## I. T. I. O. Is Now Leasing Big Block For Oil Test

### Births Outnumber Deaths in the County For 1939

#### Blessed Events Gain Over The Last Check-up

Thirty-Deaths Denotes Increase Over 1939 Record

Seventy births were recorded in Ochiltree County during the year 1939, a check of the birth records revealed this week. This number of new residents compares with a 1938 total of 66. Deaths were on an increase with 31 recorded as compared with 23 in 1938. Births exceeded the deaths 40.

One set of twins was born during the year, and the largest number of births reported for a single month was in October, with thirteen being recorded only one birth was placed on record.

#### Utility Meters Show Big Gain

Perryton is growing according to every check that can be made. A comparison of utility customers in Perryton during 1939 with the 1938 total shows a decided increase in every service: electricity, natural gas, water and telephone.

A check of the meter connections for electric consumers of the Community Public Service Co. shows 744 connections for 1939, an increase of 37 customers over the 615 during 1938.

The Southwest Telephone Co. now has 421 telephone installations, an increase of 27 phones over 1938. The water department of the City of Perryton also registered a similar increase, having 633 customers, 18 more than they had in 1938. The Public Service Corporation, natural gas utility, had 580 connections in 1939, an increase of 41 over the 1938 figure of 539.

#### County Buys Four Plows To Clear Roads

Ochiltree county has purchased four snow plows to be used throughout the county in an effort to keep the roads open during the winter. Three of the plows have arrived and are being unloaded and will be put to use immediately. These large plows fasten to the front of the County road maintainers and push the snow from the roads.

The County Commissioners announced Wednesday that the first work with the plows would be to clear the snow from the routes traveled by the school buses and mail carriers. The snow will be pushed from other roads as speedily as possible, but it will take considerable time.

During the past month of snow and bad roads, many days the school buses were unable to travel their routes and get the children to school. Rural mailcarriers have encountered many difficulties in attempting to get over the snow-bound roads.

#### Many Stranded by Saturday's Storm

Several persons in this area were caught in Saturday's snow storm, which started early Saturday and gathered momentum as the day advanced. Harold Klink, flying his plane equipped with skis, located Flowers and Huston and returned them to Perryton Sunday.

He reached his farm, but the snow had blown until he could not get over the roads. Saturday evening, after the storm abated, he rode horseback to C. R. Cudd's and attempted to phone home. He spent the night in the Cudd home.

Ray Huston was hauling a load of oil and stuck his truck in snow near the Blue Mound school and had to spend the night. Marvin Coburn, who carries the mail northwest of Perryton, was stalled in a snowdrift near the J. E. Johnson home, where he spent the night. Mr. Coburn walked to Perryton Sunday.

#### Perryton Postal Receipts

According to figures just released by Postmaster M. R. Coffee, the receipts for 1939 were \$15,196.56, an increase of \$481.28 over the 1938 total of \$14,715.28.

### Major Companies Assembling Block in Northwest Part of County for Wildcat Oil Test

Ochiltree county will have another deep well oil test going down within a short time provided the land owners in the block being assembled by the Indian Territory Illuminating Oil Company cooperate in leasing the land solid in the block desired by the oil company. Lease agents for the I. T. I. O. have secured leases practically one hundred percent from resident land owners in the block.

#### JUST HERE and THERE

Too much importance cannot be stressed on the importance of the cooperation of all land owners, both resident and non-resident, in the leasing of lands to the major oil company now assembling a block of land in Ochiltree county for a deep oil test. The company must have a solid block if they put down this test hole at the outlay of thousands of dollars.

They are not unreasonable in their position. They are not asking for such a large block and the lease money, though only 25c per acre amounts to \$166 for a section and where is the Ochiltree county owner of a section that can't use that much money? If you have not leased your land, then you are standing in the way of a development that could mean much to the future of Ochiltree county and the value of your land holdings.

Do you know that the I. T. I. O. has been spending \$290 a day in Perryton for the last six months in the operation of the core drilling crews that have been working this field. Figure it up: \$6,000 per month or about \$36,000 for the last six months. Not a small amount of outside money to come into an agricultural income community.

The Perryton community is losing a mighty good civic worker in Jess Woodward who is going to Ellsworth, Kansas. Jess has been in the front in every movement for advancement of this town and country. As a member of the school board, as a director and president of the Chamber of Commerce, he's made a real hand. Jess, we wish you the best of luck and commend you most highly to your new neighborhood.

W. F. Haggard, who has been in charge of the commercial work in the Perryton High School, has accepted a position as head of the commercial department in McMurry College, Abilene, Texas. Mr. Haggard has been with the Perryton school system for ten years and will be greatly missed in the community life of Perryton, as well as the school. The block being assembled by the I. T. I. O. is located west and north of Perryton in Ochiltree county. There is some lease activity just across the line from the proposed block in Hansford county. Some land is being leased by other major oil companies.

The I. T. I. O., a subsidiary of the Cities Service Co. is one of the biggest producing companies in the major field. They are leaders among majors in the development of new fields. This company discovered the Oklahoma City pool, the Wilcox sand at Seminole and the Tillman pool near Frederick, Oklahoma.

They have recently leased a 15,000 acre block in Hemphill and Roberts counties along the Canadian River. About two years ago, they leased a block of about 12,000 acres in Sherman county, on which they have brought in a large gas well and are now down 2,000 feet on a second well in the quest for oil.

For the past six months this company has been operating a core drilling crew out of Perryton. They have drilled dozens of test holes in every part of this area and the location of the block was determined by the findings of this core drilling.

Leases being taken by the I. T. I. O. are the standard 10-yr. commercial form providing that unless drilling is started within one year from date of lease, the lease terminates unless rental money is deposited before end of year. Land owners are being paid 25c per acre and an annual renewal rental of 25c per acre.

#### Woodward Goes To Kansas Town

J. H. Woodward, who recently resigned after many years as manager of the Perryton Equity Exchange, is now located at Ellsworth, Kansas, as manager of the Ellsworth Feed & Elevator Co. He has been in Perryton this week making arrangements to move his family and household goods to his new home this week-end.

Ellsworth is located about 30 miles west of Salina, Kansas. Under his contract Mr. Woodward will have complete charge of the plant at Ellsworth which includes a feed manufacturing mill, grain and elevator division, and a wholesale and retail oil and gasoline station. He will share in the earnings of the company.

The best wishes of their many friends in this vicinity will go with Mr. and Mrs. Woodward to their new home. They were active and popular in business and social circles and Perryton's loss is Ellsworth's gain.

## Taking Business Census

W. H. Lance, enumerator for the Business and Manufacturers Census for Ochiltree County, is calling on all businesses and manufacturers that come within the scope of this census. All establishments are urged to have their figures available when the enumerator calls for the purpose of filling out a schedule for that business.

The reports to the Bureau of the Census are strictly confidential, and as individual reports will not be made available to anyone other than a sworn employee of the Census. The reports to the Census are required by Act of Congress providing a penalty for refusal to give a report or for the willful giving of incorrect figures. The same Act of Congress also provides a penalty for the divulging of any of this information. The reports are used solely for preparing statistical information concerning the nation's resources, production and distribution of activities and can not be used for taxation, valuation or regulation.

It is very important that every citizen cooperate to the fullest with the Bureau of the Census in order that a true and correct picture of the Panhandle of Texas may be reflected. It should be the desire of every West Texan for this part of the state to show up to its best, no better and no less.

Let us all remember that our town and our community will be measured for the next ten years as the result of this 16th Decennial Census. We are making the yardstick now by which we will be judged in the future. Let us all strive to make that yardstick an accurate one.

The Bureau of the Census is the keeper of the Nation's records on business, national resources, labor, wealth, employment and other related economic facts and is vastly used by individual firms, trade associations, business and civic bodies and other private and public agencies. The Census Bureau is a service organization and will furnish facts and figures in the aggregate to any citizen of the United States concerning the various phases of life in America.

It will be to your advantage to cooperate in every way possible with the Bureau of the Census.

The old cowman of the early 1900's knew the best use of the land in rough sloping areas. Nature is a good conservationist and the grass roots tied the soil together, holding it there on the slope.

The same principle can be used today. Grass is a crop. It is easy to harvest. That five-inch muzzle on a cow is like a miniature lawn mower being pushed twenty-four hours a day by four legs. The finished product is beef for the market, dairy products, or possibly mutton and wool.

This type of farming conserves the soil. Then there is an available supply of manure to return to the soil. Last year I made a check up with a farmer friend about manure. How many wagon loads do you suppose were available on an average quarter section farm? The answer is fifty loads in a year or enough to spread over five acres. This farmer had ten head of cattle, three head of horses, one brood sow, and one hundred and fifty chickens.

"Farm people are business people and as such are certainly concerned about conditions such as prices for their products which affect the success of their business," stated Raymond D. Thomas, Dean of Commerce, Oklahoma A. and M. College, recently.

"They have to decide what prices they can expect to receive for the various products of the farm and adjust their operations as best they can," the economist continued.

This deciding on expected prices, the speaker called, forecasting. To be done intelligently requires a balancing of conditions which are unfavorable against conditions which are favorable to see which are likely to be most important.

According to Thomas and E. D. Hunter, Extension economist in farm management. Favorable conditions at present outweigh unfavorable and for the year ahead, generally better times are in prospect.

For the long time period ahead, however, prospects for agriculture are different. It seems that farm operators are going to have to expect lower prices for their products but can at least partly overcome this difficulty by reducing costs of production. After all, the difference between the cost of producing a pound of beef and the price received for the pound of beef is the profit, or margin, and plays an important part in the success or failure of the farm producer.

## Syphilis Fight Registering Gains

AUSTIN, TEXAS—National Social Hygiene Day on February suggests the timeliness of a review of recent gains against syphilis. The Nation's leading public health problem. "Although it is too early in the present campaign to state accurately what reductions in prevalence have been realized, it is not too early for an estimate regarding future success," says Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Until recently only inadequate budgets were available in the several counties of Texas for the control of syphilis and gonorrhea. In 1940, seventy-five per cent of the total counties in the State are in active cooperation with the venereal disease program. Forty-seven venereal disease clinics in twenty-nine counties are operative, these clinics treating a weekly patient load of 30,000 persons. Eighty-seven counties, exclusive of counties in

which clinics are located, receive free drugs for treatment of venereal disease in indigent, the drugs being distributed through the local physicians after approval of the plan by the county medical society. Other significant achievements in the war against the venereal diseases in Texas include: Increases in the number of persons tested and treated for syphilis; improvement in case finding and case-holding facilities; a greater participation by industry and labor in the campaign; and significant widening of public understanding of the problems of syphilis control.

"Most of the task remains before us, despite these remarkable gains," Dr. Cox said. "The incidence and prevalence of the venereal diseases in Texas are still far too high. True it is that great forward strides have been made, but truer still is the fact that only sustained interest and public support can assure the eventual routing of the pale spiral germ of syphilis, the next great plague to go."

Lucky is the farmer or rancher, throughout the Southern Great Plains Region, who has been able, the past month, to lay his head on his pillow at night, or toast his feet at his home and fireside with a feeling of confidence that all is well.

He may well consider himself lucky for, in many places, drought conditions have been such that feed reserves for stock have dwindled to nothing. He may, also, take to himself credit for good foresight and business management in seeing to it, that—regardless of conditions—a reserve feed supply is on hand at all times for just such an emergency as has overtaken the Plains Area since before Christmas.

Snow has covered the ground and, with it, practically all roughage for the last month. Unfed livestock, no doubt, has suffered from severe cold and hunger. If no loss of life has actually resulted as yet, still the "pound of flesh" has been exacted and must eventually show up on the blood side of the balance sheet.

A feed reserve for the farmer and ranchman is as essential to successful and safe stock-raising, as a cash reserve is to good banking.

A reserve feed supply is one of the practices emphasized by the Soil Conservation Service, states H. A. Pinch, Camp Superintendent of the local Camp here in Perryton.

## Search for Musical Texas Youths

AUSTIN, Texas—Field forces in NYA's twelve Texas districts the next few weeks will help to sift out outstanding musical talent of boys and girls between 16 and 25 to make a South and Central American tour next summer with a 109-piece All American Youth Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Leopold Stokowski, J. C. Kellam, State NYA Administrator, said today.

Applications should be filed with the nearest NYA District Director by any Texas youth within that age limit, regardless of sex, race, or color, who wishes to compete for a berth on the tour. NYA District Directors are located in Marshall, Dallas, Houston, Fort Worth, Waco, Austin, San Antonio, McAllen, Amarillo, Lubbock, San Angelo, and El Paso.

Selection of young people to play in the Orchestra, he said, would be made first by local committees in each district. Winners of the district tryouts will enter the state contest to be held in Austin the early part of March. From the state eliminations winners will compete in regional meets to be held in eight cities over the United States. Kellam added that youth will have to pay their own expenses to dis-

trict, state, and regional contests but that the winners of the regional auditions will be given a trip to New York at the expense of Mr. Stokowski to undergo final selection for the 109 who will make the tour.

"Young people interested in this good-will tour sponsored by the Pan-American Union should make application immediately to the NYA District Office nearest them," the State Administrator said. "They should keep in mind, however, that in such a widespread competition great talent is a necessity, much more so than experience, and that only 109 will be selected from the entire United States to make up the Orchestra."

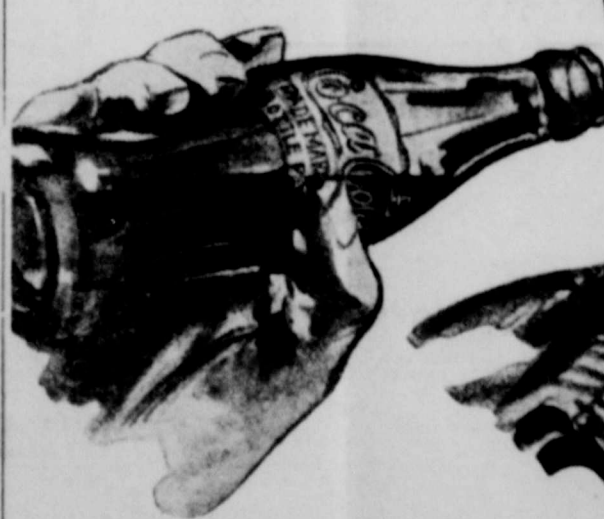

## Attorney General Gives Ruling On Payment of Poll Taxes

The attention of prospective voters of Ochiltree County is called to a recent ruling by Attorney General Gerald Mann requiring that you must either pay your 1939 poll taxes in person or send the money by an authorized person with a written statement.

The ruling, issued January 3, was to the effect that in cities of more than 10,000 population all poll taxes must be paid in person, while in smaller cities poll taxes must be paid in person or by authorized person with a written order.

The ruling does not apply to a man and his wife. Any man can still pay poll taxes for his wife or any woman for her husband. Fred Huston, deputy sheriff in charge of tax collections in the office of J. S. Talley, stated that a total of 400 poll taxes had been paid Wednesday, January 17, and six exemption certificates had been issued. Last year, approximately 1156 persons were eligible to vote, compared to 1219 two years ago. Mr. Huston states that all tax collections are ahead of last year.

Citizens between 21 and 60 years of age are required to have poll tax receipts in order to vote. Citizens who have reached their twenty-first birthday since January 1, 1939, or who will reach the age of 21 before the election date, are required to secure exemption certificates from the tax office during January. Also all persons who are entitled to exemptions because of physical disability must secure certificates during this month.

If a person is blind, deaf or dumb or permanently disabled or has lost one hand or foot, he is entitled to an exemption certificate because of physical disability.

## \$463,972 Advances War On Paralysis

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, which administers the funds raised annually by the Committee for the Celebration of the President's Birthday, made forty-four grants totaling \$463,972 to universities, hospitals and other institutions in twenty-one months from its organization on January 3, 1938 to the end of its fiscal year on September 30, 1939, according to the annual report of its president, Basil O'Connor. It has a principal of more than \$1,000,000, and is prepared to make other grants as approved.

## Coffee Shop Opened On Monday at Hotel

Announcements will be made later as to whether the Coffee Shop will continue the policy of remaining open during the afternoon on week days.

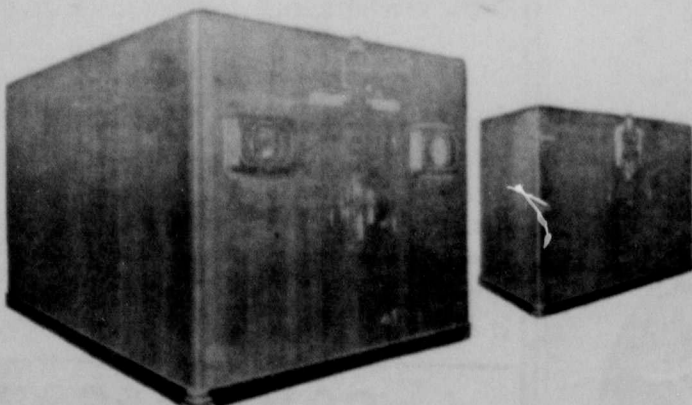

These new Buckeye giants hold better than four tons of eggs and themselves weigh six tons, according to Jack F. Todd and T. O. Calloun. The incubator is one of the largest in the southwest.

The new Buckeye streamliner turns eggs automatically at fixed intervals day and night. Whether the operator is out to lunch or waiting on customers, the eggs are turned regularly every three hours and a check mark is made on the recording chart each time a turning is made.

All vital factors of incubation and hatching, temperature, ventilation, humidity and egg turning are controlled without the attention of the operator. Only the best results can be obtained because these factors are kept in their exact relationship for the entire duration of the hatching process.

Eggs remain in the "setting unit" for 18 days. Then, just before hatching, the eggs are transferred to the "separate hatchery." During the hatch, the air in the hatchery is changed every three minutes, and the hatching process is completed in air kept constantly pure and un-

## Reduced Funds for Soil Conservation Cuts Down Aid to Farmers

Amarillo, Texas — Reduced federal appropriations for soil conservation work during the next fiscal year recommended in the President's "economy budget" to Congress means that Dust Bowl farmers will need to co-ordinate and expand local efforts if gains of recent years in checking soil erosion are to be maintained, according to H. H. Pinnell, regional conservator of the Soil Conservation Service in the Southern Great Plains.

Enactment of the recommended reduction in funds will result in a proportionate reduction in Service personnel and means that the Soil Conservation Service will not be able to give farmers as much material aid as in the past. However, the progress of the conservation program can be protected by increasing local responsibility, Pinnell said.

In many communities where soil conservation districts have been organized, the farmers and landowners are already prepared to continue their progress toward a better land use and erosion control.

## INTERNATIONAL Sunday School Lesson

**The Right Kind of Greatness**  
The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Jan. 21.  
Text: Matthew 20:17-28

**MANY** men are possessed by the passion to excel, have great dreams of ambition and attainment. Men of this sort have brought blessing or curse to mankind, according to the conception of strength and greatness they have had in mind.

Scholars, scientists, inventors, who have devoted their energies and genius to the service of their fellowmen, have done a great deal to bless the world. Humble saints and ministers, whose ideal has been that of making their lives strong in goodness, have similarly brought inestimable blessing.

But the pages of history are rife with the tragedies that have fallen upon mankind through the ambition of kings and rulers and military leaders, who have had dreams of power and who have cared nothing about how the lives of their fellowmen were sacrificed or how much suffering they brought upon men as long as they could attain their ambition.

**OUR** lesson brings us right into the heart of this question of what constitutes greatness, and how greatness can serve to bless men instead of curse them.

It is significant that the mother of James and John of the 12 disciples was called "the mother of Zebedee's children." We don't know much about Zebedee, but his wife evidently was the ruling power in that family. She had inordinate ambition for her sons, and apparently she had inspired them with her own passion. In her conception of a

great earthly kingdom that Jesus was going to establish, she came to Him with the strange request that when He should set up His kingdom, her two sons should sit one on his right hand and one on his left.

It seemed a strange misconception of the kingdom that Jesus had come to establish, and it implied such misunderstanding of His teaching and of His example that one might reflect upon the woman's intellectual and spiritual blindness.

Is it not true, however, that blindness of this sort has usually been manifest on the part of those whose lives have been formed in worldly ambition and with dreams of their own aggrandizement?

If the mother of Zebedee's children had been at all wise, she would have sensed the absurd nature of her request. But Jesus brought to her sons a very real challenge; were they able to drink of the cup that He was about to drink of, and to be baptized with that baptism of suffering that He was about to bear?

The sons did not flinch at the challenge. Their reply was firm and uncompromising, "We are able."

Little did they know of the ways in which they were really to share that kingdom and to participate in the true greatness of the Master whom they had chosen to follow. We must set over against the picture in our story that of John, the beloved disciple, transformed by the power of Christian love, seeking only a new sort of greatness as he said, "We know that we have passed from death unto life because we love the brethren."

## War Remains Quiet

The war, the authorities say, will remain fairly quiet until spring—no one is expected to start a major offensive while the bad weather holds. And in the spring, it is forecast in some quarters, Hitler will make his bid for victory. Time works with the Allies, and against the Reich. The military men mainly think that Hitler must win this year, or lose.

The Russo-Finnish controversy still holds the spotlight. To quote the military authorities once more, it is felt that the Red Army has been bad—but not as bad as it has appeared to most laymen. The Arctic weather has helped the Finns, who know the terrain and are masters of guerrilla tactics. And the Russian troops, at the start at least, comprised third class, not first class divisions. Stalin apparently woefully underestimated the spirit of Russia's little neighbor.

There is considerable speculation as to what will happen once the Finnish business is settled. A Russian drive against India would not startle the experts. And if that should happen, England would be in a tough spot. It would mean that she must divert great quantities of troops, equipment and supplies from the Continent, and thus weaken her support of France on the Western front. England would have to give every effort to beating the Soviet—a successful Russian drive to the east would mean the shattering of the great empire's life-line.

There is still talk of the possibility of a "peace offensive" this year.

# NOTICE Tax Payers

Your 1939 TAXES are now due and must be paid before the first day of February, 1940 to avoid penalty.

Both men and women are required to pay their poll tax. Unpaid poll taxes are a lien upon any real or personal property you may own, or come into possession of.

Those who were 60 years of age or more on January 1, 1939 are not required to have an exemption to vote; those who have moved into the county since January 1, 1939 are required to have an exemption; those who have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1939 are required to secure an exemption certificate during January, 1940, before they may vote in any of the elections during the year; no charge is made for these exemptions.

In 1940 automobile license fees cannot be paid before February 1st, 1940, but must be paid between February 1st and April 1st, 1940.

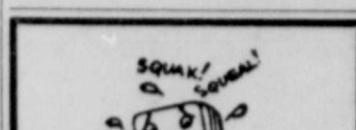
