

Cong. Burleson Announces \$56,300 Grant to CAP

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Congressman Omar Burleson announces approval of a \$56,300 OEO Administration & General Programming grant to the Community Action Program, Inc., with headquarters in Abilene.

The Program serves Taylor,

Haskell, Mitchell and Stephens Counties, and this grant will be effective November 1, 1973, to run for three months.

The program provides for the administration and management of the community action agency for general neighborhood services and outreach projects for the designated communities, including the establishment of a senior citizens program to include job development, placement and counseling, and arts and craft programs. Also provided will be a job placement program for 200 people as well as a training program for 50 low-income residents. The establishment of a small-scale non-profit garment project and neighborhood-owned grocery store are also included in the program.

City Secretary Rides Bike To Work

Have you wondered about the bicycle that stands in front of City Hall? It belongs to City Secretary, Roy Kimbrell. Roy, a native of Clovis, New Mexico, spent most of his childhood in Colorado. He was attending ACC when he married the former Francis Shouse and moved to Merkel, eventually becoming City Secretary.

What's so unusual about a daily ride to work on a bicycle? Well, it seems that Roy Kimbrell has no feet of his own to peddle with. However, he does fine with his artificial limbs, which are so well fitted that many people are unaware of the loss. Both legs were removed, below the knees, as a result of injuries received in the Korean conflict, where he was awarded the Purple Heart.

Following the incident, Roy was plunged into despair, but his assignment at the Hawaiian hospital, while rehabilitating, was to feed and care for a youth who had lost both legs and both arms, so Roy quickly regained his perspective. Determined to enter the mainstream of activity, the veteran de-

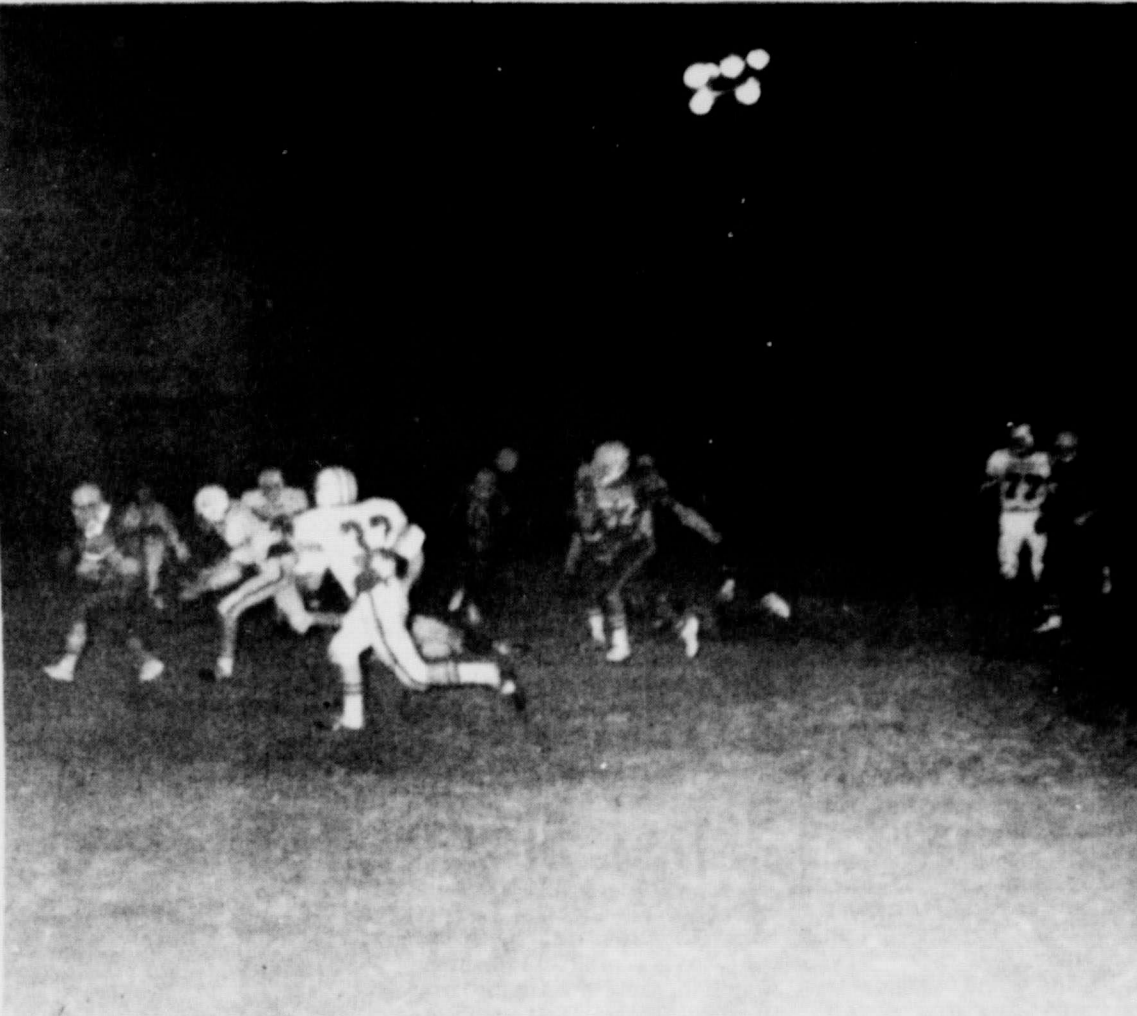
veloped an attitude of helping others.

He is a fire fighter, a member of Merkel's Volunteer Fire Department. He also connects the water hoses in the team races. Last Christmas, his gift of an artificial leg to the White Elephant Sale, was auctioned to benefit the Fire Dept. fund. It was filled with flowers and decorated the local florist shop.

His wife and family of daughters attest to his good humor. Not only is he a camping enthusiast, but he helps manage a Little League team in the summer.

Co-workers say Roy is "cheer on any gloomy day". He often teases about being squeaky and after mowing the lawn, jokingly complains of being a "cripple".

He began riding the bicycle to work for exercise last year. When asked if he uses that mode of transportation every day, he answered, "I ride it most every day, weather permitting but if the wind starts blowing, I call Francis to come after me and the bike in the station wagon." He adds with a grin, "Kinda lazy, you know."

After getting warmed up, the Jr. Badgers knew where to take the football. With Ronny Whisenhunt leading the way, Brad Pursley scored his first TD from 18 yards out. Extra point failed. Merkel 8--Rotan 0.

In the second quarter Pursley also scored from 10 yards out with Whisenhunt again leading the way. Extra point was no good. Merkel 14 - Rotan 0. Late in the 2nd quarter, Donny Riggan behind good blocking from the linemen Rudy Biera, Hector Ascencio, Garth Doan, Dwayne English, Nicky Carter, Dennis Phillips, Jesse Sparks and Thomas Jones bootlegged around left end from 16 yds out and the extra point by Brad Shugart was good. Score: Merkel 20 - Rotan 0.

The second half saw the Jr. Badgers come out and open up on the passing attack. First there was a pass to Jesse Sparks good for 15 yds, then another to Dennis Phillips for 20 yds. Then late in the third quarter, Riggan pitched back to Pursley, who threw the half back pass to Thomas Jones who was downfield and made a good catch. Play covered 25 yds. Then Pursley went to his left, cut back between good blocks by Rudy Biera and Dwayne English, took the ball across for another TD from 12 yds out. Extra point was no good. Merkel 28 - Rotan 0.

Badgers to Meet Robert Lee Friday in 2nd Home Game

The Knox City Greyhounds handed the Merkel Badgers their second defeat of the season Friday night as fleet footed Charlie Flye rambled for a hundred yards rushing and two touchdowns.

The Greyhounds went out in front 6-0 in the first quarter when Halfback Gary Carver went in from the eight yard line and fumbled in the end zone, and Stanley Newton covered the fumble for the touchdown.

The Greyhounds tried for two points on the ground but were unsuccessful.

In the second quarter, Flye broke the game open as he took an end around hand off for 68 yards for the touchdown. Again the rush attempt for two extra points failed for the Greyhounds.

With the score 12-0 at the start of the second half, Merkel's kick off was returned by Flye 90 yards for the Greyhounds third touchdown and Flye's second of the night. The Greyhounds failed to convert again.

Holding the powerful Greyhounds in check the rest of the game, the Badgers mounted a drive that ended with Fullback Jim Landpluming in from the eight yard line to give Merkel their first touchdown for the night. The try for two was no good.

With Flye leading the rushers in total yardage, the Knox City Greyhounds backs ran for

two hundred and eleven yards on the ground. Merkel's leading rusher was Tailback Steve West with 33 yards. Fullback Bill Watts had the next high with 29 yards.

Merkel had 13 first downs to the Greyhounds 11. Merkel tried nine passes and completed four for a total of 80 yards to Knox City's 15.

Merkel fumbled the football a total of four times and re-

covered it none. Knox City fumbled four times but lost the ball only once. The Greyhounds had three penalties for 15 yards, while Merkel had 6 for a total of 40 yards.

The Merkel Badgers will play host to the Robert Lee Steers this Friday night. The Steers dropped Roscoe Plowboys last Friday night 13-12 for their second win of the season with no defeats.

Rep. Martin Announces Committee Meeting Sites

Each week, a most valuable player will be named.

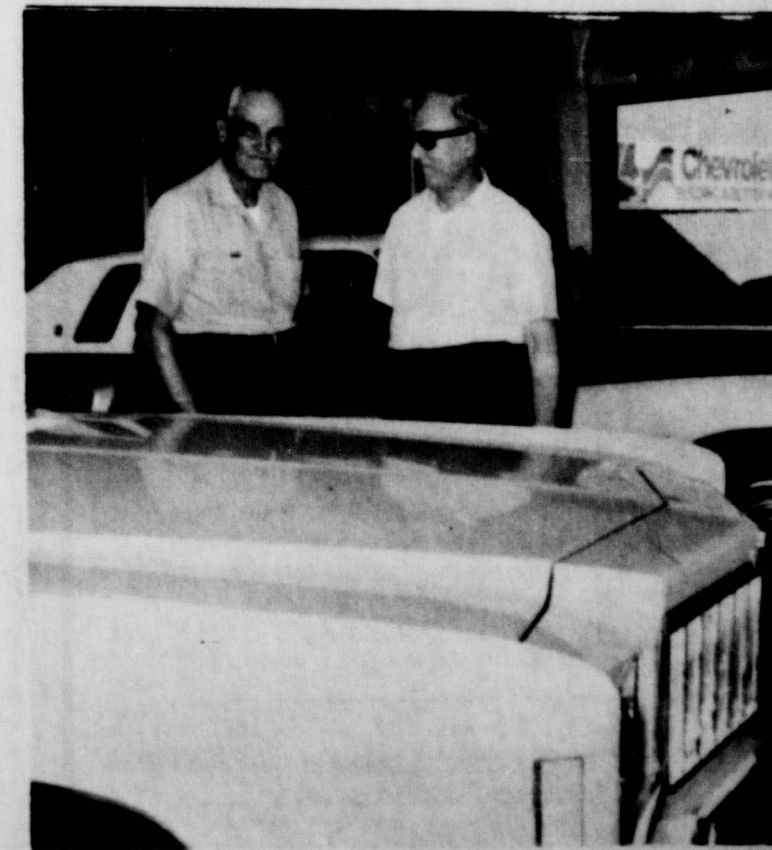
The membership drive is still in progress. Everyone is invited to join the Booster Club. The Club now has 75 members.

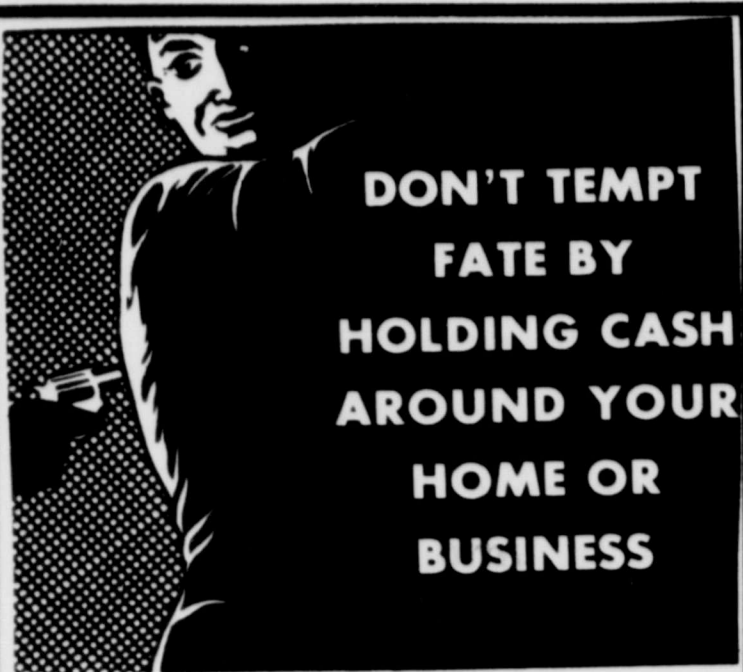

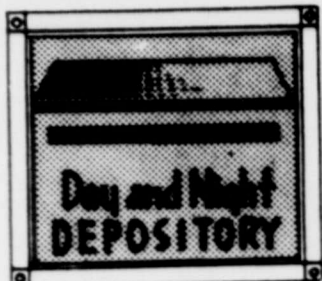
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Aerial Spraying And Chaining Control Mesquite

SONORA —Numerous West Texas ranchers have reported success in using the combination of aerial spraying, and mechanical chaining to control mesquite.

Several scores of ranchers here Thursday (Sept. 13) heard range scientists discuss the control of mesquite and other brush during field day of the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research Station at Sonora.

The ranchers also heard the scientists, of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, tell how the grazing system known popularly as H-I-L-F (high intensity, low frequency), has increased beef production. In about three years, the

HILF system of seven pastures at the Sonora station enabled researchers to increase from 40 to 60 the animal units per section. Each pasture is grazed intensely three weeks by the livestock (420 animals in this study: 60 percent cattle, 20 percent sheep, 20 percent goats). Each pasture is then rested four months.

As for brush control, Charles E. Fisher told the group that "Our aim should be neither annihilation nor eradication, but the economical control of brush."

He is professor in charge of brush control at the TAMU Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock, and he tells ranchers: "Do not do anything about your brush if you do not plan also to practice good management on the treated land."

Fisher said chemical and mechanical controls work rather well in much of the Edwards Plateau, but the efficient use of chemicals in areas like that of the Sonora station was limited because of the cedar.

Fisher described brush control on a ranch near Menard, where the time needed to "work" cattle was three hours on 1,000 treated acres, but six days on 1,000 untreated acres.

The ranchers also heard of benefits expected to accrue to them because of a quite expensive, thoroughly sophisticated unmanned space satellite that is photographing a "corridor" several hundred miles wide and extending from the U.S.-Canadian border to the Gulf. Much West Texas rangeland is in the corridor.

By means of the photographic "sensing," said Dr. Robert H. Haas, science hopes soon to be able to inventory, rapidly and economically, such rangeland conditions as --

-- the extent of brush infestation,

-- the presence and numbers of wildlife,

-- the damage from wind and water erosion,

-- the presence of plant diseases,

-- the extent of grass and other forages.

Haas is associate professor of vegetation management in the Experiment Station, one of the four groups sponsoring the Great Plains Corridor Study. The others: National Aeronautics and Space Administration, A&M Range Science Department and A&M Remote Sensing Center.

SITUATION ETHICS No. 1

"Is there any real 'law' of universal weight? The situationist thinks not. Situations ethics, on the other hand, calls upon us to keep law in a subservient place, so that only love and reason really counts when the chips are down. In situations ethics even the most revered principles may be thrown aside if they conflict in any concrete case with love. There are times when a man has to push his principles aside and do the right thing." (Situation Ethics, J.F.)

Situation ethics is a brand of reasoning, not only in the area of morals but also in the approach of some toward any Bible doctrine, designed to get around or appear better off than obey all law. The logic of the situationist leads to the conclusion that evil may be at times righteousness and righteousness may not always be the right-necessary course of action.

Men can change the rules when the rules were made by men in the first place. The Bible, however, is not a human invention, but an inspired revelation from Deity (II Tim. 3:13,17; Eph. 3:1-5; Gal. 1:6-12; Heb. 2:1-4.)

Situation ethics calls the Bible believer and the one who adheres devotedly thereto "a traditionalist". He further says "the good is whatever works, whatever is expedient, and whatever gives satisfaction, and the end justifies what ever method used." He further projects the idea "that if a man believes in keeping the commands of God he is "cold, unfeeling, mechanical, hard-hearted, mean and more than a little stupid".

Situationalism, if accepted, destroys respect for the Bible and for the authority of God; it can only result in the total destruction of society; it eats away the moral fiber of the nation and creates chaos and religious division. It is evil and wrong at its roots and thereby produces bitter fruit. Its most bitter fruit is the acceptance of the idea that "strict adherence to the Bible pattern is not necessary to be pleasing to God." Jesus said, recorded in John 8:31,32 "If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed; and ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free."

The law of Jesus, the will of God makes a clear distinction between good and evil, right and wrong. To assume that God has given a law that is contrary to the interest of people is to defame God. Man may suppose that his actions will make him happy because it satisfies an immediate urge, but his true good is served if he lives a pure, chaste life and accepts the doctrine of Christ (II John 9:11).

COTTON crop in Texas this season is expected to be the best since 1962. Production in the state is now estimated at 4,650,000 bales. This compares with 4,246,000 bales produced in 1972.

Yield based on Sept. 1 conditions is expected to average 406 pounds per acre compared with 408 pounds in 1972.

Harvest for the state has reached about 10 per cent completion. Cotton on the High Plains and Low Plains is making excellent progress. Crop potential on the Plains is above average.

Rains have hampered harvesting in southern sections and cotton root rot is a problem in the Blacklands.

BASED on Sept. 1 conditions, a record grain sorghum crop is forecast for Texas at 421,600,000 bushels. This would be more than 100,000,000 bushels above the 1972 crop.

Peanut production is now estimated at a record high in Texas of 502,400,000 pounds compared with 480,455,000 pounds in 1972. Yield is expected to average 1,600 pounds per acre. Acres estimated for harvest total 314,000 which is 7,000 more acres than the 1972 crop.

Soybean production for Texas is also estimated now to set a new record of 11,475,000 bushels. This would be more than twice the 1972 soybean production. Acreage this year is double that of the previous year. Average per acre yield is estimated at 27 bushels per acre.

Production of corn in the state this year is estimated at 60,800,000 bushels, an increase of 54 per cent over last year.

Wheat seeding for the state is now above 10 per cent, and is on schedule with last year. Farmers are preparing fields or have them prepared throughout the state.

RANGE and non-irrigated pasture conditions as of Sept. 1 averaged 76 per cent of normal and compared with 77 per cent last year and 86 per cent last month.
