

## Lamesa Makes Excellent Fire Record For 1935

Figures released by Fire Marshal Jack Phinley today show that the 1935 fire record was the best enjoyed by Lamesa in many years. The report reveals that less than \$3,000 fire loss was incurred by property owners in Lamesa during the year.

The excellent record is attributed to the co-operation of the entire citizenship and it proves that fires are not accidental but are either caused by carelessness or incendiarism and can be minimized if carefulness is practiced.

There were only five fires in Lamesa during the year which were of 'unknown' origin and two of these fires gave evidence of being of an incendiary nature.

Firemen answered only eighteen general fire alarms here during the 12-month period. Investigation of causes of the fires showed that oil stove explosions were responsible for the largest number of fires. Three fires were caused when careless smokers tossed cigarettes near inflammable objects. Three of the calls answered were to automobiles that were ablaze caused by motor trouble. One fire is attributed to defective wiring and another was started when clothes that had been cleaned in gasoline ignited.

Other causes listed were fireworks, Christmas decorations and one fire was started from a defect in a electric refrigerator motor.

Lamesa property owners suffered damages of approximately \$16,000, by fires in 1934. The 1935 record shows an appreciable decline in losses by fire. The splendid record compiled here during the past year was the best in many years. Insurance rates are based on losses incurred over a period of years, and thus, if Lamesa home-owners wish to have their rate lowered, they will have to continue their war on fires.

## Driver's License Is New Law In State

Beginning on the 15th of February, the Tax Collector-Assessor Willie Cleveland will have all arrangements completed to start issuing the driver's license cards that will be required by the state law.

The card will have to be carried by drivers and must be presented for inspection at the request of any peace officer. There will be no charge for the card but should there be a violation of the driving laws the presiding judge will be authorized to remove the license and there will be a stiff fee to have it re-issued when the probation period is over.

This year is the first that Texas laws have called for a driver's license and it is inaugurated and patterned after other states that have had the law for several years. The campaign was started for the law, after the appalling number of deaths due to traffic accidents was constantly increased instead of decreased.

## District Supervisor Named For Old Age Pension Setup Here

The Old Age Assistance Commission Monday this week moved toward completion of local setups for administration of Texas old age pension act, which will become effective on Friday, February 14.

Mr. George B. White of Big Spring was named by the Commission as supervisor for district 18, which includes Dawson county. A local supervisor who will be stationed in Lamesa, will be named in the near future we have been advised.

Other counties in the 18th district are Andrews, Borden, Ector, Gaines, Garza, Glasscock, Howard, Lynn, Martin, Midland, Terry and Yoakum.

With the Old Age Pension Commission rapidly getting all business in shape, it looks now like there will be no trouble for the ones due a pension to receive it. It is the firm belief of the Old Age Pension Commission that citizens will be able to get old age assistance without the help of paid agents. They are warned to beware of pension agents.

Mr. Orville S. Carpenter, executive director of the Old Age Commission, gives the following information concerning the pension: "Application forms will be distributed to cities and towns over the state and will be available to all who want them February 14, when the law goes into effect."

"As required by the new law certain facts must be established by the applicant. The law grants assistance to the needy who are 65 years of age or more, and each applicant must definitely and conclusively prove his or her age."

"There are many ways by which a person can establish his age." Director Carpenter states "The Commission will consider any evidence that proves or helps to establish definitely the age of the applicant. However, it will be necessary in each case for applicant to establish to the satisfaction of the Commission, by whatever means he can, that he is 65 years of age."

Other problems soon to face applicants will be proving (1) income for last two years, (2) property owned and liens against same, (3) cash or negotiable securities held, and (4) citizenship.

7. Insists upon a high standard of efficiency in the schools.
8. Maintains churches that are active in matters pertaining to the religious education of children and young people.
9. Possesses the services of influential men and women who exhibit a keen sense of responsibility for meeting exacting standards in their personal, business, and official conduct.
10. Supports one or more community organizations designed to promote the civic, cultural and moral welfare of the community as a whole.

## Rural Schools Make Library Improvements

Two rural schools, Klondike and Spareberg have made marked improvement in their library facilities during the school year.

Klondike, the only accredited rural high school in Dawson County, has added something over 500 volumes to its new library at small cost. Many of the books were donated; others were purchased second hand at bargain prices from depression book stands. The collection includes fiction, reference and biographical material, and books especially adapted to the primary and elementary grades.

An up-to-date numbering and cataloging system is used, and students issue out and check in the books.

Spareberg has a paid librarian under the Works Progress Administration. The library is adequately equipped with shelves, desks and chair for Miss Evelyn Harper is librarian, and she works in the library during school hours issuing out and checking in and repairing books. The Spareberg library project is the only rural school library project that was approved for Dawson County.

The Spareberg library contains several hundred volumes, of all varieties and a number of periodicals are received weekly and monthly. A daily newspaper comes to the library also.

Improved library facilities are planned for other schools in the county during the coming year. Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, County Superintendent, stated.

## Bonus Information For Ex-Service Men In Dawson County

Sam Richardson, Allen-Houston Post Service Officer of the American Legion at Lamesa gives the following information on how to secure the soldier bonus.

Application blanks are available thru the American Legion. Already about 100 blanks have been filled out. The following information is necessary on the application: The number of the adjusted service certificate, its date of issue and the "A" number of the certificate, the place and date of birth, army or navy serial number. The date of his enlistment and discharge, rank and organization at date of discharge.

Identification. Finger prints will be relied upon, the prints of your four fingers of the right hand must be placed on the application in space provided, the applicant must be further identified by a postmaster, a commissioned officer of the army, navy or marine corps, an officer of a post, chapter or other organization or any person who is authorized to administer oaths in a state or territory, possession, District of Columbia or in a federal judicial district of the United States.

The American Legion Post No. 330 of Lamesa has received the application blanks through the Veterans Administration and applications will be accepted through their service officer, Sam Richardson, who is recognized by the Veterans Administration and authorized to accept and assist in filling out the applications.

Veterans who have not applied for the bonus may continue to do so. About 38,000,000 bonds will have to be printed and 3000 extra clerks will be busy the next six months getting ready for the pay off.

Bonds will be issued in denominations of \$50 which veterans may cash at any local post office after June 15, or hold until 1945 and receive 3 per cent simple interest annually.

### FARM NOTES

#### By JOE C. WILLIAMS County Agent

#### Farmers Meeting:

Mr. C. H. Day, of Plainview, a member of the state advisory board on the cotton of the past cotton program, for Texas, met with farmers of Lynn County, Saturday, Feb. 1, at 10:00 a. m. Mr. Day led the five thousand farmers on the trip to Washington last spring. He recently stayed eight days in the conference at Washington, working out the new program that has started through Congress. He discussed this program and those who attended were well paid for their time as he talked the language that farm people could understand, since he is personally operating a farm in Hale County.

#### Terracing Meetings:

Thirty nine men and boys attended three terracing demonstrations held in O'Donnell, Hancock and Woody. These men and boys were trained in making adjustments on the levels and also running the lines on the water level. These men can run lines on their own and neighbors' farms. More

of these meetings will be arranged as the agent can get around to the communities for the work. Any communities that want the work should get in touch with the agent for appointments as the time for plowing will soon be here. On account of the demonstration that have been called for it will not be possible to do any individual work of laying lines.

For instance thirty nine days' work was accomplished in the three, where as if individual work were attempted it would have required thirty-nine days to do the job that was accomplished in three days.

**Poultry Mash:**  
Laying mash for hens: 100 pounds bran; 100 pounds shorts; 100 pounds finely ground oats or barley; 100 pounds corn or milo meal; 100 pounds meat and bone scraps (95% protein); 2 1/2 pounds salt. If milk is available, four to five gallons of milk each day will take the place of the meat scrap.  
Chick starter: 55 pounds yellow corn meal; 20 pounds wheat shorts; 6 pounds fine meat and bone scraps; 5 pounds alfalfa leaf meal; 6 pounds cottonseed meal; 1 pound fine oyster

shell; 1 pound salt. The meat and bone scrap meal may be omitted in case chicks have all the milk they can drink.

**Growing Ration:** Recommended after chicks reach a weight of one pound.  
Growing Mash: 36 pounds yellow corn; 20 pounds bran; 20 pounds shorts; 5 pounds alfalfa leaf meal; 5 pounds meat and bone scraps (or all milk they can drink); 10 pounds cotton seed meal; 1 pound bone meal; 2 pounds oyster shell; 1 pound salt. The above ration is to be supplemented by grain which may be any available for the birds, such as cracked corn, milo or wheat.

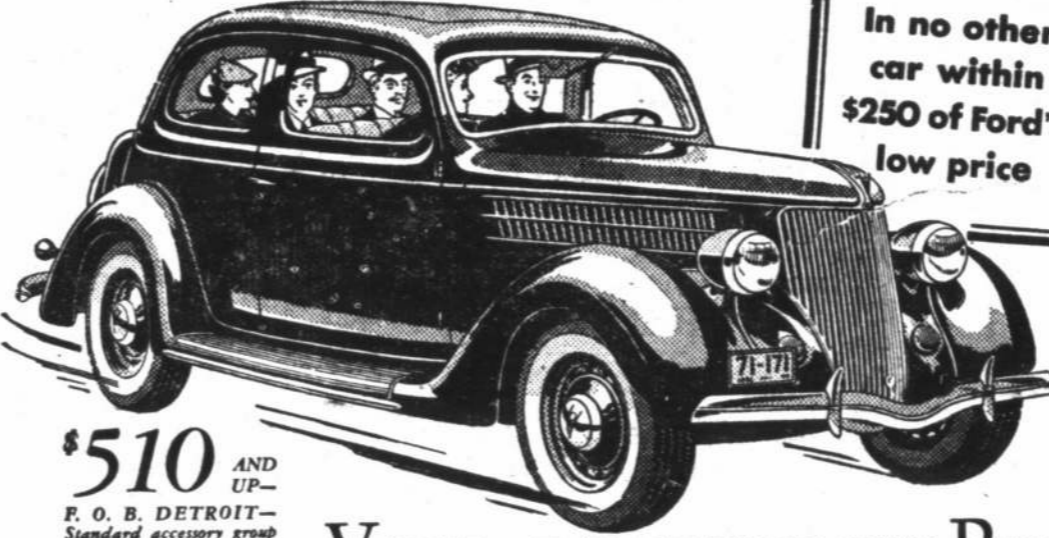

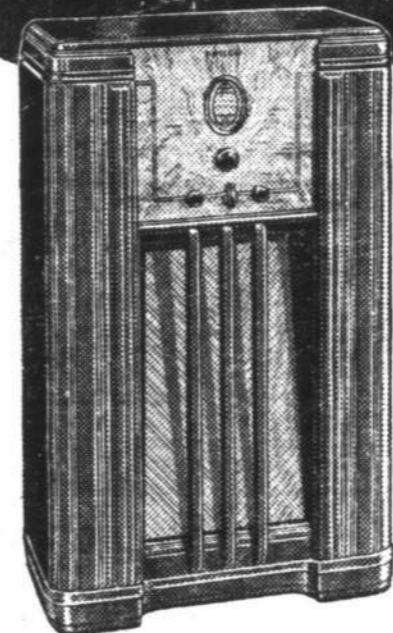

**Educational Program At CCC Camp To Be Broadened**

One hundred per cent participation in the educational program at the CCC camp is the aim of the Educational Advisor. At present enrollees are taking courses in elementary subjects, Journalism, and vocational courses such as bookkeeping, typing, auto mechanics and radio communication.

With the addition of four new instructors through the Works Progress Administration, new courses are planned in High school subjects, vocational and commercial work and music instruction.

Impetus was given to the educational program with the addition of classrooms made available when one of the buildings being used for living quarters was vacated and occupants moved into a barrack.

The library now includes one hundred and twenty-four volumes, covering fiction, biography, history, government and vocational subjects. It is supported by a permanent allotment of books from the government, a traveling library that circulates from camp to camp, and other books contributed by the townspeople of Lamesa and the enrollees themselves. A prize of five dollars is open to the enrollee reading the most books during period of enrollment.

One phase of education of value to CCC men not generally called to the attention of the public is carried on in the field where men are engaged on the work project. The enrollees receive experience and training which is systematically planned by the Educational Adviser and Technical Foreman, while engaged in labor and conservation activity. Such instruction is of value to men who plan advancement in government employment along technical lines. During the coming months the instruction will include tree planting, terracing, and wind erosion control.

Informal and recreational activities add much to the enjoyment and happiness of men for whom the camp serves as a home. Singing, and other music may be heard during the evenings spent at Camp. Others get pleasure playing games such as checkers, dominoes and ping-pong in the Welfare Building.

It is the desire of the administrative personnel at the camp to promote friendship and understanding between the townspeople and enrollees. Those who would like to visit classes, inspect school building, or observe other activities are invited to come to the camp.

The teachers of Dawson County met in an informal session at the Legion Hall, Friday night, January 24. After several minutes of group singing led by Superintendent V. Z. Rogers, the election of a new president for the Dawson County Teachers' Association was considered. Mr. A. G. Bearden, former teacher in the Lamesa High school having resigned to accept the duties of secretary to the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce. Mr. X. R. Banks of Sparenberg was elected president, Mr. Paul Prichard of Munger first vice-president, Miss Gertrude Jones of Bartlett second vice-president and Mr. Charles T. Hatchett of Lamesa third vice-president.

**Quality Meat Show At Lubbock On March 30, 31 Apr. 1**

Lubbock, Texas, Feb. 5—Dates for the sixth annual Quality Meat Show at Lubbock have been set as March 30, 31 and April 1, Durwood H. Bradley, general chairman of the show executive committee, has announced.

The show includes a baby beef, fat pig, and fat lamb division for vocational students and 4-H club members, and a canned and cured meat division for adults.

The grand champion calf division will receive \$25.00 and a substantial sale price. Last year Phillips Petroleum Company bought the grand champion calf, paying 66 cents per pound or a total of \$566.28. Twenty-five other premiums in the baby beef division range downward to \$4.00.

The grand champion pig exhibitor will receive \$12.00, with twenty other premiums ranging downward to \$1.00. Morton Salt Company bought the champion pig last year for 29 cents per pound or \$59.16.

First prize in the fat lamb division is \$5.00 for two divisions, and two groups, and \$6.00 for the best county group of 16 lambs. Thirty one prizes in this division range from \$1.00 to \$6.00. The Waffle Shop in Lubbock

bought the grand champion lamb last year for 27c per pound or \$21.06.

Twenty-three cured meat division prizes range from \$1 to \$8.00, while 77 premiums will be awarded in the canned meats division, totaling \$73.90.

Col. Earl Gartin of Greensburg, Indiana, has again been engaged to handle the livestock sale, which will be held April 1. Last year 73 calves, 31

pigs and 41 lambs were sold at the sale for a total of \$3,927.61, an average of \$107.11 per calf, \$23.48 per pig, and \$8.52 per lamb.

**EXAMINATION FOR POSTMASTER**

To fill the vacancy in the position of postmaster in this city, the United States Civil Service Commission has announced, at the request of the Postmaster General and in accordance with an order of the President, an open competitive examination.

To be eligible for the examination, an applicant must be a citizen of the United States, must reside within the delivery of this post office, must have so resided for at least one year next preceding the date for close of receipt of applications, must be in good physical condition, and within the prescribed age limits. Both men and women are admitted.

Under the terms of the Executive order, the Civil Service Commission will certify to the Postmaster General the names of the highest three qualified eligibles, if as many as three are qualified, from which the Postmaster General may select one for nomination by the President. Confirmation by the Senate is the final action.

Applicants will not be required to assemble in an examination room for scholastic tests, but will be tested on their education and business experience and fitness. The Civil Service Commission will make inquiry among representative local business and professional men and women concerning the experience, ability and character of each applicant, and the evidence thus secured will be considered in determining the ratings to be assigned to the applicants.

The Commission states that presidential postmasters are not in the classified civil service and that its duties in connection with appointments to such positions are to hold examinations and to certify the results to the Postmaster General. The Commission is not interested in the political, religious or fraternal affiliations of any applicant.

Full information and application blanks may be obtained from the secretary of the local board of civil service examiners at the post office in this city, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

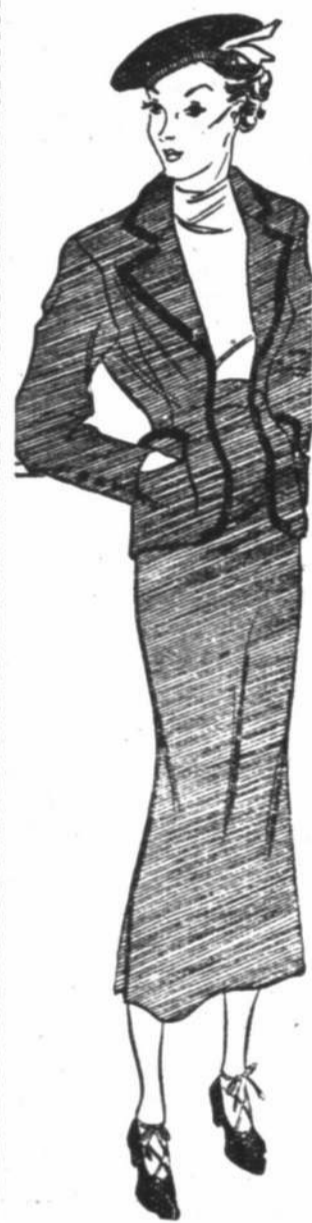
