H. D. Agent Work Discontinued In Co. By Com. Court

The Commissioner's Court of Knox county has taken action to discontinue with the work of the county home demonstration agent, and Miss Grace Nelson, who has been in charge of this work in the county for the past several years, has been advised that her services will be dispensed with, effective February 1st. This action was taken by the court at Benjamin on Thursday of last week, we are told.

The action was taken as a measure of economy, it is said, and while no action was taken on dispensing with the services of the county farm agent, we are informed that this position too will likely fall under the program of economy being invoked by the court.

Members of the local Home Demonstration Club, and club members in all parts of the county, have been busy the past week circulating petitions asking that the court rescind its action in dispensing with the work and it is likely that a strong protest will be made to the court at its next meeting.

The work of the home demonstration agent has proven very effective in the county during recent years, and many thousands of dollars worth of goods have been conserved under her supervision, and it is the contention of those who have taken an active interest in the work of the agent that her services are needed more during times like we are now experiencing than in normal times.

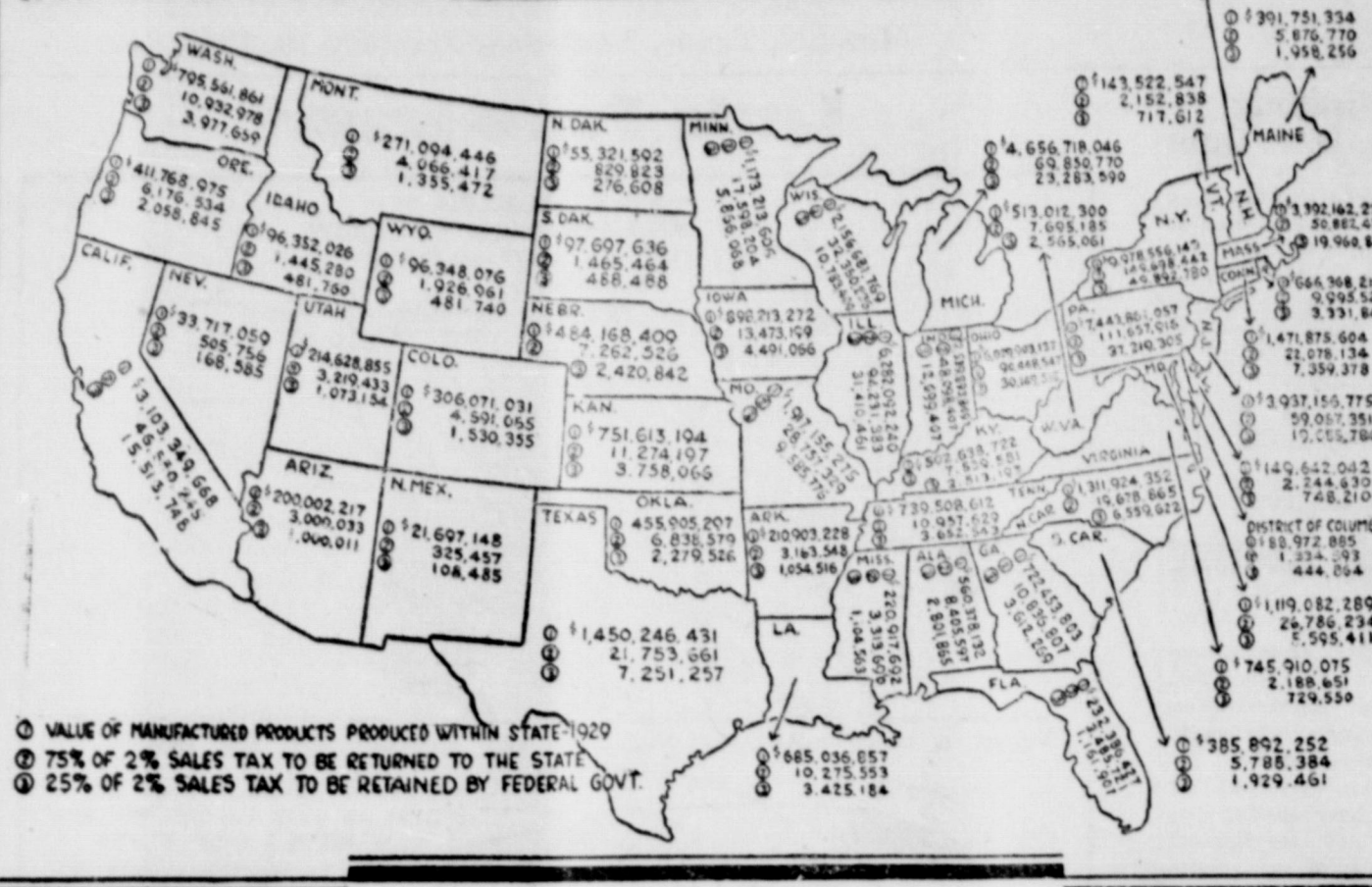

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THE SALES TAX

The editor accompanied Chas. Foyle, D. T. Mauldin and R. G. Campbell to Wichita Falls on Friday evening of last week for the purpose of attending the annual president's dinner of the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce and hearing Honorable "Mike" Conner, Governor of Mississippi, speak, and every feature of the evening's entertainment was enjoyable to the fullest extent.

The address of Gov. Conner was devoted in the main part to a discussion of the sales tax and its application in Mississippi, and from the manner in which the tax has worked in that state it seems that other states will not be long in following Mississippi's lead in its adoption in some measure. However, Gov. Conner stated that one of his first acts after having assumed the reins of government in that state was to reduce the cost of state government one-third, and the reduction of governmental costs together with the successful application of the sales tax has about solved the financial problems in that state, and already petitions are coming to his office asking that the tax be increased from 2 cents on each dollar to 3 cents with a provision that the added 1 cent be left in the various counties in which it is collected. Gov. Conner stated that with such a sales tax the ad valorem tax could eventually be abolished in Mississippi.

Gov. Conner stated that in Mississippi prior to the enactment of the sales tax law property owners were over-burdened with taxes and home ownership had ceased to be the aim of the people, but that since the sales tax has been in operation and the ad valorem tax for state purposes had been reduced, and prospects were that ad valorem taxes for both state and county maintenance would be eliminated, people are taking a new interest in his state at a cost of frantically acquiring of property.

The Mississippi governor impressed his audience as being a real statesman, a sound reasoner and a man capable of bringing about efficiency in government to the extent that it has been brought about in great business organizations. He stated that the sales tax had been administered in his state at a cost of a fraction over three per cent, which is a record of itself.

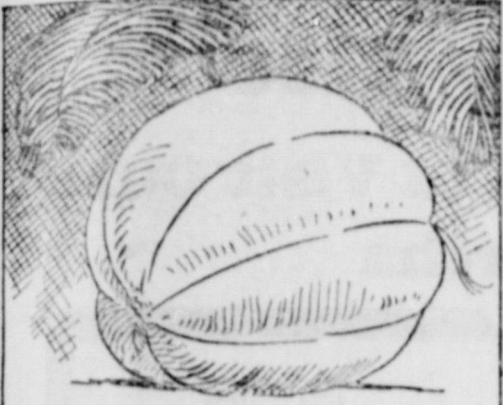
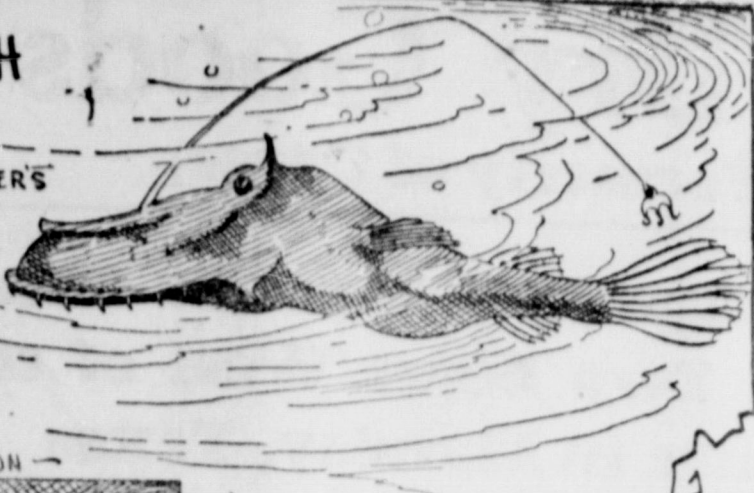

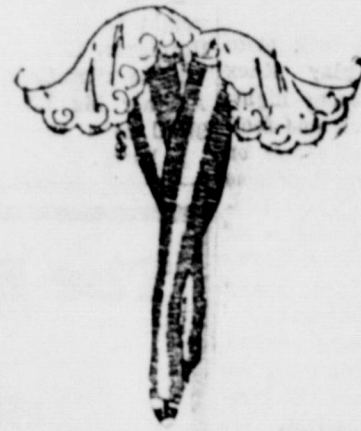
