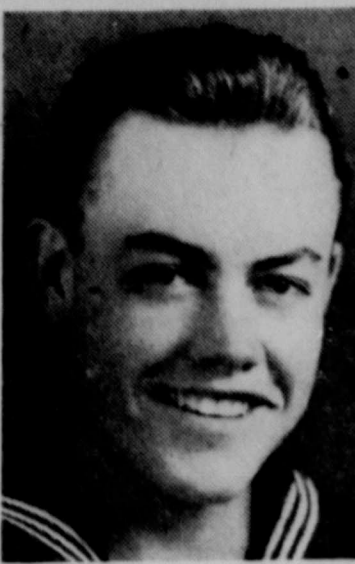

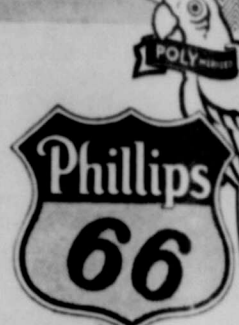

A Needed Investigation

A searching Congressional investigation to learn what plans various government agencies and officials have in mind to change manufacturing, marketing, and other business practices is scheduled to get underway within the next two weeks.

The inquiry, which will be conducted by the House Committee on Interstate Commerce, was authorized when the House, last week, adopted House Resolution 98, sponsored by Representative Charles Halleck of Indiana.

The Committee is specifically instructed, under this measure, to investigate what government officials and agencies are doing and are proposing to do with particular reference to the elimination of trade marks, standard brands, brand names, advertising, and marketing practices.

It is too early to predict with any degree of certainty what this Congressional search will divulge, but it is an excellent idea to smoke out, in advance of their appearance in some formal dress, any radical measures or reforms that might have an adverse effect upon our economy, if such reforms are found to exist.

Miss Mulkey met with mothers of Girl Scouts at the Legion Hall early Monday afternoon, speaking on the subject, "What Girl Scouting Can Offer My Daughter." Later she talked to Girl Scouts and Brownies at the schoolhouse. She also conferred with Mrs. Sibley Jines, president of the American Legion Auxiliary and other members of that organization. The Auxiliary has sponsored all Girl Scout activities in Perryton for many years. Members of the Auxiliary committee who direct the Scout work are Mrs. Van W. Stewart, chairman; Mrs. H. I. Hudson and Mrs. C. S. Carmichael.

The Girl Scout leader was the main speaker at the joint meeting of the American Legion and Auxiliary, Monday evening. Van W. Stewart has been named as one of the members of the advisory committee from Ochiltree county. The other member from this county will be appointed within the next few days.

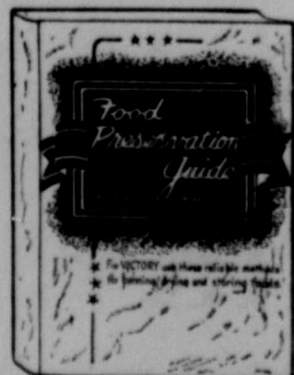

Gives Safe Food Canning Methods

COLLEGE STATION—Only two methods of home canning are recommended by the Extension Service, A. and M. College of Texas, as being safe, preventing spoilage, and retaining the maximum amount of food value, flavor, texture, and color.

One method, says Winifred Jones, Extension specialist in food preservation is to process meats and vegetables, except tomatoes and ripe pimientos, in a pressure cooker. The other method is the water bath for fruits, tomatoes, and ripe pimientos.

She explains that the pressure cooker offers the safest known method of canning the non-acid vegetables and meats because it destroys bacteria in these foods, including the most dangerous—the bacillus botulinus. If these bacteria are not destroyed in the spore stage they may grow and later produce a toxin or poison in the food.

"The worst part about this poison is that you usually cannot smell, taste or see it, yet one small bite could cause death or severe illness," she says. The bacillus botulinus is destroyed by maintaining pressure at 240 to 250 degrees Fahrenheit. In an oven or water bath the temperature of the food inside the jar never goes higher than 212 degrees, because the only way to get liquid higher than 212 degrees is to maintain pressure.

Open kettle canning is not recommended by the specialist because research has proved there is a greater percentage of spoilage and the food often becomes mushy in texture. It is best not to can fruit and tomatoes in a pressure cooker because they keep easily when processed at 212 degrees Fahrenheit in a water bath. Further directions on modern canning methods are available from county home demonstration agents.

Good Health is Vital in Raising Chicks

COLLEGE STATION—Raising what they have is the main problem confronting Texas producers of poultry. According to W. A. Boney, poultry veterinarian for the A. and M. College Extension Service, Texas poultry flocks are 17 per cent larger than at the same time a year ago.

Doing the job efficiently means better brooding, ranging pullets on ground free from visible parasite eggs and placing them early in clean houses with deep litter, sufficient feed water, space, light, nests, ventilation, grit and oyster shell.

A five per cent reduction in mortality of hens would mean an increase of 200,000,000 dozen of eggs and 100,000,000 pounds of poultry meat, Dr. Boney says. Frequent culling and marketing of unprofitable birds is one means of increasing the supply of poultry meat.

Keeping young stock away from old stock, and daily cleaning and disinfecting of houses and utensils protect against outbreaks of disease. Phenothiazine in quantities of 1½ ounces, or three level tablespoonsful, in the mash 100 hens would consume in two days, is 100 per cent effective against the cecal worm whose eggs transmit blackhead to turkeys. It also is effective against the large round worm of poultry, Boney says.

The bluestone and vinegar treatment along with this is proving effective in controlling blackhead and other protozoan diseases. The mixture comprises two ounces of powdered or small crystals of bluestone dissolved in one pint of vinegar. It is administered by putting one tablespoonful in each gallon of drinking water in non-metal containers for two or three days, and never given more than five successive days at one time.

See the county agricultural agent for information for prevention and treatment of poultry diseases.

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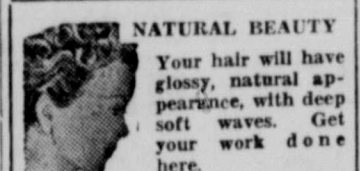

VACUUM CLEANER

Beating rugs by hand is hard on you and hard on your rugs, but it's your only alternative if you allow your cleaner to become damaged beyond repair. Here are a few hints on how to keep it in A-1 operating condition:

TIPS ON CLEANER CARE

- Empty dust bag every time cleaner is used. Dust in bag reduces suction.
- Avoid running cleaner over pins, nails, coins and other hard objects. Pick them up by hand.
- Keep brushes free from lint, hair and threads. Clean after each use.
- If cleaner is not picking up threads, check belt to see if it is turning brush. Increase tension or replace belt if necessary.

- Be sure that brush is properly adjusted. Bristles should extend about one-eighth inch below nozzle.
- Coil cord loosely on hooks. Pulling too tightly may break wires inside insulation where cord bends over hooks.
- Disconnect cord by grasping plug at outlet. Do not yank cord or you may damage connections.
- Follow manufacturer's instructions on cleaning and oiling. Consult your dealer if you have lost directions.

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
