Petition cites city water problems

The Colorado City Council was presented with a petition Wednesday night from citizens and business operators expressing dissatisfaction with the water quality and water distribution system.

Lloyd Ledbetter, owner of Dairy Queen, was the spokesman for the group whose petition stated that "it has even become a not so rare occurrence for us to experience water outages during peak business hours."

"Considering the water service rates, and the property taxes paid to the city each year by the business owners and operators, we feel that this

situation is unacceptable, and that immediate steps must be taken to cure this situation," the petition stated.

Twenty-nine persons signed the petition which was presented to the council during a special meeting called to consider a new animal control ordinance.

"The water situation in Colorado City is deplorable and unacceptable to me, other concerned business owners and operators and citizens of this town," said Ledbetter.

Ledbetter said that water is the "lifeline of any town" and said that "we in Colorado City are fortunate to have, most of the time, plenty of water in our lakes, a fairly adequate filter plant (which a lot of towns do not

have)—but then we drop the ball and we do nothing about our water distribution system."

Ledbetter, a former member of the council, said the city was warned 12 years ago by Buz Rich, director of public works, that the city should begin a water main replacing campaign. Ledbetter said the only result was a "band-aid" method of repairing the present system.

Ledbetter suggested a bond issue is needed to take care of the problem instead of the continually repairing of the present system.

"This looks to me like the city is trying to keep an old, old, high-mileage car running when it would be cheaper to make monthly payments on a new

one," said Ledbetter.

Ledbetter said his business was without water completely several days last year and "the same pattern started occurring early this year."

Ledbetter displayed two jars, each containing a water filter and brown-looking water, which he said came from his ice machines at the Dairy Queen.

He said when customers come into his restaurant and cannot be served because there is no water or if the drinks taste bad because of the quality of water, customers are lost and tax revenues are lost for the city.

Neppin Pandya of Great Western Motel was also in attendance and said that he has to refund money to guests at his motel

because there was not enough water pressure at times in order for the guests to take showers.

Brenda Tarter, city manager, told Ledbetter that "a lot has been done and a lot more is being done than most people realize" to improve the water distribution system.

Mrs. Tarter said a \$3 million water bond issue is the solution but questioned whether the citizens of Colorado City would approve such a project.

"The council realizes there is a problem," said council member Des Hearn.

Mayor Elmer Martin noted several things have already been done to increase water

4-H exchange visitor compares Germany with USA

The Bobby Lemons family of Colorado City is gaining a lot of first-hand knowledge about West Germany these days thanks to a 24-year-old guest.

Margaret Westrup, who lives in Groben, 46 miles from the Netherlands border, is staying with the Lemons for two weeks as part of a 4-H exchange program.

The visitor has been in the United States since May and saw Washington D.C., Dallas, Mineola, Cypress, College Station and Iowa Park before arriving in Colorado City. Her next host family lives in Fort Stockton.

Westrup, whose family farms, said she "really likes" the United States and is impressed with

its size and the friendliness of the people.

"Texas is as I thought it would be," she said, adding that many American television shows are seen in Germany including "Dallas", "Falcon Crest" and "Dynasty".

She took English in school for five years and speaks the language quite well.

She says the size of Texas is almost overwhelming compared to her native Germany.

"An hour's drive here is nothing," she said. "One hour driving in Germany is a long way."

Farm sizes are also different here than in Germany. Her family farms 85 acres which is considered a "medium" size farm. They grow maize, oats

Annual AJRA rodeo starts Wednesday

Over 300 contestants from Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Louisiana will be in Colorado City July 9-12 for the annual American Junior Rodeo Association (AJRA) Rodeo, sponsored by the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce.

Penny Solomon, executive vice president of the chamber, said this is one of the largest junior rodeos held and because of the large number of entries here each year, there are four performances instead of the usual three at other rodeos.

Performances will be at 7:30 p.m. nightly at the rodeo arena

located west of town at the Ag Barn. Saturday morning slack will start at 7:30 a.m.

Miss Solomon said the rodeo will offer plenty of exciting events and encourages residents to attend the performances. Wrangler will conduct a drawing each night for a \$25 gift certificate for Wrangler merchandise.

"Our merchants and local people have been so gracious in donating things and supporting us by buying ads in the program," she said.

She said the rodeo couldn't take place without volunteers

and said more volunteers are needed to help in the concession and at the gate. Becky Manning and Gloria Erwin are in charge of the concession stand and Connie Robertson is in charge of gate workers.

Sue Guelker and Jeannie Bolin are in charge of the queen's contest. The rodeo queen will be announced at Saturday's night performance. Contestants are Mandi Farris, Anne Kimmel, Amber Stephens, Katie Walls and Sherri Webb.

Sharon Hoover, chairman of the rodeo parade which will be

Saturday at 5 p.m., said the queen contestants will be featured during the event.

Mrs. Hoover said a variety of entries are scheduled for the parade and there is still time for local organizations or businesses to enter a float. The parade theme is "Texas - A Pioneer Spirit". The parade will have four sheriff's posses representing Nolan, Dawson, Howard and Scurry counties and one if not more Shriner's groups will be present.

Clowns, under the direction of Delaine Myers, will be along the parade route distributing

toys and "goodies" to the kids.

A Marine Corp color guard from Abilene will be lead of the parade. Staff Sgt. Garcia of Colorado City is a member of the color guard.

The Red Raider from Texas Tech University in Lubbock will also return to this year's parade.

Grand marshal will be Mrs. Marion Bassham.

A number of floats, including several from the Westbrook sesquicentennial parade, are entered and local dignitaries

"To better serve our banking customers, the City National Bank is remodeling and redecorating in order to increase the efficiency and comfort of our facilities," said Alford.

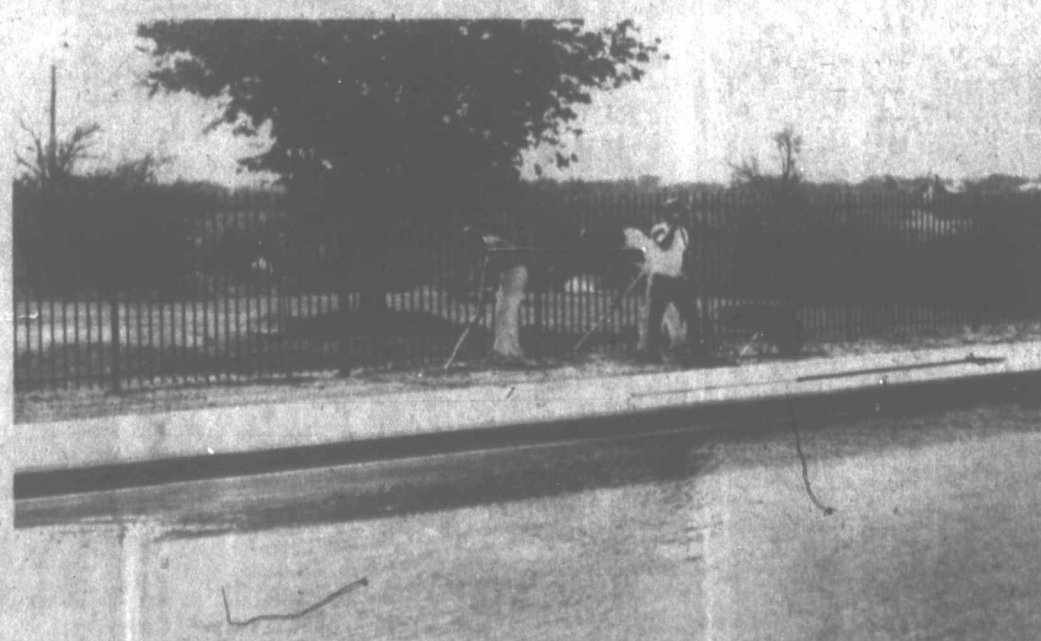

pressure in the north part of town including installing booster pumps and activating old wells.

Mrs. Tarter said the council has budgeted \$30,000 a year the last two years for water improvements. She said much more is spent each year on maintenance of the water system.

Rich said much of the problem of water pressure can be alleviated by building a standpipe north of the interstate near the city limits. He said a section of pipe from the water towers north to near Walnut and 22nd streets needs to be replaced with a new 12-inch line.

Rich estimated the cost of the new line at \$35,000-\$20,000 and the cost of the standpipe at about \$45,000.

Ledbetter asked for immediate action on replacing the water line, adding that he will loan the money to the city if necessary in order to do the project.

Martin asked Rich and Mrs.

Tarter to formulate a plan, "something we can do", to help the problem.

The city has applied for a \$300,000 grant to construct a new water line on Cherry Street from Second to 17th streets, pledging \$46,000 in local funds if the grant is approved.

In other business, the council authorized payment of \$5,400 to Texas Tank Service for repair work done to the two overhead water towers. The council also gave permission to spend \$3,000 to repair and paint the old standpipe in the southeast part of town which is still in use. The standpipe will be painted black with red band around it in honor of school colors of Colorado High School.

No action was taken on the animal control ordinance. City attorney Pete McKinney was instructed to make changes in wording of several portions of the proposed ordinance and present it to the council for further consideration at a later meeting.

Although she is qualified to teach, she hopes to do farm work when she returns home by working on a temporary basis on farms when someone is sick or unable to work.

But until when she will see more of the United States by spending two-week stretches with host families. Her last three months will be spent in Minnesota.

While in Colorado City, she's seen the local theatrical production of "Colorado Choo Choo" and went to Albany to see the Fandangle. She also planned a trip to Palo Duro Canyon to see the "Texas" production.

Americans support changes in law

WASHINGTON, D.C.—A nationwide poll shows a sizeable majority of Americans support

major changes to a 55-year-old, federal law which sets wages for public construction projects.

The changes would require the government to accurately reflect marketplace wages and reduce paperwork requirements. These are the same revisions contained in legislation introduced by Congressman Charles W. Stenholm (D-Stamford) and co-sponsored by 120 Members of Congress.

The 1931 law, known as the Davis-Bacon Act, is vaguely worded. It generally requires the government to pay wages

that far exceed local market rates for federally-funded construction, repair work and renovation projects. The Congressional Budget Office estimates that Davis-Bacon adds about \$1 billion a year to federal construction costs. The law also requires contractors to submit to the governments complete, weekly payroll records to prove compliance with Davis-Bacon. Davis-

Bacon applies to all projects costing more than \$2,000, a threshold set in 1934.

Stenholm's bill, H.R. 472, is supported by a diverse coalition of business and civic organization, which commissioned through the Virginia polling firm of Decision-Making-Information. The survey sample was 1,050 adults contacted by phone.

Mitchell County Hospital

Mitchell County is about to have an additional physician beginning in August. Dr. Dee Roach and his wife will be moving during the month of July and he will be ready to open his practice on the first of August. We are all extremely pleased that Dr. Roach will be here and we know that he will be an asset to our hospital, medical staff, city, and county.

Our hospital is one that we should all be proud of because of what it means to have a hospital in the county and the services that are available. Our daily census reflects what is happening throughout the nation in hospitals; but outpatient business continues to increase. We will see between 450 and 550 outpatients per month. These outpatient visits will include those who come in for x-rays, laboratory work, respiratory therapy, physical therapy, and emergencies.

We constantly have to make changes in the way things are done because of Federal regulations (Medicare-Medicaid), insurance company regulations, and State licensure changes. To combat the cost of these changes, we have to come up with ways to generate revenues. The implementation of our Home Health Agency has been a very positive step. It has helped the physicians in making sure that good care is followed up in the homes. The Swing Bed Program has been another positive step in helping offset the Medicare loss - plus giving the needed care our patients deserve.

There are always things about hospitals, or any business, that we can complain about - mostly because we don't understand all the changes that are taking place; however, positive benefits that our county hospital offers to the resident far outweigh the negative things that we hear.

"Bad Company ruins good morals." I Corinthians 15:33

Wasn't it Benjamin Franklin who said almost the same things as Paul did here?

It seems that Paul got there first. When the Gentiles started coming into the Christian Church they brought a lot of thier beliefs with them. They had all been schooled in pagan schools, they had read pagan books, and their friends were from the pagans, and it was very hard to cut all of their old ties. But all wasn't evil in that world. There were elements of culture; learning, decency and uprightness of which Jesus could have approved. These were, on the other hand, large areas of the ancient life which were completely reprobate. For the Christian to draw entirely new lines of distinction, to pass moral judgments, to separate the good from the bad according to the new standards of measurement called the moral and spiritual skill of high order. And sometimes they failed miserably.

The problem of sharing in the world around us, and still keeping ourselves uncontaminated by it, is one of the hardest things the Christian has to face. So many people say, "Let your conscience be your guide," and that is a little upsetting sometimes to the Christian.

Paul's rule will stand to test in any generation. The choice of friends is the most fateful choice Christians ever make. Any friend who sneers at our convictions, who laughs at our scruples, who belittles our best, who persuades us against our conscience, who tempts us to spend more than we can afford, is a disastrous friend. "Bad company ruins good morals."

MAIN IDEA

Finding the main idea is another way of actually asking you what the paragraph is about. The main idea is usually found in the first sentence of a paragraph... but not always.

INFERENCE

This is a skill that asks you to reach a logical conclusion by using your ability to reason.

SPECIFIC FACTS OR DETAILS

Concrete facts, statistics, etc. that give support for the main idea.

PRACTICAL READING

The category of practical reading includes useful reading normally required of any adult. Handbooks, recipes, contracts, indexes, library entries, advertisements, and applications are examples of practical reading.

County Oil News

At a location three miles northeast of Cuthbert, Grand Banks Energy has finished an oil producer in Mitchell County's Sharon Ridge Field.

The well is designated as the No. 4 Coleman Ranch "A", showing potential to pump 16 barrels of oil per day, plus 107 barrels of water.

Location is in a 130-acre lease in the H&TC Survey. Bottomed at 1,819 feet, the well will pro-

duce from perforations in the "1700" Formation, 1,838 to 1,842 feet into the hole.

The No. 4 Coleman Ranch has been brought on line in Mitchell County's Sharon Ridge Field, with Mrs. W. M. Keck Jr. as the operator.

Located three miles northeast of Cuthbert, the well is in a 160-acre lease in the H&TC Survey. It indicated ability to pump seven barrels of oil per day, plus 57 barrels of water. Production is from perforations in the "1700" Formation, 1,705 to 1,748 feet into the wellbore. Bottomhole was at 1,900 feet.

The same operator plans to test for potential at four other Sharon Ridge Field wells. They are designated as the Nos. 7, 8, and 9 Coleman Ranch and the No. 2-A Coleman Ranch, located from two to three miles northeast of Cuthbert.

Two of the wells, the No. 8 and No. 9, have already been perfo-

rated for possible production in the San Andres Formation.

Testing for potential is scheduled at a Mitchell County wildcat venture seven miles northwest of Westbrook. It is Edwin and Berry Cox's No. 2 Brannan, bottomed at total depth of 8,390 feet in a 674-acre lease in the T&P Survey A-1668. Drilling had gotten underway in early April.

Commercial shows of crude oil have been reported at two new drilling ventures of Grand Banks Energy Inc. in the Sharon Ridge Field, about three miles northeast of Cuthbert. Designated as the No. 3 and No. 6 Coleman Ranch, the wells have been perforated for possible production in the San Andres Formation.

Moderate production of salt water was reported in addition to oil. No official report has been made on state-recognized potential.
