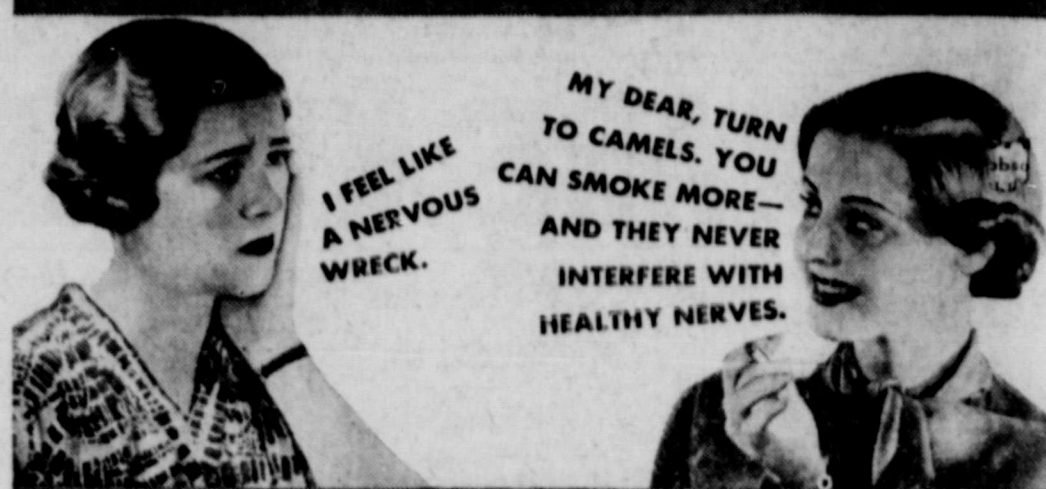

France Is Looking For New Prestige

PARIS.—With French colonial authorities preparing for a second "French Ottawa" conference, advocates of a bigger and better French Empire are hammering away at France's new prestige in the Far East.

Frenchmen touring Far Eastern waters on the slowly increasing French merchant fleet are beginning to ask why in the Far East, is everything British. It is explained that in Europe the prestige of the British Empire is usually English, and England is the dominant word, but once East of Suez, the word British is everywhere, the language, the customs, the flags, the commerce and the manufactured products are British and though they are made in the manufacturing north of England, they are British made.

The Depeche Coloniale has started a campaign, along with other pro-colonial newspapers to correct this advantageous position of Great Britain as regards to France.

In all frankness, the colonial newspapers point out to the splendid ships which England runs between Marseille and India, to the beautiful Empress liners of the Canadian Pacific lines and to the palace liners which give the closest competition to the French liners on the Atlantic.

It is understood that the present Minister of Colonies Pierre Laval is attempting to organize a Far East development Bureau to push French prestige to the limit, and especially to prepare the public for this second French Ottawa Conference, which will be given another name, a French name, to kill the British propaganda thus implied.

Cash For Education Will Bring Discount

FREMONT, Neb.—Education will be procurable at Midland College, located here, on a basis of substantial discounts for cash payments, according to announcement by college officials.

Student expenses will be reduced as much as 18 per cent for the 1934-35 term, under a system of cuts in tuition approved by the college trustees.

Tuition will be reduced from \$80 to \$65 per semester, while

students rooming and boarding on the campus will be given an additional discount of \$10, or about six per cent. Dr. H. F. Martin, Midland College president, announced.

Students unable to pay their bill by the semester in advance will be allowed to pay by the month or quarter, but will not be allowed the \$10 additional discount.

By Cowen 'Expired Cotton Option Now May Be Reinstated'



Expired Cotton Option Now May Be Reinstated

WASHINGTON.—Holders of cotton options which expired May 1 will be given an opportunity to have these options reinstated if application is made within the next 60 days, it was announced today by Oscar Johnston, manager of the cotton producers pool.

Mr. Johnston stated that only 820 option contracts covering 3,506 bales of cotton had not been heard from and, under the terms of the option, these contracts expired May 1. Holders who desire to have them reinstated should make application to the cotton producers pool within the next 60 days, Mr. Johnston stated.

In announcing that reinstatement would be granted on application, Mr. Johnston made public the present status of the cotton options which were offered producers as a part of the compensation in the 1933 emergency cotton campaign.

Of a total of 571,434 options issued covering 2,428,697 bales, 567,198 options covering 2,403,174 bales have been exercised either by sale or delivery to the cotton producers pool. Of this amount, producers holding options covering 457,180 bales have called their options and the cotton sold; and the remainder have been delivered to the cotton producers pool.

Mr. Johnston stated that options outstanding totaled 6,543 contracts covering 42,025 bales. These are divided as follows: 3,207 contracts for 21,449 bales have been extended, the holders paying the sum of 40 cents per bale per month carrying charge; 209 contracts covering 368 bales have called and fixed the date for future sale; 2,307 contracts covering 16,502 bales are in suspense and will be issued when adjusted by correspondence or settled (these option holders will then have 30 days after date of issue in which to call for sale or assign to the cotton producers pool); 820 contracts covering 3,506 bales have not been heard from since date of issue and these producers are given the privilege for 60 days from May 1 to apply for reinstatement.

staged by students in various eastern institutions. He described the disturbances as "futile demonstrations."

Women Must Take Part In Program of Rehabilitation

AUSTIN.—Women must take a part in the rehabilitation program of the state if it is to be a materialistic, bread and butter affair, it was stated today by Director Marie Dredson of the Texas relief commission when speaking upon progress made in the rural recovery program to

Our first thought is to see that these families are enabled to take care of themselves with food and clothing," said Director Dredson. "If we stop there, we have only the foundation. We are going out plans which will enable the people of this southwestern area to do more than merely exist. We are going to build projects necessary under the program can be directed to bringing shade trees to the farms and lawns, to creating community parks, to building community clubhouses which reflect the native architecture of this area. We are going to build a model for homes of the type. Our first settlers here had an architectural type all their own, dictated by the native material and by the climatic conditions. We have reason to be proud of such architecture. Rather than imitate other types, we will do it to keep the honest and beautiful types which we ourselves designed."

There are only a few points in which women will be most valuable in the rehabilitation program, according to Director Dredson. The first is going to offer them an opportunity, Director Dredson said, to work on the relief administration projects will be given to them for their labor according to the usual rate in this section for labor, Director Dredson said, in no case will the scale of pay be less than 30 cents per hour as set by the FERA.

NEW YORK.—Three weird denizens of the sea, hitherto unknown to scientists, have been found among the fishes obtained from the deep waters of the Atlantic off Puerto Rico. Described by Dr. George S. Myers, assistant curator, division of fishes, of the U. S. National Museum, the first has been named *Stenobrama erismma*. It is the "eye" fish. Each eye is about fifth as long as the diameter of the body. A man's eye, in the ratio, would be about a foot and about eight inches high. Addition, this creature has two eyes on its side near the

False Eyes
Unless they are intended to deceive the creature's enemies, the eyes of these false eyes is not in. Their existence would not have been detected had it not been for a painting of the fish by Chester L. Smith, artist of the U. S. Smithsonian Deep Sea Division, as soon as it was taken from depths of some 150 fathoms. Incidentally, at a depth, which is just about a borderline of eternal darkness, would be of little service to an animal. Only one other "eye fish" has been discovered about a half a century ago.

Strange Creature
The second strange creature of the deep is called *Peristichia*, and is a unique "arm-gurnard". It is a bottom-dweller and its whole body is covered with spiny plates bearing sharp spines about a quarter of an inch long. There are a hundred of these on the head of this particular fish, and off its throat to other fishes colored bright red.

Lab, which is known to scientists as the lantern group, consists of the third new species. These small minnow-like creatures live only in the open ocean, on any land and are never near the bottom. Doubtless, as of them live and die in the open, with no knowledge that exists either shore or bottom of the ocean. When seen in the open, they resemble the light-shades of a ship. All have luminous spots along their sides, it is believed, serve as "navigation marks" in the dark.

Texas Had Only Nineteen Failures In Month of April

AUSTIN.—There were only 19 commercial failures in Texas during April, against 21 in March and 44 in April, 1933, declines of 9.5 per cent and 57 per cent respectively, according to figures compiled by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research from reports from Dun and Bradstreet, Inc. Liabilities of the bankrupt firms totaled \$235,000 compared with \$435,000 in March of the current year and \$470,000 in April last year, respective drops of 46 and 50 per cent. Assets of the firms that failed, totaling \$109,000, were 66 per cent below those of March and 18 per cent below those of April last year. Average liabilities per failure were \$12,368, a drop of 40 per cent from the \$20,714 in March but an increase of 16 per cent over the \$10,691 of April, 1933.

Nevada Gold Mining Camp Enjoys Boom

SILVER PEAK, Nev.—Scenes reminiscent of boom days when this mining camp produced approximately \$40,000,000 in gold, are at hand again. The camp has been producing steadily for the past 60 years, but with the rise in gold price, prospectors returned to take another chance in their endless fight with the desert to wrest a fortune. There is a scarcity of homes and equipment. Shelter is at a premium. Original prospectors named this camp Silver Peak after discovering silver. However, the silver ore gave out and gold was later found in large quantities. Production since then has been gold.

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Coin Vending Tax Will Have Hearing

AUSTIN.—Whether the Texas legislature has inadvertently placed a tax on pay telephones, gas meters and other coin operated vending machines will be argued before the Court of Criminal Appeals here May 23.

The question comes before the court in the form of a habeas corpus proceeding filed by Joe Day, Austin, charged with violating a statute that imposes an occupa-

tion tax of \$10 a year on coin-operated marble machines. He claims the law is unconstitutional because it provides unequal taxation through specific exemptions of pay telephones and gas meters, etc.

State's attorney Lloyd Davidson will contend, however, that the provision relating to marble machines and the exemptions are both unconstitutional, but that the remainder of the act, levying the tax in general terms on all coin operated vending machines including marble machines, pay telephones, gas meters and the like, is valid and enforceable.

Should Davidson's construction of the law be upheld by the appellate court, the state stands likely to reap a harvest of \$500,000 annually from the occupation taxes imposed.

Mexico Adds Man Power to Highway

MEXICO CITY.—Seven thousand men are making a drive to complete the international highway between here and Laredo, Texas, according to Leopoldo Farías, director general of Mexican national highways.

Until recently only 3,000 men were working on the uncompleted sectors of the road, but the desire to finish the highway at the earliest moment caused the increase. Farías said that in addition to the new man power 150 trucks and six steam shovels have been

"Test cars then tried the G-3 for months—speeding up to 60 miles per hour, jamming on the brakes, speeding up to 60, jamming on the brakes. Cars and brakes wore out—but the G-3 stood up and kept on standing up!

"The new tire, with its flatter tread, longer non-skid design wear, slower 'heel and toe' wear and greater safety with more non-skid blocks on the tread, has met and whipped the problem presented by the modern car," Mr. McMillen concluded.

NEW YORK—Dick Hoyt has ordered his stock in Madison Square Garden sold and has sailed for Europe.

That's too bad, I mean his sailing for Richard Farnsworth Hoyt was more like the man he backed, Tex Rickard, than anyone ever connected with the vast organization they built together. It was unfortunate for boxing that Hoyt was too big and busy a man to take over the Garden reins when the master manipulator died. He would have made an ideal promoter.

Although a banker, head of some of the most extensive enterprises in the aeronautical field and a director of 55 corporations, Hoyt, who started as a \$25-a-week clerk, found time for sport.

Patience Exhausted

HOYT's passing from the sports business means that he finally has given up on boxing, for it was the ring game that brought him into it in a professional way. Rickard 10 years ago sought to build the Garden with a stock promotion scheme, and when that failed, made many a disappointing trip to Wall Street before bumping into Hoyt.

Dick told me of his first meeting with old Tedde only the other day. He long had been an admirer of the Yukon alumnus and said he got a real thrill out of his call.

Hoyt, then only 25 and rapidly rising to the peak he struck just before the crash, financed the Garden in an hour or two on the telephone. He made rich associates and friends come in. Most of

them had only a vague idea of what he was talking about afternoons when the Six Millionaires, of whom he boasted, were born.

Hoyt organized the spirit Madison Square Garden Club in the confines of the E layout at Eighth avenue and ninth street.

Support Never Lacking

HE was as proud of the Rickard, and remained largest individual stockholder chairman of the board to the Out of the Hoyt-Rickard era also came the Boston Capitalists of other cities who spirited to erect similar show

Hoyt supported Rickard, tactfully while the master promoter was guaranteeing the huge sums. More recently he not falter when William F. successor to Rickard, decided to throw up the stadium at Madison and the huge bowl in Queens.
