Martial Law Follows Fatal Rioting in Peru

(By Associated Press)
LIMA, Peru, Nov. 13.—The government today established martial law in the departments of Lima and Junin in an effort to suppress widespread disorders of a distinct anti-foreign complexion. Communist agitators are blamed.

Two hundred infantrymen were sent to the Cerro de Pasco mining region where fifteen persons were killed and twenty-five wounded yesterday in riots growing out of trouble between British and American mine operators with native employees.

John W. Chapman, Chicago, and E. L. Tripp, whose address is unknown, both Americans, were among those killed.

POLISH COURT UPHOLDS AUTHORS' MOVIE RIGHTS

(By Associated Press)
WARSAW, Nov. 13.—Polish courts have held that movie theatre owners must have permission of composers to exhibit films containing excerpts from the latter's musical works, even though the producers of the film have purchased the movie rights.

The finding was made here when the proprietor of a theatre was fined \$350 because he exhibited a film made on the Western Electric sound system and containing a scene from the opera "Cavalleria Rusticana" without first obtaining permission from Pietro Mascagni. The famous Italian composer brought the suit.

The cast went back to the Bern authors' rights convention, which the United States did not sign. American producers have been sending over many films containing musical settings of scenes taken from the works of European authors, and trouble has developed in several instances.

In the Warsaw case the defendant pleaded that the Western Electric had paid \$2,500 for the right to put the scene on its film, but the court upheld the contention of the Mascagni attorneys that the right to use a musical composition in the creation of a film does not extend to public exhibition of the finished product.

First Goodfellow Makes Donation

John Weeks Earnshaw is the first Goodfellow in Ballinger. A new crisp \$5 bill was received at the Ledger office early Thursday morning to be applied to this fund which will spread a little happiness among the poor children this Christmas.

The campaign will be handled as a part of the American Legion program, and leaders who for the past seven years have looked after the details will be on the job to canvass the town, learn who is worthy of aid, and purchase and deliver packages to these families on Christmas eve.

A citizen who has been at the head of this work ever since its inception here seven years ago declared Thursday night that it would be a real job this year and would require a considerable sum if the work was done as thoroughly as in past years. It was pointed out that many kiddies will know no Santa Claus except that personified by the Goodfellow committee.

The committee will carefully plan the campaign and in order to do this ask local people to make contributions early so some idea will be gained in advance of how much is available for expenditure. Purchases will be governed accordingly.

Last year the budget was slightly below \$350 and was ample to take care of all deserving cases in the city. No budget has been set so far this year and probably will not until after the canvass is conducted late in December.

Last Criminal Case Is Before Court

The case of the state vs. W. T. Smith, charged with selling intoxicating liquor, was heard in 35th district court here Wednesday. The jury reported in the afternoon, bringing in a verdict of guilty and assessing punishment at one year in the penitentiary. The case was contested and trial consumed most of the day.

Thursday morning the case of the state vs. Johnnie Walker, in which defendant is charged with burglary, was called. When asked if he had a lawyer Walker informed the court that he would handle his own defense and did so in a creditable manner, questioning each witness who was placed on the stand. The evidence submitted by the state is that Walker entered the blacksmith shop of Ischar & Patterson one night and attempted to break into the safe. The knob of the safe was broken off by the use of a hammer and some time after the attempted robbery is alleged to have taken place Walker was arrested and lodged in jail, and charged with the crime.

Walker denies his guilt and all evidence submitted, which is circumstantial. Fresh shoe tracks were found about the opened door which fit those of Walker. However, he admits being about the shop in the afternoon but not on the evening of the robbery.

This case will close the criminal docket for the week and as soon as some small civil suits are disposed of it is expected that court will adjourn.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MOVES TO NEW CITY HALL

The Ballinger Chamber of Commerce moved Wednesday afternoon from over the Tigner Jewelry Company to new quarters in the recently finished city hall. Secretary J. D. Motley was busy Thursday filing records and arranging furniture in the new offices. A directors' meeting will be held as soon as this is finished.

Some new furniture has been purchased by the chamber and the remainder was refinished, making it look like new. All equipment is now in harmony with furnishings of the building. The room occupied by the chamber is large enough for all meetings of the board and is convenient for the business men. The phone number will remain the same. The secretary's office is the first door to the left after entering the building.

Hundreds are Dead In Path of Tornado

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Dispatches from Rangoon, India, today reported hundreds of persons dead as the result of a tornado which wiped out the town of Kyauk Pyu on the west coast of lower Burma. All buildings in the town are reported to have been destroyed, trees uprooted, and vessels in the harbor driven out to sea.

Landslide Buries 100 in France

(By Associated Press)
LYONS, France, Nov. 13.—A catastrophic landslide early today killed between 60 and 100 persons when practically the entire Fourviere Hill surrounded by the noble basilica of St. Jean slid down, bringing with it ten houses in ruins and burying the sleeping occupants.

A second avalanche followed the first, burying 19 firemen and 7 policemen who were engaged in rescue work.

Three bodies had been recovered late this evening. Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Carr returned Wednesday from Dallas, where they spent Armistice Day. On Armistice Day they attended the races at Arlington Downs, where a crowd of 25,000 saw the thrilling horse races.

DULUTH, Minn., Nov. 13.—(AP)—Approximately 22,000,000 board feet of state-owned timber is being sold by Minnesota.

Authorities Believe Family is Poisoned

DETROIT, Nov. 13.—Charles Anger, 59, his wife, Lydia, 36, and their child, Alice, 5, apparently seriously poisoned, are in a hospital here today.

Police are puzzled over motives in the case.

The parents are unconscious and their condition is precarious. The little girl told the police that her father gave her pills for several days. The janitor reported considerable commotion in the Anger apartment for several days. He said when anyone knocked at the door, Mrs. Anger opened it, then slammed it in their faces.

Moans and cries throughout the night caused the janitor to break down the door early today, revealing the condition inside.

ERA OF COSTLY HORSES PREDICTED IN FEW YEARS

DURHAM, N. H., Nov. 13.—Horses are likely to be higher in 1937 and 1940 than ever before, says M. Gale Eastman, farm economist at the University of New Hampshire. Development of tractors, trucks and automobiles lessened the demand for horses in recent years and prolonged the period of low prices.

The end of the low price period, he says, has left few young horses in the country and as the old ones begin to disappear the whole country will join a scramble to get more.

Despondent Man Kills His Family

UNIONTOWN, Penna., Nov. 13.—R. W. Playford, 55, wealthy lawyer and banker, suffering under the delusion that his family was facing poverty, shot and killed his three children and himself, and probably fatally wounded his wife, Nancy, before the family arose early today.

The dead children are: Nancy, 13, Margaret, 10, and Pauline, 9.

SOVIET PATENT LAWS BOON TO INVENTORS

(By Associated Press)
MOSCOW, Nov. 13.—New patent laws for the encouragement of inventors are being promulgated by the Soviet government. The new laws will cut red tape and patent committees are to be organized within the government trusts, syndicates, factories and shops.

Two different kinds of patents are contemplated. Under one the inventor will be granted a certificate which will attest that he has given his idea to the government. He will be entitled to royalties and will have free medical aid, tuition for himself and children, pension and exemption from taxation.

Another patent form will allow the inventor to dispose of his invention and will be issued for 15 years, subject to government right to make use of the patent if the idea is considered of great military or industrial value. In such cases the inventor will receive a permanent royalty but will not be granted the other privileges.

PREVENTING DIPHTHERIA

Diphtheria is a cold weather
disease. While prevalent through-
out the year, it reaches its maxi-
mum during autumn.

This is a good time, therefore,
to immunize young children
against the disease.

The three doses of toxin-anti-
toxin required to make the child
resistant to the disease may be
administered to the infant as
young as nine months. It is of
value for children of all ages, but
particularly those under ten.

Children between the ages of
five and seven are especially
prone to contract diphtheria. This
may be due to their entrance into
school life, with its attendant
increase in contacts with other
children.

There is no danger in being
immunized. The danger lies in
not being protected against so
insidious and destructive a dis-
ease as diphtheria.

The required three injections of
toxin-antitoxin do not hurt, be-

yond a pin prick. There are no
undesirable after effects. Toxin-
antitoxin is no "new fangled"
idea. It has passed the experi-
mental stage. Hundreds of thou-
sands of children have received
this protective treatment.

Through its almost universal
application a number of commu-
nities have been able to escape
diphtheria so that there hasn't
been within their limits a single
death from this disease for a
number of years.

Medical science has now placed
at our service such effective
means for the prevention of dipht-
heria that every new case must
be considered a moral, if not
legal, indictment of criminal ne-
gligence on the part of those
responsible for the child's phys-
ical well being.

Despite this, however, our week-
ly reports still show an appalling
number of diphtheria cases and
deaths.

"I am doing it only because my
husband wished me to, but I'll
try to qualify," said Mrs. Wingo
with quiet dignity.

Before her was a career of con-
tinuing the long public work of
her husband, the late Otis T.
Wingo, Arkansas Democrat.

She recalled the 17 years which
had been a training school for
her new task. These were gay
young years of the Wilson admin-
istration.

She smiled a bit wanly to re-
member how they "boned up"
among the biographies in the
Congressional Directory to be in-
formed about their hosts and
hostesses.

Then came the years in which
the political arena got a larger
hold on her. Her husband was
injured in an accident. More and
more she shared in his public life.
During the last three years, she
seldom was absent from his side,
even attending the long sessions
of the banking and currency com-
mittee meetings.

Her one thought, now she says,
is to carry out her late husband's
wishes. So she is closing the door
of the home scene, stepping forth
into the political career.

Millions of Citrus Trees Planted in Texas

BROWNSVILLE, Nov. 13.—The lower Rio Grande Valley of Texas rapidly is nudging closer to national leadership in the citrus fruit industry.

The valley's ambition is to have the largest number of citrus trees by 1931 of any territory in the world.

The magnitude of the Texas grapefruit industry is revealed in the citrus census of the department of agriculture, which disclosed that the valley had 6,001,101 citrus trees on April 1 of this year. Of this number 420,160 were grapefruit trees.

During the present season approximately 1,500,000 additional citrus trees are to be planted, and 1,250,000 of these will be grapefruit. This would bring the total grapefruit trees in the section to 5,451,650.

During 1931 it is estimated an additional 650,000 grapefruit trees

will be planted, bringing the total to 6,101,650.

The valley hopes to surpass Florida by the end of next year in the number of trees planted, and perhaps to lead all citrus-growing sections of the world in that respect.

Florida, however, with approximately 5,600,000 bearing grapefruit trees, still is far ahead of the valley in production. That state ships about 30,000 carloads of grapefruit annually, while the Rio Grande section totaled 4,500 carloads last year.

The valley's output, however, is expected to double annually for several years to come as productivity of young trees increases.

The value of trees now in Texas orchards is estimated at \$120,000,000, and the valley has thousands of acres of additional land suitable for development of the industry.

FUR TAX TAGS ARE SHIPPED TO TRAPPERS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Nov. 13.—Shipment of 3,000,000 fur tax receipt tags has been started by the game, fish and oyster commission in anticipation of the start of the fur season, December 1. The tags must be attached to the pelts of each fur bearing animal offered for sale, according to the law passed at the fifth called session of the 41st legislature.

The law provides a tax of five cents on mink and raccoon skins and one cent on all other skins. The tags were mailed to game wardens and will be distributed to the various stores by the wardens.

Last year, the only requirement was to tag each bundle of furs.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—(P)—Some form of small loan credit is used regularly by more than four-fifths of the people of the United States, says the department of commerce.

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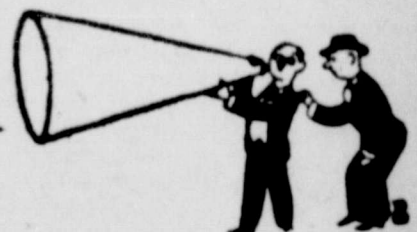
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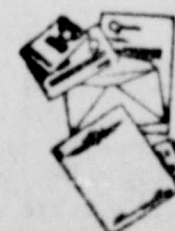
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
