Eighty-six foot dam
goes down; no

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Aug. 6.—An
eighty-six foot dam across the Vir-
gin river near Little Field, Ariz.,
was swept away late yesterday by
flood waters from the nearby moun-
tains and large numbers of live-
stock were drowned. It was learned
today. Ranchers in the valley
were fleeing to higher ground
and the dam was under construction.
It was about half completed. Ap-
proximately 15,000 acre feet of
water had been impounded before
the concrete wall burst and water
flowed over the valley.

WOODS AFIRE IN 6 STATES OVER NATION

**DRY WEATHER BLAMED
FOR FIRES; 1000
MEN FIGHTING**

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 6.—Forest fires today menaced timber lands in southern Oklahoma, reports were said. Three men were in hospitals after being overcome by heat in fighting the flames.
Continued dry weather was blamed for spread of the fires.
Phillips, state forester, estimated 200 men were fighting the two largest of 26 fires discovered by state rangers. He termed the situation critical.
McBride, R. C. Duke and Ward, all of Broken Bow were in the fire fighting.
Burns Near Ringgold
Largest of the fires, which remained uncontrolled, has burned 1,000 acres near Ringgold, in the county between Pushmataha and certain counties. Phillips said a second major fire, after raging over 1,000 acres near Pine Valley in northern LeFlore county, was being under control. It was contained between two creeks.

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"TEARS OF ST. LAWRENCE" DUE FOR APPEARANCE SUNDAY NIGHT, AUG. 11

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 6. (AP)—The beautiful "Tears of St. Lawrence," as the Perseid meteor showers sometimes are called, are due for their annual visitation to earth Sunday night, Aug. 11.
The best time to look for them is between midnight and dawn, in direction of the constellation Perseus. Their "radiant," the position from which they come, rises in the northeast shortly after midnight, and is not far from directly overhead at dawn.
The name "Tears of St. Lawrence" was given them by Irish peasants more than a century ago. Astronomical records identify them first about 1100 years ago.
"Of all the annual showers they are the most certain to return with average richness," said Dr. Charles P. Olivier, professor of astronomy at the University of Pennsylvania and president of the American Meteor Society. "Also, as they come in August, when nights are still comfortably warm, they furnish the most excellent opportunity for a person casually interested in meteors to see a good shower. While quite numerous from August 5 to 15, yet from August 10 to 13, one is certain to see large numbers, particularly after midnight. Many of the Perseids leave very bright and enduring trains, which being beautiful phenomena, add to the interest."

Furnishing a barometer for the improved business status of the city, Lubbock's postal receipts from January 1 to August 1 of this year aggregated \$62,96.09 a gain of \$9,035.46 over the corresponding period of 1928, according to a statement issued this morning by Postmaster John L. Vaughan.
Total receipts during the same period last year were \$53,930.61.
July's receipts this year totaled \$9,133.40, as compared with \$4,930.72 for last year representing a gain of \$702.77.
Based on the present record, this year's receipts at the end of December will probably exceed those of 1928 by \$15,000 or \$20,000.

WAR TIME TACTICS RESORTED TO IN STRIKE OF NEW YORK GRAVE DIGGERS

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Temporary burial of the dead in trenches, reminiscent of war times, was resorted to today at Calvary cemetery in Queens where a week-end strike of grave diggers resulted in an accumulation of 600 bodies.
Since the start of the strike bodies have been placed in the cemetery's temporary receiving vaults which have accommodated nearly 1,000 bodies. Under the law, however, a body must be buried within four days after death and other the week-end men were placed at work digging three long trenches.
It was announced that after settlement of the strike the bodies would be reburied in the family plots.
Efforts to arbitrate the strike which started shortly after the discharge of a chauffeur, were under way today between the strikers and members of the cemetery board of trustees. Between 600 and 700 men are involved. They have demanded recognition of their union and an increase in salary from an average of \$24.20 a week to \$7 a day with double time on Sunday.

BOND ALLOWED IN WAYBOURN MURDER CASE

JUDGE REFUSES TO DISMISS CASE ON AGED WOMAN
GEORGETOWN, Aug. 6.—Mrs. Rosa Waybourn, charged with murder in connection with the death of her husband, today was allowed bond set at \$1,000 in a habeas corpus proceeding before District Judge Harry Dolan, who refused to dismiss the case against the gray-haired woman with the explanation that the court was without judicial authority to grant her attorney's request.
At a former trial, Mrs. Waybourn was found guilty in Bastrop county and sentenced to serve 45 years. The case was reversed by the court of criminal appeals. A change of venue to Williamson county was ordered.
Blacksmith Testifies
Hugo Middleton, Smithville blacksmith, testified at the woman's trial that she gave him \$250 to have W. W. Waybourn, Smithville railroad man, killed in order to collect his life insurance policy. Middleton said that he gave the money to a Mexican, who has never been located. Middleton now is in jail at Bastrop awaiting action on his appeal from a 90-year sentence imposed for the alleged murder of his father.

REWARD OFFERED FOR TOM SHOOK

WICHITA FALLS, Aug. 6 (AP)—A reward of \$150 has been posted by Governor Moody for the capture of Tom Shook, former Electra police chief, who has been a fugitive from justice since a spectacular break from the Wichita county jail in August, 1928. It was learned here today. The reward is to remain in effect for three months from August 2. Copies of the proclamation have been received by officers here.
Several indictments are pending against Shook, one of which charged murder in connection with the fatal stabbing of Oscar Daugherty, a truck driver.

Texas Registration Is 1,043,182 Cars

AUSTIN, Aug. 6 (AP)—Texas motor car registrations stood at a new peak today. License plates had been issued for 1,043,182 passenger vehicles, records in the state highway department revealed. In 1928 there were 947,654 registrations. Owners of 3,704 buses and 159,381 motor trucks have paid fees since Jan. 1. The department also has registered 11,474 trailers and 2,396 motorcycles.

FATE DECIDES DOG'S GUILT

LEXINGTON, Ky., Aug. 6. (AP)—Fate has decided what justice as represented by the courts, has not been able to determine. The guilt of Jack, Airedale dog valued at \$500 by his owner, Mrs. George Kergamer.
Jack, accused of killing sheep had been defendant in a series of trials that began last January in a magistrate's court. His photograph was published in newspaper over the country.
H. C. Downing, Fayette county farmer, hearing a disturbance early yesterday in his sheep pen, ran out with his gun, fired three shots, killed a six-year-old Airedale, the mother of Jack, and fatally injured Jack himself. Three crippled sheep testified that the two were killers.

STATE RESTS SNOOK CASE; STORY TOLD

**FINAL DETAILS GIVEN
IN LOVE TANGLE;
5 DAYS USED**
COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 6.—The state rested its first degree murder case against Dr. James H. Snook, former Ohio State university professor, shortly before noon today after completing its picture of his three-year love affair with Theora Hix, the medical student he is alleged to have killed.
Final details of the story were told by Howard Levey, county detective, who testified in regard to the questioning of Dr. Snook that resulted in his confession last June 20 that he beat the 24-year-old coed into unconsciousness after a quarrel and then cut her throat.
Five Days Used
Approximately five days were required for the state to put into the records on which the case seeks to send Dr. Snook to the electric chair.

HILLSBORO WOMAN BURNED FATALLY

HILLSBORO, Aug. 6. (AP)—Mrs. Joe Gerrick, wife of a Hillsboro merchant died here today of burns sustained in a fire at her home.
The case was brought to court today from the rear of the Gerrick home rushed in and found the woman standing in a bathtub with her clothing afire. A blanket was thrown around her and she was taken to a hospital, but died a few minutes later.

Stallworth Counsel Ready For Hearing

AMARILLO, Aug. 6. (AP)—Attorney for Mrs. L. P. Stallworth of Amarillo, charged with the slaying of Mrs. Grace Morrison of Plainview in front of a hotel here on May 13 said that they would announce ready for trial when the case is called at Canyon next Monday.

Liquor Proposal Is Downed In Wisconsin

MADISON, Wis., Aug. 6. (AP)—A proposal to put Wisconsin into the business of manufacturing and selling liquor was defeated in the senate today. The measure, by Senator Ben Gettleman of Milwaukee, would have amended the state constitution which prohibits the commonwealth from entering private business.
Gettleman contends the 19th amendment would not apply to a state distillery.

LUBBOCK MAN IS STABBED; ONE CHARGED

W. T. BOWMAN UNDER BOND; W. MARTIN IN HOSPITAL
Condition of Walter Martin, Lubbock carpenter, living on Thirty-fourth street, who sustained serious knife wounds Monday afternoon in a cutting affray, is improved today, it was announced at the West Texas Hospital.
W. T. Bowman, neighbor of Martin, was released late yesterday after making \$1,000 bond, following his arrest on charge of assault with intent to murder.
Started Over Water
Argument which resulted in the cutting is alleged to have started over the right of Bowman to use the water in a well located on Martin's property.
Martin was rushed to the hospital where an examination revealed three cuts, the deepest and most serious being one in his left chest below and a little to the left of the heart. His left lung was punctured by the blade, according to physicians and he will not be pronounced out of danger until after an escape of 24 to 36 hours. Doctors stated that had the thrust been a trifle higher and to the right he would have been instantly killed. The other two wounds are in the left loin and over the left shoulder. WAR VET SEEKS PUNISHMENT

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 6. (AP)—To Peter Rutherford, 85, a Civil War veteran, desertion is a crime that should be punished even after more than a half a century. He declared he was going to pay the penalty even if he had to appeal to the Adjutant General of the United States.
Rutherford first told his story to Sheriff Floyd Brower, and that officer sent him to the commanding officer at Fort George Wright, near here. The aged man reported to the officer and confessed that after serving one enlistment during the Civil War he was enlisted but deserted two years later.
"My life since then has been one of regrets," Rutherford told the officer. "I have always been ashamed of the thing I did. I am here to pay the penalty."

ZEPPELIN'S WORLD TOUR IS PREPARED

**DIRIGIBLE TO LEAVE
WEDNESDAY ON 1ST
PART OF TRIP**
LAKEHURST, N. J., Aug. 6.—Work of refueling and readjusting the German trans-Atlantic dirigible Graf Zeppelin went forward today in preparation for her departure at midnight tomorrow on the first leg of a globe-encircling air voyage.
Dr. Hugo Eckener, her commander, will head his giant air liner back to her home port, Friedrichshafen, Germany, from whence she arrived Sunday. From there the airship will continue eastward around the world, with stops at Tokyo and Los Angeles, Lakehurst, and back to Germany, a total of 22,000 miles.
Book 18 Passengers
On the first flight to Friedrichshafen, the Graf Zeppelin has booked 18 passengers, some of whom have made reservations for the world tour. The airship will carry freight and mail.
Three passengers have been booked for the trip around the world by the Hamburg-American line in New York.

HOWARD TO DIE FRIDAY

**EXECUTION SCHEDULED
FOR FRIDAY; HELMS
DATE IS SET**
AUSTIN, Aug. 6.—P. W. Howard, sentenced to death in El Paso for the murder of L. V. Nixon in 1920, is scheduled to be electrocuted in the Texas penitentiary early Friday.
It was alleged that Nixon was slain while carrying Howard in his automobile on a prospecting trip to Ward county. Nixon's body was found buried in a shallow grave.
Governor Moody has been petitioned to commute the sentence to life imprisonment.
Henry Helms, one of the participants in the Cisco bank robbery on Dec. 23, 1927, when two persons were killed, has been sentenced to die in the electric chair on Sept. 6.

Russian - Chinese Affair Deadlocked

NANKING, China, Aug. 6. (AP)—The foreign office of the Nationalist government announced today there was a deadlock at the conference between Russia and China, over seizure of the Chinese eastern railway, which has been in progress at Manchuria, Manchuria.
The nationalist authorities were unable to accept the Russian demand for reimbursement of the Russian associate managers on the railway before the opening of formal negotiations.

OUTBREAK OF CHINESE GUN DEATHS FELT

**RICE LIQUOR TRAFFIC
BELIEVED CAUSE
OF TROUBLE**
NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Prospects of one of the bloodiest tong wars in years were seen today by additional killings both in this city and Boston, bringing the dead to five in two days in addition to several wounded.
A few hours after U. S. Attorney Charles H. Tuttle and Samuel Sung Young, Chinese Consul General, had warned Tong leaders here that no violence would be tolerated pending a peace conference today, a Harlem laundryman was shot and killed at his ironing board.
Two Die in Boston
Similarly in Boston two Chinese were shot and killed within a few hours after Tong leaders had assured police there would be no Tong warfare in that city. Police officials said it was the first time Tong leaders had deliberately deceived them and expressed belief the killings would result in the bloodiest Tong war ever seen in New England.
In Chicago and Newark, N. J., where the killings started with one death each on Sunday, a tense quiet prevailed. Police maintained close watch on the Chinese sections, but no attempts at violence occurred.
The cause of the renewed Tong outbreak remained in mystery. One theory upon which New York police were working was that it was said the rice liquor trade which was said to have become quite profitable with the deteriorating quality of other bootleg liquor.

BLONDE HAIR NEEDS CARE

A blonde who has gained world-wide distinction partly because of her spun-gold hair should have a few words of advice for other blondes who would make the most of their yellow locks.

Although Mary Pickford has clipped the long golden curls which formerly hung to her waist, her hair is probably the most beautiful blonde hair in Hollywood.

"The greatest difficulty blondes have in caring for their hair is in keeping it light and vivid," Miss Pickford believes. "Most blondes have a tendency to gradually turn brown, until it finally becomes a dull, lifeless mouse brown without color or personality. Innumerable girls have asked me what to do to make blonde hair retain its original yellow-gold shade. This can be accomplished in most cases, although it demands unremitting care."

There's a Tea Hour.
"Camomile tea as a rinse is beneficial to light hair, giving it a gloss and fluffiness as well as helping to retain the color. This may be used after a shampoo with castile soap. Camomile leaves may be obtained at the drug store. To make the tea, pour one-fourth box of leaves into one and one-half cups of water. Bring it to a boil and strain."

"An especially good shampoo for blonde hair is the egg shampoo. Melt two tablespoons of castile soap shavings in a cup and a half of hot water. When cool, add the beaten whites of two eggs. Lather the hair well and rinse until clean and soft."

"Always dry the hair in the sun rather than by hot air or heat. Brush the hair for five minutes every night," Miss Pickford continues, "and follow this by rubbing the scalp with the finger tips, actually moving the scalp about over the skull. This treatment stimulates the hair, bringing the blood to the surface and feeding the roots. If there is any trace of dandruff, use a good tonic. Only healthy hair can be beautiful."

doggedly to stem a three sided attack of flames that had swept 30,000 acres in Montana, Idaho and Washington.

The army 1,000 strong and being augmented as rapidly as recruits could be found—reported varying success, but all observers insisted that the continued lack of rain and low humidity, which was as low as 13 in some places was making this one of the most dangerous seasons in history. Federal air patrols working out of Spokane reported that many new fires, none of them large, but all potentially dangerous, had been started in the national forests by lightning.

In Montana at least 12 new fires were reported.

The largest fire in North Idaho was the old blaze on Pack River in the extreme Panhandle section. It had burned over nearly 10,000 acres and was still giving trouble. In central Idaho, in the Clearwater, Selway, Salmon and Nez Perce forests a dozen or more new fires were reported, and fighters were still battling the blaze on Bald Mountain, which was out of control.

The Chelan fire in Washington was burning on six fronts, and nearly 500 men were fighting it. It was started by lightning Friday night, and had burned over nearly 12,000 acres.

With five fires which have been burning in various sections of Siskiyou county, northern California, for the last three days, under control, the Klamath national forest was reported to be in the path of a new fire, which was racing through heavily timbered land in the Hoopah Indian reservation.

STATESMEN CONSIDERING REPARATIONS

(By Associated Press)
THE HAGUE, Netherlands, Aug. 6.—Statesmen of twelve countries, including Great Britain, France, Germany and Japan, met here today to formulate methods of enforcing the Young reparations plan and to liquidate the last outstanding problems of the World War.

The conference which is to put into effect the recommendations made by the recent reparations conference under chairmanship of Owen D. Young at Paris was convened at eleven o'clock this morning in the hall of the first chamber of the Dutch states general in Medieval Biennialhof.

Belmont Von Bismarck, Dutch Prime Minister, welcomed the 38 principal delegates and their 400 subordinates after which Premier Briand of France, Foreign Minister Stresemann of Germany and Chancellor of the Exchequer Snowden of Great Britain replied.

The first meeting, which probably will be the last public session until decisions are reached, consisted chiefly of formalities. A second meeting was called for this afternoon at which the delegates will get down to the work at hand.

The United States has no delegate, but is represented by an observer, Edwin C. Wilson, first secretary of the embassy at Paris.

Recognized Difficulties
In their speeches of reply the British, French and German delegates all recognized that difficulties were ahead of the conference and all expressed determination to do everything possible to put an end to international misunderstanding.

Foreign Minister Stresemann went further and indirectly expressed a favorable attitude toward Premier Briand's proposed "United States of Europe." The German minister recalled the time when the states composing Germany were all divided by customs barriers which were now recalled with laughter.

"I hope the time will come," he added, "when in all the countries of Europe the time when customs frontiers existed between them will be recalled with the same amusement."

LOOP HOME BOMBED
CHICAGO, Aug. 6 (AP)—A bomb exploded last night in front of the home of John Sheridan, secretary and treasurer of the Chicago teamsters, chauffeurs and helpers' union. Damage was slight, but no one was injured. Internal strife in the union was blamed by police.

PEW RESIDENCE IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

Incurring a loss of \$4,000, fire wrecked a seven-room dwelling of W. A. Pew, 1614 Fifth street, this afternoon about 1 o'clock.

The blaze, which started when a container of lubricating oil became ignited while being heated, spread rapidly and was well under way before it was reported to the fire department. Very little household goods were salvaged.

Telephone Head Is Divorced By Wife

Gifford, president of the American Telephone and Telegraph company, was divorced here yesterday by Mrs. Florence Pittman Gifford, who charged incompatibility and declared that her husband's business interests came foremost in his life and that he had neglected his social duties.

AGED MANAGER DOES NOT GO TO FIELD UN- TIL GAME IS BEGUN

Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of six articles on Connie Mack, manager of the Philadelphia Athletics, who this year seems certain to achieve his great desire for another American league pennant.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 6.—After you once have had the opportunity to meet Connie Mack when he is not on his official dignity you can not resist a prayer to the baseball gods to let his Philadelphia Athletics into the world series.

A soft spoken and kindly gentleman, he is of the type that inspires one of his breed to say to him—"Father, I've been awfully bad. Forgive me."

That's what makes his ball players fight for him. They don't love Eddie Collins and they resent the dominating ways of Kid Gleason, but there isn't a player on the club who would not die for the "old man."

Works As Executive
Connie Mack works as hard as any man in baseball. He is an executive of the club in addition to his managerial duties.

We called Mack's office at 9:30 in the morning and asked his secretary if he ever came to the park before the squad arrived.

"He's here every morning about this time," she said. "He's here now, but he's very busy."

"Would it be possible to see him just for a few minutes today?"

"You'd better call back about noon," she answered.

Connie answered the phone at noon.

"Yes," he said, in that mild spoken way of his. "You can call at twenty minutes to 3."

Right On The Dot
Right at the appointed minute a visitor stepped out of Mack's office and we stepped in.

"I'm so glad to see you," he said. And he said it with a seriousness that would convince you he meant it.

It was a blistering hot day and the air in the windows was drawn. Behind him, on a pedestal was a bust statue of some one. The soft carpet on the floor of a very well appointed office and the light gave the room the atmosphere of a sacristy in a cathedral.

"The 'old man' as his boys call him, when he is not within hearing, sat at his big desk. He was without coat or vest and he had his collar off.

It was approaching game time and after a few minutes of casual conversation about his ball club and the league and we started several times to leave, but he would not permit.

About five minutes before game time we asked:

"Don't you go down earlier than this?"

"No, I go down just as the game starts. Sometimes after," he answered.

"Eddie (Collins) and the Kid (Gleason) are down there and they know what to do. I don't exert myself any more than I have to. You know, young fellow, I'm an old man. I have to save myself. I have to get plenty of sleep and rest. I never have been very strong or rugged."

"You have to engage in some kind of exercise to maintain your health and I get mine playing golf. It is a good game. You can regulate your pace just as you wish to. If you don't want to play 18 holes you can play nine and if you don't want to play nine you can play five."

"What do you shoot?" he was asked.

"Oh, I have done as well as 91," he replied with a wide smile.

Ball Players and Golf
"If you think golf is such a beneficial game, why don't you let your men play?" we asked.

"You can't mix golf and baseball in the playing season," he answered. "I allowed them to play during the training season because they have to have a certain amount of diversion. But when they play regularly they get it on their minds too much. They argue about grips in the clubhouse and use baseball bats to demonstrate the way Hagen and Jones and Farrell hold their clubs. They all have their favorite players and they argue about them."

"I have known of cases also where discussion was created on a club when two players of more got into an argument about the number of strokes they made. Charges of cheating create had feeling just as they do in crop games. So, the golf playing that is done on this club, I do."

STASIAK INJURES MAT CHAMPION

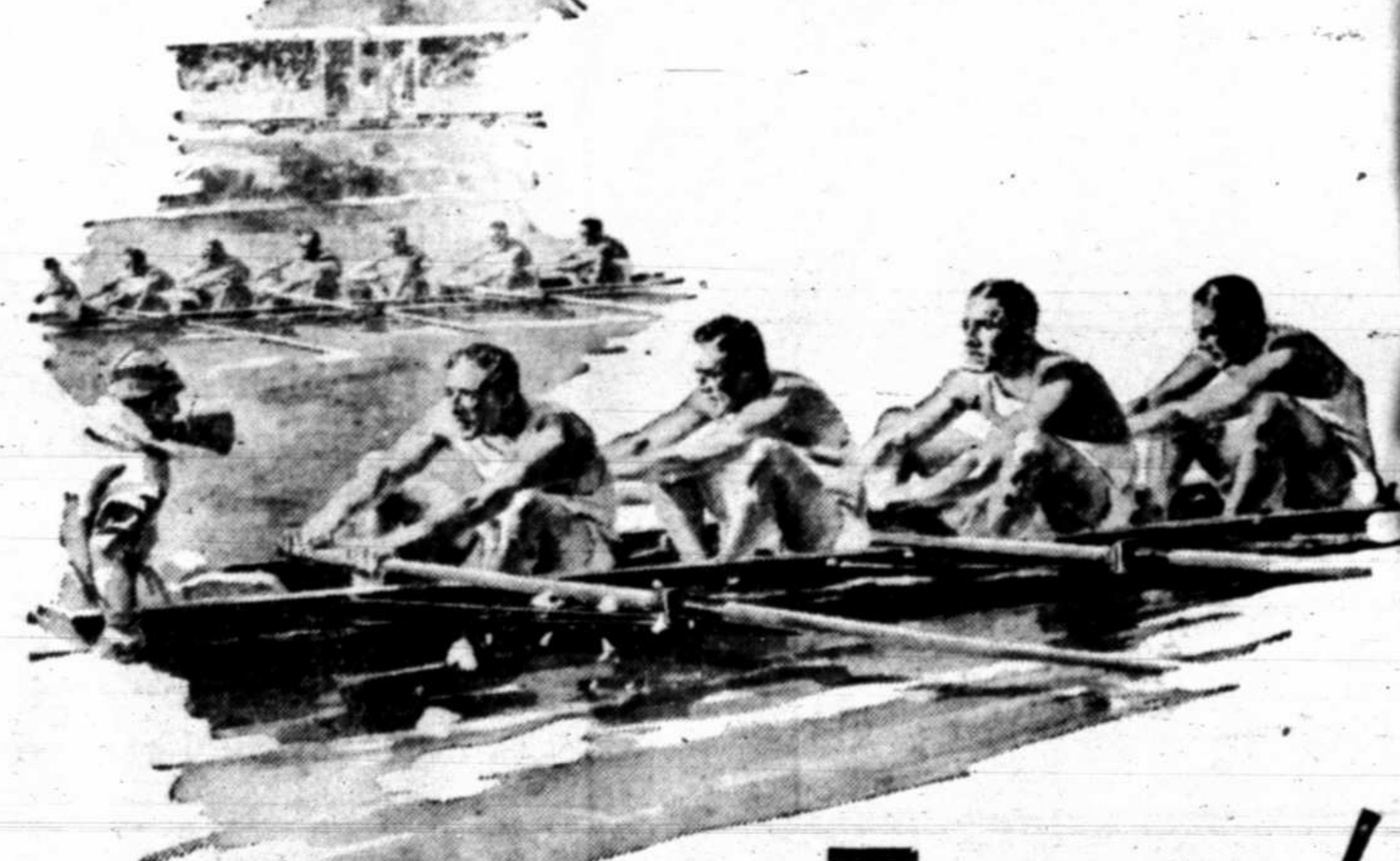

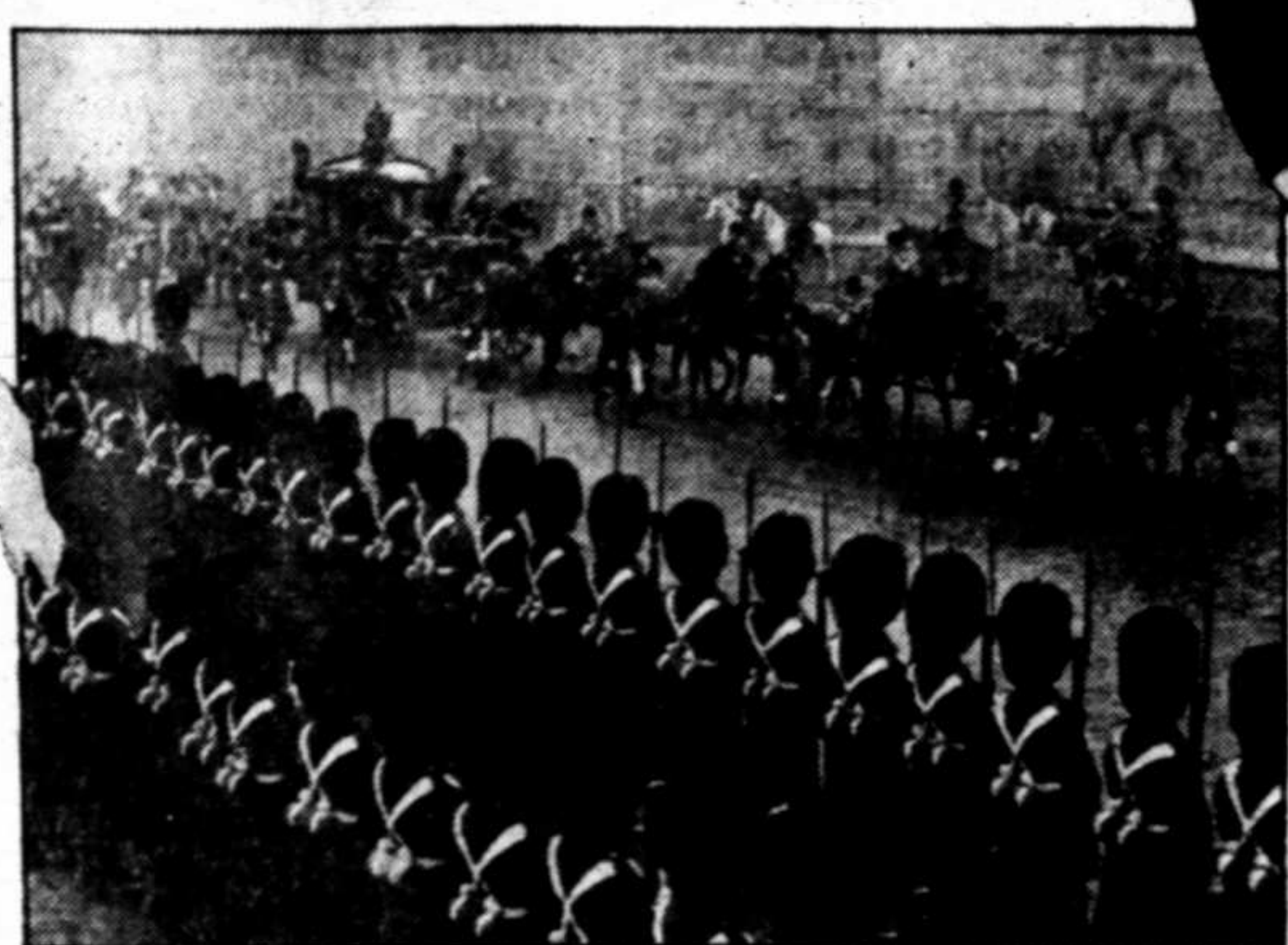

The Half-American Lady In England's Parliament

*Cynthia Mosley's Mother Was a Chicago Heiress
And Her Father Was the Great Lord Curzon,
And She Is the World's First Wife to Be Elected
To Sit Beside Her Husband in a Law-Making Body*

PICTURE the amount of front page newspaper space that would be devoted to Senator and Mrs. Borah if, upon the opening of the next session of Congress, each were to be sworn in as a United States senator. Then you have an American equivalent of England's new political sensation—a husband and wife who have been elected to sit side by side as members of the historic House of Commons.

But even that does not give an adequate picture of the stir which Sir Oswald Mosley and his charming wife, Lady Cynthia, have caused. There is another angle which has no American parallel, but which in England surpasses in sensationalism the senator and Mrs. Borah simile. It is that Sir Oswald and Lady Cynthia have turned their backs on their ancient aristocratic backgrounds and have won their seats in Parliament as Labor candidates.

Lady Cynthia, besides being the first titled woman to sit in the House of Commons for the Labor Party, is the first woman in the world to be elected to sit in a legislative body beside her husband.

She is young—not yet 30—and beautiful. She has money and brains and plenty of courage. She is a fluent speaker and is not prepared to stand any nonsense from anybody on the Tory side—man or woman. Ever since she and her husband joined the Labor Party they have had to fight every inch of their way. And she has thrived on it.

ON form, there was never a pair more unlikely to join the Labor Party than the Mosleys. Sir Oswald, the sixth baronet of his line, had the usual training of a young and wealthy aristocrat. He went to the exclusive school of Winchester and from there to Britain's West Point—Sandhurst.

He joined the Sixteenth Lancers as an officer and fought all through the war. In the later stages he was a member of the Royal Flying Corps and had a terrible crash, the physical ill effects of which he still feels.

While he was living his busy life, there was growing up in London a beautiful young girl who had everything in the world to make an ingrained aristocrat of her.

Her father was the Marquess of Curzon, one of the last of the old-fashioned aristocratic Tory grandees. Her mother was the lovely Mary Leiter, daughter of L. Z. Leiter, the famous Chicago grain millionaire. There was money on both sides of the family. There were gorgeous town and country houses. There was the training of fashionable girls' schools and the glamor of living in India as the daughter of the Viceroy of that great empire. There was the glitter of life as the daughter of that same man when he was Secretary for Foreign Affairs and leader of his party in the House of Lords. And, seemingly, she cinched everything when in 1920 she fell in love with and married Sir Oswald Mosley, who had been elected to the House of Commons as a Tory in 1918 for the "gwell" Harrow division.

BUT something had happened to Mosley during the war. He had served in the trenches and in the air with the common men from the fields and the factories. He saw that though life had denied them many things it had showered on him, they nevertheless were just as good patriots and just as willing to fight and, if need be, die for their common country. Somehow young Mosley could not get it out of his head that Great Britain should be made a better place for those men and their likes to live in. He looked to his party to start the good work. His elders frowned on him.

In the next election, in 1922, he ran again in the Harrow division, but this time distinctly announced he was running as an "Independent Tory." He was again elected. And he began to be a thorn in the side of the Tories because he would not be a sheep. The other Tory sheep began to think if he was not a "Red" he was at least a trifle "Pink." So they were not greatly surprised when he formally renounced allegiance to the Tory Party and boldly joined the Labor Party.

It was a political and social sensation. For the new Red was a son-in-law of Curzon the proud, Curzon of whom it

was satirically written even when he was an undergraduate of Oxford University: "My name is George Nathaniel Curzon. I am a most superior person. My cheek is pink, my hair is sleek. I dine at Blenheim once a week." Society wondered what Curzon would do about it. He did exactly nothing, because there was nothing he could do. His son-in-law had independent means and an independent mind. What is more, it was hinted his own daughter, Sir Oswald's wife, was going to follow her husband into the Labor Party. And she did, after she had patiently studied economics and politics and the history of her country and come to the conclusion that her husband was right.

IN 1924 the Labor Socialist Party gave the new recruit a hard nut to crack. They nominated him for Parliament in the Ladywood division of the great industrial city of Birmingham, which had always been the political property of the

The press took but a languid interest in Mosley's campaign. Ladywood would teach him a salutary lesson. But it turned the other way about. The proud and confident Chamberlain was re-elected, but only by a scant and pitiful 77 votes.

It gave him such a fright that he promptly scuttled from that dangerous district and in the recent Parliamentary contests ran in a far safer and more secure seat in Birmingham. British candidates for Parliament, unlike our candidates for Congress, need not reside in the district they seek to represent.

A by-election occurred in 1926, in the Smethwick division. Mosley was named as the Labor candidate and this time the press changed its tactics. The young "aristo," who had become a "Red" and almost carried Ladywood, was a man to be watched and to be fought.

Chamberlains. Neville Chamberlain, Minister of Health in Baldwin's Tory cabinet, represented Ladywood. Sir Oswald's chances seemed slight indeed.

for people to apply to charities for the means of livelihood. The more logical thing is to spend our money in advocating the cause of Socialism.

"All the resources of my wife and myself are at the disposal of the Socialist cause. We have already spent a lot of money in helping the cause we have at heart."

SIR OSWALD'S father, the fifth Baronet, then still living, gave out a letter to the press ridiculing "Titled Socialists" and said his son was born with a silver spoon in his mouth. This was widely played up in the press, but Mosley's reply effectively silenced the old man's guns: "I was removed from the care of my father by a court order when I was five years old and placed in the care of my mother, who was legally separated from him. Since then my father knows nothing of my life and very seldom even sees me. So far as I am aware, he has contributed nothing to my education or upbringing except in the form of alimony which he was compelled to contribute by a court of law."

In the meantime, Lady Cynthia was an indefatigable worker in her husband's cause. She canvassed Smethwick street by street and cottage by cottage. She held street corner meetings and in the last week of the campaign, issued this personal appeal to the women-voters: "This is frankly a woman's appeal to women. What really matters to us is our children under the present wicked system. My children happen to be among the fortunate who

All the fires of the Tory and Liberal press were concentrated upon him. He and his wife were hammered in the editorials. They were ridiculed in the news columns by expert reporters.

If the Mosleys campaigned in good clothes, their wealth was pointed out. If they went about in old clothes, this was sneered at as resorting to political subterfuge. But Mosley answered all these critics. Said he:

"When people like my wife and myself take up the cause of the working class, we must expect to have abuse showered upon us. My father attacked me when I joined the Labor Party. But he is the only one who has challenged us to reconcile our wealth with our Socialism."

"We have been urged to prove our sincerity by giving our money to charities. Our obvious reply is that by giving money to charities we are condoning and perpetuating the very system which has made it necessary

to have a fair chance in life. I want every mother's child to have the same chance. A fair start is the birthright of every child. We of the Labor Party say it must be denied them no longer."

She had previously given a taste of her quality in slashing speeches. In one, she said she and her husband knew when they joined the Labor Party it meant a parting of the ways with their Tory society friends. They were prepared for it and did not care.

"These Tories," said she, "say that it is brains that bring them their wealth. But some of these rich people have no brains at all. They just inherited money while you poor people who work have a rotten, miserable wage. We want to sweep away this horrible system by which workers are blackmailed through starvation into surrender."

"IKNEW I was one of the lucky ones," she said in another speech. "I could have had a lovely time, not caring a hoot about anybody. But I could not get out of my head that other women did not have a fair chance. That is what brought me into the Labor Party."

One of the Tory campaign war cries was to ridicule their both having titles, while they asked the voters to call them "Comrade." Mosley, replying for his wife and himself, said:

"By her own friends in the movement my wife is addressed as Comrade, which is the title of humanity and the only one of value. The poor old Tory snobs, who are interested in titles, may call her what they like. A courtesy title is certainly the only courtesy she has latterly received from the so-called 'Gentlemanly Party.'"

"Harder names than these are the portion of our class who espouse the cause of the poor. A great Frenchman, on the eve of the French Revolution, observed that the aristocracy had always pursued with implacable hatred the friends of the people but with tenfold implacability an aristocrat who is a friend of the people."

Sir Oswald Mosley was triumphantly elected to represent Smethwick district. His main comment was that it has been a battle between Labor and Pressocracy, in which Labor had won.

In the last campaign he again ran for Smethwick, while his pretty wife ran in Stoke. There ensued a beautiful example of the devotion of the pair. Knowing that he is not strong and more anxious for his success than hers, Lady Cynthia insisted automobiles loaned by friends for campaign purposes should all be diverted to Smethwick. She said she could conduct her campaign alone.

Mosley was again elected and by an increased majority. But his young wife worked one of the election miracles. Five years ago the Tories and the Liberals of the district united on a candidate to fight the Socialist and carried the election by 4546 majority. This time Lady Cynthia in her first try, carried the district by 7850. This was not only an overturn of over 12,000 votes, but she secured for her party double the votes they polled five years ago.

BEFORE Lord Oswald ran in Smethwick for the first time, he and Lady Cynthia made an extensive trip through the United States. There were some social affairs in their honor, but they came to work and study.

Their main purpose was to look into industrial conditions in America. They travelled extensively. They went all through great industrial plants. They stopped off at East Liverpool, Ohio; to go through potteries, American counterparts of a chief industry in their own district in England.

They went down in a coal mine in La Salle, Illinois. Lady Cynthia told the reporters that capitalism had made a mess of things in England. But she said she found that in the United States employers were wise enough to give big wages to their employees. This gave the workers a bigger purchasing power and made for prosperity all around.

There are now a lot of people who are predicting a great future for the young couple. Both husband and wife have brains, speaking ability and fighting qualities. Sir Oswald is looked upon as one of the heirs to great power in the Labor Party. Prime Minister MacDonald is very fond of the young couple and it is likely that their friendship will become important in the future. If Mosley should rise to very high office, he would in many ways parallel the story of his brilliant father-in-law.

In the life of Lord Curzon published some time ago, many of his letters to his first wife—the former Miss Leiter—and many of hers to him were printed. They show a lover-like devotion that lasted all their married life together.

The same comradeship exists between Mary Leiter's daughter and the man she married. The main difference is that whereas the late Lady Curzon never went into politics herself, her daughter now has entered Parliament with her husband, to sit by his side and help fight his battles.

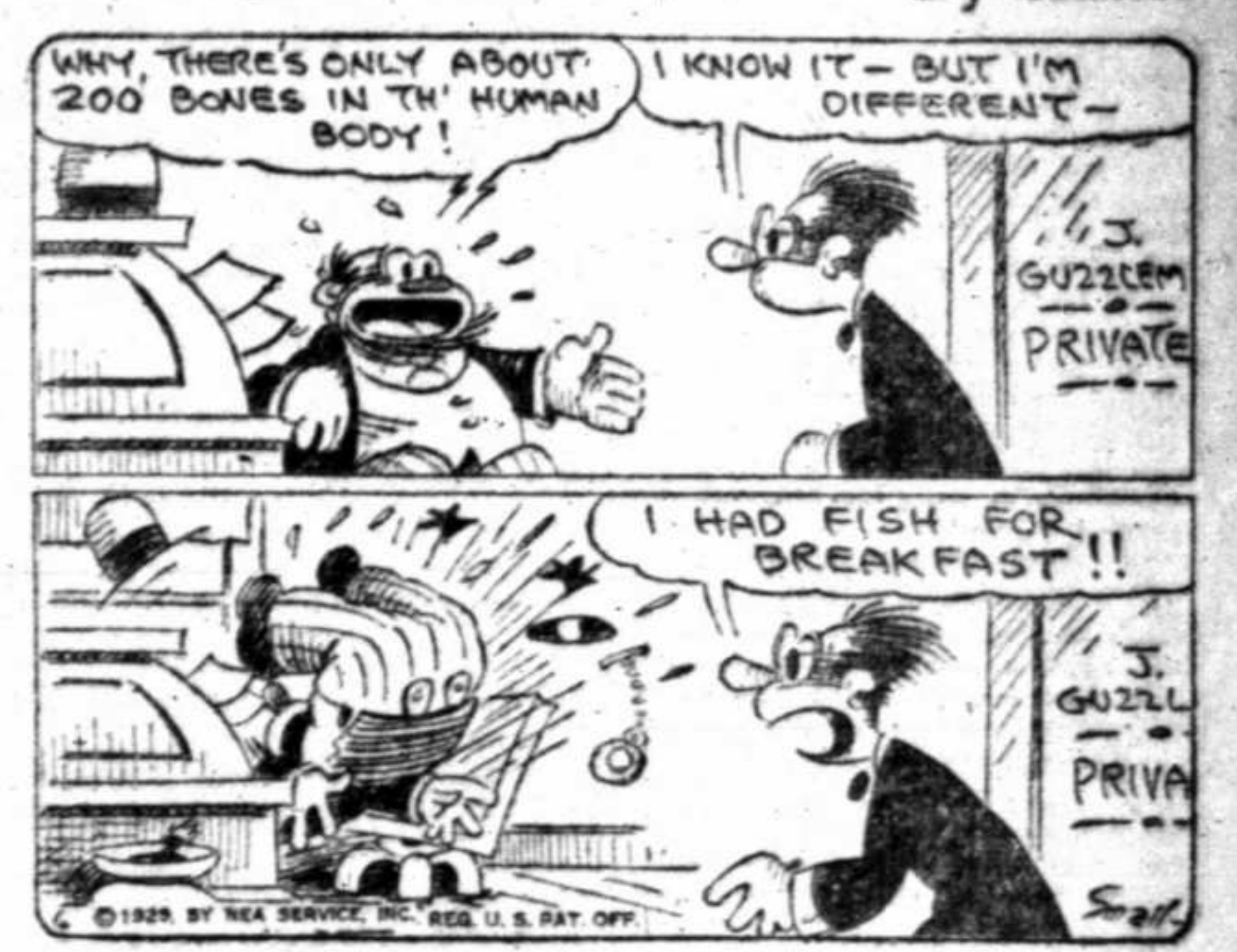
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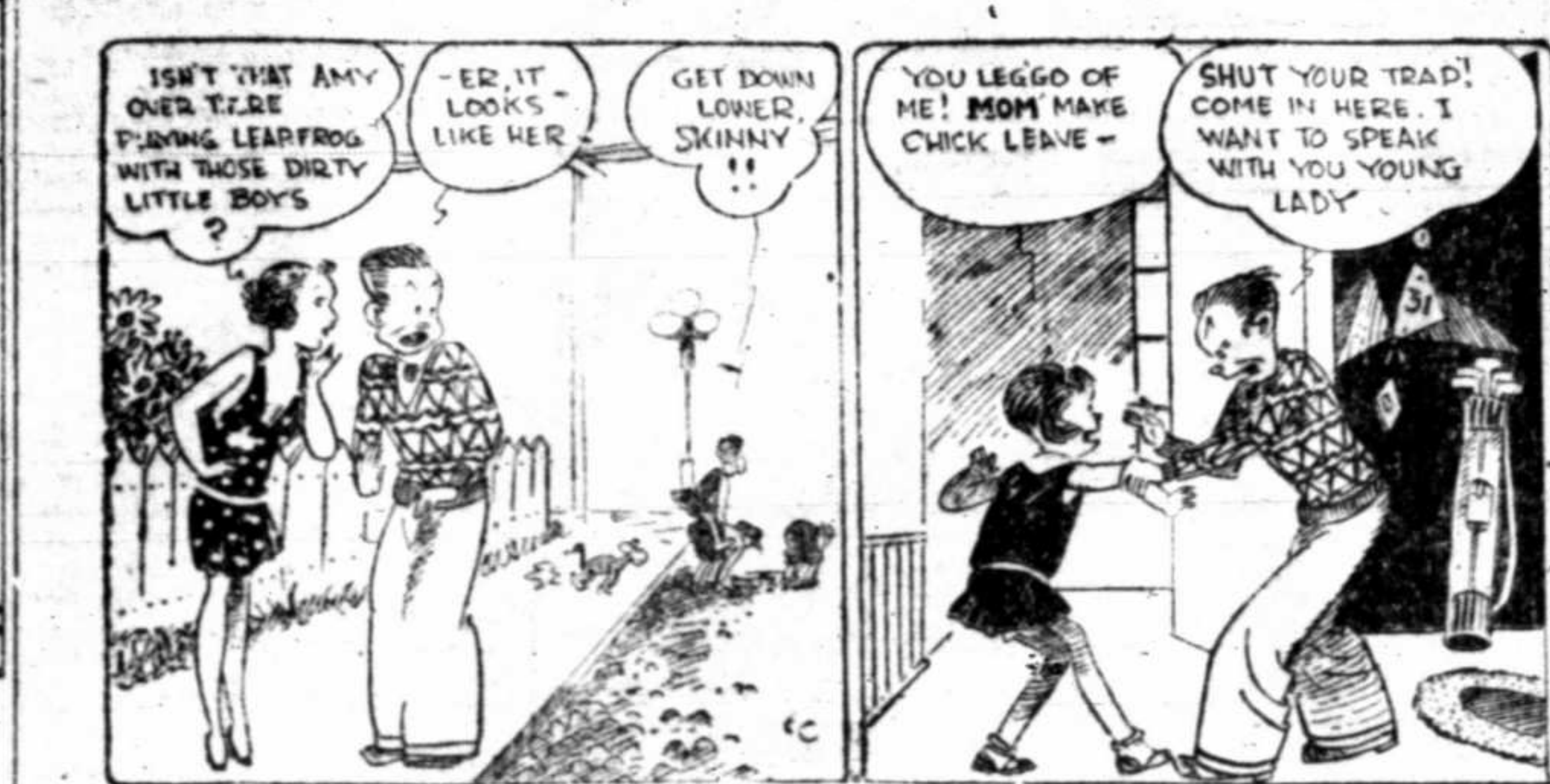
