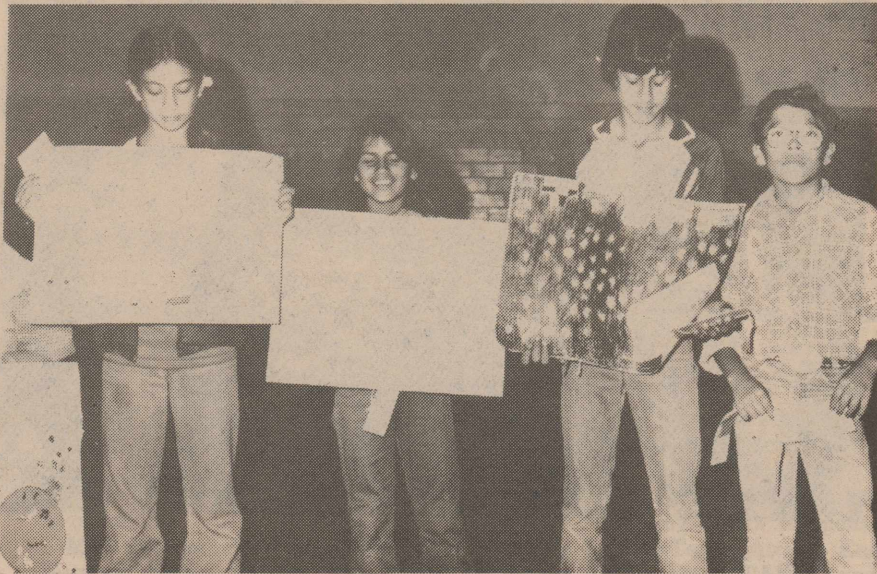


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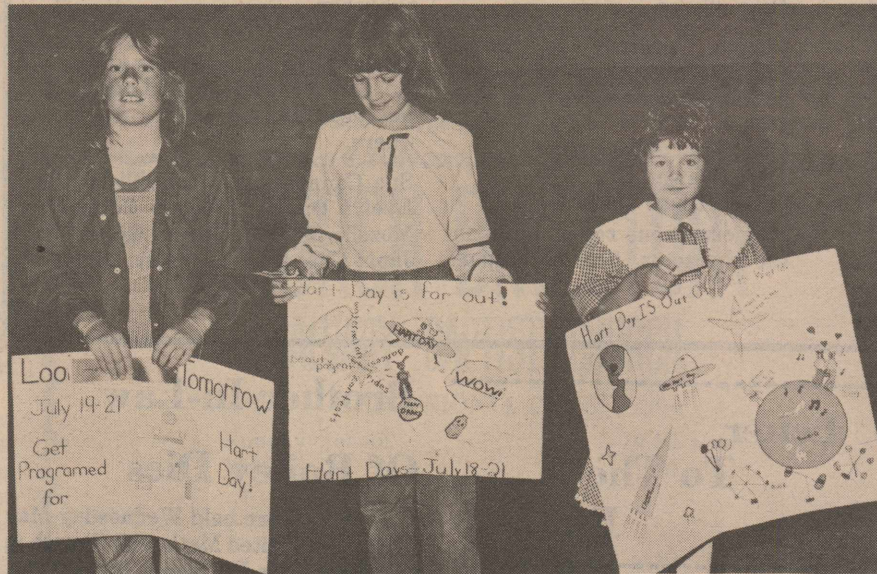

The Olton Ambulance emergency number is 285-2600.

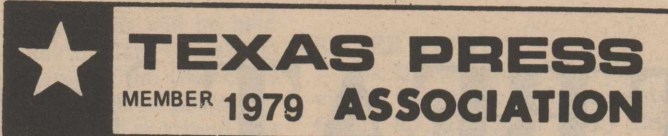
City Council Meeting Changed

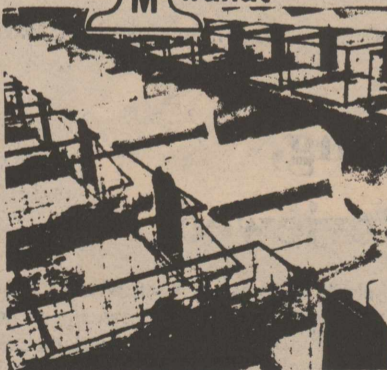

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New Postal Regulations Given Concerning Cards

"Use up your small and undersized envelopes and cards before July 15," Postmistress Sanders reminds customers. That is the date when the Postal Service's new size standards become effective.

The Hart Postmistress said that after July 15, envelopes and cards measuring less than three and a half inches high or five inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed.

Postmistress Sanders said that because the envelope and greeting card industries have had more than three years to prepare for the new

standards, few retailers should still be selling undersized pieces.

"Many consumers, however, are likely to still have smaller envelopes and cards in their supply of stationery," Mrs. Sanders said.

The regulations also prohibit flimsy cards. In the future they must be at least seven-thousandths (.007) of an inch thick. An official postal card, for instance, has a thickness of nine thousandths of an inch.

Undersized pieces and flimsy cards are being banned because they can become trapped in other mail, tear and jam processing machinery. As a result, the letters of others can also be damaged.

The standards also affect oversized and odd-shaped pieces of mail, Mrs. Sanders said. For first class mail weighing one ounce or less, there will be a surcharge of seven cents for pieces more than six and one-eighth inches high or 11 and a half inches long.

For more information, the Postmistress suggests customers check with a post office window clerk.

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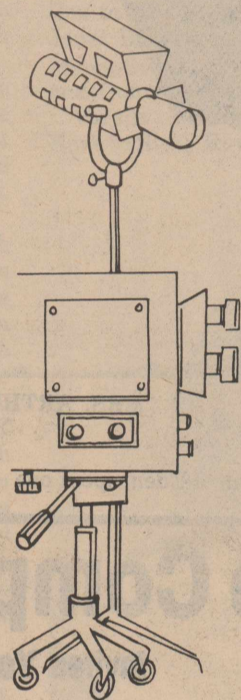

BROWNIE MOUNDS

Sift:
 3½ c sifted flour
 1 t baking powder
 ½ t salt
 Mix:
 ½ c oleo
 1½ c sugar
 Stir In:
 ½ c light corn syrup
 2 eggs
 Stir in flour-6 (1 oz) sq melted unsweetened chocolate

 1 ½ c nuts

Drop by heaping tablespoons onto greased baking sheet. Bake at 350° for 10 to 12 minutes.

PLUM CAKE

Sift 2 c flour, 1 t each; salt, cinnamon and ½ t soda together. Beat 3 eggs, 2 c sugar and 1 c cooking oil. Mix in 2 sm jars of baby food plums and 2 oz red food color. Alternate adding flour and egg mixture, beat until fluffy. Add 1 c pecans. Bake in bundt pan - 1 hour 20 minutes at 350°.

DROP SUGAR COOKIES

1¾ c sugar
 1 c shortening
 1 c buttermilk
 2 t soda, in a little water
 1 heaping t baking powder
 4 c flour
 1 t salt
 2 eggs
 1 t vanilla

Mix as you would cake batter. Drop by spoon on greased cookie sheet and sprinkle on a little sugar. Bake in a 350° oven.

MRS. DIRK'S CAKE

3 t lard (do not substitute)
 3 t cocoa
 1 c sugar
 2 eggs
 1 t soda
 1 t vanilla
 1 c buttermilk or sour milk
 1 c flour
 1 t cinnamon
 1 t allspice
 1 t cloves
 1 c raisins
 ½ c nuts

Put everything together and mix well. Add nuts and raisins. Pour in greased and floured 8x8 pan. Bake in 300° oven for 40 mins. (Double recipe for 13x9 pan.)

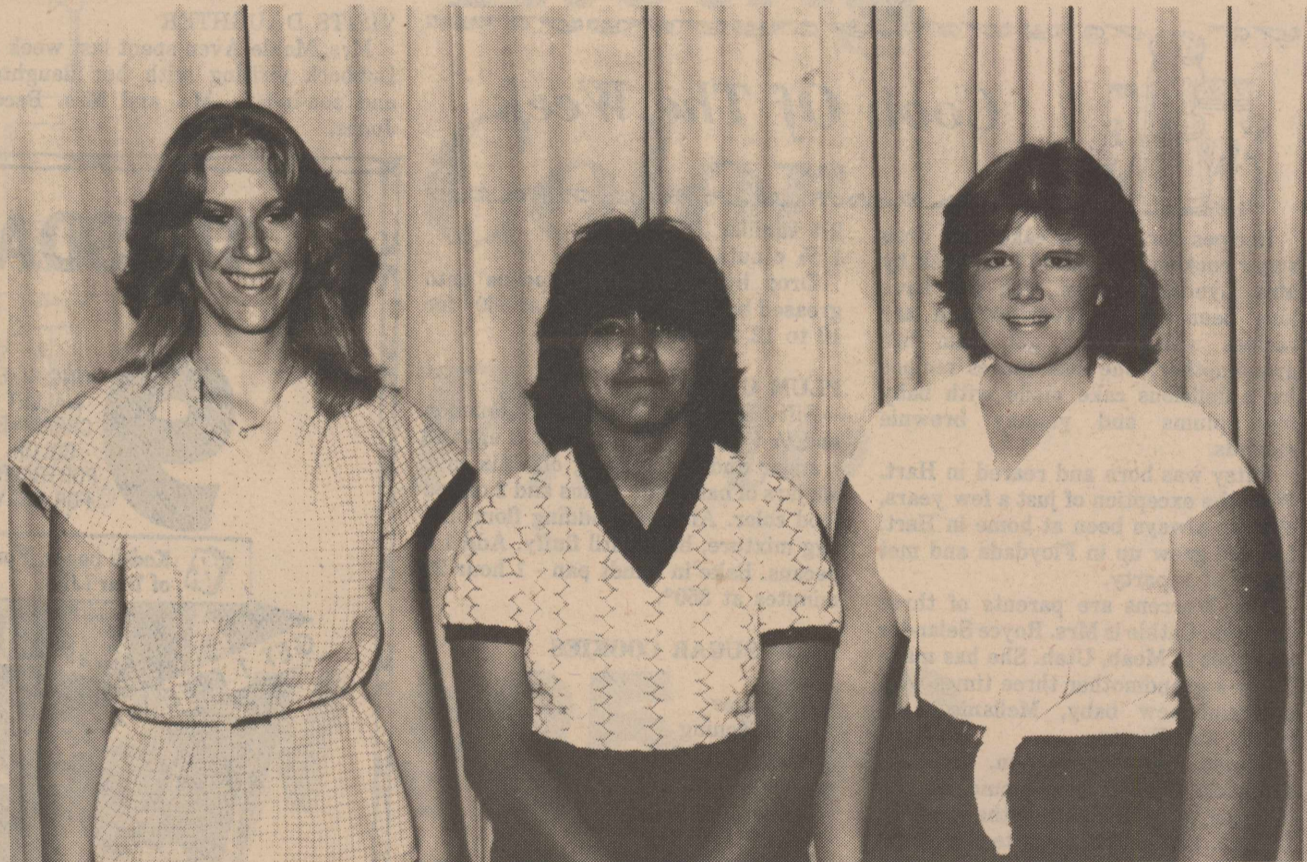

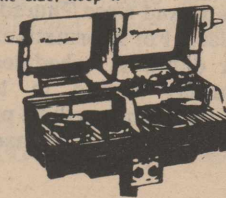
