RUNNELS COUNTY STOCKMEN LOSE IN FIGHT AGAINST TICK

Sustaining an objection made by the counsel for the defense in the tick eradication case of the State of Texas vs. C. Kornegay, just after the case went to trial Wednesday, County Judge Parish holds that the tick eradication law in this county is invalid and of no effect. The case on trial was abruptly ended and other cases of a similar nature dismissed.

After prosecuting the work of eradicating cattle ticks in this county for nearly a year, and after the county and stockmen have expended several thousand dollars in freeing the county of ticks, the law has been knocked out and the bars thrown down for cattle to be brought into the county regardless of whether they are infected with ticks or not.

This state of affairs has been brought about by the failure of former County Judge Kleberg to make publication of the proper notice certifying to the result of the election at which time the tick eradication law was adopted. Judge Kleberg published a notice, as required by law, but the notice failed to give the result of the election, and did not say whether the majority of the vote was in favor of the tick eradication law or whether it was opposed to the adoption of the law.

The defense based its case on this technicality and won out, when court sustained the objection to the introducing of testimony showing that such a notice had

been published. In fact the law is very plain in requiring that due notice of the result of the election be given by publication in a newspaper in the county. This notice was not given according to the law governing the adoption of the tick eradication law, and there was nothing for the court to do but rule as he did in the matter.

This case grew out of the alleged failure of Mr. Kornegay to dip cattle as instructed by the inspector. There were a number of similar charges, and the cases were all pending in the county court and were to come up at the present term. The cattle men employed attorneys to assist the county attorney in prosecuting the cases and enforcing the tick eradication law. The defendants in these cases, for various reasons, had declined to dip their cattle. When complaint was filed against them they employed Judge M. C. Smith, of Ballinger, and Judge F. L. Snodgrass, of Coleman, to defend them. The state was assisted by Judges Doss & Baugh, Judge Jno. I. Guion, and Judge C. P. Shepherd; County Attorney Harris representing the state.

This law has been upheld in other counties and enforced where the law with reference to holding the election and declaring the result has been complied with, and whether the defendants in these cases were guilty or not as charged, the law will be upheld in this county after the law of publication has been complied with. Will Publish Notice and Make Law Valid.

Attorneys for the state held a conference after the cases had been dismissed, and took steps to comply with all details of the law making the tick eradication law in this county valid, and the commissioners' court will publish the proper notice.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Because the United States discovered evidence that the crews of German vessels in both Manila Bay and at Colon, Panama, were laying plans to sink their vessels and obstruct the ports, the government is taking precautionary measures to prevent such action, and German vessels entering these ports will be closely guarded. No German vessels in these ports, however, have been seized.

BOLIVIA STANDS WITH UNCLE SAM

CHILE WILL NOT SUPPORT UNITED STATES.

Santiago dispatches received at Buenos Aires say that in a ministerial council held at Santiago, it was determined that Chile would not support the United States against Germany.

MEXICAN TROUBLE WARMING UP AGAIN

LAREDO, Tex., Feb. 7.—Eight Fellicistas were killed and twenty-five captured in a fight between these new bandits and the Carrancistas near Rodriguez Monday night. In anticipation of further trouble a train load of troops has been sent to Rodriguez.

PROMINENT MASONS WILL COME HERE

In the afternoon of the 20th, the Master's degree will be conferred by representatives of the several lodges of the district.

After the exemplification of the work the lodge and its guests will repair to the Carnegie Library, where the ladies of the Eastern Star will act as hostesses. A pleasing program will be featured consisting of music and speech-making. After which appetizing refreshments will be served.

AMERICAN AMBASSADOR IS LEAVING

AMSTERDAM, Holland, Feb. 7.—According to Berlin dispatches received here, Ambassador Gerard expects to leave Berlin next Saturday.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Official messages received at the state department report that Ambassador Gerard has left Berlin and gone to Berne. Another message says he will leave Berlin soon. A previous message received said Germany was delaying the matter of providing transportation for Gerard until it was known at Berlin that Bernstorff had been given satisfactory passage from America.

The state department does not anticipate any difficulty in transporting the German ambassador to Berlin, or in bringing the American ambassador home.

"FOR GOD'S SAKE STOP SUBMARINES"

LONDON, Feb. 7.—A British wireless station reports that it picked up a message apparently coming from New York to Berlin, which said: "For God's sake rescind submarine order. State terms instead." The message was signed "Louis P. Lochner." Lochner is Henry Ford's secretary.

HEAVY TONNAGE TO EUROPE WITHDRAWN

GALVESTON, Feb. 7.—Practically all Scandinavian tonnage was withdrawn from the charter market for trade between the United States and Europe owing to the break between America and Germany. Prominent ship charterers say that the same tonnage now offered at a much lower profit to South American trade has also been withdrawn, and the shipping interest and commercial interest here feels the result keenly.

AMMUNITION FACTORIES DOUBLE OUTPUT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Bleached cotton fibre consumed in the United States in the manufacture of explosives during the three months ending Dec. 31, amounted to 81,700,539 pounds. Including linters and hull fibre 583,710 bales consumed for this purpose. For the year this will more than double the preceding year.

DEATH WIRE AROUND WIRELESS STATION

WAUKEGAN, Ill., Feb. 7.—A "death wire" carrying a high voltage has been stretched around the Great Lakes wireless station. A double guard has also been placed around the station to prevent any damage to the station or interference with radio messages.

ALLIES TO FIGHT FOR REPARATION

LONDON, Feb. 7.—"There is no possible basis for peace contained in Germany's recent offer," King George declared in a speech in the House of Lords, in opening Parliament this morning. "My people throughout the empire and all our allies remain steadfastly and unanimously resolved to secure just reparation and restitution for Germany's brutality in the past, and a guarantee for future peace, which we regard as essential to the progress of civilization," the British monarch continued.

While King George was speaking a band outside of the parliament was playing "The Star Spangled Banner."

MANY SHIPS SENT TO BOTTOM

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Two were killed and the remainder of the crew saved when the British steamer Saxon, was submarined yesterday. The vessel was a thirteen ton capacity.

Twelve survivors of the British steamer Azul have been landed, and report that their ship was submarined. This was a three thousand ton ship.

Official report has just been made of the submarining of the British steamer Vestra, a thousand ton ship, and Crown Point, a five thousand ton ship. Both ships fell victims to German undersea craft.

NO MENTION OF SHIP'S WARNING

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Consul General Frost at Queenstown, in his official report to the American embassy at London on the sinking of the Evestone, makes no mention of a warning having been given the Evestone before it was attacked by the submarine. Neither does Consul Frost say anything about the Evestone making any resistance or attempt to escape from the submarine.

The American negro sailor, Richard Wallace, who was among those killed on the Evestone, was killed by a shrapnel which the Germans fired at the life boats after they had left the sinking Evestone. After shelling the survivors in the life boats the German U-boat disappeared without offering aid, said the consul in his report to Ambassador Page.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7. 4:02 p. m.—The Senate stands behind President Wilson's action in breaking with Germany by a vote of 78 to 5.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Declaring that the United States had never been neutral and that the President had shown favor to the allies, Senator Works, republican, sprung the first opposition to be heard in congress against Mr. Wilson's break with Germany. Senator Works was severe in his criticism of the President's action in severing relations with Germany.

Senator Stone lead the fight in defending Mr. Wilson and hitting at those who hold that the president should have consulted congress before severing relations with Germany, said "the president acted wholly within his constitutional rights."

Senator Lodge, a republican, followed Senator Stone in defending Mr. Wilson's action, and said, "President Wilson was demanded by honor, safety and security of the United States to do what he did. Let us show the people of the United States and the world that we are without division. To show division shows weakness.

Senator Stone called up his resolution asking the senate to endorse the break with Germany, and the resolution will carry by big odds.

OUTLAWING LIQUOR ADS

AUSTIN, Feb. 7.—Following in the steps of the Federal government in outlawing liquor advertisements, Senator Robbins and other senate members introduced a bill this afternoon prohibiting the publication of liquor advertisements in newspapers and the posting of liquor advertisements in public places.

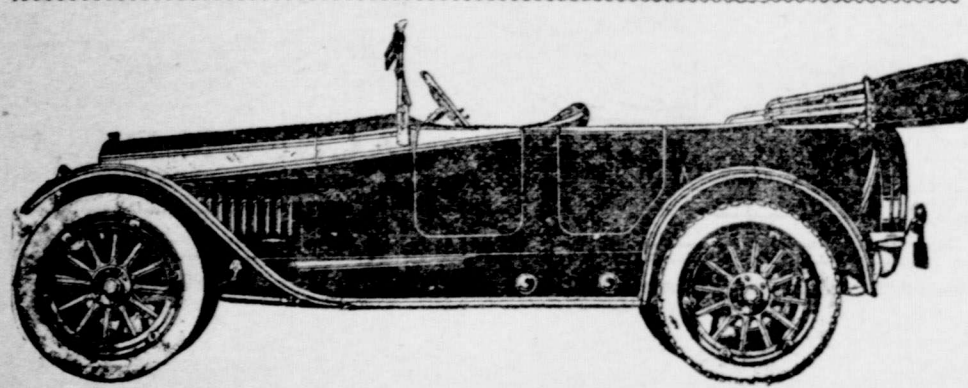
200 WOMEN KILLED IN MUNITION BLOW UP

PRESIDENT VINSON MAKES STATEMENT

"Let me say at the outset that I am not opposed to the policy of having the sons and daughters of rich men in the University of Texas. In my judgment, there are far too few of this class of Texas boys and girls patronizing this institution. Figures recently compiled reveal the interesting fact that each year some 3,000 Texas students are registered in schools beyond the confines of this state. We may reasonably say that this figure represents to a large extent the boys and girls who go from the homes of well-to-do people of Texas for their education. It is a great pity that the sons and daughters of our rich men and women are educated altogether out of that environment in which their lives for the most part must be lived after graduation. They lose tremendously. We also lose. It is an economic problem. If the expenditures abroad of each of these students are placed at only \$500 per annum, it means that something like a million and a half dollars are annually paid to institutions outside of Texas for educational advantages which the state does not afford, or at least for advantages which some of our people feel cannot be obtained at home. But, when all of this is said, it still remains true that both from the standpoint of policy and from the standpoint of practice, the University of Texas is gaged to the requirements of the poor man, and not to the abilities of the rich man. It is a fact of tremendous significance that during the past session more than fifty per cent of the men students of this University were dependent upon themselves for the expenses of their education. This money was made either before coming to the University or while in attendance at the University. Out of the entire student body, both men and women, more than forty-two per cent paid their own expenses in the University either in whole or in part during the past session; and these self-supporting students earned during that session the total sum of \$16,000 while carrying on their University studies. Certainly the fees charged by the University itself do not demand riches for their payment, as these, including all student activities, may be paid for with the small sum of thirty dollars per year."

Texas spends annually on alcohol and tobacco \$139,000,000 and only \$18,000,000 on education. To double the state's education fund would cost each citizen one cent a day.

MORE FARMERS EN- ROLLED AT UNIVERSITY

As usual, in the occupations represented by the parents of students in the University of Texas, farmers are in the lead. Another notable fact is the number of widows sending their children to the University, there being last session 269. Some of the principal occupations for the year 1915-1916 are as follows: Farmers, 466; merchants, 261; lawyers, 201; doctors, 149; ranchmen and stockmen, 128; teachers, 92; real estate dealers, 87; bankers, 74; railroad men, 61; clerks and salesmen, 70; ministers, 51; drummers, 48; contractors, 38; insurance agents, 25; lumbermen, 33; druggists, 32; cotton buyers, 26; county, city and federal officers, 33; engineers, 26; grocers, 20; newspaper men, 20; carpenters, and mechanics, 20; oil men, 15; manufacturers, 15; housekeepers, 12; bookkeepers, 10; boarding housekeepers, 11; dentists, 9; stenographers, 8; dairymen, 8; speculators, 6; musicians, 6; restaurant keepers, 5.

Other occupations, the total of which number 118, are barbers, tailors, giners, dressmakers, laundrymen, blacksmiths, chemists, shoemakers, architects, grain dealers, quarrymen, milliners, photographers, firemen, butchers, gardeners, motormen, tinsmith, hatter, bricklayers, draymen, potters, fuel dealers, sidewalk inspectors, silo builders, Y. M. C. A. secretary, optician, sawfiler, liveryman, auto dealers, track foreman.

Among the 2729 students in the long session of the University of Texas, 1915-1916, the Methodist church was represented by 847 affiliates; the Baptist, 496; Presbyterian, 396; Episcopal, 254; Christian, 233; Catholic, 99; Jewish, 71; Lutheran, 52; Congregational, 22; Church of Christ, 19; Christian Science, 16; Evangelical, 9; Unitarian, 5; Moravian, 3.

The University Y. M. C. A. is housed in a building costing \$100,000, more than half of the men students of the University doing active work in this Association. The Y. W. C. A. also has a strong organization, 1157 of the University students enrolled pursued studies in the Bible. 33 former University students are either already missionaries in the foreign field or are engaged in preparation for that work. The Christian, the Episcopal and the Catholic Churches have erected special buildings for the use of the students, while the Methodist and Baptist churches have large church buildings adjacent to the campus. Provision has been made by the Methodist Church for the employment of a man to devote his entire time to giving Bible instructions.

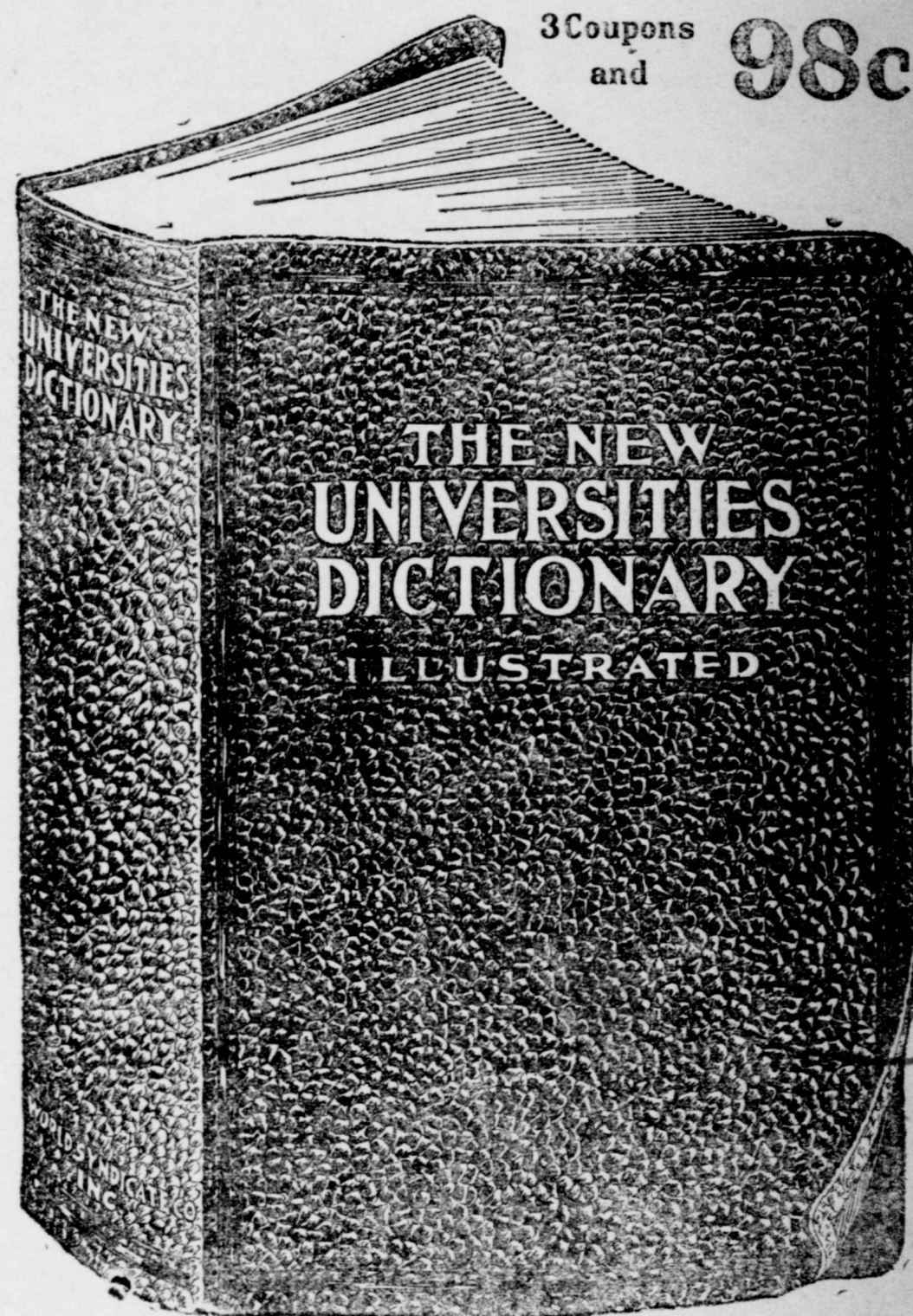

Worldiness in Church Biggest Problem in Sin

FRIAR FACTS
* Christianity's value is in christianity's service.
* Eradication is the only principal under Heaven for the world.

About two hundred and fifty people greeted Evangelist Friar at the Ninth Street Baptist tabernacle last night, and listened with intense interest at his discourse on worldiness. The evangelist is pitching his battle against sin in the church, and says until there is a house cleaning the church people can not do efficient revival work. He stated that the worldiness in the church was the biggest problem the church had to contend with.

Before delivering his sermon Evangelist Friar complimented The Daily Ledger, and thanked the paper for using liberal space in reporting the progress of the revival. While this has always been the policy of this paper, and while we consider church news as of much importance, even to the sinner, as any class of news, and of a great deal more importance than most news, we appreciate the remarks made by the evangelist. Evangelist Friar requested those who appreciate the publicity given the meeting to show their appreciation by patronizing the paper, both in subscription and advertising, and as a result several news subscribers have come in.

A text was taken in the twelfth chapter of Romans and the sermon was directed at the church folks in an effort to get them to consecrate their all to the work of the Lord. We give below some parts of the sermon Rev. Friar delivered. Addressing the church members he said:

"Folks sometimes hate the preacher for telling them the truth but heaven approves of the man who says what he thinks is the truth. The preacher is not altogether responsible for the truth he preaches. God is author of truth. If anything I say offends you take the matter up with God."

"The world problem in the church is one of our biggest problems. Paul says in our text that we are to give our bodies as well as our spirits to the Lord because he is kind and merciful. Your concern ought not be how much of my money shall I give to the Lord, but how much shall I keep for myself. A traveling man came into one of our meetings in Oklahoma and when he found that we were there for several days he looked up his trunk and led nearly all of his customers to the Lord. That is what a consecrated church member can do. Did he lose much by knocking off for several days? No, for the Lord takes care of the man who is true to him. That drummer felt that his business was serving the Lord and he sold goods to pay the bills."

"Don't be like the world. The devil blinds some people's eyes. So it is that when the preacher urges you to give up some foolish sin you get angry. You forget that God has had far more experience in this man-making business than you. He knows that it is not best for church members to be worldly. Yet God never had it in for you. He loves you. So do I. I used to wonder that God would save a man like me, but now I wonder more how it is that he can use me in the salvation of others. If you will obey the language of our text, he can use you too."

"Gipsy Smith went to London after nine months here. His little daughter was at the ship-landing to meet him. There was also a committee from a certain church where the people were then waiting for him to come and raise \$40,000 for their church. The men urged him and home drew him as the little daughter was tugging at his hand. They insisted that they had to have him and he gave the child some money and told her to go to a fruit stand. She began to cry and when asked what was the matter replied: 'Daddie, I do not want money. I want you.' Brother, God is after you, body and spirit. When you attack certain sins some dear soul pukes up her lips and declares, 'I just

can't see it that way.' The devil has blinded her eyes. Somebody said, 'I don't believe in God.' That is in the bible. It says the fool hath said in his heart there is no God."

"In Stockdale they play forty-two on Sunday and are able to see no harm in it. Of course, they would never do a thing like that in Ballinger, but they used to do it in Stockdale. Listen to me. The Bible says, 'Redeem the time.' When you get a vision of the crucified Christ you will never talk about passing the time away again."

Employment for 107 deserving students in the University of Texas was secured by the University Y. M. C. A. employment bureau during last session. In addition to this 226 odd jobs were secured.

The total value of the work done by these students was \$11,938.40.

Although by far the majority of the jobs secured go through this bureau, these figures by no means represent the amount of money earned by students while attending the University. A large number of them are student assistants who secure their appointment after the first year by reason of excellence of the work done as students in the year previous. Then there are a great many who secure work out in the city of Austin who find out about them of themselves and never apply to the Y. M. C. A. The figures on the Employment Bureau are interesting in that they represent pretty fairly the amount of assistance received at the University of Texas by students who come without means and entirely without friends or information concerning the conditions.

"Waiting on table" heads the list of employments. From this source alone students earned \$6557 during last session. "Chorem" ranked second and "Clerks" third.

Under the head of odd jobs, "Yard Work" was the most remunerative, there being \$103.05 earned in this manner. "House work", "cutting and carrying wood", "putting up stoves" and "distributing circulars" are some of the other items listed in the report of the Y. M. C. A. secretary.

A student who worked his way through the University last year writes to Mr. T. W. Currie, secretary of the Y. M. C. A. of the University of Texas, "Any fellow with a good supply of grit and common sense can make his way through the University. I came here with only \$45, and with the help of the Y. M. C. A. have succeeded in making my way the first year. Every body is good to the man who is making his way."

Another student writes, "many prospective students say, 'I am going to enter the University as soon as I get money enough to pay my way.' When you get the money, perhaps you will not have the desire to go on to school. Why not come on and take a chance on the money proposition? There are hundreds of students making their expenses while they are in college. There are just two things necessary for you to do to make expenses while here: (1) Leave your name with the University Y. M. C. A.; (2) Work."

During the past year Mr. Currie received 214 applications

for employment from students. He secured places for them which netted the students during the year \$11,938.40. A boy or girl has to take a chance in coming to Austin to college with but little money, but the chance is worth taking.

Mr. Currie makes the following suggestions to men who desire to work their way through school: (1) Do not come to Austin more than five days before school opens. (2) No jobs are given before this time, and under no conditions will places be assigned before the applicant arrives. (3) We do not guarantee to find you a place to work. We will help you in every way possible. (4) Students should endeavor to bring \$75 or \$100 with them.
