Wolves vs. Monahans

Kick-Off Here 7:30 P.M. Friday

The 1972 edition of the Colorado City Wolves hits the gridiron Friday night, led by a seasoned and confident quarterback, Amador Guerrero.

The team is running high on confidence and strong on ability, according to the coaching staff, headed by athletic director Weldon Brevard.

The opponent for the opening night is none other than Monahans, the team that seems to hold the key to the fortunes of the Colorado City season. Kick-

off time is 7:30 p.m. at Wolf Stadium here.

In the past, if the Wolves did well against the usually powerful Lobos, then the year was a good one. It's not superstition, but just based on the fact that if a team can play an even game with Monahans or defeat the Lobos, they have a good chance against anybody.

And this year, Brevard believes the Wolves have a good chance against anybody and the Monahans game will be a good test of prowess and a winning attitude that the Wolves showed crowds in controlled scrimmages the past two Friday nights against Andrews and Haskell.

Monahans will be faster and quicker than Andrews, whom the Wolves downed two touchdowns to none, and the Lobos will be stronger than Haskell whom the Wolves tied in a superb come-back.

The Monahans team is in the same shape as Colorado City in regards to returning lettermen

as the Lobos only have six or seven, four on offense and two or three on defense, Brevard noted.

Monahans will outweigh the Wolves 10 to 15 pounds per man but the Colorado City coach is hoping this can be offset with quickness.

One outstanding man for Monahans is their center, a 240 to 250-pounder who goes both ways, playing on offense and defense.

Thus far in their two scrimmages, Monahans has been the loser. But before local fans start relaxing, it should be considered that the Monahans team faced two outstanding teams, one Alpine, the winner over Monahans three to one touchdown, and Odessa High School, the winner four touchdowns to two.

Alpine is one of the top-ranked AA schools in the state and Odessa has a well respected AAAA ball club.

100 Workers Needed

Mobile Home Plant Is Announced For C-City

Sequoia Mobile Homes a firm now seeking incorporation, has announced plans to locate a mobile home plant in Colorado City.

Stockholders in the proposed corporation are Denton Marsales of Big Spring, his son Dennis Marsales of Abilene, Larry Blaylock of Eastland and Jim Webb of Fort Worth.

The Colorado City Industrial Team, Inc. has been working with the Marsales on locating a mobile home plant for almost three years.

The mobile home plant will be located on 10-acres of land south of Interstate 20 East along the access road.

It will eventually hire some 100 persons when full production is attained with an estimated period of four to six months, according to the stockholders.

The payroll will be between \$10,000 and \$13,000 a week.

Locating the mobile home plant here is contingent on approval of guaranteed loans by the Small Business Administration, working through the City National Bank here.

The entire package deal involves almost \$500,000.

Charles Root, past chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Industrial Committee and still a member of the Industrial Team, has been working closely with the Marsales to get the plant located here.

Several years ago, plans were being made to locate the plant here but the Marsales were without the man they wanted to run the operation.

That man is Larry Blaylock, former owner and operator of mobile home plants in Arkansas and Eastland. He recently sold the Aztec Mobile Home plant in Eastland and is now free to start another plant.

The fact that Blaylock was not available before was the reason for the Marsales not establishing their plant here earlier and his availability now is the reason they are proceeding with their plans.

Marsales said he chose Colorado City because he was so well received during initial discussions several years ago.

Blaylock, who will move here and be actual head of operation of the plant said he prefers a city the size of Colorado City not only for better quality but

also it is a better place for his family than a larger one.

Employees for the plant are now being sought an applications may be filled out at the Chamber of Commerce.

Root said individuals in the operation are hoping to start people to work as early as a week from now in order to have them trained.

Denton Marsales owns several trailer home sales and rental lots in Big Spring as well as operating a refinishing plant to refinish and restore trailer homes.

Workers hired will be trained at the refinishing plant, Root said.

Blaylock also plans to use em-

ployees to construct the building for the plant and install equipment. He has noted that production of trailer homes will be started while the building is still under construction.

The building of sheet metal construction along with equipment will cost some \$200,000 to \$250,000.

It will be located on a 10-acre tract of land that has been purchased by the Industrial Team for \$500 an acre but the owners agreed to sell the land at the low price of \$500 in order to secure the industry.

Utilities are being extended to the property and an area of the 10-acres will be paved through the industrial team.

Marsales and his son own trailer home parks and sales lots in Big Spring, Abilene and Brownwood and possibly will open one more or both here.

It is through the lots they own and the lots persons they hope will become stockholders in the corporation that they plan to market the homes built by the plant.

There may be local stockholders as well.

Full production of the plant will mean about three to four mobile homes a day.

Marsales pointed out that there is a possibility of attracting additional industry here See PLANT Page 8

Construction Set

Jan. 1 Date For Public Housing

The Department of Housing and Urban Development told officials of the Colorado City Housing Authority Tuesday that they have approved the sites and bids for 26 housing units for the elderly in Colorado City.

Construction will start about Jan. 1 HUD officials told Colorado City Housing Authority Board President D.M. (Jake) Merritt and Authority director Dennis Walding.

Completion will take about four months.

Housing authority officials are also attempting to get HUD to construct a community cen-

ter building for use by tenants of the low rent housing for the elderly.

Walding said that schedules and justification must be made before HUD consent to the construction of the center.

Also while in Dallas, Walding and Merritt approached HUD officials on the possibility of converting the old Baker Hotel into apartments through the housing authority.

However, Walding said the officials were not too receptive to the idea in initial discussions and the discussion was not continued.

Walding noted that he hopes

to work with the architect on the housing project for the elderly in hopes that the architect can help devise a plan to convince the government to undertake the project.

The housing for the elderly that has been approved is to be constructed in duplexes on lots at the corner of East 5th and Elm; East 4th & Vine; East 7th and Elm; East 6th and Oak; East 6th and Walnut; East 5th and Oak.

The bid that has been approved for the project was for a turn-key job costing \$444,500.

That cost includes every cost from the architect's drawing board to the completed apartments. More than \$500,000 had been allocated for the project.

Walding said the architect's sketches and plans for the units are to be completed within two months when he and Merritt will return to Dallas for final papers on the project.

A new concept is being built in a cluster project, the units will be scattered in five separate site locations in Colorado City's central residential dis-

"Barefoot" Ticklish

Two More Nights For Play

The crowd may have been small at Tuesday night's performance of "Barefoot In The Park" at the Colorado City Opera House, but the laughter by those who were there made it sound like a full house.

The crowd was disappoint-

ingly small for what some members of the audience praised as the best of the four productions presented thus far in the new home of the Colorado City Playhouse, Inc.

On the second night the crowd was even smaller.

The play will be presented again at 8 p.m. Thursday and Saturday. Tickets are only \$1.75 per person. Reservations may be made by phoning 728-3491 or by going by the Opera House between 1 p.m. and 5 p.m.

The cast is small but high in quality.

Not enough can be said for the acting ability of everyone in the cast, all the way from Bob Rely, the player with the smallest part that included one line spoken off-stage with a brief appearance on stage, to the young couple around whom the plot of the play revolves.

The young couple is portrayed by Martha Armijo and Jim Bob Holman.

The theme of the play concerns the first days of a newly married couple, their new apartment on the top of a brownstone on East 48th Street in New York, six flights up.

Thrown in for added laughs is the bride's pill taking mother with a nervous stomach, played by Martha Bisnette, and an aging playboy gourmet cook, played by Kent Womack who lives in the attic of the building.

Porter Richardson is the telephone repairman who, after climbing the six flights of stairs, asks the young couple to not ask him if they have telephone trouble.

The play is one of the excellent writings by playwright Neil Simon. It is presented in three acts, lasting about 2 1/2 hours.

Canning Class Uses Frozen Concentrates To Make Jelly

Looking for good tasting, easy jelly recipes?

Participants in the third session of food preservation classes at Wallace Neighborhood Center have found an easy economical way to make jelly using frozen concentrates.

From beginning to end the whole process takes only 30 minutes and the finished product is 4-6 tasty jars of jelly.

Recipe for the jelly is:

GRAPE

1 can (6 oz.) concentrate, thawed
2 cups water

1 box commercial powdered pectin

3 3/4 cups sugar.

Thoroughly mix powdered pectin, concentrate, and water in large saucepan. Stir constantly over high heat till bubbles form all around edge. Immediately

add all sugar and stir. Bring to full rolling boil (one that cannot be stirred out) and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Skim, pour, and seal.

Procedure for grape jelly can only be used for grape jelly because the syrup becomes too thick for other fruits.

Procedure for orange jelly (also tangerine or apple) is the same as for grape only there

are a few ingredient changes.

Recipe follows:

2 cans (6 Oz.) concentrate, thawed
2 1/2 cups water

1 box commercial powdered pectin

2 pounds sugar

(Follow procedure for grape jelly.)

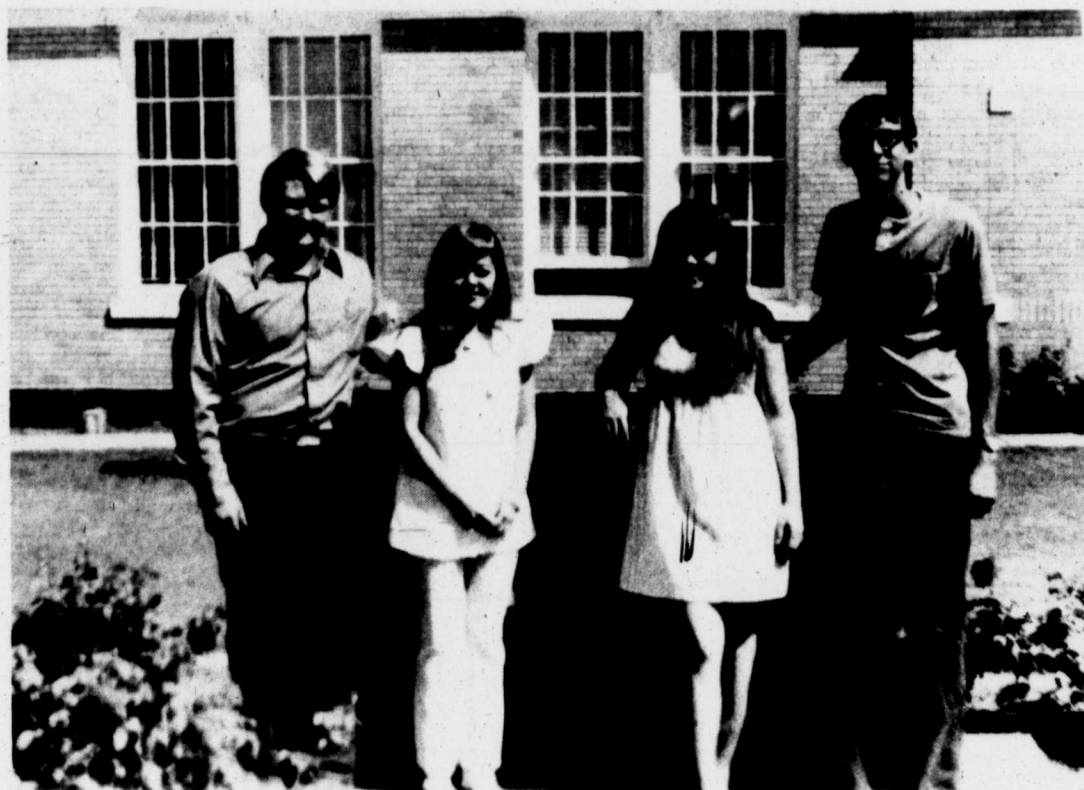

in the apartments in that they will be built solely for persons 62 years of age or more who qualify under the minimum income levels of the public housing programs.

Instead of being built in a cluster project, the units will be scattered in five separate site locations in Colorado City's central residential district.

This new scatter-pattern will better conform to the city's existing housing and will lessen the expense of furnishing utilities and adequate street paving and make the units more convenient to existing shopping and business firms.

Walding pointed out that there are now 15 applications on file for the housing, mostly from persons living in Colorado City.

Once the housing is completed it should help the housing pinch here. Anyone who has hunted a house in the last year knows how few houses there are available to rent.

The city now has 50 public housing units which are full most of the time. There is only one vacancy now and it will be filled before the week ends.

Floor plans for the new apartments include one and two-bedrooms. Four of the units are listed with no bedrooms simply because these are efficiency types with no door closure between the bedroom and living area.
