### Scouts Ask Lamesans To Place All Waste Paper On Curbs By 9 a. m. June 8th

The waste paper campaign is slated to close next week end, and members of Boy Scout troop 23, which is sponsoring the drive are asking Lamesa residents to place their waste paper collections on the curbs by nine o'clock Friday morning, June 8.

In order to conserve gas and tires members of the troop plan to make one tour of the city, gathering all the waste paper at one time, and request your cooperation in this project.

You can help them by placing your paper collections on the curb as early as possible Friday, so that they can quickly gather the bundles and take them to the freight car which will be on track.

The War Production Board requests that salvage groups continue to function until Japan capitulates and six months thereafter. Waste paper will remain critical with increasing paper need in Europe. With the flood of war material and personnel going to the South Pacific, more packaging to withstand salt air will be necessary.

Waste paper, which in peacetime is plentiful that it becomes a household nuisance, today is a vital war material necessary in the manufacture of essential military equipment. The demand is so great that normal trade channels are unable to supply enough waste paper to keep mills running full time and to enable them to meet all overseas and home front war requirements.

There is an abundance of waste paper in the home, in the store, and in the factory, and each of you can help relieve the paper shortage by collecting every scrap of paper and placing it on the curbs early Friday morning.

Troop 23 is trying to get enough paper to fill the freight car, which will hold 40,000 pounds. Every effort should be made to collect all waste paper possible that essential supplies and services may be maintained during the present war. Have your collections ready for the Scouts Friday morning.

### Assembly of God To Have Vacation Bible School Soon

Cpl. Speck has been stationed in Italy for more than 2 years, where he was attached to the 90th Bombardment Group. He served as a ground crew member of the Air Corps.

The corporal has been in service for the past 3 years, prior to which time he was employed with Bryant-Link Company in this city. He will visit in Lamesa and expects to arrive here some time next week.

His family is planning a reunion in Carlsbad over the week end, and Cecil Speck will attend.

### Scott Robertson's Brother Is Freed, And Is In France

Editor's Note: Scott Robertson of this city received a letter this week from his brother, F-O Pink Robertson, who was shot down over Holland September 19, 1944 after which he was taken prisoner by the Germans. In the service for 3 years F-O Robertson, who has been awarded the Air Medal, had been overseas approximately 2 weeks prior to being captured by the Germans. An article which was printed in the Midland paper recently stated that F-O Robertson was among the group of American prisoners of war confined in Stlag Luft 1 who captured their prison camp from the Germans, took 2,000 German prisoners and over-ran several hundred square miles of German territory. In addition to freeing themselves, the group liberated the prisoners in five other camps in the territory.

F-O Robertson is the son of Mrs. Ruby Robertson of Lorraine, and has visited in this city frequently. Below is printed the first letter which his brother has received from F-O Robertson since being informed of his return to military control.

France  
May 22, 1945  
Dear Scott and family,  
Well, I am doing fine in this camp near La Harve, France, only it rains nearly all the time. I hope to be home in July.

Will you drop Mother a line and tell her to save any mail that comes for me? I hope you are well. I have not received any mail since I left the States. The flak wounds in my leg healed without any scars and with this food, I am beginning to feel like a human again. I sure killed me a lot of Jerries before they got me though. The worst is too good for those German prisoners in the States.

Not much to write about, for we can't get out of camp. Take care of yourselves and I will see you soon.

### Lt. J. C. Norris, Former German Prisoner, Is Here

Lt. J. C. Norris, a prisoner of the Germans for approximately 10 months, arrived in this city Tuesday night, May 29, to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Will Norris. He has been given a thirty day furlough, after which time he must report to a camp in Miami, Florida.

Lt. Norris, pilot of a P-51 and possessor of the Air Medal, went down over Hungary July 2, 1944. He was on a shuttle bombing mission from England to Russia at the time.

Serving overseas on two separate occasions Lt. Norris had been in the European area since April 1944, and was stationed in Italy. Previously he had spent two years in the Canal Zone, where he was attached to the ground crew of the Air Corps.

The young lieutenant is a Lamesa High School graduate, and entered the service in August, 1940. He began training as a pilot after returning from the Canal Zone, and received his commission at Victoria Air Field, December 5, 1943.

Mr. Yates emphasizes the importance of every qualified voter casting his ballot in this election. The polls will be open from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m.

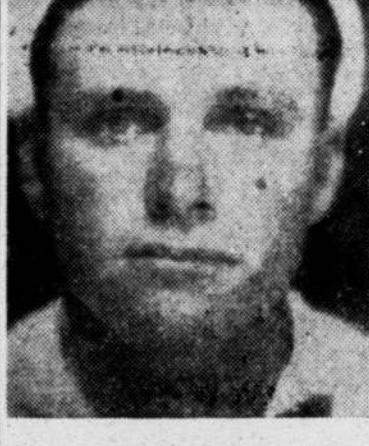
### Bible School Is To Close With A Program Friday

Williams, who has been engaged in law practice in Chickasha since 1919, has become well known throughout Oklahoma and West Texas as a lecturer and humorist. There is almost a full demand upon his time to fill engagements throughout the country, especially in Rotary circles.

His dry wit, his homely philosophy, and his sincere mannerism never fail to hold an audience spell bound from beginning to end. As a humorist, Williams bids fair to rank among the best in the Southwest.

He was born in Denison, and was educated at the University of Arkansas and the Kansas City Missouri Law School. He has been a member of the Rotary Club of Chickasha since 1921 and is past president of that club. Williams has been active in Rotary International as director, district governor, committee chairman and member, and is now a member of the 1946 Convention Committee.

He will make a presentation of the president's award to the club in recognition of outstanding services rendered during the year 1944-45. The show will include many interesting features. It is being presented under the auspices of the Army Ground Forces and the War Finance Division of the Treasury Department.

This two-hour demonstration is a grandstand seat to actual war. Before your eyes American Infantrymen attack a Jap pillbox with flame throwers, machineguns, mortars, bazookas, grenades and rifles. They creep up on the enemy position exchanging shot for shot. Then comes the main assault, the Japs are over-run and killed to the last man.

You will be able to see how the weapons your War Bonds buy are used by the Infantry. You will see the tricks of the Jap and how our men outwit him and blast him to bits with superior firepower and strategy. You'll be able to handle these weapons as well as see them used.

Doughboys fresh from action overseas will tell you how the War Bonds you bought put these weapons and many more in their hands. To be here and take part in the show is First Lieutenant Robert L. Parent of Hartford, Connecticut, who was leader of an Infantry rifle platoon that helped lead the Japanese a big blow at Wanimo, New Guinea. He is now unit commander of the "Here's Your Infantry" demonstration team appearing in the Seventh War Loan.

Overseas veteran of 25 months with the famed 32nd Infantry Division in the Pacific the Doughboy officer led his outfit to a Jap supply and ammunition dump on Wanimo in June of 1944. The raid cost the Japs 800,000 rounds of destroyed ammunition, 40,000 pounds of rice, two machineguns and one barge.

Lt. Parent, a machine operator in civilian life, has been in the Army more than four years. He has served in Australia, New Guinea and the East Indies and his Asiatic-Pacific Theatre Ribbon bears battle stars for four campaigns. He holds the Combat Infantryman Badge awarded for exemplary conduct in action.

You will want to attend the Infantry Show here Friday night, to see the demonstration and to hear what battlewise soldiers have to say about the Japs.

Be at McCollum Stadium at 8:30 p. m., so that you won't miss any of the performance.

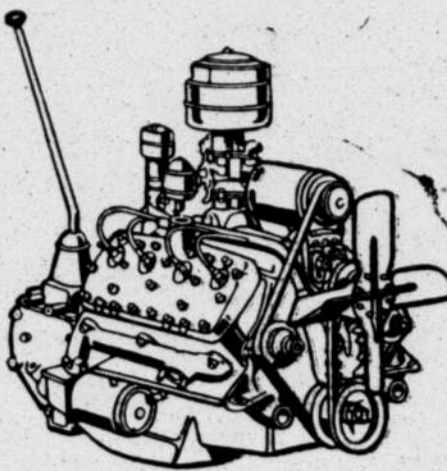

**Points On How To Combat Powdery Mildew Quickly**  
Frequent spring rains in many parts of the state have increased damage from powdery mildew on roses and crapeyrtle, according to reports received by the A. and M. College Extension Service.  
For light cases, Mrs. Florence Lowe, acting specialist in landscape gardening, suggests using dusting sulphur once week until the mildew disappears. She offers this warning, however, on the dusting of roses: "Use the sulphur sparingly during hot weather on account of possible leaf injury."  
Severe cases should be sprayed with wettable sulphur. In making this solution, use two ounces of sulphur per gallon of water. The specialist advises. The roses should be sprayed thoroughly with this solution until all signs of mildew have disappeared.  
Dusting once a week is advised since spores of the disease begin to germinate immediately after a rain, so the foliage should be covered often with a thin film of the dust to prevent germination. During the summer, dusting need not be so frequent.  
Best preventive measures for the disease can be taken during the dormant season. The bushes should be pruned and stripped of diseased leaves, so that the disease won't spread to new shoots in the spring.

### Agent Discusses Phases Of Soil Conservation Law

County Agent T. A. Barfield has made a study of some pertinent questions that arise in connection with the State Soil Conservation Law, and explains some of the phases of this law.

The first topic he discusses is what is a soil conservation district. He states, "A soil conservation district is a governmental, sub-division and a public body, corporate and politic, organized under the provisions of the soil conservation law of the state of Texas. It is definitely a landowners' program and to be highly successful, landowners must accept leadership in the development of the program and in administering the affairs of the district through a board of district supervisors, duly elected by the landowners, themselves. Each of the five members of the board must be landowners, actively engaged in farming or ranching."

Some might want to know if a district can vote taxes. County Agent Barfield reports that this can not be done as it was not provided in the state soil conservation law that taxes could be levied.

As an answer to the question of whether the district can make you do anything, Barfield explains that the district program is entirely voluntary.

He reminds you that any natural person who holds title to farm or ranch land lying within the district, and who has attained the age of 21 and resides within the proposed soil conservation district is entitled to vote. He further states that the wife of a landowner or any adult member of the family who is considered as having equity in an undivided estate is entitled to vote. This includes sons and daughters of landowners if they have attained the age of 21 years.

A poll tax is not a necessary qualification for voting in the soil conservation district election.

### Small Tasks Are Many In The Victory Garden

There are several small tasks in the Victory garden, such as staking tomatoes and thinning some leafy plants, which if attended to at once will improve production, says J. E. Rosborough, horticulturist for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

Tomatoes which are to be staked and pruned should be given close attention now. Plants should be pulled closely to the stakes and tied firmly in order to prevent them whipping back and forth and possibly damaging blossoms or fruit. It is also important, Rosborough says, that suckers be removed at least once weekly. After three clusters of tomatoes have set on a plant all top buds should be pinched out to prevent more growth. But when this is done, two pairs of leaves should be left above the top cluster of fruit to maintain normal growth. Staking, pruning and topping tomato plants assures earlier and larger fruit.

Rosborough cautions, however, not to stake and prune summer tomatoes such as Porter and Denmark. These varieties produce fruit on the sucker growth, and staking and pruning will reduce the yield. During the hot summer period these types of smaller tomatoes must be depended upon for the garden-to-table supply because the large early varieties will not set fruit. The smaller varieties, which still may be planted, need plenty of foliage to protect the fruit from the hot sunshine.

Thinning, Rosborough says, may be practical profitably with okra, squash and cucumbers. In the process, okra plants should be spaced two to three feet apart. If it is done now side branches will develop tender pods and thus increase the yield of each plant. Only the best squash and cucumber plants should be selected. These should be spaced at least three feet by recovering all others. Rosborough says. Cucumbers especially must have ample space and plenty of moisture and fertility. Side dressing with two or three tablespoonful of 5-10-5 commercial fertilizer per plant about the time the first blossoms appear will make the cucumbers smooth, crisp and tender. One pound of barnyard fertilizer per plant will give the same result.

Below is printed a letter which Pvt. Schutza's wife received from his chaplain:

Dear Mrs. Schutza:

As chaplain of the 34th Regiment, I wish to convey my sincere sympathy to you on the death of your husband, Pvt. Julius A. Schutza, Co. F, who was killed in action in the Philippine Islands.

On the afternoon of February 4, 1945, your husband with his company was attempting to penetrate enemy fortifications on highway 7 from Olongapo to Dihilupihan, 3 1/2 miles northwest of Olongapo. It was during this attack on enemy positions in the mountain passes that your husband was instantly killed by enemy mortar shell fragments.

I conducted the services and your husband was buried with military honors in the United States Armed Forces Cemetery, Olongapo, Zambales, Luzon, P. I.

The death of your husband is a real loss to our regiment but an even greater loss to you and those who knew him. All the words we may say now will not bring him back to you, but remember the words of the great Master, "Greater love hat no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." This love will live forever and it now reaches out to you to soften and heal the sorrow you now experience. Your husband's love for you now reaches out to encourage and strengthen you and we hope you will turn to God for that necessary comfort and faith to carry on. May God's richest blessings be with you.

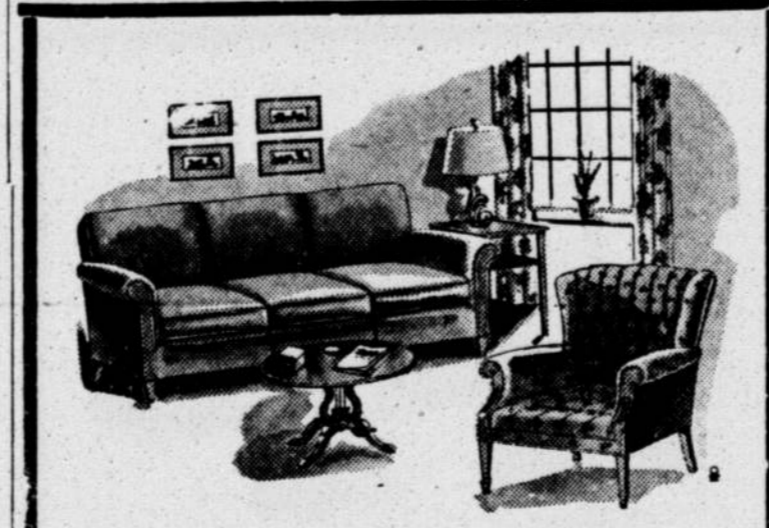

The provisions of this Constitutional Amendment shall be self-enacting, and if a majority of votes at said election shall be cast for same the Governor shall, within thirty (30) days after said election, issue a proclamation declaring this Amendment to be a part of the Constitution of Texas.

S. J. R. No. 8 A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas...

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer, or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by the qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Justices of the Commission of Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall become Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and each shall continue in office as such Associate Justice of the Supreme Court until January 1st next preceding the expiration of the term to which he has been appointed and until his successor shall be elected and qualified.

Section 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot: 'For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members'; and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: 'AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members.' If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Section 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 5. Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Section 6. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 7. The provisions of this Constitutional Amendment shall be self-enacting, and if a majority of votes at said election shall be cast for same the Governor shall, within thirty (30) days after said election, issue a proclamation declaring this Amendment to be a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Editor's Note: The following article was written by Pfc. W. H. Cornett, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Cornett of this county. Pfc. Cornett is a member of the Anti-Tank Corps and has seen service in France, Belgium, Germany, and Holland. He entered the Army a year ago and has been overseas since the last of December.

Germany, May 14, 1945. To the People of Lamesa and Dawson County: Just a few lines to let you know a little bit about the country and the people on this side of the world. This is a very beautiful country.

There are mountains, valleys, rivers, and trees by the thousands. During the winter there is a white blanket of snow which, in places, isn't more than knee-deep, and it makes a very pretty setting for the evergreens.

When the snow has all melted and the mercury begins to rise, everything begins to get green and is still very beautiful. Then hot weather comes along and makes you wish for your bathing suit and the beaches of good old sunny California.

The German people are supposed to be an intelligent race of people but instead they act more like a bunch of heathens. They have nice homes, nice clothes, and everything that anyone could wish for, but they aren't capable of taking care of themselves or choosing someone to rule them. They are not satisfied and want to over-run countries and take things that belong to somebody else, and then take the people and make slaves out of them.

They have many thousands of slaves who, of course, were very happy when the American soldiers came and set them free. The Germans don't like the Americans, but they all say they had rather have us here than to have the Russian soldiers.

They are afraid that the Russians will kill them and they can't seem to think that the Russians have a reason for wanting to kill them. ### Three New Oil Locations For Dawson County

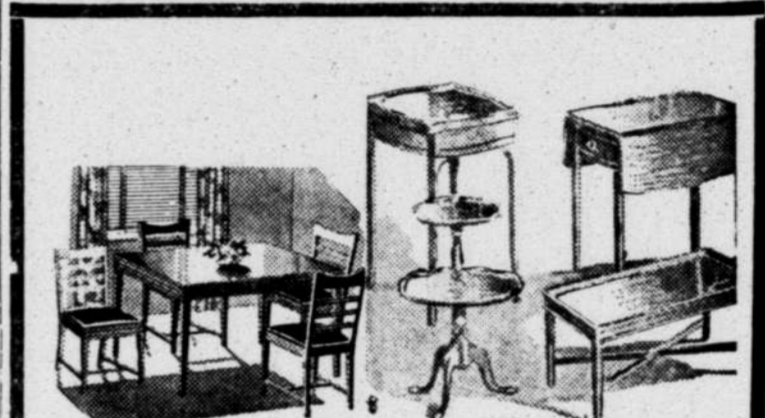
### Local Men Attending Firemen's School

T. A. BARFIELD, County Agricultural Agent, WOMEN HAVE A PART IN DAWSON COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION PROGRAM.

MYRTLE DICKIE NEGY, PLANNING. The question is often asked, "When should shrubs be pruned?" The answer is, "When they need pruning." Winter, when the plant is dormant, is the best time for a general pruning, as there is less danger of injuring the shrub. However, shrubs that have just finished their spring blooming should be cut back now so that they will start to form flower bud stock for next spring. Shrubs and trees may be safely pruned until the middle of July. However, heavy pruning during the summer which produces an abundance of new growth in the year is dangerous. Some kinds of pruning should be done regardless of the season, such as removing dead limbs, diseased limbs, and limbs that ruin and injure each other. Practice and study are necessary for satisfactory results in pruning, but mistakes for the beginner should not cause discouragement as a good healthy plant will soon cover up the rough places.

**LEATHER GLOVES**  
Leather gloves that are labeled washable may be washed in mild, luke warm suds. Wash them gently on the hands, peel off carefully from wrist, rinse well in luke warm water, run water into each finger, to restore shape and roll in turkish towel to dry. Wash before they are dry enough that they have to be rubbed to come clean. Don't try washing gloves that have been dry cleaned.

#### THE LORD'S SUPPER

##### I. WHAT IS MEANT BY 'CLOSE COMMUNION'?

Open communion, that is UNRESTRICTED communion, is a sin because it is a violation of the plain commands of the New Testament. The Lord gave his church strict orders concerning the Lord's Supper and to refuse to obey these orders is to sin. OPEN COMMUNION is based on sentiment—not on the Scriptures. Without investigation many decide that Baptist are "stingy" and begrudge the small amount of elements used. When it comes to our OWN SUPPERS we are as liberal as others, but when it comes to the Lord's Supper we must act under the Lord's orders. Some, without investigation, think that Baptist decide that all others are not Christians just because Baptist do not invite them to eat the Lord's Supper with them. This is a great mistake, for Baptist think that every one who has been born of God is a child of God, and they are fellowshiped by Baptist as children of God. But since the Lord committed the supper to the church and gave strict orders concerning who should eat that supper we have nothing else to do but to obey the MASTER'S ORDERS. Some of God's children have no right to eat the supper because they refuse or fail to comply with the requirements which the Lord Himself made for all who shall partake of the supper. Just being a child of God does not admit one to the supper.

Below are the requirements that the Lord Himself placed about HIS SUPPER. It is our business to OBEY THE LORD no matter what people may think or say. If Baptist are UNPOPULAR because they adhere strictly to the Lord's requirements concerning the Supper we can't help it, but we MUST OBEY HIM.

In the New Testament the Lord's Supper is very close, being restricted in fifteen particulars:—

1. Restricted as to place—in the church. 1 Cor. 11:1-3.
2. Restricted as to motive—must not be a social feature. 1 Cor. 11:21-22.
3. Restricted as to purpose—to discern the Lord's body. 1 Cor. 11:27-29.
4. Restricted as to those who are baptized. Matt. 28:19-20.
5. Restricted to church members. Acts 2:41-42.
6. Restricted to those who are sound in the faith. Acts 2:41-42.
7. Restricted to those in fellowship. Acts 2:41-42.
8. Restricted to those whose walk is orderly. II Thess. 3:6.
9. Restricted to those with clean lives. 1 Cor. 5:1-11.
10. Restricted to people of the same faith. Heb. 13:8-16.
11. Restricted to the elements used. Matt. 26:26-28.
12. Restricted as to the design—in remembrance of Jesus. Luke 22:19.
13. Restricted to a united church. 1 Cor. 11:16-22.
14. Restricted to those judged by the church to be worthy. 1 Cor. 5:11-13.
15. In addition to all these restrictions, and after having met all the foregoing requirements, the individual must examine himself. 1 Cor. 11:28.

Instead of self-examination being the only requirements, as some teach, it is only one of the fifteen requirements.
