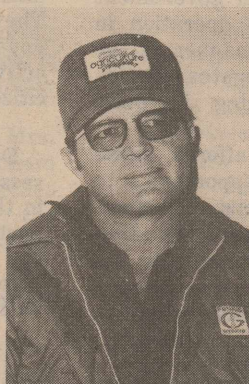

City Election Slated

Voters will elect a new city government Saturday, April 7 with the terms of mayor and commissioners expiring simultaneously.

Mayor Frank Barnes is unopposed on the ballot. Appointed to fill the office in 1976, he was elected to the office in April of 1979.

A resident of Hart since 1969, Barnes was formerly principal of Hart Elementary School before entering private busi-

ness in 1976.

Since moving to Hart, Barnes has been an active member of the Volunteer Fire Department, serving as fire chief. He and his wife, Shirley, are parents of three children. Mrs. Barnes is counselor at Hart Elementary School.

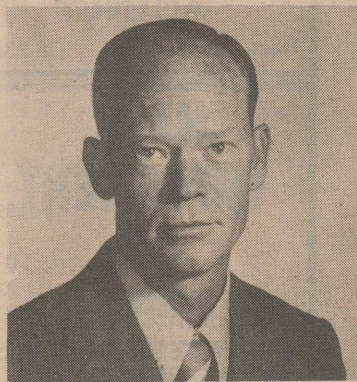
Commissioner Bob Bowden also seeks re-election to the office he has held one term.

"We have certain projects begun," he says, "that I'd really

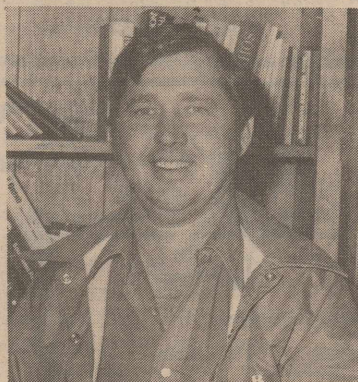
like to see through. We have a responsibility, too, to serve when we can."

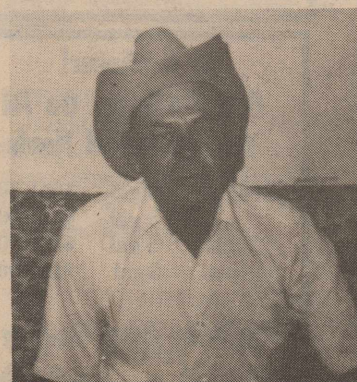

7 Seek Posts

Seven candidates are seeking election to the three vacancies on the board of education of Hart Schools. Only one, Bill Rich, is an incumbent. Others are Weldon Davis, Doug Higgins, Larry Lee, Elias Martinez, Cleve McLain and Mike Reed.

Terms of J.D. Myrick and Wamon Foster also expire but neither seeks re-election.

Davis has lived in the Hart community 32 years. A graduate of Hart High School, he attended Wayland Baptist College. He and his wife are parents of four children. They have three grandchildren.

A deacon in First Baptist Church, Davis is president of the board of directors of High Plains Bargaining Association. He also serves on the planning committee of Castro County Farmers Union.

He farms with his father, brothers and son.

Higgins has lived 16 years in the Hart Community. He graduated from Springlake High School and West Texas State University. He was a football coach and girls

basketball coach in McCamey, Spearman and Hart before entering the farming profession.

Past president of Hart Lions Club, he is currently serving as president of Castro County Farmers Union, was a member of the policy drafting committee for Texas Farmers Union and community committeeman for Castro County ASCS.

Higgins and his wife, Marylyn, are parents of a daughter, Lesa, a freshmen at WTSU, and a son, Daniel, junior at HHS. The family attends First Baptist Church.

A graduate of Hart High School, Lee attended Angelo State University and graduated in 1967 with a degree in accounting. He practiced accounting seven years in Dallas and completed requirements to become a Certified Public Accountant in 1971.

Returning to Hart in 1974 to begin farming with his father, he has become active in Castro County Farmers Union, Hart Jaycees and First Presbyterian Church of Plainview.

Lee and his wife, Linda, are parents of a six-year-old daughter, Tanya. He seeks election as trustee because he feels he can aid students and teachers alike to achieve a high level of education.

Martinez began coming to Castro County 21 years ago and moved here permanently 14 years ago from Dallas. A native of Coleman County, he graduated from Mozelle High School in 1951.

He and his wife, Angie, are parents of five children. The four oldest graduated from Hart High School or attend Hart schools at present.

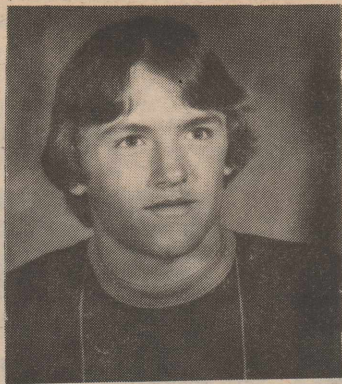
"If elected," he says, "I will do what is best for the community and to the best of my judgement, what needs to be done."

Two Hart High School boys, Daniel Higgins and Mark Werner, will represent their community in the 1979 session of the Texas American Legion Boys State. The announcement is made by Commander Everett Heller of Hart American Legion Post #311.

Glen Snitker has been chosen as alternate, to attend if either delegate is unable to go.

The 1979 session of Boys State will be in session from June 6-12 on the campus of the University of Texas in Austin.

Sponsors of the two youths are American Legion Post #311 and Hart Lions Club.

American Legions across the nation are sponsoring 51 Boys States this summer. Two outstanding youths from each Boys State will go to American Legion Boys Nation in July in Washington D.C. where they

will study federal government organization and operation in much the same manner as the Boys State delegates participating in training in state government.

"Boys State affords these young men an opportunity to learn the functions of government," says Commander Heller. "Also, they will see the importance of the role a good citizen has in discharging his

citizenship responsibilities. They soon discover how good government depends upon the active interest of every citizen."

During their Boys State sessions, the youths participate in the organization of political parties, campaigns, elections and the enactment and enforcement of their own laws within a mythical state.

RED CINNAMON PICKLES

2 gals. cucumbers, peeled and seeded
Mix 2 c lime with 8 1/2 qts water. Pour over cucumbers and let stand 24 hrs. Drain. Wash through several cold waters. Let stand 3 hrs. in cold water, add ice cubes if available. Drain and cover with 1 c vinegar, 1 sm bottle red food coloring, 1 T alum and enough water to cover. Simmer 3 hrs. Drain. Make a syrup of 3 c vinegar, 3 c water, 15 c sugar, 12 sticks cinnamon, 30 oz red hots. Heat until dissolved. Pour over cucumber rings and let stand overnight. Fourth day, reheat, pour into hot jars and seal.

MY FIRST RECIPE

"How To Preserve A Husband"

Be careful in your selection. Do not choose too young; and only such varieties as has been reared in a good moral atmosphere; when once decided upon and selected, let that fact remain proven, settle, and give your entire thought to preparation for domestic use.

Some insist on keeping them in a pickle, while others are constantly getting them into hot water. Even poor varieties may be made sweet, tender, and good by garnishing them with patience, well-sweetened with smiles and flavored with kisses. Keep warm with a steady fire of domestic devotion and serve with peaches and cream.

Singles play was Suzahn Rowland, 3-8, and Teresa Mapp, 3-8.

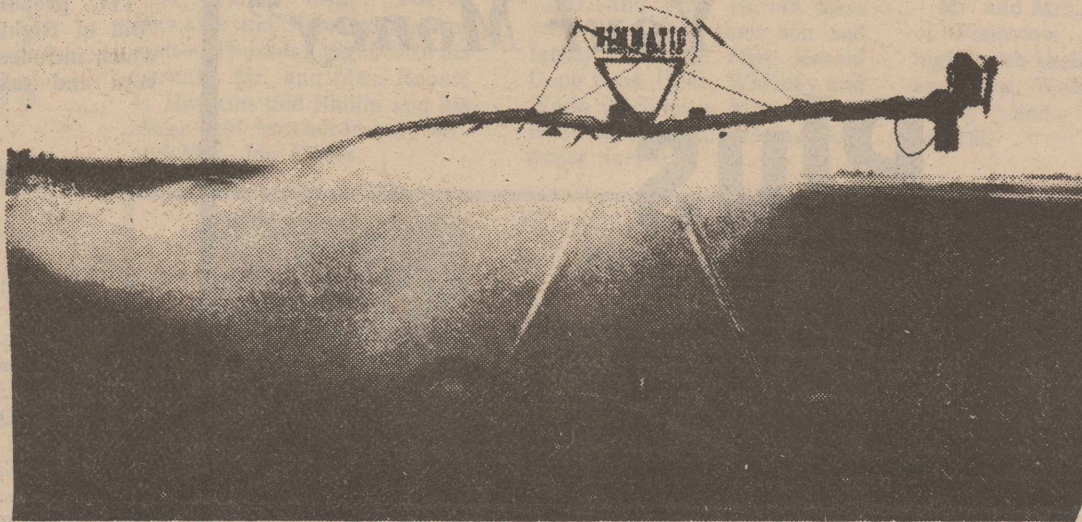
In a practice match Monday, Averitt and Catano were 8-3 over Springlake-Earth.

Mrs. McLain, Area Women Attend State IYC Meeting

Mrs. L.C. McLain of Hart, Mrs. Olan Moore and Mrs. Richard Connell of Dimmitt, Mrs. Al Schoenenberger, Nazareth and Mrs. Jimmy Mammore of Amarillo recently attended the State International Year of the Child (IYC) meeting in Austin.

Mmes, McLain, Moore and Butch Merritt returned to Austin, last week, where Mrs. McLain testified before a Legislative Committee concerning the IYC. The International Year of the Child is being promoted through the United Nations by the same people who promoted International Women's Year in 1977. Mrs. Jean Childs (Andrew) Young is the head of the IYC in the United States.

IYC proponents uphold a "Bill of Rights for Children" which includes: 1. The right to vote and take full part in

political affairs; 2. Right to work for money; 3. Right to privacy; 4. Right to financial independence and responsibility, right to own or buy or sell property, to borrow money, establish credit, sign contracts, etc.; 5. Right to direct and manage one's own education; 6. Right to travel, live away from home, or to choose or make one's own home; 7. Right to receive from the State whatever minimum income it may guarantee to adult citizens; 8. Right to seek and choose guardians other than one's own parents and to be legally dependent upon them; and 9. to right to do, in general, what any adult may legally do.

"These sound good, but what will happen to the American family and what has happened to the responsibilities of parents in this modern age, is a question that causes much perplexity," says Mrs. McLain.
