NO ONE HURT IN SHOOTING FUSILLADE NEAR WINTERS

Quite a little excitement prevailed Ballinger Sunday when Sheriff Perkins received a telephone message that a man was dead on the gallery and to come and get him. This message was from one H. P. Hudgens, who resides three miles northwest of Winters on the Humphrey road. Mr. Hudgens in his brief account over the telephone said that his boys, Clark, Haskell and Herschell, went after some water at a well on one of his tenant places, by the name of Frank Burch and that as they approached the house the tenant Burch opened fire on the boys and that his boys returned the fire and that Burch was lying on his front porch and for Mr. Perkins to come and get him.

Sheriff Perkins and County Attorney C. P. Shepherd immediately left for the scene of action which occurred about 10:15 Sunday morning and when they reached Winters they picked up J. T. Brown, justice of the peace, of the Winters precinct and another party and proceeded to the place of the alleged killing with the intent to hold an inquest, but on arriving at the place found that no one was hurt, but that quite a lot of shooting had taken place.

It seems that trouble had been brewing between H. P. Hudgens and his tenant, Frank Burch for some two weeks and become more or less acute the last few days, which culminated in the shooting on Sunday.

On last Thursday Hudgens phoned to the officers at Ballinger that his tenant Frank Burch was crazy and to come and get him at once and have him sent to the asylum, on being asked as to what the manifestations were that lead him to such an opinion Hudgens said that Burch was plowing under his cotton. Judge Kleberg sent out Dr. F. M. Hale, county health officer and Sheriff Perkins immediately to make an examination and they made an examination and reported to Judge Kleberg that there was nothing in the report and that no cotton had been in any way damaged and that Burch was very "sane."

On Sunday morning Herschell, Haskell and Clark Hudgens, sons of H. P. Hudgens, hitched up a wagon and took two barrels and started to the Burch home some three-quarters of a mile from the home of H. P. Hudgens and took along two shot guns and one 30-30 Winchester after the water, on arriving within seventy yards of the house stopped the wagon and then the shooting began. It is disputed as to who fired the first shot but an examination of the Burch house revealed the fact that several large holes were there in, indicating that the bullets from the 30-30 had penetrated the house, there were evidence of buck shot also on the house.

In all there were some dozen or more shots fired. Burch claims

NEWSPAPER EDITORS' OFF TO EL PASO

Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Sledge, of Ballinger; Mrs. D. C. McCaleb, of Austin; W. A. Smith, of San Saba; H. H. Jackson, of Coleman; G. W. Faulkner, of Santa Anna; and a number of newspaper men from other points left Ballinger Monday morning over the A. & S. for Abilene, where they will join the "Texas Press Special" en route to El Paso.

The annual meeting of the Texas Press Association convenes in El Paso Tuesday morning. The 1916 meet promises to be the most largely attended and most successful meeting in the thirty-seven years history of the association. Both the Texas & Pacific and the Southern Pacific provided special trains for the newspaper men and their wives, hauling them in luxury style. The newspaper men and their wives in the northern and eastern part of the state concentrated at Fort Worth and the Southern members meeting at San Antonio, were carried to El Paso.

"The Texas Press Special" over the T. & P. composed of ten pullmans, dining, observation and baggage cars, left Fort Worth at 9:30 Monday morning and at the same hour the S. P. pulled out of San Antonio with a "Texas Press Special" each train equipped with an electric sign at the rear with the words: "Texas Special."

At El Paso an elaborate program has been arranged for the entertainment of the newspaper delegation, including a trip to Cloudercroft, N. M., also an excursion to the Elephant Butte Dam and a visit to Juarez. The program committee of the association assigned Mr. Sledge to a place on the program, and they have announced that the program this year is an unusually good one. The excursion will stop for an hour in Abilene, spending from 3:15 to 4:15 in that city as the guest of the Chamber of Commerce and will be given a "light feed" at Sweetwater, where they will spend an hour. Arriving at El Paso at 10:30 Tuesday morning the convention will convene at two o'clock for a three day's session.

CHICAGO OPENS NOISE SHOWS

CHICAGO, June 5.—Chicago started today to make good on the prediction that for the next week it will be the noisiest spot in the world—unless it be Verdum. Certainly it will be the spot where more words are spilled than anywhere else.

All of which is by way of preface to the fact that the convention crowds began arriving today. They came chaperoned by bands, megaphoned assistants, singers and just plain noise-makers.

By Wednesday, Chicago will be swollen with people to nearly twice its normal size.

There are 985 delegates to the Republican national convention, to arrive, 985 alternates to the same, nearly 1,000 delegates and alternates to the Progressive National Convention; 20,000 women workers for the ballot, mostly out of town boosters; to say nothing of just plain spectators to the various affairs.

Already the lobbies of Chicago's loop hotels seem as choked with humanity as they did at the height of the Republican convention sessions four years ago.

All the hotels, incidentally, began today removing every bit of furniture from their lobbies.

No flower pots, vases, or chairs will clutter up space where enthusiasts may gossip, nor be near at hand for weapons in case arguments wax too hot.

One well known hotel, which sports a fountain in the middle of one of its dining rooms, began today to inclose this spot of water. It is a precaution which proved successful four years ago and saved a lot of rescues of persons and things which in previous convention times seemed to have a natural habit of gravitating there to.

The Coliseum and the Auditorium, where the Republican and Progressive hosts will hold solemn conclaves, were ready for the crowds today.

Tickets for the Republican convention were at the biggest premium they ever have been for such a gathering.

There were plenty of offers of \$350 for a single ticket admitting holder to the expected four daily sessions and tickets scarce at that.

It was estimated that the attempt to gain admittance will be made in vain by about ten thousand people. Only 12,400 seats for the public have been provided in the Coliseum.

Fakirs thronged Michigan Ave. and reaped a rich harvest in the sale of badges, banners, pictures and souvenirs.

Most of the delegations were expected today.

New York's 90, with alternates, co-workers, hangers-on and admirers, arrived on a special train this morning.

Deputy chief of Police Schnetler has sworn in several hundred extra policemen and almost an equal number of plain clothesmen, borrowed from other cities, went on duty today to keep a wary eye on the undesirable.

The only formal routine observed today was the meeting of the Republican National Committee, cleaning up contests and transacting the thousands and one details incident to stage-managing the big pow-wow.

WIND STORM DAMAGES THE NORTHWEST

WICHITA FALLS, Tex., June 5.—A terrific windstorm late Sunday evening swept all before it in the Northwest section of Texas and Southwest Oklahoma. A negro girl was killed and something like a dozen negro houses were splintered at Haskell, Texas. Two big oil tanks were destroyed at Glennpool, Okla., and other property damaged. No other loss of life has been reported.

CHRISTIAN REVIVAL WELL UNDER WAY

The revival being held by the First Christian Church has made a good start, and is already getting well under way.

In spite of the threatening appearance of the weather a large crowd gathered at the open-air meeting place last night and, while the apparent imminence of the storm broke up the service just as the visiting preacher, Rev. Bandy, was ready to begin his sermon, yet the interest manifested under such unfavorable circumstances speaks well for the future of the meeting.

The church was well filled yesterday morning, and Bro. Bandy delivered an interesting and most helpful sermon, which was listened to very attentively by those present.

The speaker took for his text the 19th and 20th verses of the tenth chapter of Hebrews, and the main line of thought was the supreme excellence and infinite advantages of the New and Living Way of Life which we have in Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, as contrasted with the Mosaic-law, spoken of in scripture as the law of sin and death.

It was shown that while the old law was itself perfect, yet man's inability to keep that law made it impossible for him to find justification and life through that law; and that it was therefore necessary for Jesus to come into the world and die, and by the shedding of His blood make an offering for sin that would bring salvation and life to men.

By using the Old Testament illustration of the passing of the death angel through the land of Egypt, the speaker showed how that, as it was necessary for the one to be saved to be within the house upon the door posts of which the blood had been sprinkled, so it is necessary today for the sinner to come into the Body of Christ, The Church, by the blood-sprinkled way, through his faith in the saviour and obedience to His gospel requirements.

There was a splendid first morning's attendance at the church today, at 9:30 a. m. which is the hour for the morning hour.

Bro. Bandy gave another helpful message. Tonight, J. F. Montgomery, the pastor, will speak on "Unpardonable Sin," and tomorrow at 9:30, on the "Parable of The Good Samaritan."

The splendid choir leader, Miss Williams, of Fort Worth, is an inspiration to all who attend and her singing is of a high order and very inspiring and will be a special feature of each service. Her solo Sunday night was listened to with silent, rapt attention. A most earnest invitation to all.

Mr. Francis thought that some friend or relative of the car's owner had borrowed the car, and did not dream that the auto was being stolen until later. A mechanic employed by the O'Kelly & Walton garage is also missing today, and it is being alleged that this man is guilty of the theft.

Texas officers are getting the following description of the car and it is hoped that the thief will be caught before many hours: \$25.00 Reward—Chalmers automobile, stolen at 2 o'clock Monday morning, June 5. Motor No. 58-867, 5-passenger, 6 cylinder, 1916 model. Been driven 1100 miles when it left here. Had non-skid tires on rear wheels, one is Pullman and other Firestone, also has a tire in rack. The upholstery on back seat was loose. This car was new. Painted blue. Phone or wire J. D. Perkins, Ballinger, Texas. Then came a description of the supposed thief: Suspected Driver—a small man about 25 years old, weight 110 pounds, has horse-shoe and horse-head tattooed on left hand below wrist. He is a mechanic.

Whether the car was altered or mutilated is not known, but a theory is being advanced that the driver could not possibly have made his get-away leaving absolutely no clue, with the car the same appearance. Sheriff Perkins and Mr. Shepperd followed country roads leading out of Ballinger for a short distance, but were unable to find traces of the missing car.

This mechanic came here, he said, from Midland, Texas, and to there from San Francisco, Cal. where he claimed to have worked in the Cadillac Motor Car factory. He gave his name to a Ledger reporter as Guy Williams.

The missing car was a beauty, and will be quite a loss to Mr.
