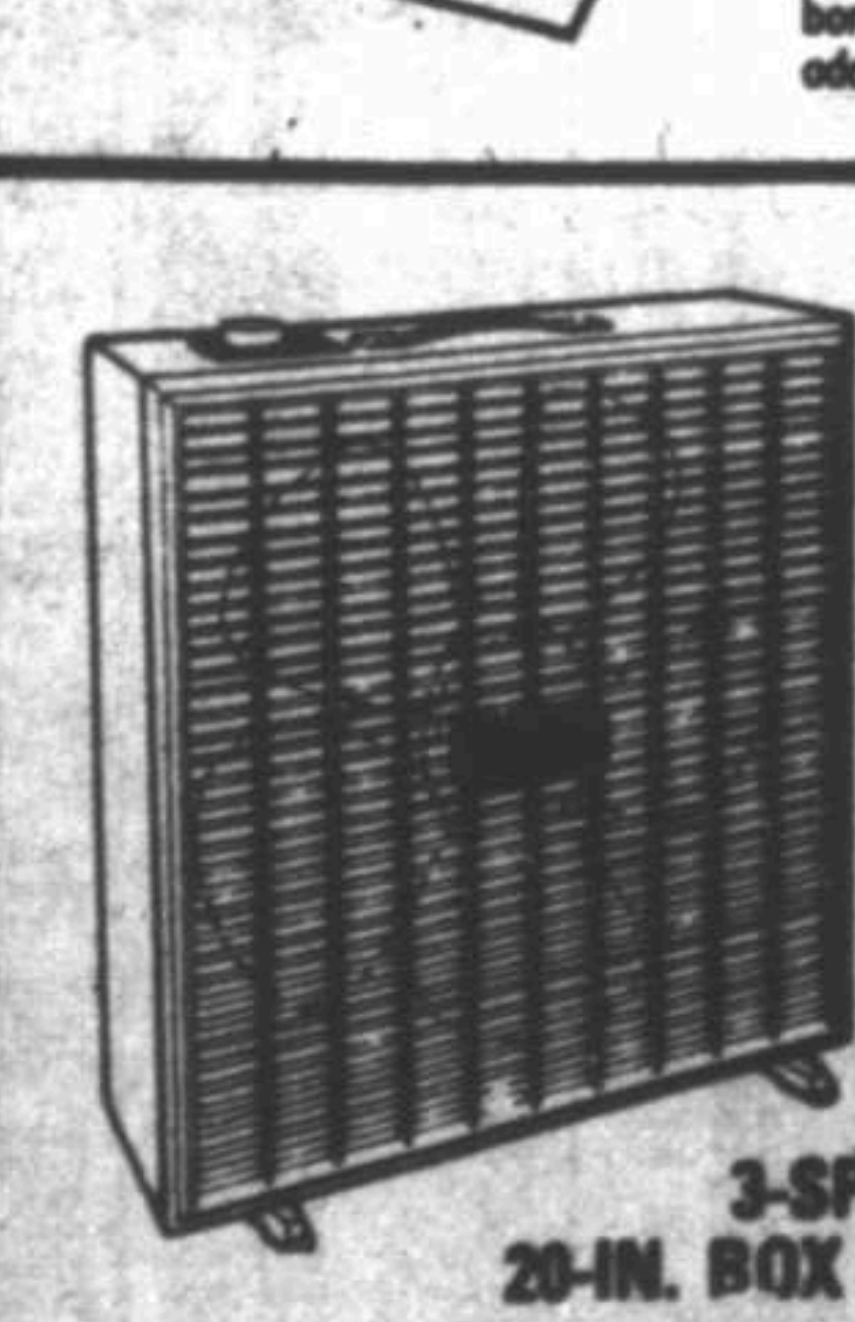

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Business Mirror Theory on cause, cure of inflation called 'mad'

NEW YORK (AP) — It is now almost an article of faith that domestic inflation is caused by excessive growth of the money supply, and it is a dictum of monetary policy that high interest rates are the cure.

It is the uncritical acceptance of this analysis, and the resulting course of action, that explains why men such as John Wright can be seen holding their heads and looking baffled, frustrated and angry.

To Wright, who founded and presides over a large consulting service for institutional investors, including many important banks, the theory is mindless and the course of action destructive. In short, it is mad.

If continued, he states in an analysis issued recently from Wright Investors' Service headquarters in Bridgeport, Conn., the current high interest rates "will destroy the American economic system."

First, "they take from the poor and add to the rich," says Wright, whose own portfolio choices regularly include the bluest of blue chip stocks. He is not against the rich; he is against poorness. Next, he says, they diminish the producers and expand the lenders, and in his view of things that is somewhat contrary to the desires of most Americans. In his view, people have an instinctive desire to produce.

The list continues. High rates "inhibit and diminish long-term capital investment, productivity, research and development, production and development of new sources and efficient applications of energy."

"They are," he states, "bankrupting small businesses, increasing the concentration of economic productive power, drastically reducing effective competitive price cutting and have caused the high rate of bankruptcies in our history since the Great Depression."

Memo shows supervisor
allowed disapproved pour

HOUSTON (AP) — A memo introduced at a hearing on the South Texas Nuclear Project shows that an inspector refused to approve a concrete pour that was eventually cited in a report that led to a \$100,000 fine.

Intervenor opposing the \$2.7 billion project produced the memo, written by lead inspector R.C. Forte, during testimony Tuesday before a Nuclear Regulatory Commission board which will decide whether to grant an operating license to Houston Lighting & Power.

Forte wrote in the April 1979 memo that he refused to approve the pour because he found sand, mill scale and rust, paper, cigarette butts, candy wrappers, scrap wire and other debris on the pour surface.

But, he said, the pour was made after quality control supervisor Charles Singleton gave his consent after a cursory check.

The NRC cited that pour in a report that led to the fine and an order that Houston Lighting & Power show cause why construction should continue at the plant.

In other action Tuesday, the NRC board questioned Brown & Root executive Dr. Knox M. Broom Jr. about the high turnover rate of project managers and site managers in the past four and one-half years.

Board member Ernest E. Hill said that in that period, there have been six project managers and seven site managers.

Broom responded that some managers were removed because of cost overruns and construction lags, and others apparently left for other jobs.

He said neither Brown & Root nor Houston Lighting & Power was happy with the situation.

"We like to have continuity in these assignments and prefer that someone occupy them for at least several years," Broom said.

Both Broom and another company executive, Steve H. Grote, said they did not believe there was a direct connection between the high turnover rate and construction problems at the \$2.7 billion project near Bay City.

Refinery fire won't curtail production

ABILENE, Texas (AP) — A spectacular fire at the Prude Refining Co. that ripped the roof from a storage tank and burned for 2 1/2 hours won't significantly affect production at the facility, a company spokesman says.

"It has not affected our production to any great extent except when concerning the use of that storage tank," vice president Tommy Broyles said Tuesday.

The blaze, which broke out late

Monday after lightning hit a 70,000-barrel tank that held fuel oil, was visible from two miles away. About 90 firefighters finally brought the fire under control.

No injuries were reported and a damage estimate was not available.

Two years ago, a fire ripped through the refinery, injuring 14 workers and halting production for 4 1/2 months.
