School Athletic Fund Disbursements Shuffled

The Talco-Bogata school board voted in regular session Tuesday night not to incorporate the Athletic Fund into the General Operating Budget for this year due to problems of bookkeeping and auditing.

Funds will periodically be deposited into the Athletic Fund from the General Operating Fund to make up deficits, and all checks will be signed by the president and secretary of the school board.

Mrs. Neill Rozell expressed displeasure at the Athletic Fund Budget that was prepared and presented by superintendent Talmadge Morgan, because she said that it did not represent all the money spent on athletics in the school system and presented false impression of the actual cost of athletics.

Mrs. Frank Stubblefield presented a report to the school board on the new Home Economics Cooperative Education Program, in which 10 girls are employed in home economics related fields in the communities.

Four policy changes resulting from the change to the quarter system were approved at the meeting, which was attended for the first time by new board member, Marion Mitchell.

The board approved a number of proposals by Rivercrest principal Mike Vinyard, including a plan to tie in the agriculture building with the school public address system, and the building of a fence between the south bleachers at the football field and the parking lot. The ticket office would be built into the fence, so that spectators would park their cars first and then buy tickets for admission to the game. The new arrangement is expected to help with the traffic problems at the field. New and improved lighting for problem areas around the field were also approved.

Shelved for further study was a request for a killing pen for the meat lab in the agriculture building. A number of problems involved in the killing pen were discussed, including disposal of waste, odor, and board members suggested other solutions for providing meat for the lab.

Band director Walter Rich reported to the board that the band had started the year with 27 members, had grown to 35, and that the beginner band, composed of fifth and sixth grade students, has 60 members. Thirty of these members are from Talco, 30 from Bogata, 30 in the fifth grade and 30 in the sixth grade, Rich said. Twenty to 25 members will go into the high school band next year, and a 75 piece band may be a reality

at Rivercrest in a three year period.

Rich said that the Rivercrest all-girl chorus has 19 members, and is showing excellent progress. Approved by the board if the budget would allow for the music program was a new sound system including

public address, tape deck, and turntable; a Besseler tuba and a repair kit for instruments.

A crime prevention-drug education cooperative program was approved for the school system.

The board considered employment of a person to

assist students in crossing the highway at the Bogata Elementary School, and approval was given for superintendent Morgan to employ someone for \$3 a day, or approximately \$60 a month. Elementary school teachers will be responsible for the crosswalk in the afternoon.

Homecoming Set At Rivercrest

The tenth annual Homecoming of Rivercrest High School will be Friday and Saturday, October 10 and 11.

Saturday a banquet is scheduled at 7:30 p.m. at the Holiday Inn in Mount Pleasant, with a dance to follow at 9:00 p.m. at the National Guard Armory. All ex-homecoming queens from Talco, Bogata and

Rivercrest will be honored at the banquet. Banquet plates will be \$3.75, and advance reservations must be made for tickets.

Ex-student association dues are \$2.00 per student, and admission to the dance is \$5 per couple and \$3 per single.

Rebels Defeated By Mount Vernon 19-8

What has been apparent to everyone who has followed the Rebel football team all this year became apparent to a large number of home town fans last Friday night when Rivercrest came back in the last seconds of the fourth quarter and got on the scoreboards against the Mount Vernon Tigers. Rivercrest lost to Mount Vernon 19-8.

Rivercrest looked good on the field and in the statistics in the first quarter, gaining 104 yards on the ground and driving to the Mount Vernon 21 yard line before letting the ball go over on downs. Much of the yardage gained in the first quarter is credited to Milton Scales, who racked up 60 yards in one carry from the Rivercrest 15 to the Mount Vernon 25. Scales gained 93 of the Rebels' 102 total yards for the game. The Rebel offense ran 15 plays in the first quarter as opposed to eight for the Tigers.

The second quarter was dominated by the Tigers, however, who pushed to the Rebel five yard line and then fumbled in the end zone to Rebel Clyde Brown, and the Rebels took possession on their own 20 yard line. David Horn had to punt the Rebels out of trouble four plays later, and the half ended with the score still 0-0.

Part of the problem with the Rebel offense centered around quarterback Larry Taylor, who suffered an injury to his right hand and was severely hampered in his passing and ball handling. Taylor was in-

tercepted once in the first quarter and once in the second quarter. There were some outstanding defensive plays accomplished by the Rebels during the first half, including the recovery of a Tiger fumble by Randy Belcher, and the deflection of Tiger passes by Bill Montgomery, Randy Nolen and Sammy Ellis. Montgomery, Keith Mankins and Nolen put continuous pressure on the Mount Vernon Quarterback.

It was not until late in the third quarter that the Tigers managed to get on the scoreboards, even though they dominated the play and controlled the ball most of the period. A Tiger drive that began on the Mount Vernon 31 yard line was shut off on the Rivercrest 15 yard line with an incomplete pass, and the Rebels took the ball on downs.

Clyde Brown was caught behind the line of scrimmage and dropped for a 12 yard loss to the five, and Horn punted to the Rivercrest 32. Three plays later the Tigers scored from the three yard line. The extra point

Six Murders Near Clarksville Probed

State Editor CLARKSVILLE, Tex. — Within the past two years, four — and possibly six —

homocides have occurred within a radius of a few miles of Clarksville.

Five of those six deaths involved residents living between Clarksville and Avery. In addition, two former residents of the Bagwell community, west of Clarksville, were

murdered in Canton, a town about 75 miles southeast of Clarksville in early summer.

Up until Tuesday no arrests had been made in connection with the six confirmed homocides. Earlier this week County Sheriff M. E. McGuire and Deputy Bobby Yarbrough arrested an illegal alien in Waxahachie in connection with the death of Alejandro de Leon who was found dead about a month ago near Detroit.

McGuire said Friday a warrant had also been issued for another illegal alien in connection with the Mexican's death.

"Our case is not too good against the one we've got right now until we get the other one," McGuire said. "We're afraid he might get into Mexico and if he does, we'll never get him."

McGuire said an autopsy had not been received on de Leon's body which was sent to Dallas.

"We've got the pathologists' opinion back but nothing official," the sheriff said. "I don't know what is taking them so long."

"Their opinion said de Leon was strangled but we just haven't got anything official," he added.

McGuire said de Leon and the men suspected of killing him were Mexicans illegally in this country.

"We think they took off after they killed him and stopped off in Waxahachie. We got a tip where they were but one had already taken off by the time

we got down there with a warrant," McGuire stated.

The sheriff said no new leads had been turned up in connection with the other recent homocides in Red River County and two men killed in Canton in Van Zandt County.

"The sheriff down there (Van Zandt County) and a Texas Ranger are handling that one and were supposed to keep in touch but I haven't heard any more from them," McGuire said.

He added that the department had some "strong suspects" in connection with one of the other homocides but "nothing definite enough where we could issue some warrants."

Except for de Leon, the other homocides have occurred in an area just to the north and east of Clarksville about eight miles near the White Rock community.

The first of the confirmed homocides occurred Dec. 22, 1974, when Lena Smith, 75, was apparently robbed then shot to death.

She was found Christmas morning with two .22 caliber slugs in the head; her purse and money were never recovered.

Leading officers to believe robbery was the motive.

The next victim was Harvey Goodwin, 19, who was found Feb. 17 at the Old Concord Baptist Church about three-fourths of a mile from the Smith home. Goodwin had been shot five times, also with a .22

Jury Returns No Bill, Be Back October 16

The Red River County Grand Jury will possibly reconvene Thursday, October 16, according to Pat Beadle, Jr., county attorney. The jury recessed subject to recall, but this date was suggested as possible for the next meeting.

The Grand Jury, meeting Monday, October 6, no billed Moses Martinez, a Mexican national who is in this county illegally. Martinez was arrested in Waxahachie on a warrant issued by Detroit justice of the peace, Claude Smith, and brought to Red River County jail by the sheriff's department in connection with the death of Alejandro deLeon, another

Mexican national whose badly decomposed body was found about a month ago in the north part of Red River County. Martinez was to be detained until immigration authorities arrive.

Beadle said there were no other special matters proposed and the Martinez indictment was the only one he brought before the jury.

4-H Week Set For October 5-11

4-H boys and girls throughout Texas and the nation will join in a salute to America's Bicentennial celebration during National 4-H Week. It's a special time when 4-H is recognized for its contributions to the growth and development of youth.

It is administered by the Cooperative Extension Service, and Extension professionals play training and assisting volunteer leaders who help with local 4-H activities.

Some 7.2 million youth between the ages of 9 and 19 are currently enrolled in 4-H, with more than 215,000 of these in Texas. More than 21,000 volunteer adult and youth leaders assist with local 4-H programs in the state.

Although the majority of 4-H members still live on farms and in rural communities, 24 percent now come from larger urban and suburban areas. Well over half the Texas 4-H's live on farms or in towns of under 10,000 population.

Texas 4-H's participate in more than 60 educational project areas, with the most popular being food and nutrition, clothing and textiles, and horses and ponies.

Since its beginning around the turn of the century, 4-H has offered practical learning and citizenship experiences to millions of young people.

Also, over-the-counter fashion fabrics and inner fabrics offer homesewers the same quality and type of fabric available to ready-to-wear manufacturers.

Today's woman can sew faster and easier than ever by using clever, quick, and easy techniques, along with new notions, tools and sewing aids—such as fusible products—which eliminate many steps toward garment completion.

Turning again to the "economics" of homesewing, making garments at home can save 60-70 per cent or more, when compared to purchasing ready made. Also fabric quality and workmanship are better and lower priced than similar-quality ready to wear.

Other frequently-mentioned motivations for sewing are better fit, a creative expression, individuality in coordinating style, fabric, and trim or designing ones own garment, and productive use of leisure time.

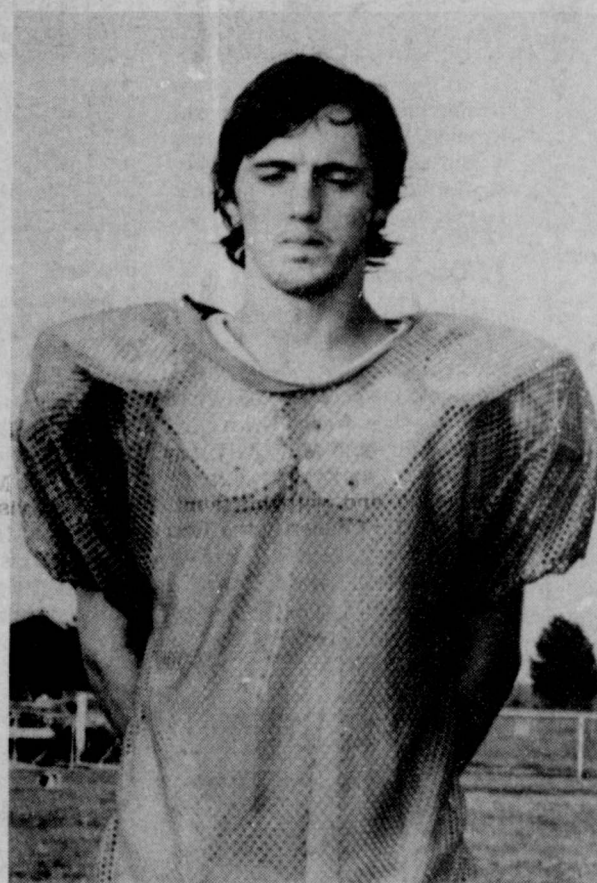

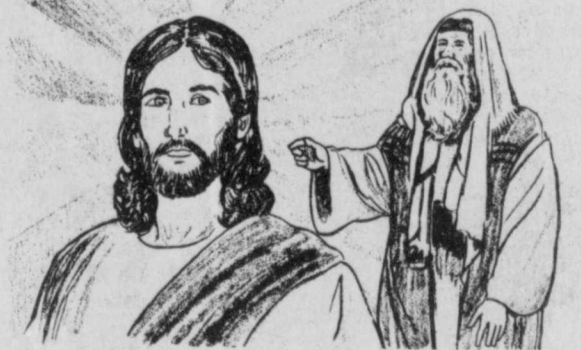

Terrariums And House Plants Course Set PJC

Continued From Page 1 in those two old people," McDonough stated.

"But, at the time there was no reason to think otherwise. The bodies were found in the kitchen and the bedroom and were burned beyond recognition.

"I just guessed which was which because of where they were found in the house. One body was by the stove in the kitchen and the other in the bedroom. I assumed the woman had got up to light the stove and that's where the fire started.

"There was only about two and one-half to three feet of the bodies left. We figured the house burned when the stove exploded but now I can't be sure that's the way it happened at all."

McDonough said all he was waiting for was "someone to get their foot in the door" before he would order the bodies exhumed and autopsies conducted.

"All the evidence pointed to a tragedy but since the other murders, it's possible those old people could have been murdered and then their house burned to cover it up," he said.

Excluding the Runels boy, who disappeared while on a shopping trip to Clarksville with his mother, McDonough said there was a definite pattern of brutality in the murders of Goodwin, Mrs. Smith, Brown and Hastings.

"After the Smith woman was shot, someone took her and literally threw her or stuffed her in a window like you would a rag," McDonough said.

"There was also a footprint on the window screen that was kicked in that indicated the person that killed her wore a size 11 or 12 shoe. I know that because there was mud on the screen left by the foot when the screen on the window was kicked in.

"And then there's the Goodwin boy. One of the shots in the back could have been fatal and the two in the head were just to make sure.

"I knew Hastings as well as anyone did and he got into a lot of trouble but never enough to make any enemies mad enough to kill him. I didn't know Brown that well, but he and Hastings were pretty much alike.

"People tell me their heads were smashed in pretty good. Hastings and another fellow were in jail for being drunk and when they got out he and Brown left for Canton. They were found dead the next morning."

McDonough said if and when someone is charged with any of the homicides whether or not they confess to having something to do with the deaths of the elderly couple in the fire would determine if he orders their bodies exhumed.

"A fellow won't get any more or less if he admits to killing one or five," McDonough said. "If the person charged admits to having something to do with their death or even if they don't, I'll order the bodies exhumed and autopsies conducted.

"Until then, there's not much I can do as JP and coroner," McDonough added.

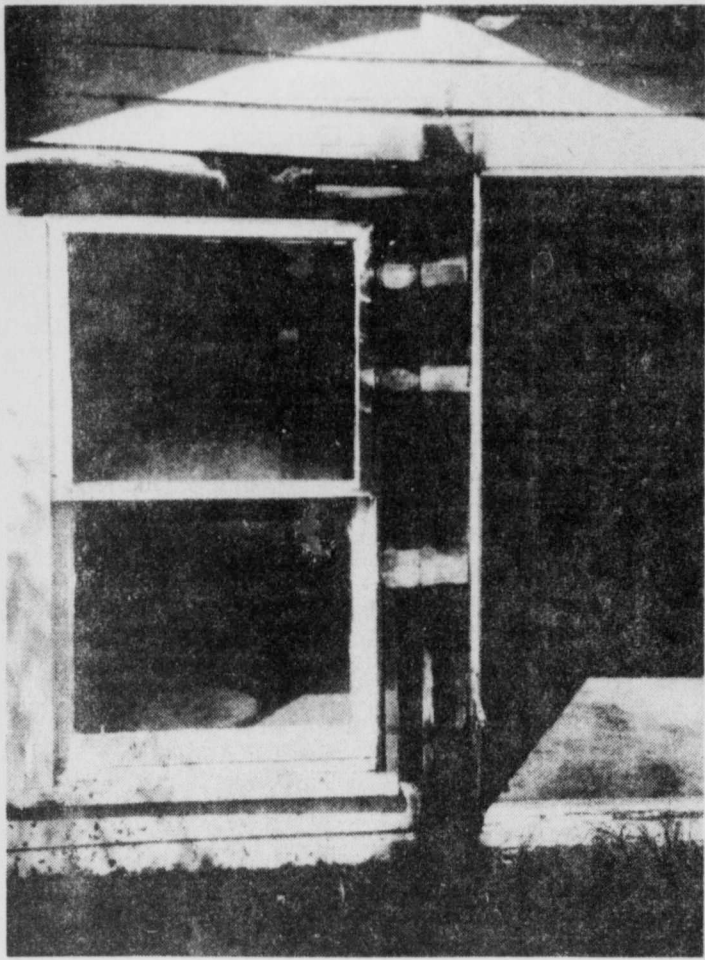

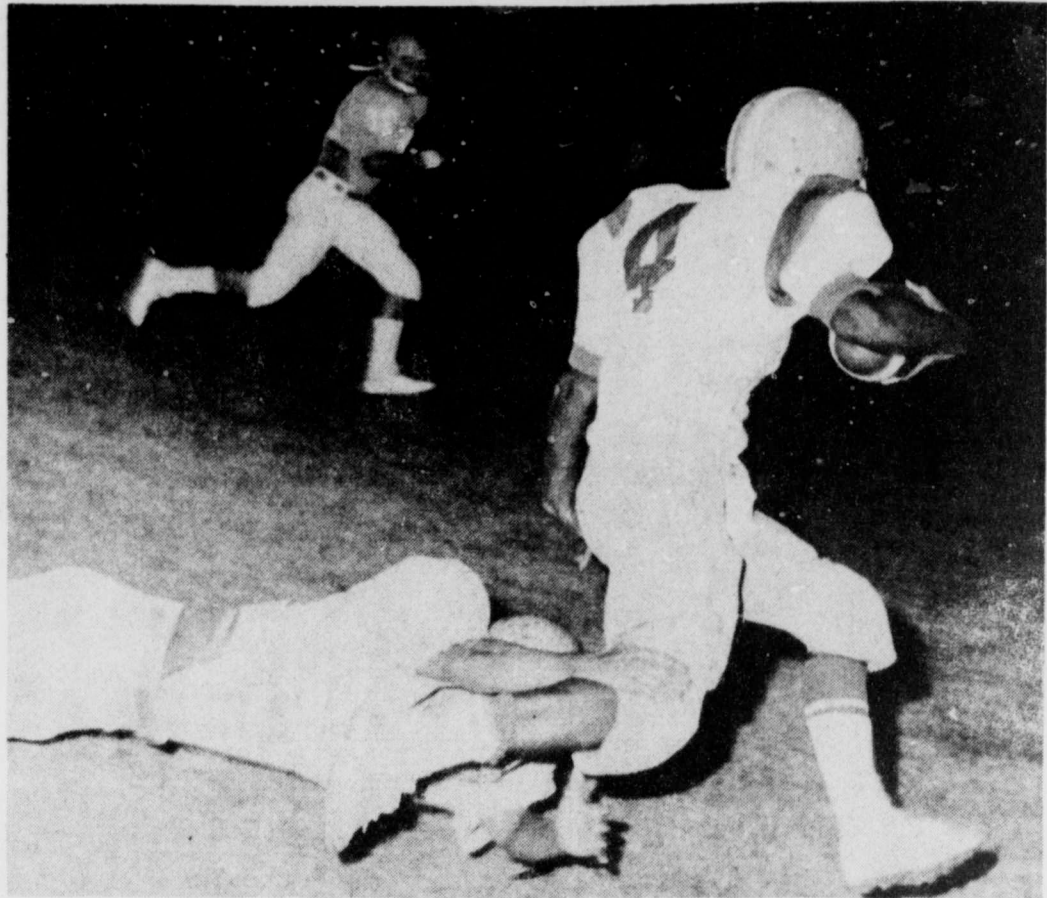

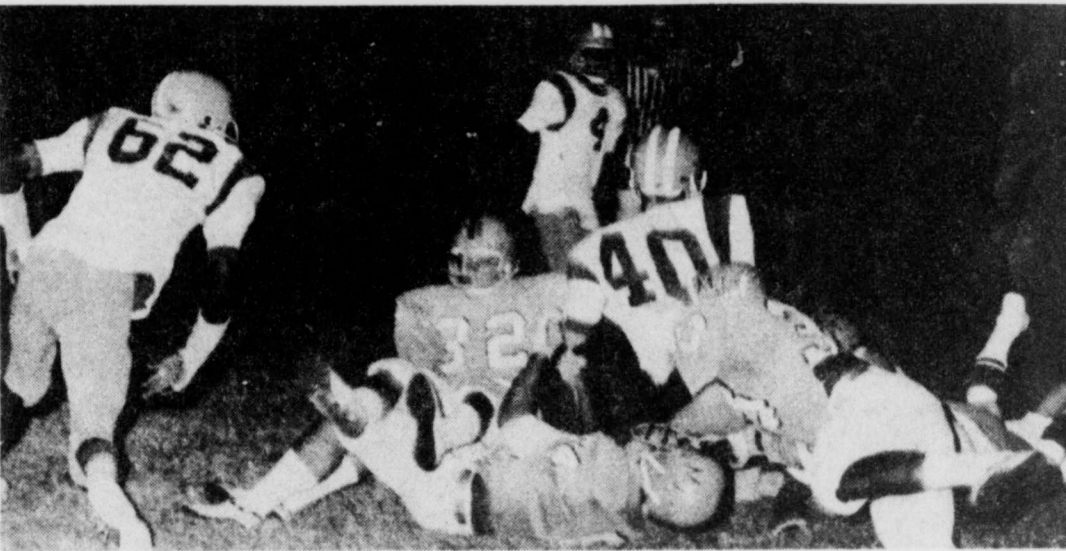
