OLD FRIENDS CLEAR ROAD OF SNOW FOR COOLIDGE FUNERAL

LEADING CITIZENS LABOR FOR LOVE OF MAN WHO IS DEAD

BURIAL IS TODAY
HILLSIDE CEMETERY TO BE FINAL RESTING PLACE

PLYMOUTH, Vt., March 19.—Plymouth, sorrowing, is preparing to clear the snow from the winding road that leads to the Coolidge family burial plot in the little hillside cemetery where the father of the president of the United States will be laid to rest Saturday afternoon.

Meanwhile, the farm house where Colonel Coolidge died at his son's bedside, is being prepared by special train in a vain effort to reach the bedside before the end, has become hallowed ground to the stern men of Plymouth. None approaches the house where President Coolidge, Mrs. Coolidge and John, their son, are alone with their dead. None asks what transpires inside the snow-banked walls.

Brief funeral services will be held in the farm house in which the dead patriarch administered the oath of office which made his son the thirty-third president of the United States. Then, when the icy layers of snow have been cleared from the Ludlow road and the wagon road leading into the cemetery, the remains will be taken for burial in the plot where, nearly two years ago, the Coolidges gathered about the grave of Calvin J., the president's son.

By automobile from Woodstock to Bridgewater and thence by sleigh, President and Mrs. Coolidge reached Plymouth nearly 12 hours after Colonel Coolidge had breathed his last. The presidential party, which included Attorney General Sargent, remained in the Coolidge farm house about an hour, and then drove in sleighs to Woodstock Inn, some miles away.

Atro Johnson, chairman of the board of selectmen of Plymouth, then obtained a dozen picked volunteers to attack the four feet of snow in the cemetery. They opened and prepared the grave.

These men who cleared the pathways and shoveled the snow from the roads were the foremost citizens of Plymouth, paying this last tribute to their late fellow citizen. It was a duty of affection with these weather-beaten Vermont farmers.

Among them were some of the old friends who had called one by one at the Colonel's request in the last days of his life. There were Orie Ward and his sons, Eli and Sidene, Ed Blanchard, Lewis Rogers, Curtis Derby and others. Soon they had cleared away the terraces of the hillside cemetery on which front the headstones of generations of Coolidges.

Adjourned in respect to Colonel John C. Coolidge, and adopted a resolution of condolence to the family.

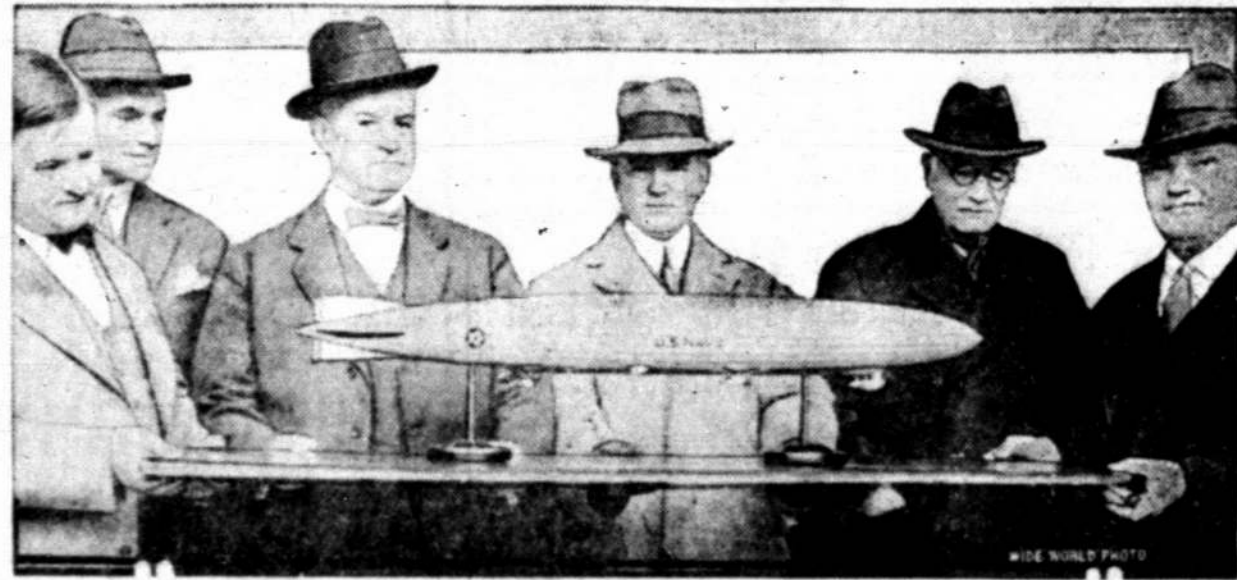
Sub-committee of judiciary committee voted, 4 to 1, to recommend to the full committee that six days each be given to wets and dries for hearing on modification legislation.

MARTIAL LAW FOR PEKIN AS 33 DIE IN RIOT

PEKIN, March 19.—Virtual martial law exists in Peking following the killing of 33 Chinese students who carried on a demonstration against the recent ultimatum of the foreign powers.

Shops have been closed, cable dispatches to foreign countries are being rigorously censored and all public meetings have been forbidden. American and British residents of Peking are divided in sentiment and some of the most prominent members of the American colony are openly siding with the students against the move of the powers.

The ultimatum which brought about the present outbreak demanded that China remove mines from the Pei river, the water route to Tientsin and dismantle the forts on that order that foreign shipping might proceed to Tientsin. China guaranteed that this route should be kept open by the boxer protocol signed with the powers in 1901. Following the yielding by China to the demands of the ultimatum the student demonstrations have taken on more intense form.

TITHING EVANGELIST CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR

DALLAS, March 19.—The balance of gubernatorial aspirants was tilted in favor of the male of the species Friday with the entrance of O. E. Zimmerman of Naples, Texas. In a letter received today, Zimmerman announced his intention to attain the governor's chair in the coming campaign with a platform based on "the law of God and cleansing of Texas."

Zimmerman, who termed himself, as a "tithing evangelist," and who seeks to govern, "by the book" will favor increase of the governor's salary to \$25,000 a year, he declared.

"Higher taxes for this rich and lower taxes for the poor," were outlined as another plank in his platform.

No change would be favored in the state election law outside the adoption of an amendment barring the ballot to foreign born voters, Zimmerman said.

WETS FORCE HEARING ON DRY LAW CHANGES

WASHINGTON, March 19.—Prohibition will be examined fore and aft in the hearings about to be authorized formally by the senate judiciary committee. After great reluctance, four of the five senators on the sub-committee have consented to the hearings and it is expected that the full committee will order them in a few days.

Wets finally forced the dry senators on the committee to permit the hearings by threatening to talk definitely on the senate floor. "We should worry," said one of the dry leaders when advised of the new plans. "The only effect of them will be to arouse our workers out in the country and cause them to work harder for dry candidates. We expect the next congress to be drier than this one just as it is drier than the one before it."

Canada's system of modified prohibition under government supervision will be emphasized by the wets. Canadian officials would be asked to come here to tell the senators about the operation of the system of government stores and controlled distribution.

Senator Bruce, Maryland, wet democrat, has proposed a constitutional amendment modeled on the Canadian plan which all wet forces are endorsing. It would amend the eighteenth amendment by substituting local option and providing government distribution of liquor in localities desiring it and absolute prohibition in localities voting dry.

OPEN GIRLS' DORMITORY AT SAN ANTONIO SCHOOL

MISSIONARY TELLS OF WILD BEASTS AND WILDER MEN, AFRICA

DR. ROYAL DYE, WHO WAS ON CONGO 15 YEARS, SPEAKS HERE

CONVERTED 4050

FOUND NO WORD IN TRIBAL SPEECH FOR "FAITH" OR "HOPE"

Crocodiles and cannibals, slave girls thrown to the wild beasts, slave castles dark with tragic memories, unknown black tribes with ancient civilizations but with no words for "faith" and "hope,"—these were among the things which Dr. Royal J. Dye, for fifteen years a missionary in darkest Africa, painted with words to an intent audience at the First Christian church here last night.

Following the trail of Stanley, marked with white crosses through the jungle, Dr. Dye, his wife, and another missionary went up the Congo in 1899. There, during the 15 years of his sojourn, he established the second largest church in the world. There, last year, he and his fellow workers converted 4050 black men to the religion of Christ.

Dr. Dye last night used a large map of Africa to show his travels into the land of the witch doctor and the eaters of human flesh, pointing out the spot on the Congo river where a crocodile had overturned the canoe in which he was riding, biting a piece out of the side of the boat, while the missionary and his companion swam frantically to safety. He showed where he found seven hundred tribes who had heard nothing of the gospel, but who were skillful and wise workers in metal, pottery, and many other arts, and who had a perfectly developed but unwritten language. Dr. Dye put this language into writing for them, and found in his researches no word for "faith," no word for "hope." He gave them these words with the gospel which he preached.

There he saw a negro chief throw a sick slave-wife to the crocodiles with his own hands when she was of no further use to him. He saw the infant son of that murdered woman driven into the wild beasts in a forested jungle, whence he crept back to take shelter in the hut of the missionary. This lad grew up to be one of the most effective of Dr. Dye's missionary assistants.

Another native who developed into a great aid to him was a girl, who was sold by a savage tribal chief to a soldier, and who served that soldier for two years before Dr. Dye rescued her, diseased and broken, and cured her. This girl, he said, was the brought about the conversion of a tribe of cannibals in this way. The cannibals had killed

Mandamus Dan to Clear Road Bonds

SAN ANGELO, Texas, March 19.—Mandamus proceedings to force the attorney general of Texas to approve \$500,000 worth of Tom Green county road bonds will be filed with the state supreme court in the next few days.

Action was decided upon by the county commissioners here in the sale of the bonds. An Oklahoma City firm purchased the issue at par and with accrued interest amounting to \$11,125, agreeing delivery within ninety days. The mandamus suit seeks to clear up the issue recently aroused when the United States supreme court ruled against the constitutionality of the Texas county bond act in the Archer county case.

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BOLES ASKS ICC TO GIVE PANHANDLE RR FIRST OPPORTUNITY

DENVER AND SANTA FE GET SECOND CRACK AT BUILDING

SIX MONTHS GRACE

IF NOT STARTED BY THEN, WAY IS CLEAR FOR OTHER TWO

The proposed Texas Panhandle and Gulf railroad would be given exclusive first chance at building a new line through the rich South Plains country under the recommendation made yesterday by Examiner C. E. Boles to the ICC. If they fail to do so within six months, the Fort Worth and Denver would be allowed to build from Estelina, near Childress, to Lubbock, connecting the South Plains with the main line from Fort Worth and Denver line, according to United News dispatches to the Avalanche last night.

The Panhandle would, under this recommendation, control the Quanah, Acme and Pacific, use the latter's line from Seymour to McBain, and extend this line 27 miles to Floydada. Thence it would proceed to Tucuman, New Mexico, making 303 miles on its main line, and would be required to build branch lines to Plainview and to Lubbock from Floydada.

In case the Panhandle does not build within six months the Denver will be permitted to build, and the Pecos and Northern will be permitted to build from Lida to Silverton. Lida is two miles from Plainview. The Santa Fe application for a line from Plainview to Dimmitt was, however, disapproved, as was the Fort Worth and Denver extension to Silverton.

The report of Examiner Boles, has been delayed since last July, when he heard the claims of the various railroads which desired to open up the 10,000 square miles of fertile land which is now the last railroad frontier. When it finally came, it was disappointing to many people in Lubbock, who regarded it as merely conducive to further delay. Senator W. H. Bledsoe in particular decried, after a meeting of the railroad committee of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, that the wretchedness of this report would not be taken too seriously by the commission and that the petition of the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains railroad be granted now instead of experimenting for years with the Texas Panhandle and Gulf.

The dispatch from Washington read as follows: "Development of better rail facilities in the Panhandle section of Texas, with establishment of new lines and connections with Texas Panhandle and Gulf railroad, was recommended to the interstate commerce commission today by Examiner C. E. Boles. In addition to construction of the Rock Island's proposed new line of 146 miles from Liberal, Kan., to Amarillo, commission was asked to approve sweeping changes and extensions of lines conditioned upon the Panhandle railroad improving its service. Boles held that the Texas, Panhandle and Gulf should extend its line from Seymour to Tucuman, New Mexico, provided service from Plainview to Lubbock was perfected by lines connecting with Floydada. Control of the Quanah, Acme and Pacific Railroad by the Texas Panhandle and Gulf was urged, and extension of that road twenty seven miles recommended. This recommendation was also conditioned on Floydada being joined by the Panhandle. A similar condition was imposed upon his recommendation for a branch of the Pecos and North Texas line from Lida to Silverton, a distance of thirty miles. The Panhandle was given six months to perfect its system before these alternatives are to be permitted. The Pecos and Northern branch from Plainview to Dimmitt should be disapproved, Boles told the commission. The same conditions, that of waiting to see if the Panhandle would conform to requirements, was imposed on approval of the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains line from Estelina to Lubbock, but construction of the Silverton branch should be refused, he recommended.

Patcher Plaster Offers Easy Way To Fix Old Walls

(Article 3 in a series of Spring remodeling suggestions)

Before walls and ceilings can be re-papered, repainted or recalcimined, unsightly cracks must be filled and plaster must be restored to patches where it has fallen off, exposing the lath. For no surface-decoration will hide these defects permanently. No matter what kind of paint or paper may be used, it is only a question of time before un-repaired cracks will show through.

Patching the walls is essential to the housewife's own satisfaction, but more so if there is any thought of selling the house. For few things can spoil the appearance of a room so completely as yawning cracks in the plaster. Moreover, they are unsanitary because they harbor dirt and vermin.

Plaster of Paris is tried as a patching material. But it never gives permanent satisfaction. A little lesson in physics will show why. Both Plaster of Paris and ordinary wall plaster are gypsum. But each is made according to a special process so that Plaster of Paris is chemically denser than common plaster.

Now, when changes in temperature affect the wall, the ordinary plaster contracts and expands more freely than the denser Plaster of Paris does. So the two materials pull apart and the original crack or other blemish re-appears. This is true also of cements and fillers which sometimes are tried for patching.

Yet the housewife or her husband can not be expected to buy a bag of wall plaster and a quantity of

FARMING AS A BUSINESS.

"Legislation can help agriculture help itself". Governor McMullen declared in an address before delegates attending the convention of the Federation of Nebraska Retailers at Grand Island, Nebraska. The governor declared that the farmer does not ask the government to step in and manage his affairs, but does ask that he be aided in working out his own problems. He urged less talk, less thoughtless opposition, and above all, something tried. "Agriculture is not a local industry in which only the people of the farming communities are directly interested," Governor McMullen said. "It is national in its scope. It represents an investment of over \$8,000,000,000. In economic matters agriculture must be taken for what it is, namely, our basic industry, and our largest industry. If it can be through legislation as other industries are helped then the help should be forthcoming. If the tariff system benefits industry as it most certainly does, then it should benefit agriculture. But agriculture must first put itself in position to receive such benefit. As it is now, it is helped by the tariff only in form instead of in fact. Its protection through the tariff is on paper instead of on the farm. One obstacle in the way of help through the tariff has been crop surplusage. So long as there is a surplus of any crops, the surplus must be sold in competition with world production, and the world price received for the surplus is the price that has been accepted for the major portion of the crop. That is wrong and in every way is unbusinesslike. It's the tail wagging the dog. Agriculture is not asking special favors of the government and it is not asking the government to step in and manage the farmers' affairs. It simply wants help to which it is entitled the same kind of help the government has given industry, labor and finance. And there is another thing agriculture wants. It wants less talk, less criticism, less thoughtless opposition and more action. It wants something tried."

CHANCE

Chance is sometimes lucky. The terrible attack made by Mexicans in a border town on two American girls which led to their suicide was bad enough, but if it had occurred some years back when American-Mexican relations were seriously strained it might have been enough to push the nation into war. As it was the press didn't play it up as much as it might have. Thanks should be voted the Mexican authorities who have promptly moved to arrest and punish the diabolical criminals. The firing squad will be the possibility of the military trial which awaits the brutes. Mexican federal authorities are now vigorously proceeding to clean up these border dens, where vice and liquor have been abounding, but don't forget one thing.

Patronage of Americans from across the border has made these Mexican hell towns possible and profitable. Denied such unbridled liberties as possible in a little town just across in the Mexican town, Americans cross the boundary and transform themselves into hogs and beasts. Is it any wonder that "gringo" is a term of reproach among our southern neighbors?

PROPHETS

Prophets have been proverbially unrecognized. Whenever you see some specially gifted diviner followed by large crowds because of his sooth-saying qualities you might remember that old truth. If he were a true soothsayer, a super-enough foreteller, he wouldn't have a corporal's guard behind him. Italians recently followed the advice of a supposed oracle in betting heavily in the advances tips as to the government's lottery winners. The prophet claimed his father on his deathbed had tipped him off to reading the future. When the government announced the winners, the soldiers had to protect the old prophet from the wrath of his erstwhile worshippers.

ADVERTISING MERCHANTS

The merchant who does not advertise in his own town in order to sell his own wares fails. Advertising, however, may be other than newspaper advertising. The fact that we qualify our first sentence by the second is because newspaper advertising predominates all other kind to some extent that many merchants think that advertising means newspaper advertising.

We strongly urge all merchants to advertise, whether they use our columns, or not. We believe that in this newspaper the average local merchant can get better results than through any other sources, cost considered, but if our mer-

chant friends do not think so we will not quarrel about it.

There was a time when getting business was largely based on kinship, friendship and pull. That day has passed in modern towns. Where modern cities grow business goes to the hustler, and the public impression of a hustler is mainly based on large display type frequently observed.

COMMENDATION DUE SENATE

A movement has been started in the United States Senate to curb the "habit of the senate" of embarking upon numerous investigations.

There is a feeling that congressional and senate investigations are in many instances largely for political effect, and that as such, they upset sound industrial conditions, with resulting loss and inconvenience to the public.

We have the legal, judicial and regulatory departments of our government which should be capable of carrying on proper investigations and hearings where the facts warrant. Such duly authorized proceedings might not be as sensational in character as the "shows" the senate stages, but they would be as effective in getting results and far less expensive for the taxpayers.

SAFE FARMING.

Hon. Clarence Ousley, Director of the Texas Farming Association, in a letter to the editor, recounts a very striking incident which he considered the choicest argument for safe farming he ever heard. Certainly no one is better qualified to judge than Mr. Ousley.

At a typical county seat in North Texas, the first week in February, a meeting was held attended by about two hundred farmers and the bankers and leading business men of the town. Several addresses were made on the present cotton crisis and the danger of further losses from another big cotton crop.

Finally one of the bankers asked that all farmers arise who had corn in the crib of their own production. Twelve men arose. After they were seated he asked that all farmers arise who had meat in the smokehouse of their own raising and curing. The same twelve men arose. After they were seated he asked that all arise who had money in the bank which they did not borrow. The same twelve men arose.

LOCARNO AND THE LEAGUE

It could hardly have been expected that the halcyon atmosphere of Locarno could have been preserved forever. The spirit of peace, goodwill, reconciliation that prevailed there was in many respects a unique manifestation in a Europe which has always been in a perpetual turmoil of conflicting interests. But it is nevertheless surprising how speedily the Locarno spirit seems, for the moment, to have evaporated in the atmosphere of Geneva. To secure the Locarno agreement the allied powers held out certain promises that now come home to make trouble.

The demands of Spain and Poland have whetted the appetites of other League nations for Council seats. Brazil, which has been a non-permanent member of the Council ever since the beginning, is now also demanding a seat, and in such a truculent way as almost to preclude compromise.

As a means of avoiding a split in the League some of these nations have been asked to defer their demands until the September meeting, and the representatives of the fifty-five nations have been called as a lobby to bring pressure in certain quarters.

The most fanciful imagination could scarcely imagine a more burlesque situation among world statesmen. All that is clear is that the League leaders on the one hand and Germany on the other wish to have their own way. But it is typical of the methods that have obtained these many years that resulted in the World War.

TOO MUCH HOSPITALITY.

That all the comic and tragic possibilities of prohibition are probably not exhausted is illustrated by an incident recorded in recent press dispatches, which might form the nucleus of a great movie scenario.

Brigadier General Smedley D. Butler of the Marine Corps, who tried for several months to clean up Philadelphia, was relieved from that unfinished business and ordered to military duty at San Diego, Cal. To welcome the general with due hospitality, Colonel Alexander Williams, his predecessor, gave him a big banquet at the Coronado hotel, where it is said real cocktails were served.

Later in the evening Colonel Williams became intoxicated, whereupon his superior officer, and guest, General Butler, had him arrested and preferred charges against him for drunkenness. The colonel will likely be court-martialed for his offense.

While Colonel Butler probably did his duty, it does seem a shabby way to treat one's host.

Physicians said that Malvy would have to remain in bed for several days they had examined him in the chamber hospital. Doctors among the deputies were the first at his side.

There was tense silence in the packed galleries as Malvy rose to defend himself against those who have charged him with revealing plans for the battle of Champagne in the great war, and have demanded that he be ejected from the cabinet. The minister interior arose to speak after Deputy Ybarnes had made a violent attack against him.

Ybarnes and others accused Malvy of responsibility for the deaths of soldiers executed after the campaign disaster.

Parlians on all side interrupted the speakers during the session.

SCISSORED EDITORIAL

WE ARE NOT PARTICIPATING

The Bulletin is a client of the great newspaper syndicate which is promoting a nationwide straw vote on the question of modification of the Eighteenth Amendment, but is not participating in the movement. We do not regard a straw vote as a reliable index to public opinion, inasmuch as invariably it is incomplete and is susceptible to more or less manipulation; but we especially look with disfavor upon a straw vote on the question of modifying the prohibition laws because we do not regard that question as a debatable one, and any expression of public opinion upon it can have little or no value.

It has always been the contention of this newspaper that the Eighteenth Amendment to the National Constitution provides for absolute prohibition. The Amendment is specific in its direction to Congress and to the legislatures of the several states to enact enforcement legislation designed to prohibit the "manufacture, sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes." The one purpose of the agitation for so-called "modification" of the liquor laws is to evade the provisions of that Amendment for legalization of the manufacture, sale and transportation of intoxicating beverages. Whatever one may think of prohibition per se, there can be no argument about the enforcement of a Constitutional provision. Every good citizen insists upon the strict enforcement of prohibition because the supreme law of the land demands it. Any beverage containing sufficient alcohol to satisfy the demands of the modificationists is an illegal beverage because the Constitution says it is illegal. There is no argument of that question.

The public, some years ago, was given ample opportunity to express its opinion of prohibition. For more than thirty years prohibition was the outstanding political question of America, and every qualified voter during that time had opportunity to cast a ballot not once but many times, giving forceful expression to his opinion. The fight was continued until prohibition was victorious; and to give ear to the minority now, after prohibition has been accomplished in a fair and legal manner, is extreme folly. And it is a minority which is demanding the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment and the modification of the enforcement legislation—there can be no doubt of that fact. Very few who originally favored prohibition made it possible by their ballots to observe its countless benefits. The majority favoring prohibition now is infinitely greater than in the final days of the long campaign against liquor and the interests which were engaged in the liquor business.

So, regardless of the final results shown in the nation wide straw vote on prohibition and the modification of the prohibition laws, The Bulletin will not participate in it.

JOHNNY RISCO WINS DECISION OVER PAUL BERLENBACH, UPSETTING DOPE BUCKET WITH SAME TERRIFIC PUNCH

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, March 19.—Johnny Risco, a powerful Lithuanian heavy-weight, from Cleveland, Ohio, met Paul Berlenbach, the world's light-heavyweight champion, at his own game of slugging Friday night and pounded his way to victory over the Astoria assassin.

The result was one of the greatest surprises of the current fight season, but was justified by Risco's gameness and terrific hitting.

The big round Lithuanian from the opening bell rushed Berlenbach, who was a 2 to 1 favorite, and in the first round connected with a right swing which sent the popular champion to the canvas for the count of four.

Leaping in wildly but willingly, Risco mixed it with Berlenbach all around the ring, and put Paul thru the ropes again with another right to the jaw.

Just before the bell rang to end the second round, the champion went down again for a short count, this time from a sharp left hook.

Risco piled up a big lead at the start and while he punched himself tired and gave Paul time to recover his strength, the Cleveland heavy-weight was there at the finish with a rally which the title holder girded, and which aided the judges in awarding Johnny the decision on points.

Berlenbach did not go down again after the second round, but much had been taken out of him by the damaging punches, and so ineptly was Risco's time punishing blows that Paul was unable to overcome the early handicap.

It was a wild slugging bee through out, neither using science nor troubling to defend himself, although it was only the champion's superiority as a boxer which saved him from the fatal count.

Risco was a tired but happy man at the finish.

ATHEISTS ORGANIZE TO SPREAD DOCTRINES OF DISBELIEF IN GOD OVER WHOLE OF U.S., TO USE RADIO

WASHINGTON, March 19.—Preparations are going forward here and in other large centers for a nation wide campaign to spread the doctrine of atheism.

Although it has been incorporated only a few months, the American Association for the Advancement of Atheism is undertaking an ambitious program which includes the formation of societies in colleges and cities, dissemination of propaganda through newspapers and public meetings and the erection of a radio station to broadcast the denial of God.

"We are gaining converts rapidly," Linn Aegale, Washington representative of the association told the United News. "Chapters are being formed in a number of universities. We expect to organize one at George Washington University here within the next few weeks."

"The average person in this country is an atheist at heart. He does not believe that there exists an anthropomorphic God who occupies the post of dictator of the universe. When he says that God is nature or force, he is just letting himself down easily."

The association took its first public step Tuesday when it protested against an appeal to congress for a change in the constitution to include God.

"The petition of 86 citizens of Allegheny county, Pennsylvania, to congress through Representative Porter, of Pennsylvania calling for the injection of God into the constitution is the most colossal insolence and impudence," the statement issued by the association said.

"One of the sensible things that the founders of the constitution did was to leave religion out of that document. They made it very clear that they regarded atheism, Buddhism and Confucianism as much the religions of the country as Christianity. Every system of thought has an equal right to flourish on American soil and it is not for the government to show favoritism to any of them."

"We do not serve notice, moreover, that believing atheism to be indispensable to logic and clear thinking, we intend to advocate it as earnestly as Christians do their belief and we shall claim the full protection of a constitution which did not and does not discriminate in favor or against any group of people."

"The atheist organizations will preach that the universe is eternal, that there is no beginning and that there is no ending."

"That there is no religion, if you wish to call it that, of now, or hereafter. We do not believe that there is need for worship or room for fear. Our big problem is to elevate man. We deal with present conditions in this life and not with supernaturalism."

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ONLY FOUR DAYS LEFT, AND LUBBOCK STILL LAGS IN SUPPORT FOR ITS OWN BIG SPRING MUSIC FESTIVAL

With only four days left before the third annual South Plains Music Festival, Lubbock has not awakened to the fact that a festival is to be held, according to Miss Mary Dunn, president of the South Plains Music Teachers' Association who are sponsoring the festival that will be held March 24, 25, 26, and 27 and which will bring four American artists to Lubbock together with 300 South Plains musicians who will compete in the music contests.

A guarantee of one thousand dollars must be put up by the music teachers association today to insure the expenses of the artists, Miss Dunn stated Friday afternoon, while to date only approximately one hundred and fifty dollars worth of tickets have been sold. The tickets have been dropped to the very bottom in order to encourage more people to enjoy the festival and yet no interest has been displayed.

The season tickets which will be sold up to nine o'clock tonight are bringing a total of two dollars, the cheapest ever known for such a program. Similar festivals with practically the same artists and contests in other Texas towns this spring are selling season tickets for eight dollars.

The festival has the moral support of practical every organization of business men in Lubbock, according to Miss Dunn. It has been endorsed by the Retail Merchants' Association, the Chamber of Commerce and the Kiwanis and Rotary clubs and others and yet little interest has been shown in the purchasing of tickets.

Tickets have been on sale since March 8 at ten drug stores, and three music stores, and of the money collected to date, the major part came from the public schools, according to Miss Dunn. The stores handling the tickets are: Halsey-Hall No. 1, and 2; City Drug, Bowler Drug, Shepard-Smith, Lubbock Drug, Floyd Beall Drug, Thornhill Drug, Red Cross Pharmacy, G. C. Johnson Drug, Rix Furniture, Barker Bros., and South Plains Music Co. It is hoped that every Lubbock business man who believes that the holding of the music festival in Lubbock is worth while purchase tickets for his family today in order that the guarantee money be wired to New York to the artists.

When questioned in regard to the outcome if the festival did not bring in sufficient revenue this year to cover the expense, Miss Dunn stated that the festival would probably be cut out entirely or cut down to a mere contest between South Plains musicians which would not entail a heavy expense.

Other South Plains towns are giving hearty support to the festival in many ways, according to Miss Dunn and are outstripping Lubbock in support of the festival which will be held here. Slaton people have bought almost as many tickets as Lubbock, situated 18 miles from here, and supporting the festival which will not be held in their town. Reports from other South Plains towns also show that despite the distance a large number will attend the festival.

"Of course it is up to Lubbock to put the festival over," Miss Dunn stated Friday afternoon, "and I feel sure that they will put it over as they have every other progressive move here when the citizens realize the benefits the festival will heap upon the business and social life here."

Last year approximately five thousand people attended the four day festival, a large per cent, being music lovers from other South Plains towns. Music teachers from other towns last year expressed disappointment of Lubbock lack of interest in the festival which is held here, and local music teachers hope, no basis for such complaints will be present this spring.

Learns Law In Pen, May Get Him Out

NEW YORK, March 19.—Jacob Lubin, studying law in his cell at the federal penitentiary in Leavenworth, Kansas, became such an apt scholar that he may have saved himself years in prison.

Lubin was sentenced to a 12 year term in December 1920, following conviction for robbing the mails. As time approached for him to be eligible to parole, it was found that a grand jury indictment, charging subordination of perjury, was hanging over him.

The prisoner's knowledge in law came to the rescue. He wrote his own brief and forwarded a motion to Federal Judge Knox asking that the indictment be prosecuted or dismissed. Today Judge Knox dismissed it and Lubin probably will soon be paroled.

Carter is charged with murdering A. D. Searles and Wm. Devitt when they resisted his attempts to rob them. He used a Maxim silencer on a .22 calibre pistol, keeping the whole city in a state of high excitement for seven days by his uncanny sniping in the streets at night.

DALLAS ELEVATOR BOY TRAVELS 29,568; GOES NOWHERE

DALLAS, Mar. 19.—Joe Nero, elevator boy in one of Dallas' largest downtown office buildings, has ridden up and down far enough to have traveled around the earth once completely and have a good start for a return trip. A check made by the elevator boy revealed the fact that the seven years that he has operated the "egg" he has ridden over 29,568 miles—without getting anywhere. Nero said that he makes an average of 136 round trips from the street floor to the seventeenth every day in the week except Sunday. He travels about 13 1/2 miles every day. onel John Coolidge's monument flanked on one side by the markers of the grave of the Colonel's first wife and his sister Abigail, both of whom died in the month of March, a fateful month for the Coolidges.

On the other side stood the waiting granite slab held for Colonel Coolidge, himself, with the date of his birth, March 31, 1845, and a vacant space awaiting the chiseling of March 18, 1926.

At the end of the row lay the grave of youngest of the Coolidge dead, Calvin, Jr., and between that and the grave of the presidents' step mother three vacant plots reserved for the president, his wife and their son, John.

The service for Colonel Coolidge Saturday afternoon will be brief by wish of the president. The Rev. Dr. John White, who acts as pastor of Small Union church to which the colonel belonged, will use the Episcopal ritual and will preach a short eulogy. If it is desired, but it is probably that there will be only a short prayer at the house and another at the grave.

Throughout the night a sentry stood guard near the bier at the Coolidge home.

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CHAIN STORE MAGNATE BUYS WIFE'S SMILES WITH MILLION DOLLARS IN COMPROMISE OF FAMOUS KRESGE SUIT

NEW YORK, March 19.—"There are smiles that make me happy," sang the soldiers and sailors and their sweethearts towards the close of the world war, but none sang of smiles valued at \$10,000,000 by the smiler, which have just been purchased for a sum said to be in excess of \$1,000,000 by Sebastian S. Kresge.

The smiles of Kresge's own wife, the former Doris Mercer, have been bought by the big chain store man at a price which, if not all that was asked, still constitutes a very fair market price for the commodity.

Kresge has settled out of court his wife's suit whereby she sought to obtain 2,500 shares of chain store stock which she says he promised her in a pre-marital agreement. He is understood to have paid more than \$1,000,000 in cash, no stock being involved in the settlement.

The million dollars came in nickels, dimes and quarters from the S. S. Kresge chain stores.

During the trial, before Supreme Court Justice Wagner brought about a temporary reconciliation, Max D. Steur, Kresge's attorney, created a sensation by declaring that Mrs. Kresge had demanded \$10,000,000 in consideration of a pleasant smile and a cheerful "good morning" to her ardent spouse. Steur declared Mrs. Kresge's brother, a Pittsburgh clergyman, had gone to the chain store millionaire and said:

"You know I think that if you were to give Doris ten million dollars in cash, she would consent to

be pleasant to you."

Kresge, although infatuated with his wife, who had cooled towards him after he failed to deliver to her the 2,500 shares of stock which she had expected as a wedding gift, thought the price too high.

The difficulties of the Kresges arose over the question of where extravagance stopped and stinginess began.

"He was free enough with his money in a large way," said Mrs. Kresge. "He gave \$1,000,000 to the Ku Klux Klan and another million to the anti-Saloon League. Then he used to go out and bring in the milk bottles so as to be sure and get the nickels back on them."

In Kresge's eyes his highly desirable and unusually beautiful wife was the soul of extravagance. When he brought her home a toy dog, she demanded a square cut emerald.

Both Kresge and his wife had been previously married. Before they were free, they agreed to wed, and the millionaire gave his prospective bride a large block of stock as an engagement present.

In her suit, however, she charged that he had promised 2,500 shares more in exchange for her signing away her dower rights and that he had failed to deliver the stock.

Justice Wagner, before whom the case was tried called both parties together and attempted to reconcile them.

Kresge was exceedingly willing, his wife having been living apart from him during the past year. Mrs. Kresge held out for her price. The announcement Friday that a settle-

ment had been reached, friends declared, meant that the millionaire had paid approximately \$1,300,000 which was what Mrs. Kresge would have received as her dower rights.

Kresge's wife smiles upon him once more, but whether the reconciliation is to be permanent, remains to be seen. Close friends of Mrs. Kresge say it will not be. They say that Kresge had better make the most of his \$1,000,000 worth of smiles while he still is within range, for his wife's ambition is to take up an operatic career, which does not include her husband.

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LADY SUFFOLK DIGNIFIES SCRAMBLE FOR FIFTY MILLIONS BY BRINGING BURKE'S PEERAGE MANNER INTO COURT

CHICAGO, March 19.—Lady Suffolk, charmingly dignified, has thrown the weight of her English drawing room personality into the court battle for millions with her American brother, Joseph Leiter.

While her attorneys clash with the opposition over technical points in the trial by which she hopes to oust her brother as administrator of the \$50,000,000 estate left by their father, Lady Suffolk sits erect in the witness chair, smiling and calm.

Joseph Leiter seemed to be boiling with anger but the oftener he arose from his seat to whisper words of advice to his attorneys, the more composed became Lady Suffolk. Her own placidity was obviously irritating to her brother and his attorneys.

The clash between the attorneys came out of a clear sky and developed into controversy that proved highly amusing to the large crowd of spectators. During examination by her attorney, Leland K. Neeves, Lady Suffolk was asked:

"Has there been any recognition upon the part of your brother since you entered the court room?"

Before she could reply Henry S. Platt, attorney for the brother, was on his feet with strenuous objections.

"I have seen no recognition on the part of the countess," he said. "There is an old saying in the country from which she comes that is no further from London to Liverpool than from Liverpool to London."

The argument was considered pertinent to the case because it involved the same principles as the suit itself. Lady Suffolk had complained that the estate was jeopardized by the inability of the trustees to agree on policies. Leiter and Mrs. Colin Campbell, the sister who is siding with him, had replied that any friction was of the countess' own making.

Tit for tat, the trans-Atlantic family row wore on with the countess remaining calm and her brother growing red in the face during his conference with counsel. Judge Denis E. Sullivan, finally ruled that the feelings of the trustees might be determined but that the countess could only testify to her own.

This the countess did through the identification of numerous letters which had passed between her and numerous other relatives including another sister, Lady Curzon, wife of the former viceroy of India. The communication showed she had no animosity toward any of her kinsmen but expressed a feeling that Joseph was incompetent to administer the vast fortune alone. The countess's testimony, largely the identification of documents, letters and cablegrams will consume several days, the attorneys indicated.

**MISCHIEF "ON AIR"
AS BROADCASTING
GROWS**

CHICAGO, March 19.—Like the adolescent boy, radio's rapidly growing powers and possibilities are leading it into much merry mischief.

New restraints in the form of special legislation may be necessary to curb pranks it is accused of perpetrating on an innocent public.

Almost daily during the last week some American broadcasting station or its announcer has become involved in difficulties growing out of alleged "abuse of the ether."

In one instance a man was thrown in jail for setting up a radio hoax and cutting the outside world off from a program which the speakers believed was being broadcast.

Another man was thrown in jail for broadcasting alleged slander but had to be released because there was no law against "radio slander."

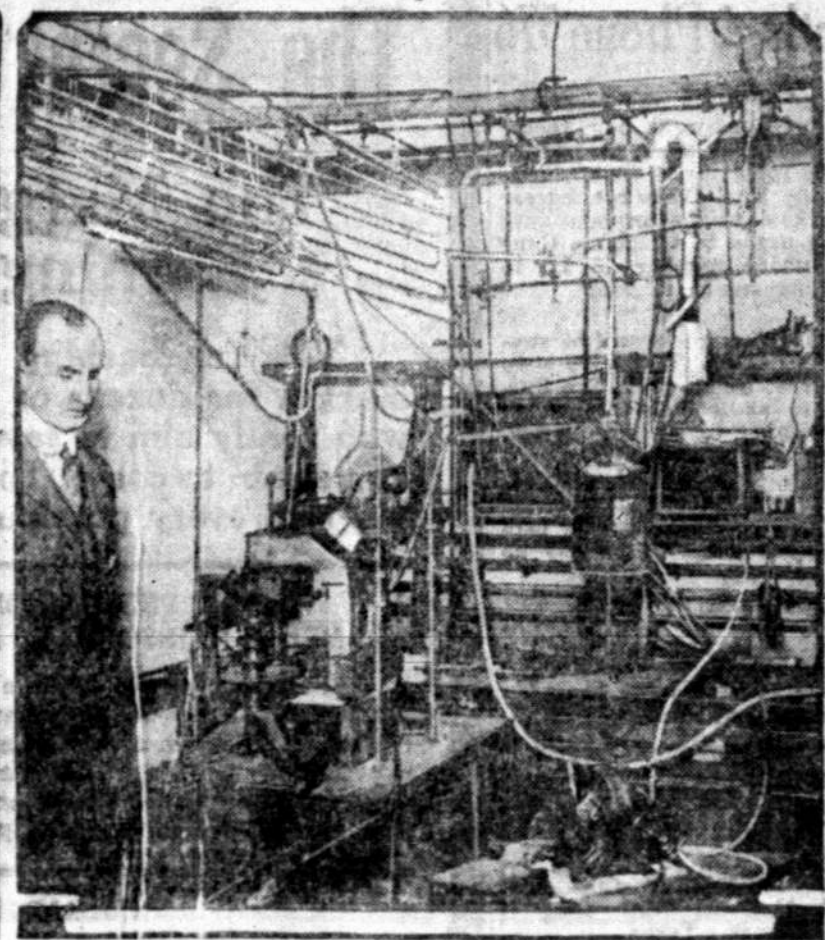
The hoax was a great joke outside of East Chicago, Ind. But within the confines of that village, nobody dared snicker in the open.

Lester Ottenheimer, program chairman of Kiwanis club of the boosters announced a big meeting to advertise the town. The speeches he said would be broadcast to two million "listeners in" over station WGN.

The secretary of the chamber of commerce spoke eloquently into the microphone for 45 minutes. Mayor Hale pictured the town's virtues for 30 minutes more. Everything was lovely until some one discovered the microphone were not connected. Then Mayor Hale had Ottenheimer put in jail. Two hours later he was released because the city attorney said there was no law under which he could be prosecuted.

In Chicago Philip L. Friedlander, was arrested by State's Attorney Robert E. Crowe, for "radio slander." Crowe was sitting in his home

when Friedlander announced over the radio from a loop cabaret that the state's attorney, was sitting at a front table for a night out. The charge had to be changed to one of disorderly conduct.

Crowe said the "slander" was broadcast because he was prosecuting several officers of the radio station on another charge brought by a woman.

Down in Illinois two towns—Elgin and Joliet—have fallen out with each other over the broadcasting of a high school basketball game description.

Elgin's fans claim Michael Wyoff, Joliet coach, stepped to the microphone during the game and shouted:

"Elgin, as usual, is using dirty tactics."

Elgin officials have demanded an apology for the "ether insult." Some stations have taken pains to keep out of trouble by censoring the speeches of their performers before they go on the air.

Officials of station WOC at Davenport, Ia., recently scheduled a sermon by Rev. Wallace Essingham, of Darlington, Wis., for next Sunday night. The pastor has now left his pulpit following a spat with the women of his congregation over an aid society play which is considered immoral. When Rev. Essingham announced he would broadcast "the sins of Darlington women," from their station, WOC officials promptly cancelled his engagement.

Rabbit Drive On Boles Farm To Be Repeated

This afternoon at three o'clock a second attempt to drive all the rabbits on two sections of the Buel Boles place into a wire enclosure will be made by people of Lubbock and the Canyon community, and the more than 125 who attended the drive Thursday and witnessed the results will be on the job again—but this time the wire will be in better shape and the frightened animals will not be able to run through them as was the case Thursday.

It is believed that two hundred or more rabbits will be caught in the drive today.

A number of cars carrying Lubbock people to the scene of the drive will leave the Gene Wofford Tin Shop on 13th street promptly at two o'clock. The drive, which will be held three miles from Canyon school starts at three o'clock.

FARM AID PROSPECTS FADING FAST IN CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, March 19.—

Prospects of any drastic farm relief legislation at this season of congress are dwindling rapidly. In fact it can be said rather safely that there will be none, outside of the administration proposal to aid co-operative marketing unless the political threat of the past became more portentous.

The restless mood of the middle west has not produced the reaction here that was forecast. Members of the house agricultural committee have shot holes through various proposals which have been presented and have used various numbers of these farm relief plans as their weightiest argument. The farmers themselves, can't agree, say the legislators.

This attitude was brought to the floor Friday by a member from the big wheat state, Representative Tinscher, Kansas republican. He took up one proposed measure after another and criticized it, but in answer to repeated questions could offer no solution of his own.

The scene in the house was symbolic of the general situation, uncertainty, hesitation, bickering, with a touch of politics.

Tinscher talked a bit of former governor Lowden of Illinois, who has mentioned by some as a standard bearer for the disgruntled farmer. Lowden came here, "shed copious tears" but did not offer anything constructive Tinscher told the house. The Illinois farm leader is willing for an equalization fee to be assessed on crops for supporting the proposed surplus marketing agency, Tinscher said, just so long as corn is expected. A good deal of corn is grown in Illinois, the Kansas member added.

Perhaps Lowden, would not want to tax the wheat growers, he said, if he should want to run for some office that required the vote of Kansas. Tinscher made no mention of what he had in mind, but his hearers smiled.

The whole agitation Tinscher said, grew from the depression in the corn belt, and he added that the committee of 22 from Iowa wanted to put a fee on wheat, cotton and other crops, which have drawn high prices but not on corn.

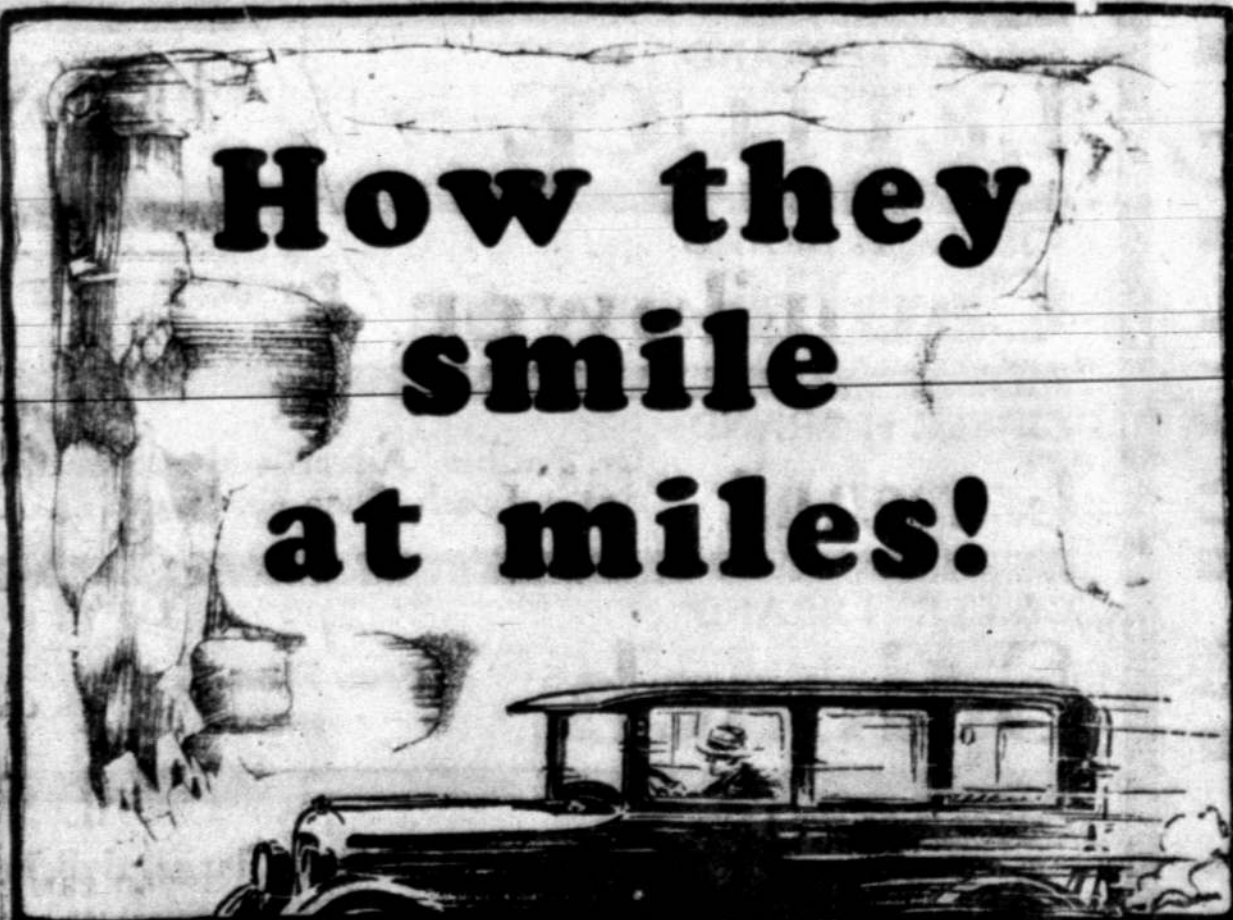

WEST TEXAS CHECK COLLECTING AGENCY

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OFFICIAL WASHINGTON PAYS TRIBUTE TO COLONEL JOHN COOLIDGE, FATHER OF PRESIDENT, WHO DIED THURSDAY

WASHINGTON, March 19.—Official Washington paused in its routine of government duties Friday to pay its respects to the memory of Colonel John C. Coolidge.

The Vermont farmer who died Thursday night as his son, the president of the United States, was rushing to his bedside, was eulogized in both house and senate. After adopting a brief resolution of condolence proposed by Senator Dale of Vermont conveying the sympathy of the upper body to President and Mrs. Coolidge, the senate adjourned without transacting any business. A similar resolution was adopted by the house.

Throughout the day telegrams and cablegrams from all parts of the country and from embassies in many foreign countries poured into the White House and state department. The workers in the White House continued their round of duties, but the bereavement of the president lent a solemn air to the executive offices. Mr. and Mrs. Frank B. Stearns of Boston, long friends of the Coolidge family, were the sole occupants of the official residence, Ambassador Alanson B. Houghton, a house guest having moved to the home of John Dwight.

The White House proper was closed to visitors. The flag was struck, as is the custom when the president is absent.

Friends and acquaintances of Colonel Coolidge praised the late patriarch of the Vermont hill country. "Colonel Coolidge died in the knowledge of the honor and success of his only son—a knowledge which is the greatest boon that could come to the father in this life, and which can decorate with happiness and even the long and painful days when the shadows of death itself are deepening," Vice President Dawes said. "The nation has taken a pride in him and suffered a loss in his death. Its people mourn with his bereaved son and family."

Secretary of State Kellogg issued the following statement: "In common with other members of the cabinet, the news of the death of the president's father, although not unexpected, came to me as a shock. Nurtured in the rugged climate of Vermont, he lived to the fullness of years in the high esteem of his neighbors and all who had the privilege to know him. "He was the best type of our citizenry, and his private virtues were such as to make him the ob-

jective of honest pride to his countrymen and worthy of the emulation of all."

His "character, gentleness and simplicity of life furnished to all mankind an example worthy of emulation," the resolution adopted by the house of representatives said. The death of Colonel Coolidge was the second bereavement which has befallen the White House since the Coolidges came to live there. In the last few years this mansion of the presidents has become a place of sorrows.

In 1914 the first Mrs. Woodrow Wilson died there. President Harding's death was the next tragedy in 1923. President Wilson died a year later from an illness contracted while in the White House. Mrs. Harding died in 1924, unable to bear up under her grief over the death of her husband.

The death of Calvin Coolidge, Jr., son of the president, was the third bereavement of 1924.

Hip Pocket Flask Safe in Kansas City

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 19.—The prohibition sleuths of Kansas City have been told to "go easy" on the hip-pocket bootlegger and concentrate on the big fellows.

Indiscriminate raiding on suspicion is to be abandoned under a new policy, the police commissioners announced Friday declaring there have been recently too many petty liquor arrests.

The commission recommends that the officers get information sufficiently definite to justify a search warrant before making a raid. Under the new plan the vice squad will place every liquor case before the prosecutor, who, in turn will present the information to a circuit judge or justice of the peace, who will, if the information warrants, supply a search warrant. The change in policy is caused because of losing of hundreds of cases in the courts.

"By getting search warrants before entering places of business or residences," M. O. O'Donnell, one of the commissioners said "we will get four times as many convictions from one fourth as many raids."

CATTLEMAN CALLED TO TESTIFY IN HILL MURDER CASE

Ed T. Davis, "traveling sheriff," for the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, arrived in Lubbock yesterday to look after interests of the association and to visit the inspector Lem Chesser and Sheriff H. L. Johnston.

Upon arriving in Lubbock yesterday a subpoena was delivered to Mr. Davis, instructing him to appear as a witness at the trial of J. R. Hill, Yoakum county ranchman and hotel owner, charged with murder growing out of the fatal shooting of one of Hill's tenants in Yoakum county on or about September 24th, 1925.

Spring is Ahead of Schedule in Middle Western Section

CHICAGO, March 19.—Two days ahead of spring's official arrival, heavy weather has overspread the middle west.

Friday was the warmest day of the year over widely separated sections and weather bureau here predicted temperatures would remain well above the freezing point for another 10 days.

A spring like shower with an occasional flash of lightning was falling on Chicago Friday night, but clear skies were promised before afternoon Saturday.

Nebraska reported temperatures ranging from 62 to 78 degrees. Thousands of wild geese are flying over the state on their annual journey to the northland.

As far north as St. Paul temperatures are rising. The heavy snow of last week over Minnesota is disappearing rapidly with the thermometers registering 40 degrees above zero. Agriculturalists of the northwest, however, say the frost is slowly leaving the ground and that spring sowing may be delayed.

Only a few patches of ice remain on Lake Michigan between here and Milwaukee.

Despite several severe blizzards the middle west has experienced a mild winter, according to records of the weather bureau. The average temperature for the last four months is one degree above normal.

Nebraska's winter was the mildest in ten years. There were only two days of sub-zero weather.

Prescription Evil Storm Center In Dry Campaign

NEW YORK, March 19.—The federal drive against New York physicians and druggists who conspired to violate the Volstead act has suddenly widened its scope.

Several hundred doctors may now be involved in the conspiracy, according to United States Attorney Buckner, who sent one of his assistants before the federal grand jury Thursday to seek additional indictments. More than 4,000,000 spurious prescriptions have been circulated in New York city, the current investigation has revealed. Others had been "washed" and the names changed. These were worth 75 cents each to the conspirators.

Genuine doctors' prescriptions calling upon a drug store to deliver to the bearer a pint of rye whiskey for medicinal purposes, now are being sold for \$3.50 apiece.

It is against this conspiracy that Buckner, his aides and Colonel Mills, the new prohibition administrator, are directing their attention at present.

They are understood to have found that more than 500,000 gallons of rye whiskey has been withdrawn illegally from bonded warehouses and disposed through spurious prescriptions.

NEW YORK, March 19.—Military rules have changed one of the entrance requirements to the Hobo club, honorary under graduate society at city college. Candidates for admission had been forced to go unshaven for three months and R. O. F. C. officers objected to their appearance.

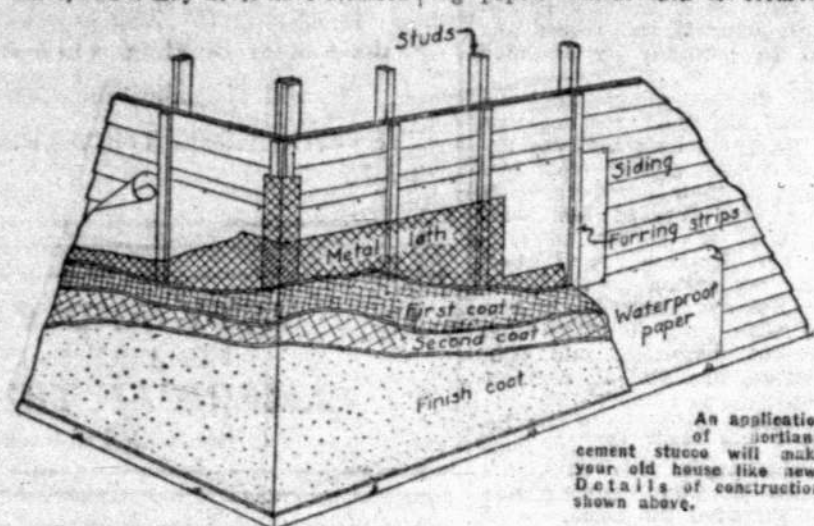

Renewing Your Old House

MOST of us have seen examples of the successful and consequently beautiful use of portland cement stucco as an exterior finish. Practically all of these have been new structures, and it may never have occurred



to the home owner that to give his house a new dress with this fire-safe, permanent building material practically makes the old house new. The increased use of stucco as an exterior finish has developed a variety of texture and color, which gives the new or remodeled house owner a choice from a large number of artistic and beautiful effects. The home builder and the architect can easily agree on portland cement stucco as an ideal material, possessing the maximum of utility, adaptability, and beauty. The owner will choose the texture and color he desires, and the architect will know how best to produce the artistic effects demanded.

Details of construction of a stucco

finish are shown in the accompanying drawing. Waterproof or building paper is fastened to the siding. Furring strips are then nailed to the studding, directly outside the building paper. Metal lath is securely stapled to the furring strips. The first stucco coat is applied directly on the metal which also acts as a reinforcing material. This should be completely imbedded in the first coat. In mixing, use one bag of portland cement with three cubic feet of sand, and five pounds of hydrated lime. Mixing must be thorough to eliminate streaky surfaces. To make good portland cement stucco, the reinforcing and base coats must be properly applied. The reinforcement must be continuous over the entire surface, and the joints must be well lapped and nailed or tied together. Each coat must dry thoroughly before the next coat is applied.

NEW YORK FINANCE

By E. WALTER MOCKLER
Financial Editor United News
NEW YORK, March 19.—Motors
were under pressure for the
better part of Friday and weakness
in this division was accountable in
a large part of the general weakness
in the market. Steel common was
lower and closed around the low
for the day. On the other hand in-
dependent steel, especially those
which may figure in possible mer-
gers, held their own in much better
shape. Rails was under pressure
and found little support in sight.
In the initial cause of the weak-
ness in the motors, other than that
which has been in effect for the
past several days, was the Hudson
report for the first quarter. This
was not really the first quarter of
the year, inasmuch the months in-
cluded were December 1925, Janu-
ary and February 1926.

However, the net suffered in
comparison with the same period
of last year and the street is mindful
of the fact that the big motor boom
never actually got underway until
late in March and early in April.
For this reason, the Hudson earnings
reported an unexpected decline.

Other motors paid the price of sell-
ing in the market, the latter issue break-
ing in par. Jordan, Pierce Arrow and
others of the independent class
were sold steadily.

Industrials are finding little in
the way of encouragement in the
daily reports, despite the fact that
the market is still coming in-
crease. However, there is still com-
ing in the way of business done during the year.

This is regarded as so much water
which has already gone over the dam
and the financial community is in-
creasingly interested in the ten-
tential possibilities of the coming
year.

Brokers loans, as reported to the
federal reserve system by member
banks showed a further material de-

crease. The total of \$2,885,605,000
represents a decline of \$162,783-
000 from the preceding week. With
but a few more days of the present
rate of liquidation and there should
be little doubt but that stock ex-
change loans as reported to the ex-
change by member houses should al-
so show a material drop for March
when reported early next month.

This release of funds as a result
of the selling is going far toward
correcting the uneven position in
the investment markets.

At the peak of the long rise, many
high class stocks and not a few
bonds were selling on an invest-
ment basis showing a yield of less
than the going rate on money in the
open market. When traders were
forced to pay more for their accom-
modations than they were deriving
in the way of income from the se-
curities the sole consideration be-
came the speculative value of pend-
ing developments. Most of these
special developments were in the
nature of stock splits which usu-
ally and nothing to the stockholder
it is largely a question of taking
money out of one pocket and put-
ting it in another.

In cases where existing shares
were split into a large number of
shares and the aggregate dividends
paid on the new equivalent per
share for the old stock is well in ex-
cess of the dividend per share on
the old stock, there has been a real
improvement for the stockholders
point of view. Most of these details
however, have been fully discount-
ed and those who are still to come
must be regarded as individual fac-
tors having but little bearing on
the main course of the market.

Call money held at 4 1-4 per

a market as that now underway makes
but little demand upon the call
money markets as scheduling sales
reduce the total volume of funds
