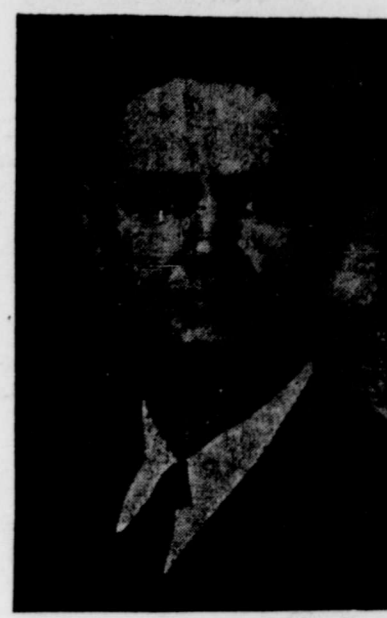

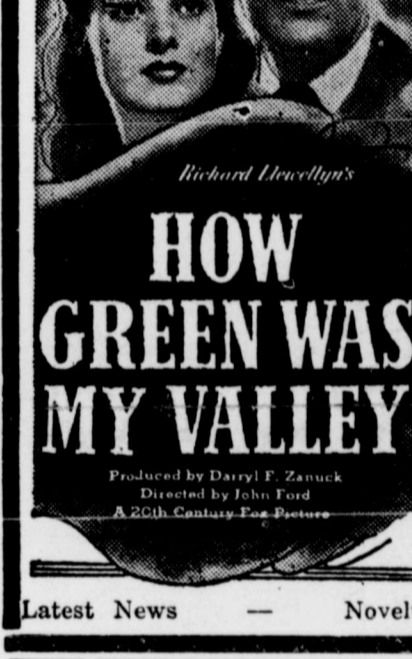
Dear Buford,

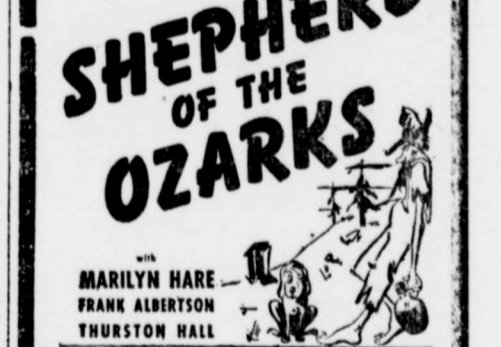
