

Area Voters Choose Bentsen, Smith; Farwell Precinct Gives Nod To Bush

Parmer County voters joined with those across Texas in favoring Democratic candidates in Tuesday's general election.

In what was considered a good turnout for a non-presidential election, a total of 2154 voters went to the polls in Parmer's eight voting precincts. Another 66 votes were cast in absentee balloting prior to the election for an overall total of 2220.

Democratic Senatorial Candidate, Lloyd Bentsen, Jr., received a total of 1156 Parmer votes to lead over his Republican opponent, George Bush, who had a total of 1013. Bentsen led across the state as he was named to the Senate post now held by Ralph Yarborough, who was defeated by Bentsen in the Demo primary.

Preston Smith of Lubbock, incumbent governor and a Democrat and probably the most popular state politician in this area, won by 585 votes in Parmer County over his opponent, Paul Eggers, the GOP nominee. Thus Smith was returned to another two-year term in office. The Parmer County vote count was 1381 for Smith and 796 for Eggers.

Other Democratic candidates in the contest statewide races received comfortable margins from Parmer Countians.

The people in Parmer County, as expected, overwhelmingly defeated the proposed constitutional amendment which would allow for liquor to be sold by the drink in areas where such is approved by local option. Out of the 2220 total votes, 459 were in favor of the "open saloon" amendment while 1756 were against it. This amendment carried across the state.

Republican Bob Price of Pampa, U. S. Representative from the 18th Congressional District, was re-elected without opposition.

In the senatorial race, Bentsen carried five of the boxes in the county plus the absentee voting. Republican Bush led at Farwell, Rhea and Lakeview. Bentsen's largest percentage was in the Oklahoma Lane box where he got a 3-1 margin --- 94-35.

Smith carried all of Parmer's boxes except Rhea's. The voter turnout was down from the presidential election

year of '68, but was up considerably from the last off-presidential election --- 1966.

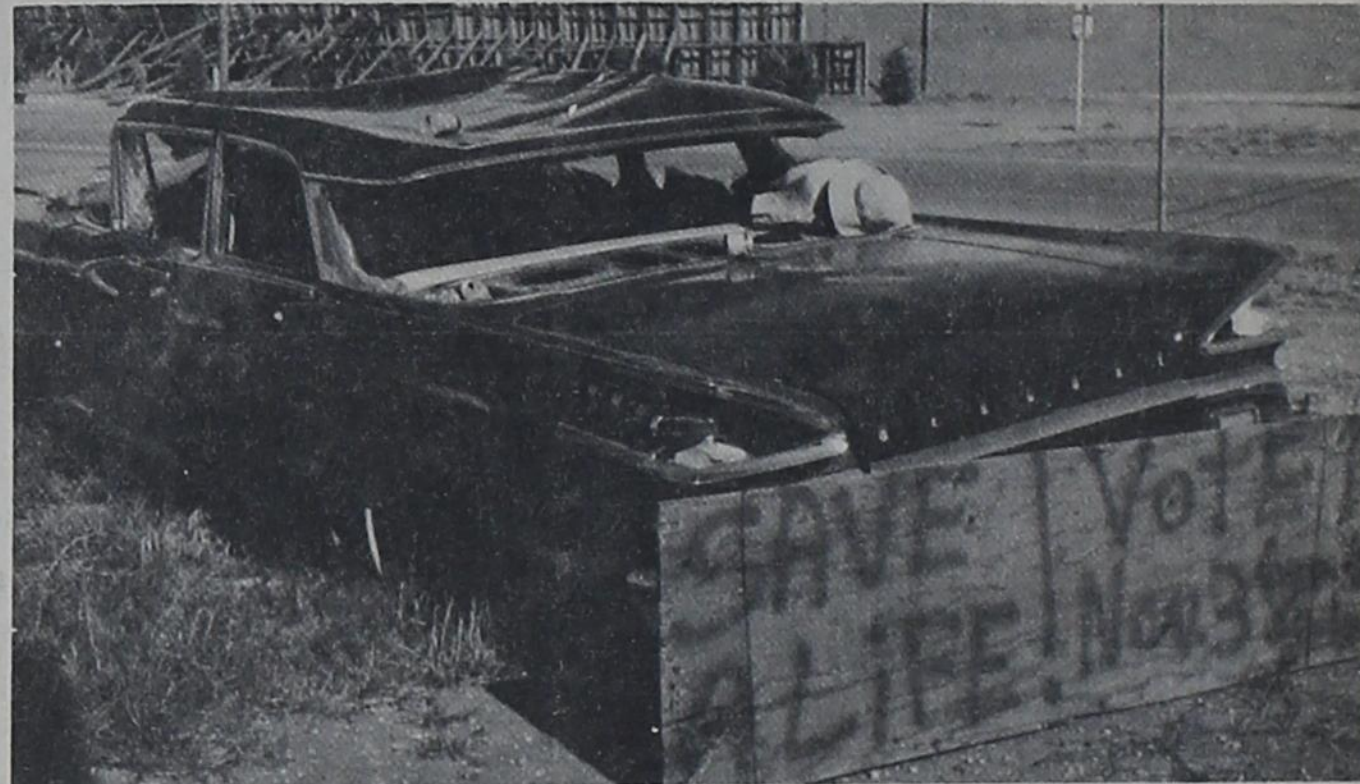
Football Banquet Set By Texico Boosters

Death Claims J. D. Kirkland

Funeral services were conducted from the First Baptist Church of Hereford Thursday, Oct. 29, for J. D. Kirkland, prominent area businessman in the field of irrigation and water well services.

Rev. Fields officiated at the final rites and burial was in a Hereford cemetery.

Mr. Kirkland, 62, who had recently moved to Hugoton, Kans., from Hereford, died October 27 in High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo after suffering a heart attack.

Born October 5, 1908, in

mobile dealer in that area and in Muleshoe.

In 1944 he went into the irrigation business in Littlefield and in 1951 moved to Hereford where he formed West Texas Drilling of Hereford, Inc.

In 1962 he was president of Texas Water Well Association and has served in several offices of the National Water Well Association, having been its president in 1967. He was appointed by Governor John Connally to head the Texas Water Well Drillers Board and was still serving in this capacity at the time of his death. During this period he had helped enact many laws for the improvement of irrigation.

Mr. Kirkland was associated with his son Jack in West Texas Pump Company here in Farwell and was in the process of establishing a branch office in Hugoton, Kans. He was a member of the Avenue Baptist Church in Hereford.

He is survived by his wife, Sherry; three daughters, Tina and Kathy Kirkland of the home; and Mrs. Alice Vinton of Farwell; six sons, J. D. Jr., of Amarillo, Jerald of Hereford, Jack of Farwell, Walter of Gower, Mo., Billy of Amarillo, and Bobby of Hugoton, Kans.; also, four brothers, two sisters, and 17 grandchildren.

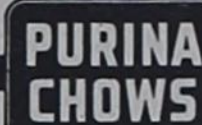

First District Loss --

Jackson Boys Do It Again; Steers Defeated 64-22

Farwell suffered its first district loss here Friday night to the Kress Kangaroos by a score of 64-22. It could have been anyone's game until late in the third quarter when the already fired-up Kangaroos really came to life.

Kress had 14 first downs and total yardage of 471 yards. They gained this sizable offense

and Barry Williams. From there, Larry Erwin snaggd a Gene Sheets' pass and, dodging and breaking tackles, fled to paydirt. Erwin then added an extra point to give the Steers their only lead of the night, 7-6. On the resulting kickoff, the alert Steers killed a run-back from the 23 on the 23. Kress promptly retaliated, sending Roy Jackson around left

four yards to paydirt and Larry Erwin's extra point made the score 20-14.

Johnny Jackson took the Steer kick from the 15 to the 33. The 'Roos drove from there to a touchdown in 13 plays against the stubborn Steer defense. Johnny Jackson forced his way into the end zone from the 15, but Arce stopped the two-point

Steer pass and ran it back 45 yards to paydirt. Once again, points were missed, and the 'Roos led 38-14.

The Steers came raging right back; however, when they drove from their 30 to a touchdown in eight plays. Gene Sheets went the last 23 yards on a busted pass play, and added the two-point conversion on a pass to Randy Chandler to make the score 38-22.

After this, the Kress defense tightened while their offense sharpened, and they held the Steers pointless for the rest of the half and scored the next four times they had the ball. When Kress started from their 41, they drove to paydirt in nine plays, Roy Jackson plunging the last five yards. A missed conversion made the score 44-22. When the 'Roos covered a Steer fumble on their 40, they drove in to a touchdown in seven plays. Mike Carlisle added two more to make the score 52-22. Kress worked in from the 32 in three plays, Johnny Jackson striding

the last 14 yards to make the score 58-22 when the conversion attempt was missed.

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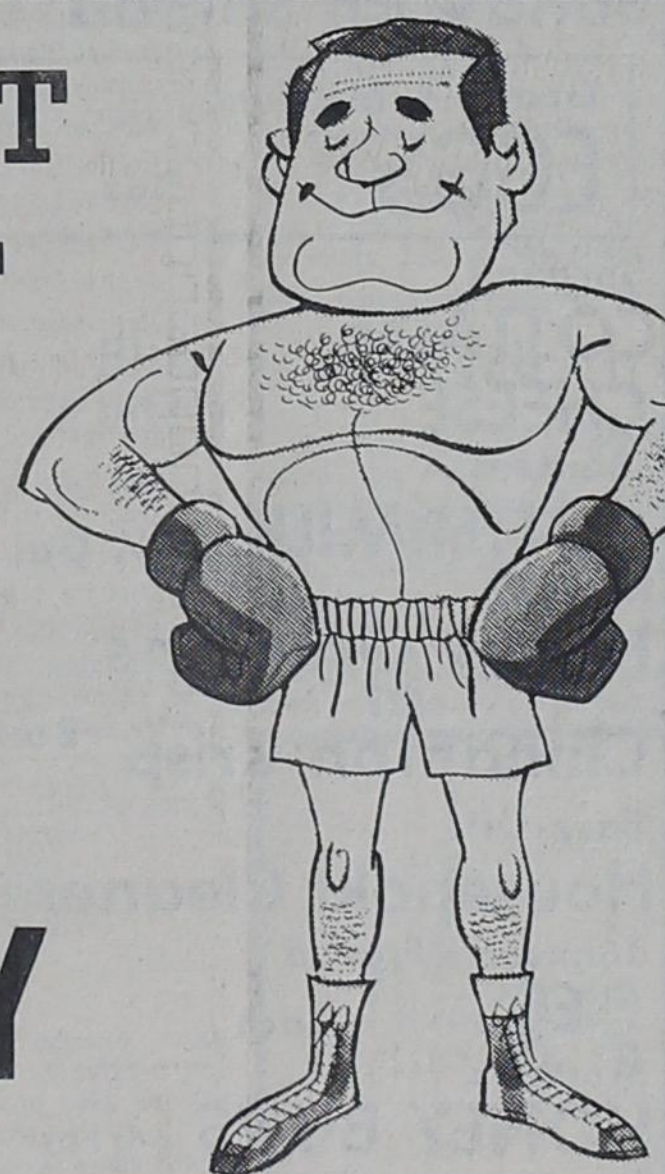
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Kress Beats Junior Varsity, Jr. High Teams

The seventh graders were defeated 6-0 and the eighth grade team was pushed under

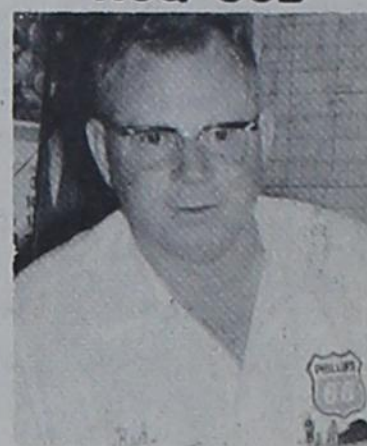

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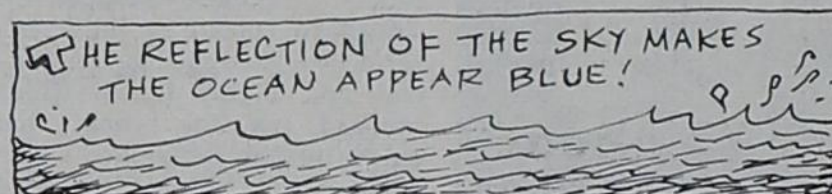

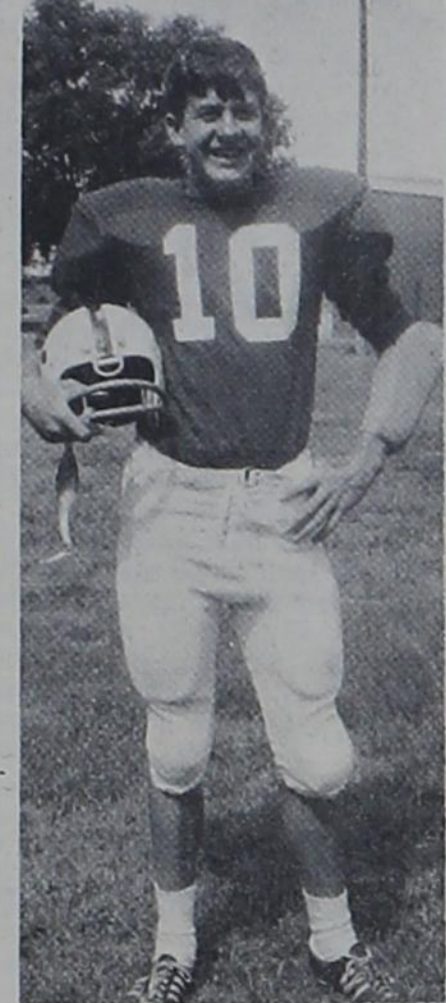

Texico Beats Roy 16-14 In Season's Last Game

Texico's Wolverines wound up their second season of football on a winning note Friday night as they downed the Roy Longhorns of District 4-A, 16-14 in the final game of the season for both teams. The game was played at Roy.

It was also the last game that 11 boys (seniors) will be playing for the Wolverines. Seniors and their positions include Jerry Askew, kicker and cornerback; Wesley Clark, punter, offensive and defensive tackle; Mitch Turnbough, offensive and defensive tackle; Ken Farmer, guard; Ricky Pace, tight end and corner back; Johnny Dane, split end; Mike Casey, quarterback; Monty Lambert, running back and linebacker; Greg Walters, running back and safety; Marty White, running back; and Danny Pearce, defensive back. All of these team members played in Friday night's game except Mitch Turnbough who was out with injuries.

It was a game to remember for all these boys and also for the rest of the squad as it gave Texico their first winning season since football was resumed as a school sport two years ago. The Wolverines wound up the season with a 4-3-1 over all record and a 2-1 district record, finishing behind Melrose who had a 3-0 district slate.

To begin action in Friday night's game, Jerry Askew kicked for the Wolverines and the Longhorns set up shop on their own 33. Terry Yell and Monty Lambert stopped the Longhorn runner on the 35 after a two-yard pickup. On second and eight, Loren Gibbs stopped the Roy runner, but only after he had gained seven yards on the carry. The same runner carried on the next play to gain a first down at the 43. On the next play the quarterback was stopped for a five-yard loss, but Roy picked up seven yards on the next down. With third and eight, a Longhorn back tore loose on a long run that was stopped on the five-yard line of Texico by a tackle by Greg Walters.

At that point the Roy quarterback executed an excellent fake and went around end to score the first TD of the game. First try for PAT was no good; however, a penalty against Texico gave Roy another try. This attempt, too, was nil.

Roy's ensuing kick went out of bounds and the Wolverines took over on their own 40. A penalty against Roy on the first play from scrimmage made it first and five for the Wolverines and Greg Walters carried for a five-yard pickup on the following play. The joy was shortlived, however, as Texico fumbled and Roy recovered. Three plays gave the home team nine yards, then Number 41 scampered the remaining yardage for another Roy TD. This time the two-point PAT was good and the Longhorns led 14-0.

Texico's Albert Steward took the Roy kick back to his own 43. On fourth and seven Texico attempted to punt, but the ball fell into the hands of the opponents. Roy gained one first down before giving up the ball on the Texico 18.

Following a five-yard penalty, the Wolverines started the long trek to paydirt from their own 13. Steward picked up seven yards on first down and gained another three on the next play. Greg Walters then made a first down on the Texico 24. On the next play, Johnny Dane went 60 yards on a split reverse to carry to the Roy 16. Steward then drove to the four-yard line and on the next play plunged over for the Texico TD. He also ran across the two-point conversion to put the score at 14-8, Roy.

The touchdown and extra points gave life to the Wolverines who held the Longhorns to fourth and 15 on the next series. Wesley Clark, Terry

Yell, Loren Gibbs and Ken Farmer were instrumental in setting the home team back.

The ensuing punt was blocked by Texico who took possession on the Roy 23. Greg Walters made a beautiful run to the 12 and from there Steward plunged in for the second Wolverine touchdown. Walters ran the points across to put the Green and White n-front 16-14.

This proved to be the final score as the remainder of the game saw the teams exchanging punts.

The Wolverines picked up 262 total yards, 55 in the air and 207 in the line running game. Steward collected 76 yards, Greg Walters had 61 and Johnny Dane had 60 to lead the rushers. Mike Casey completed five of nine pass attempts, two each to Johnny Dane and Ricky Pace, and one to Greg Walters.

In looking back over the just completed schedule of games, Wolverine Coach Jim Wynne commented, "We had a winning

season and wound up second in our district. The boys did an especially good job since this was only our second year to play."

In talking about the game with Roy, Coach Wynne said, "It was a rough game -- we were losing 14-0 before we ever got started, and we were lucky to win it."

Albert Steward, Greg Walters, Loren Gibbs and Terry Yell were saluted as Wolverines of the Week following the final game of the season.

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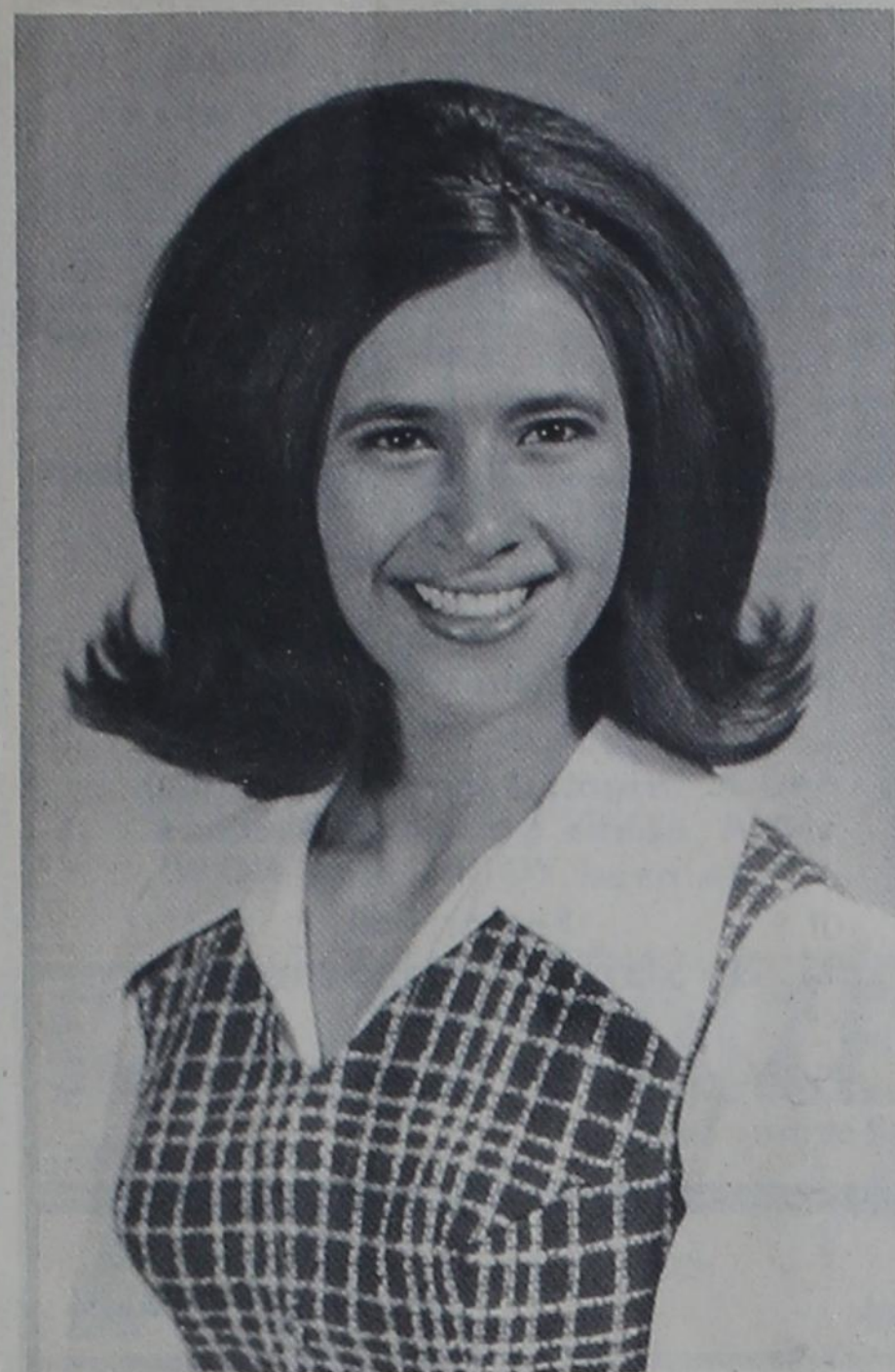

Carpet tiles, a new attraction in floor covering is one of the easiest and most fashionable ways to add a dab of color and style to any room of the house, reports Cherie Jan Slabaugh, Extension housing and home furnishings specialist at Texas A&M University.

Easy-to-install do-it-yourself carpet tiles offer the average consumer a soft floor covering at attractive prices, and the tiles come in a variety of colors and patterns. They can be used as floor coverings, wall coverings, decorations, flower designs, outdoor mats, toy chests linings, coasters, coverings for interiors of station wagons and boats --- just about anything the consumer dreams up.

Home improvement centers, hardware stores and lumberyards are the major distributors of carpet tiles, but department stores are also beginning to carry the popular furnishings items.

The tiles were first introduced in 1966 and were made only by needle-bonded olefin. Now they are manufactured by the tufting and flocking process, making them more versatile for consumer use. The tiles are made from polyester, nylon, polypropylene and other yarns. Shag tiles have become the most popular style.

The most popular size tile is 9 by 9 inches, but they are also available in 18 by 18 inches and sell for about 68 cents per square foot.

APRICOT NUT BREAD
1 12-oz can (1 1/2 cups) apricot nectar
3/4 c snipped dried apricots
2 c sifted all purpose flour
1 c sugar

Add dry ingredients to liquids, mix thoroughly and pour into a greased and floured tube pan. Bake at 300 degrees for 1 1/2 hours.

ICING
1 8-oz package Philadelphia cream cheese
1 stick oleo
1 box powdered sugar

Blend until smooth the softened cream cheese, oleo and powdered sugar. Add one cup of pecans.

Completely cool the cake before icing it.

BAKED PORK CHOPS
Dredge six 1/2-inch thick pork chops with flour. Brown in hot fat. Place in baking dish and pour drippings over chops. Combine:
1-10 1/2-oz can Celery soup*
1-10 1/2-oz can water
1/2 c chopped celery
3/4 c minced onions
1 bell pepper-sliced
3/4 t salt
1/2 t paprika

Combine ingredients, heat and pour over and around the chops. Cover and bake at 300 degrees for 1 1/2 hours.
*Tomato soup may be substituted for celery soup.

TRUE THANKSGIVING

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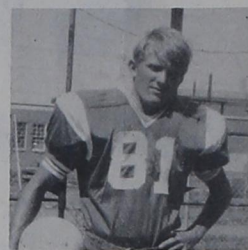

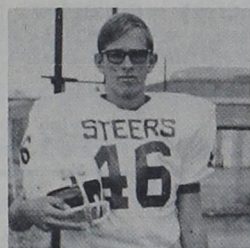

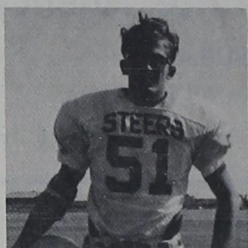
