Bowers Flings Stormy Challenge to Republicans Smith Lieutenants Forecast Victory on First Ballot

Check Shows That 690 Votes May Be Safely Accredited

"Favorite Sons" Continue Efforts But United Move Against Smith Lacks Any Momentum.

BELIEVE AL WILL GET VOTES FROM INDIANA

Possibility of Stampede To New Yorker Seen As Likelihood of Shifts Of Delegates Looms.

HOUSTON, June 26. (P)—The nomination of Governor Smith of New York on the first ballot is now the confident expectation of the men who are directing maneuvers in his behalf here.

There has been a show of confidence in the Smith camp that he would be the winner, but it was not until today that his lieutenants seemed inclined to forecast his selection on the first roll call.

George R. Van Name, the New York executive vice-president of the convention, indulged in some hand-wagon predictions expressing the view that even if a determined effort were made to stop it, the Smith on the first ballot movement appeared to be gaining such momentum that it could not be halted.

Some of the foes of the New Yorker still refused to concede defeat. Many leaders in the opposition, however, seemed ready to call it a day, convinced that obstruction tactics would be futile when balloting begins, probably Thursday, the Smith leaders were inclined to believe that a shift of a big block of Ohio delegates from Power to Smith before completion of the first roll call might settle the issue.

690 Votes Assured.

ENGINEER'S HEROISM SAVES MEXICO TRAIN

LAREDO, Texas, June 26. (P)—Fifteen Americans are alive and unhurt as a result of the bravery of an engineer on a train from Mexico City to Laredo. An attempt was made to bomb the train between La Loma and La Puente in the state of Hidalgo, early Monday, according to members of a crew and passengers.

The train took a siding to avoid another train which had been derailed by a bomb which had been killed. The train became so long that the engineer decided to reconnoiter with the engine detached and advancing slowly a bomb exploded in front of it, going off prematurely.

The engineer went back immediately to head a second bomb which was placed in the center of the train. It was found under a pullman where the Americans were sleeping. The engineer cut the fuse and a party was organized to hunt for the bandits but no one was found.

2000 Barrels Is Production From Hobbs Well No. 1

Newly Discovered Oil Field, Just Across Line In New Mexico Gives Promise Of Being Pool.

LAMESA, June 26.—Indications that the newly discovered oil field near Hobbs, New Mexico, just across the state line, would prove even larger than had been expected, appeared today when the Hobbs No. 1 well made 2000 barrels of high grade oil when it was turned loose in its first test.

Lamesa, being the nearest hotel point and railroad line to Hobbs, is taking an active part in speculation of the field. Much leasing and royalty activity is reported from Hobbs.

It is reported by those in a position to know the extent of the field that it will extend over into Texas.

WAGE ROW SETTLED

Long Dispute Between Men And Orient Is Over

WICHITA, Kans., June 26. (P)—A ten month's wage dispute between the Orient railroad and 519 of its operating employees has ended in a settlement. E. A. Boyd, general attorney for the road, announced today.

The settlement follows closely recommendations of President Coolidge's fact finding commission which held a hearing on the dispute in Wichita last month. The management agreed to join a regional adjustment board for arbitration of grievances, and the employees agreed to accept the Orient's compromise increase with an additional concession of 20 cents per day more for work train crews.

FOGS HALT RESCUERS

Attempt To Find Lost Fliers Fails

KING'S BAY, Spitzbergen, June 26. (P)—Milder weather without wind brought fog to the Arctic and again today kept up rescue work of the aviators and mariners who are trying to save survivors of the Nobile expedition and to discover the whereabouts of Roald Amundsen's rescue plane.

Milder weather, however, is making for better ice conditions. As soon as the fog lifts, ships will be able to work to the six men marooned near Froya island.

Club Encampment Will Start Today At Fair Grounds

350 Boys and Girls From This and Adjoining Counties Expected to Make Event a Banner One.

PLEASURE, BUSINESS MINGLE ON PROGRAM

Public Invited to View Exhibits of Girls' Work and To Attend Some of Educational Sessions.

With everything in readiness last night for the 4-H club encampment, which begins at the Fair Grounds at 2 o'clock this afternoon, all indications pointed to the most successful meeting of its kind ever to be held here.

Between 350 and 400 boys and girls club members of this and adjoining counties are expected to attend the two-day encampment. Representatives from seven near-by counties yesterday for County Agent D. F. Eason showed that approximately 125 out of the county club members would be here today.

Present indications show that this will be the largest 4-H annual encampment to be held in this county and one of the largest to be held in West Texas.

Elaborate Program

An elaborate program, with pleasure and study intermingled, has been worked out for the two-day session. W. P. Kistner, area executive of the Boy Scouts, will be in charge of the registration this afternoon, and of numerous camp activities during the time.

After registration the boys will take part in the judging training course under the direction of Dean A. H. Leitch, Prof. W. L. Staeger, of the Tech agricultural department.

City Dads Ratify Plan of Petition

Discussion of Definite City Plan for Lubbock Is Another Feature Of Commission Session.

Ratification of the plan for a petition to be presented to the City Commission asking for a bond election for a city auditor, and for a definite city plan for Lubbock constituted the main business of the regular meeting of the directors of the Board of City Development held at the city hall last night.

The board went on record as interested in a definite city plan and plans were inaugurated to investigate and learn more about the project.

To Investigate Schedule

A committee was authorized last night to investigate the proposed schedule of the Fort Worth and Denver train to and from Lubbock. The schedule was discussed by the board but no definite action was taken. A request from Dallas jobbers for a late train out of there was considered.

The board passed a resolution favoring legislation to petition for a constitutional amendment which would cause property to be subject to a lien for paying purposes. This action was in connection with a state-wide movement.

Wright Named Delegate

Neil Wright was selected as a representative to Lockney today to discuss the arrival of the Denver train into the South Plains to be held at Sterley Junction. Representatives from each of the South Plains towns served by the new railway will attend the meeting today to work out plans for the celebration.

The Federal Court committee of the Board was voted a resolution of thanks at the meeting last night for the work done in getting the federal court for Lubbock.

This was the first meeting of the Board for some time and a number of routine matters were considered.

Captain Bass, 50, has had over a quarter century of military service and rose from a corporal in 1899 to a major during the world war.

Democratic Convention Started In Enthusiastic Demonstration

HOUSTON, June 26. (P)—The Democrats of the nation sat down together today here in the hot corner of the great Southwest to sing a little, perjure a lot, and then lay off until night and its cooling gulf breezes.

But they made a start, if not a very dashing one, on their job of celebrating the 100th anniversary of "Old Hickory's" election as their presidential candidate, by nomination of a man, by every sign, from the sidewalks of New York, whom they ardently hope to elect to the presidency in November.

Cowboy Stand Applauded.
Even with all the heat—and it was hot—it was a colorful scene in the huge, open sided hall when Chairman Shaver of the national committee began pounding for order. The vast rectangle of the main floor, two or three acres in extent, was swarming with people and alive with waving fans. The aisles were jammed and the three bands fought for attention with old songs and new. A red shirted cowboy band, led by an astute haired Texas beauty on a gray mare, came in and marched around the hall to that old ditty of the gray mare from which it draws its name. It received hearty applause.

Murphy, Chicago Labor Leader Is Attacked, Killed

Machine Guns Mow Down "Big Tim" When He Steps From Home, Located In Exclusive District.

ONCE SERVED TERM IN FEDERAL PRISON

Had Been Engaged In Union Affairs Since Release From Leavenworth; Identity of Assassilants Puzzle.

CHICAGO, June 26.—"Big Tim" Murphy, Chicago Labor Leader, was shot and killed at his home in the exclusive Rogers Park district tonight by assassins who attacked him with machine guns.

An automobile parked on a side street a few hundred yards away threw its glare of lamps on the Labor Leader as he stepped from the basement doorway, his silhouette reflected by the basement lights.

In response to a call "who's there," Big Tim was answered by the rat-a-tat-tat of a machine gun. He fell into the roadway, his brother-in-law, grabbing his body and dragging it into the bungalow dining room.

Mrs. Murphy was absent from the home at the time.

The former labor leader, released from the Federal prison at Leavenworth about a year ago, returned here and announced he was through with all " racketeering" and proposed to lead a commercial life, dealing mostly in real estate.

Murphy was convicted of complicity in the \$100,000 Dearborn Street railroad station mail robbery. Since his return here he has been engaged, nevertheless, in minor union organization affairs, the latest of which was an attempt to organize a meat dealers association.

Radio Man Slain In Plane Smash

Blazing Craft Carries Naval Operator 2000 Feet To His Death, Near Vallejo, California.

VALLEJO, Calif., June 26. (P)—Withrow Prince, 23, Naval radio operator, plunged 2000 feet in a burning airplane to his death here today. Ensign L. T. Cleaves, pilot, leaped to safety in a parachute.

Lincoln Draper, 23, Army student pilot, was killed today when his plane crashed.

COURT WILL "REST"

Farmers Busy In Fields, Judge Avers

County court is going to "rest" for a while, it was announced yesterday by Judge Charles Nordyke. Unless some case of real importance comes up court will be adjourned for some time, he said.

This action was caused by the fact that witnesses in the cases scheduled to come up are farmers and are needed in their fields, and because most of the lawyers are wanting a rest after such a long court session in the three courts here.

OPPOSE BROKER "FEE"

Charge \$12,000,000 To Be From Merger

NEW YORK, June 26. (P)—Charges that Dillon, Read and company investment bankers, would make a profit of \$12,000,000 in a merger of Dodge Brothers, Inc., and the Chrysler corporation, were made today in the supreme court by attorneys seeking an injunction to prevent the proposed \$250,000,000 combination.

Decision on the application was reserved by Justice McHugh, who said that the suit probably should have been brought in Maryland where the Dodge company is incorporated.

NEW YORK CAMPAIGN

Special Headquarters For State Set Up

WASHINGTON, June 26. (P)—A special Republican presidential campaign organization for New York state was set up today with Secretary Hoover's personal approval and an effort was continued to settle upon a party campaign manager for the western half of the country.

Verdict Giving State Vast Oil Lands Returned

Unestimated Millions In Property Would Revert To Commonwealth Unless Verdict Is Changed.

AUSTIN, June 26.—A verdict carrying a judgment worth unestimated millions was returned for the State in its suit for more than 500 acres of Hutchinson county oil land by a jury in district court here this afternoon. The action was brought on the theory that the tract is vacant of valid title and therefore should revert to the State. The exact extent of recovery will be determined later by the court.

Some sixty oil companies and individuals, present holders of the area, are defendants. Motions for new trial probably will be prepared.

Nearly all witnesses were technicians, testifying about surveys made in the county.

The action is similar to another thus far won, asking possession of many acres in Harris county. In that case the judgment for the state was estimated unofficially at \$2,000,000.

COTTON PRICE UP

Advance Carries Market To 22.31

NEW YORK, June 26. (P)—A further advance on the continued unfavorable character of weather and crop advices, carried cotton prices up \$2 to \$2.50 a bale today all new crop positions going into new high ground for the season.

October sold up to 22.31, an advance of 218 points from the low level of June 12, and 54 points from yesterday's closing quotation. Much realizing was encountered at this level, which was absorbed on moderate reaction. October closing at 22.22. The general market closed steady at net advances of 40 to 45 points.

FARM BUREAU MEET

Members Give Directors Their Views

DALLAS, June 26. (P)—Recommendations for the ensuing year from the members of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association to the new board of directors were submitted today at the closing session of the two-day state membership meeting.

Subjects covered in the recommendation were modification of the existing contract and submission to the members; change of the by-laws to provide for the rotary system of electing directors; and change of the annual membership meeting date from the fourth Monday in June to the second Monday in May.

ARKANSAS FOR SMITH

Demo Enthusiasm Booms to Crest After Fiery Talk

Mythical Prosperity And Economy Derided In Sentences Ringing With Denunciation And Rebuke.

SPEAKER RUNS GAMUT OF RECENT SCANDALS

Countless Millions Listen by Radio, As Party Shatters Precedent With Night Session.

BY JAMES L. WILLIAMS, SAM HOUSTON HALL, HOUSTON, June 26.—A stormy challenge by the national democracy to the republican presidential ticket and platform not yet two weeks old went roaring out over the radio and telegraph to night as notice to the world that the party of Jefferson and old Hickory would enter the November lists with blood in its eye.

Claude G. Bowers, of New York, temporary chairman and carefully selected keynote speaker, touched off a veritable powder keg of democratic enthusiasm. He tore mercilessly at the record of two republican administrations, those of Harding and Coolidge, to sweep his auditors in the crowded pavilion into outbursts of applause as he went down the line on the oil scandal, farm legislation, "fake prosperity," unemployment, and all the other allegations of republican misrule, upon which the democrats propose to base the fight for election of their presidential ticket.

Shower Drenches Many.
The New York editor spoke to a crowd many of which had been drenched by a heavy thunderstorm which penetrated the roof of the newly built auditorium, but the fight over the presidential nomination, which seemed assured to Governor Smith of New York, in order to hear him sound the party battle cry.

Especially vociferous was the reaction of the convention to Bowers' demand that the hand of privilege be taken from the throats of the farmers. Every state and county was removed from its meetings and a parade of several minutes followed.

Prohibition Storm Cloud Expected To Break Today

Lines Tightened By Wets and Drys For Platform Row

Bone Drys Will Demand "Sacred" Enforcement of Prohibition, Designated By Name.

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, June 26.—Wets and drys in the democratic national convention tightened up their lines today in preparation for a battle tomorrow within the resolutions committee on the prohibition plank.

Convention harmonizers still were seeking to have the row settled behind closed doors, but such militant leaders of the South as Josephus Daniels, North Carolina, publisher and former Secretary of the Navy, and Governor Dan Moody, of Texas, were ready to throw the issue into the convention itself unless their demands were met.

Daniels and his co-workers insisted that the plank must name the 18th Amendment and pledge the party to "sacredly enforce it." Apparently the supporters of Gov. Alfred E. Smith were disinclined to go that far and they believed they had the votes in the convention to put over a straight law enforcement plank.

To Ask Modification
The demand of the drys will be countered before the committee tomorrow with a plan for modification of the Volstead Act, to be offered by George E. Brennan, national committeeman for Illinois, and a Smith leader in the convention.

New York, Maryland and New Jersey were expected to support that plank, although not even the most optimistic of the wets entertained any idea that it could be put over.

Headlights at Houston

(By Associated Press)
The Democratic chieftains who decided on night sessions for the national convention already are hearing from evening newspapers back home, but they place all of the blame on the evolution of the radio. By 10 o'clock sessions in midday when many of the nation's millions are at home for noon lunches they assert that they will reach the voters over the broadcasting chain, and then again, with night sessions they believe literally millions will listen to the lambasting of the republican party.

These leaders are depending on the newspapers to carry the all-important printed word, but they are overlooking no bet in getting their case across. Unless there is a change in plans there will be several night sessions of the convention, although no day will be altogether neglected.

"You can't go wrong on my initials—they are as solid as A B C," says Arthur B. Clark, the brown-shirted delegate from Alabama.

"Here's one for the book," add the information clerk tossed a telegram across the desk.

"What does the democratic convention open?" it read. It came from Pittsburgh.

Just inside the Rice is a table with a diagram of seats spread. Two men approached.

"Please, Miss, we want two good seats down front."

Money changed hands and the men pocketed two tickets.

"Who said it was a hard job getting tickets," one said.

"Convention seats?" pined the young woman. "You've bought tickets to the wrestling match."

A national committeewoman by proxy is being mentioned as the probable choice of the Reed forces to second the nomination of the incumbent, Mrs. Annetta Pank, New Mexico's tiny blond representative, who is replacing Mrs. Jennie Martin Kirby on the committee. It is regarded as the favorite.

The convention adjourned at 9:28 p. m. until 11 o'clock tomorrow morning, when reports of committees, including the platform committee with its troublesome prohibition problem, will be in order. Senator Joseph T. Robinson of Arkansas will be installed as permanent chairman.

It has not been definitely determined when the platform speeches will be made, but it is virtually certain that a presidential choice will be designated Thursday or Friday.

HEFLIN BOOMS

Gives His Protest With A Lengthy Telegram

HOUSTON, June 26.—(AP)—Senator J. Thomas Hefflin, arch foe of Governor Al Smith, did not come to the convention to add his booming voice to the southern bloc campaign but he shelled the "enemy" from afar today with a thousand word telegram.

Addressed to A. H. Carmichael, chairman of the Alabama delegation, Hefflin's telegram declared that Smith's support from southern and western states did not represent more than one-fourth of the democratic voters in those sections. He called on the Alabama delegation to fight Smith's nomination to the next and at no time to cast a vote for him.

Keynoter's Remarks On Farm Relief Are Cause of Prolonged Demonstration

(Editor's Note: Dr. W. A. Jackson, head of the department of government at Texas Tech and a close student of politics is the author of the following account of the Democratic convention. With a press gallery ticket, Dr. Jackson is seeing and studying the convention, first hand.)

HOUSTON, June 26.—The noon session was tame. It lasted less than one hour. There is more noise tonight. The bands are vying with each other, playing the tunes that make creepy feelings run up and down the spine and the heart beat a little faster. Dixie is the favorite.

Most everyone concedes the nomination to Smith. That has taken much of the pep out of the whole affair.

The convention is very wet as the elements poured forth in torrents this afternoon and tonight.

At fifteen minutes to 8 the gavel was sounded. It continued to sound for the next ten minutes. The last temporary officers were read.

The temporary chairman was led to the platform amid cheers. He poured it on to the Republicans and conjured up such great men as Jefferson and Hamilton, Jackson and Wilson. The tribute to Woodrow Wilson drew continuous cheering which was prolonged by the appearance of Mrs. Wilson on the platform. The appeal for farmers drew cheers and then some more cheers. Led by North Dakota, one by one the standard bearers of the states started on a parade around the hall. The cheering continued so long that the bands played "We Went to Home Till Morning."

It was fifteen minutes before order could be restored. The personnel of the four great committees was announced following the address of the temporary chairman and everybody went home till morning.

In addition to the favorite sons who were groomed as candidates before delegates assembled here for the convention, Mississippi has brought out Sen. Pat Harrison; Texas, Jesse H. Jones, the Houston millionaire, and South Carolina, Chief Justice Watts of that state.

SAM HOUSTON HALL, HOUSTON, June 26 (AP)—With most of its disagreements already smothering themselves in the dust clouds raised by the Al Smith bandwagon, the Democrats assembled today in this resplendent new convention hall for a national convention that everybody seemed to think was about as good as over before it started.

As the convention came together, Sam Houston Hall lay shimmering under a merciless South Texas sun, like a great square platter of humanity. A low, arched roof hid it, but there was some consolation and comfort in the fact that the lid did not fit down tightly. The roof-edge, a fifteen foot open space ran all around the hall, permitting a circulation of air that was at least fresh and unconfined, even if it could not by any stretch of the imagination be said to be cooling.

The scooped up sides which sloped from the convention hall on east and north were lined with spectators' seats, like the bleachers of a baseball park. But most of the 18,000 seats were on a dead ground level in a vast square in the center of the platter. The alternates, and many hundred spectators likewise were on this lower level. There were no galleries.

The west side of the square was the convention platform, arranged in the now familiar style, with long rows of seats for important personages and a small speakers stand projecting like a tiny pier in a sea of humanity, exactly from the center of the platform proper. In place at the front of the pier was the silver-plated microphone stand, the only one of its kind in the world, used first at the Republican convention at Kansas City two weeks ago.

The architect had placed ten special platforms for photographers, they were perched like crows nests, high atop a double row of slender supporting columns, and had a look strangely like battleship fighting tops when their crews took their places, stripped for action. They manned their battery of movie film guns and searchlights with collars and sleeves rolled up, shirts open, handkerchiefs bound about their foreheads to keep rolling perspiration out of their eyes. In idle moments they used their powerful cameras to look the ladies over.

Famous Band Gets Hand
An hour before the noon convention time a small advance of the convention army had mustered in the galleries and on the convention floor, and two bands, placed opposite each other in the north and south bleachers, played alternately. A little later another special Texas convention jazz company which called itself The Old Gray Mare Band circled the whole outer aisle surrounding the delegate section, dressed as red shirted cowboys, playing the tune for which it was named and headed by a cowgirl leader, riding astride the old gray mare herself. Horse and rider got a better hand from the crowd than either the band or the music.

Among the first of the distinguished guests to come into the reserved section on the convention platform was Mrs. Woodrow Wilson. She entered accompanied by Mrs. Jesse Jones, wife of the Houston publisher and banker, who upset a lot of political pot buckets by bringing this convention to his home town. They sat down together, unnoticed by the assembling crowds.

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Brown Derbies Ready For Campaign

Al's Picturesque Headgear Has Prominent Place As Way Cleared For Drive

(By Associated Press)
ALBANY, N. Y., June 26.—As the Democratic convention which will consider his name as the party's candidate for the presidency opened in Texas today Governor Alfred E. Smith tried on the latest edition of his never ending succession of brown derbies, the war bonnets that have featured every Smith campaign for the past quarter century.

The Governor greeted reporters with a smile in the executive office shortly before noon, but while he chatted with them freely he continued his policy of saying nothing about the convention or his own prospects.

"For the benefit of the newcomers," he said, "I think I'd better show the latest thing in brown derbies."

Walking across the room to a hat rack he took down a deep

chocolate derby that had arrived as a gift by the morning mail and set it jauntily on his head.

"How many of those do you

get a day?" he was asked.

"Four so far today," he said, "but only one in a dozen is wearable. This one though, is good. This is official."

The Governor said that he would listen to the keynote speech tonight on the radio in the executive mansion.

AL NONCHALANT

"That's Some Band" Is His Comment On Convention

ALBANY, N. Y., June 26.—(AP)—Wearing a bunch of four leafed clover in his coat lapel, Gov. Alfred E. Smith went about his state duties today paying but occasional attention to the Texas convention.

When the convention opened he was attending a meeting of the state building sites commission and he shut the door of the conference room so that he would not be disturbed by the report of the convention coming in on an emergency radio set in the executive offices.

After the building sites meeting was over the Governor entered his office and sat down for a moment before the radio.

"That's some band," was his only comment on what he heard.

Herbert Hoover fixed prices of American farm products during the war, Reed charged, for the purpose of benefitting the "British and allied buyers."

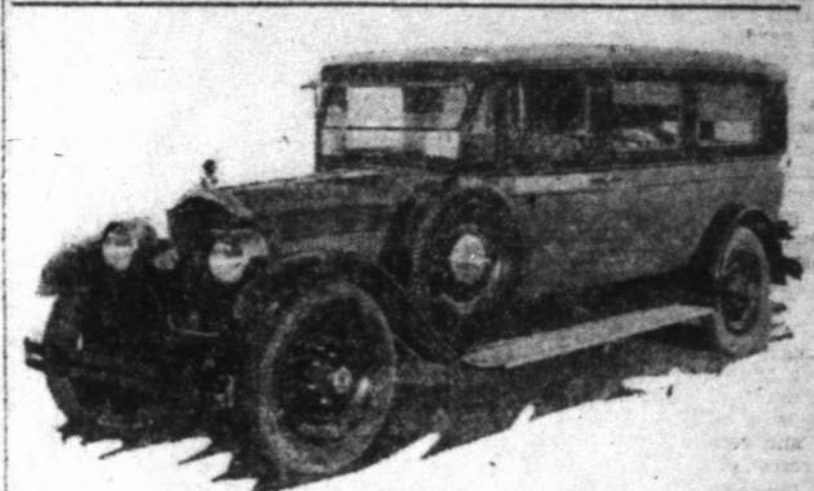
Undaunted by the increasing claims of the Smith forces the silver-haired campaigner turned loose his statement against Hoover today as part of his campaign for the democratic nomination.

Moody and Jones, Everywhere Loom Before Delegates

Governor Is Most Worried Over Securing Boney Dry Plank; Jones Over Looking After Delegates.

HOUSTON, June 26. — Two distinguished Texans—more than ever the limelight since the Monday election—were in the city today for the purpose of working out their primary positions in the national convention. Gov. Dan Moody conferred with representatives of at least 10 states, framing a mutually acceptable plank. Jesse Jones of Houston, who brought the convention to this city, was from lack of sleep, kept a ceaseless activity on convention arrangements—seeing that the "thousand visitors to Texas" well provided for.

Meantime, Texas' 40 votes, wielded by men and women, stood ready to be cast for Mr. Jones as president. Whether Governor Moody or some other state leader offer Mr. Jones to the convention has not been decided.

Texas Plank Favored.

Governor Moody got the impression from a majority of his colleagues that the Texas plank was promulgated by the Beaufort state convention. "At least it did not seem too bad to suit them," the governor thought Tuesday night. "Some of them want to change the wording little bit."

Among the youthful executive's inferiors were members of the convention platform committee from Georgia, Alabama, North Carolina and Virginia and dry spokesmen from Tennessee, Florida, Pennsylvania, Utah, Idaho and Missouri.

Moody Given Oxygen.

Governor Moody got a stirring injection as he led the Texas delegation into the mammoth convention Tuesday noon, carrying a large blue Star flag. As the visiting delegation saw whose reddest blood was half hidden by the flag folds, they cheered and jumped to their feet. Even some of the "wet" Maryland delegation seated just in front of the Texans cheered. One came from the free state ranks.

However, the demonstration was greater than the one for former Jimmy Walker of New York.

Jesse Jones Busy.

Mr. Jones, now fully accredited as Texas' "favorite son," said Tuesday night at his suite atop the Lathrop hotel where Texas headquarters are, that he has had no rest on his probable strength outside the Texas 40 votes.

"I haven't made the slightest move to solicit any support from my quarter," Mr. Jones said. "I've been too busy with these convention arrangements to think much about that."

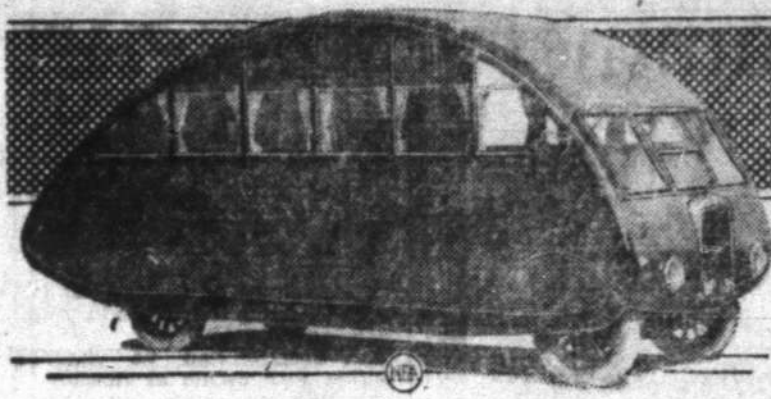

COOLIDGE WORRIES MORE OVER FISH

SUPERIOR, Wis., June 26. (AP)—The opening of the National Democratic convention in Houston today caused no ripples in the ordinary White House routine here. President Coolidge's quiet and sunny life on the Brule river was disposed to continue without interruption, with attention being devoted to what business was at hand but with the natural beauty and the open air recreations of Cedar Island Lodge claiming first place in the day's activities.

Mr. Coolidge had no closer contact with events at Houston than the average voter, the daily press and the radio being his only sources of information. The radio at the Lodge, however, has proved very unsatisfactory so far owing to the interference caused by the Little Power station on the estate itself.

ed. The standard bearers made up the major part of the procession while the delegates cheered. Wiers' keynote was the principal business of the night session, the remainder of the time being taken up with necessary routine, such as the appointment of committees and adoption of rules of procedure.

In sentences loaded with the shrapnel of irony and invective, the New York Evening World editorial writer called the roll of the scandals of the last two republican administrations; declared the portion of the farmer had become one of thorn and thistles, while other industrialists fattened on tariffs and subsidies; asserted that "the plunder hand of the power monopoly was threatening to tighten its grip on public utilities; described the Coolidge policy in Latin America as "dollar diplomacy" conducted in the interest of American business; accused the party in power of having sent "bureaucratic agents swarming over the land like the locusts of Egypt" and warned his fellow democrats that republicans now were seeking to "drug the conscience of the nation with the doped soothing syrup of a fake prosperity."

"What Prosperity?" "We want to know what prosperity they mean," he said. "They point to a few powerful corporations enjoying paternalistic privilege and our answer is that you cannot judge the prosperity of a people by the earnings of a privileged monopoly."

"Four million jobless men is not prosperity; a million abandoned farms is not prosperity; the utter ruin of the basic industry is not prosperity; the failure of 4,000 banks in the seven years of normalcy is not prosperity; the failure of 23,146 business firms in 1927 is not prosperity."

"Do they offer us their claim of the payment of eight billions of the public debt up to July of last year? Our answer is that six and one third billion of this amount was paid with money or the cash assets of the Wilson administration. "Do they offer us their record of economy? Our answer is that with the elimination of the interest on war debts, the last three years of this regime has cost the people more than four and a quarter billions more than the last three years of the Wilson administration. Calls It "Mythical."

"Mythical prosperity, mythical economy, mythical facts, mythical figures, and mythical men—the last eight years may well be treated by the historian of the far future as the mythical age of American history."

The keynoter directed his accusations repeatedly at Secretary Mellon whom he described as a disciple of Hamilton and the direct personal beneficiary of governmental policies which the Republicans were now refusing to extend to the farmers.

In tracing out the Veterans' Bureau, Dougherty and Tapot Dome scandals he recounted how "Will Hays had sought to turn over the Sinclair bonds to Mellon," who, he said, "made no protest against the party taking its share out of the pot filled by the pillaging of the nation's properties."

Declaring that at Kansas City it was Hamilton and not Lincoln, to whom the Republican party bowed in homage, Mr. Bowers added that "it could hardly keep the Lincoln mask on its face, and Sinclair's money in its chest."

He wound up a detailed denunciation of centralized authority in government and finance with this prediction: "Give the plunder band but eight years more of such governmental cooperation and a combination of power companies will put a few men in control of the public utilities of a mighty empire. Once in position and entrenched the plunder band of the powerful monopoly cannot be dislodged by the fighting force of a dozen fighting Andrew Jacksons."

Farm Situation "Disgrace." "The speaker described the farm situation as a disgrace to American civilization."

"And what does the ruling caste say to this?" he asked. "It calls it 'farmers depression' and what does it propose? It proposes that the farmers shall become better business men."

"Now when it suits the pleasure of the privileged to legislate money into its coffers, it is applauded by the claque as patriotic statesmanship; but when the farmer demands his share in the unhappy game of paternalism they denounce him as a radical and a crank."

"One day the head of the state by a scratch of the pen increased the tariff lot of the pig iron industry by 50 per cent and the next day he delivered a homily to the farmers on the wickedness of expecting profits from the government act."

"We do not ask paternalistic

WAR PLANNED, RUMOR

Italy and Hungary Reported Against Soviet

VIENNA, June 26.—Bela Kun, the fiery communist who is being held in Austria on a charge of entering the country after having been expelled, caused a sensation in court today when he declared that the reason he had come to Austria was because the third international had cumulative proof that Italy and Hungary were preparing for war against Soviet Russia.

Other countries would be dragged into this war, said the erstwhile leader and the "proletariat would be made fodder for their cannon."

Bela Kun was defiant and almost insolent in his attitude toward his three judges. The Hungarian government has sought to have him extradited to Hungary to face charges of murder growing out of his rule in that country several years ago, but thus far the Austrian government has declined to hand him over.

Austrian police have asserted that his presence in Vienna was part of a plot to inaugurate a fresh communist regime in Hungary under the patronage of Moscow. He entered Austria under a false German passport, an offense punishable by 90 days in jail.

DULANCHINCO, Hidalgo, Mexico, June 26. (AP)—Jose Bernal Castillo, candidate for congress was shot and killed here today during a pistol fight between two rival political groups.

That is the slogan of the local chautauqua committee, which met yesterday morning to lay final plans for the appearance here of the chautauqua. The committee, which plays in Lubbock for six days starting Saturday.

R. S. Williams, of the Citizens National bank, was selected president of the 1928 program association. Bob Hester was selected as secretary and treasurer. Miss Elizabeth H. West as chairman of the ticket committee, and Claude H. Grollman as chairman of the grounds and site committee. These committees began their work this afternoon. All signs of the guarantee have been asked to attend a second meeting of the group at 6 o'clock tomorrow afternoon in the city hall.

In a vote of all those present it was decided to lower the price of the season tickets this year from \$2.75 to \$2.50 and charging a fee of \$1.00 for season reserve seats. Students season tickets will sell for \$1.50 while child's tickets will go for \$1.00.

DAILY MARKETS

WALL STREET STOCKS

NEW YORK, June 26. (P)—Stock prices gave an impressive demonstration of strength today in the face of an increase from 6 1/2 to 2 per cent in the call money rate. In general, the best prices of the day were recorded after the high rate went into effect. Final quotations disclosed a long list of gains ranging from 1 to nearly 9 points in the active industrials and rails, and from 10 to 15 points in a few specialties. There were a few soft spots.

Trading was only moderate in volume but total sales of 1,413,300 shares were nearly 50 per cent above those of yesterday, the quietest session since November, 1926.

Marking up of the call money rate followed the calling of about \$30,000,000 in bank loans, but caused little surprise. There was no change in other monetary accommodations.

Buying of the oils was stimulated by publication of private estimates of a sharp decrease in crude oil production last week, the Oklahoma output being the lowest in some time. Houston jumped 5 1/2 points, Atlanta reaching 4 1/4 and Richmond 2 1/4.

CHICAGO, June 26. (P)—Rain delays to harvesting in Kansas and Oklahoma, with hail damage to crops in Nebraska, had a bullish effect today on the wheat market. Corn also developed strength, owing partly to prolonged wet weather south accompanied by reports that in farm work there cotton will be given preference over corn.

Closing quotations on wheat were: No. 1, 1-3/4 to 1-1/2 net higher. No. 2, 1-3/4 to 1-1/2 net up. No. 3, unchanged to 3-8c advance and provisions unchanged to a rise of 30c.

COTTONSEED OIL. NEW YORK, June 26. (P)—The cottonseed oil market was active and strong today closing 18 to 27 points higher, late months going above the 11 cent level.

Sales 36,700 barrels. Prime crude nominal prime summer yellow spot 10.35; July closed 10.38; September 10.80; October 10.80; December 11.04; January 11.05.

PORT WORTH LIVESTOCK. PORT WORTH, June 26. (P)—The cattle trade here today generally was steady. Steers sold from \$9.60 to \$11.25, cows \$8.00 to \$8.50 and calves \$12.00 to \$12.25.

Hogs were 10c to 15c lower, with the bulk selling from \$9.50 to \$10.40 and pigs \$4.25 to \$4.30.

Sheep were uneven, lambs selling 50c to 50c higher and yearlings steady. Lamb prices ranged from \$13.50 to \$15.00.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON. NEW ORLEANS, June 26. (P)—After reacting from an early advance the cotton market strengthened on later trading under good trade and speculative buying induced by various bullish influences and rallied to levels approximately \$3 a bale over the previous close. The advance met resistance by early buyers, and the market closed very steady at a net advance of 45 to 50 points.

Funeral Here, Interment At Vernon

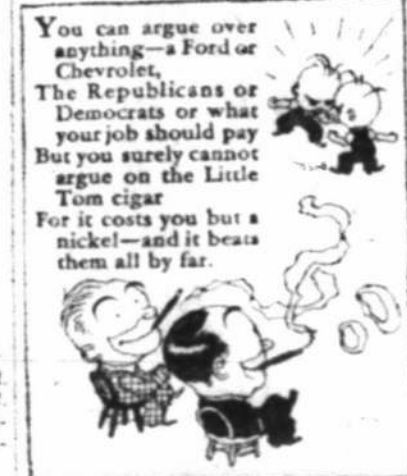
