Park Facilities To Be Expanded

Public hearings are slated for Nov. 21 in Austin before the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission on the Phase II expansion and building program for Lake Colorado City State Park. State Representative El-

mer Martin of Colorado City was in Austin last week to give information on a strip mining bill he is sponsoring and while he was there, he said he dropped by the TP&W headquarters to find out the status of the park's

expansion program.

A full report was handed Rep. Martin, which will be studied by the commissioners during the hearing, with adoption virtually assured, Martin said.

The plans call for expenditures of \$1,197,641 in construction of new camping sites, picnic facilities and a new trailer dump station.

The first phase of development was completed in 1973.

This development includes a 35 unit multi-use camping area with water and electric hookups, a restroom building with showers; a 25 unit tent camping area with water hookups, 15 shade shelters and two restroom buildings without showers; and a 20 unit picnic area with water service and a restroom building without showers; a four lane boat ramp with two boat docks; a fishing barge; a sanitary dump station; and a 75 acre mini-bike area. Support facilities include the headquarters, service area, a standard residence and a mobile home.

In an introduction to the study, information is given concerning the popularity of the Lake Colorado City State Park for a wide area, noting that it is accessible from all directions and within a two-hour drive of Midland, Odessa, Lubbock, Abilene and San Angelo.

Proposed development of the project will include the redesign of an existing camping area, new camping areas, increasing the day

use area's capacity and support facilities. The proposed development is listed below in priority order:

Priority 1. The area with the highest priority for development is Tent Camping Area I. This area was designated for day use in the first master plan but demand has forced the usage of this site to change to camping. Development proposed for this area includes conversion of existing picnic sites to tent sites. The total number of campsites proposed is 30. All of the campsites will require shade shelters because of the lack of trees.

Planned support facilities include one-half mile of access road, a restroom shower addition and fish cleaning table which will be placed on a T-head fishing pier. The pier is to be salvaged by the original contractor from the first fishing pier which was destroyed by high winds and wave action.

Priority 2. The area placed second in priority is Day Use Area I. This is the area of the original city park before jurisdiction was transferred to the P&W. Facilities proposed are 27 picnic units with shade shel-

Wolves Down Ballinger, 7-6

Colorado City's Wolves pulled off a shocker Friday night as they upset Ballinger's Bearcats, the No. 2 ranked team in the state. Final score was 7-6 with all the scoring coming in the third quarter, with the three other quarters being tough, defensive struggles.

Ballinger never got inside the Wolves 30 in the first half with the Wolves punching down to the Bearcat two yard line before being stopped early in the second quarter.

Ballinger took the kick-off to open the second half, going 70 yards to score with the quarterback Joey McQueen racing the final 12 yards. The try for extra point was no good.

The Wolves Benny Arispe took the ensuing kick-off and returned it to the Wolves 36 where the Wolves started a 64 yard drive, climaxed on a fourth down by a one-yard plunge by Bill Everett for the score with 1:12 left in the third quarter. Steve

Belvin kicked the extra point to give the Wolves the lead and the victory.

With 45 seconds remaining in the game, Ballinger attempted a 41 yard field goal which went wide, insuring victory for the Wolves.

The Wolves controlled the ball most of the night behind the generalship of Quarterback Ray Torrez, the Wolves leading rusher with 93 yards who also completed four of 10 passes for 59 yards and one interception. The Wolves had a total of 206 yards rushing with 17 first downs compared to 133 yards rushing and 10 first downs for Ballinger. Ballinger completed only one of nine passes for 10 yards.

'Wet' Forces Won't Give Up

Requests for the initial application to get petitions circulated in Precinct 1, Precinct 2 and again in Precinct 3 have been turned in to the County Clerk's office.

If successful in getting the 10 names required on each application, special elections on the issue of legalizing sale of alcoholic beverages for off premises consumption could again be held in the county in about two months.

Bob Tammen, co-owner of Bojo's and Tammen Heating and Plumbing here, filed the first application Thursday for Precinct 3. Then Friday, Bill Hudson for Precinct 1 and Glenn Hemphill for Precinct 2 also made the preliminary application.

County Clerk Marie Bassham said that the three men said they would turn the applications back in to her office Monday, Nov. 17, the date the Precinct 3 application is due. The other two would have until Nov. 18, but they said they'd all turn them in together, she said.

Tammen, when contacted by the Record Thursday afternoon, said that when he requested the application earlier Thursday, the clerk's office turned him down, saying that Precinct 3 would have to wait one year from the date of Tuesday's election. He then called Secretary of State Mark White's office in Austin and was informed that another election can be held in the same precinct but not at the county's expense. The clerk also said she had phoned White's office to get the information.

Tammen said it would cost 25 cents per registered voter to hold the Precinct 3 election.

There are 1,547 eligible voters in Precinct 3 as of Thursday afternoon, making

the cost of holding the election \$386.75.

Only 47.7 per cent of the Precinct 3 voters cast their ballots in the Tuesday election on the question of legalizing the sale of alcoholic beverages for off premises consumption only.

Mrs. Bassham said that each of the requests was for sale for off premise only, none calling for sale of mixed beverages as was the case in the Precinct 2 election July 8.

Tammen said that he didn't believe that 402 of the "wet" forces would come out to vote in the next election. The vote was 402 against legal sales and 336 for, a 66 vote margin. Only 738 votes were cast in the election from the possible 1,547 eligible.

Each of the three applications must be turned in by Nov. 17 or 18 signed by 10 eligible voters of the precinct. Names are then checked and verified by the clerk's office and petitions are issued. The petitions must be returned within 30 days and have listed 35 per cent of the voters who cast ballots in the last gubernatorial election.

In Precinct 3, 168 would have to be certified as eligible, in Precinct 2, 69 would have to sign and 228 certified signatures would be required on the Precinct 1 petition.

Class Holiday Tomorrow

Students in Colorado City and Lorraine have a Monday holiday from classes.

Friday was the end of the first trimester and teachers in both schools will use the day to complete records and prepare for the second trimester, Nov. 11 through Feb. 20.

Backers of the election will have to pay for Precinct 3 and Precinct 2 election costs but the county will bear the expense of calling the Precinct 1 election, if enough names are collected and certified for the commissioners court to order the election.

If petitions begin circulating shortly after the applications are turned in Nov. 17, it is possible they could be back in to the clerk's office and certified before the Dec. 9 commissioners meeting. However, the County Clerk said it would be almost impossible to certify names by that December regular meeting and she is expecting the petitions to circulate for a full 30 days and be certified by the January regular meeting of the court.

Two Injured In Accident

Two truck drivers were seriously injured when the double-deck cattle truck they were driving missed a curve one-half mile east of Lorraine about 6 a.m. Thursday.

The truck, which was westbound on Interstate 20, crossed the median and the eastbound lane and overturned in a ditch.

Thomas Neil Jacobs, 26, of Nacogdoches received emergency treatment at Root Memorial Hospital and was transferred to a Lubbock hospital at 8:10 for treatment by a specialist.

He suffered chest injuries and was in critical condition.

Jerry Clyde Byrd, 27, of Frankston was hospitalized in Root Memorial Hospital with back and abdominal injuries. He was described as being in serious condition.

The truck, owned by Jerry Merket Cattle Co. of Longview, was bound for El Paso loaded with 124 head of cattle. Investigating officer Marvin Keenan with the Texas Department of Public Safety, said that about 17 of the cattle were killed and the others escaped along the highway right-of-way and

were later rounded up by local volunteers including Dink Rees, David Scott and Jimmy Moody.

The Lorraine Volunteer Fire Dept. was also called to wash down gasoline spilled when the truck overturned.

Colorado City Police Chief Jesse Browning said that he dispatched two ambulances to the scene after a call came in to the dispatcher reporting "a bad wreck with bodies scattered all over the pavement."

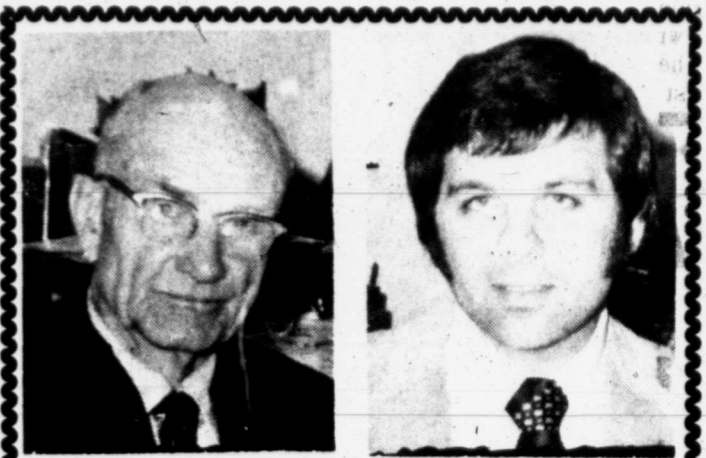

Hebrews 2:14-16. "For as much then as the children are partakers of flesh and blood, he also himself likewise took part of the same, that through death he might destroy him that had power of death, that is, the devil; And deliver them who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject to bondage. For verily, he took not on him the nature of angels; but he took on him the seed of Abraham."

Since the beginning of time, God intended to have men that would honor Him, and show reverence to His deity. We are living in a day where there is a lack of respect. Respect is not shown to parents, children, employers, employees, teachers, students, etc. This all stems from a lack of love in the hearts of men.

This lack of love started at the same time that all sin began. Sin began at the fall of man, when Adam partook of the forbidden fruit. Since that day we have tried to replace a genuine love with a love that is based on mere affections. Affection is not all there is to love.

The real love is shown when the Father sent His only begotten son, the Lord Jesus, as our sacrifice.

This sacrifice was sinless, this sacrifice was the life-giving blood of a man, yet the Son of God. He took the place of our sinful lives and offered us a new hope and a fresh start. The only thing is, you must believe on him. This blood, that now covers the Christian's life, gives access to the real kingdom of God.

And we, being bought by such a supreme cost, ought to be willing to give more of ourselves to Him. To whom we yield our bodies to serve, Paul says, his servants we are. So why do one-third of the membership in most faiths attend church? Where are the other servants of God? Out of that third, why is it only a few that have an active part?

posed include 12 picnic units with shade shelters, a fish cleaning table and water service to the site.
Priority 5. was given to a vegetation management program for those western areas of the park which were formerly agricultural lands. This program involves the removal of the terraces and planting grain sorghum. Before the grain is mature, it will be cut to allow for the drilling of native grass beneath the stubble. All desirable vegetation will be flagged for protection during plowing.
Priority 6. provides for an assistant's residence and privacy fence.
Priority 7. is the Tent Camping Area II. This area was originally planned as a screened shelter area but due to limited funds, the use was changed to tent camping. This area adjoins the same fishing cove as Tent Camping Area I. Facilities to be placed in this area include 20 campsites with shade shelters, a restroom with showers, .3 mile of access road and a trailer dump station.
Priority 8. provides for an entrance portal on the entrance road near its junction with FM 2836.

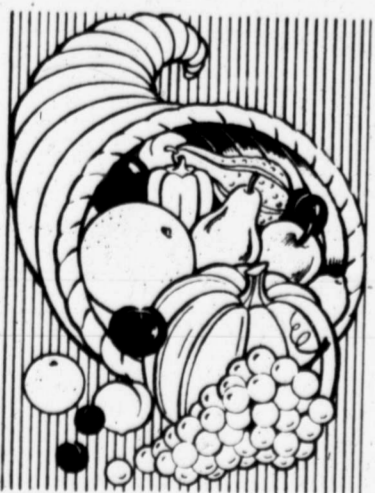
