Abernathy Defeats Idalou In Thriller

IDALOU (Special) — It was a close, bitter battle all the way and when the smoke had cleared Friday night, Abernathy's Antelopes were on top, 26 to 20, over the fighting Idalou Wildcats.

They swapped first quarter TD's and Idalou owned a 7-6 lead at the change. Ronald Harkey ran 3 yards for Abernathy's TD and a running try for extras, failed. John Hamilton plowed 5 yards for an Idalou touch and he kicked extra point.

Again, they swapped TD's in the second. David DeBusk tore out 63 yards for an Idalou TD. Hamilton kicked. Abernathy was right back with Jerry Fuller going 55 yards for a TD. A run try for extras failed. Idalou held a 14-12 lead.

And again in the third stanza, they traded TD punches. Gary Sage plumped 1 yard for the Idalou six patch. Kick for point was blocked. Billy Ellis reeled off 70 yards with a pass from Fuller for the Antelope six points in this frame. A pass for extras fell short. Idalou led going into the last quarter, 20 to 18.

But the 'Lopes squeezed out 8 points in the final quarter. Harkey went in for a TD from 2 yards out. Running for extras failed. The winners got a safety when an Idalou back was trapped in the end zone.

The Antelope victory wasn't all joy. By the time the game ended, 17-year-old Gary Martin, a senior halfback, lay in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital where he was being treated for undetermined injuries.

A hospital spokesman said the youth was being X-rayed late Friday night, but indicated the injury was serious enough that he would be admitted.

PARCEL POST RATES HIGHER AFTER OCT. 19

Postmaster Herman Lambert reminded postal customers today that higher parcel post and catalog rates will go into effect Saturday (October 19).

The rate increase will average 10.5 per cent and in most cases will mean an additional ten cents postage per parcel.

The higher rates were approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission in July.

Under the new rates the minimum charge for local parcel delivery will go from 40 to 50 cents. The minimum charge for parcels destined outside the local delivery area will be raised from 50 cents to 60 cents.

Almost all parcels that are charged up to \$1.10 under present rates will go up 10 cents. This accounts for more than 80 per cent of all parcel post. Postmaster Lambert pointed out,

There will be a 15-cent hike on most parcels now charged between \$1.10 and \$4, and a 20-cent increase on parcels now charged over \$4. Parcel post rates are based on the weight of the package and the distance it is mailed.

Higher rates for the delivery of packages and catalogs are required to bring revenue from this type of mail within four per cent of operating costs, as required by law. Postmaster Lambert explained. The higher rates are designed to put parcels and catalogs, which are fourth-class mail, on a break-even basis.

Additional revenue is needed from parcel post and catalogs to offset higher costs resulting from pay increases approved last year for postal employees.

ROY JONES IS ABERNATHY'S NEW CITY MANAGER; L. G. DEERING IS MAYOR UNTIL APRIL ELECTION

There was a "shake-up" at City Hall this week. Mayor Roy Jones and Councilman L. G. Deering were asked to resign their respective posts. In turn, their fellow Councilmen named Jones as Abernathy's new City Manager, and appointed Deering to serve as Mayor. Jones will follow Robert Sokoll, who resigned last week. He will begin duties as City Manager at Levelland Oct. 28. Following is Mr. Sokoll's official report on the City Council meeting:

Abernathy City Council met in Regular Session in the City Hall Monday, October 14, at 7:30 p. m., with the following members present: Mayor Roy E. Jones; Aldermen Lee Echols, Royce Henson, Ralph Wolf, Joe Chambers and L. G. Deering.

The minutes of the previous council meetings were read and approved as read.

Joe Chambers moved, and Ralph Wolf seconded that Ordinance No. 166, lowering the sanitation rate, be passed. Motion carried. This rate has been increased for a four month period to finance an aerial mosquito spray program.

The Council turned down a request by E. L. Moore to close an alley in Block 18, O. T. Addition. The Council reviewed a request for a water bill adjustment and ruled against making any correction on the person's bill.

George Davis, Sales Representative for National Cash Register, presented a proposal for a new bookkeeping and posting machine. The NCR bid was \$5,500. Co., Burroughs Corporation submitted a net bid of \$4,260.30 on a new posting machine. The City Manager gave a short report on a lease-purchase plan on a new billing machine. The Council reviewed the bids but took no action.

Glenn Rosendale, President of the Abernathy Community Action Board, gave a report on the progress and work that was being done by this organization. He also reviewed a survey it had been made of the town.

Jim Kuback made a request to the City that he be allowed to use the City Dump Ground to dispose of the Tucco debris. This request was refused by the Council.

The City Manager reported that the State Health Department had conducted a series of tests at the City Sewer Disposal Plant and that they had made several preliminary recommendations. The recommendations were as follows: (1) That the sewer effluent be metered and screened before it enters the treating plant (2) That laboratory equipment be purchased and daily tests be made of the effluent (3) That records be kept and periodic reports be submitted to the State Health Department. It was also mentioned that a secondary treatment might be necessary in future years. It was also reported that a detailed report will be given to the City just as soon as all the results of the tests are completed in Austin.

A report was also given on State Law numbered Article 4477-5, which was recently passed by the State Legislature, for the purpose of controlling air pollution. In accordance with provisions of this law the State Health Department is requiring all cities to cease burning refuse and to bury it daily, beginning July 1, 1969. Sokoll reported that he had been in contact with Austin, regarding this matter, and Abernathy will definitely be included under this law; and that the City need to begin making plans to change from an open dump to a sanitary land fill operation.

The Council briefly discussed a city sales tax as a means of financing some of the needed and required improvements. No action was taken regarding this matter.

Sokoll gave a report on a visit that had been made to Lake Meredith. Mayor Jones, Marvin Patterson and Sokoll made this trip for the purpose of checking into future water for Abernathy.

The Council approved a request by the City Manager for him to submit an application to employ three Neighborhood Youth Corps workers for next summer. It was explained that these youths would come from low income families and that the Federal Government would pay their salaries for a 28-hour week for a 10-week period.

Ralph Wolf moved, and Lee Echols seconded that a Paving Release Resolution, pertaining to property belonging to the White Estate, be passed. Motion carried. This resolution will clear up some legal matters and allow the City to receive \$577.80 for a paving lien that has been owed the City since 1961.

The City Manager presented reports on the Airport, Police Department, and Financial Statement.

In final action Royce Henson moved and Lee Echols seconded that Roy Jones be requested to resign as Mayor and be appointed City Manager. Motion carried on a unanimous vote of the Council.

Joe Chambers moved and Royce Henson seconded that L. G. Deering resign temporarily as Councilman to serve as Acting Mayor until next regular election in April. Motion carried unanimously.

No other business coming before the Council, meeting was adjourned at 11:30 p. m.

City Manager Bob Sokoll announced that absentee voting in the General Election will begin at Abernathy City Hall for Hale County voters Thursday, Oct. 17, and will continue through Friday, Nov. 1. City Secretary, will be in charge of the absentee voting here.

The General Election will be held November 5. Ballot will range from the office of President of the United States down to County and Precinct offices. Texas voters also will ballot on 14 proposed Constitutional Amendments.

You must present your Voter Registration Certificate at the time you request to vote by absentee ballot.

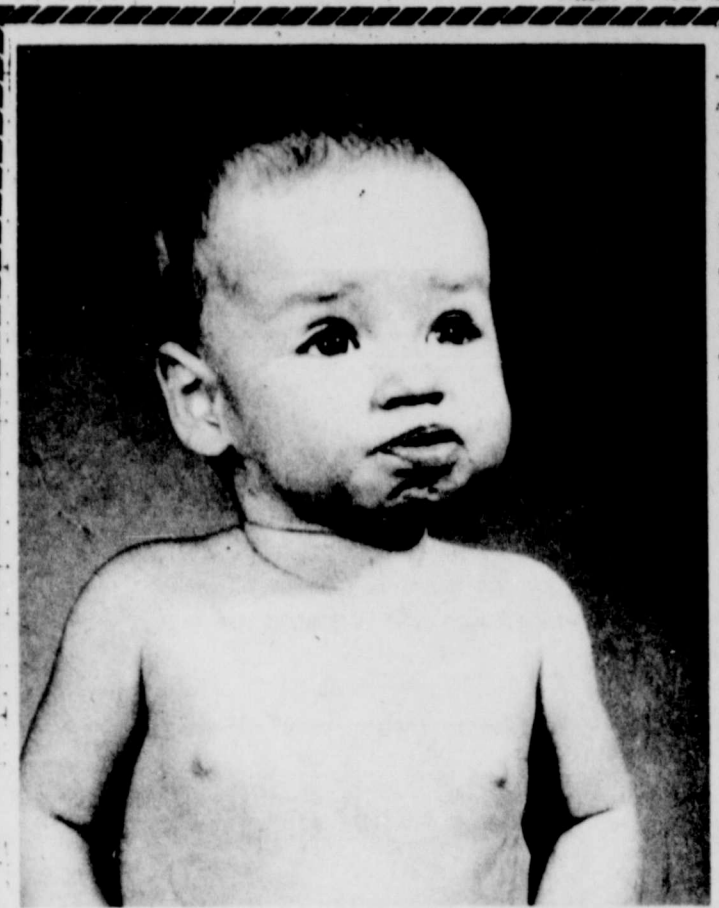
VETERANS LAND BOARD SALE

WELDING SCHOOL HELD AT NEW DEAL

"A farm welding short course for adult farmers has been held under the sponsorship of the New Deal High School Vocational Agriculture Dept., according to Mr. B. D. Mann, Supt. and Mr. Robert Sisco, teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Mr. Joel R. Barton, welding specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A & M University did the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A & M University.

Mr. Barton is a native of Glascock County, Texas, and was reared on a West Texas ranch. He attended grade school in San Angelo and graduated from high school at Big Lake, Texas. He holds a B. S. degree in animal husbandry from Texas A & M. After five years as a pilot in the U. S. Air Force, Mr. Barton served as an agricultural specialist in Texas State hospitals and special schools. In addition to regular classes, he set up farm shops and gave instruction in farm welding and general farm repair.

"Many welding short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Barton and all have met with outstanding success," according to Walter Labay, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Plainview, Texas. Arrangements for the adult education short course in welding and in other fields are made through Mr. Labay's office.

The short course at New Deal began Monday, Sept. 23, 1968 at 7:30 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of arc welding were held Monday through Thursday.

Mr. Barton stated that the short course was adjusted to the wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expected to cover such subjects as safety in welding, factors controlled by the operation in running a bead and striking an arc, types of electrodes, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hardsurfacing, and pipe welding.

"Short courses in welding, as well as other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A & M University," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Dept. of Agr. Ed. at Texas A & M University, who coordinates the program for Texas A & M.

NMSQT AVAILABLE FOR STUDENTS HERE

Abernathy High School students who expect to complete their secondary school requirements and to enter college in 1970 can register now to participate in the 1969-70 National Merit Scholarship Program, Counselor Charles Bowen announced today.

The first step for all students who wish to enter the nationwide competition is to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT). The test will be given in the school at 9:00 a. m., Tuesday, February 18, 1969.

Participating students pay a \$1.25 fee. When his NMSQT scores are reported, each participating student will receive a handbook to help him evaluate his scores and compare his performance with that of other high school students across the country. The handbook also contains information about choosing a college and financing college education. The handbook and other interpretive materials are furnished as a part of reporting the test results.

The highest-scoring students in each state will be named Semifinalists and will be eligible for Merit Scholarship consideration. In addition to the National Merit Scholarships financed by NMSC, more than 370 business corporations, foundations, colleges, professional associations, unions, trusts, other organizations, and individuals offer scholarships through the Merit Program.

About 18,750 students have won Merit Scholarships in the thirteen Merit Programs to date. Approximately 2,900 new winners of Merit Scholarships will enter college in the fall of 1968.

In 1968, the number participating students was 793,114. Of this number, 15,027 were named semi-finalists and 39,120 were named commended students. Abernathy had one student in this number, Royce Dean Walker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tella Walker.
