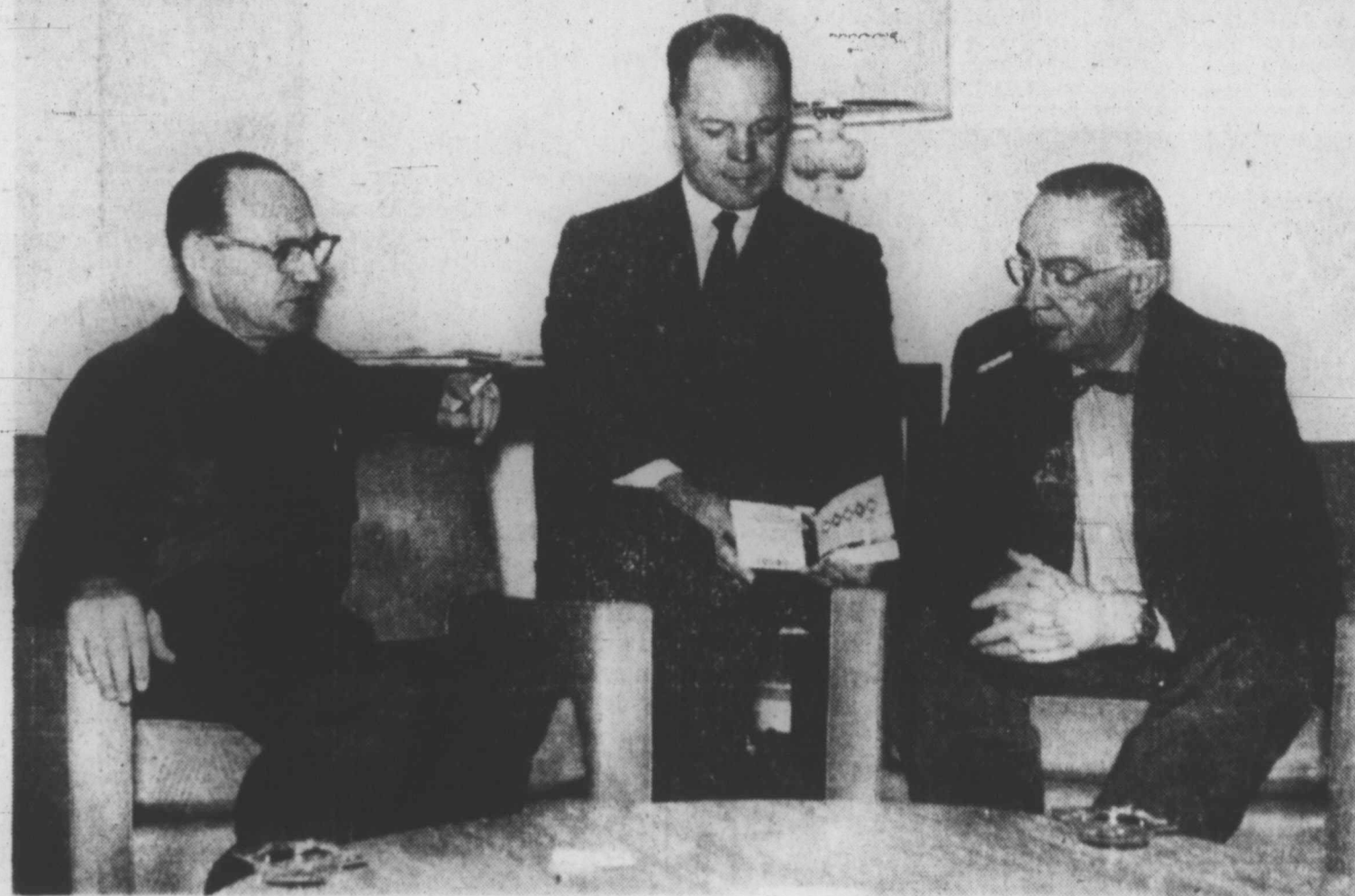

FOUR 2ND OFFENSE DWI

Grand Jury to Meet Monday for 7 Cases

At least seven felony cases will go before Mitchell County grand jury here Monday.

Four of the cases involve charges of second offense, driving while under influence of intoxicating liquor.

Two others deal with charges of unlawfully removing mortgaged property and a seventh alleges burglary.

The hearing Monday by the grand jury, impaneled in May, will be for the October term of 32nd District Court.

DWI charges to be investigated by the grand jury include those against Paris William Yarbrough, Raymond Ellis Brown, William Marlin Rains and George Alph Prescott.

Yarbrough is charged with second offense DWI on a charge filed Sept. 10 by Sheriff R. E. (Dick) Gregory. The charge alleges that the defendant previously was convicted of a misdemeanor charge here Feb. 25, 1950.

The felony DWI complaint against Rains was filed Sept. 12 by Police Chief Leon Yeager and alleges that Rains was convicted previously on a misdemeanor DWI county Sept. 13, 1953 in Shackelford County.

State Highway Patrolman Buddy Hertenberger filed the second offense DWI charge against Prescott, who allegedly was convicted of misdemeanor DWI here May 7, 1951.

The other felony DWI charge going before the grand jury will involve Raymond Ellis Brown, who was arrested by city police here Friday. His charge follows a recent arrest for the same offense.

Baird Officers Grab Suspects in Burglary

An 18-year-old Florida native was in jail here Saturday awaiting Mitchell County grand jury action on a burglary charge.

He was identified as Ansel Willard Hall, absent without leave from a Georgia military base.

Behind-bars also and facing juvenile delinquency hearing was his 16-year-old boy companion.

The pair was arrested early Thursday morning in Baird just a few hours after a break-in here at Elmer Pickens Saddle Shop, 100 block W. Second.

Both of the youths were returned here Friday by police and sheriff officers. And District Attorney Eldon Mahon immediately filed the burglary and juvenile charges.

Police said the two youths were traveling in a 1959 Ford, stolen in Dallas, when they were arrested by Baird sheriff officers.

When a search of the car revealed a BB pistol on .45 caliber stock, the Baird officers checked here for recent burglaries.

The front plate glass window of the saddle shop, located on the city's main thorough-

fare, had been smashed between 1 and 2 a. m. the same day. Taken from the window was a pistol of the same description found in the youth's car.

Police Chief Leon Yeager said a Pepsi-Cola bottle was thrown through the store window. He theorized the burglary was made when the BB pistol was mistaken for a regular .45 caliber weapon.

Baird police had been alerted when a Sweetwater service station operator recorded the license number of a car which had driven away without the driver paying for gasoline.

Farm Census Named for W-Tex Area

Appointment of Clyde Cook of Borger, as a field assistant for the 1959 Census of Agriculture was announced by the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce.

Cook will direct a force of 17 crew leaders and 219 census takers in 53 counties in the Panhandle - South Plains of Texas. Counties in which Cook will supervise the farm census this fall include Mitchell County.

Cook began duty on Sept. 23 and received several days of training which will cover administrative procedures and other duties and responsibilities connected with the job.

He will be responsible for recruiting the crew leaders, who will enter on duty on Oct. 26. The crew leaders will in turn recruit the census takers who will enter on duty on Nov. 18.

The 1959 Census of Agriculture will collect information on the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock production and inventories, selected farm facilities, selected farm expenditures, farm values, and mortgage debt. Information will be published for counties, states, and the nation.

Local Buffalo Hunting Told In New Book

Adventurous buffalo hunting on the frontier, with the late John W. Mooser of Colorado City as a major participant, is described by Wayne Gard in his new book, "The Great Buffalo Hunt," out Oct. 19.

The book is a comprehensive history of buffalo hunting in the West, with detailed attention to the slaughter for hides. It shows that the wholesale killing was viewed as necessary to subdue the Indians and to clear the plains for cattle raising.

Gard, a widely known historian, is an editorial writer for the Dallas News and is the author of five books. His most popular one has been "The Chisholm Trail," which the New York Times called "a magnificent piece of work."

His new book, issued by Alfred A. Knopf in New York, has 16 pages of early photographs and lithographs, plus nine drawings by the noted Nick Egeenhofer.

Mahon to be Speaker At HSU Convocation

Cong. George Mahon will be speaker for the formal fall convocation at Hardin - Simmons University in Abilene Monday.

The program will include ground breaking ceremonies for a new \$630,000 chapel-auditorium, part of a \$1.5 million expansion program at HSU.

Mahon, who is home between sessions of Congress, is a 1924 graduate of the university.

County Drenched By More Soaking Rains

May Cost \$125,000 To Cotton

More rain Friday and Saturday drenched Mitchell County with one of the finest fall moisture seasons in years.

Total moisture measurement for the last four days amounted to more than 5 inches in some areas of the county.

And rain was still falling late Saturday, indicating the moisture will increase.

But cotton farmers may pay more than \$100,000 for the rain.

Gin operators and farmers, were reporting the rain was causing some damage to the cotton. Extent of the damage will not be known for sometime, but just a few dollars in reduced price per bale because of lower grade could quickly amount to \$125,000 with 25,000 bale crop harvest.

The moisture continued to soak valuable moisture into the ground for pastures and small grains. Stock tanks were drinking a good supply of water, too.

HEAVY RAINS here Friday night, which subsided into continuous gentle shower most of Saturday, had put more than 1.75 inches on the official rain gauge by early afternoon.

This new Colorado City moisture combined with 59 inch Thursday and 1.35 inches Wednesday for a total of 3.79 inches. The rain was not confined to the Colorado City area. It extended over the entire county and measured considerably more in some rural areas, especially south and east of the city.

At noon Saturday the moisture total at the Payne community rain gauge of Weldon Wiggins was 5.5 inches. He reported 3 inches of rain during the first half of the week, then counted 2.5 more inches Friday and Saturday.

IN THE EASTERN area of the county the moisture was almost as much. K. L. Taylor of Lorraine State Bank reported 2.54 inches of rain fell at Lorraine Friday night and Saturday morning. Total for the week was 4.2 and the rain was still around at the last measurement.

In Looney community the new rain Friday and Saturday morning totaled 2 inches for a week's moisture measurement of 3.5 inches, according to Mrs. R. D. Ritchey.

Rain total in Spade community, southwest of Colorado City, had increased to 4.80. See RAIN Pg. 7

2 MORE CHARGED

5 Persons Guilty In County Court

Five persons have entered pleas of guilty to charges in County Court for offenses ranging from drunk driving to aggravated assault.

Bond has been set for two other persons whose cases have not yet been scheduled. Ruby Lee Scott paid a \$75 fine and court costs after pleading guilty to aggravated assault.

She cut her mother, Mrs. Florence Scott, and her sister-in-law, Mrs. Dave Scott, with a pairing knife Tuesday evening at about 6:50 p. m. The defendant, arrested by city police, told the court that she didn't intend to hurt her mother.

Displayed at the court trial was also a butcher knife which the woman had with her when she made the assault. Paying fines and serving three days in jail after pleading guilty to driving while intoxicated were Ray Gonzales, Ray Scott and J. D. Hamm.

Both Gonzales, arrested by Sheriff R. E. (Dick) Gregory Jr., and Scott, arrested by Deputy Sheriff Lewis Claxton, were fined \$75 and costs. Hamm, arrested by Highway Patrolman Buddy Hertenberger, was fined \$100 and costs.

Pete Lopez, arrested by Highway Patrolman Elwood Rogers, was fined \$35 and costs after pleading guilty to driving while his license was suspended.

The pleas of guilty were heard before County Judge Elmer Martin, who assessed the fines.

Bond was set at \$250 for Terry Lee Thomas, charged with contributing to delinquency of 2 minor boys by "encouraging, causing and giving said children alcoholic beverages." He was arrested by city police near a local drive-in.

Bond of \$500 was set in each of two cases filed against William Renfro - one charging driving while intoxicated and the other charging transportation of beer, whiskey and gin in a dry area. He was arrested by R. E. (Dick) Gregory Jr.

PROTECTION BEGINS

Farm Disability Has Key Period

Beginning Oct. 1 Mitchell County farmers — along with all those across the nation — will have social security disability protection for the first time.

And the October date can be an important one for any farmer who becomes severely disabled in October or later months. R. R. Auley Jr., district manager for Social Security Administration, informed the Record Thursday.

Although many severely disabled people in this West Texas area are now receiving disability insurance benefits under social security, farmers have not been able to qualify up until this time.

A disabled person has to have social security credit for 5 years in the 10 years immediately before he became disabled. Because farmers were not covered under the law until January 1955, they could not meet this test before October 1959, unless they had had other work covered by the Social Security Act in earlier years.

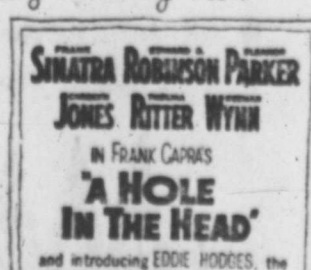
How To Bring Up A Problem Father
