WATER CONSERVATION PARLEY

IRVIN R. BUCHANAN CALLS MEETING OF G. P. F. P. & T. A. AMARILLO FEBRUARY 8

Irvin R. Buchanan, Ochiltree county district and county clerk, and Texas director of the Great Plains Farm Pond & Terracing Association, has called a meeting of all parties interested in water conservation and "keeping the rainfall where it falls", in Amarillo on February 8.

Much interest over the Southwest has been created by the program outlined by this association for the conservation of moisture by the building of small farm ponds and terracing of all fields, even though they be practically level. A number of experts of this subject have been procured for the Amarillo meeting.

The G. P. F. P. & T. A. was organized at a meeting held in Perryton on December 11. A second meeting was held at Elkhart, Kansas on January 9. As a result of the information given out at these meetings, plans have already been laid out for participation by the state and federal governments in the cost of such water conservation projects.

PERRYTON POSTMASTER CHANGE

APPLICATION DEAD LINE SET AT FEBRUARY 12; PRESENT TERM EXPIRES ON FEBRUARY 4, 1935

A call has been issued by the United States Civil Service Commission, at the request of the Postmaster General, for a competitive examination for Postmaster in Perryton to succeed Mrs. John A. Black, whose term expires on February 4, 1935. Applications to take the examination will close on February 12, 1935.

This examination is to be held under the President's Order of July 12, 1933, and not under the civil service act and rules. Competitors will not be required to report for examination at any place, but will be rated upon their education and training, business experience and fitness.

Parties wishing to apply for the office may obtain application Form 10, and Form 2213, containing definite information in regard to the examination from the secretary of the civil service examiners at the Perryton office or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications must be properly executed and filed with the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., prior to the closing hour of business on February 12, 1935.

The call specifically warns against offering, promising, paying, soliciting, or receiving any money or other valuable thing as a political contribution or otherwise for use of influence, support, or promise of support in obtaining appointment. Any such act is a violation of the law, and offenders will be prosecuted.

CALICHE WORK STARTED NO. 4

CALICHE IN CUTS ON GRADE BEING LAID ON NEW ROAD; COMPLETE TWO MILES

Caliche work on the new grade on Highway No. 4 has been started with nearly a mile on each side of Wolf creek being completed with the first course. The caliche is being pulled from cuts on the grade and it is estimated that this will supply enough material for approximately nine miles of double course base without the necessity of opening up caliche pits.

Three-quarters of a mile of double course, loose caliche has been laid north of Wolf creek to a depth of twelve inches. The work south of Wolf creek covers about a mile of single course, six inch caliche.

SIGNING CORN-HOG CONTRACT

EXPECT TO HAVE CONTRACTS SIGNED AND COMPLETED FOR MAILING FIRST OF FEBRUARY

With the meeting at the Alfalfa schoolhouse tonight, the campaign for the signing of the 1935 Corn-Hog contracts for Ochiltree county will be brought to a close. Meetings have been held in every precinct in the county this week; at Huntoon, Monday; at Farnsworth, Tuesday; and at McMillen, on Wednesday night.

County Agent J. T. Stovall urges that parties who did not sign the contracts at the community meetings, call at his office in the courthouse and sign up at once, as contracts completed will be mailed on February 1. It is to the interest of the farmer to complete his contract, for the first mailed in will be the first to receive their checks from the administration.

MOST MONEY TO OCHILTREE CO.

OCHILTREE COUNTY FARMERS LEAD NORTH PANHANDLE IN AAA PAYMENTS DURING 1934

With \$490,204, almost a half-million dollars, Ochiltree county farmers and land owners lead the Panhandle in 1934 in benefit payments from the AAA to those who participated in the cotton, corn-hog, and wheat program adjustments. Hall with \$422,000 was second, and Collingsworth with \$410,701, was third on the list.

A total of \$7,417,500 was paid in 1934 to farmers in the 23 northwest counties of Texas comprising District 1 of the State Extension service through three divisions of government benefit programs.

This total is exclusive of the cotton certificates, which amounts to more than a million dollars and also excludes the amount of money received through the AAA cattle purchasing program.

The total number of cotton contracts in District 1 in 1934 was 10,750, with benefit payments totalling \$2,600,000. There were 4,415 corn-hog contracts, with payment totalling \$817,500, and 8,000 wheat contracts, with benefit payments amounting to \$4,000,000.

Income Tax Changes

New Regulations Announced Regarding Filing Federal Income Tax Returns

The attention of all persons required to file income tax returns covering the year 1934 is respectfully directed as follows:

The Revenue Act of 1934 requires that all joint returns must be signed by both husband and wife. Either may prepare and acknowledge the return, but the signature of each must be affixed. Those persons desiring to make out their returns in the collector's office or at designated places in the various portions of the district should be accompanied by their respective husbands or wives. If this is impracticable, either may render the return under oath, and take to the return for his or her signature. The return, however, must be prepared and mailed in time to reach the collector's office on or before midnight of March 15, 1935.

Special emphasis is given to the fact that the new form 1094 (the pink slip) must be executed and submitted together with the income tax return. Failure to do this, in each case, will result in an arbitrary charge of \$5.00, which amount will be added to the amount due and will be collected in the same manner as the tax. It is highly important that this new requirement be not overlooked, since the collector will be powerless to waive payment of this charge in case of failure to file said Form 1094.

Taxpayers should file their returns at the earliest moment possible so as to obtain better service and avoid the rush conditions usually prevailing during the last few days of the filing period.

SHOW INTEREST IN TERRACING

RECOMMENDED AS PREVENTATIVE STEP FOR SOIL BLOWING HERE IN PANHANDLE

With the continued drought and the prevalence of fields blowing out during the sandstorms, many farmers are becoming more interested in ways and means of storing the scant moisture supply and preventing wind erosion. Terracing and contouring is the answer to this problem.

Terracing in the Panhandle has been demonstrated to prove that it will control not only the run-off water but the wind erosion or "blow out" as well. A nine year test at Goodwell, Okla., Experiment station has given some interesting results, chief among these being the increase in production of about one-third over the nine year period. This means that if the normal production of wheat were nine bushels per acre on unterraced land, the same land terraced would produce about twelve bushels. Terracing costs would be more than repaid any normal year since the land can be terraced for from fifty cents to one dollar and fifty cents per acre, depending on the nature of the ground.

On land to be planted to feed in 1935, it is recommended that the rows be run on the level so that each row catch and hold all water falling on the land. J. T. Stovall, county agent, hopes to be able to terrace all land where requests are made for lines. In order to do this it will be necessary to have the assistance of the land owner and operator. If you expect or desire to have lines run on your land, you are requested to call at Mr. Stovall's office and list such land with him.

TO TEST STOCK FOR ABORTION

LIVESTOCK SANITARY COM. WILL CONDUCT TESTS FOR CONTAGIOUS ABORTION

Forms have been received at the office of J. T. Stovall, county agent, requesting the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas to conduct tests for contagious abortion among livestock in Ochiltree county.

Several stockmen have made requests that tests be made with the idea of freeing their herds and the county as a whole of abortion or Bang's "sease". Blanks for this purpose were requested and have arrived. Any stockman interested in this work is requested to call at the office of the county agent and become familiar with this contract. The disease is contagious and one animal may carry it to an entire herd. It has been spreading rapidly in this section during the past few years and drastic measures must be taken to free herds of diseased animals.

International Sunday School Lesson

Lesson IV Jan. 27, 1935

PETER'S DENIAL

Memory Verse: "Wherefore, let him that thinketh he standeth, take heed lest he fall." 1 Cor. 10:12.

Lesson Text: Mark 14:27-31, 54, 66-72

I. Peter's Denial Foretold

"All ye shall be offended." This was bad news to the disciples who thought nothing could separate them from their Master. But it is hard to know our own strength or weakness. We may be overconfident and fail to take proper precaution about our soul. No one is more in danger of a tragedy than he who thinks it cannot possibly happen. He who thinks it is impossible for him to go on the rocks ought to beware. He is already so near their rugged edges that the next wave may crush him like an eggshell.

II. A Parental Rainbow

"Howbeit after I am raised up, I will go before you into Galilee." This was a refreshing turn of the subject. Despite the desertion of the disciples, the Lord would rise from the dead and meet them again in Galilee made sacred by their associations and travels there. We may fail, but the Lord will not. Men may deny him, but he will not deny himself. So the great program of redemption will move majestically on. We may fall by the wayside, but that won't stop the onward trek of the army of the Lord. As no amount of failure on the part of Jesus' disciples could prevent His coming forth from the dead as Victor, so present-day failures will not be "blotted out" of the Lamb's book of life, others who remain faithful will receive the crown.

The theme of the resurrection is the theme of heaven. It is the key to the gospel message. Upon it depends the convincing power of the New Testament. The fact that Jesus came forth from the dead assures us that we shall also come forth.

III. Peter's Denial Emphasized

Peter's boastful confidence in himself became vanity. He would remain true even though the other disciples did not. He placed himself upon a higher level of moral and spiritual fortitude. His own heart told him he would not deny the Lord. But he who trusts in his own heart is a fool, says the Book. Our hearts may deceive us. When our heart says one thing—speaks assurance, and the word of the Lord contradicts it—warns us, we ought to take the word of the Lord instead of our heart. When man by his "feelings" determines he is in harmony with God, yet has failed to obey the things heaven has commanded him to do, his assurance is only a deceiving mirage that will mock him in eternity.

On the one hand we have Peter vehemently and stoutly affirming he will not deny the Christ. On the other, we have the calm testimony of Jesus that the fisherman would do it—even before the cock crowed twice.

IV. The Denial Occasioned

"And Peter had followed him afar off." This tells us volumes. Peter became a distant disciple. Instead of staying close to his Lord in the trying hours, he, like Lot's wife, followed from behind. Wolves look for stragglers. Let a little lamb stray behind the flock and far from the shepherd and the jaws of wild beasts soon have it by the throat.

V. The Denial Accomplished

Peter warmed at the enemy's fire. This is a poor policy for any of us. The warmth of the devil's camp is made by the flames of hate—not love. So Peter begins to breathe the atmosphere around him. Fearful, he is unable to face even a damsel's question. Forbidden by the Master to use the sword of steel, he was unable to use that more powerful weapon—patience under suffering. So like a whimpering coward, he denies his own Lord three times. A fisherman's profanity punctuates his denials. It doesn't sound like Peter, but it is the price he must pay for negligence and vanity. The peacock has been hit by a hailstone. His vain plumage, bruised and disheveled, wilts to the ground, and poor Simon slinks away, a coward and a deserter!

IV. The Denial Verified

What is that noise? Only a rooster crowing! But the sensitive ear of Peter has caught it. After all, Jesus was right. Peter was wrong. The man who couldn't fall did fail. He who would die with his Lord, had not even spoken for him. But the cock-crowing aroused Peter's better self. He recalled the con-

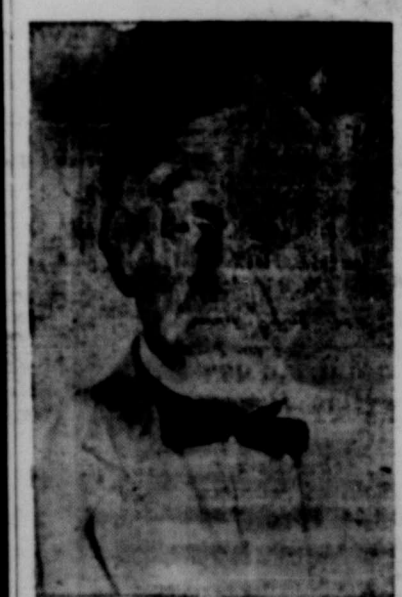

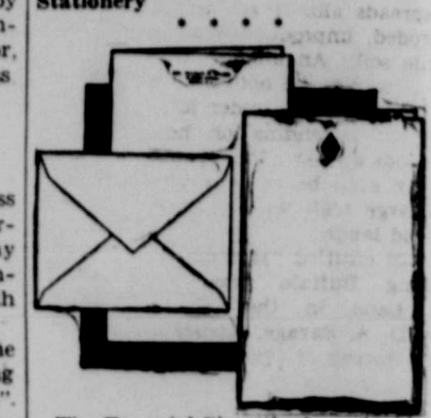

Buffalo Grass May Grow Again On Deserted Wheat Land In West

Once trod by the buffalo, the land is now a desert. The Hays, Kansas, experiments at the U. S. Department of Agriculture show that drought-resistant and erosion-resistant buffalo grass may be re-established on abandoned wheat lands in the Great Plains. The method, which the government has found to be highly practical, is to transplant pieces of sod to well-plowed land.

It spreads almost as fast on eroded, unproductive acres as on fertile soil. An almost complete cover may be obtained in one to five years, under local conditions, depending on how the sods are set. This transplanting may even be economically on a large scale with a minimum of hand labor.

Article 328 entitled "Methods of Establishing Buffalo Grass on Deserted Land in the Great Plains," by D. A. Savage, Assistant Botanist, Bureau of Plant Industry, describes the most practical methods for reestablishing buffalo grass. Copies may be obtained at its each from the Superintendent of Public Documents, Washington, D. C. Full planting of buffalo grass has been weakened by drought that is not advisable. The experiments at Hays, Kans., have shown that buffalo grass may be planted successfully every year from March to August, inclusive, but the best time seems to be March or April following a rain before spring growth has started.

The first experimental transplanting of any consequence probably was that started at Hays in 1912. Since then, the experiment has been continued, and in 1929, to discover the most satisfactory size of sod and width of rows, to develop more efficient economical methods of transplanting, to learn more about the sods of buffalo grass, and how to prepare the land and how to set the sods.

The value of native buffalo grass sods, as well as for lawns, courses and general landscaping on the Great Plains has long been recognized. No domestic or imported grass used elsewhere for varied purposes has been found adapted to climatic conditions in western region. It is an active perennial turf grass, able to withstand heavy tramping and grazing and able to recover from the effects of drought.

Adapted to a rainfall of 12 to 20 inches and will endure hot summer and cold winters. Roughly the land in which it will grow includes western three-fourths of North Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, the Panhandle of Texas, and the parts of Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, and New Mexico east of the foothills of the Rockies. Buffalo grass is a rather producer, but highly nutritious palatable to livestock. When grazed during the summer it cures on the ground and makes excellent winter pasture. Re-establishing nature's choice Great Plains grass presents a simple task. It takes 20 to 50 years for buffalo grass to recapture land out of cultivation, because it is almost entirely by surface erosion. It cannot be established any success by seeding, because seeds cannot be depended upon to germinate. In addition they are used near the ground and are killed by frost. Buffalo grass is propagated by setting out sods in moist soil, but this tedious work and is likely to fail on dry land. Solid spacing of buffalo grass soil is practical only on very small areas such as lawns

where the chief consideration is immediate results.

To re-establish larger areas with buffalo grass, the Hays station found 4-inch cubes of sod the most convenient size to transplant and the most efficient in spread. Larger sods re-establish themselves more quickly and may be used if the supply is plentiful. But the 4-inch cubes when alternately spaced one foot apart covered the intervening space in one season under local dry land conditions. Similar sods spaced three feet apart required less than three years to make a cover of grass. At the end of five seasons the sods placed six feet apart had covered practically all the intervening spaces. Sod in 6-inch wide solid rows, three feet apart, provide a cover much sooner but less efficiently—considering the amount of sod material used—than individual sods three feet apart. An acre of land when planted with 4-inch cubes three feet apart, requires a strip of sod a foot wide and 540 feet long. About nine times as much turf is needed when the sods are placed only one foot apart.

For transplanting on a large scale the Hays station used sods four or more inches square and one to two inches deep, merely dropping them on deeply and freshly cultivated land and pressing them level with the surface with a weighted packer. This eliminated the labor of digging holes or plowing furrows and setting the sods by hand. A 12-inch sod cutter was used with erect dividing blades so as to cut three 4-inch strips one to two inches deep in one operation. The strips were then cut into convenient lengths with sharp spade and loaded on wagon or truck. The sods must be placed on the ground grass side up. To save labor they can be dropped into sheet iron chutes dragging behind a wagon or truck. Shovel attachments may be fastened to the bottom of the chutes to provide a shallow furrow for the sods.

With a practical sodding method of this sort, buffalo grass can be cheaply re-established on a considerable acreage of land either by individuals farmers or with state or federal aid.

"Re-sodding should be started on the higher ground so that if it is not completed at once, seed washing down from the higher land may assist in re-sodding the lower land," says Mr. Savage, who is conducting the experiments.

He tells of other means of transplanting large pieces of sod which were tried with varying degrees of success. Tossing the sod in shallow furrows and harrowing and packing the land afterward was likely to cover many of the sods beyond recovery or to greatly retard their growth. A hand rake can be used to fill in around the sods but this adds to the cost. Cultivation after transplanting should not be attempted as it destroys the surface runners and encourages wind and water erosion.

Broadcasting small pieces of buffalo grass turf on recently cultivated land and packing afterwards is a practical method, but only under the most favorable rainfall conditions. Turf was broadcast in this manner both by hand and with a manure spreader, but the later method knocked most of the soil off the roots if the pieces were small to begin with. Disking the ground afterwards was not a success. On two successive years the broadcasting method was a failure because dry, windy weather followed. The ultimate spread of the grass when successfully broadcast was the same as that of the 4-inch cubes spaced three feet apart, but the final surface was smoother than on the

transplanted plots. About one acre of sod was used for every nine acres covered.

Sods should be obtained from a stand of nearly pure buffalo grass, avoiding areas with mixtures of grama grass, which often is confused with buffalo grass. The grama grass however has taller stems, makes a less attractive turf and spreads less rapidly. Under natural conditions buffalo grass occurs in mixtures of about equal parts of staminate (male) and pistillate (female) plants with occasional patches entirely of one sex.

For lawns exclusive use of the pistillate plants is preferable. Such a lawn with leaves wholly covering the stems is more attractive than a lawn with some staminate plants. While the brown spikelets of the later are not wholly unattractive, they rise above the leaves and detract from the green appearance of the lawn.

If sods for planting are cut from a buffalo grass pasture in alternate strips, the buffalo grass rapidly recovers the shallow furrows left by the cutter. Bare spots left in the spring usually are covered with grass by fall. Cutting on the contour controls erosion in the furrows. If it is desirable to retain the original smoothness of the prairie, these furrows may be filled with fresh soil, but for pasture purposes a little roughness may even be desirable to retard runoff of rainfall.

Reasonable grazing of buffalo grass sods as soon as they are firmly rooted, and clipping at a height of around two inches, aid in keeping down competitive weeds and other grasses which shut out the sunlight. Repeated close clipping weakens the grass and encourages weeds.

Although thousands upon thousands of acres of buffalo grass have been destroyed by the plow, it still is found in varying degrees of abundance on non-sandy soils from southwestern Montana and southwestern North Dakota, to south central Texas, and from the foothills of the Rockies to the 97th degree of longitude on the Plains. It thrives without irrigation although water sparingly applied is helpful in starting growth.

Commenting on the "back to grass" movement, a Great Plains pioneer says, "The 'sod-buster' plow, once a symbol of progress, led us too far. The drought and dust storms last summer convince us that thousands of acres in the Great Plains should never have been touched by the plow. The Indian who complained that a piece of overturned sod was 'wrong side up,' was more far-seeing than the white man."

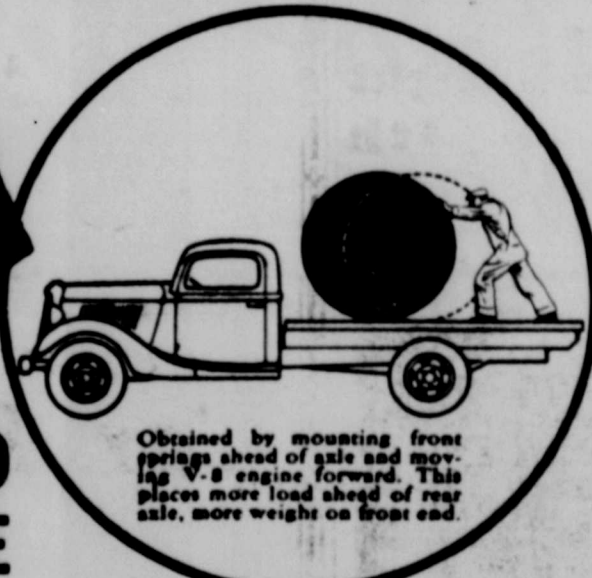

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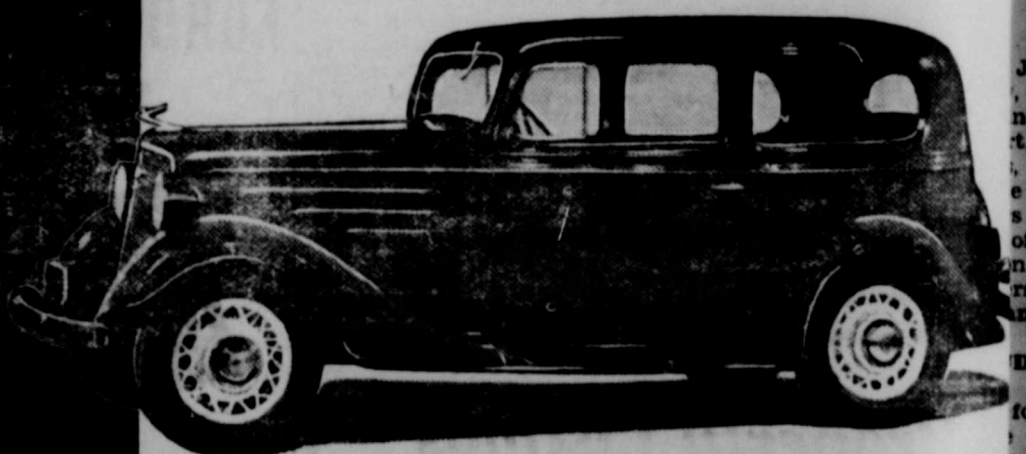

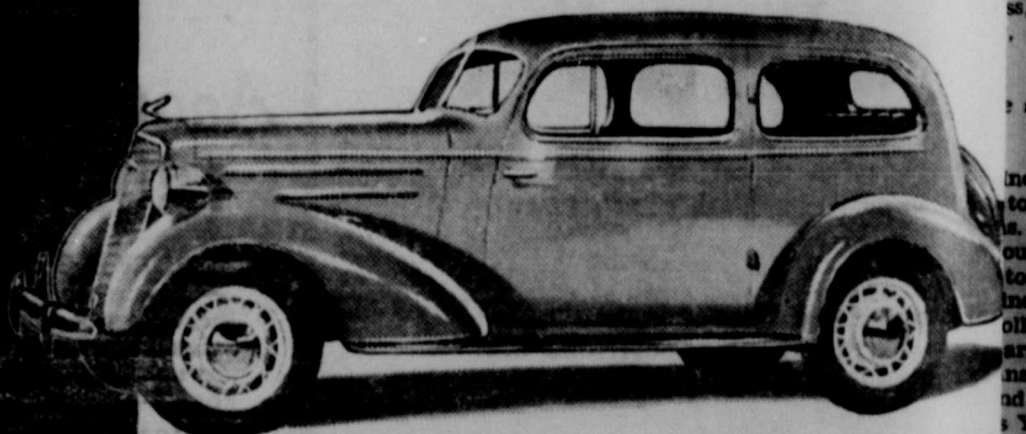

REMOVED FROM FEDERAL ROLLS

TEXAS RELIEF COMMISSION ANNOUNCING REGULATIONS ON NEW FEDERAL RELIEF

Austin, Jan. 15.—The question of how serious removal of unemployable persons from federal relief rolls will be was being answered last week as county administrators completed an analysis of caseloads over the state. Results of the count were due in the state administrative office by January 10.

The following regulations were adopted for the guidance of administrators in determining classifications under the new federal order.

Women eligible for mothers' aid under act of the 42nd legislature are not eligible for F. E. R. A. relief.

Persons more than 65 years old are not eligible for federal relief excepting at the request of the client and then only after physical certification by a physician recommended by the county administrator and approved by the Texas Relief Commission.

Persons regardless of age who as a result of an examination by a physician recommended by the administrator and approved by the Texas Relief Commission are found incapable of performing a full day's work at their normal occupation or any other worthwhile work are not eligible.

Persons receiving allowances under the pauper fund are not eligible to F. E. R. A. relief, and F. E. R. A. funds can not be used to supplement relief given by the city, county or state.

Persons suffering from chronic illnesses who, as a result of examination by a physician recommended by the administrator and approved by the Texas Relief Commission, are declared able to perform a full day's work, are eligible for federal relief.

A temporary disabled person who is otherwise normally employable shall be considered the responsibility of the F. E. R. A. and shall receive direct relief from federal funds pending his recovery.

If within the household of an unemployed person eligible for federal relief there is an aged, infirm or otherwise unemployable person or any dependent who normally was supported by the wage earner, work certification should be sufficient to provide for such person's care.

Physical examinations were contemplated for only two groups as follows:

Persons more than 65 years old who have had continuous gainful employment record and who appear to be able to work.

Administrators were cautioned that examinations should be sufficiently thorough to insure soundness of constitution so that F. E. R. A. will not put persons more than 65 years old or those suffering from chronic illnesses to work if work would jeopardize life or health.

Results of the analysis will show the number of women eligible to mothers' aid, the number of persons more than 65 years old who have not been regularly employed and who can not receive a physician's certificate, number of persons less than 65 years old physically or mentally incapable of working, and all others not eligible to F. E. R. A. funds.

To Distribute Milk

Texas Relief Commission To Distribute Canned Milk To Relief Roll Clients

Austin, Jan. 15.—Texas Relief Commission will receive for distribution to relief clients over the state 1,804,800 cans of evaporated milk. It was announced last week by C. Z. Crain, head of the commodities distribution department. The cans, each containing 14½ ounces of milk, will be distributed on a basis of nine cans per average family per month. Mr. Crain said he expected delivery to Texas distribution points by the Federal Surplus Relief Corporation within the next 20 days.

Mr. Crain also announced distribution of 35,408 mattresses manufactured in Texas Relief Commission plants. Manufacture of mattresses will continue until materials supplied by the Federal Surplus Relief Corporation have been exhausted.

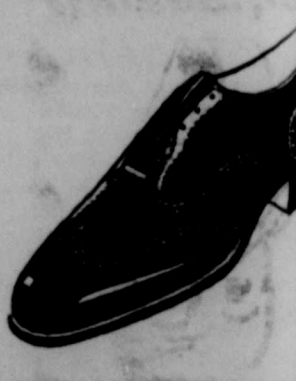
