Awards to Dispatch

The Post Dispatch is the winner of two first place plaques in the West Texas Press Association's 1980 Better Newspaper Contest.

The newspaper won first place for general excellence in the division for weekly newspapers in towns of 3,000 or more population. It

also was the first place winner for editorials in the weekly division.

Publisher Jim Cornish received the plaques Saturday night at the Better Newspaper Awards banquet which wound up the West Texas Press Association's summer convention in Abilene.

The convention, the 50th annual one for the West Texas Press Association, was held at the Kiva Inn, beginning Friday afternoon and continuing through Saturday.

The association is the largest regional press association in Texas.

Remodeling of primary school added to budget

Post school trustees Monday night in a long budget work session rejected by a split vote the proposal to join the primary and elementary buildings but generally agreed to remodel the primary building.

They added to the maintenance package a new gym floor and new permanent seating in the high school gym, a maximum of \$40,000 in landscaping — most of which in the end probably will go to remodeled Middle School — and some repainting in the 20-year-old high school building.

Cost estimates for this maintenance package are being sought in advance of the school board's regular August meeting at 7:30 p.m. tonight in the high school library.

All of these needs were submitted by School Supt. Bill Shiver along with his suggestions on curriculum.

Supt. Shiver told trustees that with a new, all-time high in assessed valuation of an estimated \$238,459,345, the school district will need a 93.5 cent tax rate to meet its general fund operating budget of \$2,586,044.71.

Each penny of the tax rate will raise \$21,461, with tax discounts and delinquent taxes taken out.

The cost size of the agreed upon maintenance proposals will determine the final budget figure and the

tax rate needed.

It is still to be determined whether the school district can reduce its tax rate this

year, as all other local taxing units have done, but it appears probably that even with the hefty main-

tenance package the school tax rate will come down. The school district uses 75 (See School board, Page 8)

Rodeo big success—Steer races really wild

There were no winners on any of the three nights in the wild steer race as the steers, all big and mean,

literally ran over all the cowboys who ventured into the arena to try and saddle them.

In the end a \$75 prize was offered if anybody could even pull the rope off any of the wild steers' horns, but nobody could do that either.

Some broken ribs and a broken cheek bone were among the injuries suffered by the cowboys who tried and failed.

As it turned out, nobody has saddled and ridden one of these wild steers this summer rodeo season in any rodeos in which Terry Walls of Stephenville was the producer.

Billie Franks of Snyder, a barrel racer, was taken to Garza Memorial Hospital by ambulance for emergency treatment Friday night when her horse clipped the gate coming into the arena for the barrel run and Billie suffered a hard fall. She was released from the hospital and suffered only bruises, however.

Only Garza rodeo winners, except for the county team roping, were V. O. Rasbury and Barry Byrd of Post, who were second in the team roping; Freddy and Fred Lucero of South-

Fire destroys vacant house

A fire at 5 a.m. Wednesday completely destroyed a vacant house at 613 South Avenue H and damaged homes on either side of it.

"Flames were through the roof when I got here," Fire Chief Neal Clary told The Dispatch. "There is no

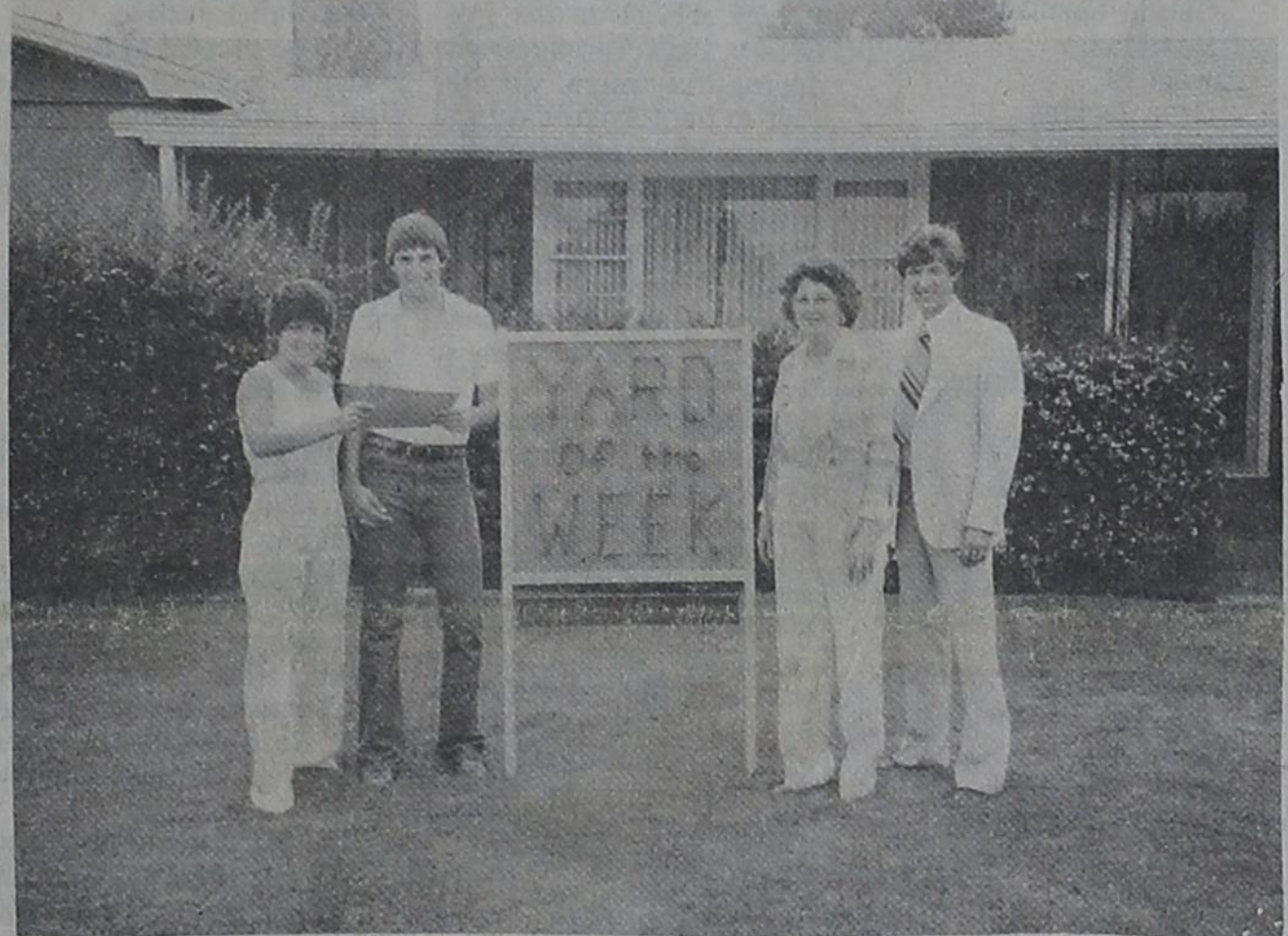
way to determine now what caused the blaze. The electricity was still on though and it could have been a short."

If there had been a south wind it might have set the whole block afire, firemen said. The houses are only about 20 feet apart and are all wood with wood shingled roofs.

The house at 615 South Avenue H was the only one of the three occupied and nobody was home at the time of the fire. Lance Edwards recently purchased the home and the one which was completely destroyed from Marvin Odom, according to what Edwards told firemen.

The Edwards home was badly damaged in the rear portion by the blaze with smoke damage throughout the house. It was virtually a total loss.

The house on the other side of the vacant one where the fire began had its wooden shingled roof catch fire, but firemen quickly extinguished the flames. The house was locked but apparently vacant.

Phone boost Oct. 1

Post's telephone rates will go up Oct. 1 as a result of the Texas Public Utility Commission last week granting General Telephone Co. of the Southwest a \$31 million rate increase.

The one-party resident rate will go up 75 cents monthly from \$5.90 to \$6.65.

The one-party business phones, however, will jump 47 percent from \$12 monthly to \$17.60.

General Telephone had asked for a \$58.3 million increase which would have meant much higher rates than those granted.

Included in the PUC

ruling was inclusion of a \$4,000,000 penalty for poor service against General Telephone.

The commission's staff was ordered to initiate on Feb. 1, 1981, an investigation to determine the company's effectiveness in

Youth camp completes 10th year

The White River Youth Camp, just out of Post, celebrated its tenth anniversary with the camp session beginning in July of this year. The christian camp is sponsored and staffed by members of the Churches of Christ in areas surrounding White River.

The camp was a dream set in motion 10 years ago by a small group of christians who wanted a facility closer to the plains area for youngsters who could not afford camp fees and travel expense to camps in the mountains of New Mexico and other places farther than a day's driving distance.

The Bible youth camp is located about 22 miles southeast of Crosbyton near White River Lake. It is located on 21 acres of land donated by Patsy and Arnold Sanderson of Post.

The idea of a Bible Encampment at White River was suggested at a business meeting of the White River Church of

Christ early in 1971 and the plan was to invite area families to camp around the church building with Vacation Bible School classes during the morning and singing and preaching at night. The meeting was held with various presentations on camp work considered and among visitors was C. A. "Pop" Farley, long time Director of Camp Blue Haven, in New Mexico. Other meetings were held in the following weeks in different areas and, the camp became a reality.

For the first year, seventy one campers attended. In January of 1972, a new dining hall, kitchen, office, and trading post was begun, as were 12 new custom made tents ordered to update the sleeping facilities of the campers. Concrete slabs were poured for the tents, and steel frames were erected and plans were made for more camp sessions. Campers were turned away because of limited space and facilities. Our strong support

The Dispatch strongly supports Post school trustees in their efforts to complete the task undertaken several years ago of putting the Post school plant in top physical shape.

With their remodeling of the primary school next year they will just about complete the job.

The heavy maintenance schedule has included the remodeling and expansion of the Post Middle School, remodeling and expansion of the school lunchroom, installing an all-weather running track around the practice field, and the installation of new and much more powerful football stadium lights.

The primary remodeling and high school gym improvements will just about wrap up the program trustees undertook with considerable thought and diligence.

We would point out that in accomplishing all of these improvements not a dollar's worth of bonds were sold. The improvements were financed through the regular budget without any tax increases.

Post can't look forward to having an oil

bonanza within the district forever, but it now can look forward with a great deal more confidence to the future years when oil will eventually begin its decline.

The board of trustees has had almost a complete turnover since this program of improvements was begun. But new trustees have seen the wisdom of the effort and have given it their solid support.

We leave our readers with this one added thought to support this fine school improvement program.

Costs climb each year for everything and improvements made yesterday were a lot easier to pay for than those which are being made today and those which will be made tomorrow.

But certainly once the program is completed, a lot of dollars will have been saved district taxpayers in the future because we built today for Post's tomorrow.

It's nice to have an administration and a board of school trustees with vision to look ahead and see that sometimes a dollar spent will be a dollar saved.

Fission and fusion power

Despite all the noise and sit-ins staged by the "anti-nukes", atomic energy is making a place for itself in the United States today.

Let's look at some of the facts.

The first nuclear fission reactor began generating commercial electricity 22 years ago and today about 70 nuclear power plants in the United States are producing more than 12 percent of this nation's power.

Despite all the controversy, those nuclear plants have operated so safely for the last 22 years that not one single member of the public has been harmed as a result of their operation.

They already supply an irreplaceable amount of energy and could supply a whole lot more except for the bureaucratic red tape which today surrounds all efforts to develop nuclear power.

Just the nuclear plants we have operating today produce an energy equivalent of 1.3 million barrels of oil daily.

There is another kind of atomic energy which may promise even greater things for America's future. It is nuclear fusion, not nuclear fission about which we have been talking.

Ten investor-owned Research Foundation away back in 1957 to focus efforts on

research into this technology through which the enormous energy of the sun and stars eventually may be harnessed to produce electricity.

Fusion is the source of the sun's energy. TAERF and other researchers are only in the early stages of learning how to create and control this kind of energy.

But if this technology can be developed successfully, fusion will have a unique advantage over all other sources of electricity. Its fuel — deuterium — can be extracted from ordinary natural water. Thus a successfully developed fusion power plant would be assured of an almost unlimited clean and low-cost fuel supply.

This TAERF research is centered at the University of Texas Fusion Research Center, one of the largest university experimental fusion programs in the world. Its physicists rank among the world's best and its scientists and engineers are distinguished internationally for their contributions to the world fusion effort.

Let's not oppose nuclear energy — fission or fusion. Of course we want proper safeguards, but the world must turn to new sources of power and be prepared to move with confidence into our future.

District governor in Rotary visit

Rotary District Governor Wayne Sturdivant brought an inspirational message on Rotary service to the Post Rotary Club Tuesday noon during his annual official visit to the 55-year-old local service organization.

The Amarillo attorney stressed the Rotary theme for 1980 of Rotary International President Rolf J. Klarich Helsinki, Finland, which is "Take the Time to Serve."

He told how Klarich, a 22-year-old Finland army lieutenant, was so badly wounded fighting on the Russian front at the start of World War II that he spent two years in a hospital and came out with a broken body. His family was dead, his farm gone, and his nation a Communist captive.

But he started over, built a chocolate factory, and when he retired some years ago he dedicated his life to his God, his country, and to the Rotary principle of international brotherhood.

"You can't look him in the eye and tell him you don't have the time to serve," Sturdivant told Rotarians.

Sturdivant told Rotarians his own district theme for the year is "Pride in Rotary" and told the Post club that it has much to be proud of in the service it has given as a club and as individual members over the last 55 years to build Post.

Mrs. Sturdivant and Bill Sewell of Slaton, representative of the district governor, were other special guests.

Governor Sturdivant conducted an assembly of club officers Monday night, followed by dinner at Damon's Restaurant, and a group of

Two more new Garza wells

Garza County has two new oil well completions this week and another new location.

The new wells are J.C. Stelzer's No. 1 John Sealy, 12 miles east of Post in the Post field; and WTG Exploration, Inc.'s No. 1-A T.C. Head and others in the WTG field, 10 miles south of Post.

The No. 1 Sealy produced 14 barrels of oil daily and 46 of water on test from an interval of 2,681 to 2,802 feet. Total depth was 2,880 feet.

The No. 1-A Head is a 78-barrel oiler and 11 of water from a 3,136 to 3,250 foot interval. Total depth was 3,250 feet.

The new location is Viking Energy Corp.'s wildcat, the No. 1-A Lott, seven miles south of Post, which will be drilled to 8,700 feet.

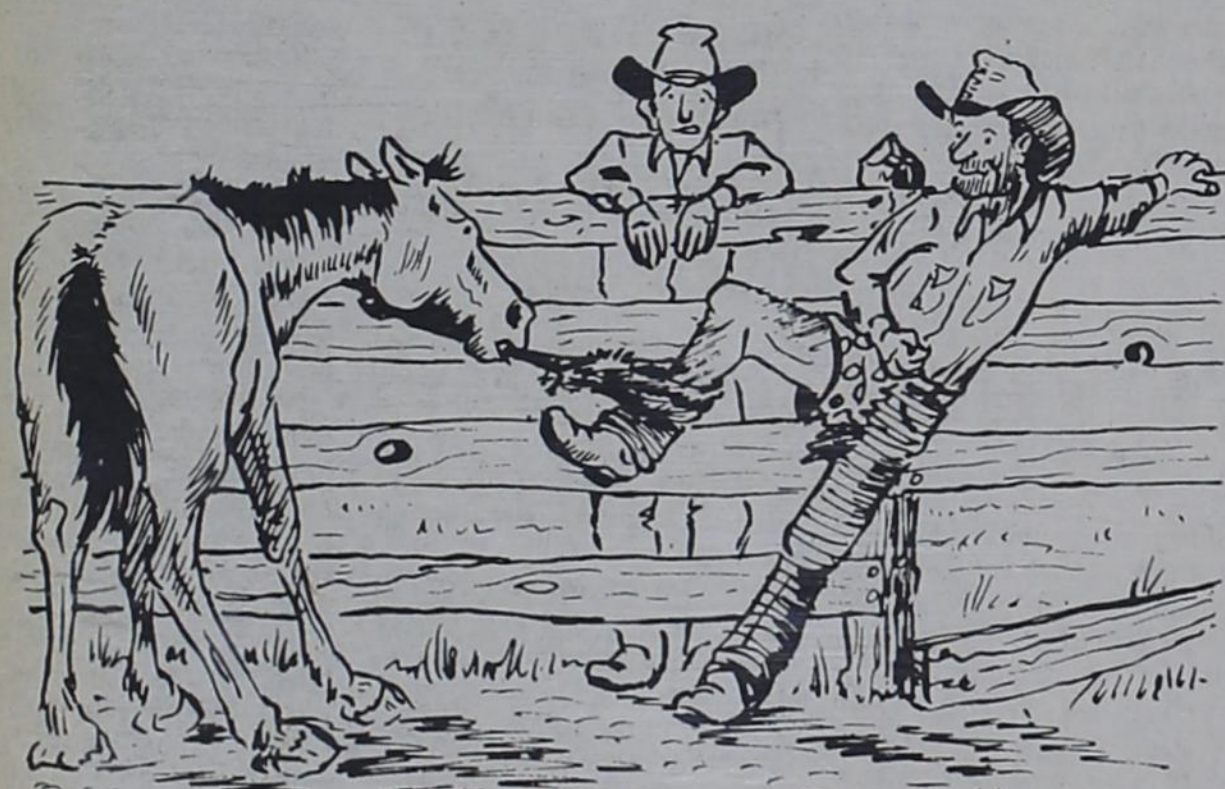

Fails to get 'limited access status'

Hospital short RNs

Garza Memorial Hospital fails to qualify for "limited access status" because the hospital is within 30 minutes of hospitals at Slaton and Tahoka, Hospital Administrator Maritta Reed has been told by the Texas Department of Health.

The "limited access status" was sought during the hospital's present shortage of registered nurses and protect the hospital's medicare certification.

Mrs. Reed told hospital trustees of this development at its August breakfast meeting at the hospital last Thursday morning.

The hospital recently lost four of its six registered nurses due to resignations from the nursing staff.

Mrs. Reed said the hospital possibly will receive some part-time RN help by late August.

Directors voted to accept the \$3,828.80 bid of Lubbock Sash and Door for two new fire doors to be installed in the hospital to meet Life Safety Code requirements. The hospital has been written up at every such inspection since 1977 for not having the two fire doors.

The accepted bid actually was the slightly higher of two bids received from Lubbock, but it was accepted for the firm's reputation for quality work.

Directors also voted to move a hospital storage building behind the hospital farther away from the hospital to meet another life safety code requirement.

On the recommendation of Mrs. Reed, directors voted to purchase a new destrometer for hospital use. She explained the test is routinely done to determine blood sugars, but the hospital cannot charge for the test without the destrometer. She said the instrument should pay for itself within a six months period. Another advantage is that the destrometer gives very rapid answers on blood sugars in life-threatening situations such as admission

of a diabetic in a coma.

The board accepted the bid of Scientific Products of Grand Prairie, Tx., of \$288.16 for the dextrometer, the list price of which is \$339.95.

The board delayed action on the proposal that an evaporative cooler purchased for the hospital's boiler room as a preventive maintenance measure to provide air for the boilers until Hospital Director Colley Gatlin, an industrial engineer, can make his recommendation on the purchase.

The directors were advised that Dr. Richardo Rodriguez is taking a test in September which if he passes will help qualify him for permanent residential status in this country. The board was made aware of a letter Congressman Charles Stenholm had written Dr. Rodriguez inquiring as to his status in his efforts to obtain U. S. citizenship.

Directors set a public meeting for 5 p.m. Monday, Aug. 18, in the hospital dining room on the total increase in taxes proposed for the hospital district.

This notice appears in a quarter-page ad in today's Dispatch as required by state law.

Due to increased oil valuations, the hospital district has voted to increase its tax revenue by 18 percent next year although it has reduced its hospital district tax rate from 75 cents to 65 cents per \$100 taxable property valuation.

The 65 cent rate will raise \$421,700 in ad valorem taxes for the new fiscal year, as compared to the 75 cent rate raising \$347,586.93 in ad valorem taxes for the current fiscal year. The state law requires a public hearing when taxes are increased over three percent.

Directors also approved bills for the month and wrote off \$64.35 in two uncollectable accounts.

Directors approved paying Mrs. Reed salary only instead of possible a lower salary plus a mileage allowance after the IRS indicated the straight salary would be preferred and require less bookkeeping by Mrs. Reed. The decision had been left open two weeks before when Mrs. Reed was employed as administrator.

Mrs. Reed advised the board that new hospital drapes, meeting necessary safety inspection requirements, have arrived and that new bed rails have been ordered for hospital beds not having them.

Reunion held in Brownfield

Disqualifying conditions include a history of hepatitis at any age, pregnancy within the past six weeks, major surgery within the past six months, weight less than 110 pounds, and a history of unarrested clinical tuberculosis.

A person may safely donate blood every eight weeks. The entire process usually takes only 30 minutes, and only 10 minutes for the actual donation.

A person's body contains an average of 10 to 15 pints of blood, and new blood is constantly being made. When you donate one pint your bone marrow is stimulated to produce more red blood cells, and your red blood cell count quickly returns to normal.

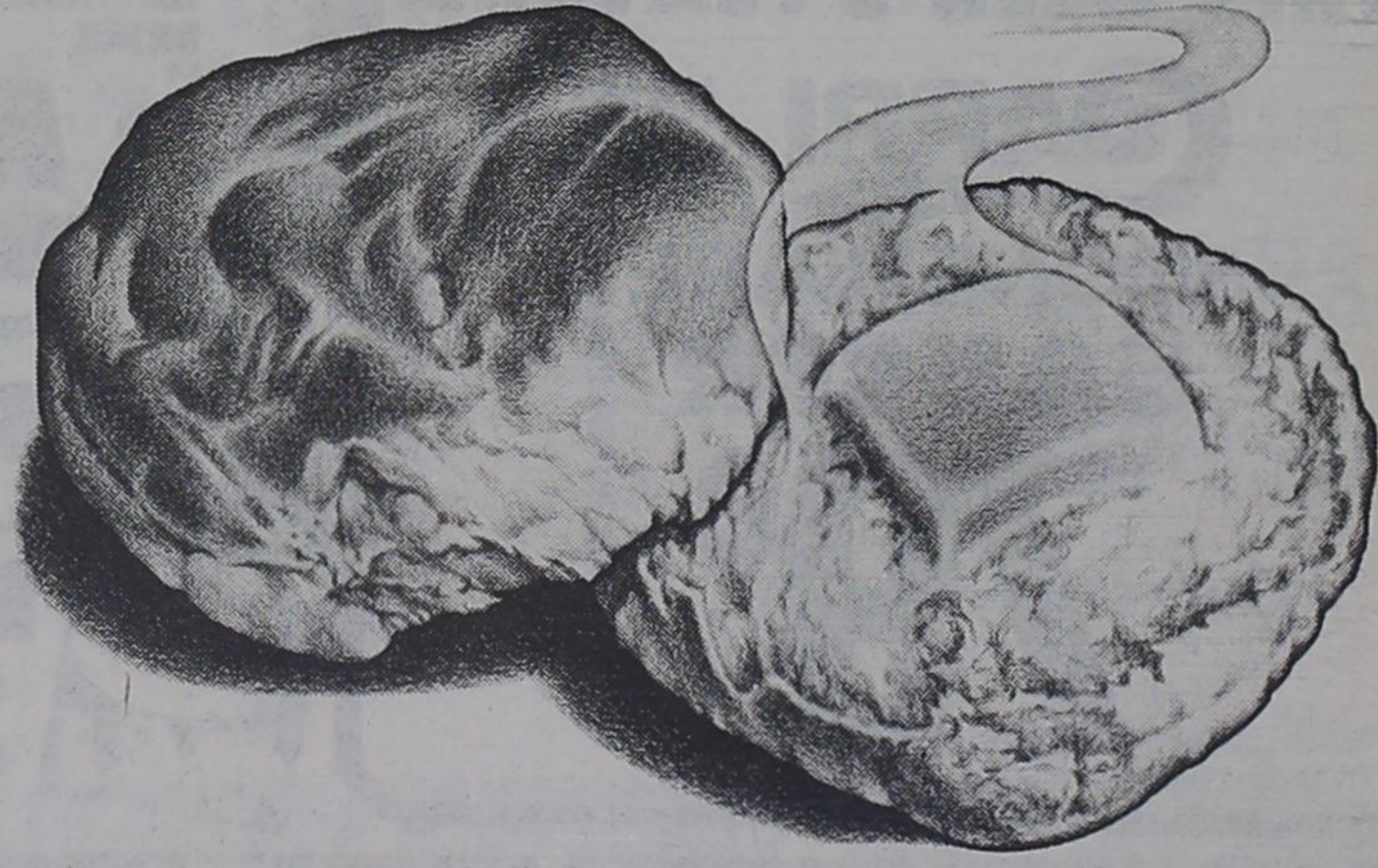

Hospital usage now in normal mid-summer slump

Garza Memorial Hospital usage was in its usual mid-summer slump in July, according to monthly reports for last month presented hospital directors at their regular breakfast meeting last Thursday morning at the hospital.

The hospital admitted only 42 patients during the month to bring the total number for the first 10 months of the fiscal year to 512, as compared to 47 and 528 for the same time periods in 1979.

Patient days for the month totaled only 100 for the month, far below even the 175 days for July of 1979, although total number of patient days for the fiscal 1980 year to date is still running ahead of the same period for 1979, 2,128 patient days to 2,038.

The average hospital stay for a patient in July was only 2.4 days compared to 4.2 days for the average for the year to date.

Five babies were born during July to bring the total for 1980 to 73. There were no deaths at the hospital in July. A total of 315 outpatients were treated to bring that total for the year to 2,184, as compared to 205 for July, 1979, and 1,861 for the first 10 months of 1979.

School budget tonight

Post Independent School District trustees will hold their regular August meeting at 7:30 p.m. tonight in the high school library with a public hearing on the school district budget, approval of the budget, and the setting of a rate hearing date the first item on the agenda.

Other agenda items include accepting the resignation of Mrs. Wanda Resen-

dez, the employment of Greg Johansen as a high school teacher and coach, and Miss Dorothy Hathorn for compensatory math teacher; a report comparing state TABS scores, financial statements for June, a report from Whitaker and Hall on progress of summer projects, approval of bills, and accepting the tax collector's reports for May and June.

Only \$16,358.36 was collected in patient accounts during the month. This was bolstered to \$19,429.55 by \$642.18 in tax collections and \$2,429.01 in interest.

Expenses for the month were \$63,987.40, which meant the difference between income and outgo came from hospital district taxes.

The hospital has received \$335,752.85 in patient account payments in the first 10 months of this fiscal year, as compared to \$266,848.74 for the same period in 1979.

District tax collections have added \$347,586.93 so far this year as compared to \$286,529.76 in the same period in 1979.

Total hospital income from accounts, taxes, dona-

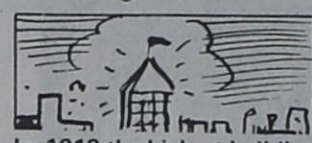
tions, and interest to date is \$691,293.79, as compared to \$565,773.57 for the same period in 1979.

The hospital's accounts receivable as of Aug. 1 this year were \$73,715.94, consisting of \$2,769.80 in medicare outstanding, \$32,299.21 in other insurance outstanding, and \$38,646.93 in other accounts receivable outstanding. The hospital has no old accounts receivable outstanding, as directors are now writing off the books old accounts each month as uncollectable.

In comparison the accounts receivable as of this date a year earlier were \$123,074.62.

This included \$14,696.80 in medicare outstanding, \$32,283.17 in other insurance outstanding, \$49,474.03 in

other accounts receivable outstanding, and \$26,620.62 in old accounts receivable outstanding.

percent of real value to obtain its assessed valuation.

The school district in recent years has taken advantage of its climbing property valuations in oil to bring its physical school plant into top shape without the necessity of a bond issue.

The proposed 1980-81 maintenance package will just about complete this renovation and expansion of the physical plant.

In rejecting the construction of a connecting corridor between the primary and elementary schools, school trustees cut a major chunk costwise out of the proposed maintenance package, however.

The proposal has been under consideration for many months with the administration pointing to the benefits to both students and teachers of the two buildings.

Principal Dan Rankin told trustees he has many students who use both buildings. As principal of both schools, he maintains offices in both buildings and says the faculty of the two schools operate separately with separate teacher lounges and even separate copying machines.

What trustees did agree to do was to remodel the primary building to include lower ceilings, fluorescent lighting, electrical re-wiring and painting.

Rankin told trustees that the building's present lighting is so inadequate that it won't even register on the light meter used by the building inspector.

Trustees did some upgrading of the primary building several years ago including painting and some new floor coverings.

The spectator seating and playing floor in the high school gym were both high on the proposed maintenance list.

Athletic Director David Thompson said the seating was the most important of the two and urged replacing the pullout bleachers with permanent wooden stands as found in most high school gyms in this area.

He also recommended a special covering treatment for a new playing floor which he said will prevent any future floor difficulties. The floor had been listed by Shiver as "on its last leg."

Jack Lott, board president, in advance of the meeting had secured the services of a landscape architect in an effort to solve the long-standing landscape problem, especially at the new middle school.

From that came a proposal to spend \$141,500 on landscaping all four schools. This would include new trees and considerable new paving.

The board didn't want to go into such a heavy expenditure especially since it couldn't make up its own mind as to exactly what it wanted.

Finally, after the three school principals told them

they would prefer grass to trees, the board decided to concentrate upon grass and set a limit of no more than \$10,000 landscaping for each of the four school buildings.

But before the discussion ended about 11 p.m., they generally agreed that they might have to lump the whole \$40,000, or at least considerably more than \$10,000, to solve the problems around the remodeled and expanded middle school.

Athletic Director Thompson asked trustees at the end of the long session if they had any objections to the Antelope Booster Club lighting the new all-weather running track.

Lott suggested that the booster club president write a letter to the board for its regular Thursday night session setting forth what the boosters would like to do, the matter would be placed on the agenda, and action taken.

Trustee Mike Flanigan during a rather prolonged discussion before the board got into its maintenance package brought up what he termed his "old argument" against continuing to build the carryover surplus from year to year.

He said he favored a carryover surplus only large enough to finance school operations from the beginning of the school's fiscal year in the fall until tax money started to come in.

Supt. Shiver in his commentary at the start of the meeting on curriculum made these points:

The pupil-teacher ratio in the Post schools should be carefully examined. The ratio dropped from 16 students per teacher for the four school 1975-76 through 1978-79 to only 14 in 1979-80. In Texas, in 1978-79 the average ratio dropped to 16.7 pupils per teacher from 17.6 the previous year requiring the employment of 8,000 additional teachers.

Does the low ratio in the Post schools, well below the state average, actually increase learning in the upper grades, Shiver asked. He added if the board desired a change it needs to act soon even for the 1981-82 school year.

Nine teachers aids are now employed by the school at a cost of \$60,625 in local tax funds, he also pointed out.

Post schools are now in the second phase of the accreditation cycle which is evaluation. Curriculum needs should be reflected from these reports, Shiver pointed out.

The superintendent also said that the public has spoken for increased vocational programs, but only a few students signed up for the vocational program at Western Texas College in Snyder offered by Post schools. "Perhaps this interest should be examined further and our existing programs carefully scrutinized for the purpose of upgrading or redirection," Shiver noted.

The superintendent also noted that Post schools are now spending \$106.89 per pupil on media services and instructional materials which places it a high 12th in the entire state among school districts in such expenditures with only 1.1 percent of school districts paying more whereas in other state-wide comparisons Post has ranked about 25 percent down from the

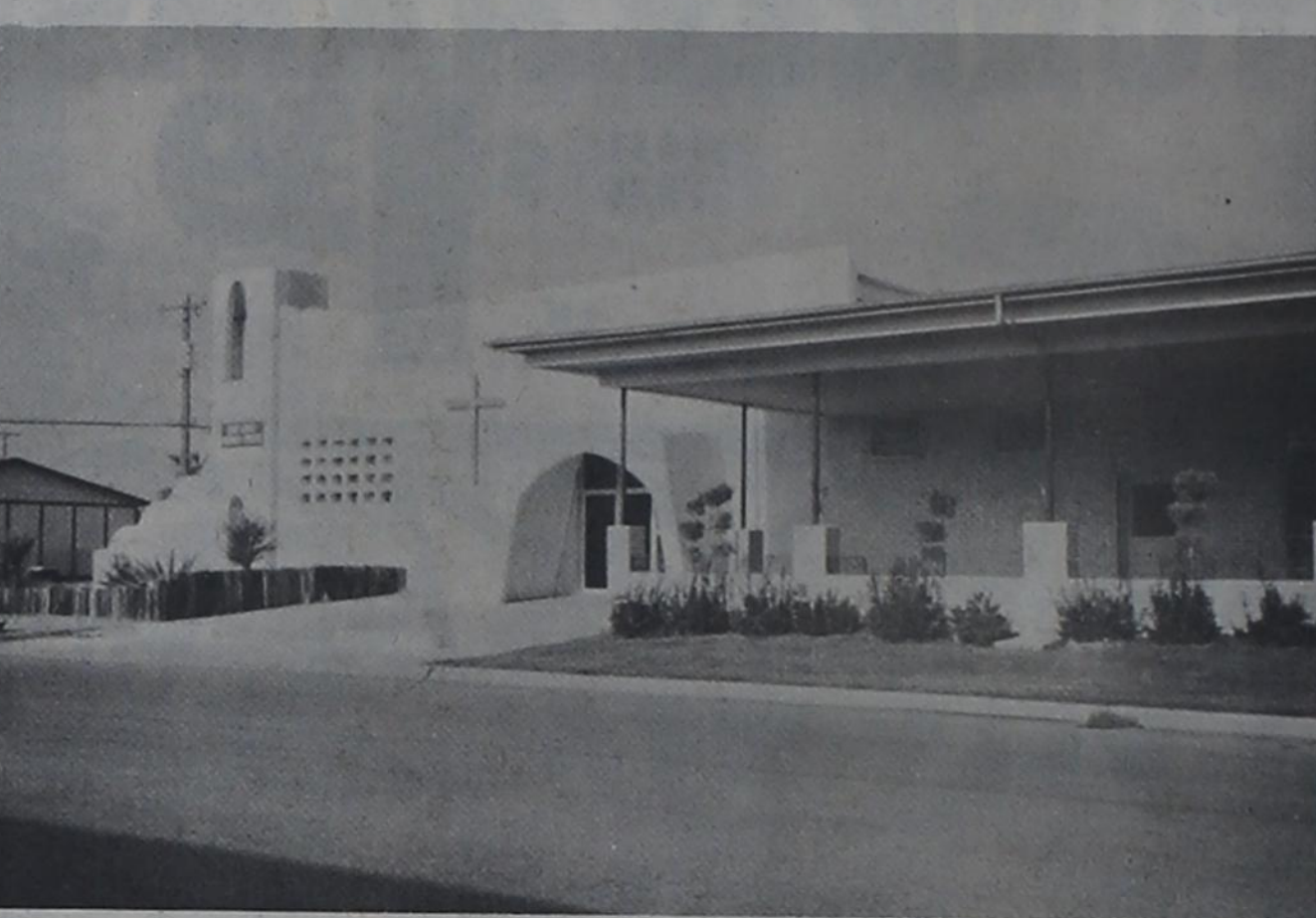

Lopes 'faster and stronger'

Coach David Thompson figures to field a good Antelope football team this fall whose principal problem will be its lack of depth.

The Lope grid mentor and his coaching staff welcomed 45 sophomores, junior and senior candidates out for football Monday morning. The group included seven starters back from the 1979 varsity.

"Our job," Coach Thompson told The Dispatch Tuesday afternoon is to get them into shape so they don't get hurt."

"We're a lot quicker and stronger than last year," Thompson declared with a satisfied smile. "We're going to be pretty good if nobody gets hurt."

The grid mentor has virtually his starting 1979 backfield back intact plus three regulars up front, including Quick End Mark Holly, 170-pound senior, who Thompson sees as a stickout pass catcher.

Coaches are working the squad twice daily at 7:30 a.m. and 6 p.m. in two-a-day conditioning drills.

Players will put on pads Friday morning for the first time.

Coach Thompson invites all interested local fans out to the first squad controlled-type scrimmage starting at about 9 a.m. Saturday in Antelope Stadium.

He expects about 10 or more upperclassmen to report for football within the week. Freshmen will report next Monday.

The opening game of the season will be at Lockney Friday night, Sept. 5, but two scrimmages are scheduled for August to get the club ready for its 10-game season.

The Lopes will scrimmage at Ralls next Friday evening, Aug. 22, and will entertain Littlefield here in Antelope Stadium Friday evening, Aug. 29.

The veteran backfield will be composed of four seniors.

They include Drew Kirkpatrick, 150-pound quarterback; fullback Barry Wyatt, a 175-pounder; tailback Alonza Luna, who weighs in at 160; and wingback Russell Fluitt, a 145-pounder who was a part-time starter a year ago.

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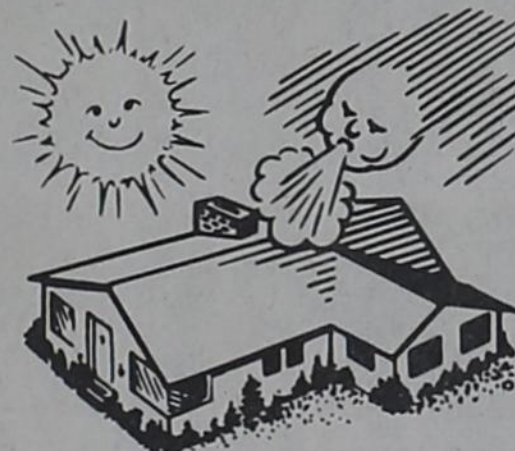

Campers have preferred tents instead of cabins every year, as is still the case.

The first year of camp was trial and error for both campers and staff members with all parts of the week's endeavors new to all. It was the idea from the beginning to have the camp as a wilderness camp, with campers 'roughing it' and rough it they did that first year.

The cooking facilities were set up in a rented tent with Guy Goen, of Spur, furnishing all the cooking facilities out of his ranch chuck wagon. Meals were cooked on camp fires and chuck wagon facilities, but the food was nevertheless devoured by the hungry campers.

Borrowed tents and campers furnished by members of the Church of Christ all over the area, were set up and campers loved the setting of camping out. And true to form, it rained all week, but it was a happy and memorable week for all who were involved in the activities.

New camp sessions along with camp facilities were added each year as support and interest grew. Some camp sessions are full, with just not enough room for all who want to attend. The camp to date now has four full week sessions.

All of the work at the camp has been done through donations of time, lots of good old hard work and also donations of buildings that were not in use. The camp today is staffed by volunteer workers who do all the cooking, cleaning and general duties needed during the four weeks of camp sessions.

Counselors are Christian college students who are paid very little for their work with the youngsters, but money is not their aim, as can be seen by the results of the camp. Firm friendships are formed that last a lifetime. Some campers have started their camp summers in the fifth grade and gone through all years of high school. They

have even returned to become counselors and also teachers.

In 1973 plans were made for three one-week sessions and the amphitheater was designed by Dick Laird who was at that time camp director. Money and materials for the amphitheater were donated by the Monterey Church of Christ.

In 1975 after an idea by Jay Don Rogers, the new camp director, a western street was added for flavor at the camp and today the street is like stepping back into the past with buildings representing the old west with corral and all. The staff members and teachers live in the old west buildings which are very modern inside, with the outer parts of the buildings copies of old time buildings.

In 1975 a swimming pool was added and other general improvements made. A boxcar was buried and redone to house classes and to serve as a storm shelter. In 1976 the Bait Rite building was purchased from Arnold and Patsy Sanderson and with that purchase they donated more land to the camp. The building is now housing the crafts classes that are given during camp sessions.

Many memorials have been given to the camp, including a small building to store sports equipment given in memory of Kam Huntley, grandson of Sexton and Inez Huntley of Post who was killed in an accident following a year of his attending camp at White River.

Ken Bozeman's family donated the new nurses quarters which house the camp nurse and any campers who have cuts and scratches or just need a little "tender loving care."

In 1977 Hesten and Ruby Bennett donated a farm house, and refurnished it for the camp director to live in while camp is in session. Also the Afton Church of Christ donated their building which was redone and turned into the Opry house which serves as an auditorium for campers programs.

In 1978, Willie Harris along with several others built the jail to go on the old west street.

The camp is open to all youth of the area, fifth grade through high school, regardless of church preference. Bible classes, music, nature hikes, crafts of all kinds and just a fun filled week of getting together, making friends and memories, are the objectives of the camp. It is for young people with love from area Churches of Christ.

Activities held during a regular week of camp include for just a few, a western day, featuring a shootout at the OK Corral in "old west" town, complete with horses and guns and good and bad guys.

Arnold Sanderson brings his horses over for the kids to ride and to make the western day complete. They have other scheduled activities including skit night in which the counselors and campers entertain other campers and guests, devotions held out with nature, down by the lake or in the amphitheater or just under a mesquite tree.

Campers are not there just to have a good time, which is important, but they are there also to learn. They are responsible for their tents, their care during camp, and they are graded on their abilities. They can earn patches for their accomplishments.

The main idea of the camp is to show young people they can be at one to God and all his blessings and how to enjoy and appreciate all that He gives. They are brought closer to God and to each other during their experiences and it is hoped that their camp experiences will remain with them throughout their life. The camp is staffed by dedicated Christians who really care for the campers.

The camp and all of its activities have become a labor of love for many local people. Jim Strawn who is in the oil transport business has been camp cook for many years, taking his

The PUC ruling calls for the \$4,000,000 service penalty for poor service to be removed if the staff investigation next February reveals the utility firm is then meeting the commission's service objectives and standards.

If not, then the recommendation includes the suggestion that the staff be instructed to consider initiating proceedings to decertify General Telephone in its serving areas in Texas.

Rates in effect until Oct. 1 were established on a city-by-city basis prior to the establishment of the PUC in September 1976, but under the tariff approved by the commission basic service rates will now be based on the number of telephones which can be reached without a long distance charge and are placed in 10 separate groups.

Post is among 162 communities composing group I of the ten separate groups and phone patrons here will pay the lowest rates authorized General Telephone in Texas. This group has 3,200 phones or less reachable without long distance charges.

Group 10, which has a million to 1½ million phones available on local service, will have new rates of \$11.15 for one-party residential service and \$37.30 for one-party business service.

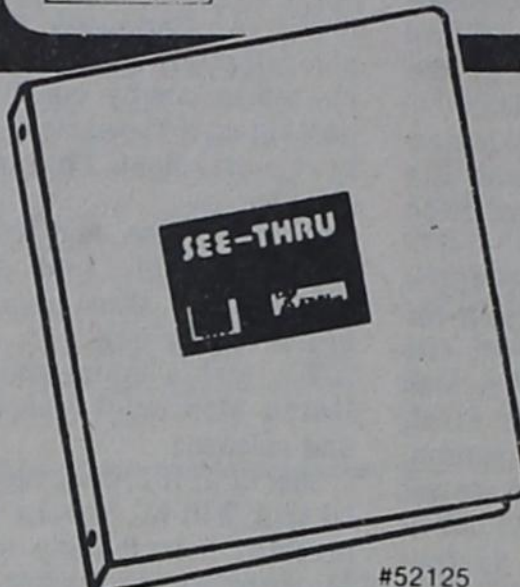
General Telephone filed their rate increase request Feb. 25. Hearings were concluded in June.

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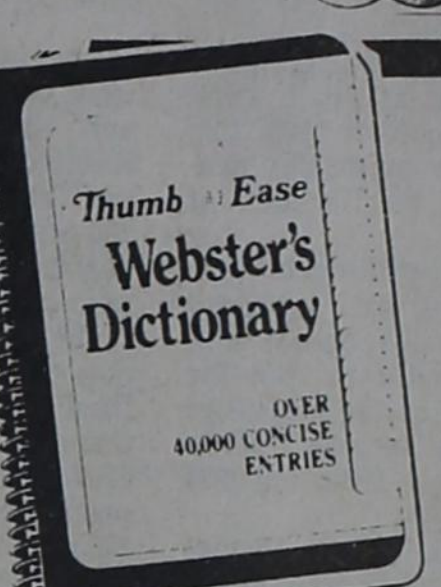
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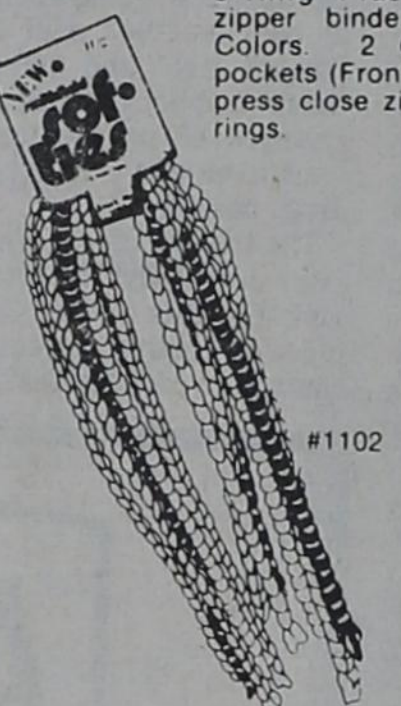
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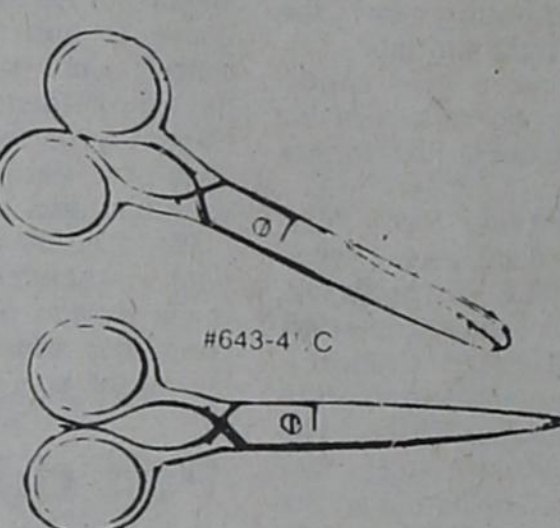
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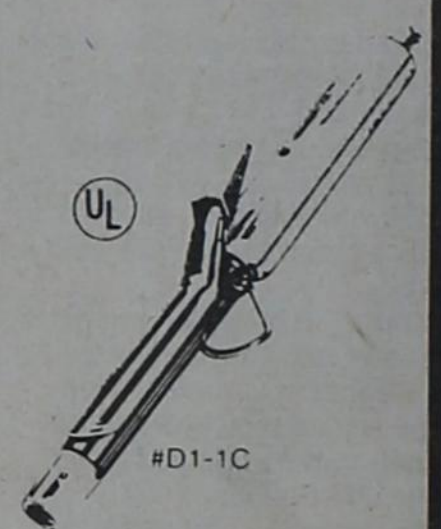
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The White River Youth Camp
