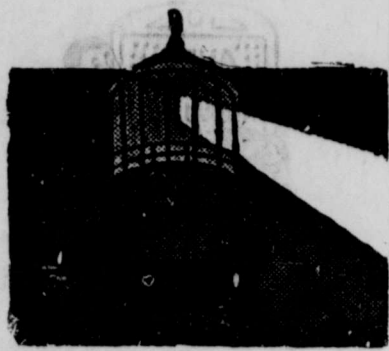

The Honor America Day last Saturday in Washington, D. C., was carried out without serious incident. Though some of the dissenting crowd was there and caused some trouble, the police kept it to a minimum.

The closing of hospitals throughout the country to medicare patients is a blow to the communities where they are located. The Johnson Hospital here in Loraine has been notified that it cannot take medicare patients for treatment in the hospital beginning on July 17. Dr. Johnson and Dr. Terry will both continue to operate a clinic but are closing the hospital part of their business. The doctors can continue to treat medicare patients in their office and medicare will pay for this service but they cannot keep a patient over night.

Just recently the Senate of the United States passed a bill that will permit privately owned hospitals to get Hill-Burton aid in building new hospitals or remodeling old ones. That is fine and will be helpful to many communities. But the biggest problem for hospitals is the lack of nurses and Congress has not done anything to help remedy this situation. What good will new hospitals be without nurses?

DATES SET FOR WHEAT REFERENDUM BY MAIL

ASCS Office reports that July 27-31 has been set as the dates for a mail referendum on 1971-crop wheat marketing quotas. By law, in the absence of new legislation, the 1971 wheat crop comes under the provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended. This Act requires that a marketing quota referendum applicable to the 1971 crop be conducted on or before August 1, 1970.

The Agricultural Act of 1965, as amended, extended its voluntary wheat program through the 1970 crop year, and specifically suspended marketing quotas for wheat producers only for the duration of the Act.

Previously announced for the 1971 crop wheat was a national wheat marketing quota of 1,210 million bushels, along with a national allotment of 43.5 million acres.

To be announced in advance of the referendum will be the price support loan rate for 1971 crop wheat, estimated domestic certificate value, required acreage diversion percentages, and other program details. County ASCS offices about one week prior to the referendum will mail program information to

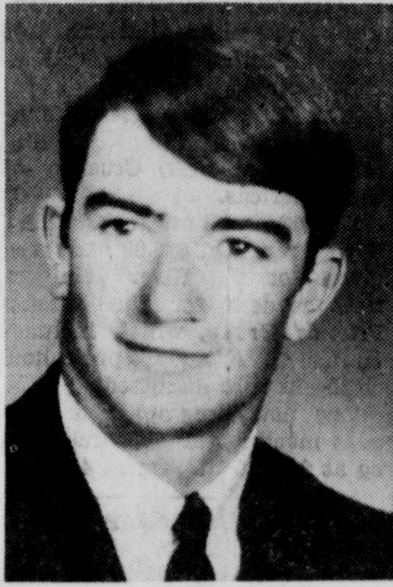

FARMERS RECEIVE EARLY PROGRAM PAYMENTS

Farmers who have contributed to stabilizing markets for food and fiber and to the conservation of soil and water resources by taking part in the 1970 wheat, feed grain, and cotton programs are receiving their program payments earlier this year than ever before, according to Curtis E. Latimer, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee (ASC).

The first batch of payments were made beginning July 1. Additional payments will continue to be made as rapidly as farmers certify compliance with program requirements and as fast as individual farm records can be processed and checks returned to ASCS County offices for distribution to farmers.

"Because of the excellent cooperation between farmers and their local ASCS office, approximately 25 percent of the participating producers in Mitchell County received their payments on July 1," Latimer said. Payments mailed July 1st were \$664,500.00.

Most payments should be completed by mid-August, if farmers who signed up will complete the necessary certification indicating that they have complied with all of the program provisions.

Farm program payments help maintain a balance between supply and demand, the Chairman explained. He pointed out that both farmers and consumers benefit from this balance.

"Agricultural productivity almost doubled in the past 20 years, but farmers' markets take only about a third of this increase," said Latimer. This means we need new markets. Farm programs help us hold down production maintain farm income until new markets are developed and old ones expanded.

"High surpluses must be avoided. They are costly in tax dollars and are wasteful of food and fiber.

"Farm programs help farmers make adjustments in their individual farming operations that in the long run will result

Farm programs also make important contributors to conservation of natural resources and help fight pollution, Latimer said. Acres that are diverted out of crop production under farm programs are put to conserving uses such as the growing of grass and trees. Such practices conserve soil and water, provide habitat for wildlife and small game, help prevent pollution of our streams from sediment and agricultural chemicals or waste products, and reduce air pollution caused by blowing dust, the Chairman explained.

"When a farmer takes land out of production and puts it to a soil and water conserving use, he gives up the value of the production as he normally would have received as income. At the same time, the farmer pays taxes on land removed from production even though that land produces no crops. Program payments are designed to compensate him for these voluntary contributions toward a more stable farm economy and a better environment," Latimer said.

In recent years, the U. S. Department of Agriculture has advanced partial payments to farmers during the spring sign-up period for the feed grain program only. The balance of the feed grain payment, and cotton and wheat payments were generally made starting in late August and continuing through September and October, or later, the Chairman explained.

"Because of budget restraints, partial payments could not be made this year. However, the Department made a commitment to farmers that full payments would be made as early as possible. That commitment is now being fulfilled."

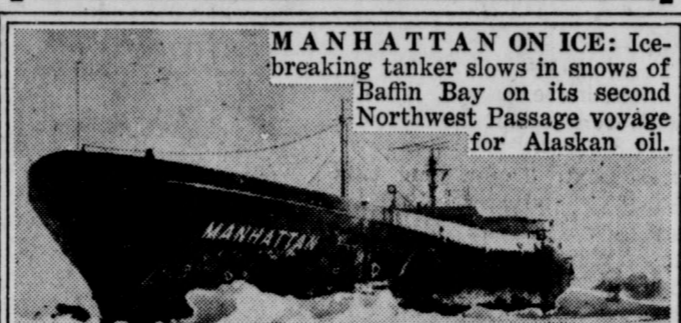

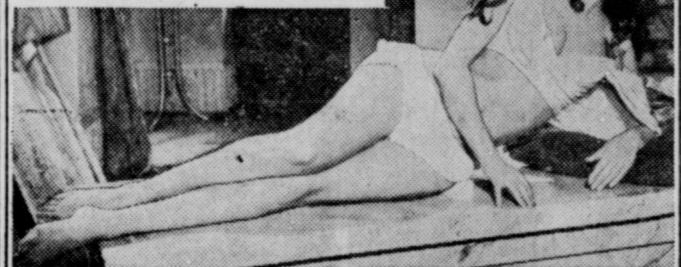


MANHATTAN ON ICE: Ice-breaking tanker slows in snows of Baffin Bay on its second Northwest Passage voyage for Alaskan oil.
