COMMISSIONER'S COURT PASSES MANY ORDERS.

The Court met Monday of last week and spent a very busy day with routine matters and the passing of orders enumerated below. The following two days were also busy ones, as the Court was sitting as a board of equalization, and went over all the assessments of Tax Assessor Bissett, for the present year. Very few changes were made; in fact, no changes of any consequence were made, showing that the work of the present tax assessor was found very satisfactory to the Board.

The Wolf Scalp Bounty order of \$25 on grown wolves was extended until such time as the Court decided to revoke the order, while the bounty of \$10 on puppies was extended 3 months. Bob Crisp was allowed \$10 per month until the order is revoked, while Mrs. N. L. Gentry was allowed one more month's pay of \$10.

The quarterly reports of County Treasurer J. A. Browning and Justice of the Peace Howell Wright, were examined and approved.

Oscar Pears was appointed Justice of the Peace of Precinct No. 6, which includes the town of London. This is the first time this or any other, except Precinct No. 1, has had a Justice of the Peace for several years.

On account of the crowded condition of the Clerk's office, and of the inadequate size of the vault now used by the Clerk, it was decided that the Clerk's office would be changed to that now occupied by the tax assessor, at the northeast corner of the Court House, and that the tax assessor's office be moved to that now occupied by the clerk. The partition between the vaults will be taken out and the present entrance to the clerk's office closed with rock, and a new vault for the tax assessor's records provided. The north entrance to the Court House will be permanently closed and the hall between the northeast and northwest rooms will be cut off with a partition and be used as a part of the clerk's office. These changes will give the clerk almost twice the present office space as well as twice the vault space. Work was started on these changes Tuesday of this week.

The expenses of the county for the year were carefully considered and the tax rate for the year set as follows: County Adv 25c; Road and Bridge, 15c; Court House and Jail, 5c; Jury, 7c; County Road Bond, 30c; Precinct No. 1 Road Bond, 12c; Junction District No. 1, School Bond, 25c; London-Red Creek, District No. 4 School Bond, 25c. It is the order of the Court

65-PIECE BALLINGER BAND COMING HERE.

Emil A. Loeffler received a telephone message Wednesday morning from J. D. Motley, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce of Ballinger, stating that the fine 65-piece band of that city was looking for a place to spend a week's vacation and that if arrangements could be made to take care of them, he would insist that they come here instead of going to Amarillo as they had previously planned.

Mr. Loeffler told them to come on; that a suitable place would be secured for them to camp, so in the second conversation with Mr. Motley, he stated that they would leave Ballinger Sunday, arriving here the same day for a week's stay.

There will be about one hundred in the party, and it's up to Junction to leave nothing undone for their entertainment and convenience while here. It is quite an honor to have such an organization, and let's make them enjoy the visit far more than they expect to.

That the Supervisor of Commissioner's Precinct No. 1 remove or cause to be removed all obstruction on and along the old roadbed, known as the Junction and Kerrville road, beginning at a point near the southwest corner of the Schreiner Park, thence north to the northwest corner of the Schreiner Park thence in an easterly direction following the old roadbed as it existed in the fall of 1925, to where said roadbed crossed the N. Llano River, thence in a northeasterly direction, following the old roadbed as it existed in 1915, crossing the Main Llano at the old crossing, thence in an easterly direction to the point where the old road intersects the new road from Junction to Kerrville, and known as the Old Spanish Trail. It being the intention of this order to have removed all fences, posts, and wire on and along said right of way as it existed in 1915, and the Clerk is hereby instructed to mail a copy of this order to all interested.

NEW VOTING PRECINCT ESTABLISHED BY COURT

At the meeting of the Commissioners' Court last week, a new voting precinct was created for the Roosevelt country, and the voting will be done in the Roosevelt school house. The new precinct is taken from the Copperas Precinct, and extends down the river to the old Winkler place on the north bank and to the J. F. Ragsdale place of the south bank of the river, extending west and southwest to the southwest corner of the county.

This will be a great convenience to the people of the Roosevelt community, as it was done after a petition bearing the names of practically every voter in the newly created area. The precinct will be known as Voting Precinct No. 10.

A change was made in the Gentry and Segovia precincts, in which the lands of King Fisher, Mrs. Anna Dechert and Westervelt were taken out of the Segovia precinct and placed in Gentry. Residents on these places have been voting at Gentry as their lands were on the precinct line and the change was made at their request.

CHARTER GRANTED TO JUNCTION HOTEL CO.

A charter for Junction's newest business enterprise was received the first of the week from the Secretary of State at Austin, which makes the Hotel organization a reality.

G. W. Fry, Coke R. Stevenson, J. A. Heyman and Emil A. Loeffler are the temporary directors, who will serve until the meeting of the stockholders, which will be soon, when a board of directors will be selected to serve as in the case of all similar corporations.

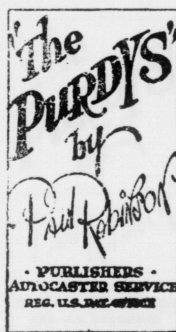
Several of those whose names appeared on the original subscription list have not paid in, but enough money has been subscribed and paid to assure the success of the enterprise, even though it will be necessary to cut down the size from that originally planned. In order to provide a means of increasing the size of the hotel, a considerable amount of stock has been subscribed by two or three of the original stockholders, which will be in a way, treasury stock, and it is hoped that this stock can be disposed of and the original plans as to size carried out.

Any one wishing to aid in this worthy enterprise for the progress of the community, and at the same time be able to feel that the investment is a safe one, can procure stock in the company. If you can't take but one or a few shares, every little helps, and a large number of small shares will materially assist in erecting the size of hotel that will be a credit to the town and one of our biggest drawing cards.

A copy of the plans and specifications have been received from the architect, Adams & Adams, of San Antonio. W. E. Simpson & Company will be supervising engineers and bids have been advertised for and will be opened in about two weeks. The bids for the West Texas Utilities Company office building will be opened at the same time and it is expected that the same contractor will get both jobs and thus be able to effect a saving on both structures.

The list of hotel stockholders will be published after the stock certificates are issued, which will be within the next few days, as the certificates and seal should be received by the last of this week.

THE TEST OF GENIUS

Marion Talley, a 19-year-old girl of Kansas City, has risen suddenly from obscurity to a stellar role in the music world, for her wonderful voice has been recognized and she has been honored by tremendous audiences in the Metropolitan Opera House of New York City. Her meteoric career is without precedent in musical history.

A prima donna for the last 48 years in both Europe and America, whose success had not been so meteoric, but which came after years of toil and patience, suffering and disappointment, Mme. Schumann-Heink, herself 64 years old and the mother of eight children, yet still the most wonderful singer in the world, has pleaded for the youthful and gifted fellow-artist against the day of a possible reaction by an over-enthusiastic public, by echoing the plaint of Chaucer:

"The life so short, the crafts so long to learn," offering a little motherly advice in the proud moment of Miss Talley's success by a suggestion to labor and to wait. Heralded by unprecedented publicity, although the youngest coloratura soprano, and although received with the greatest demonstrations of public interest ever shown in the operatic world, this youngest prima donna has already felt the targets of a vigorous condemnation of her claim to artistic merit, the public claiming genius, the critics claiming inadequacy.

It is the belief of Mrs. Schumann-Heink that Miss Talley will sing better when she has lived more; when she has experienced love and marriage; has drunk deeper of the cup of

joy and sorrow; has felt life's responsibilities and borne its burdens.

The San Antonio Evening News thinks that, beautiful as is her voice now, it lacks the quality which it will have then. That is another way of saying that life and art are so closely interwoven that it is impossible to separate one from the other. The soft voice, which is "an excellent thing in woman," is not the voice of the intellect, but of the soul, the soul that speaks or sings only through "labor and sorrow."

DO FIGURES LIE?

One statistician explains the coming results in the governor's race as follows: "Ma" will receive her usual 170,000 votes; Lynch Davidson will bring along his 280,000 votes; Dan Moody will have around 215,000 labor and enthusiasts who will stick to him to the last. 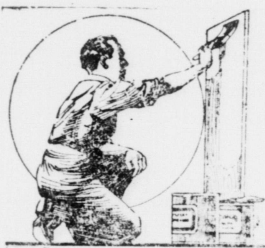

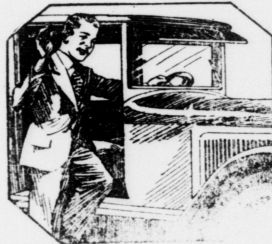

FORCED TO IT.

Shortly after the lights went off Tuesday night, one of the prominent stockholders of the Llano River Irrigation & Milling Co., telephoned The Eagle office, presumably to "rub it in" on the editor, because the lights were off and because we had been one of a very large majority in the town that wanted the light service improved.

Mrs. Perry answered the phone, but without announcing who she was, was showered with a lot of questions about the lights, all in a very abrupt and discourteous manner, quite unbecoming any gentleman.

He couldn't understand why the lights were off, but was met with the statement that one night wasn't as bad as a week. It would not seem right to get uninterrupted service from a new concern, whose system is not nearly completed in the town, after the kind of service we have had from a concern that had been in business here many years.

This man also stated that his bill was twice as much as formerly, and in this connection we would like to ask, "how much is twice as much as nothing?"

If this writer had been in the office, he would have been glad to inform the questioner that during the first month that the West Texas Utilities were here, our bill was 25 per cent lower than when "his" company was running it, and also that when we got the bill we could tell what we were charged with—it was not one of these "U.O. Me So Much" kind. We would also like to inform him that during the first month that we took power for operating our machinery, we never lost 15 minutes time on account of bad current, while previous to that time, under the old concern, there was rarely a day, and never a week, that we did not lose considerable time from weak current, or when it was cut off entirely. Our conservatively estimated losses from bad current amounted to an average of about \$20 per month.

We could have also told him why we put in our own water system. On one occasion our kindling pile caught fire and burned entirely up while we were standing near it with a hose connected to the city line, which did not furnish enough pressure to throw the water eight feet, and a very, very small stream that far.

We also have on file in our office a statement from the State Board of Health, regarding a sample of the city water that the Department had analyzed, and we will be glad to show this to this man, or any interested party, and we would like to ask him about that, too.

We could have also asked him what was wrong with the telephone system that he is also heavily interested in. At that time efforts were being made to get connection with Menard and the ladies at the switch board were doing everything possible to make the connection, but the West Texas Utilities men who were trying to learn the trouble, tell me that it was 10:30 before they were able to talk to Menard (about three hours after placing the call), and then were not able to get direct connection, but had to try through several other exchanges.

And there are a lot of other things we could have asked and may ask later.

The plasterers of Dallas, who were earning only \$13 a day, have gone out on a strike. They say they must have \$14 a day

or not a lick of work will they do. When poor laboring men are ground under the heels of capital until they can't get more than \$13 for eight hours work, what is the country coming to? —Boerne Star.

This is a natural result of a condition that exists in the minds of the boys throughout the country. When they have dropped out of school along about the 8th grade because their studies are taking them off the streets too much, or even in many cases where they graduate from High Schools and colleges, there is a burning desire to get through a short run business college and get a white collar job. Just as long as the vast majority want these white collar jobs, shunning trades that require a few years of close application, just that long will we find clerical workers drawing (and willing to work for) low wages, rather than do real work for real pay) \$40 to \$75 per month, when the trades whose ranks are comparatively small in numbers, will draw good wages, because they perform work that is an everyday necessity.

Representatives of one of the largest independent telephone concerns in the State were here last week looking over the local telephone plant and taking an inventory of same with a view probable negotiations for the local exchange after the figures are compiled and the matter put before the concern's management.

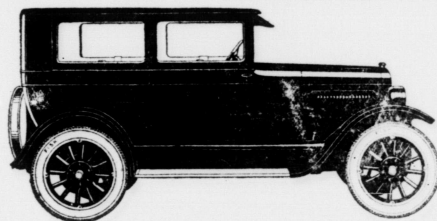

TOURIST CAMP OWNERS MAKE IMPROVEMENTS.

The recently formed Texas Camp and Park Owners' Association, whose headquarters are located in San Antonio, has been making rapid strides during its short existence, reports T. A. Keene, secretary-treasurer of the organization.

During the past two weeks camps from all over the Southwest have been sending in for information and quite a number of new tourist camps have become aligned with the association. The activities of the organization are not confined to Texas alone, but to surrounding states as well, with New Mexico well represented.

The association went on record at a meeting held here several weeks ago against the general run of free tourist parks as now exist in some sections of the State. The better class of motorists do not care to stop over in many of the free camps and would far rather sign their names on the registers of the up-to-date camps with cottages.

Mr. Keene believes that all free camps should be abolished and a uniform charge of at least 50 cents per car be taxed all visitors or guests at the various camps for open camping. A charge of from \$1 and up should be imposed on cottages, depending upon their facilities and accommodations obtained at the various camps.

Too many "motor tramps" or "Weary Willies," as they were formerly known, have taken to the highways in flivvers and it is common sight to find several of them in almost every free camp. Too many squatters take advantage of the hospitality of the cities and towns offering free camps to "tourists." The squatter, the fellow who carries along an entire family and sometimes two families and several extra children and who works a week or so in each town, lives in the free camp and thereby avoid paying room rent. He is an undesirable citizen and the abolishment of the free camps will see this class of "tourist" cast into the discard.

The Camp and Park Owners' Association approves the plan of several towns now planning the opening of pay camps. The privately owned camp, fully equipped, is in a position to bat undesirable citizens, but the town offering free camping space finds itself in a different position with regards to saying who shall or shall not stay with them.

Charge for camping space and give the motorist some accommodations, instead of just a mere place to stop for the night, is the plan suggested by Mr. Keene.—San Antonio Express.

THREE HORNS TO THIS DILEMMA.

Our estimable journalistic friend, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, has again laboriously undertaken to show to its readers that "Dan's the man" by repeating all the vituperative charges that could be remembered against Jim Ferguson, our Fort Worth contemporary concludes a long editorial discussion of Mr. Ferguson's Sulphur Springs speech with the declaration that "There is but one issue in the campaign now, but one question for the voters to decide. Ferguson has made the issue. The voters must decide whether they want a return of the Fergusons to power, with all that means, or they want Dan Moody as Governor. All other questions and all other candidates are side issues." We have frequently found ourselves in agreement with the Star-Telegram, and now agree with it in most of its charges against Mr. Ferguson; but we cannot agree with its conclusions as to the present gubernatorial campaign.

The Bulletin, and a number of its readers, are not willing to permit Ferguson to make the issue governing the selection of the next Governor of Texas. We are not willing to agree that we must elect Moody in order to avoid electing Ferguson. It occurs to us that there is another way in which the defeat of the Ferguson regime may be accomplished, a way which does not involve the election of Mr. Moody. We are not willing to agree that because Ferguson is bad, Moody, who has shown the State evidences of some of his badness, is good enough to be the next Governor. We are not willing to vote solely in protest against the present administration, and do not think it will be necessary. We prefer to vote for a candidate, with the heavy emphasis upon "for" rather than to debase our privilege of the franchise merely to register a protest against a man. It all depends upon the viewpoint.

As we pointed out several days ago, The Bulletin has no especial objection to Mr. Moody. We have admired him, and have repeatedly voiced approval of his work as a public official. But, brilliant as he may be, honest as he undoubtedly is, sincere and earnest and eager as he has shown himself to be, it is not the duty of the people to elect him to office when another candidate is equally brilliant, equally sincere and honest, equally earnest and eager, and is in addition an older, more experienced, more settled, more successful business man, lacking Mr. Moody's dangerous impulsiveness and possessing administrative skill that Mr. Moody can not possibly attain except at the cost of many years of practical experience.

We do not agree with our friend, the Star-Telegram, therefore, that Ferguson has

made the issue, because we are not willing to permit Ferguson to make issues for us. We do not agree that we must elect either Ferguson or Moody, because it is our purpose to elect Lynch Davidson. We do not agree that Mr. Moody is the only honest and capable and probably successful candidate; for we believe that Lynch Davidson is equally honest, more capable and more probably successful than Moody. If this is not sound reasoning, why did the Star-Telegram carefully avoid any discussion of Mr. Moody's fatal blunder in accepting Ferguson's challenge to resign office as a wager on the outcome of the first primary? Does the Star-Telegram think that the people can be compelled to vote for Mr. Moody against their will?—Brownwood Bulletin.

FAKE TREE DOCTOR.

We have this day received a telegram from one of the largest Chambers of Commerce in West Texas advising that a certain party is going over West Texas representing himself as being a representative of a large concern in Dallas which makes a specialty of doctoring trees. Our information is that this party does not represent this Dallas concern, and that where he has been he has killed many trees rather than helping the trees. Our suggestion is that if any party comes to see you with reference to tree work that you thoroughly investigate before making any deal with him.

Also, advise your people thru the local press to be careful in dealing with any tree doctors.

ORDER ESTABLISHING ROOSEVELT ELECTION PRECINCT NO. 18, KIMBLE COUNTY, TEXAS

Be it remembered that on this, the 21th day of May, A. D. 1926, came on to be before me, the undersigned, J. R. Hodges, Clerk of Kimble County, Texas, 43 other qualified resident voters of Kimble County, Texas, to establish Roosevelt Voting Precinct No. 18, for said county, and it appearing to the Court that the convenience of said voters would be better served by the establishment of said voting precinct, and it further appearing that the existing place for said voters where it is now located, is not a practical meeting place and causes great inconvenience to the petitioners herein in exercising their civic rights by reason of its location; therefore it is ordered, adjudged and decreed by the Commissioners' Court of Kimble County, Texas, that said voting precinct be and is hereby established with metes and bounds, as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at the Southwest corner of the County of Kimble, the Southeast corner of the County of Sutton; thence in the north-easterly direction following the division line between this precinct and Commissioners' Precinct No. 1, to where this division line crosses the east boundary line of survey No. 5, Certificate No. 1779, T. C. Ry. Co., thence north to the east boundary line of survey No. 3, T. C. Ry. Co., survey No. 4, T. C. Ry. Co., survey No. 173 Certificate No. 271, G. C. & S. F. Ry. Co. survey No. 19, Certificate No. 1296, G. H. & S. A. Ry. Co., survey No. 12, G. H. & S. A. Ry. Co., survey No. 5, G. H. & S. A. Ry. Co., to the north-east corner said survey No. 5; thence west to the northeast corner of survey No. 6, G. H. & S. A. Ry. Co., survey No. 6, G. H. & S. A. Ry. Co., thence north to the north-east corner of survey No. 4, Certificate No. 1213, G. H. & S. A. Ry. Co., Block E; thence north to the northeast corner of said survey No. 5; thence west along the north boundary line of said survey No. 5, to the southeast corner of survey No. 9, Certificate No. 1225, G. H. & S. A. Ry. Co., Block E; thence following the division line between this precinct and the Murr Voting Precinct No. 9, in the boundary line between the Counties of Sutton and Kimble; thence south following said boundary line to the place of beginning.

That said Precinct shall be known as the Roosevelt Voting Precinct No. 18, and that all elections held in said voting precinct shall be at the School House located in the town of Roosevelt, and being the school house now used by Common School District No. 17, of said county.
