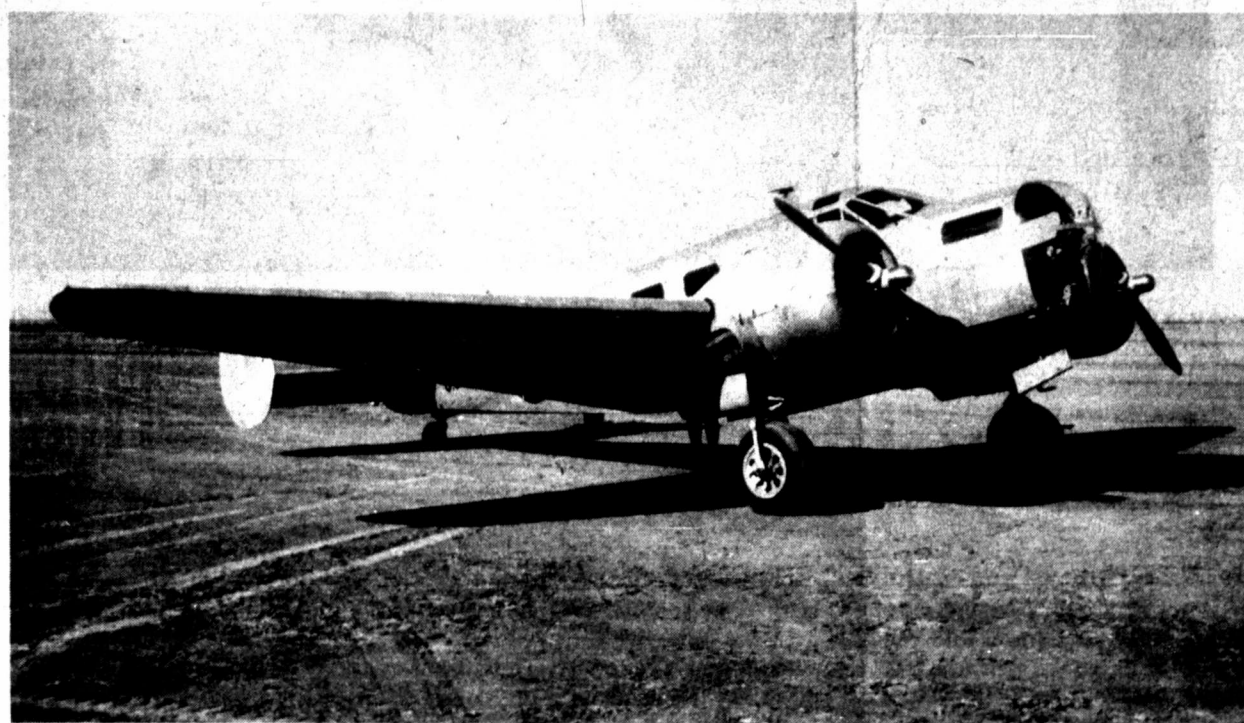

Big July 4th planned

More activities than ever are in store for the July 4th Celebration in Mitchell County this year.

The day is bound to be full of fun and memories for everyone who takes part in even a portion of the events which are planned.

To start the day off right, the 29th Annual July 4th Fly In will be held at the Colorado City Jet Strip Airport.

The Fly In is expected to feature, in addition to its other attractions this year, AT11's, bomber trainers which were used at Big Spring's Webb Air Force Base during World War II to train fighter pilots. The aircraft practiced

bombing raids over portions of Mitchell County.

The presence of these aircraft at this year's event was coordinated by J.O. Dockrey, other Fly In officials, and Preston Burchard.

Burchard, a board member of Heart of West Texas Museum, was also instrumental in helping to arrange a display featuring the bomber trainers at the Heart of West Texas Museum.

That display includes uniforms from the period, photographs of the aircraft participating in actual bombing raids, and a bomb casing discovered on a local ranch and recently donated to the museum.

A Grumman Amphibian, a World War II fighter, and two aircraft from the Big Country Squadron of the Confederate Air Force are also expected to make an appearance at this year's Fly In.

The Fly In breakfast of bacon, eggs, toast and coffee will be cooked and served from 7 until 10 a.m. by personnel of the City National Bank. There will be a charge of \$3 for the breakfast but there will be no admission charge, and the air conditioned pilots' lounge will be open.

The public is invited to come meet the pilots, inspect the

Sheriff agrees to suspension

Mitchell County Sheriff Wendell Bryant, along with his attorney Bradley Miles from San Angelo, appeared in person on Tuesday in 32nd District Court at a hearing before Presiding Judge Ray L. McKim.

McKim, a visiting judge from Midland, was to have heard reasons why Mitchell County Attorney Clay Strange believed that Bryant should be temporarily suspended from his position as sheriff, pending a trial of his case by a jury at some time in the future.

Before any testimony could be given in the hearing, however, Bryant informed the court that he has agreed to the temporary suspension.

He stipulated that his agreeing to the suspension should not be considered in any way an admission of any of the allegations or accusations contained in the Petition for Removal.

Those allegations, for which grand jury indictments have since been handed down, include official oppression and official misconduct.

Bryant, who was ordered to stay away from the sheriff's office during the suspension, will continue to receive his salary and his benefits as a county employee.

McKim appointed Mitchell County Sheriff's Deputy Patrick Toombs to temporarily fill the office of sheriff. Toombs has been acting as the sheriff's chief deputy.

Stenholm to speak

A special event is planned for July 3rd: State Representative Robert Junell and U.S. Congressman Charles Stenholm will speak at noon at the Civic Center.

This joint meeting of local Kiwanis, Lions, and Rotary Clubs is open to the public.

Council to study argument, proposals in greater depth

The City Council of Colorado City met on Tuesday night, and heard from Vivian Beights, director of the Colorado City Housing Authority, regarding the cooperative agreement between the City and the Authority.

Ms. Beights was accompanied by Robert Bracy, chairman of the Housing Authority Board of Directors; Jay Guelker, vice chairman; and board members A.W. Rowe and Ira Williamson.

She gave a brief overview of the Housing Authority's purpose, and brought to councilmembers' attention her interpretation of certain portions of the 1950 contract which had been signed by the City Council of that time and representatives of the Housing Authority.

Citing certain paragraphs within that contract, Ms. Beights argued that the City has a responsibility to perform certain repairs and

Appointments made to redistricting committee

County Commissioners' Court met on Tuesday and, among other business items, appointed Oscar Ortiz and Esther Goss to the county redistricting committee.

Ortiz and Ms. Goss, who volunteered to serve on that committee at the recent public forum regarding redistricting, will be notified by official letter of their appointments, according to Mitchell County Judge Ray Mayo.

Commissioners also discussed certain items in the county's proposed personnel policy manual.

Richard Slagle of Austin, a representative of the Texas Association of Counties, is working with the Court on the drawing up of the manual. He has presented a model of such a manual

as a guideline from which commissioners will be able to adapt a personnel policy for Mitchell County.

Three major sections of the proposed policy were discussed, and amendments proposed in Tuesday's meeting. Commissioners agreed to study two or three sections at each subsequent meeting until such time as the policy had been studied and amended in its entirety.

In other business, commissioners heard a proposal from County Treasurer Ann Hallmark regarding a change she felt should be made in the wording of the county's self-funded group health insurance policy.

Exile...

concert lights up the night

All right, Mitchell County, that's more like it!

The turnout for the Exile concert on Friday night was wall-to-wall crowd! And that's a lot of people when you consider that the walls we mean are the ones surrounding the entire Fort Wood corral.

It just goes to show you that we have the ability and the numbers to show support for entertainment acts which come to our area.

Some of the crowd was from outside Mitchell County, and that's great! We welcome the chance to show the entire state what a great place Mitchell County is.

Before the concert began, it almost looked as though a tremendous rainstorm would spoil the evening.

The members of the group were being advised not to come on stage, all wired for electrical sound like they were, because it might be too dangerous.

Real troopers don't let anything like a little threat of lightning stop them, though, and, less than 10 minutes after the show was supposed to begin, out they came, amid cheers and shouts.

They performed an entire, full-length concert with a dramatic backdrop of frequent lightning flashes, and they never missed a beat. Even when one or two little sprinkles of rain fell from the sky, the band played on.

The identities of the players in Exile have changed somewhat since the last time I saw the group in concert. They were good before - very good. Now, I must say they are excellent.

Steve Goetzman is still on the drums, and Sonny LeMaire still sings most of the lead vocals. Lee Carroll, Mark Jones and Paul Martin have been added, and the combination works perfectly.

Martin is the band's new showcase talent. He sang approximately 50% of the lead vocals, and he had approximately 100% of the women in the audience

policy would exclude from coverage any pre-admission tests or exams given prior to out-patient surgery unless such tests were given on the same day as the surgery.

Ms. Hallmark suggested that this might be somewhat unreasonable, as physicians frequently must study the actual results from tests prior to authorizing surgery. Such results cannot always be expected to be available on the same day the tests are given.

Commissioners agreed with the point made by Ms. Hallmark. They voted to request that the policy be reworded to eliminate the requirement that tests, in order to qualify for coverage, be administered on the same day as out-patient surgery.

maintenance, specifically to the water systems, on the Housing Authority's private property.

City Manager Buddy Foster, along with several councilmembers, interpreted those paragraphs in a different manner, and the council agreed to study the contract in more depth, and to study any other documents which might pertain to the Housing Authority, before making a final decision on that interpretation.

Councilmembers also agreed to study in more depth a proposal presented by Mitchell County Appraisal District representative Mike Burt regarding the advisability of making the Appraisal District the central taxing location for all county taxing entities.

In other business, councilmembers voted to pay off the balloon payment on a Caterpillar D4H Dozer to avoid interest payment on the amount; they voted to seek bids for the seal coating of certain city streets; and they voted to seek temporary contract assistance for the completion of the 911 addressing system, in order that that project be completed within the required time limit.

The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for certain residence Custom Calling Services.

The Custom Calling Services affected by the Company's application are optional telephone service arrangements that provide the following features: Call Waiting, Call Forwarding, Three Way Calling, Speed Calling 8 and Speed Calling 30.

The Company's proposal would increase the monthly rate for the individual Call Waiting feature from \$2.10 to \$3.10 for residence customers. Also, the rates for certain combinations of Custom Calling Features (Call Waiting, Call Forwarding, Three-Way Calling and Speed Calling-8) would increase or decrease depending upon the combination of features. In addition, the company proposes to obsolete the optional Custom Calling Service feature Speed Calling 30 for residence customers except for existing customers at their existing locations. Most of the Company's residence customers in Texas who subscribe to one or more of the Custom Calling Service features will be affected by the proposed rate restructuring. It is expected that the proposed rate restructuring of Custom Calling Services will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.9 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. The restructuring will result in an increase in the Custom Calling Services rates for approximately 2.5 million residence customers and rate decreases for approximately 15,000 residence customers. Also, the obsolescence of the optional feature Speed Calling 30 will affect approximately 156,000 residence customers.

Shallower production has been confirmed with a successful plugback in the Westbrook Field, Mitchell County, five miles west of Cuthbert. Abraxas Production Corp. of San Antonio is the operator.

Designated as the No. 6

Brennand the affected well pumped 123 barrels of oil per day from new perforations in the Wolfcamp Formation. The production interval ranges from 5,312 to 5,320 feet into the hole.

Pumping 19 barrels of oil with

16 barrels of salt water daily, the No. 42 W.W. Watson has been completed in the East Howard-latan Field, Mitchell County.

Location is 9.5 miles southwest of Westbrook.

Anadarko Petroleum of Midland is the operator.

The well was perforated to produce at 2,430 to 2,830 and 2,851 and 3,186 feet into the wellbore.

Mitchell County's Coleman Ranch Field gained a new producer when the No. 1415 Coleman Ranch Unit was finished about two miles west of Cuthbert.

It pumped 18 barrels of oil with 16 barrels of waste water daily on an open choke.

With Fina Oil and Chemical Co. of Midland as the operator, the well was will produce from perforations ranging from 2,644 to 3,030 feet into the hole.

Quick action by company prevents serious environmental problems

AUSTIN, Texas, June 17-- Railroad Commission Chairman Lena Guerrero credited quick response by Diamond Shamrock and Commission field personnel for preventing serious environmental damage following a crude oil pipeline rupture in the Brazos River 10 days ago.

"It could have been an environmental nightmare - a rampaging, rain-swollen river washing out a major crude oil pipeline and carrying thousands of gallons of oil some 90 miles downstream," Guerrero said. "Instead, swift work by company and state disaster response people contained the spill, prevented it from reaching Possum Kingdom Lake, and we're into the final mop-up phase today. It's almost a textbook example of how to handle an oil spill under very difficult circumstances."

Guerrero said that government and private manpower and equipment were mobilized rapidly June 7 after Diamond Shamrock reported a rupture in its 10-inch crude oil pipeline where it crosses the Brazos River near Knox City. While the company shut down the pipeline and worked to set up an absorbent boom across the river, the Railroad Commission took over

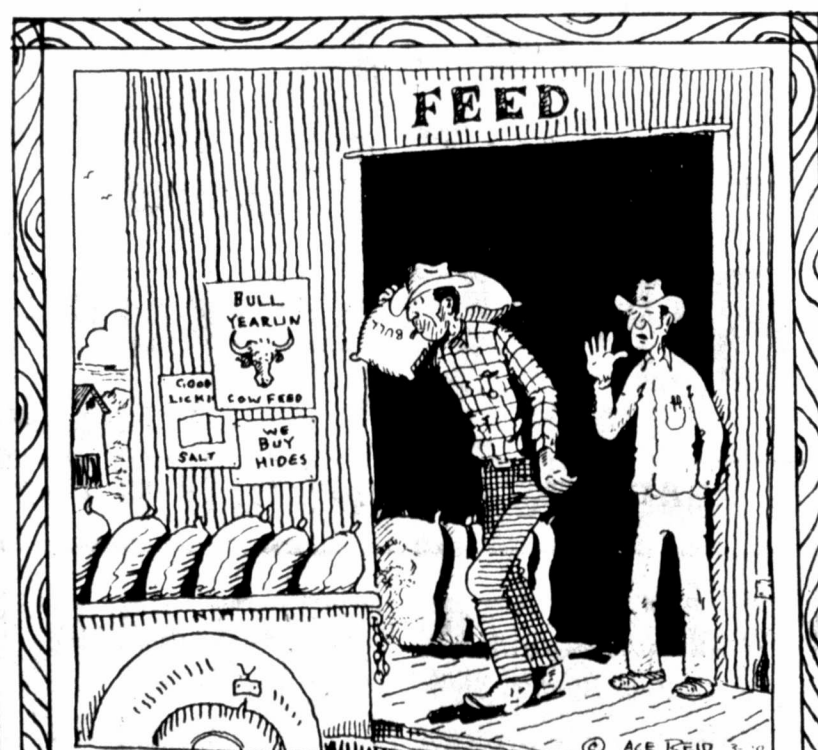

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory Assistance Service.

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase the rates for Directory Assistance calls from \$.30 to \$.40 per call (after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no change in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging \$.25 per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones.

If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.4 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers, approximately 155,000 business customers, approximately 500 private pay telephone owners and all customers who make Directory Assistance calls from public pay telephones.
