Rangers Win Over Canadian October 16

Battling on a muddy, water soaked field, the Perryton Rangers nosed out the Canadian Wildcats here Friday night, Oct. 16, 6-0 to win their first conference game.

In spite of a slight mist throughout the game a large number of loyal supporters watched the Rangers crush the Wildcats early in the first quarter. The touchdown came when the Rangers took over on their own 32 yard line. With a well balanced running attack and hard blocking line, the Rangers gained three consecutive first downs to place the ball on Canadian's 20 yard line. On the 3rd down, Parvin dashed 20 yards to pay dirt. Schollenbarger missed the conversion. The quarter ended without either team threatening again.

The Wildcats only chance to score came in the second quarter when they succeeded in pushing the Rangers back to the latter's 2 yard line. Perryton removed their hopes, however, when they kicked out from their end zone to Canadian's 44 yard line. Late in the second quarter Canadian made their only penetration.

Throughout the last half the fighting Rangers were able to maintain their lead by holding the Wildcats scoreless.

The most spectacular punt of the game was when Turner kicked the ball 42 yards and succeeded in removing the danger of Canadian's scoring. Bray, Allen and Pearson showed up well on the defense. French played an outstanding game on the offense.

American Loyalty at Stake

This week marks the beginning of a big campaign in our schools as well as all over the U. S. We Americans will be asked to contribute generously and willingly to China Relief. It is not like we were giving money to some poor unfortunate people that we feel sorry for. This is not the case. We actually owe China, not in terms of money, dollar for dollar, but in the willing spirit of friendship and cooperation they have shown in the past. For example back in 1918 China was asked for \$100,000 for the U. S. War Work Fund. China said nothing but contributed \$1,425,000 over 14 times the amount asked for. Again in 1927 after the Ohio and Mississippi floods, the Chinese people raised more money for relief than any other country except Canada. They weren't even asked for this money but did it of their own accord. These are only two of the many examples of their friendship.

Now we are at war. This is new to us but China has been at war since July 1937. Since that time these happy, peaceful, carefree people who model their living, tilling the soil, have been tortured beyond human endurance.

When the Japs invaded China many of these people had never seen an airplane or a machine gun. Thousands of these people were machine gunned and bombed when they didn't even know the meaning of war. The people now number fifty million. Their homes are lost; their possessions burned; their families separated and killed. Now they know the meaning of war. They didn't learn it from a dictionary or newspaper or radio but from the heartache, suffering and loss of the things dearest to any human.

Now the situation is changed and the Japs are realizing their mistake, for the people who didn't know the meaning of war don't understand the word quit. China can take it! She has proven she will not be conquered as long as there is a Chinaman left to fight.

Your contribution is, in every respect, a united expression of sympathy and appreciation of those brave men and women whose struggle is linked with our destiny. Will you, to express your loyalty, give to the fullest extent of your ability? Remember, just \$20.00 will feed and clothe one refugee for a whole year. Are you a person whose American spirit and conscience is ruled by his pocketbook?

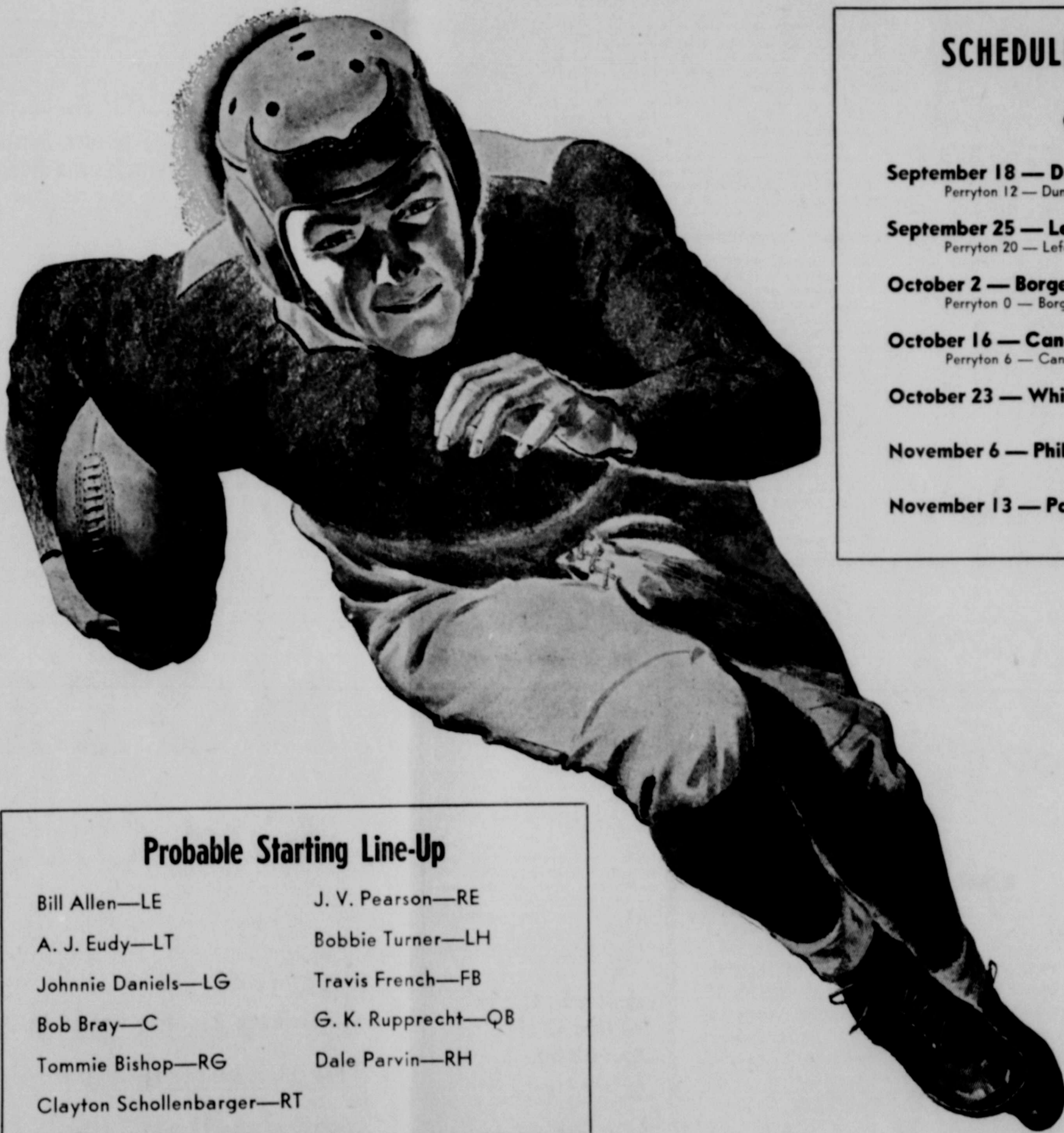

Don't Neglect Scrap Rubber

The urgency and seriousness of our rubber shortage forcefully was brought home to us by Bernard Baruch in the President's rubber inquiry committee report. "We find the existing (rubber) situation so dangerous," he said, "that unless corrective measures are taken immediately this country will face both a military and civilian collapse. The naked facts present a warning that cannot be ignored."

Scrap rubber from our homes, farms and industrial plants is part of the answer to the problem. It must be remembered that even in normal times the rubber industry has used a percentage of scrap rubber in the manufacture of rubber articles. Scrap rubber went into the average automobile tire even before the war, when we still had access to inexhaustible supplies of natural rubber in Malaya and the Netherlands East Indies. We are using proportionately more scrap rubber now to meet the huge demands of our armed forces, thus saving our priceless and irreplaceable stock of crude rubber. Until victory or until our synthetic rubber industry is in full operation, our war needs can absorb all the reclaimed rubber we can supply.

So don't neglect that old pair of rubber galoshes, that swimming cap, or that piece of garden hose when you are making a search of your home for the scrap which will help win the war. Old rubber is urgently needed and the most beautiful monument we can build to America's victory are stockpiles of scrap rubber at our local collection depots.

Are You Too Busy to Read This?

(From the Jackson Citizen Patriot, Jackson, Mich.)

Don't doubt it a bit. You live on a farm. Your hired man quit. You can't hire labor in competition with war plants. The corn hasn't been cut. You're way behind on the fall work.

And you don't want to see it yourself, if he doesn't come back, do you?

Let's collect it today and get it ready to send on the way to reinforce that kid who's going to need all of the reinforcements he can get.

Rats Spread Typhus Germs

AUSTIN, Texas.—Reports coming in to the State Health Department indicate an increasing incidence of typhus fever throughout the State without any particular regard to urban or rural population.

Inasmuch as nearly 900 cases of typhus fever have already been reported in Texas this year, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, is urging full cooperation from all communities whether large or small in a campaign to exterminate rats and thus control the increasing prevalence of typhus.

"It must be kept in mind that the rat acts as a reservoir of the typhus germ and the rat flea is the means by which the type of typhus found in Texas is transmitted to man. Rats are liable to travel many miles from one community to another, and it is therefore obvious," Dr. Cox said, "that it will be necessary to make the rat extermination program cover the entire state."

Dr. Cox has recommended a four-point extermination program in addition to the already widely used poisoning campaigns, which he believes, will assure more than temporary typhus control. This program includes: first, making food inaccessible to rodents through proper garbage collection and disposal; second, rat-proofing of homes and other buildings; third, keeping at least two traps set and baited in every home which is not rat-proofed; fourth, proper educational measures.

Concerning the educational campaign, Dr. Cox pointed out that since the typhus rat is known to inhabit practically every section of the state, it will take state-wide co-operation to exterminate it. In order to do this, the public must become acquainted with the habits of the rat and the various control measures that may be applied.

The State Department of Health has moving picture films on this subject and has issued a bulletin outlining rodent control measures. This bulletin will be mailed free upon request, Dr. Cox said.

Rent-Saving Amendment On November 3 Ballot

An economy measure for Texas, to stop the state's paying out over \$100,000 a year for office rent in Austin, will be before the voters in the Nov. 3 general election, it was pointed out in a joint statement of Sen. George Moffett of Chillicothe and Rep. Herbert P. Brawner of Joshua.

Adoption of a constitutional amendment to apply the present rent payments to construction of a state office building, and permanently ending this huge outlay for rent, will achieve this purpose, the legislators declared.

Sen. Moffett and Rep. Brawner are co-authors of the amendment which appears on the general election ballot as amendment No. 5. They pointed out that both the house and the senate gave it virtually unanimous approval in submitting it for a vote of the people.

The proposed state office building will not be started, they stressed, until after the war, when building materials are available without interfering with the war effort.

The amendment permits the state to pay for the building entirely out of money it is now spending for rent. Further, it makes the short-term bond issue to finance the building eligible for investment of the state permanent school fund, which means that the state would pay itself all the interest on the bond issue. The measure is favored by the state educational authorities who have charge of safely investing the permanent school fund.

When the amendment has been adopted, its sponsors outlined, and when war conditions permit, the legislature will pass an enabling act to carry out its purposes. This will direct the board of control to erect a suitable structure. It would authorize the board of education to invest permanent school funds in the bond issues—which is limited to \$2,000,000—and it will provide that the present state appropriations for rent be put into the fund for paying off the short-term bonds. Then, when the bonds are paid off, the state will own the structure, and the payment of the huge annual rent costs will be ended permanently.

The state now rents office space in Austin in more than a dozen office and business buildings. It also rents a considerable number of old residences, and even an abandoned funeral parlor. It is now trying to use the basement of the capitol for work of some of its departments with a serious loss in efficiency.

The supreme court and court of criminal appeals are now in the capitol. Many of their archives and records are stored, with other important state documents, in the capitol basement which has been pointed out by every recent legislature as a serious fire hazard. For several years the Texas Bar Association and the Texas State Bar have labored continuously to secure adequate and suitable housing for the appellate courts. The bar now has a committee co-operating with state authorities in the effort to work out housing of state courts, departments and agencies, so that the courts will have better facilities for their work.

The state already has dedicated a vacant half-block of land adjoining the capitol grounds, as the site for a building. This was done when the legislature tried to secure construction of a small building merely to house the courts, but the plan was expanded by the legislature also to provide for the departments now paying rent and to save the enormous outlay of money paid out as rent. No purchase of land for a site is involved.

No objection so far has been heard from any source to this economy measure, its sponsors reported. They urged that Texas voters be familiar with the benefits which will arise from adoption of the state office building amendment, and not permit indifference to defeat the proposal.

During the four years that the club has been in operation, a \$25 salary has been paid each week to some member in good standing. In addition the club has provided employment for two and three employees.

Profits from the operation of the club have been used for charity and other community projects. The club has provided free hot lunches to all underprivileged children in the Perryton schools for the past four years. They have purchased clothing, shoes, medical supplies and paid milk, gas and coal bills. Much of the work of club in the latter lines was handled through the county welfare office and the recipients were not informed of the source of their aid.

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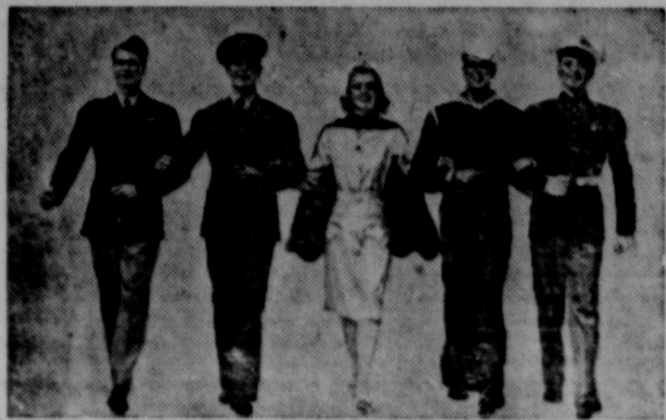

September 20, 1942

Dear Gang:

It has been a long time since I have written so will give it another try this afternoon. This is Sunday afternoon (Saturday to you) and we are not working since noon so I am trying to do a little of my back correspondence. The only mail I have received since leaving the States on July 17th is two letters from Iva which were written on July 13th and 14th. I am getting rather anxious to hear from her and am hoping to get some mail soon as we received a sack of registered mail a few days ago so probably the other mail will reach us soon. The two letters I received came to me while we were at Samoa. We were only there a few days and moved on to this place which must of course be unnamed at present. You will notice that my address is San Francisco but don't let that fool you as this is no suburb of Frisco. In fact when and if we start back I think we will flip a coin to see whether we sail for Frisco or New York. Until we started out on our boat ride you couldn't have made believe there was so much water without any islands or even ships on it. However the trip as far as Samoa was a regular pleasure cruise as far as we were concerned. We ate in the dining room and had finer food than most of us were used to at home.

This island, where we are now, abounds in Tropical fruits and vegetation. A great part of it is still a dense jungle such as you have often seen in the movies. There are large plantations which have been cleared out of the jungle and planted to coconut groves, coffee and cocoa trees. There are also lots of orange and tangerine trees but it looks as if they just grew wild as they are not set in orderly rows as they had been planted. We have eaten fruit and coconuts until we

just pass them by now without even wanting to eat any more. We have a provision and mail run that one of our boys from the office makes each evening and every few days I get on the truck and ride with him on the trip. We go out to three of our camps where we have crews working and the trip to the farthest camp is about twenty miles. When going to all of them however we have found a short cut to make one way, which is only about nine miles. The roads are mighty rough and twenty miles is fast speed on it. When I am along we try to make enough time so as to stop at a river and take a swim.

The water is the clearest I have seen anywhere except in the high mountains and it is just cold enough to be fine swimming. I wish I could take some pictures of this place and send them to you but of course that can't be done under present conditions. Maybe when we leave here it will all be over so I have really not been disappointed and I haven't had to see it through a porthole either. And when I think back to the time I was called up on May 3rd and recall that we shipped out of Frisco on July 17th I am reminded that they didn't waste much time in putting us into action. It has been mostly pleasant and I have enjoyed it. Well here is the end of the paper so I will close.
