

Chamber Sponsoring Project To Give Community Opportunity For Hospital

The Chamber of Commerce has sponsored a project to give the people of our community a chance to have a hospital. Everyone realizes the desperate need we have for medical services in this community. Much time and money are spent each year in going to and from neighboring towns to see a doctor or to visit a member of your family or a friend that is hospitalized.

This community can have and can support a hospital that is equipped and staffed equal to any hospital in the area. With an accredited hospital, we could have stable and reliable physicians that could perform 90% of all medical needs of the people which would include major as well as minor ailments.

The Chamber of Commerce has appointed a temporary hospital board to serve until an election may be held. This board has been working for several months on ways and means of financing and obtaining the hospital. The hospital consultants that have been working with the board have made a study of the area and community and have made many suggestions. Mainly, they have suggested, and the board agrees, that a 26-bed hospital be built with an adjoining clinic capable of serving two physicians to begin with.

Because of inadequate space and added expense of buying and remodeling the existing clinic, it is suggested that we obtain a new site for the hospital and clinic. A portion of the hospital can, and will be used for a nursing home to take care of our elderly citizens needing this type of care. As we grow, we can be ready to add needed space for the nursing home. We do need a place for the elderly people in our community that is close to their homes and family. In this way, they can feel more at home, can be visited more often by their families, and have the care they need each day.

Everyone is becoming aware of the medicare programs which is causing an overcrowding of hospitals and a need for more rooms. With bed shortages in the existing hospitals, room fees tend to be going up and at the same time, a room is not always available when needed, especially private rooms.

The Chamber of Commerce felt, at the time it first discussed the need for physicians here, that the only way to obtain physicians that would be the kind of doctors the people of this community would want, use, and have confidence in, the kind that would stay and be a part of our community, would be to build a hospital that could be used by the doctor or doctors.

The Chamber also felt that to solicit and accept donations and pledges for financing the hospital would be unfair because of the fact that everyone would be benefited by the hospital (if only because of the availability in case of an emergency) and yet donations would probably come only from a portion that could afford to donate.

By establishing a hospital district, the cost would be more evenly distributed and each could pay his fair share. Hospital districts are becoming the most popular and practical method of financing needed hospitals all over the country. Hospital districts are very similar to school districts. Boundaries are made, a board is elected, the district is created by legal formalities (explained below), bonds are voted, taxes are assessed, and a need is met and taken care of by the people it serves.

The board has placed a notice in the local newspaper of a bill that will be introduced into the legislature in the next week or two. The bill, when acted on by the legislature, will not create the district, but gives the board authority to set up an election for the people, so that they may create the district, and may at the same time or at a later date vote bonds to finance the building of the hospital.

The people can be assured that the needed or added taxes will be set at a very minimum and will not be a burden to anyone.

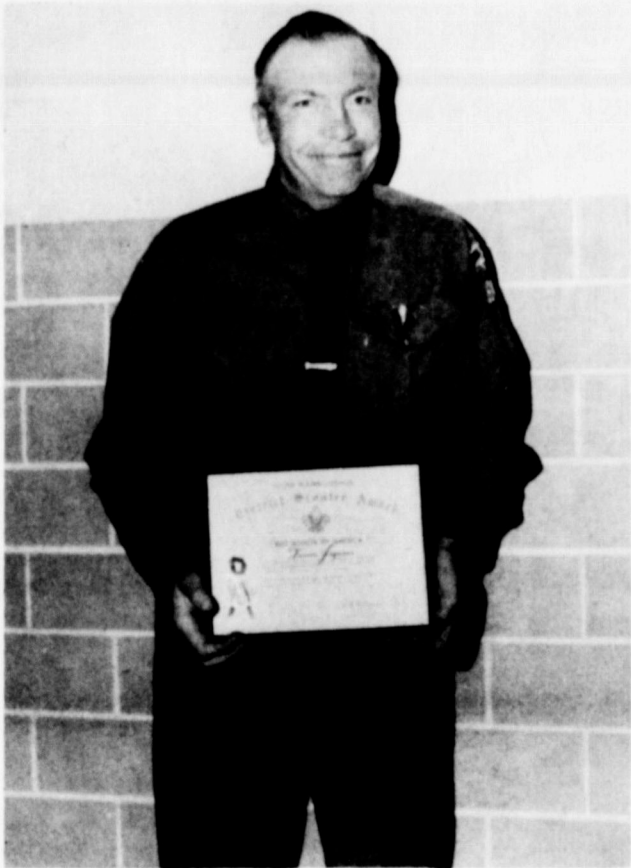
If everyone will consider the expense now being spent going to and from out of town hospitals, the convenience of having physicians in our community, time spent from work or home to obtain medical treatment or in visiting the sick, it would more than offset the cost per each individual.

The notice in the paper has stated the legal maximum tax rate. It is almost certain that the rate will be much lower than the maximum. As soon as the actual cost is determined, and when the board examines the possibility of obtaining any grants, including Hill-Burton funds that would be

available to cut the cost to the community, the board may set the rate and will make it known to the people.

The people of this community could be proud of the hospital they built which, when finished, will not only serve their needs, but will have a very tremendous effect on the growth and economy of the income of this community circulating within the community.

Without the medical services, people are constantly going in all directions away from Earth, instead of coming to Earth from all directions. As plans for building our hospital and locating our physicians develop and progress, take time to be informed correctly and take part in supporting a very worthwhile and needed addition to our community.

EDITORIAL..... WILL IT TAKE A DEATH?

Within a very short span of ten days, two youths of the Springlake-Earth communities miraculously escaped with their lives after being struck down by passing motorists. Motorists who were, in every sense of the word, grossly negligent, negligent not only in a legal sense but in a moral sense.

Both children had just alighted from a school bus. Both children were struck by motorists who failed to heed the caution and the stop lights so clearly visible on every school bus in the nation. This is an absolutely unnecessary type of tragedy.

It is unquestionably the moral obligation of every motorist, both adult and minor, to bear the responsibility for the safety of our children. Little boys and girls who rush across our roads and streets without looking in their eager anticipation to reach home after a hard day at school, are not to blame in any sense of the word.

It is we, as adult citizens of this state and community, that must obey our legal and moral obligations to protect our children. It is we that must heed with every caution while approaching a school bus from any direction and at whatever speed we may be traveling. If we, as moral citizens of this community, do not adhere to common courtesy and decency while driving, the next young and innocent child may not be so fortunate. It may well be, it will take an unnecessary and unfortunate death to awaken in us all the things we already know.

SECOND STUDENT INJURED-

Student Hit By Motorist As He Emerges From School Bus

Within the past 10 days, two local lads, both young Springlake-Earth School students, have been injured when struck by automobiles failing to stop for school busses that were stopped and in the process of discharging children. The lads were struck as they attempted to cross the highway to their homes. Both have by some miracle escaped death.

The first lad, Mark Barton of Earth, was hit by an automobile driven by Ricky Roberts of Hereford on Friday, January 13. He has been dismissed from the hospital, but suffered from severe bruises and scratches, and is recuperating at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ardis Barton.

The second youth, Tommy Brown, 9 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. William C. Brown, of Springlake, was struck by an automobile at 4:10 p. m. Monday as he dashed across the highway after stepping from a school bus driven by Don Larkin, pastor of the Springlake Baptist Church.

The lad was rushed to the Castro County Hospital in Dimmitt where Dr. Bill Lee reported him to be suffering from multiple bruises over his body, facial lacerations on the left side of his face and a concussion. He said Wednesday afternoon the lad was still in guarded condition, being watched carefully, and would perhaps require hospitalization for another week or ten days.

Investigating officer, Highway Patrolman Bill Angel, Littlefield, said the lad was struck by a '57 Pontiac driven east by 21 year old Jerry D. Miller, an airman stationed at Reese Air Force Base in Lubbock. Other occupants in the car were Iva Jean Carr of Lubbock and her mother, Mrs. J. W. Carr of Springlake.

The airman, native of Tennessee, and using a Tennessee drivers license, indicated he was unaware that the flashing lights on the local bus indicated a stop. He said he was instead looking for a flag type stop signal, as used by school busses in his native home state. Failing to see this, he thought all was clear and pulled around the bus.

Larkin, bus driver, said he turned his flashing signals on as he approached the Church of Christ in Springlake, three quarters of a block from where he stopped in front of the post office building, where the accident took place.

He said he looked in the rear view mirror and saw the approaching automobile, but thought the man hit the brakes as if to stop. He checked a second time and this time sounded his horn desperately to warn the driver of the car of the lad who was now in front of his bus, running toward the center of the highway.

The lad's body was hurled through the air approximately 30 feet, according to Larkin. Wayne Cole, driver of the Parsons Funeral Home ambulance in Olton, drove the lad to the hospital. The ambulance motor became heated and Cole radioed for an ambulance to meet him in case he had to stop and transfer the patient. However, without slowing down, Cole made the run to the hospital as Larkin supplied the lad with oxygen.

Patrolman Angel said at present Miller had been filed on for failing to stop for a school bus and the fine would automatically be between \$100 and \$200.

He also stated that he believed the demand for this product would be great. A committee from the local Chamber will be appointed in the near future to work and study those industrial development requirements.

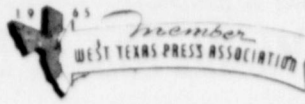
Similar meetings are being planned for the future, and members of the local Chamber may attend.

his students. He uses every proven method and devises some of his own. While learning English, his students also learn social studies, science, interpretation, and an all important and necessary facet of student life, the rich reward one receives from learning.

We can be thankful Cecil is not what one would call an easy teacher. He is demanding, but not harsh. He is stern but gentle. And he has more understanding of and toward his students than most people I have ever met.

One of the best ways of trying to say what I mean comes from one of his ex-students. This graduate of Springlake-Earth High School told me himself that if it had not been for Mr. Slover, his college English would have been almost impossible. What greater compliment could be paid a teacher.

It is so easy for a teacher to become stilted, even stagnated. This is one of the ways in which I respect Cecil so very much. He is not. He permits freedom of expression. He guides his students in the art of creation and endeavors to get them to see the importance of thinking for one's self. And, possibly more important than all the rest, he challenges his students, in just the right manner, to use their native intelligence and not to rely

too heavily on the intelligence of others.

There is a transcendent power in example. We reform others unconsciously, when we walk uprightly. This could easily be said of Cecil. The extra curricular duties he performs are countless but he goes about them with a zest and zeal, the same as he does in his classroom.

I truly believe that Cecil lives by the axiom that whoever escapes a duty, avoids a gain. He tries to instill this in all his students and if they have one ounce of common sense, they will be constantly attentive, because from this man, they can learn.

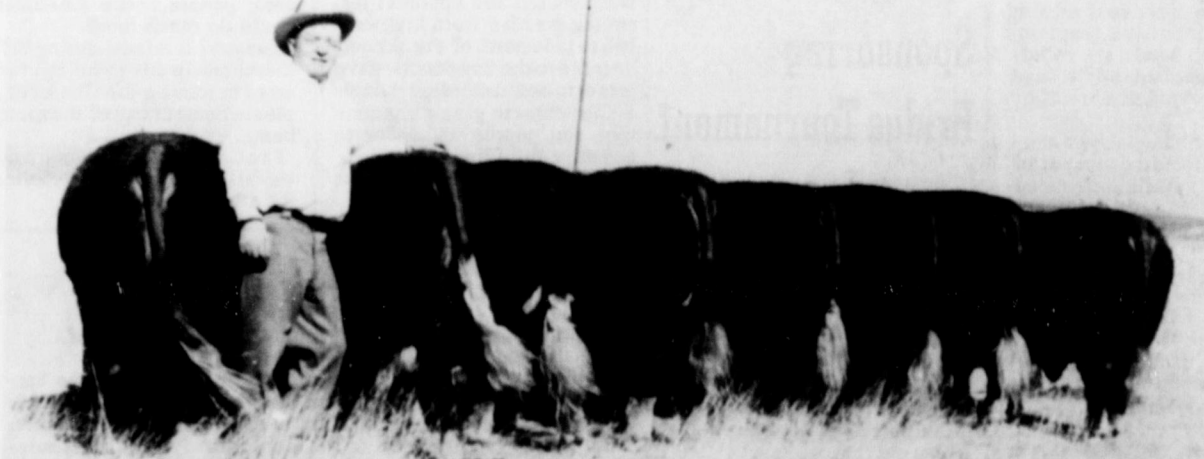

Farmers Required to Pay Minimum Wage For Farm Labor Beginning February 1

Beginning February 1 those farmers on the High Plains and elsewhere who used 500 or more man-days of hired agricultural labor in any calendar quarter of 1966 will for the first time be required to pay a \$1 per hour minimum wage.

The minimum will go to \$1.25 an hour on February 1, 1969. There the escalation stops, unless Washington legislators succeed in their efforts to pass additional legislation. Despite the proximity of the new minimum wage law's effective date, Ed Dean, Labor Relations Director for Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., says explanations of exactly how it will work, and issuance of the extensive administrative regulations that will be necessary are far from complete.

"But there are some unofficial indications filtering down from Washington as to how the law will be administered," Dean says, "and from these producers can get some idea of what to expect."

The most important consideration of farm employers at the moment is the keeping of employment records. Dean advises that any farmer who thinks he may have even come close to using 500 man-days of farm labor in 1966 or

be operating only in the front office of our locker plant.

who may come close to that figure this year should be keeping complete and accurate records.

The law does not prescribe a special form of record, but specifies only the items which must be included and that the records be accurate. So records kept for other purposes will suffice if they contain the necessary information.

Employers who utilized more than 500 man-days of agricultural labor in any calendar quarter of last year will have to record for each employee to whom the minimum wage provisions apply the hours worked each day and each week, the wages paid and additions to or deductions from wages.

Employers who are likely to utilize more than 500 man-days this year are only required to keep a record of each employee's name and address and a count of the man-days of labor in the overall operation. But should the year's man-day count reach 500, it will be to the farmer's advantage if he has accurate records showing hours worked and wages paid.

A "man-day" is defined in the law as any day during which an employee performs as much as one hour of agricultural labor.

Excluded from the man-day count are the employer's wife, parents, children, or other members of his immediate family, and local, daily, commuting hand-harvest pieceworkers who worked in agriculture less than 13 weeks in the preceding calendar year.

For the purpose of determining what counts toward this 13-week test, each period of seven consecutive days in which an individual was engaged in any agricultural labor on one or more days is included.

In a situation where custom work or contract labor is involved, the key is the employment relationship. A crew leader who merely assembles

a crew and brings it to the farm to be supervised and paid directly by the farmer is considered an employee of the farmer and both he and members of his crew are counted in determining whether or not the farmer used 500 man-days of labor.

The same situation would apply if, under the same circumstances, the crew is hired at so much per acre for their work.

In meeting the \$1 per hour minimum wage, employers will be permitted to include the reasonable cost of furnishing employees with board, lodging or other facilities. The "reasonable cost" will be determined by the Secretary of Labor through the Labor Department's Wage and Hour Division, which will administer the law.

However, reasonable cost is defined in the law as the actual cost to the employer without a profit, and would include the cost of operation and maintenance, depreciation, and not more than 5 1/2 per cent interest on depreciated capital, but in no case more than the fair price of the facilities provided.

Another point to remember is that the facilities must be provided for the benefit of the employee and not for the benefit or convenience of the employer.

The Act takes a single work week as its standard and does not permit averaging of hours over two or more weeks. An employee working on a farm subject to the minimum wage must be paid not less than \$1 for every hour worked in each week.

Thus an employer who has customarily paid a straight weekly or monthly salary may need to make some changes if it appears he will use as many as 500 man-days.

On the High Plains it is a common practice to pay year-round workers a straight weekly salary, supplemented with a crop or bonus arrangement at the end of the year. But present interpretations indicate that this year-end income to the worker can not be counted toward meeting the \$1 per hour minimum wage, because the worker will be required to get \$1 per hour for each hour worked at the end of each normal pay period.

On farms covered by the minimum wage law employers are covered by regulations on equal pay as well. These regulations require that employees of either sex must be paid at the same rate if both are doing the same work for the same employer under similar working conditions.

Dean said that, basically, there are the rules and the interpretations which the Labor Department to date has indicated will be in effect. Most of them have been published in the Federal Register with public comments accepted by the Department until February 6.

Plains Cotton Growers has filed vigorous protests to such provisions as these which prevent bonuses and crop income from being counted as wages, but there is no indication as to what effect these may have on the final regulations.

There are a multitude of other questions which have arisen concerning the new law, but Dean says satisfactory answers are yet to come on many of them. But he invited High Plains farmers to consult with him on any individual problems which arise, and promised that additional information would be disseminated as it is received.

DPS Has Manpower Shortage

The Texas Department of Public Safety is faced with the greatest manpower shortage in its history. In order to replenish the ranks of the uniformed services, employment procedures have been changed to allow for immediate employment, announced Major Harry Hutchison, Regional Commander of this area.

Applicants who successfully meet all the requirements can be placed on the payroll within ten (10) days, and will be assigned temporary duty at any of the regional, district or sub-district DPS offices over the state until a recruit training school begins. Periodic training schools will be held at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin.

To qualify for a position in the uniformed services, a man must be between the ages of 20 and 35, not less than 5 feet 8 inches in height, a high school education or its equivalent, sound physical condition, good vision, a citizen of the United States, and a resident of Texas.

is composed of Lonnie Dear, Craig Barton, and Ken Sander-

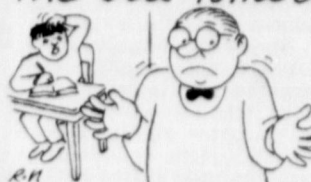
son. Of the approximately 150 boys competing at Tulia, Lonnie Dear was judged the ninth high scoring individual.

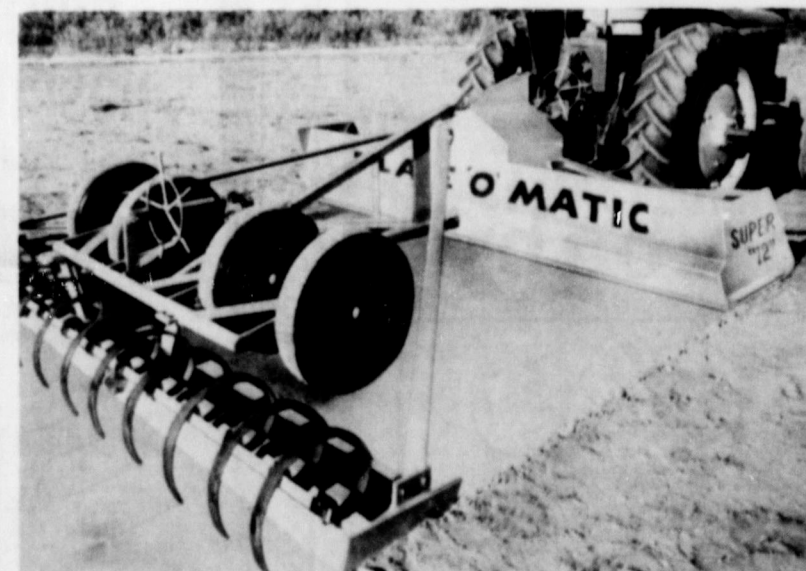

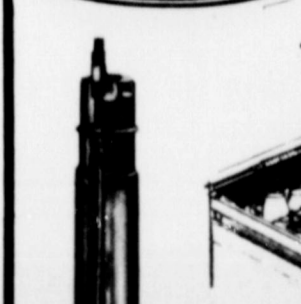

Such legislation shall create a hospital district under Article IX, Section 9 of the Texas Constitution, and shall comprise all territory contained within the boundaries described as follows, to-wit: BEGINNING at the Northwest corner of Lamb County, Texas;

THENCE East along the north line of Lamb County to a point in the East line of Section 32, Block 1, W. E. Halsell Subdivision, said point also being in the East line of Block 1;

THENCE South along the East line of Section 32 and Block 1, W. E. Halsell Subdivision, to a point in the North line of Section 6, Block T-2, R. M. Thomson Survey, Lamb County, Texas, said point also being the Northerly Southeast corner of Section 32;

THENCE West along the Northerly South line of Section 32, Block 1, W. E. Halsell Subdivision and the North line of Section 6 and Section 7, Block T-2, R. M. Thomson Survey to the interior Southeast corner of Section 32 and the Northwest corner of Section 7;

THENCE South along the East line of Section 32 and Block 1, W. E. Halsell Subdivision, to a point in the East line of Section 31, Block 1, W. E. Halsell Subdivision, said point also being the SW corner of Section 59, Block T-2, R. M. Thomson Survey;

THENCE East along the South line of Section 59 and 58, Block T-2, R. M. Thomson Survey and the North line of Section 1, Block T-1, T. A. Thomson Survey, to the NE corner of said Section 1;

THENCE South along the East line of Block T-1, T. A. Thomson Survey to its SE corner, said point also being the SE corner of Section 40 of said Survey;

THENCE South along the East line of Section 6, Block A-5, Lamb County, Texas, to the SE corner of Section 6 and Block A-5;

THENCE West along the South line of Section 6 and Block A-5 to the SE corner of Track 2, League 244, Dickens County School Land;

THENCE West along the South line of League 244, Dickens County School Land and Leagues 239 and 238, Cottle County School Land to the SW corner of Cottle County School Land, said point being the SW corner of Labor 25, League 238, Cottle County School Land;

THENCE North along the West line of League 238,

Cottle County School Land, to its NW corner and the NW corner of Labor 5, League 238, Cottle County School Land; THENCE West along the South line of League 234, Dallam County School Land, Leagues 221 and 219, Castro County School Land, League 206, Ochiltree County School Land to a point in the West line of Lamb County, Texas; Lamb County, Texas, where the South line of League 206, Ochiltree County School Land intersects with the West boundary line of Lamb County, Texas;

THENCE North along the West line of Lamb County, Texas, to the NW corner of said county and the place of beginning. The legislation shall provide that the District shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for the needy residing within the District and shall have power through its Board of Directors to issue and sell as the obligations of such hospital district bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition and repair or renovations of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes and to levy a tax creating an interest and sinking fund to pay interest on and principal of such bonds as same mature, to provide for the operation and maintenance of the District and its hospital system, and for the acquisition of necessary sites therefore by purchase, lease or condemnation, provided that said tax shall not exceed 75¢ on the \$100 valuation of all taxable property within the District.

The legislation shall also provide that such district shall not be created unless or until an election is held at which such election there shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers electors the proposition of whether or not Earth-Springlake Hospital District shall be created with the authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 75¢ on a \$100 valuation of all taxable property within such district, and a majority of the qualified property taxpayers electors vote in said election in favor of the proposition.

The legislation shall further provide that the management and control of the District shall be vested in the Board of Directors composed of five members, the initial members of which shall be named in the legislation and their successors to the Board of Directors shall be elected for staggered terms annually.

The above enumeration of provisions to be contained in such legislation is not intended to be exclusive but only to express the general purpose, nature and substance thereof. Such legislation will also make other provisions and confer other powers in connection with the general purpose and nature thereof above stated.
