Hospital ends year with money

The Mitchell County Hospital will complete the fiscal year on October 1 without having to borrow money to meet expenses, board members were told in the administrator's report at Thursday night's meeting of the District.

"The impossible has been done," said Jim Bullard, representative of Methodist Regional Services. "The management of the hospital has made tough decisions in order to ensure that the facility will remain open."

Last year the hospital district borrowed \$550,000 to meet expenses.

The hospital has had to borrow money every year beginning in 1987 in order to meet expenses.

"You're headed for better times," Bullard said. "You've been through the toughest of times."

"A year-and-a-half ago the question was if the hospital would stay open," he said, "today the question is: What we [the hospital] are going to be like and how we will serve the community?"

Board members praised the efforts of hospital administrator, Wendell Alford, whose work was credited for the financial turnaround.

"It was a total team effort," Alford said, "everyone involved with the hospital, from the board members to the employees were involved."

Alford cited efforts at maximizing productivity, cost containment measures and the home health agency that have made a difference in the now financially stable Mitchell County Hospital.

"We're moving forward," he

said. "The hospital is in a position that the board can look at upgrading equipment to better serve patient needs."

Total net revenue of \$234,856 for August was reported to board members. 208 patient days were logged during the period.

The cost per patient day of \$1319 was reported by the administrator and a net revenue per patient day of \$1129.

An audit committee is checking into three areas of hospital operations including the pharmacy, respiratory therapy and central supply to observe billing operations and report on potential lost charges, Alford reported.

A quarterly report - HAS/Monitrend II - was presented to board members which identifies trends at Mitchell County Hospital

as compared to other Texas hospitals.

The categories of the report include: occupancy percent, average daily census, average length of stay, Medicare average length of stay, Medicare as a percent of all patient days, inpatient revenue per discharge, outpatient revenue percent, deductions from revenue percent, days gross revenue in gross account receivable, operating ratio,

full-time equivalent (fte) per adjusted occupied bed, patient care units paid hours/adjusted patient day, overall average hourly salary, nursing average hourly salary, employee benefit expense per fte and expense per adjusted patient day.

The trends shown by the report are positive for the hospital and show that trends are beginning to mimic statewide patterns.

Tax statements due out by October 1st

Mitchell County taxpayers will begin receiving tax statements on Tuesday.

12,347 pieces of mail will be sent out by the Mitchell County Tax Assessor/Collector's office, Mike Burt noted. These statements will be for taxes of Mitchell County and Mitchell County Hospital District.

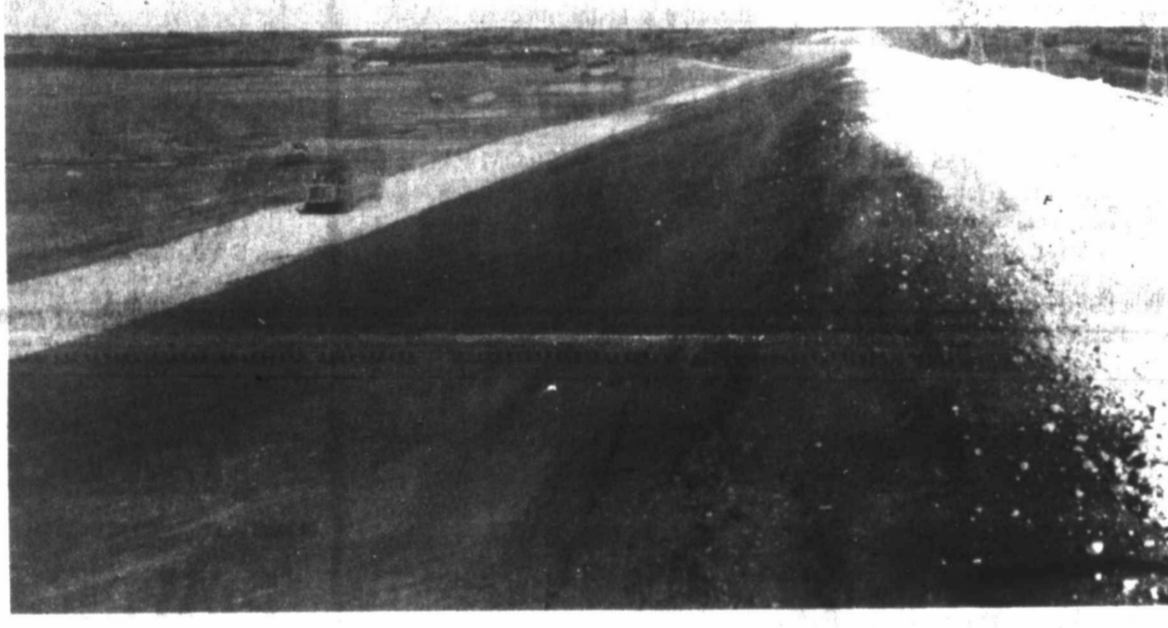
County and Hospital District taxes that are paid before Oct 31 will receive a 3 percent discount, 2 percent will be offered until Nov 30

and 1 percent will be taken off payments made before Dec 31, Burt said.

"Traditionally 70 percent of the county and hospital taxes are received in October," he noted.

At the same time approximately 5000 pieces of mail will be sent from the tax collectors office at the Colorado Independent School District, officials noted.

Penalty and interest will be added to tax payments made after January 31, officials reported.

Mitchell County hospital board hears housekeeping report

Directors of the Mitchell County Hospital District met for their regular monthly meeting and heard reports from the housekeeping consultant, medical staff and lodge administrator, discussed hospital policies and approved accounts payable and the quality assurance report at Thursday night's meeting.

Board members were presented with a notebook 'full of information' that was compiled by Bob Golden of San Saba, the housekeeping consultant hired by the district.

The notebook he presented was representative of his findings and was described as being both 'broad and basic,' listing procedures that are required for effective housekeeping at the hospital.

Golden said that he was giving the board members the information to look over and study and that he

would return after they had a chance to look at the information and form questions from the material.

The study he was to make of the hospital is completed but the work is yet to be finished on the lodge, Golden said.

Board members were also presented with the medical staff report from Dr. Dee Roach.

Antiquated equipment in the x-ray laboratory was brought to the board members attention as being in critical need of an upgrade, Dr. Roach said.

The requirements of the equipment and their usage of the various pieces of equipment involved were explained to the board members.

Studies are also being done by the staff on post-transfusion criteria to determine the effectiveness and on cesarian section deliveries. The

rate of high risk OB work done at the hospital was termed alarming by Dr. Roach.

The lodge report was presented to the board by administrator Marsha Rickard.

The Department of Health had visited the lodge in the past month to make inspections and follow-up reports, she said. All inspections were completed satisfactorily.

48 persons were residents of the lodge at the end of the month and 2 additional persons will be moving into the facility in the next week to bring the lodge to full capacity, Rickard noted.

Also presented to the board was a preliminary study on a security system used for lodge-type facilities that helps contain patients who wander from their prescribed areas without supervision.

Homecoming activities planned

Activities to include a car caravan and a community pep-rally will be held on Thursday, October 24, a highlight in the week of homecoming activities.

This years festivities have been designed to involve more of the community in the homecoming celebration by gearing the activities around elements of the traditional celebrations of years past, school officials noted.

The change from homecoming activities of the past year or two is the result of decisions by the site based management program, high

school principal James McSwain said.

The site program involves the faculty executive council and student council officers who met and decided to rely on 'past' traditional homecoming activities.

The pre-homecoming activities will be held on Thursday this year in order to involve more of the student body.

An open date is on the junior varsity football schedule for that week.

For several years the activities have been held on Friday afternoon preceding the game, a time when

band and athletes were unable to participate.

An old tradition will be revived as a caravan of decorated cars will begin the Thursday night activities, traveling from the high school on a tour of the town.

A community-wide pep rally will be held at the high school parking lot at the completion of the tour.

The changes are a positive step made by the site based management system which offer more of the community a chance to participate, McSwain said.

Junell makes list of "10 Best" legislators

State Representative Rob Junell has been listed as one of the "10 Best" legislators in Texas Monthly magazine's biennial report.

The San Angelo Democrat and Lubbock's John Montford are the only two West Texas lawmakers that were honored with recognition by the report.

"Twenty-five cents and that honor still won't get you a cup of coffee in most places," Junell joked in an interview regarding the recognition.

He quickly turned serious and said that his placement on the list was undeserved. "There are so many more people who had better sessions than I had and really contributed more to the process. I am thankful, but you could put 20 other people in there."

Junell's work on the Appropriations Committee and the work concerning the state's budget propelled him into the spotlight during the 72nd session.

The Texas Monthly criteria for the list included: "character and effectiveness; above all, we were looking for people who put solving the state's problems ahead of their personal ambitions."

The magazine article on Rob Junell is subtitled 'Genius or Jock?' and describes the second term 44-year-old Democrat as one of the leaders in Texas Legislature.

"A bulldog of a legislator who looks and acts like someone who was too small to play college football but made the starting lineup through sheer ferocity," the magazine notes.

Junell was credited for his work on some of the state's biggest problems, including the workers' compensation system, the budget and crime.

The work Junell put into getting House Bill 62 - Texas Workers' Compensation Insurance State Fund - was mentioned in the article and his ability to work a compromise solution out with Senator Carl Parker who vowed to prevent passage of the bill.

The article claims that Junell is the "most tenacious, best-informed budget-cutter on the House Appropriations Committee."

Junell's name already is appearing in conversations linked towards becoming Speaker of the House as a result of his quick rise to 'stardom' in the Legislature.

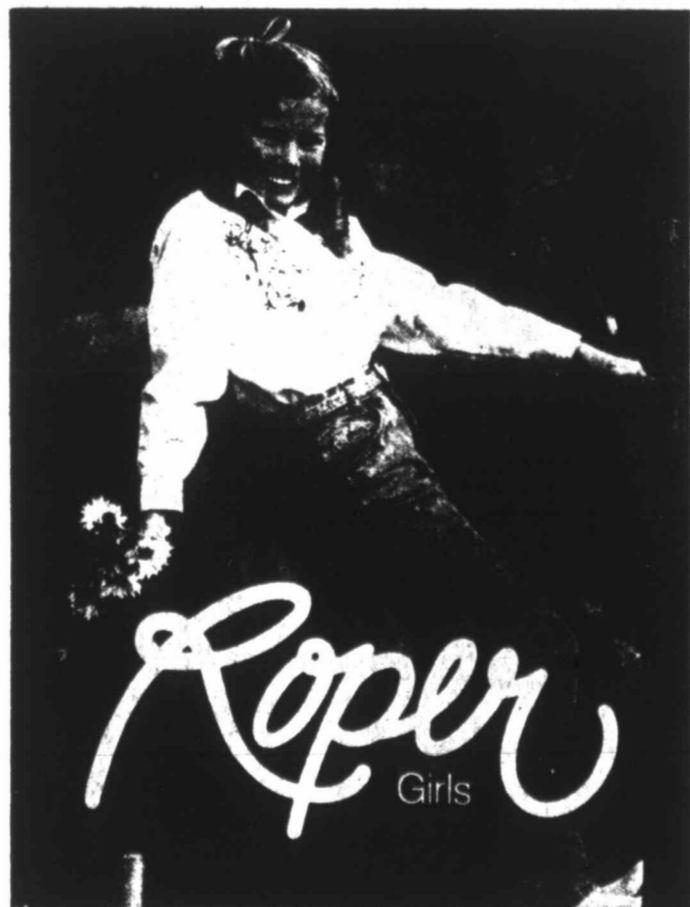
Mrs. Brown passed away Thursday, September 26, at Scenic Mountain Medical Center in Big Spring.

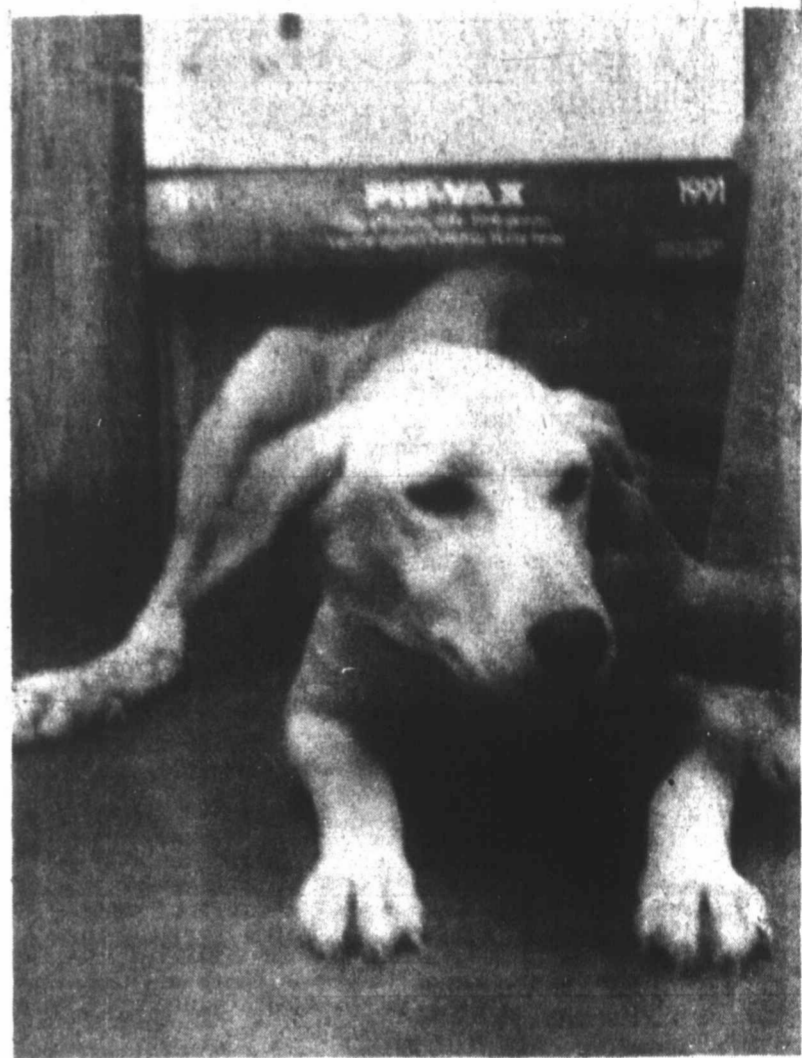

The Colorado City Wolves used Kevin Green to open up the offense in Friday nights 14-12 victory over Merkel to spoil the Badgers homecoming festivities.

Green returned to the field after being sidelined with an injury received in the opening game against Ballinger.

He earned 200 yards on the night for the Wolves, rushing 15 times for 192 yards and hauling in an 8 yard pass.

His play opened up the passing game, the inside game and gave the Wolves the opportunity to run out of the option, Coach Tom Ramsey said.

Merkel put together the first scoring drive that began from their own 34 yard line.

Lorenzo Whitney who carried 33 times for 132 yards on the night dashed across the goal line with 6:24 remaining in the second quarter.

The extra point attempt failed and Merkel led by the score of 6-0.

Colorado City took control of the ball on their 34 yard line to retaliate with a 66 yard drive of their own.

Green had runs of 17 and 35 yards to push the ball down to the Merkel 14 yard line.

A penalty flag on the next play reversed what would have been a Green touchdown and brought the ball back to the 24 yard line.

On the next play, quarterback Kelly Ramsey hit Mark Monroe for a 24 yard touchdown pass with 5:33 remaining in the half. Frank Brisenno kicked the extra point to put Colorado City in the lead by the score of 7-6.

The Badgers started their next drive on the 35 yard line and marched 65 yards for another score.

Ryan Gupton caught an 11 yard touchdown pass from Chriswell Whisenhunt to put Merkel back on top 12-7.

The Badgers attempted to run the ball in to convert a two-point conversion, but the Wolf defense stopped Whitney behind the line of scrimmage.

The Colorado City defense came alive in the second half, forcing Merkel to punt the ball away four times while the Wolves only punted once in the half.

Lorraine JV loses 12-6

The Lorraine Bulldogs junior varsity team lost 12-6 in action against Hermleigh on Thursday night.

Both teams had identical rushing yardage of 131 in the game.

Lorraine's Cory Woodell scored on a 44 yard run with 1:02 left in the 3rd quarter for the Bulldog score.

Woodell rushed for 93 yards and Joshua Lee added 38 yards for the Bulldog attack.

Hermleigh's scores came from Sanchez with 5:00 left in the first quarter and on a Sanchez to Jimmy Digby pass with :44 left before halftime.

Cade Proctor and Gene Rogers combined to sack Whisenhunt in the first series of the second half and forced the Badgers into one of their punting situations.

The Wolves began work from their own 45.

On second down and ten, Kelly Ramsey hit David Castillo for a pass that took the ball down to the Badger 36 yard line.

A penalty flag was dropped at the end of the play and added another 15 yards on to the drive for a face-mask penalty called against the Badgers. The ball was moved to the 21 yard line.

On fourth down and four from the 17 yard line the strangest play of the night occurred.

Quarterback Ramsey went back to pass and hit Castillo for a completion in the end zone, but flags were thrown.

The penalty was ruled to be pushing by the offensive in the end zone. The referees put the ball on the 29 yard line and gave Merkel possession of the ball.

"It was not an equitable call," Coach Tom Ramsey said. The flag was thrown on the opposite side of the field from the play after the catch was made.

"I'm glad the kids overcame the penalty," he said.

The Badgers were stalled when Proctor came into the backfield for his second sack of the night and again forced the Badgers to punt the ball away.

The Wolves had possession of the ball for less than 30 seconds when they scored.
On second and twelve from their 31 yard line, the offensive line broke a hole for Green and he was gone for a 69 yard touchdown.

Briseno kicked the extra point to cap off the scoring with 3:41 remaining in the third quarter.

The Badgers held onto the ball for 8:24 of the final 12 minutes but were unable to get the ball in the end zone.

Merkel took control of the ball one last time with 3:48 seconds in the game and held on until only :14 seconds remained.

Billy Joe Robinette and Mike Dossey met Whisenhunt in the backfield and issued a crucial quarterback sack on a second down and two that resulted in a seven yard loss.
With four down and 14 and time running out, Merkel tried to

pass. This time Wolf Ashley Walthall chased Whisenhunt out of the pocket and tackled him before he could make enough for a first down.

Ramsey only had to kneel down with the ball in order to run the final 14 seconds off the clock.

The victory improves the Wolves record to 2-2 and drops Merkel to 1-3.

Next week the Wolves will travel to Wylie to face the Bulldogs in the last non-district clash.

I like to be prepared for what might happen. That's why I had food, water and supplies stashed away in case I had to go into hibernation during the days of war.

When all the talk of terrorist action was going on, I didn't want to take any chances.

After the Persian Gulf War situation settled down, I felt like world peace was closer than it had ever been.

I began to eat the stash of food and even quit wearing the gas mask to bed.

We all hoped that the work was completed when the troops pulled out of Iraq.

But the one person who changed the lives of the world was still alive and plotting.

Now it looks like 'we' may have to go back in. A decision which has been haunting leaders of various countries for years.

That means I may be a target again.

I think it was my time in the service that made me paranoid.

Every time I went to a new duty station I was told the same thing. "This is the first target the enemy will strike in case of war."

I heard that at training commands, where the enemy would attack to keep new prepared combatants from the battlefield; supply commands, which the enemy would hit to break the front line of defenses; to every ship I was on, which had a more important mission than any other ship in the fleet.

You get used to that reasoning after a while. That's when you get in trouble and start thinking about it.

Every city has something that a terrorist group could strike. A group of terrorists might want to stop the production of cotton so that after the uniforms wore out they couldn't make any more, or hit the lakes and affect all those who drink water.

Then you get worried about becoming a target.

But I'm not going to sit around worrying about it too long. I've got a full list of things to do before another outbreak occurs in the gulf region.

As long as I find another gas mask, I'll sleep easier.

I'm getting food stored again and looking at mobile generators in case I have to hibernate for a while.

The cat seems to be sensing the situation and is getting a little testy these past couple days. Everytime I look at him he yowls and runs away.

I'm not going to buy any more spray paint. This time the cat is on his own.

He doesn't know how much better off he'd be if he were disguised in camouflage, even if he resembled a walking house plant.

HOME ECONOMICS HAPPENINGS

The Mitchell County Extension Program Council is sponsoring an Information Event on October 8, 1991. On the program to speak are Dr. James Denton, Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Kenneth Krueger with the Texas Water Commission.

Dr. Denton is the coordinator for the Texas FoodSafe Program. Denton leads a team of Texas Agricultural Extension Service experts in nutrition, food preservation, meat and seafood production, fruit and vegetable processing, and food technology. The TAEX FoodSafe team provides scientifically-based information concerning issues including microbiological contamination, potential residues from chemicals used in productions and processing, use of food additives and the risks. Dr. Denton will address consumer concerns which stem from confusing public information in the area of food safety.

Kenneth Krueger is the District Manager for the Texas Water Commission and serves a 21 county area surrounding San Angelo. Mr. Krueger will present information on the current water situation in Texas. Areas of concern with water safety and consumption are pesticide and fertilizer contamination. Krueger will address these concerns and will include facts and figures related to this area. Mr. Krueger will also include the most current practices being utilized to conserve above ground and underground water resources.

The event will begin at 6:30 p.m. with an awards program honoring outstanding Mitchell County Extension Supporters and the guest speakers to follow at 7:00 p.m. The public is encouraged to attend the Mitchell County Extension Event will be held at the Lone Wolf Medallion Room located at the Lone Wolf Electric Building.

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
