Salvation Army Chairman Named

Mrs. Willys Jones will chair- man Colorado City's 1970 Salvation Army fund drive which opens next week.

Her appointment was announced Wednesday by District Judge Austin McClellan, chairman of the local Salvation Army Service Unit.

A coffee and doughnut session Thursday, Feb. 26, will open the fund drive which seeks a goal of \$1,500.

Mrs. Jones said the kickoff session will be conducted from 8 a. m. until 1 p. m. in Texas Electric Service Company's Reddy Room.

The \$1,500 raised during the campaign will be applied locally and to support state agencies of the Salvation Army which are open to all citizens of Colorado City.

The money will be used to help people help themselves.

This aid will be given in food, clothes, drugs, medical aid and other assistance.

Among the Salvation Army's state agencies available to local citizens are home and hospital for unwed mothers, summer camp for boys, rehabilitation center for alcoholics, disaster cen-

ters, missing persons service and others.

We are asking the assistance of all citizens of Mitchell County in this worthwhile endeavor, said Mrs. Jones, "and the success of this campaign to help those among us in trying times of special need will depend upon the support of all citizens."

Hunters Aiming For Crow

Shoot For Prizes In Country's Big Roost

Weekend forecast:

Look for an abundance of hunters to converge on Colorado City for Second Annual Kivans Crow shoot.

More than 400, some traveling from such metropolitan areas as Dallas and Houston — are expected to open the event Saturday morning.

Hunters will hunt in what state wildlife experts term as one of the world's largest crow roosts — in the county's northern area.

In addition to the sport — which is an aid also to hunters — the hunters will be shooting for "tandem" crow which will bring hundreds of dollars in prizes, from Kivans and Colorado City firms.

One of those limited crows — painted white — will be good for \$100 cash.

Others will bring lucky hunters a long list of prizes which include cameras, air-water jacket, oil, haircuts, 50 Treasury bonds, and much more.

Our advance registration is a little slower than last year,

reported Shoot Chairman Joe Weaver Wednesday. "But almost all of these are from out of town."

More than 40 out-of-towners have room reservations at local motels.

"Our major registration will be Saturday morning," Weaver predicted, "because last year more than 300 signed up as they began hunting."

Metropolitan newspapers in Dallas, Fort Worth, Lubbock, Austin in addition to Afton, Big Spring and San Angelo have heavily publicized the 1970 shoot, pointing out the fact that a million crows are roosting in the shoot area.

In addition, the shoot received nationwide TV publicity when Garry Moore came here two weekends ago to film crow hunt-

ing for United Press Interna- tional.

A Fort Worth television station has notified Weaver it will be here this weekend to film anti-record action.

The hunters will move on

over hundreds of sections of land. Twenty-six business firms and industries are along with 21 farmers and ranchers are furnishing the bulk of prizes.

The Garry Moore who was here with a TV camera to put

the crow shoot is the entertainer who has featured on national television years. He moved from Dallas to set up the hunt with Weaver and W. A. Findley. Busiest hunting will be this opening weekend, but the hunt will continue into April.

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Girl Scouts Begin Cookie Sale Friday

Annual Girl Scout Cookie Sale in Mitchell County will begin Friday at 4 p. m.

"Scouts will be asking for a helping hand, not a handout for their organization," Mrs. James Shoemaker, leader chairman for the week's sale, said in announcing the week's event.

Special awards for local girls, given this year for the first time, will be green-uniform patches with gold Girl Scout emblems for those selling at least 27 boxes of cookies and one-half of camp fee for GS session of their choice.

Four brands of cookies to be sold are assorted sandwich, chocolate mint, butter shorties and peanut butter.

"The 50 cents you pay for a box of cookies goes a long way toward improving Girl Scouting for your girl or your neighbor's girl," Mrs. Shoemaker said.

Twenty-two cents from each box's sale goes into West Texas Girl Scout Council property fund which supports summer camp at Camp Beeche Oaks in Sweetwater, year-round troop camping, new GS service center in Abilene and other local properties.

Five cents a box goes into each troop's treasury; one cent assists girls and adults who attend national and international events and remaining 22 cents goes back to the cookie company, the chairman explained.

Money from United Fund

Drives and/or Girl Scout Fund Drives only goes into operating budgets for the Council. Cookie sale is the only source of income for camp and general properties.

"If you are not contacted by a Girl Scout and would like to buy cookies," Mrs. Shoemaker continued, "please call 728-2489."

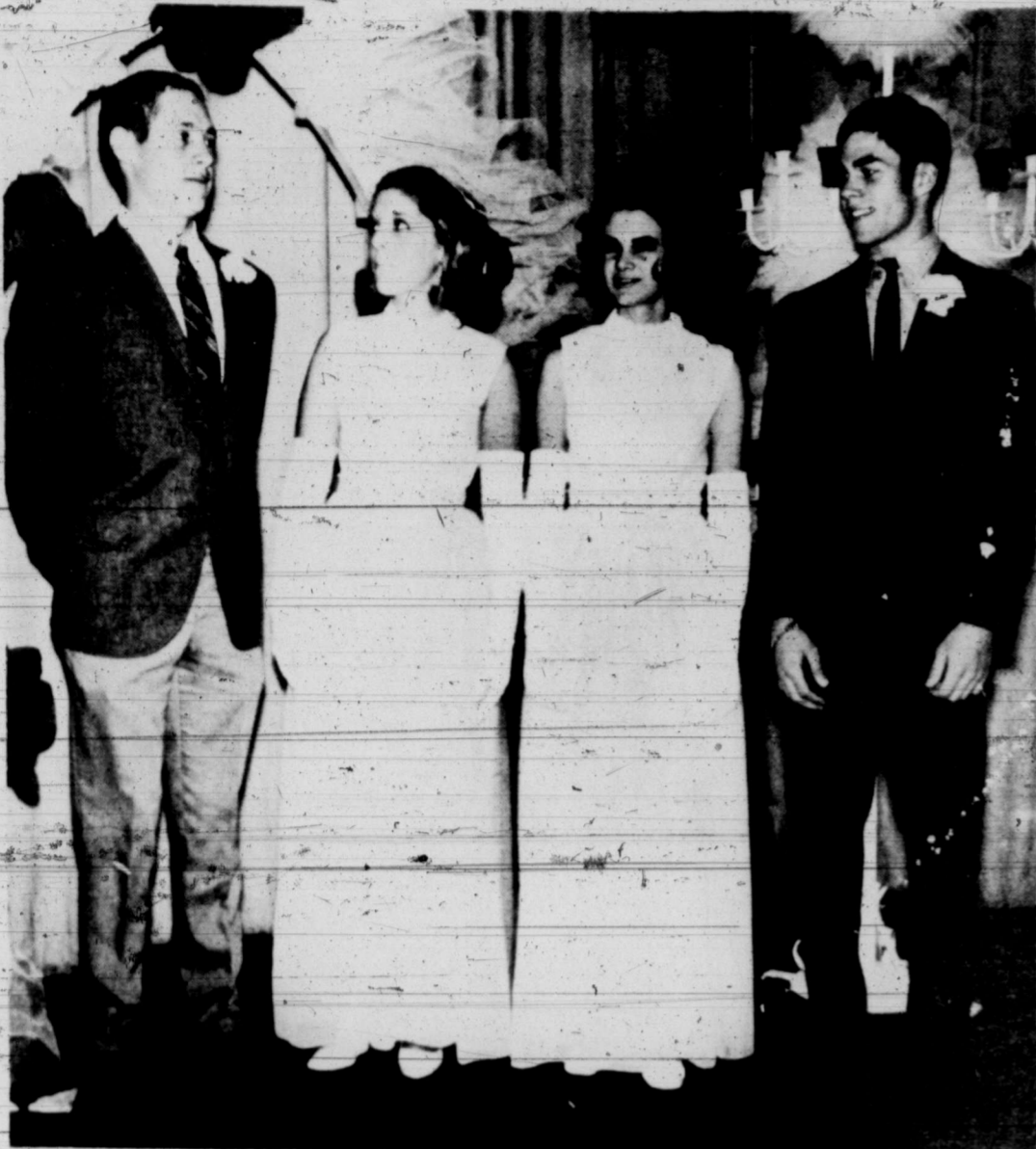

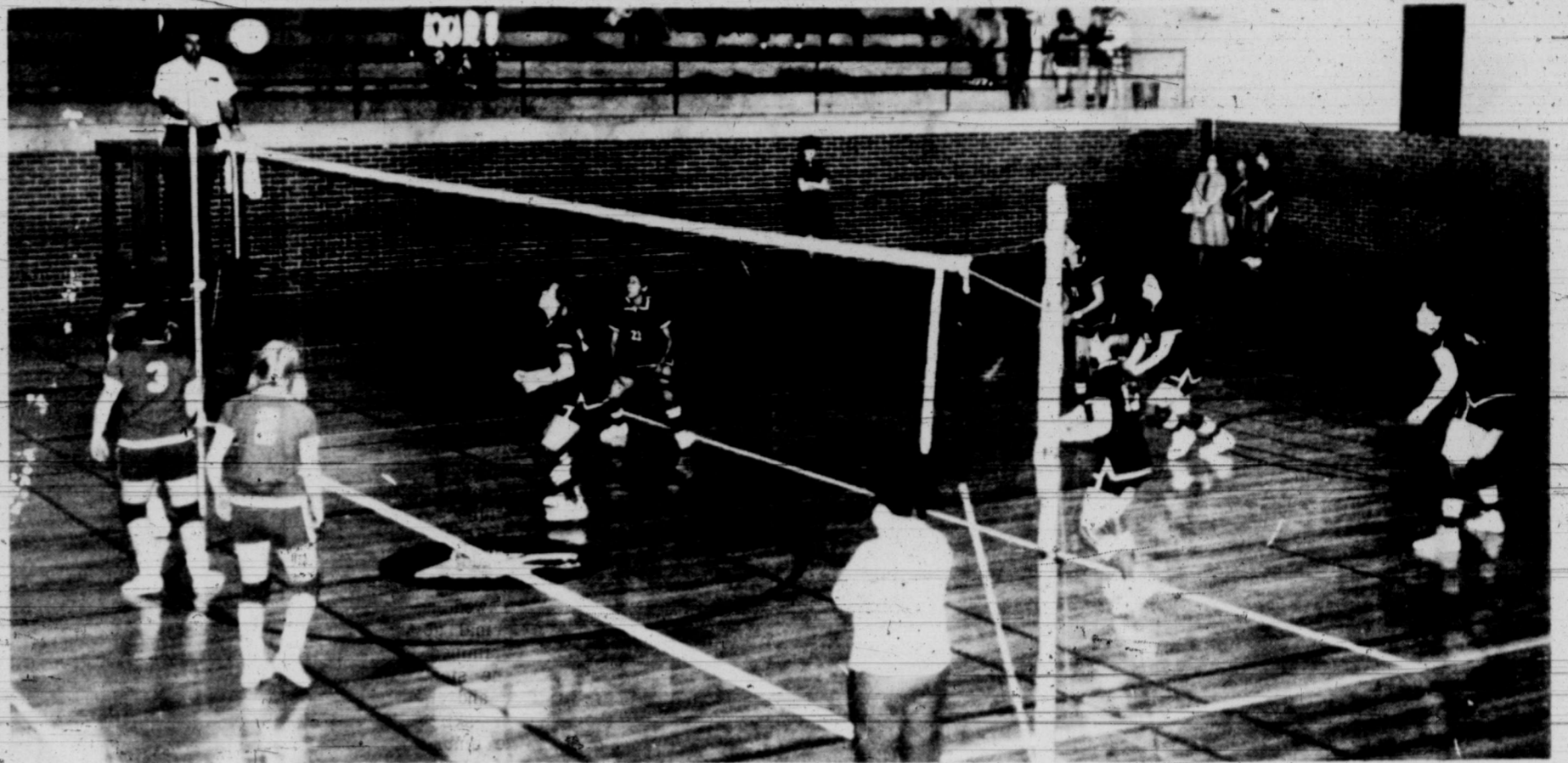
