Must Raise \$6,800 in Red Cross War Fund Drive

Drive Opened March 1; Will Close Mar. 31

Ochiltree County to Raise Quota by Voluntary Donations

Ochiltree county can and will raise its \$6,800 goal for the American Red Cross War Fund without resorting to personal solicitations. This is the decision of Chapter Chairman Dave Shanks and the members of his executive committee. Judge Shanks and his board members are firmly convinced that the people of Ochiltree are just patriotic enough that it will not be necessary to send out workers to make door-to-door and house-to-house calls, begging for money for such a worthy cause.

The drive for the \$6,800 opened March 1 and will continue through the month. The \$6,800 goal for Ochiltree county will provide sufficient money for the national fund and to finance local chapter activities.

Don't confuse the Red Cross War Fund with the pre-war annual Roll Call when one dollar memberships were sufficient to carry on the Red Cross. Ochiltree county's quota is \$6,800. That figures out an average of about \$8.50 per family. To raise the quota, those who are able financially will have to give many times more than \$8.50 per family unit. There will have to be plenty of donations of \$25, \$50, \$100 and more to reach the goal. Some families cannot give the average \$8.50, a few will not give even if they are able, so the others will have to make up the difference.

Directors for Five County District Are Being Elected

Due to the efforts of W. M. Deck, M. P. Browning, Earl Waide, Herman Hargrove and other interested citizens, Rural Electrification for all of Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Hansford and the northern one-half of Hemphill and Hutchinson counties may become an actuality soon after the war is over and materials are once more available.

Rowland W. Gaver, Lubbock, district supervisor for the Rural Electrification Administration, is in the area this week assisting with preliminary organization plans.

Hansford and the north one-half of Hutchinson county was organized Tuesday night and the following directors elected: R. D. Tomlinson and W. B. Davis, Hansford; and Ira Harbour, Hutchinson. A meeting was held at Lipscomb Wednesday night to name two directors from Lipscomb county and one from the north one-half of Hemphill. Ochiltree county will meet tonight, Thursday, to name three directors to the board.

The nine directors will then organize, elect officers, and choose a name for the five-county association.

Dan E. Archer, Perryton attorney, is serving as legal advisor for the organization.

Perryton will be headquarters for the cooperative.

As soon as the organization is completed, membership applications will be taken. The membership fee will be \$5, the fee to be used for organization purposes.

Chinese Official Speaks Friday Rotary Institute of International Understanding

Cheng Pao-Nan, director of the Midwest Branch of the Chinese News Service, Chicago, Ill., comes to Perryton tomorrow as the third speaker in the Perryton Rotary Club's Institute of International Understanding. Mr. Cheng will speak in the school auditorium at 8:15 p.m.

He will address the pupils of the Perryton Public Schools in the afternoon and at the noon hour will be the honor guest at a joint meeting of the Lions and Rotary clubs.

He returned to the United States in June, 1943, after two years of service in China's wartime capital, Chungking. While he was in China, Mr. Cheng was the representative of the American Bureau for Medical Aid to China, and also appointed as expert of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Chinese Government.

In carrying out his duties in China, Mr. Cheng made three trips into Burma and India. His work included the clearance of medical supplies picked up in Rangoon before the fall of Burma, and the setting up of transportation routes for further essential medical supplies into China after the closing of the Burma road. He also traveled extensively in unoccupied China.

Previous to this work in China, Mr. Cheng was Vice-Consul of the Chinese Consulate General at New York from January 1936 until April 1941.

Born Mar. 21, 1910 at Nanking, Mr. Cheng left China at the age of 15 for schooling in England and the United States. He returned to China in 1932 to take up his career as an official of the Chinese Government.

His subject will be "Oriental Nations as Contributors to a New World Order." He will conduct an open forum at the conclusion of the lecture, answering any questions that the audience may wish to propound.

"Remaining green and brown stamps in War Ration Book III will be used as at present until they expire after March 20, 1944. They will be accepted only at their denominational values of 8, 5, 2, or 1 point," according to the Lubbock District of the Office of Price Administration.

This statement was to clarify any erroneous idea that ration tokens would be given as change for these stamps.

"Red and blue ration tokens will be used as change only for those stamps from Ration Book IV which become valid February 27 or after," Mr. Settle explained.

Community-Wide Service Pay Homage to War Dead at Baptist Church Sunday, March 5, 3 p.m.

Five heroes from Ochiltree county who have given their lives in the defense of their country in World War II will be honored in a community-wide memorial service at the Baptist Church, Sunday afternoon, March 5, three o'clock. The service will honor those war-dead whose bodies have not been returned home or for whom no memorial service has been held.

Snow and Rain of Sunday Measured .73

A slow drizzling rain most of Sunday that turned into a very light snow Sunday night brought .73 moisture to the Perryton area. The weather has been cloudy and threatening most of this week. Dirt roads were almost impassable for a few days due to the abundance of sub-soil moisture and slow drying weather. While this moisture was hard on livestock, it adds to the supply of moisture for small grain crops. Prospects for a bumper wheat crop for the immediate Perryton area are excellent.

Local Utility Outstanding Safety Record

No Lost Time from Accidents in Perryton Division in 10 Years

Perhaps one of the most safety minded organizations in this section of the country is the Community Public Service Co. This company holds safety meetings of all their employees in this division consisting of Higgins, Follett, Spearman and Perryton, in the Perryton office regularly once each month and it is just as important that their employees attend this meeting as it is for them to report for their daily work.

As a result of these meetings there has not been a lost time accident in this division for the past ten years, and we say this has not just happened but is a direct result of the study they make of putting safety first in all their work.

Considering the fact that their work is of a hazardous nature and their men are called on to work in stormy weather as well as in good weather and on high tension lines which are energized it makes this record more impressive.

The men in the power plants have to work around and on moving parts of machinery and also on electric equipment.

This includes the driving of automotive equipment and just recently the men operating these cars and trucks were awarded medals for their no-accident drivings. Included in these employees was C. E. Whippo with a twelve year no-accident driving award representing 460,000 miles.

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Bass and Crappie Fishing to Open in County on April 1st

Bass and crappie fishing will open in certain Panhandle counties this year April 1, instead of May 1, to allow Texas State Game Commission and government officials an opportunity of studying fishing conditions and restocking requirements of the testing area, it has been announced by officials of both departments.

The new ruling affects all of the six government lakes of this region as well as streams and other lakes of the testing area, game wardens declared.

Another ruling, long advocated by those who know fishing conditions, will be tested this year in allowing fishermen to retain all bass and crappie caught which are below the legal limit in size. "It is believed in allowing fishermen to keep the smaller fish caught it will improve fishing conditions of the Panhandle waters and afford for bigger fish in the future," Jim Maggard, warden, said.

Under state laws one may catch 15 bass, 11 inches in length; and 15 crappie, seven inches in length each day of the season. Lakes Buffalo, McClellan, Tule, Dalhart, Marvin, and Fryer will adhere to state fishing laws in making the survey, and will also advocate the keeping of all the smaller bass and crappie caught in these waters.

Dead heroes to be honored are Haskell Wright, Claio R. Mitchell, Preston Bright, "Buz" Malaney and Dick Nies. Burial or memorial services have already been held for four other young men from this community who have been killed in service.

The Sunday afternoon memorial service will provide final rites for all young men from the county who have been lost with one exception. The parents of one lost hero of this war did not wish to participate in this service.

The memorial service is being arranged by a committee of local pastors consisting of Rev. O. C. Curtis, First Baptist; Rev. Herschel L. Thurston, First Methodist; and Rev. Ward H. N. Gregg, Christian.

Everyone in the Perryton area is urged to attend the service.

Following is the program: Presentation of Colors; "America" by congregation; Scripture Reading, W. C. Bryan; Hymn, "Path of Our Fathers"; Purpose of Service, reading of excerpts from War Department letters, Rev. Gregg; Presentation of American Legion Citations, Commander A. P. Spicer; Special Music; Memorial Address, Rev. Curtis; Song; Prayer and Benediction, Mr. Bryan.

Growing Tomato
Plants at Home

Growing your own plants in a box
or hotbed at home will put tomatoes
on the table much earlier, says Sadie
Seward, Home Demonstration Agent.
This is especially important in this
hot, dry area where temperature
causes blossoms to drop before the
fruit is formed. This can sometimes
be avoided by the earlier start which
setting out plants affords.

For starting plants, fill a box 18
by 30 inches and four to six inches
deep with equal parts of well mixed
garden loam and rotted manure or
compost. Firm the soil by pressing
down with the hands. Make off
rows three to four inches apart and
one-half inch deep, planting the
seed four to the inch. It is a good
idea to disinfect the seed before
planting by immersing for 10 min-
utes in a half pint of water in which
a half tablet of bichloride of mer-
cury has been dissolved.

The box should have several small
holes in the bottom for drainage.
It can be placed in the sunlight on
the back porch and brought into
the kitchen at night so as to keep
the temperature between 70 and 80
degrees.

About three weeks after seeding
the plants may be transplanted into
tin cans, paper cups or small pots,
remaining three to four weeks. The
soil in the containers may be the
same as the mixture in the plant
box, but the plants should be set
from one-half to one inch deeper.
The containers also should have
small holes for drainage at the bot-
tom.

The object of transplanting to
cans or pots is to permit each plant
to develop a vigorous root system
and a top toughened to outside grow-
ing conditions. When seven to eight
inches high and outside weather is
favorable, they are ready for field
planting. But they should be set
two inches deeper in the garden than
in the containers. In setting them,
mix about a half teaspoonful of com-
mercial fertilizer or about a shovel-
ful of rotten manure into the soil
where each plant is to stand.

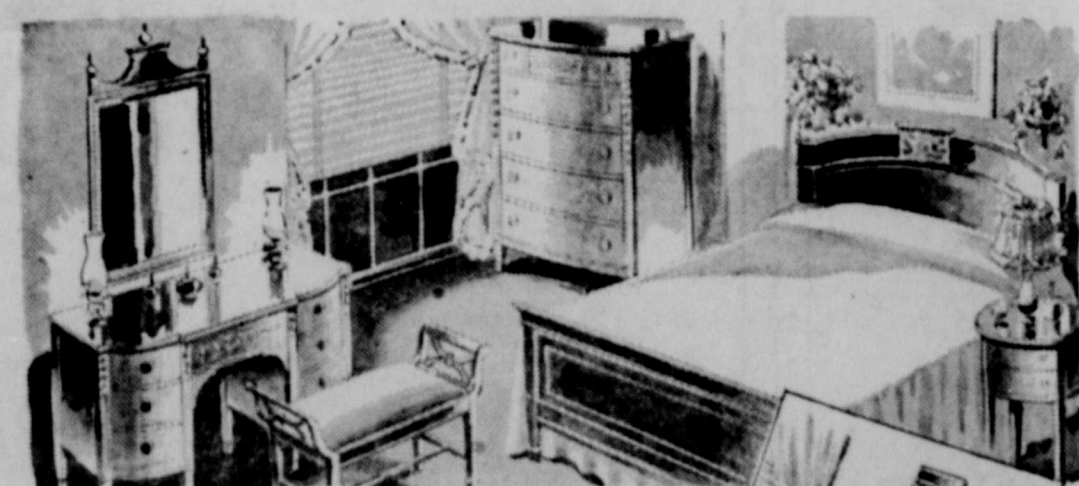

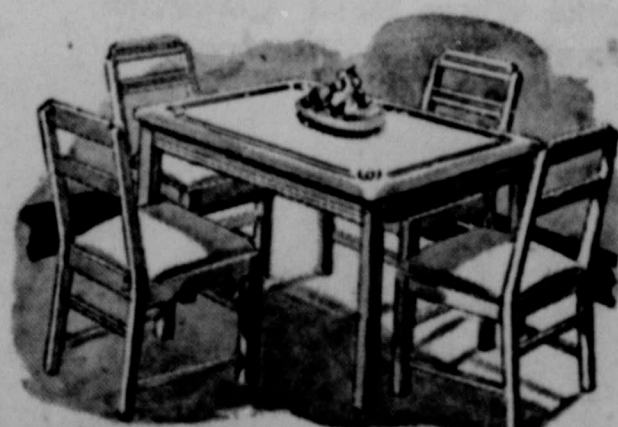

News that the 4th War Loan goal of \$14,000,000,000 has been reached and passed will cheer American boys from Italy to the Marshalls. But they will hear the news not only over sputtering radios but over the din of battle.

For the war still goes on with ever mounting fury. And that means that our War Bond buying must go on unabated, too.

To the millions who bought extra War Bonds in this drive, all America gives thanks.

To the 5,000,000 and more volunteer workers who contributed their time and abilities to help make the drive a success, your Government and your fighting men give thanks.

Our job goes on.

The Bonds we bought last week and the week before are today's exploding bombs and shells, and spent bullets can never be used again. We must provide for tomorrow, too. The need for new guns, planes, ships and tanks *still goes on.*

For the war still goes on with ever mounting fury. Tommy Cook's father has gone to the Navy. Tommy is in Room 2A. Betty Jean Scott is a new pupil in the fourth grade.

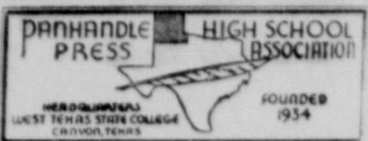
Grade 5A is making an afghan for the Red Cross. They are also studying about the Netherlands and they have many interesting pictures and posters on their walls and blackboards.

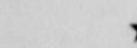
