

# Space Lab, Station Follow Moon Landings

## C-City's Haines Maps Nation's Future In Space

Apollo 14 flight directors plan for the lunar landing Friday for 3:16 a.m. as originally planned.

Astronauts Alan Shepard and Edgar Mitchell will take a pair of 4-hour moon hikes Friday and Saturday in the Fra Mauro region near Cone Crater.

After that, what next?

Well, Charles R. Haines provided an outline here last week when he reported his assignment as program manager for the lunar landing training vehicle at NASA Manned Space Craft Center in Houston.

Haines, the 35-year-old Col-

orado City aeronautical engineer, has moved up rapidly to key prominence in the nation's space program since the late President John F. Kennedy's pledge to beat the Russians to the moon attracted him to space.

Space with its moon landings hundreds of thousands of miles away is a way of everyday life to Haines. He frets about things like his small checked tie--whether it was too loud for the headliners' table at the Chamber of Commerce banquet which honored him--more than Friday's moon landing.

And, here is what Haines reports is coming next:

Apollo 15 training is already under way for another moon landing. It will place astronauts on the moon for more than 3 days--with 7 times more opportunity to explore than the Apollo 11 mission.

While Shepard and Mitchell will walk on the moon Friday, Apollo 15 will place a vehicle resembling the earliest American auto on the lunar surface.

Apollo 16 and 17 missions will close out the moon exploration next year.

Then will come the Skylab. Haines reports the Skylab is

about 2 years away and will be an engineering conversion from the third stage of the Saturn 5 rocket.

An Apollo service module transports 3 astronauts to the lab and docks there, letting the astronauts move into the Skylab for a long stay in orbit.

Equipment in the Skylab, Haines reported, will have window area for a telescope, solar panels for converting sun-light into electrical energy.

Astronauts will return to earth in the module after their Skylab assignment is complete.

A second Skylab mission probably will be for 8 week duration, followed by a third mission of the same length.

The Skylab telescope will provide astrological observation above earth atmosphere which distorts land telescopes.

The Skylab, with enough room for astronauts to exercise, will provide knowledge on the effect of space upon the human body.

After the Skylab will follow the Shuttle, Haines told his hometown audience at the Chamber of Commerce banquet.

The Shuttle will have two dif-

ferent space units--the larger of the manner of a booster craft and a smaller unit for orbiting.

Space experts will be cautious with the Shuttle program. First mission will be certain the load can be carried into orbit. Second and third phases probably will utilize the Shuttle for rendezvous and rescue time missions as well as for carrying supplies to space stations.

Haines says the Shuttle target is early 1976, depending upon the amount of support Congress continues for the space program.

Space Station will be next development following the shuttle.

Several modules will make up the station, which will have a crew of at least 12 astronauts.

Each of the Space Station's modules will be designed for specific purposes--like one for computers, another for supply, one for storage, another for exploration, etc.

The shuttle system, Haines explained, will deliver a module back to earth for re-equipping or other purposes.

One of the problems which

the space program must solve along with solar power is for an efficient ecological system. Waste from space craft and stations must be recycled back into original form for return to earth.

If the Shuttle is perfected by 1976 or 1977, then Haines believes the U.S. may have the Space Station by 1980--just 9 years away.

With the Space Station will come the space tug or space taxi that will move out in particular orbits from the station. Anticipated goal for Mars: somewhere in the 1980's, depending upon space program support.

"NO PERSON is really independent until he can go to bed any time he gets sleepy," goes a little quotation from a paper called The Liberal in Colquitt, Ga.

Now that has got to be true so far as it goes. It just does not go quite far enough.

No woman is truly independent until she can get up as late as she wakes up, too.

How independent a person of either sex is depends a lot on the point of view, of course.

No man is really independent until he has learned how to make himself a decent cup of coffee just in case his Sleeping Beauty refuses to hear the alarm or is out of town visiting her mama.

No woman is really independent until she can change the length and style of her hair without consulting anybody.

NO MAN is really independent until he can sit in his own house wearing his hat, that golf cap, or the dilapidated sweater if he wants to.

No woman is truly independent until she reaches the point when she can politely refuse an important invitation without being sick in bed.

No man is independent unless he can pre-empt the bathroom whenever he sees fit to shave.

No woman is independent until she can serve frozen vegetables, ready-to-bake pies, and even TV dinners when necessary or when the notion strikes her.

No man is independent if he can not vote as he pleases for or against any issue of any candidate. No woman is either.

But independence depends on the point of view. And if nobody cares what you do or when you do it, all that independence must be small comfort.

**Banquet To Feature Humorist, Musician**

Dan McBride of Dallas, guitar-strumming folk singer and Baptist preacher, will be guest entertainer for First Baptist church-wide sweetheart banquet Tuesday night in Civic House.
